Sing-Songs To Commence On Thursday

WILL BE HELD WEEKLY AT ATHLETIC GROUNDS; ARE SPONSORED BY CITY

Attracted Average of 2,000 People Per Night Last Summer — Max Ford to Again Lead Mass Singing — Wallis Malone Expected to be Piano Accompanist — Fine Program Arranged for Initial Event

The fourth season of the municipally-sponsored weekly sing-songs will open at the Westmount Athletic Grounds next Thursday evening, commencing at 8.30 o'clock, it was announced yesterday by Norman Smyth, city recreation supervisor.

The sing-songs, which will be held each Thursday night throughout the summer, are probably the most popular events held as part of the municipal recreation program.

Last year they attracted average turnouts of approximately 2,000 persons and early indications point to the fact that they will be equally, if not more largely attended this summer.

Max Ford, principal of King's School, who so ably led the singing last year, will again take over the same role. Wallis Malone, it is expected, will act as piano accompanist.

As was the case in previous seasons excellent programs of entertainment will be arranged to augment the group singing. They will include boxing and wrestling matches, motion pictures and amateur shows. The latter met with the widest popularity last summer.

For the opening event, a program of unusual interest is being arranged, details of which will be announced in the Examiner next week.

So popular were the sing-songs last year, that even rainstorms failed to cancel the enthusiasm of those participating in the group choral work. In fact, attendances never fell below 500 on the gloomiest evening.

Ordinarily, when rain is predictable prior to the hour at which the event is scheduled to commence it is cancelled for that week, but there were numerous instances last year, when the crowds who had assembled were reluctant to leave, even when skies darkened and a storm threatened.

Most of the pictures were snapped by local residents and loaned to the library at the request of Miss Jenkins. The original collection has been greatly augmented by the loan of photographs taken by newspaper photographers but have never appeared in print. Among them are a number of films that are outstanding and show the Royal Couple to better advantage than many published in papers here.

The picture that has probably attracted the greatest interest is an autographed photo of the King presented by His Majesty to the City of Westmount. When the exhibition is concluded it will be returned to the City Hall where it will serve as a lasting souvenir of the historic occasion.

The photographs will remain on display at the library until the end of the current week at least. The collection is believed to be one of the few of its kind on the Island.

The former Maranac DeRosay, Mrs. Levy was the widow of Joseph Charles Emile Levy, a notary and alderman of the City of Montreal prior to his death 30 years ago. She died suddenly on Monday in her 74th year.

A native of Brookline, Mass., Mrs. Levy came to Montreal following her marriage in 1885 and had resided in this city since. Surviving are four daughters, Mrs. J. Sullivan, Mrs. Jules Lareau, Mrs. Paul Gelin and Miss Marie Levy, all of Montreal, and a brother, Warren DeRosay, residing in Pennsylvania.

Westmount High School has just recently published its year book—an accurate pictorial and comprehensive written record of the year's activities. This annual is the one event which is enthusiastically anticipated throughout the advancing term.

This memento of the wide variety of weekly doings and occurrences in and about the numerous organizations of the school is all set down in a clear and attractive manner for the student readers who make up—along with parents, friends and distant relatives—a subscriber's list approximating seventeen-hundred persons.

Many Changes
The magazine has undergone a number of changes, which, thanks to its alert editor, John W. Dodds, have raised its already high esteem to that of even greater value. The first striking innovation is in the cover design, which, although the white background is maintained, the crest has been moved from the larger center piece to the lower right hand corner and a number of extra lines added. The Latin phrase Vox Ducum (Voice of the Leaders) is handsomely displayed in a vertical position above the crest with the month and year alongside.

This issue has been justly dedicated to the school's most conscientious worker—the Principal's secretarial aid, Miss Emma G. Lawlor.

Wild Chase Results in Arrest Of Two Suspects

Two men giving the names of Lucien Lacroix and Armand Martel, alias Renaud, were arrested early yesterday morning by Westmount police following a chase through city streets and were booked on charges of loitering. They were scheduled to appear this morning on counts of attempted break-in and burglary.

The two men were observed shortly after one o'clock at the rear of the Thrift Store at 4175 St. Catherine street by A. Rigby, of 4171 St. Catherine, as he was putting his car in a garage in the lane.

