New Red Offer On Arms

MacMillan Replies To Bulganin

LONDON (P) — Prime Minister Macmillan told Soviet Premier Bulganin in a personal letter released today that "some measure of agreement" on disarmament would open the way for a general East-West settlement.

The British leader said the world's most urgent need is for conventional and nuclear disarmament "to dispel the threat of war."

He told the Russian premier: "You and I have lived through two world wars. We have seen their terrors. We must wish to preserve our children and grandchildren from a third and perhaps final tragedy."

Macmillan, answering an April 20 note from Bulganin, expressed disappointment that the Russians had made "no constructive suggestions for the achievement of German unity."

"The best way of settling the main international problems would be to allow the German people freely to elect their own government and to decide their own future."

LONDON (AP) — The Soviet Union's offer to admit Western inspectors if agreement is reached on a nuclear test ban was seen in Western quarters today as a major step forward in disarmament negotiations. But many details must be clarified.

The proposal was put to the United Nations disarmament subcommittee Friday by Soviet delegate Valerian Zorin. He suggested a two- or three-year halt to nuclear tests with an international committee under the UN to enforce it.

Zorin said the Soviet Union would agree to admit Western inspectors if there was agreement to the moratorium on nuclear tests.

Until now the Soviet Union has rejected Western demands that any halt to nuclear tests be backed up by inspection. The Russians held that the tests could be ended by a simple agreement among the H-bomb powers — Britain, Russia and the United States.

The immediate reaction from Western sources was that the Soviet proposal represented an important advance, but that it needs to be thought out before its significance can be judged.

NOT ENOUGH

Jules Moch, French representative on the subcommittee, told Zorin that an ending of tests would be no guarantee to the halting of production of hydro-

gen bombs.

The Western position is that the scientific knowledge gained over the years from nuclear tests could permit the H-bomb race to continue. The West insists that inspection and enforcement apply to the production of fissionable materials as well as to test explosions.

Zorin gave no reply when asked by U.S. delegate Harold E. Stassen if his proposal represented a change in Soviet thinking on the ending of the production of fissionable materials.

Hugh O'Donnell Named Batonnier

MONTREAL (P) — Hugh O'Donnell, son-in-law of Prime Minister St. Laurent, Friday was elected batonnier-general of the bar of the province of Quebec at a meeting of the group's general council. Also batonnier of the Montreal bar, Mr. O'Donnell succeeds Jean-Paul Galigne of Quebec.

Haiti Mob Sullen But No Violence

PORT AU PRINCE, Haiti — (P) — The army's ouster of Haiti's provisional president Daniel Fignole has brought sullen protests from the streets crowds he championed.

But thus far these groups, made up of workers from the capital's poorest districts, have refrained from violence in the face of the tight rein placed on Port au Prince by the military junta that ousted Fignole out of office and into exile Friday.

Fignole, one of 10 candidates for president in elections that have been twice postponed, was the favorite of the worker groups. They demonstrated for his return Friday under the guns of the army, but went home at 8 p.m. when a curfew went into effect.

The junta is headed by Brig. Gen. Antonio Kerekou, 48-year-old army chief of staff. He promised to rule only until order could be restored and elections held, but set no date for the elections.

Killer Of Policeman Won't Hang

OTTAWA (CP) — The cabinet has commuted to life imprisonment the death penalties imposed on two men convicted in separate murders in Ste. Agathe, Que., and Duncan, B. C., it was announced Friday.

The death sentence imposed on Michel Benoit, 32, convicted of shooting a policeman who interrupted him while stealing from an automobile on a Ste. Agathe street, has been commuted to life imprisonment in St. Vincent de Paul penitentiary, near Montreal.

Thomas Sidney Symes, 31, convicted of the shotgun murder of Paul Richard Powling, 28, on New Year's Day this year, had his death sentence commuted to life imprisonment.

Benoit shot Ste. Agathe police captain Ernest Chalifoux, 46, Aug. 7, last year. He was convicted Dec. 3 and sentenced to be hanged June 21.

Flu Epidemic Spreads From Orient To West

GENEVA (Reuters) — The seeds of a new influenza virus sweeping Southeast Asia already have spread to the North American continent, the World Health Organization said Friday.

In London, biochemist Norman Pirie said the new strain might have been born under the influence of nuclear fall-out from test explosions.

