ST. MATTHEW'S CHURCH.

This Church and congregation have been greatly blessed by the presence amongst them of a spirit to offer willingly to the Lord out of that which He hath given to them. This fall witnessed the dedication of several offerings to God and His service. On the 24th September Mr. Arthur Judge, the eldest son of one of the families in the congregation, was admitted to the Order of Deacons, thus offering himself to God's service; on 12th September five young persons solemnly gave themselves in the Rite of Confirmation to live henceforth not to themselves, but unto God; a beautiful stone pulpit was erected in loving memory of the Rev. George Hamilton by his father; an alabaster reredos of excellent workmanship given by three sisters in affectionate memory of Mr. William Evans Price; and a rich white altar cloth for the Festival of our Blessed Redeemer, given by a member of the congregation, all in the same service offered to God for the use of His Sanctuary.

Besides this goodly list of rare and costly offerings, the handsome gothic tower and spire are being completed by efforts which are costing not a few of the congregation some measure of self denial, and the contractor, Mr. Hatch, has been favored by fine weather almost throughout the work.

The pulpit is of "oolitic freestone," known in England as Painswick stone. Its general outline is circular, and its base and substructure are massive and solid. The superstructure is rich in ornamentation and very perfect in its minutest detail. A slab of polished alabaster runs around the top of the pulpit and surmounts the perforated arches which spring from clusters of marble columns, three in each cluster, bound together in the centre by a band of oolitic stone. These columns are of very beautiful variegated marbles, contributed by Italy, Spain, Egypt, California and England. Between the arches are niches with carved canopies in which will shortly be placed alabaster statues of the three great preachers, St. John the Baptist, St. Peter and St. Paul. The carving, in its sharpness and depth and general excellence, does great credit to the skill and painstaking care of a Quebec artist, Mr. F. Morgan, of the firm of F. & J. Morgan. The work was done at Cheltenham, in England, where Mr. Morgan made his home last winter.

The reredos has been admirably executed by Messrs. Earp, of London, England. It consists of a central panel, in which is shown in strong relief "the last supper." Each of the thirteen figures is carved in clear, distinct and striking form. At each end is a niche with a rich canopy resting on marble columns. In one stands St. Matthew, the Patron Saint of the Church; in the other Nathaniel. On the top of the second, which is in a deep recess, stands a cross, and beneath it the Pelican feeding her young with blood from her own breast.

The altar cloth is of white damask silk covered with leaves and flowers embroidered with rare skill and care. It is divided into three panels, each bearing in its centre a shield with a monogram.

A correspondent thus describes Mme. Bernadaki, the fair Russian who aspires to be known as the most beautiful woman in Paris:—"I saw her at the Opera, looking the very type of perfect, it soulless, loveliness. In features she resembles greatly the portraits of Mme. Rancmar. The eyes are of a deep blue, the nose aquiline, the mouth small and shaped like Cupid's bow. The exquisitely shaped head is set to perfection on the white, rounded throat, and the shoulders in mould and in coloring would put to shame the most artistic form ever sculptured in marble. If her face were only expressive it would be divine. She will be next season one of the queens of Parisian society."

AN ITALIAN MURDER.

History of a Fearful Crime Just Brought to Light.

A report of the proceedings before the Tribunal of Naples gives the history of a fearful crime which has just been brought before them. It is called the "Femayrou of Marianna," a little township not far from Naples. The case was tried with closed doors, showing, says the writer of the article an exaggerated regard for public morality, where such romances as the "Pot-bouille" are sold by the thousand. After acts of infidelity, well known in Marianna, Assunta di Angelis left her husband in the spring of 1881, and passed three months with her lover, Guiseppe Minervini, in Naples. Abandoned by him at last, she returned to the house of her husband, who received her once more. It is a matter of conjecture as to whether any conditions were affixed to this pardon; however that may be, the husband and wife came to live in Naples. In the autumn of last year Assunta heard that her lover was going to be married, and sent for him. On his approaching the house she waved a handkerchief in welcome and received him with smiles. A short time after, a woman, Assunta, rushed out of the house brandishing a razor from which she licked drops of blood, and crying out, "Madonna, help me, help me! They have killed him in my house." Giovanni di Lorenzo, the husband, also fled, throwing down a long dagger. In the instruction of the case it was decided that, though terrible wounds had been inflicted by the razor, the mortal blow was given by the dagger. The doors of the court were opened when the advocates addressed the audience, and, as usual, "splendid speeches" for the defence were made. Admitting that the mortal blow had been struck by the husband, the crime, it was contended, was not his, but of the irresistible—a theory adopted by the jury, and Giovanni di Lorenzo was liberated the same evening. Assunta di Angelis, on the contrary, was condemned to ten years of hard labour with *circumstance attenuante* as a necessary accomplice. "Yet," continues the journalist, "she had done nothing more than give cuts of the razor on the head, the forehead, and behind the ears. Do you not see that she endeavoured only to defend Minervini, as all betrayed lovers do in Naples? This was omitted by the prosecution, and the forgetfulness costs Assunta ten years of hard labour." This deed of blood was committed on September 29th, 1881, a little more than a year ago.