Rigby, who had previously noticed Constable Besson on St. Catherine street, reported the presence of the men to the officer. By the time they returned to the scene, however, the men had jumped into a car and were driving off.

The constable and Rigby immediately gave chase in the latter's car and followed the pursued auto as far as St. James street, when it slowed up and Martel jumped off in an attempt to escape on foot.

However he surrendered when Const. Besson fired a shot in the air. He told police at headquarters where to locate his companion and the second man was picked up yesterday by Captain Broden and Sgt. Tremblay.

Mayor W. Merrill To Open "Y" Club

Y.M.C.A. Summer Group Will Commence Activity on Monday — G. H. Penrose to Introduce Mayor — Elaborate Program is Arranged

Now that the humid summer heat is quickly approaching its zenith, the five hours spent daily in the classrooms are only dull memories and there is plenty of extra time for recreation. Thoughts turn at once to how the summer will be spent.

Commencing Saturday at 8.00 a.m. (standard time) a group of boys will leave weekly throughout the "sticky" months of July and August for the Y.M.C.A. summer camp—Kamp Kanawana.

Provision has been made for those who will not be able to attend the camp, in the form of an expertly organized and active Vacation Club.

This Vacation Club was established a little more than five years ago, and has rendered an indispensable service to the community. It will be continued this year when on Monday next, at 9.30 a.m., His Worship Mayor Merrill of Westmount will deliver a brief address to the former members and the great number newly interested in the health-giving project. The Mayor will be introduced by G. H. Penrose, acting as honorary chairman. This important event will take place upstairs in the assembly hall.

Starts Sixth Year
The Club then launched on its sixth year of popular support, the hobby division will start at ten o'clock, when members will be able to participate in model aircraft construction, photographic work and wood-work. There will also be a lively game of baseball in Westmount Park.

At ten thirty, the life-saving classes will commence followed by a beginners' swim and advanced swim. It should be remembered that these last three items will occur on the program again on Wednesday and Thursday.

The highlight of the day will be reached at 2.00 p.m., when the boys will be afforded the privilege of visiting H. M. S. Berwick soon to be in port, and one of the larger class of cruisers to come here.

Aviation Day
The following day which has been titled Aviation Day, will feature as early as 9.30 a talk on aviation by local Squadron Leader R. H. Ross. In the afternoon at two, this air day will resume when the members will be invited to Cartierville Airport as welcome guests of the Montreal Light Airplane Club. Here in the flat-roofed hangars, they will be permitted to see the workings of the smaller machines and perhaps learn something.

MEN SENTENCED FOR LOITERING, PETTY THEFTS

Receive Prison Terms of One Month Each for Taking Goods From Doorways

Two men, who said their names were Leo Leclerc, 23, no address, and Lucien Gibeau, 23, of Montreal, received prison sentences of one month apiece when they pleaded guilty to charges of theft and loitering before Recorder C. A. Hale in Westmount Police Court last week-end.

Leclerc was charged with loitering and of stealing two pounds of butter from stairways on Sherbrooke street and Claremont avenue. Besides the loitering count his companion was charged with stealing cream and eggs from doorways.

Both men were arrested at 7.30 a.m. on June 12 on Sherbrooke by Sergeant Baker and Constable Denbigh.

The recorder sentenced them lightly due to the fact that neither had a previous prison record. Persons previously arrested on similar counts have been much more strictly dealt in order to rid the city completely of loiterers and petty thieves.

Leclerc and Gibeau were given a month on each count. However the sentences will run concurrently.

Royal Tour Decorations Are Taken Down By City

Following the completion of the visit of the King and Queen, the last of the municipal Royal tour decorations in Westmount were taken down this week.

The flags, crests and bunting along the routes of the procession were removed early in the week, while the special flags and decorations fronting the City Hall were the last to go.

Decorations on commercial buildings and private residences that so enhanced the appearance of the general layout have also almost entirely disappeared and few indications remain as reminders of the colorful appearance displayed by Westmount on the day of the historic event.

One of the most interesting of the decorations to be taken down was a twelve foot Canadian Red Ensign, bearing the old Dominion crest representing the nine provinces.