The new strain, officially dubbed "virus A-Singapore-157" because it first was identified by laboratory tests in that city, has Philippines, about 185,000 cases

Diefenbaker Satisfied After Meeting PM; More Talks Monday

OTTAWA (CP) — Result of the armed forces vote in Monday's general election is expected to be announced sometime today.

It will pave the way for an answer early next week to the question of whether the Liberals will continue in office or turn over the government to the Progressive Conservatives.

At one point in a round of cabinet meetings and a 90-minute closed meeting between Prime Minister St. Laurent and Progressive Conservative Leader John Diefenbaker, Mr. St. Laurent said Friday it would not be proper to "formulate a decision" on a government changeover before the service vote is counted.

There were no further cabinet meetings planned for the week end, but one might be held Tuesday.

The vote of 117,000 servicemen and some 7,000 overseas wives was taken last week and conceivably could upset some close victories resulting from last Monday night's civilian vote count.

Harry Vine Injured In Car Crash

A Sherbrooke man is in critical condition and three other people are suffering from various injuries received in a car-truck collision on the highway between Granby and Montreal yesterday afternoon.

Seriously injured is Harry Vine, 33, of 433 Vimy St., Sherbrooke, with a broken arm, and leg. Hospital officials said this morning that he had regained consciousness and his condition was improving.

Others hurt are Karl Bauer, 46, of Outremont with two broken legs; his son, John, 12, with a broken wrist and nose and Henry Rummel, 57, of Dorval, with broken feet.

Police said that the Bauers and Vine were driving in the truck towards Montreal just past Granby when their machine collided head-on with the car driven by Rummel.

The injured were taken to the St. Joseph Hospital in Granby.

REPORTED JUNE 9
In the United States, the WHO said, cases of influenza were first reported on a ship which arrived in San Francisco June 9.

The risk of Americans catching the flu is "considered to be a distinct possibility" because of the large numbers of their fellow citizens who have been in Asia recently and now are scattered all over the United States, the health organization added.

In stressing the mildness of the new flu strain, a WHO report said:

"Very few deaths have been scientifically proved to be due to this cause and are mostly among elderly people suffering from chronic bronchitis."

In order to prevent further outbreaks of the new virus, vaccine production already has started in several countries, using specimens collected by the WHO in its 57 centres in 46 countries.

54 Years In Sherbrooke

Echenberg's Sell Out To Simpson — Sears

Echenberg's furniture store, established for 54 years in Sherbrooke, will be taken over by Simpson-Sears of Montreal and Toronto this fall.

Sale of Echenbergs, which will be effective next October, will end half a century of service to Sherbrooke by the firm, one of the oldest on Wellington st.

Simpson-Sears today maintains only a mailorder office in the city. The Echenberg store, which underwent extensive modernization and renovation at the end of World War

II, is expected to be done over again before the new occupants move in.

The store was founded in 1903 by the father and uncle of the present proprietors, Moses and Manassah B. Echenberg. Col. Samuel Echenberg and his brother Abraham, took over the store in 1913. Abraham had been in the business 40 years at the time of his death a few years ago. Samuel now manages the business with the wife of his brother.

The store has been on its present site for 49 years.

Mayors Side-Step Education Resolution

MURRAY BAY, Que. — (P) — The Canadian Federation of Mayors and Municipalities Friday night side-stepped a resolution on education and dumped the problem into the laps of the federal and provincial governments.

A Winnipeg resolution that the federal government assume all the cost of elementary education ran into opposition from Quebec delegates, led by Hugh Hanson, deputy chairman of the Montreal executive committee.

After Mr. Hanson's objection that the Winnipeg resolution would encroach on an exclusively provincial domain, it was sent back to committee for revision.

As adopted the resolution instructed the federation "to urge upon the federal and provincial governments the consideration in financial arrangements whereby the provinces of Canada may more adequately support the cost of education across the nation."

The delegates also adopted a resolution calling on the federal government to increase its grant for construction of railway underpasses under the grade crossing fund.

Rash Of Murder Cases Swamp Scotland Yard

LONDON (Reuters) — Scotland Yard's murder squad is swamped with cases.

A rash of violent deaths throughout Britain this spring has forced the detective bureau to seek extra manpower from other police departments.

