Federal grants for Sheenboro and Eardley

A grant of \$18,404.00 from the Local Initiatives Program in favor of the Municipality of Sheenboro, was announced today by Mr Tom Lefebvre, M.P. The operation of this project will create 10 jobs in Sheenboro, and consist in building a dam on creek in village which will make a reservoir to hold water for fire protection and also opening of a road to municipal dump. The authority in charge is the

Municipal Council of Sheen, Esther & Malakoff. A grant of \$8,928.00 from the Local Initiatives Program in favor of the Municipality of Eardley, was also announced. The operation of this project will create 7 jobs in Luskville, and consist in the construction and improvement of municipal roads. Persons in charge are Mr Leo Labelle and Mr Bruno Alary, both from Luskville.

McDowell Elementary School Committee

Specific topics for discussion in the three meetings to date can be summarized as follows:

Discipline on School Buses. This has not been a serious problem this year and no action was deemed necessary at this time.

School pictures. A request to have school pictures taken every second year instead of every year has been granted.

Skating Program. There is a need for people to help put on skates on the younger children whenever skating is scheduled in the arena. All parents who can be at the arena on these days would be welcome.

Friday afternoon Activities. The program is off to a successful start. There is a need for one or two people to assist with the art and modeling classes. Interested persons should contact Principal W Tipping at 647-3800. In addition, the school could use odd pieces of scrap wood for projects.

The New Report Forms. These were discussed at some length. Due to province-wide reaction from both parents and teachers, it is anticipated that the report form will be changed shortly. It was decided to withhold any formal complaint to the Dept. of Education until the new report form can be studied. In the meantime, any parents wishing to offer suggestions on changes to the forms may do so by forwarding them in writing to the Principal's office.

School Dances. The question of the desirability of holding dances was discussed but it was deferred to a general meeting so that all parents will have a chance to express their views.

Medical Exams. New Dept. of Health and Welfare regulations making annual medicals obligatory are being implemented at the kindergarten and grade 1 levels. Complete information on the scheme will be available in the near future.

Pupil-Teacher Ratio. The pupil-teacher ratio or "norm" for elementary schools has been set by the government at 27:1 while for the high school it is 17:1. There is little action we can take at this time on this issue.

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The next committee meeting will be an open meeting for all parents and is tentatively scheduled for March 12th. The Committee earnestly seeks your views on the above issues and others. Please contact a member of the committee listed below if you have a specific item to bring up so that an agenda can be prepared.