Of considerable historical value, the flag formed part of the decorations on the McGill Medical Building when the Duke of York visited Montreal in 1901. It was again flown on the occasion of the Coronation of King George and Queen Elizabeth.

POLICE ARE INSTRUCTED TO KEEP SHARP LOOKOUT FOR VIOLATORS OF RULES

Number of Mishaps on Local Streets Has Been Increasing to Marked Extent — Campaign Instigated by City Council — Special Attention Will be Given to Speeding — Public Co-operation Sought

Commencing immediately traffic regulations in Westmount are to be rigidly enforced and all violators of the laws will be severely penalized.

The drive to cut down the number of traffic violations was decided upon by the City Council at a regular session Monday night, due to the fact that accidents on city streets have increased materially during the past year and a half.

Decision to instigate the campaign at the present time was made by the council in an effort to curb street accidents at the start of the summer when traffic is heaviest.

To Watch Speeders

Particular attention is to be given to speeding, it was announced, and stiff fines will be meted out to motorists who drive faster than the legal limit of 20 miles per hour.

Following the Council session the city manager, P. E. Jarman, stated that motor accidents had considerably increased in 1938 over the previous year, and that they had continued to rise during the first five months of 1939.

No alarm of any kind has been felt at the increase, but the Council decided that immediate steps should be taken to check it.

Increase In Cars

As a matter of fact, the added number of motor cars on city streets is believed responsible to a large extent for the increase in accidents, but this cause can be greatly counteracted if proper measures are taken, it is felt.

Following communication from the Council, Chief Walter A. Gough has been planning a rigid campaign to apprehend all traffic by-law violators and police officers and constables assigned to traffic duty, have been instructed to issue tickets to all motorists who do not conform with the regulations.

Besides speeding, special attention will also be given to "stop" intersections, and crossings at which traffic lights are placed.

While there are no intersections here that could be singled out as being particularly dangerous, as there are on other parts of the Island, extra traffic officers will be assigned to arteries which carry particularly heavy volumes of traffic.

Fines To Be Heavy

In future a motorist who gets away with a mere warning will be rare indeed, as officers have been instructed to issue tickets whenever a traffic violator is caught.

The success of the drive, it is pointed out, depends a great deal on the co-operation of the motorist public and they have been requested to aid the work of the Police Department by making a special effort to heed traffic regulations closely.

This is their first visit in five years to their home. They will remain here for the duration of their furlough which is about twelve months.

C. MCK. THOMSON DIED SUDDENLY MONDAY NIGHT

Was Vice-President and
Works Manager of Can-
adian Tube and Steel

The death occurred suddenly at the Western Division of the Montreal General Hospital Monday night of Charles McKenzie Thomson, of 67 Holton avenue. Mr. Thomson, who was 52 years of age, was vice-president and works manager of the Canadian Tube and Steel Products Limited, Montreal.

Mr. Thomson suffered a heart attack at his residence early Monday evening and was rushed to the hospital. He died soon after being admitted. He had been in ill health and under medical treatment for some time, but was well enough, however, to attend to his business duties.

Mr. Thomson, who was born and educated in Edinburgh, Scotland, was a noted authority in the steel industry. He came to Canada about a quarter-century ago and joined the Canadian Tube and Steel Products firm about 20 years ago, after having been associated briefly with the Canadian Car and Foundry Company. He had been vice-president of the steel products company for the past nine years, and was well-known in the steel business in the United States as well as in Canada.