Friday, Scotland Yard borrowed a detective from the west London district of Paddington to head an investigation into the slaying of a would-be emigrant to Canada.

Mrs. Rosetta Oliver, wife of a local businessman, was found strangled Thursday at her home in Exeter. She was lying on her bed, fully clothed.

Mrs. Oliver, who was planning to go to Canada with her husband to join their children, was the 29th slaying victim since April 12.

6. The case of the buried tobaccoist, Frederick Walter Jeffs, 37, who was found half-buried under twigs, leaves and bricks near a lover's lane in the Birmingham area April 19. He suffered severe head injuries. Police searched for a 20-year-old brunette believed to have had a date with him, and a man who was in Jeffs' store when Jeffs made the date.

Foreign Aid Bill Passes Senate
WASHINGTON (P) — President Eisenhower's \$3,637,000,000 United States foreign aid bill moved on to the House of Representatives today, propelled by a 57-to-25 Senate vote.

Every effort by bands of Democratic opponents to trim its totals and limit its authority to one year was smothered in a series of roll calls that kept the Senate in session until after 11 p.m.

On final passage, 26 Democrats and 31 Republicans voted for the bill; 17 Democrats and eight Republicans opposed it.

News Of The Week In Review

Sweet Music For PCs; Philip Upset Protocol

Progressive Conservatives heard what was to them the sweetest music in 22 years.

They won the general election albeit by a thin margin and John Diefenbaker, 61-year-old Prairie lawyer, prepared for a call to form a new government.

Prime Minister St. Laurent and his Liberals took the defeat with a certain grace, although doubtless staggered by the extent of the vote that knocked nine cabinet ministers from their parliamentary seats.

PHILIP'S ANNOUNCEMENT
Prince Philip won delighted comment with his announcement to Canadian soldiers in Germany that he and Queen Elizabeth will visit Canada in October.

Reports of the royal visit had been cropping up-and just as quickly discounted-for months. The prince's off-the-cuff re-

mark to the soldiers brought delighted chuckles in Britain, at the expense of Buckingham Palace officials to whom protocol, critics say, has become a fetish.

COMMIE COMIC

There was hopeful talk of a disarmament agreement — but that was at the beginning of the week.

Party Secretary Khrushchev of Russia, who was touring Finland, seemed to squelch such talk for the time being when he declared that the concept of "open skies" over the Arctic as a preliminary to a general disarmament agreement was "quite comical."

However, a couple of days after Khrushchev's disparaging remarks, the Russians at the London disarmament conference brought forward a new plan of their own.

This called for a ban on all nuclear test explosions and estab-

lishment by East and West of observation posts in each other's territory to enforce such a ban.

MAYFLOWER ARRIVES

Mayflower II finished a 5,000-mile journey across the Atlantic in a re-enactment of the historic trip of the Pilgrim Fathers, who landed in Plymouth, Mass., in 1620.

The 180-ton square-rigged bark, commanded by Cmdr. Alan Villiers, an Australian, was cheered by thousands.

All 22 members of the ship's company wore pilgrim costumes — including one Canadian, Charles Church of Falmouth, N. S.

FRENCH PREMIER

Maurice Bourges - Maunoury became premier of France — the 23rd since the Second World War — in a lacklustre ceremony that reflected the current political confusion in the country.

The Radical - Socialist picked

up the reins of power from Socialist Guy Mollet, in whose cabinet he was defence minister.

CHINESE ATTACK

A Chinese Communist shore battery fired on an American plane — and hit it.

The plane didn't come down — but the Communists made propaganda on the contention that it had invaded Communist mainland air.

In Washington, the U. S. Navy said the plane had been a bit off course, but was about eight miles away from the China coast when hit.

FIREMAN'S PROBLEM

For the second straight year the annual party of the fire department in Corner Brook, Nfld., was adjourned.