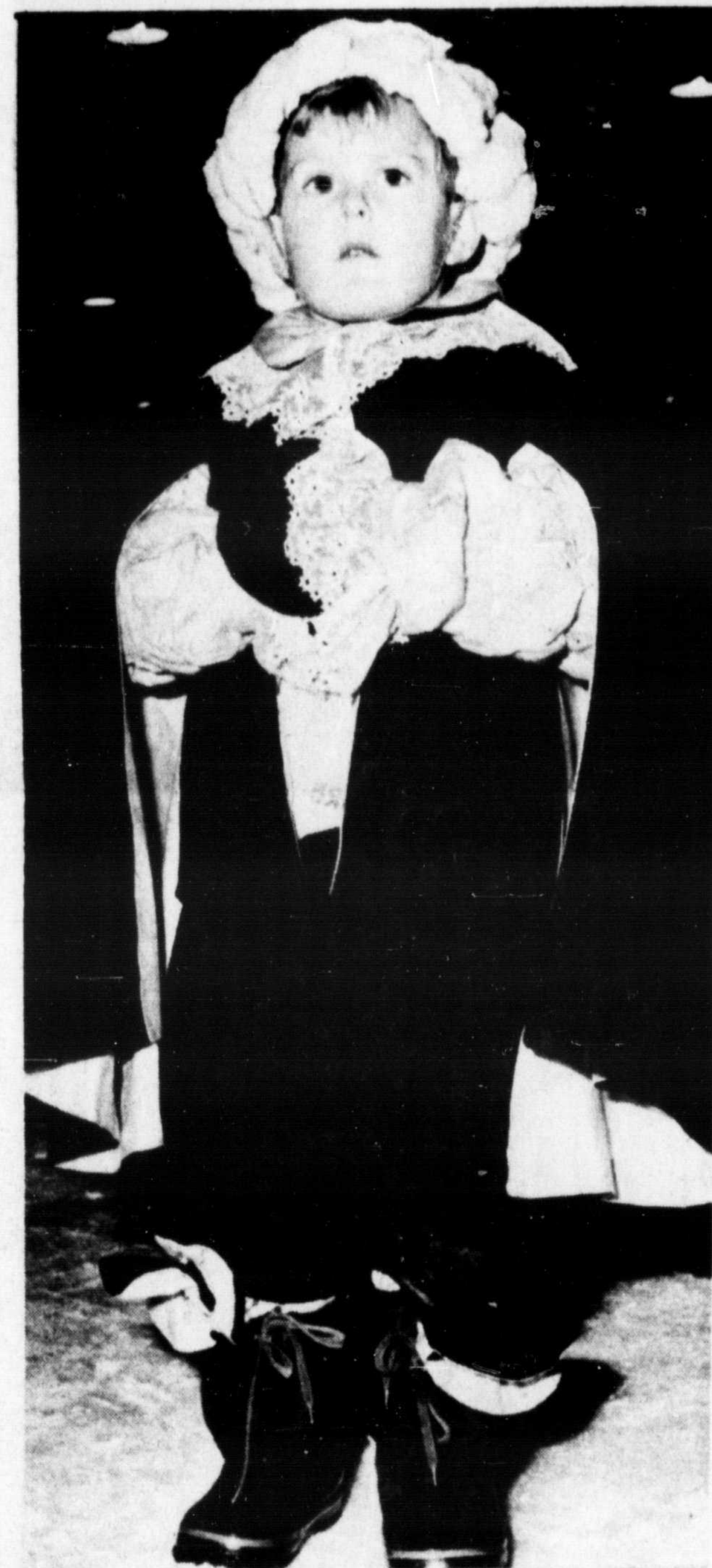

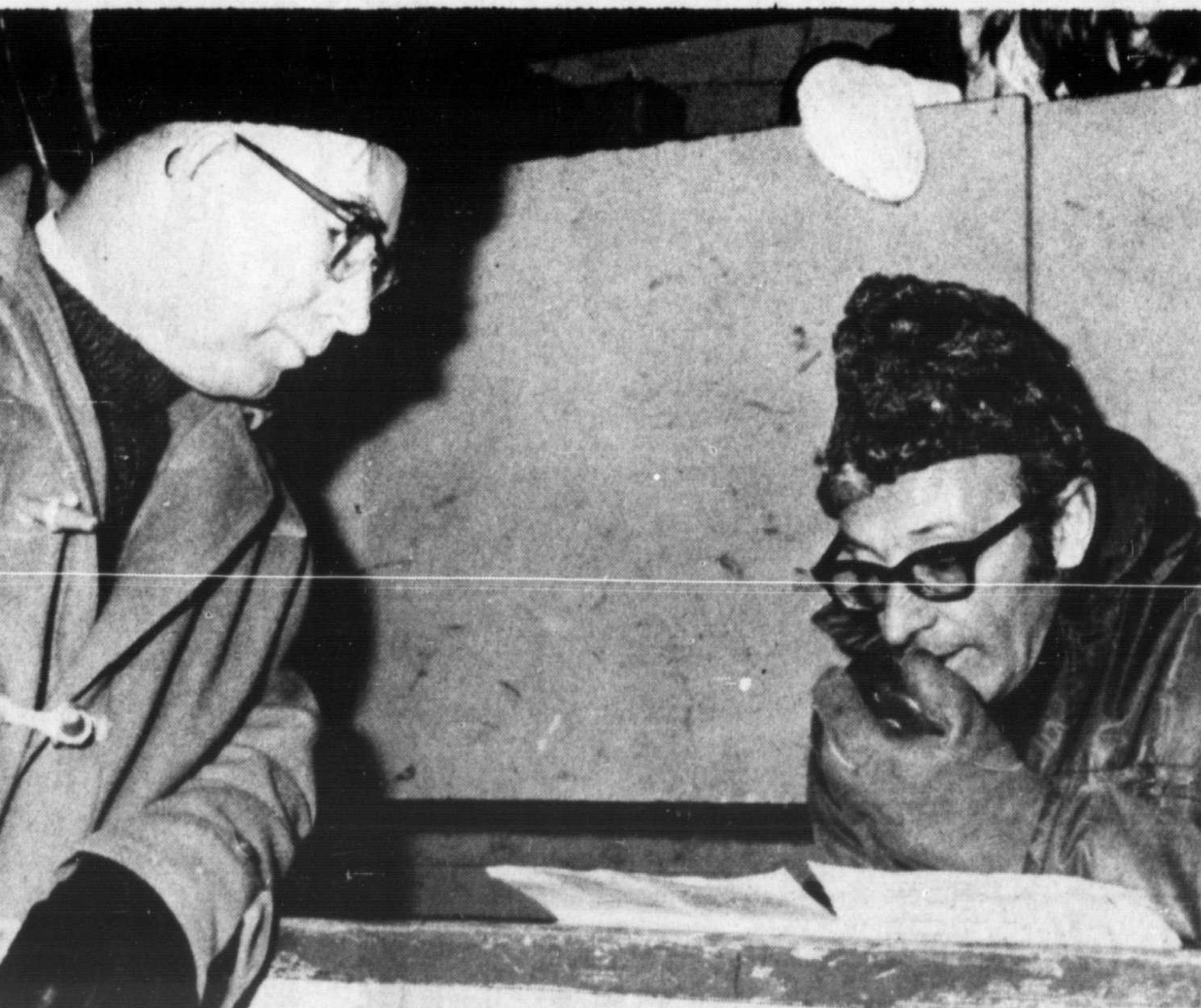

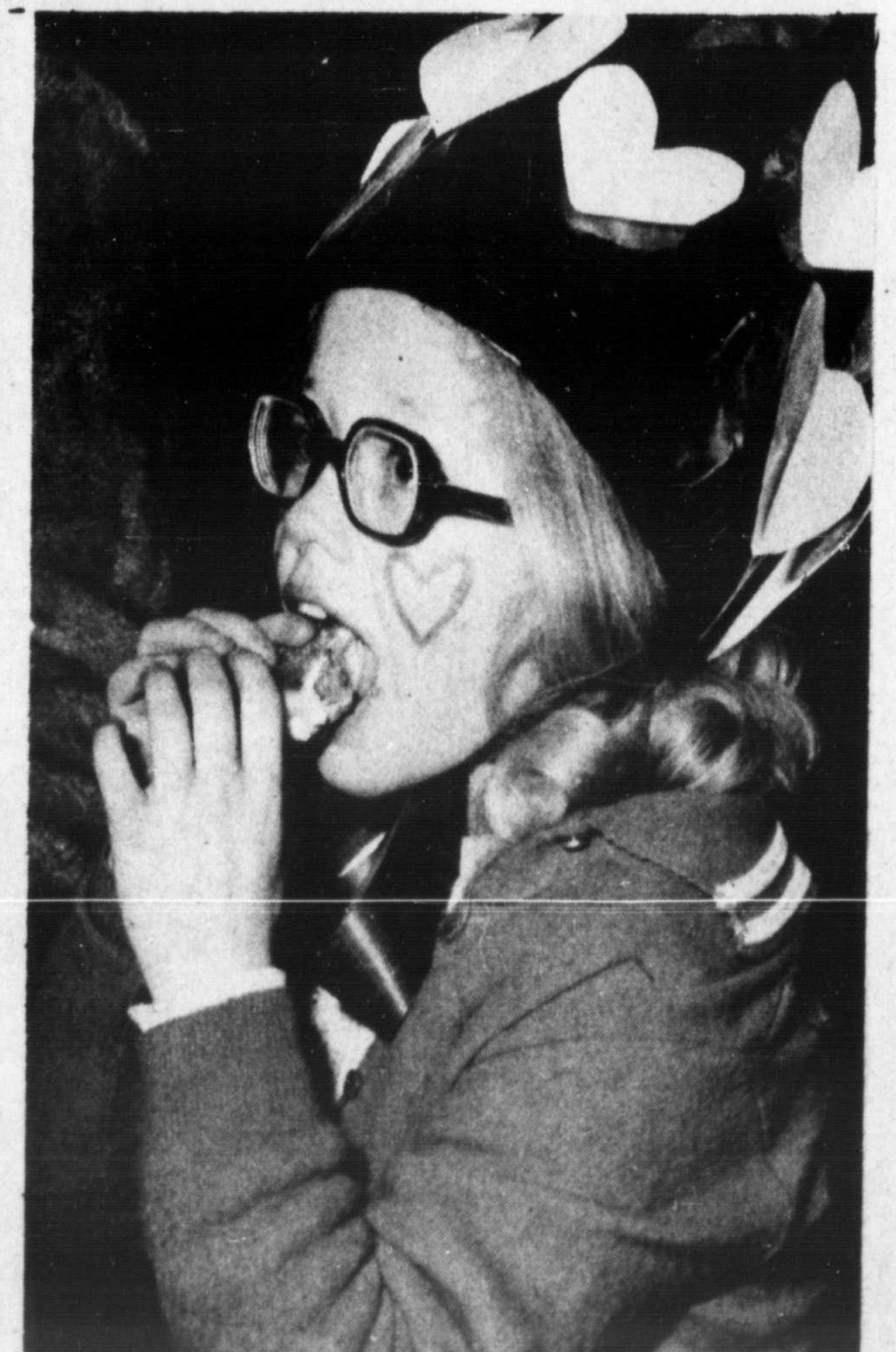

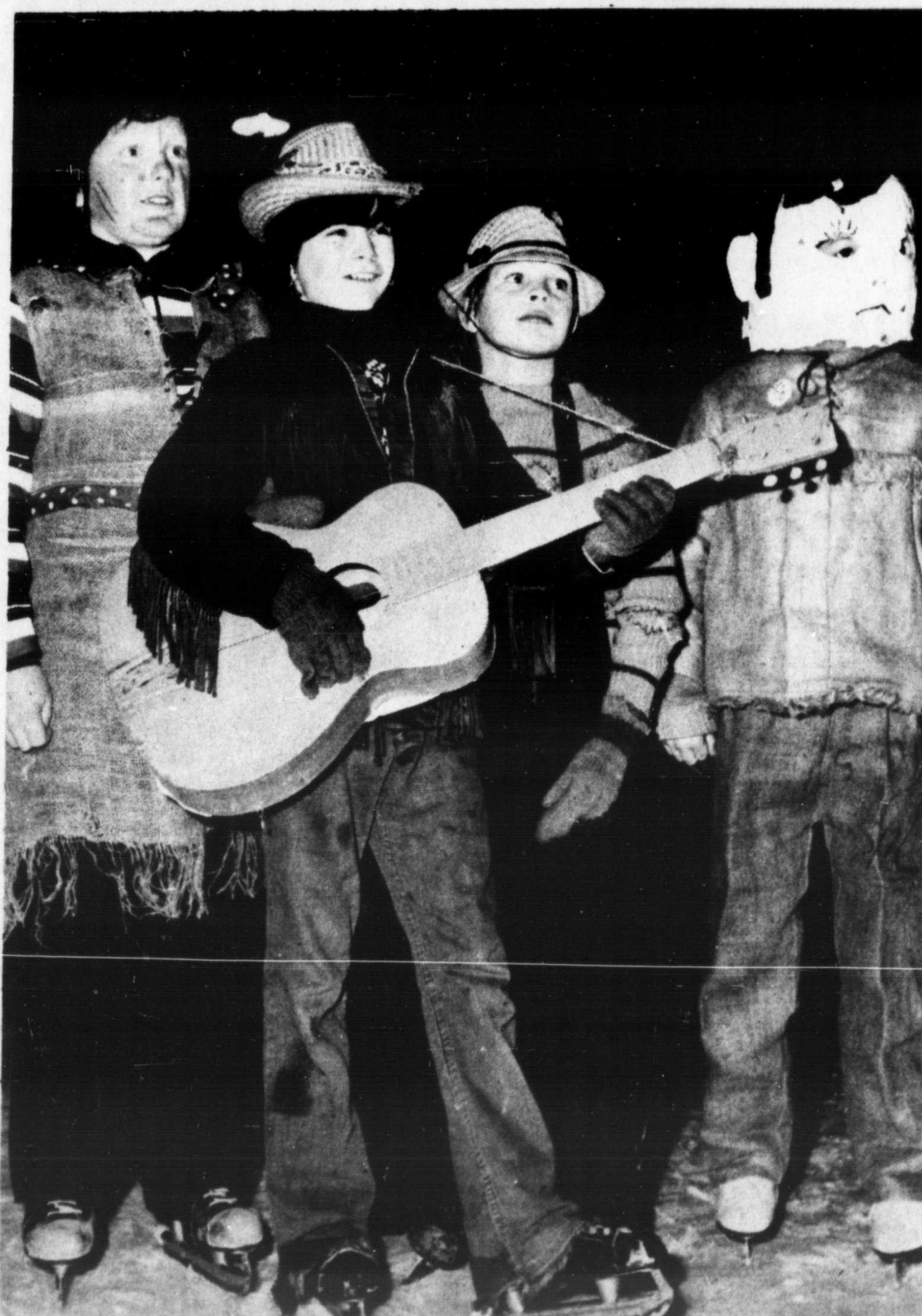

When Mr Hammond died in North Ouslow Mrs Hammond and her two children George and Mary Jane moved to Bristol Corners. For a small place it had modern facilities like singing and sewing schools. In due course Mrs Hammond married a Mr MacDonald whose home was close to what is known as the Brick Church. A Mr McNeil farmed it some years and for years it was known as the MacDonald home. He was a kind and loving husband. When he died the funeral procession was the largest ever known in that locality.