MRS. LANGTRY'S DIARY.

How the Lily Spends the Day During the Off Season.

Mrs. Langtry gets up at an early hour, and with her friend, Mrs. Labouchere, takes an early walk. She is a street pedestrian, and thinks nothing of twenty miles. She is a very good outdoorswoman, and pulls a long stretch easily. Her hands are very large, but well shaped and white, and she seems as well as a woman can be. Her taste in dress is very simple. She wears tweed and flannel dresses, and very plain little brimless hats—no jewellery, and evidently likes Quaker colors. One of her charms is a perfect unaffectedness. She has the manner and speech of a well-bred boy when she talks of horses, boats, or out-of-door sports, a natural consequence of being brought up with brothers. Less of the consciousness of being stared at than this world-renowned beauty betrays could hardly be found. She puts her heavily gloved hands in the pockets of her ulster and walks off, evidently thinking of anyone but Mrs. Langtry. She has a very cool, unimpassioned temperament, evidently, and when Mr. Langtry's means gave out, and it became necessary for the brave woman to work, she is said to have remarked to a friend, "I am fitted for the stage, for I had always a good memory, and I do not believe I should be much agitated." She might have added that she had also a very good voice. This calm temperament of hers is the very best of all her gifts for the stage. She is said to suffer from stage fright on first nights, but great personal kindness, and a sense of the security of the most admirably built and the most easily emptied houses reassure her.

GERMAN JEALOUSY OF RUSSIA.

Berlin, Nov 9.

The Minister of War has given orders that the Baltic forts be extended and strengthened at once, and directed the construction of earthworks and batteries to protect the harbor of Memel at the north end of Curischehoff, the now northern extremity of the German Empire. The erection of strong earthworks to defend the harbor of Pillan, at the entrance of Frischehoff, the extension and completion of fortifications in eastern Prussia, and especially those at Posen, have also been ordered. An explanation of this act of the military authorities of Germany may be found in the repeated warnings received from the Embassy at St. Petersburg, as well as various unofficial reports, tending to show the alarming increase of warlike feeling in Russia, a feeling which it is believed the Russian Government is strongly in sympathy with. The recent heavy concentration of troops on the Russian frontier has caused serious apprehension here and in Vienna. Members of the general staff entertain some rather startling theories on the subject of this movement of Russian troops, and it is plainly stated by some of these that whatever Russia's intentions may be, Germany will be found ready at all points should the ill-concealed antagonism of the two nations come to the arbitrament of war.

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The President of the Republic of France has conferred upon the Treasurer of this Province, the Hon. Jonathan Wurtele, D.C.L., the dignity of Officer of the Legion of Honor.

Private advices received are to the effect that in the recent Newfoundland elections, thirty Government supporters and eight Opposition members were returned.

Sir Garnet Wolseley has changed his mind, and will enter the British peerage as Baron Wolseley of Cairo, instead of "of Egypt," as was at first intended.

Mr. Chapleau did not intend coming home for some time. The disaffection in the party at the Mousseau programme has rendered his return necessary, and he will be here next week. Mr. Mousseau can afford to smile at the anxiety of the friends of the ex-Premier.

Lord Dufferin has made an excellent impression on the Egyptian Ministers. He told them he had not come to take the direction of affairs out of the hands of Sir El. Malet, but to work with the latter on terms of perfect equality. The business of the mission commences immediately, as Lord Dufferin received instructions from the British Cabinet by the mail which has just arrived. Medical reports at Cairo show that 41 deaths occurred in the British army of occupation from the 1st to the 9th instant. Nearly ten per cent of the troops in Cairo are sick.

A subject of remark in the neighborhood of Ottawa is the number of mechanics and laborers coming there from the United States to settle. Since the late period of universal depression, wages across the lines have not recovered in anything like the same degree as the cost of living. Canada is yet the cheaper country to live in, and will, therefore, continue to be sought by those for whom she has work.

The Marine Department is getting life boats made of the best American pattern, and although this country cannot yet probably, afford anything approaching to the splendid system of life saving stations which extends along the United States coast, yet when the life boats are distributed there should be a squad drilled in the use of them in every place where one is situated.

The Committee has resolved to promote the emigration of 7,000 or 8,000 persons from the poorest districts in Ireland. The Committee has accepted the rules under which the Government is prepared to assist emigration. The amount to be spent will probably be near £25,000 sterling. Canada is certain to receive a large share of this emigration.