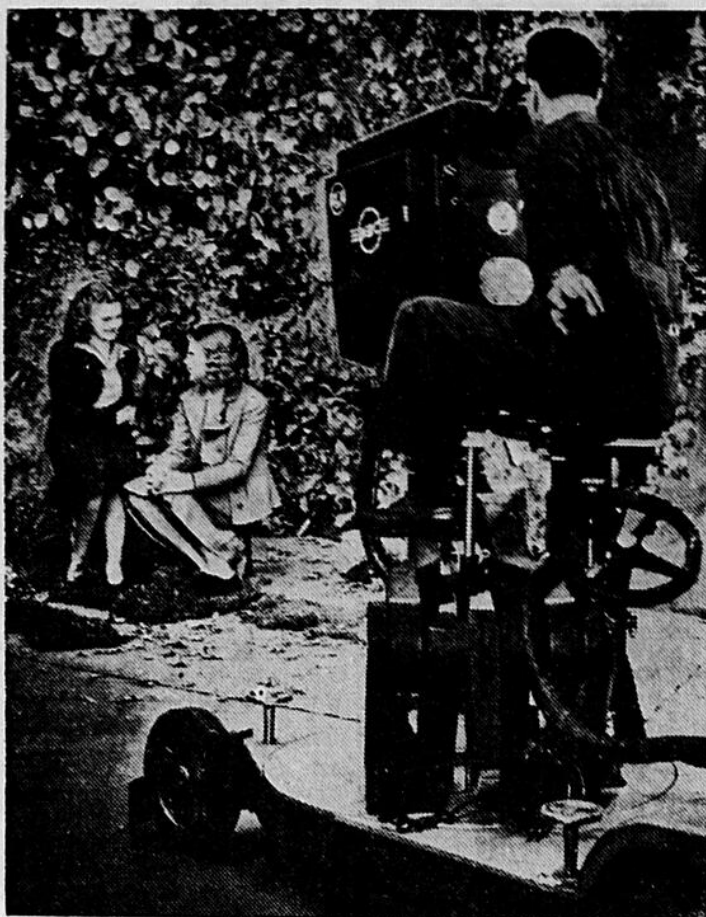

KIWANIANS IN GRANBY HEAR HOWARD ROSS

"What Price Democracy?"
Is Topic of Examiner
Writer at Luncheon

Speaking at the weekly luncheon of the Kiwanis Club of Granby Wednesday evening, his subject being "What Price Democracy?" Howard S. Ross, K.C., D.C.L., said in part:

"If we wish to keep our democracy and are determined to make that our chief aim, it can be attained only when the threats of war are banished and the world brings about conditions that made democracy possible during the 19th century.

"The seventy conflicting national authorities should submit themselves to international law and to surrendering their national sovereignty and the force of arms now used to, if possible, impose their seventy separate national wills. If we have laws between individuals to enforce the common good why not between nations in a federated world-state?"

"Then all the barriers could be taken down so that the abundance, which can be so easily secured by all, would flow, free of all tribute, to people everywhere who are willing to do their share of the work of the world, with the help of the efficient machines which are steadily becoming more automatic.

"If we defeat the dictators (as most of us believe we would and as we did) we will learn again that war is always a total loss to all of us and that the establishing of world-wide democracy (our main aim) will be more difficult because of the hatred aroused and kept alive by vicious propaganda."