Another notable character was Tom Black from Silver Creek. The remains of the old home can be seen in the hollow near the creek. He was inclined to boast about his strength. One of the merchants, to bluff him, offered him a hundred pound bag of flour if he could carry it home. He took up the challenge and carried the flour home, two miles, mostly up-hill.

Dear Editor:

We would like this to be an open letter to the Municipal Corporation of the Township of Thorne.

In 1922 our father and mother settled on Lot Eleven Range West, of Thorne. We three sons, Garnet, Fred and Melvin Wood still reside there.

When we moved to this farm 50 years ago a municipal road led to and through our property on the sideline between lots 11 and 12, Range West of Thorne. This road was used by the Public, and maintained by the Council. Also there have been several colonization grants spend on this road, thru the past several years.

This road was decreed a colonization road by the Provincial Government on Oct. 6, 1965. According to the Municipal Code, Article 465, Section 3 "no colonization road may be closed by Municipal Council without the permission of the Minister of Colonization." Council requested this permission on December 10, 1971, and this permission was refused February 9, 1972.

Nevertheless the Municipal Council proceeded to close this road by By-Law in January, 1972, and since that time have refused to have it snow plowed in winter or maintained in summer, although it is a municipal road.

His Worship the Mayor and members of Council - we are not second class citizens - we pay our taxes and expect to be used as all other residents of Thorne. Perhaps our road is closed because of our colour or creed or nationality, or could it be because of our being members of a political party contrary to that of Council?

Have you forgotten your Oath of Office to "honestly and faithfully perform the duties of your office to the best of your judgment and ability. So Help you God."

The Department of Highways have offered, as in the past, to include this road on your winter maintenance grants. Why then do Council insist to keep the only road we have, blocked in winter and not maintained in summer.

You have been notified off your responsibility to no avail.

The subject is not dropped but we think it is time that everyone in the district should be made

Well I was really shocked when I saw the announcement and could hardly believe that this could happen in Shawville. The last few years I've been in the habit of going East at fair time to visit with my brother Fred and other relations and of course, attending the Fair. But if the last day is on Sunday well I just won't be going this year.

The last 2 years at our fair here we have been using Sunday in this way. We have a one day fair usually held on the 3rd or 4th Mon. in July to avoid clashing with other fairs in South Sask.

We have a large school in which we show School Work, fruits, flowers, garden stuff, baking, preserving, etc. We ask that these exhibits be in at 10 o'clock Sunday morning. The directors then arrange them and they are judged in the afternoon, no outside activities. Then the school is opened at 10:00'clock Mon. morning and the fair goes over a chance to view the exhibits in the morning or all day as judging of horses and other live stock starts at noon. The use of Sunday wasn't done with my consent but I can see an excuse for it. But none whatever for holding the last day of the Shawville Fair on Sunday.

