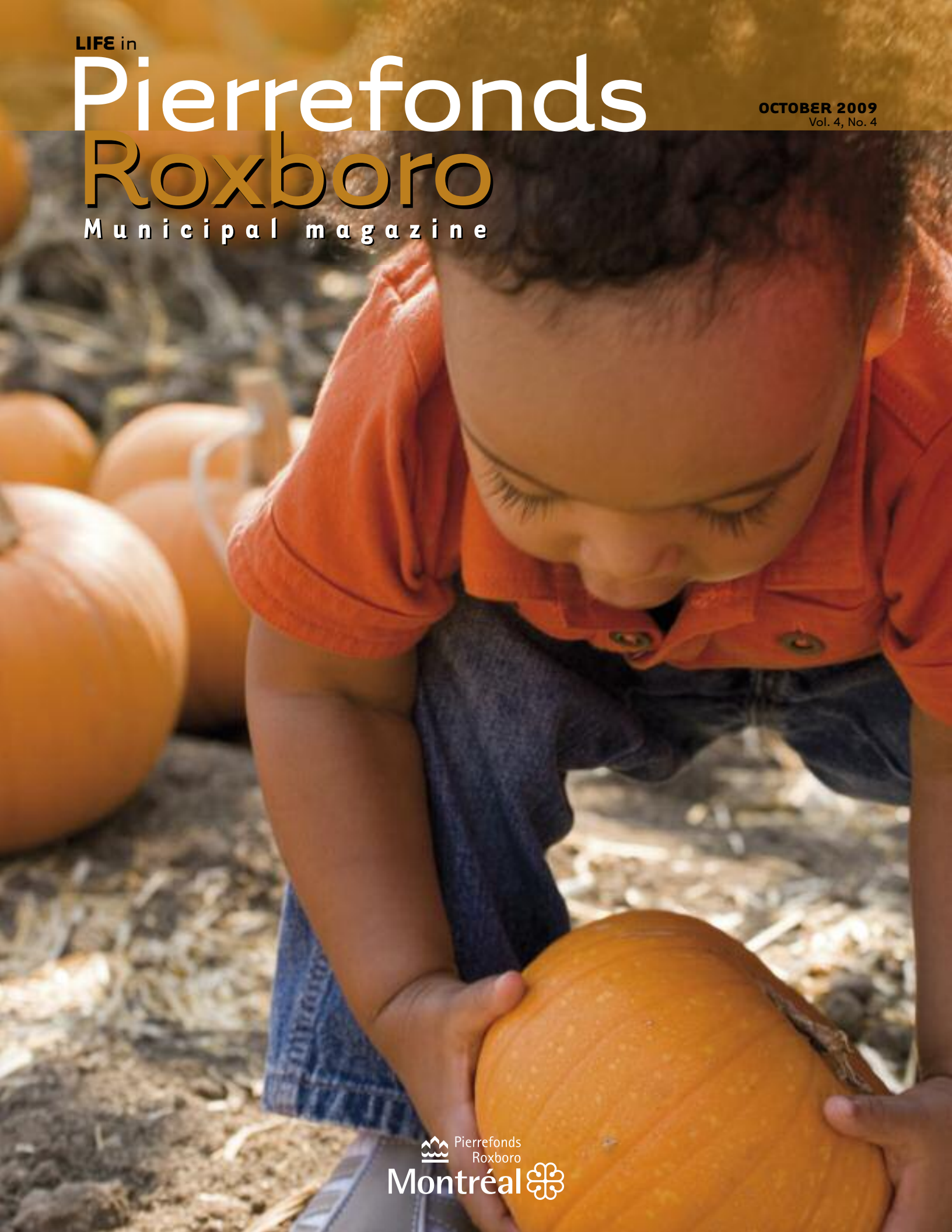

Major issues for the future!

For many years we have talked about improving the road network and public transportation and, slowly but surely we are making progress. Express bus routes and talk of extending the metro to Bois-Franc; improvements announced and forthcoming to commuter train service and added capacity for free parking at the train stations; better bicycle paths and carpooling offers are examples of the small steps we are making that will make a difference.

More than ever, we are all more conscious of what kind of environment we want to leave to our children and grand-children. We must pursue our efforts to act efficiently when it comes to environmental issues, the quality of air, quality of life and traffic jams, a non-negligible factor in this. In fact, too many single-occupant cars use our streets and highways daily resulting in lost time and pollution.