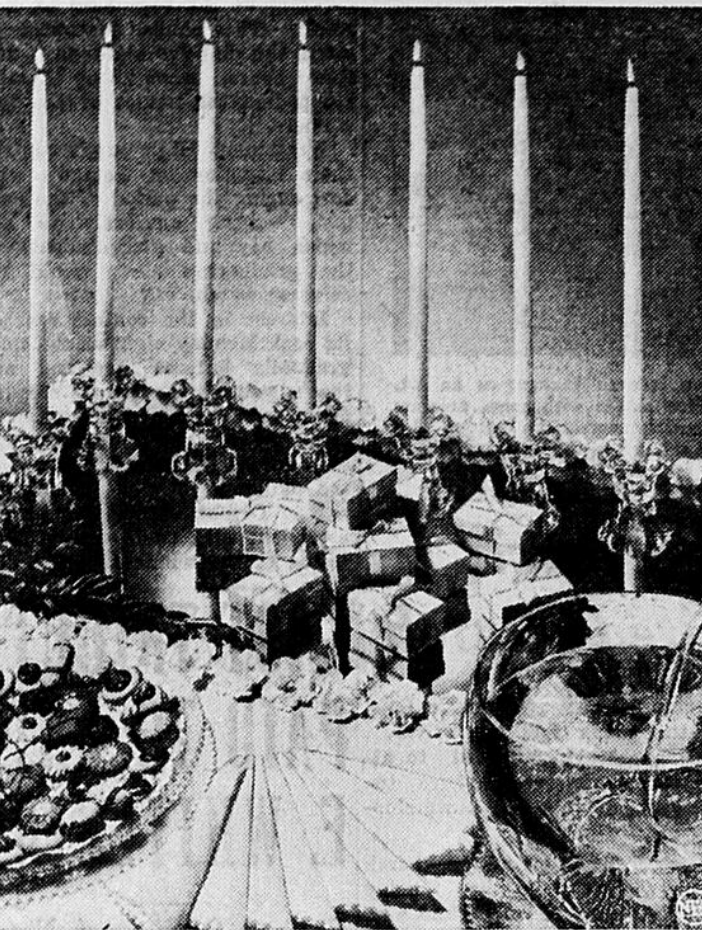

YOU DON'T NEED MEAT EVERY DAY

A delicately seasoned dish of spaghetti or macaroni and cheese is cheap, nourishing and delicious. Serve that one night as the main course. Serve no meat that night. On the next night you can afford two nice lamb chops to broil. But on the following night, use red kidney beans, cooked with tomatoes and onion and some bacon drippings as the main protein of the menu.

On the next night, serve lamb kidneys in a tender stew, with baked potatoes and a vegetable in season and cheap. On Friday, serve fish. It is plentiful and cheaper on Friday. If fowl is in season and being offered at bargain prices, have chicken.

TEA TIME TOPICS



IN A RECENT ISSUE of "The Examiner," there appeared on account of what a young man saw in London during the fight of the suffragettes to gain recognition and a few rights in England. What the gentleman saw was the results of the efforts of Emmeline Pankhurst, for it was she who incited the women of Great Britain to stand up and fight for their rights.

FOR 40 YEARS women in Victorian England had been campaigning earnestly for the vote. As a young woman Emmeline Goulden had felt instinctively the justness of their arguments. Her parents, though professed liberals, were partial to her brothers. Her education counted for little in contrast to theirs. Her resentment against this Victorian code grew with her experience. Her marriage in 1879 to Dr. Richard Pankhurst, a liberal politician, who believed in women's rights, forged this resentment into a weapon of steel.

IN THE WORKHOUSE of which Mrs. Pankhurst became one of the governing board, old women had to sit on backless benches. Little girls, without underclothing and coughing with bronchitis, spent long winter hours on their knees scrubbing cold stone corridors. She also found that women teachers were paid less than men, though they taught more classes. Women elected to municipal governing boards to deal with women's affairs were ousted from office by men judges. Legally the English women was an infant, she was able to command civility and protection, but when she wanted independence and justice, the governing bodies just laughed. What did women know about such things as voting and governing?

WHENEVER MRS. PANKHURST turned in a protest, she met the scornful opposition of aldermen, clergymen, statesmen. T. want to change the time order of how things should be run, was either treasonable and irreligious or sentimental. For more than 25 years she and her followers worked strenuously to break down, by argument, the walls of prejudice.

THEN ACCORDING TO TRADITION, Arthur Balfour advised Emmeline Pankhurst to create riots. From that day on, men who had never heard of women suffrage, read daily in the papers of suffragette outrages. Window smashing and arson were common news. Church ceremonies were interrupted, judges insulted and many other things happened. It was one of these outbreaks that Mr. Faires saw in London, and of which he wrote about in his column, "The Rambler," a few weeks ago.

WHILE THE WOMEN of this province are trying their utmost to obtain recognition, it would be well for them to keep in sight the excellent example of Mrs. Pankhurst. For she devoted her entire womanhood fighting for something that she believed in. Perseverance was her watchword.