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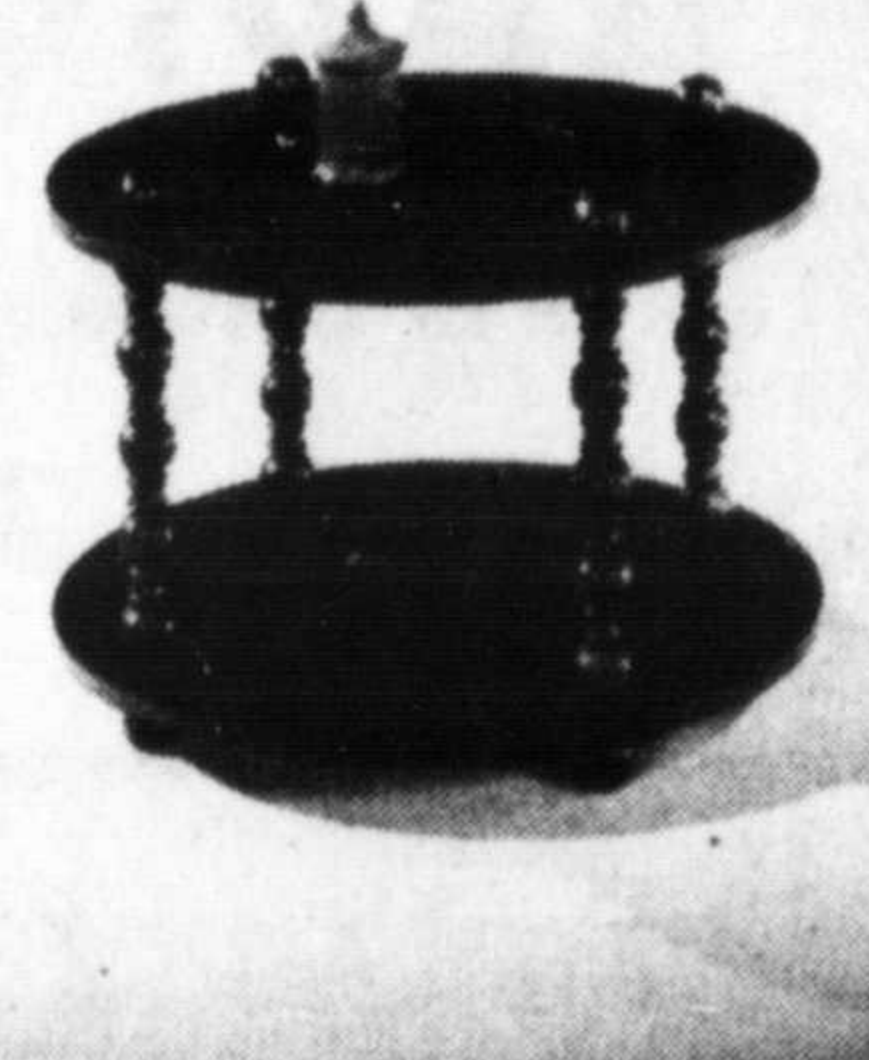
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