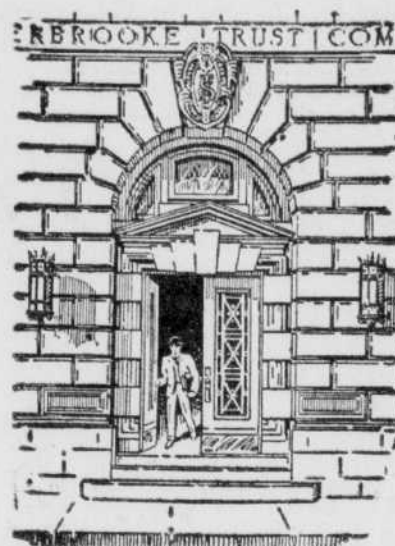

TOWNSHIPS TOPICS

By WARREN SPAFFORD

TRUST SALE RUMORED — Once again, as last year, rumors are circulating that the sale of the Sherbrooke Trust is being negotiated. Last year an offer by a reputable, coast-to-coast trust company was turned down. The original offer made by this outside company was \$325 per share, which was increased recently to \$355 per share. At a recent meeting of the Sherbrooke Trust, it was learned on reliable authority that the president and the board of directors turned down the last offer by the same company because they felt that control of the Sherbrooke Trust should rest in Sherbrooke and the Eastern Townships. With the most recent offer it is believed that, if the deal is authorized, shares of the Sherbrooke Trust will be turned over to a French language trust firm with headquarters in Montreal and whose operations do not extend beyond the Province of Quebec. The offer by this latter firm is rumored to be in the neighborhood of \$360 per share and some are of the opinion that the present board of directors will be retained should the deal go through. Not long ago, when the Sherbrooke Trust issued their financial statement, it was emphasized that the Sherbrooke Trust was the only English language company of its type outside the Island of Montreal in the province. It is also believed that architects are presently working on plans to build a three-storey addition to the Sherbrooke Trust Building. Sometime in the near future a statement is expected from either interested party on the latest rumor.

WELL OILED MACHINE — Right now there is talk of another election within a year, but that would be nothing new to the electors of Compton County. This week, the Liberal MPP for the county Dr. Fabien Gagnon, died in Quebec City and if Premier Duplessis calls an election in Compton this fall and if Mr. Diefenbaker decides to go to the country soon, Compton will have something of a record for provincial and federal election voting — 23 elections in a period of 32 years or an average of one every 1 1/2 months. All this despite the fact that J. A. Blanchette has represented the riding at Ottawa for 22 years. The dates of the Federal elections were: 1925, 1926, 1930, 1935, 1940, 1945, 1949, 1953 and 1957 and of Provincial voting, 1927, 1929, 1931, 1935, 1936, 1939, 1944, 1948, 1952, 1954, and 1956. As one can see the hustings hardly had time to stop creating before another election came along.

UNDERPASS SOLUTION — Graduating from Ecole Polytechnique this year was Robert Gregoire, son of Jean Marie Gregoire, Clerk of the Crown, of the Peace and Magistrate's Court. The young Gregoire is the first person to have graduated in engineering, after taking preliminary courses at the Technical School here. As a thesis for his graduation in Montreal he submitted a plan to improve the South Stukely underpass, whose locale does not have to be described. In his thesis he proposed to replace the present tunnel with a boulevard passing 420 feet to the right of the tunnel with a clearance of 14 feet on both sides and 17 feet in the middle. The passageway would be 32 feet wide. By changing the route 1.200 feet in the direction of Sherbrooke and 2,300 feet in Montreal direction the number of curves would be reduced from five to two. Mr. Gregoire is probably not the first person to suggest changes in the tunnel but it's high time that changes were made.

ODDS AND ENDS — Helga Von Eiken, of Montreal, who acted in When the Sun Shines at the North Hatley Playhouse last summer has been assigned the role of Mrs. Squeamish, a prudish woman about town, in The Country Wife, by William Wycherly. The play is scheduled to open at Rena Theatre off Broadway, in New York on June 26. A recent edition of Saturday Night carries a feature on Bermuda, dubbed, Canada's Mid-Ocean Colony. It gives the opinions of resident Canadians on the island. Also to be seen is a picture of Dick Varney, formerly of Sherbrooke, one of two Canadians working at the local radio station, ZBM.

Two local doctors performed a near miracle when they operated on a young man injured in a stabbing incident recently. When the victim arrived at the hospital and was seen by the doctors his heart had stopped beating. With careful massaging of the heart and stitching of the wound, the man is now walking.

Francis Thibault, unsuccessful PC candidate in Sherbrooke county, polled 37 per cent of the popular vote in Monday's voting. In the last federal election the PC candidate polled 33 per cent. Our election predictions sort of went down the drain, but nevertheless, Compton and Drummond could not have been any closer.