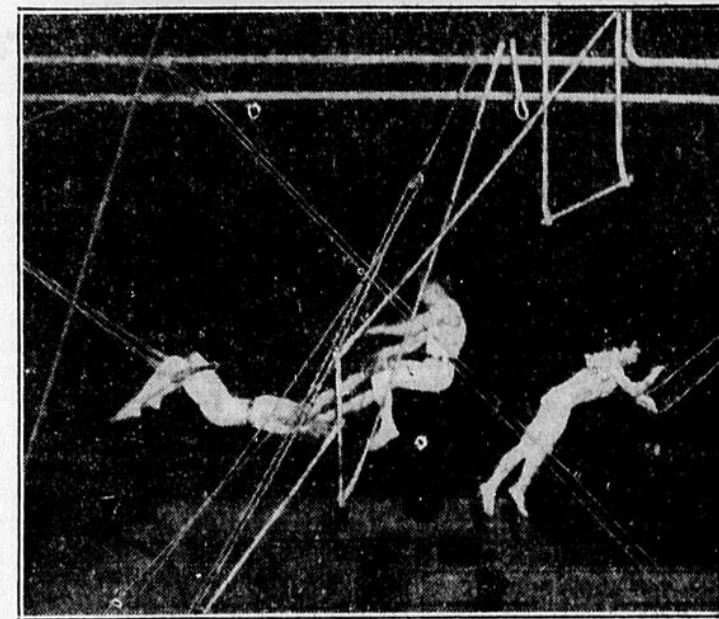

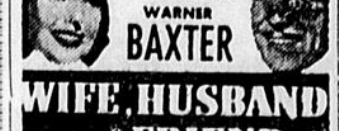

One branch acted as an umbrella, shading the nest from both rain and prying eyes. How wisely the Warblers had chosen the site for their home!

When the little mother, herself only five inches long, sat on the nest it was almost impossible to see her because her greenish-yellow cap was exactly the shade of the fresh foliage, and her streaked, olive-brown back merged into the surroundings. 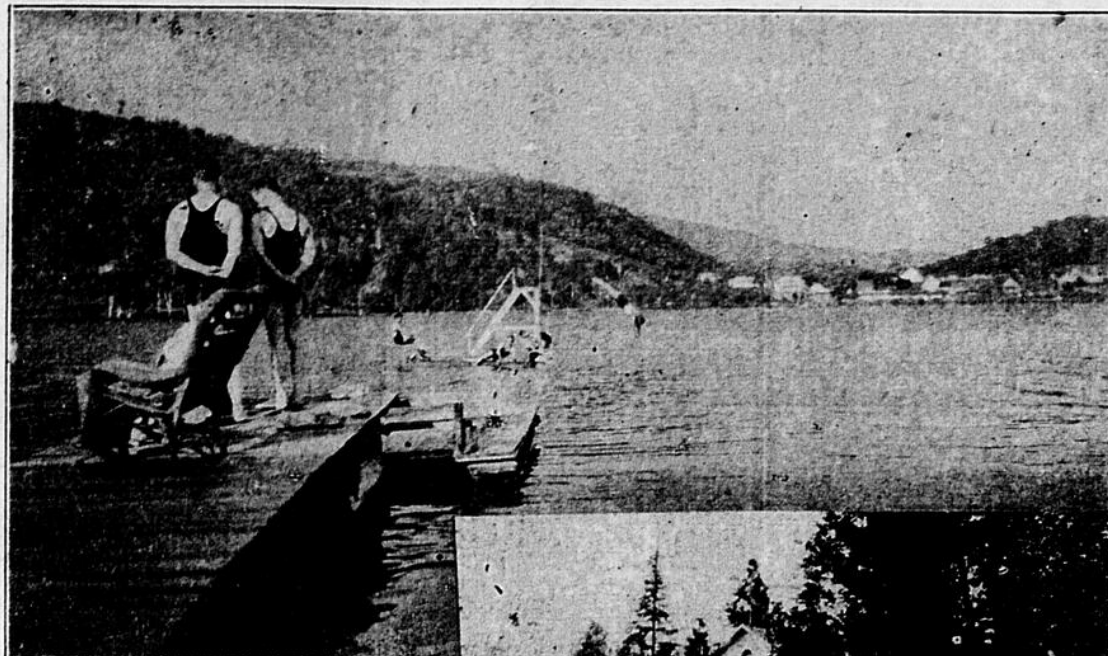