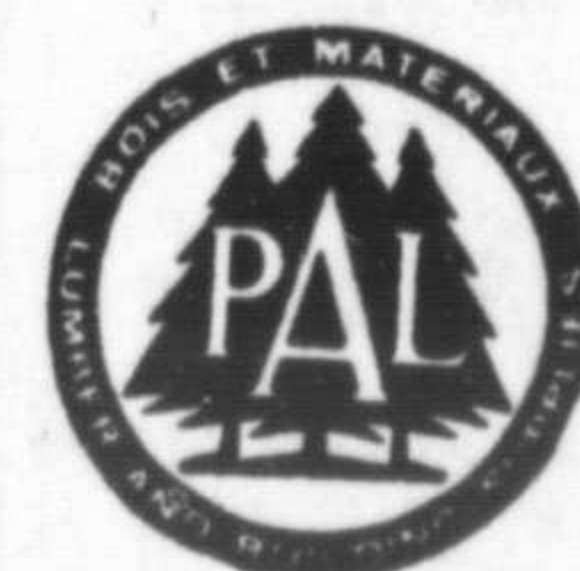
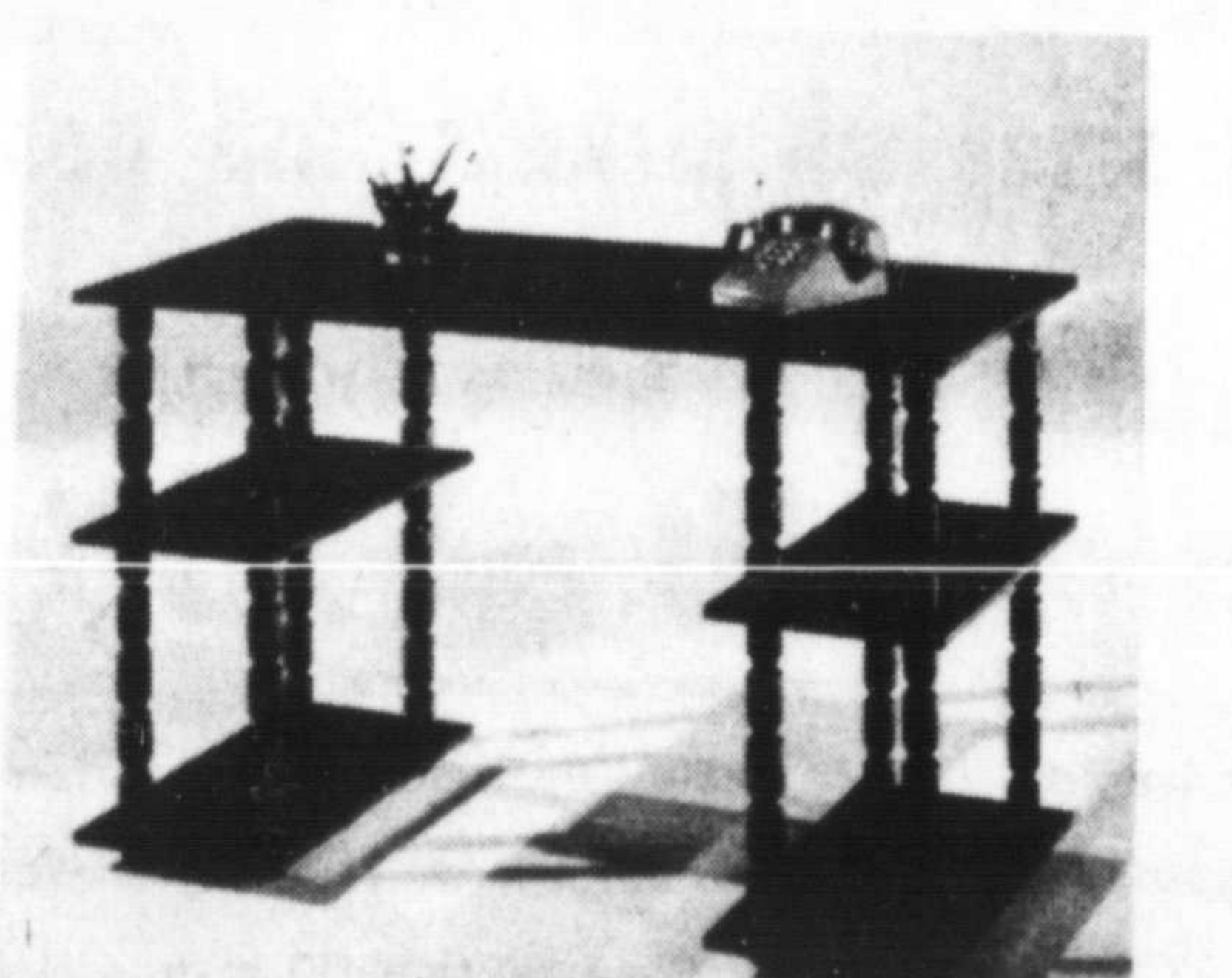
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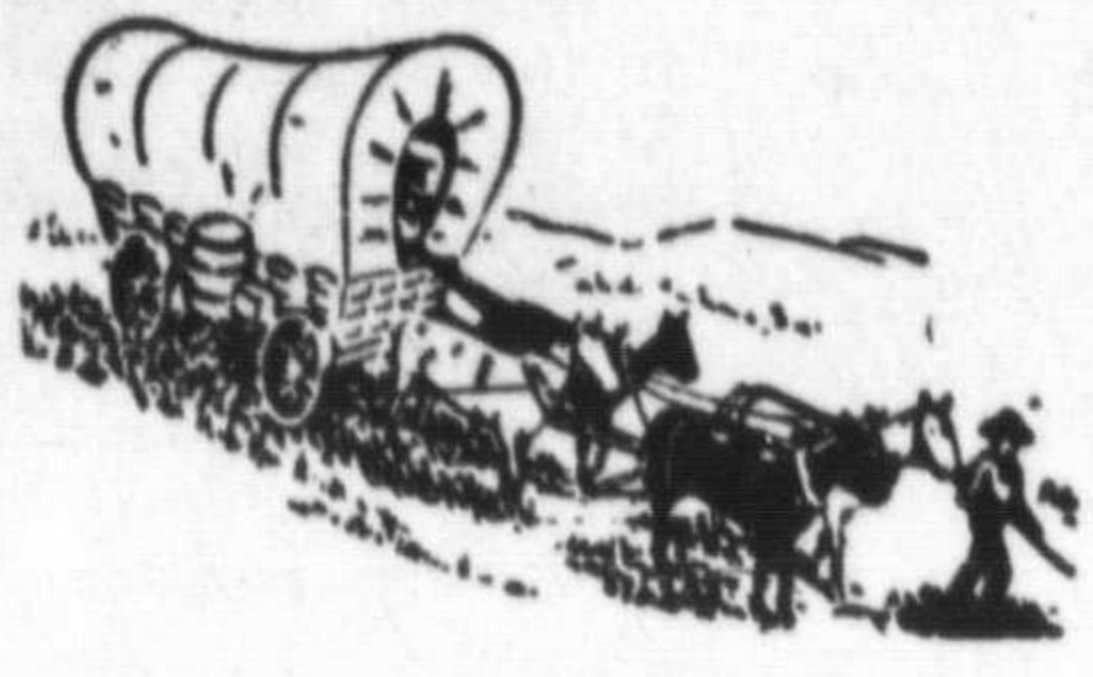