The citizens of Scotstown and surrounding districts have sent a petition to Premier Maurice Duplessis asking officials to take the necessary steps "to arrest the speeding and drunken driving in our towns and on our highways and thus avoid the unnecessary loss of life which we are at present experiencing. We would ask that you submit and enforce laws similar to those existing in Ontario and neighboring states."

Late Sawyerville Resident Noted For Adroitness At Nailing Bottle To Wall

SAWYERVILLE — It's been more than ten years since Bill McCallum last nailed a bottle to a tree.

But no one in this little Compton County community of 800 has forgotten him. Nor is it likely that they ever will. They can always pull out a copy of Ripley's "Believe It Or Not" and read about his exploits. Some of them can blow the dust off pieces of glass with nails, pins and tacks through them, and remember the day when Bill "had the imp in him." All can swap yarns, like the one about the time "Bill nailed a beer bottle to the minister's fence post."

He died in 1947, at the age of 71 — but now, he's a local immortal.

For Bill — born and raised the son of a Magdalen Islands' fisherman — had a way with glass and sharp objects for which there seems to be no explanation. He could drive a nail, tack, pin, needle, knife blade, or anything else that was sharp through anything made of glass without cracking or breaking the glass.

It is said that he often put a nail through a light bulb without breaking it. In many Sawyerville homes today, there are glass shelves through which, the owners say, Bill bored holes with a nail and a hammer so that they could be fastened to wall brackets.

Impossible? Perhaps. But samples of Bill's work are in Ripley's collection of world oddities. They were exhibited at the World Fair in Chicago in 1933, and again in San Francisco in 1939.

Other samples can still be found in Sawyerville, along with memories of the man himself.

Bill McCallum was not an educated, or particularly talented man. He was a carpenter in Sawyerville, and a cripple. A hip disease with which he was born had shrivelled his right leg, so that it was shorter than his left. But despite this handicap, Bill was a huge, hulking man. He stood well over six feet tall, and in his prime weighed over 200 pounds. He had tremendous strength in his arms, shoulders and hands.

He lived in various places. Sometimes he lived in his tiny shop, sometimes friends would take him in for a night or two. Often he lived at Randboro with his two sisters and brother Charles.

Bill was always a rather mysterious man. Normally, he was quiet and seldom exhibited his peculiar talent with glass. But when "the imp was in him," then Bill would "nail up the town." In the morning, there would be pieces of glass and bottles nailed up to trees, and fence and door posts everywhere.

Village blacksmith E. C. Painter saw Bill in action often. "He'd just take a five-inch spike, a hammer, and with one sharp tap, drive the spike clean through a bottle," Painter says. "Sometimes he drove the nail at an angle, sometimes straight, but it always went through just as clean as you please."

George Halliday, a retired farmer who knew Bill well, remembers that "it wasn't easy to get Bill to do his tricks. He was very self-conscious about his talent. I walked into his shop one day, and asked him to nail a piece of glass to the doorpost for me."

"Well, Bill was a bit reticent at first, but finally he got a small nail, a piece of ordinary window glass and a hammer. He gave the nail one hard tap, and

nailed the glass to the doorpost as cleanly as if it had been a piece of wood."

Both Halliday and Painter still have samples of Bill's work. Painter's consists of a board with seven pieces of glass nailed to it. One piece is nailed to the board with a three-cornered file; another with seven steel organ reeds, another with nothing more than a splinter of glass; one a jack knife blade, one with a five-inch screw, one with several pins, and another with three carpet tacks.

Bill had a fierce pride in his talent, and would never do it for money.

If he had been wronged, or insulted by somebody, Bill would nail a bottle to that person's fence or doorpost. This was a hex. If he wanted to compliment someone, he would do the same thing, but this time it was meant to be a symbol of good will.

To this day, no one knows how Bill could do such strange things to glass, not even his brother Charles.

"But even when he was a boy, working in the canning factory at Boyon Island in the Magdalenes," 80-year-old Charles recalls, "he could do it. It was confined to fixing windows then—instead of using putty, he would just nail new panes of glass to the frames. I asked him many times when we were younger how he did it, but he never told me. All he would say was 'if I put my hand on your shoulder, Charlie, you could do it too.' But he never put his hand on my shoulder."