The Borough has provided a free parking area in the center of the Borough for people to at least join up on their way downtown or to work. This might seem like a very small step, however we feel that every small step can count. This parking lot is maintained and cleared of snow in the winter by the Borough and it is located between the fire station and the Borough hall on Pierrefonds Boulevard, conveniently located just east of St-John's Boulevard.

There are many benefits to car pooling, such as:

- Reduced greenhouse gas emissions, which helps preserve the environment;
- Reduced gas consumption, parking fees and vehicle maintenance costs which can present substantial savings...in some cases can even eliminate the need for a car;
- Increased opportunity to communicate with colleagues, friends, acquaintances and even family members which promotes harmonious relations between individuals;
- Passengers benefit from reduced stress levels that are linked to driving and traffic jams; they can relax and gain some valuable time for en-route entertainment, such as reading;
- Businesses and commercial sites eventually will need fewer parking spaces.

The Borough will continue to demand better services from the Société de transport de Montréal. Alternatives to the car could be implemented, such as the extension of Communauto stations to serve Pierrefonds-Roxboro and increasing the capacity of suburban trains serving Montréal-Deux Montagnes route.

We can do things differently.

Please adopt car-pooling and let's ride together for a better environment !

SOCIÉTÉ DE TRANSPORT DE MONTRÉAL COMPANION CARD... A free outlet for your leisure activities!

The Société de transport de Montréal (STM) Companion Card is designated for people with psychological, physical or visual disabilities whose functional limitations justify the need to have a companion in order to use the public transit network. This card allows the companion to access the bus and metro network for free. There are no fees related to the issuance of this card. With this measure, the STM wishes to facilitate the use of the public transit network for people living with disabilities in their daily and leisure activities.

QUÉBEC COMPANION CARD FOR INTERCITY BUS TRAVEL For a hassle-free tourism!

DISASTER OR FIRE? Stop worrying and have a nice sleep!

If you are an elderly, a disabled person, or you are having trouble to move, it can be difficult for you to leave your home in case of a fire or a disaster.

Firefighters can help you get out safely and quickly from your residence. To do this, simply register in the Disabled Persons Register of the Fire Prevention Department. With this information, firefighters can intervene more effectively in case of an emergency thanks to a computerized service that alerts them when your home is identified during a disaster or fire.

Remember to inform them of any changes related to your situation.

SAAQ REMOVABLE PARKING TAG Passenger or driver, you're eligible!

You are a person with reduced mobility? Get the SAAQ removable parking tag whether you're a driver or passenger. It allows you to use the reserved parking space on the street, in malls, cinemas and all places where there are parking spaces reserved for disabled persons. It is noteworthy that a medical certificate is required. The tag is for the disabled person and not for the vehicle. Using it without a passenger with reduced mobility on board is a violation of the Highway Code. Tourist and Leisure Companion Sticker

The companion sticker permits the companion of a person with a disability free entry to tourist, cultural or recreational sites.

BY-LAWS



CONSTRUCTION

We would like to remind you that a building permit or a certificate of authorization is required for construction work except for the regular upkeep of a building or to finish a basement, unless a bathroom or toilet is installed.

If you are not sure if your project requires a permit or certificate, call Construction and Building Inspection Division (311) or come to Borough Hall (13665, boul. de Pierrefonds).

The personnel will inform you on pertinent rules and standards.

Just a reminder ...

False fire alarm: beware the fees!

Fees will be charged to building owners when the Service de sécurité incendie de Montréal have been called to respond to a second false alarm for a same building. These fees may vary between \$100 and \$2 700 depending on the category of the building and the number of false fire alarms received for it. Information: www.ville.montreal.qc.ca/sim

Parking reserved for handicapped persons

According to the Road Safety Code, it is prohibited to park a vehicle in a parking space reserved for handicapped persons unless such vehicle displays a sticker or plaque issued for a handicapped person.

Temporary car shelters

The residents of Roxboro Sector, like the residents of Pierrefonds Sector, are authorized to put up temporary car shelters between November 1 and April 15.



Wood heating

On April 27, 2009, Ville de Montréal adopted a by-law aimed at protecting the quality of the air we breathe. According to this by-law:

- It is prohibited to install any device or fireplace capable of using a solid fuel;
- The installation of an EPA or CAN/CSA-B415.1 certified pellet stove is permitted;
- Gas or electric appliances are also permitted;
- Already existing equipment may continue to be used. However, should they ever need replacement, units complying with the by-law currently in force must be installed.