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HISTORICAL HIGHLIGHTS

The Pontiac Historical Society

THE EARLY DAYS: by W.A. Hodgins.

From the personal collection of Mrs Hurst Hodgins
For at least thirty years there were no doctors. Nurses as we know them were unknown, although some of the older women became expert midwives. Medicines were of the crudest kind. Molasses and sulphur was the recognized spring tonic and blood purifier. Garlic preserved in high wines (alcohol) with a poizice of sliced onions applied to throat and feet was a specific for croup and chest colds. A big root of turkey rhubarb (bitter aloes) was kept in the cupboard and highly treasured as a stomach and bowel regulator. A concoction of the black heart of ironwood and princess pine stewed

together with a little winter-green added to help the flavor was considered a great blood medicine, and specially good for skin diseases. Tamarack, spruce, and pine gums dissolved in alcohol was a real cough medicine. Goose oil was a famous liniment and pains in the chest, sore throats, cramps etc. were always treated to a liberal application well rubbed in. A large bottle was always kept in every home. Hen oil was the standard treatment for sore and aching ears, and was considered valuable for deafness. Skunk oil was said to be a specific for rheumatism and sciatic pains. However its unpleasant odors and memories caused its use to be greatly curtailed. Here is an old time

standard treatment for a sudden cold or chill. The patient had wet and cold feet, quite feverish, severe pains in throat and chest. The person was put to bed at once and covered up warm a liberal application of goose oil well rubbed on the neck and chest, a heated flannel applied, in the mean time a dish of milk was being heated to which had been added a lump of butter and a little pepper, and the patient was given as much as he would drink, and ordered to sleep. If after half an hour the patient was sleeping and sweating profusely and particularly if there was a few large drops of perspiration on the nose, the attack was considered broken up and it usually was. Butter and sugar was the remedy for hoarseness.

Sugar was very scarce and expensive, hence the very early use of Maple Sugar and Syrup. It was the duty of the family to be sure to make sufficient of these edibles to last the year.

We think of Clarendon as a dry township, one hundred years ago it was very wet, nearly three quarters of it swamp lands. We used to wonder why our fore fathers did not pick the better lands, the reason was, they were looking for the dryer sections. From Clarendon Centre to the south and west the whole country was a vast spruce and hemlock swamp and it was only when the section was cleared and the stagnant waters was allowed to escape and evaporation from the low lying areas, that people began to recognize the value of these lands.

It was these stagnant swamp waters dimmed up for ages that caused that miserable disease we called "Fever and Ague" it was really a distressing ailment and entailed much suffering, Tamarack and Hemlock boughs stewed with slippery elm bark and the sufferer allowed to inhale the steam afforded the only relief known. Fortunately the clearing of these swamp lands and the disappearance of the stagnant waters was the real remedy and this disease has long ago become a thing of the past.

In those early days they had a dreaded malady called "Black Inflammation" no one who contracted this disease recovered. The patient would be attacked with severe pains in the abdomen in a few hours the cramps would increase in severity in a day or so the bowel would assume a black color and in a short time the sufferer would die in great agony. This must have been our modern day appendicitis.

Broken bones, legs, and arms were all locally treated men and women seemed to be raised up for the occasion. "John Hodgins" uncle Jack was one of the noted bone setters of these early days. His services were in great demand he became quite expert. It was said of him that he never refused a call day or night summer or winter his services were always available.

In the 1850's we have records of occasional visits of doctors from Hull and Ottawa, but they were very few. The first resident doctor in the township was a Dr A Sturgeon. He was the ancestor of the Sturgeons of the front and resided on the lot now owned by his grandsons, he came in about the year 1855. Not being a man of very robust health he did not survive the strenuous life of the early practitioner. He died a comparatively young man.

The next medical man on the scene was an M.D. from McGill. Arthur Lyon came to Clarendon in 1865. His name and fame are well known to all of the older people and a great company of people still living revere and honor his memory. He certainly was "in labors more abundant". For forty years or more over all conditions of roads, good and bad, day and night, in all seasons he was driving over the township for the relief of the sick and suffering.
