FROM LONDON PAPERS

LONDON, October 25.—The Corn laws! Ay, all men's thoughts turn that way. It is assumed that if the Irish are starving, the Minister must abandon the restrictions on the importation of food...

The report of Queen Isabella's marriage with the Count of Montemolin is contradicted; and Spain is again restored to unsettled rumours on that fertile subject, and to renewed riots in the towns.

Russia, busy in the North as well as South, is about to abolish the customs on its frontier with Poland, expunging the distinctive boundary of that country. There has been a good deal of false sentiment about the fallen nation; as if it had had no slavery, no political corruption, no barbarisms of its own...

THE METROPOLIS.—A strange ceremony was performed at Christ's Hospital on Wednesday. In order to assert the right of the Chief City Magistrate to be the head of the City Hospitals, the Lord Mayor arrived in state, with several of the Aldermen and Common Councilmen, and the City Officers, rang the bell at the grand entrance, and demanded admission.

A statue of Sir Thomas Gresham, by Behnes, has been placed in a niche on the East front of the Royal Exchange, under the cupola. The new steam-boat pier at Blackfriars Bridge was opened to the public on Tuesday.

At Bow Street Police-office, on Saturday, Charles Pearce, a boy of thirteen, was charged with having obtained 1l. 3s. from the proprietors of the Morning Chronicle under false pretences. It was mentioned last week, that all the morning newspapers had been tricked into inserting a fictitious narrative of the death of a Colonel Metcalfe at Elstree...

On Thursday, the prisoner was discharged; and the prosecutors considering that he had been the dupe of some designing person not yet in custody. The total number of deaths registered in the Metropolitan districts during the week ending Saturday, October the 18th, was 771; an amount considerably below that exhibited in the autumnal and annual averages, in which the numbers stand respectively 1,020 and 963.

The number of births registered during the same period was 1,310, being an excess of 539 over the mortality. The temperature of the week ranged from 73.2° (the highest in the sun) to 39.0° (the lowest in the shade); the mean direction of the wind was South-west.

The Morning Chronicle notices an important evidence of improvement in the laws, police, and habits among the people, but above all, of improvement in their earnings and material condition. Byron's statue, whilom imprisoned in the vaults of the Custom-house, has at length found a home in the bosom of his alma mater, Cambridge University.

Fourth-Lieutenant Lindsay P. Burrell, of the Queen's ship Superb, has been tried by a Court-martial, at Plymouth, for disobedience of orders and breach of the twenty-seventh Article of War. The Captain of the Superb had ordered that all officers should wear cocked-hats and swords when on shore; notwithstanding which, the accused appeared at a review at Portsmouth in undress uniform. During the night of the 8th instant, Mr. Burrell was officer of the watch while the Superb was lying at Spit-head; during his watch, he sat down upon deck and fell asleep. Witnesses clearly proved these facts. Mr. Burrell declared that the first offence was a mere act of inadvertence; with respect to the second, he attempted to prove by medical evidence, that a disease with which he was afflicted caused drowsiness; but in this he failed. The Court declared the charges to have been proved, and sentenced Lieutenant Burrell to be dismissed from the service.

At Blackburn Petty-Sessions, last week, four men were accused of shaking a woman in a sack! All the parties were employed in a print-work; a man who had courted the girl got married; whereupon the defendants made a demand upon her of money for drink, threatening the alternative of "shaking in the bag," according to a custom of the district, which subjects the jilted to a penalty instead of the jilter. She refused to give any money; and in consequence the men actually did thrust her into a

PORT OF QUEBEC. SHIPPING INTELLIGENCE.

Mr. Firth, a passenger by the bark Covenanter, Patterson, which sailed hence for Liverpool on Tuesday last, but had to come to an anchor at Patrick's Hole, the wind having come round to easterly, arrived here to-day about noon, and reports that the bark Covenanter got under weigh from Patrick's Hole on Friday afternoon, and after having proceeded down some distance it was perceived that she had sprung a leak, and finding that the leak gained upon them, came to off Crane Island, when Capt. Patterson landed and procured eight men to assist in pumping out his vessel, but the leak still gaining on them, got under weigh again, and ran her on shore at Goose Island. Mr. Firth and Capt. Patterson left the vessel on Sunday afternoon and landed on the north shore, from where they saw a vessel off the Pillars, supposed to be at anchor, and another at the upper end of Crane Island, but no other above that place at that time.

Mr. Firth reports the roads almost impassable, and had to walk through the snow for several miles. Mr. Brady, of the Water Police, left yesterday between 12 and 1 o'clock, on his way down to St. Thomas, or farther, if necessary, to ascertain the situation of the vessels which are reported to be drifting about in the ice near that place, and to render them every assistance in his power. 3 canoes from Pointe Levy, with their crews—7 men each—follow immediately after, by land, to cooperate with Mr. Brady.

BARLEY WATER.—Mix one table spoonful of the Patent Barley with two of cold water, add one quart of boiling water, boil ten minutes, strain it through a thin muslin, flavour with lemon peel, juice, or Ramsden's lemon acid sweetened with honey or loaf-sugar.
FOOD OR GRUEL FOR INFANTS.—To be made the same as above, substituting all milk, or half the quantity milk to hot water; sweeten with moist or loaf sugar.
BROTHS OR SOUPS.—One table spoonful mixed with a little cold water, put into the broth a quarter of an hour before it is taken up, will be sufficient for one quart; and so on in proportion.
PUNNING.—One table spoonful to be mixed with sufficient cold milk to form a paste, one pint of scalding milk to be poured on it, then add a small slice of butter and two eggs; flavour with nutmeg, lemon peel, bitter almonds and sugar. FOR Years past, the want of a Publication of the nature of the one we now propose to establish, has been deeply felt in this part of the Province of Canada.