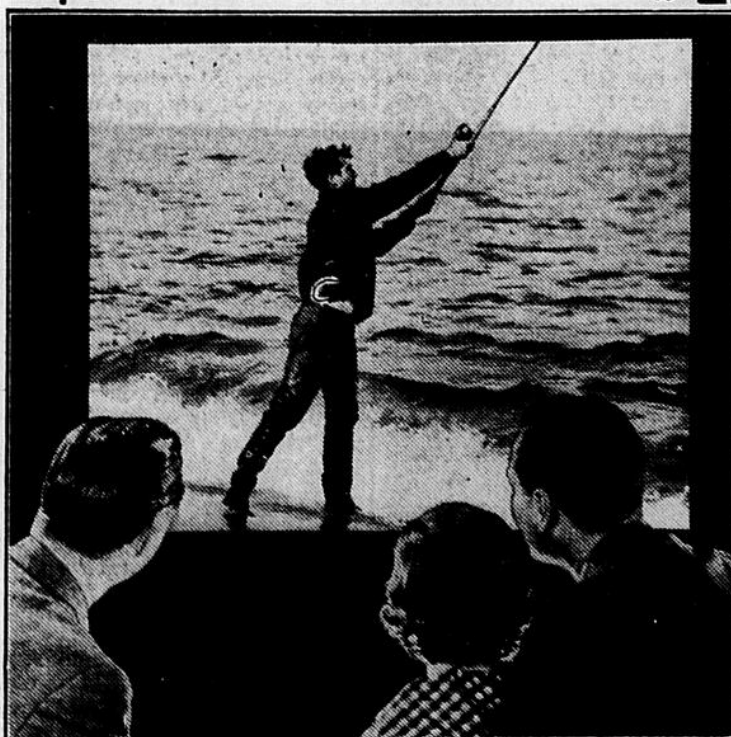

PICTURES IN COLOR



You can now make full-color transparencies with some inexpensive miniature cameras—and project them in large size on a home screen, bringing out all the beauty and richness of a colorful subject.

In the past few years, many thousands of amateur camera hobbyists have started taking pictures in full color. This spring and summer, thousands more will take up this fascinating form of photography, using full-color films.

It is hard for some of us, who are used to black-and-white snapshots, to imagine taking a picture in full color as easily as in black-and-white. Yet these color films enable us to do just that. Moreover, the pictures are not prints on paper but film transparencies, ideal for viewing color at its best. With simple projection equipment, these transparencies can be shown on a home screen magnified to almost any desired size.

Thousands of such color pictures are being shown this year at the New York World's Fair—projected on enormous screens so that each picture is enlarged approximately 50,000 times. Until one sees such an exhibition, it is impossible to realize

how much the presence of color can add to photography.

Relatively few of the subjects we choose for pictures are lacking in color. Count them over—children, flowers, scenes about the home, landscapes, picnics, and sports events, water scenes, sunsets, and the like. Study such subjects, and you begin to understand how much more life and realism they retain when pictured in full color.

Miniature cameras are used for taking these full-color pictures. Until recently, inexpensive cameras of this type were not made, but now they are available at prices as low as \$16, and suitable for taking pictures in black-and-white as well as in color.

Full-color picture taking will spread greatly in the next few years, and wide-awake hobbyists will plan now to take full advantage of this amazing development.

"A dwelling-construction program aimed to reach the group constituting over 48 per cent of Philadelphia's population earning below \$2,000 and the 27 per cent of the population above this group, but earning less than \$3,000," he said, "will find a ready market, just as the builders, who in 1938 built houses to sell below \$6,000, found immediate buyers in more than 9 out of every 10 cases."

Cornerstone Laid At Queensbridge

The New York City Housing Authority laid the cornerstone of its largest project, the Queensbridge development, in Long Island City recently at a ceremony attended by Mayor Fiorello H. LaGuardia, Nathan L. Straus, Administrator of the United States Housing Authority, and Park Commissioner Robert L. Moses. Al Red Rheinstein, chairman of the New York Housing Authority, presided.

Queensbridge Houses, which will be completed late this summer, is the largest public housing development ever undertaken in the United States. Plans call for 3,161 apartments ranging from two to five rooms, to provide homes for about 11,400 persons at rents averaging less than \$5 a room per month. Only low income families, now living in slums will be accepted as tenants.

The houses will occupy a 47-acre plot and have a 15-acre park. Of the nonpark area, about one fourth will be covered by buildings. The remainder of the grounds will be landscaped to provide play space and wading pools for children. The total cost is approximately \$15,000,000.