"He put his hand on his nephew (Richard Knapp, of Sulphide, Ont.) once, and told him to try it. And that boy, only 12 at the time, put a nail clean through a light bulb without so much as cracking it," Charles said.

A mystic to the end, Bill was fond of telling his friends just before he died "the beast is in me; it won't be long now."

He died in January, 1947, without realizing his greatest ambition—to build a glass box with a hammer and nails.

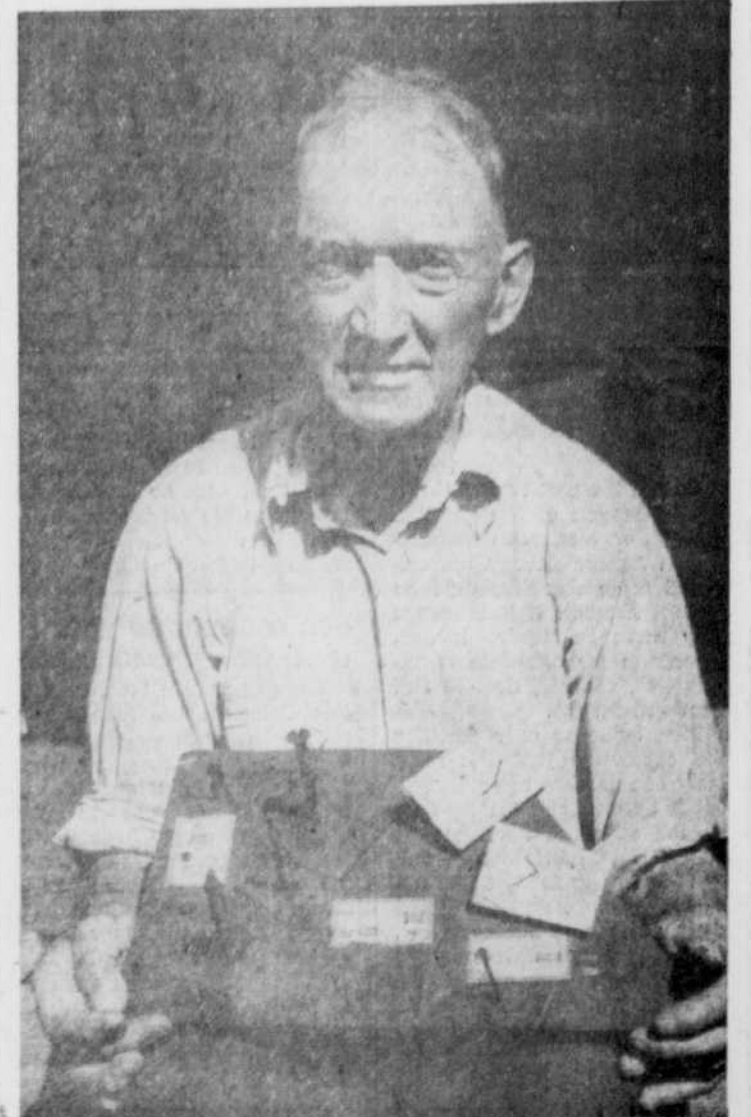
Two Eastern Townships men have been honored for their contribution to the development of the National Farm Radio Forum.