Parking reserved for fire vehicles

The Canadian Fire Prevention Code prohibits parking of a vehicle in such a way as to block access to fire department vehicles in places where a sign indicates the No Parking zone.

Snow removal

It is forbidden to throw snow or ice on public roads. This goes also for the snow removal contractor you hire. Remember that you are responsible for the work done by the contractor.

Report damages to your property's landscaping caused by the City's snow removal equipment to the Public Works Department no later than May 15.

Winter parking regulations

PIERREFONDS AND ROXBORO SECTORS

Don't forget that it is illegal to park on the streets between 1 a.m. and 7 a.m., from November 1 to April 1.

Parking of recreational vehicles

Recreational vehicles are defined as vehicles (motorized or not), pleasure boats or sail boats used for leisure purposes, including but not limited to mobile homes, tent trailers, snowmobiles, water scooters, and 3- or 4-wheel all-terrain vehicles.

PIERREFONDS SECTOR

It is forbidden to park or store a recreational vehicle measuring more than 6 metres in length in a residential front yard, unless it is more than 15 metres from the street. Exceptions are made on weekends, starting Fridays at 4 p.m., and on holidays.

It is forbidden to park a recreational vehicle measuring 6 metres or less in a residential front yard, in season* except on a land on which there is a building; only one vehicle may so be parked.

It is forbidden to park in-season* a recreational vehicle that measures 6 metres or less in the front yard except if the land is built and there is only one such vehicle.

It is forbidden to park off-season** a recreational vehicle in most residential zones; however, on land zoned H-1 (detached, semi-detached or contiguous

one-family dwelling), no more than three such vehicles can be parked in the back yard or a side yard.

* in-season parking:

parking or storing a winter recreational vehicle in winter or a summer recreational vehicle in summer

** off-season parking:

parking or storing a winter recreational vehicle in summer or a summer recreational vehicle in winter

Summer season

between April 16 and October 31

Winter season

between November 1 and April 15

It is forbidden to park or store a recreational vehicle in an off-street parking space required by a zoning by-law, except in residential H-1 zones (detached, semi-detached or contiguous one-family dwelling), at all times.

It is forbidden to park or store a recreational vehicle in the part of the driveway bordering the street, at all times.

GREEN WASTE AND DEAD LEAVES COLLECTION

A few more collections are scheduled to take place

Every Wednesday until November 25

REMINDER

See-through and orange bags are mandatory so that the content is easily visible.

PROCEDURE

Bags must be deposited close to the street between 8 p.m. the night before and 7 a.m. the day of pick-up.

ACCEPTED

Horticultural residues, twigs, leaves, stems, grass, garden waste, and small branches no more than 1 meter long and 5 centimeters in diameter.

EXCLUDED

Table waste, soil and stone, pet litter and waste, branches more than 5 centimeters in diameter, and stumps.

HOME COMPOSTING

Did you know that you could still compost during winter time?

First, you can continue to fill the compost bin in the backyard, as long as you previously removed the mature compost from the bin in the fall to make space. Since the activity of microorganisms is reduced, waste will accumulate until spring. It is strongly advised to add layers of dead leaves or wood mulch (sold as litter for animals in pet shop) during winter to prevent odour problems caused by an excess of moist material (kitchen waste) when the pile will thaw. Of course, here we presume that the access to the compost bin will be shovelled.

The other possibility consists of putting kitchen residues in tightly closed containers (pail, garbage can, etc.) stored outside. You should expect a volume of waste of 40 litres per person. When the content thaws in spring, you can incorporate it with a lot of dry material (brown material) to prevent odour problems.

Finally, there is a solution to compost indoor all year around. It is called vermicomposting. Funny and ideal to initiate children to composting, this technique is interesting for families that don't have access to a lawn. Vermicomposting is done by worms that are specialized in decomposing organic matter in a controlled environment. You can buy vermicomposting bin but you can build one at low costs with



few simple things. However, you must get compost worms (*Eisenia foetida*) from specialized producers or from a person who is already vermicomposting. The Daddy longlegs: A truly big fake spider!

Belonging to the class of Arachnida, the harvestman, commonly named daddy longlegs, is not a spider because its body is made of only one segment and it doesn't have venom gland. It does not produce silk like spiders. In addition of being harmless to human, it is very useful in the garden as it can catch slugs, snails and caterpillars. It also feeds on dead or living insects and organic matter. When a predator catches a harvestman's leg, this leg breaks at a precise point, allowing it to escape. The lost limb doesn't grow back. It's the perfect creature to get comfortable with spiders and learn how to control our fear





What can we do with dead leaves?