Commander Frene has communicated to the Academie des Sciences the results of his experiments on board the Desaix on the boilers of that vessel. He places zinc plates on the inside of the iron boilers, which thus become voltaic elements. The zinc is oxidized and hydrogen is liberated from the water, which prevents all danger from superheating, and protects the boiler from incrustation of matter held in solution by the water.

When gold is shipped from the United States to England it is usually put in strong canvas bags. Each bag contains \$5,000. Ten of these bags are packed

in a new strong iron keg. Thus each keg contains \$50,000. The average rate of insurance is about \$1,700 on each million dollars. During the last twenty years every keg of gold that has been shipped has been taken out of Wall street to the vessel by one man, old John Barclay, who is said to have grown rich in the business. He gets \$1 for every keg taken on his truck, and he often takes forty of them at a load. The loss by abrasion from the shipment of gold to England is about \$250 on a million. The United States Government is now putting its gold into bars for shipment instead of shipping the coin. Each bar or brick is valued at \$4,500. The bars are packed in kegs of saw dust to prevent abrasion.

FIRE THIS MORNING.—About ten o'clock this morning fire broke out in the stables of Mr. Flanagan, carter, in St. Michael street. It quickly communicated to the double brick tenement house, and the whole soon became a mass of smouldering ruins. The adjoining house was considerably scorched. The burnt building was owned by Mr. Boyce, grocer, and was occupied by Edward Flanagan, carter; Joseph Dewfall, laborer; Mr. Roy, boarding house; Mrs. Widow Martin, and Mr. Lafrancois, all of whom lost more or less of their effects. The water was turned off from that section and the fire got considerable headway, although a hose from the nunnery well had, in the meantime, been got to play on it. One of Mr. Flanagan's horses was badly burned.

ST. ANDREW'S SOCIETY.—The following officers were last evening elected for the ensuing year:—President, Wm Rae; Vice-Presidents, J Harper and Hon D A Ross; Treasurer, J McVicker; Secretary, A Robertson; Committee, P Johnstone, W Brodie, D H Gaggie, D Kerr and A D Webster; Chaplains, Rev J Cook DD, and Rev W B Clark; Physician, Dr Rowand. It was resolved to celebrate the anniversary by a dinner and a committee appointed to carry out the arrangements, viz:—Messrs D H Gaggie, D R McLeod, D Kerr, the President, Vice President and Secretary. Relief has been extended in the past year to twenty-five persons, the passage of three was paid to Montreal, two to Scotland, one to England and one to Prince Edward Island. There was expended \$231.47, and the receipts (including balance of \$211.38 from last year) have been \$493, leaving a balance in the hands of the Treasurer of \$262.91 and \$100 in the Savings Bank.

QUEBEC AND THE PROVINCIAL EXHIBITION.—At a meeting of the Provincial Board of Arts and Manufactures at the Provincial capital, with Father Audette in the chair, a resolution was passed asking the Government to appoint a Permanent Exhibition Committee for the city of Quebec, to make arrangements for the holding of next year's exhibition here.

IMPROVEMENTS.—The Federal Government have sold the lot and buildings, ordnance, storehouses and powder magazine, forming the corner of the Grand Battery and Hobert streets, to the Laval University for the opening out of their frontage ground.

LEG FRACTURED.—Philip Hamel, fireman, while going to the fire from No. 1 Station this morning, by some means fell from the reel and had his leg fractured.

HANDSOME COLLECTIONS.—The collection at the services in the Anglican churches on Thanksgiving were for the pension fund of the Church Society and the handsome sum of \$319 were taken up as follows:—Cathedral \$204, St. Matthews \$95, and Trinity \$20.35.

NORTH SHORE RAILWAY.—It is said that the work of extending the North Shore Railway from the present terminus here to deep water will be begun immediately, the contract having been awarded to Mr. Roberge, of Montreal.

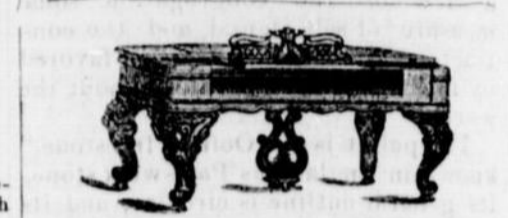

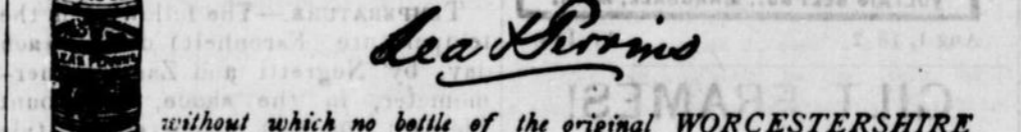