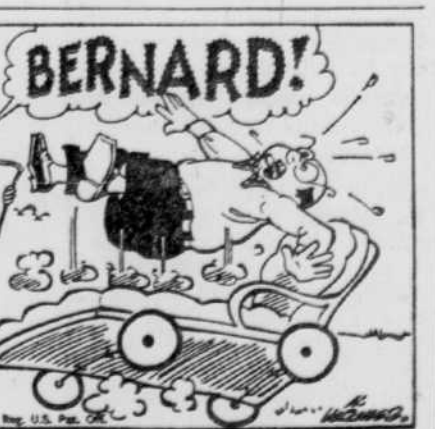

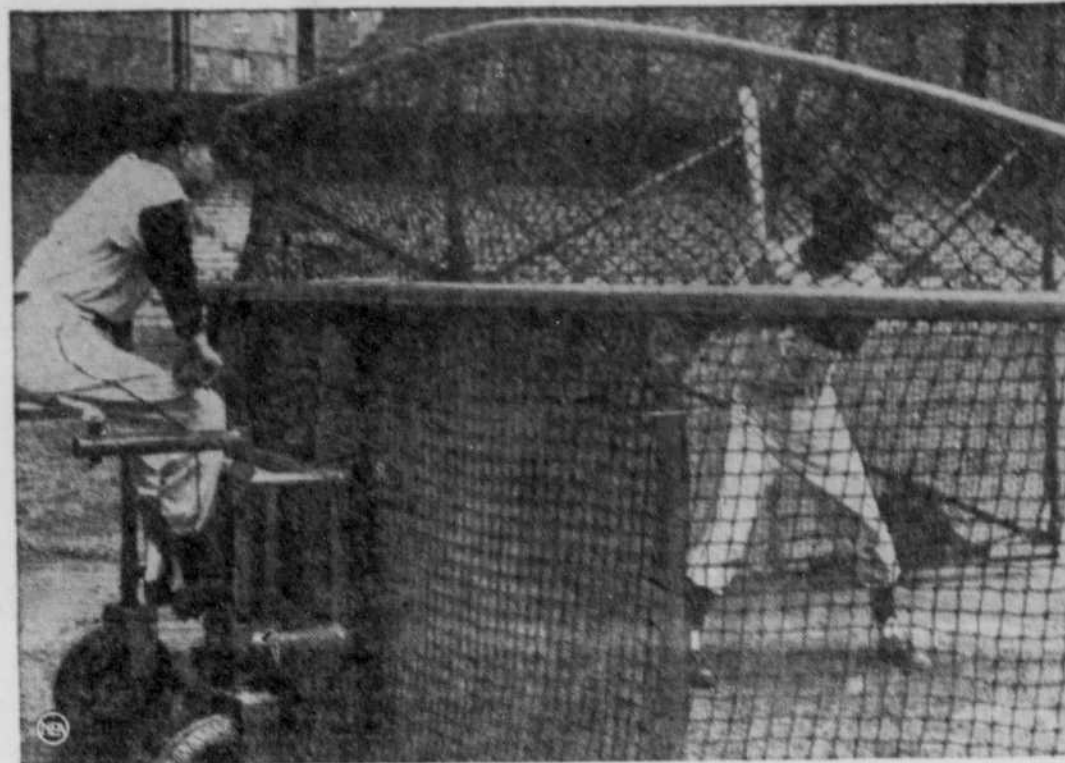

Toronto Race Fans Set Two Records At New Woodbine Track On Saturday; 26,000 Attend And Wager \$1,039,285

TORONTO — (P) — It's taken 98 years to get more than 26,000 persons at a Canadian racetrack on a single afternoon and just as many to come up with racing's first million-dollar day. The attendance figure isn't shattering in these days of bumper sports crowds.

The marks were set last Saturday at New Woodbine in suburban Toronto, one of the largest and most modern racing plants in North America. The attendance was 26,705, the betting \$1,038,285.

On sober reflection, it's a wonder why the crowd figures weren't much higher because the Ontario Jockey Club, sponsor of the meet, had everything going for it, including, as it turned out, one of the fastest Canadian-bred three-year-olds in history.

It was a fine afternoon. The attraction was the 98th running of the Queen's Plate, the most colorful event on the racing calendar. The \$13,000,000 track, opened just a year ago, is geared to handle crowds of 40,000 or more.

You can't walk more than 50 yards from any given point in the grandstand or clubhouse without bumping into mutuels machines. There were no local competing sports attractions to speak of.

There's free parking space at the track, about 15 miles from downtown Toronto, for nearly 25,000 cars. On top of everything else, the top Canadian-bred three-year-olds were going for a purse of more than \$25,000.

The race was broadcast and televised in Toronto, which could have made some inroads on the attendance figure. Even so, with a population of 1,500,000 to draw on, why wouldn't the biggest racing day in the year draw a fullhouse crowd of 40,000 or more?

President Will Harridge Fines Five Players A Total Of \$650 For Their Part In Thursday's Fracas

CHICAGO — (P) — American League President Will Harridge Friday fined five players a total of \$650 for their part in Thursday's free-for-all fight between New York Yankees and Chicago White Sox.

Fines of \$150 were assessed against outfielder Larry Doby of the White Sox and infielder Billy Martin and outfielder Enos Slaughter of the Yankees.

