



His Release Said to Have Been Set for Tuesday. HIS RIGHT TO AN APPEAL. Court May Be Called on to Quash the Verdict of the Court-Martial-De-monstrator in London.

New York, Sept. 17.—A Paris despatch to the Sun says: Capt. Alfred Dreyfus will be released on Tuesday, and thereafter will be at liberty to reside, as a free man, in any part of the world. The court-martial will then be open to him for quashing the verdict as soon as the necessary facts for demonstrating his innocence have been collected. The prisoner himself is unable as yet to declare his intentions in this respect, but his family and friends, in announcing the withdrawal of the appeal to the military court, admit that the request of the Government, and that of the injured man to rest until the rehabilitation of the latter is complete.

TARS TO GIVE SHOWS

Assisted by Montreal Militia Men and Highland Cadets

ON THURSDAY AND FRIDAY

The Sailors From the Warships Will Go Through All Kinds of Exercises and Evolutions for Charity.

A grand naval and military tournament is to be given on Thursday and Friday evenings of this week in the Victoria rink, in which the sailors and marines of the British warships due in next to-day will participate. Entertainments of this character are extremely popular in Montreal, and as the proceeds are to go to a worthy charitable institution, there is no doubt the affair will be a grand success. Vice-Admiral Sir Frederick Bedford, commander of Her Majesty's North American squadron, has been pleased to give his sanction to the event, and the officers and sailors of the fleet express themselves as being greatly pleased to return in this manner the many kindnesses hitherto shown them by the citizens of this city.

A splendid programme of naval and military drill, with a number of special features has been arranged, which will take place. There will be 100 picked men from the warships in front, supplemented by 60 marines, the Highland Cadets, 400 strong, under Major Lydon, will assist with their favorite rifle, and the remainder of the force will be furnished with equipments from the Royal Scots and Montreal Field Battery.

The committee of management of the tournament will be composed of the captains and lieutenants of the ships and the commanding officers of the various regiments. This is not the first occasion on which British Jack Tars have been seen at their picturesque evolutions in the city. It is doubtful if they will ever have an opportunity of giving the public an exhibition of their work under such favorable auspices.

Capt. Princess of H.M.S. Talbot, will give his personal attention to the general part of the programme, and Lieut.-Col. Stevenson is actively interesting himself in the military section of the tournament. He has arranged for the use of the drill hall for the sailors, so that they may have shore drill for three days previous to the opening of the tournament.

The opening of such a body of men on the parade ground of the Victoria rink, will create a picturesque scene which is not often witnessed in this city, and one that will tend to arouse the patriotic feelings of the spectators. It is being held for the different detachments to march into the rink to the strains of martial music, and the places around the British colors. The programme is designed to occupy two hours, to commence at 7.30 p.m. and terminate at 9.30 p.m.

The sailors will give their attractive exhibitions of cetina and physical drill, while the marines will give an exhibition of their exercise. The Highland Cadets, so well and favorably known, for their pretty drill exhibition, will have a grand display in the tournament. From an athletic standpoint, the most interesting feature of the event, will be the exhibition of the three teams composed of sailors and three local teams, a number of whom will be selected from the city first division. The three winning teams of the first night of the tournament will contest on the second night. Among the features will be wrestling on horseback, fencing on bicycles between Sergt. Major Hawker and a competitor, in addition to the usual games. The known swordsmen will perform a number of difficult feats. One of the Jack Tars is an expert bicyclist, and he will be called upon to do some fancy and trick riding. An obstacle race will be one of the amusing features of the programme. It is possible for the Field Battery to get their guns into the building, they will give an exhibition of mounting and dismounting. The different programmes will be provided for both nights of the tournament.

## IT GAVE HIM NO PEACE

Defaulter's Conscience Drives Him Back from the Klondike to a Penitentiary in Tennessee.

Memphis, Tenn., September 16.—Charles O. ## IT TIED UP \$825,000

Dispute Over Payment of Transportation Charges Arises from Big Shipment of Klondike Gold Dust.

Vancouver, Sept. 17.—A dispute regarding the payment of transportation charges has technically tied up \$825,000 worth of Klondike gold dust in the St. Lawrence. The gold was shipped on the steamer Cleveland recently from St. Michael. The bank of British North America and the Canadian Bank of Commerce of Dawson, own the gold which was shipped from Dawson to St. Michael, being consigned by way of St. Lawrence. This vessel having been chartered by the United States government as a transport, the gold was shipped under the flag of the Cleveland. The charterers of the Cleveland held their hands on the gold, while the companies owing the gold, being the bank of British North America, and the Canadian Bank of Commerce, being the owners of the gold, so that the Cleveland charges are too excessive.

## CITY HAS MAD DOG SCARE

Buffalo Fears That Hydrophobia Lurks in Many Kennels.

Of the 12,000 Dogs in and Around the City, it is Said One Third Have Been Infected.

Buffalo, Sept. 17.—The mad dog scare is growing. There are, it is estimated, between 11,000 and 12,000 dogs in the city of Buffalo, and about 5,000 in the small towns adjoining. It has been estimated by the health authorities that at least one-third of these animals have come in contact with some of the mad dogs, or their victims, which have been killed by the police, and this assumption is the chief reason that hydrophobia is now slumbering in many hundred dogs.