In the forest, fallen leaves are an essential source of organic matter that will be transformed into rich humus with the contribution of soil organisms. To avoid losing this organic matter, we can:

- **Mulch dead leaves on grass with a mulching mower** (without bag) as soon as they fall. The leaves will compost directly on the lawn and will enrich the soil. It is also thought to be a great method to control some tree and shrub diseases.
- **Keep leaves in bags or cans** so that they can be used in the compost bin during the following year. By the time they stay in bags, they will start to decompose and it will accelerate the composting process.
- **Protect perennials and non-hardy plants with pile of leaves.** This prevents temperature fluctuations where snow cover is thin.
- **Allow the leaves accumulate in plant beds** to recreate forest mulch that is rich in humus
- **Deposit the leaves** in see-through or orange bags for the borough's **green waste and dead leaves** collections.

EMERALD ASH BORER



A single piece of firewood can destroy millions of trees.

DON'T MOVE FIREWOOD!

Because of the infestation of invasive species such as the emerald ash borer in areas of Québec and Ontario, the Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) prohibits the moving of firewood to or from certain places.

You could face penalties or prosecution. All it takes is one harmful pest to create an imbalance in nature. You must then learn where your firewood comes from and find out if you live or travel (e.g. summer cottage, camping) in a regulated area. CFIA recommends to buy and burn local firewood only and to leave natural items in their natural habitats.

"Clear The Air!" is Quebec's contribution to the Canadian vehicle recycling program Retire Your Ride. The program's global objective for the entire country consists of recycling 50,000 vehicles built in 1995 or earlier, every year until March 31, 2011. Quebec's objective is to retire 20,000 vehicles from the province's roads before the end of the program.

Where does the recycling go?



During 2009, the collection of recyclable materials underwent some scheduling changes. Recycling collection is now on Mondays for residences west of St-Jean Boulevard and on Thursdays for residences east of St-Jean Boulevard including the territory of the former city of Roxboro. The company in charge of this collection is RCI Environnement; a company specialized in the area of waste management. The sorting of recyclable materials within recycling bins is no longer necessary. The sorting centre at the St-Michel Environmental Complex takes care of separating all materials automatically, with the help of technological advances in the sorting equipment that they now use. Your eco-quartier team visited this sorting centre so as to be more competent in responding to your questions regarding their procedures. According to information provided by the St-Michel Environmental Complex, before unloading their cargo, recycling trucks are weighed. There is a characterization station at the entrance of the sorting centre, where a person evaluates, at random, samples of the recycled materials that were collected. This is to evaluate the quality of the sorting at the collection stage of the recycling process.

Paper

Large heavy objects (like cardboard boxes) are mechanically separated from the lighter and finer papers (such as newspapers and magazines). The second sorting step, which is mechanical, allows them to sort newspaper from the rest of the types of paper. The third step involves the manual separation of other materials such as recyclable containers, garbage, and non recyclable materials. The rest of the material runs along 3 conveyor belts where up to 25 tons of fibrous materials (materials made from wood) per hour may be collected. (Source: Centre d'expertise des matières résiduelles de St-Michel)

Glass, plastic and metal

Glass bottles, plastic and metal containers as well as milk and juice cartons are sorted in this part of the sorting process. A large magnet is used first to isolate and remove any ferrous metal; this metal is then compacted and stacked in bundles. Next, a strong fan blows any plastic and aluminium materials and juice and milk cartons off of the conveyor belt leaving just the glass which is sorted into clear, coloured and mixed bins. The aluminium and plastic containers and the juice and milk cartons are then all separated manually. The plastic containers enter into a large drum where they are separated by weight and size; they are then sorted manually by type of plastic. (Source: Recyc-Québec).

The reprocessing of recyclable materials

When it comes to the valorizing of recyclable materials in Quebec's industrial sector, many players are implicated. There are more than 700 companies in Quebec specializing in the reprocessing of recycled materials. They are essential in leading recyclable materials back to the market as new products containing post consumer recycled content. Most of these companies are involved in collecting, sorting, processing of recyclable materials or production of goods with recycled content. Some companies receive recycled material and fully process it into new products. Acier Bouffard inc (for metal and ferrous objects), Cascade & Turcal inc. (division of Kruger inc.) (for paper products), and Chen group International Inc. (for plastic products) are all examples of companies that have huge involvement in the recycled materials market in Quebec. (Recyc-Québec)