Fines of \$100 each were levied against first baseman Walt Dropo of the White Sox and pitcher Art Ditmar of the Yankees.

Doby, Dropo, Martin and Slaughter were banished by umpires for the first-inning brawl which started when Doby flattened Ditmar with a left hook for a wild pitch he considered as an intended duster.

In New York, Dan Topping, co-owner of New York Yankees, said the Yankees will refund the amount of their fines to the three players involved in Thursday's Chicago brawl.

Although Topping didn't say so, it was understood that the Yanks also will refund the \$100 that pitcher Tom Sturdivant was fined after last Sunday's fight with Ray Boone at Detroit.

It further was reported that the total of \$5,500 in fines assessed against Yankee players after a recent night club incident probably will be refunded if the players behave the rest of the season.

Boston Red Sox Swap Billy Goodman To Baltimore For Mike Fornieles In Straight Player Trade, No Cash

BOSTON — (P) — The Red Sox Friday swapped infielder-outfielder Billy Goodman, a lifetime .300 hitter, to the Baltimore Orioles for right-handed pitcher Mike Fornieles.

It was announced as a straight player swap between the two American league ball clubs.

Goodman, 31, used only as a pinch hitter on rare occasions this season, has played the outfield, first, second and third base.

Goodman has been with the Sox since they bought him from Atlanta in 1947.

At the start of this season Goodman was one of nine active American leaguers with a lifetime .300 average. He won the league batting crown in 1950 with a .354 average.

Goodman has been shut out at first base this year by such players as the Boston roster as Mickey Vernon, Dick Gernert and Norm Zaichin. Gene Mauch and Ted Lepico have had the call at second base and Frank Malzone is bidding for rookie of the year honors with his sharp play at third.

Fornieles, a native of Havana, won four and lost eight games last season while pitching for both the Chicago White Sox and the Orioles.

The Cuban righthander has won two and lost six this year while pitching 37 innings in 15 games. He has a 3.95 earned run average, has walked 17 and struck out 43. He has pitched one complete game.

Greg Mulleavy Resigns; Royals Get Campanis

MONTREAL — (P) — Greg Mulleavy has resigned as pilot of the floundering Montreal Royals of the International Baseball League, general manager Rene Lemyre announced Friday.

Al Campanis, director of the parent Brooklyn Dodger farm club, is taking over temporarily with no word on who eventually will succeed Mulleavy.

Lemyre said Mulleavy will report to Brooklyn, possibly today. The Royals touted as league contenders this year, are 16 games off the pace in the basement.

Lemyre's announcement at a press conference confirmed rumors that Mulleavy was through here.

Lemyre also announced that catcher John Roseboro is going to Brooklyn and that Dodgers' third-string catcher, Joe Pignatano, will replace him here. Pitcher Bob Walz is being sent to St. Paul's in the American Association.

Also announced was the shifting of shortstop Mel Geho from Demoines of the Western League to Montreal and the sending of pitcher Danny McDevitt to Brooklyn from St. Paul. There was no mention of a pitcher to replace Walz.

NEW YORK — (P) — Joe DiMaggio once authored a book about being lucky to be a Yankee, and recent developments indicate he wasn't fooling.

It wasn't luck when Hank Bauer tried to steal second with the bases loaded at Detroit, and all ending up safe with the winning run scoring, we aren't sure just what you would call it.

Which brings to mind that the Yankees currently are engaged in a series with Chicago White Sox which very well could determine whether New York is going to win the pennant, as per habit, or confound the experts by not winning.

They have two or three good men for every position and Casey Stengel could pick a lineup blindfolded which could win the pennant in a breeze.

It may be the Yankees have enough men for two or three good major league teams but not enough for one championship team. The fact Stengel has been shifting his lineup continually

may indicate a doubt in his mind as to just which men belong in there.

The really great teams of the past had one lineup and barring injury necessitating a substitution, the lineup was in there day after day until the fans could name the batting order in their sleep.

The White Sox have been going along with pretty much the same lineup this year, and they're still leading the league.

What may be taken as a bad omen for New York is that, with the exception of Kansas City, it has been having trouble with the lower case clubs. It has won all six with the Athletics, but to date is even-strephen with Baltimore and Washington, with four victories and four losses with each club.
