THE MONTREAL ELECTIONS.

The Herald (the Opposition organ) says: The elections in this city went yesterday, as will be seen by our detailed statement of the polling elsewhere, largely in favour of the Government candidates, Messrs. Cartier in the East, and McGeie in the West. Perhaps this was the result which was generally expected, though the majority were, at least in the West ward, larger than might have been looked for. The Daily News of yesterday says:—The vote of Mr. Mederic Lanctot threatens to be even more disastrous than that of Mr. Devlin. Throughout yesterday Mr. Cartier carried all before him, and the same result is pretty sure to happen to-day. The Hon. Minister of Militia addressed the electors in French and English from a balcony overlooking Jacques-Cartier Square after the close of the poll last evening. His reception was an oration. He expressed in unmeasured terms his contempt for the charlatan who was endeavoring to foist himself upon the Division as he had foisted himself on the honest working men and the Coalbrook quarryman. Mr. Cartier paid a high tribute to the zeal and diligence of his English supporters. His return to-day by an overwhelming majority may be regarded as a fixed fact. Last evening's Montreal Telegraph says:—"Glorious Victory."—Majority for McGeie 511; for Cartier 571. These simple figures on our bulletin board have been read by many hundred passers yesterday, where one sentiment has been expressed, no regret is manifested for those candidates upon whom the zeal of popular disapprobation has been indelicately set, only joy that Montreal should have nobly asserted her confidence in our new institutions, and her trust in the men to whose exertions we are indebted for the present order of things.

MR. HOWLAND RETURNED.

The Hon. Mr. Howland has been elected in West York by a majority of five hundred and twelve. The total votes polled was only something like eleven hundred. The opposition to him was a broad fringe, his opponent being a person of the name of Hubertus—not the Hubertus of Globe notoriety, but another Hubertus equally as facile in the hands of Mr. George Brown and who was, we believe, employed as a sessional clerk in the last Parliament.

ONTARIO ELECTIONS.

POOR BROWN.—Mr. Brown cannot find a constituency which can be purchased, or which can be persuaded to have anything to do with the "Great Obstructionist." His lieutenant, Mackenzie, having been defeated by an immense majority, is also laid on the shelf. And every man who is associated with him or his party should be similarly treated.

COL. ORD KNIGHTED.

The Queen has been pleased to direct letters patent to be passed under the great seal, granting the dignity of a Knight of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland unto Harry St. George, Ord, Esq., colonel in her Majesty's army, lieutenant-colonel in the corps of Royal Engineers, C.B., Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Straits Settlements, Colonel Ord, was the officer announced on for his conduct at Bernada during the yellow fever epidemic in Inspector General Barrow's report.

FRANCE AND AUSTRIA.

The organs of the military party in Austria are raising their voices in a higher and more aggressive tone than they for some time past have used, and this is attributed to the meeting of the Emperors Napoleon and Francis Joseph at Salzburg. The official Bavarian Gazette says that the Emperor and Empress of France were received on their arrival at Augsburg, by their way to Salzburg, with both favourable and unfavourable demonstrations.

BROKEN HEADS V.S. GOUGING.—

The New York papers are rejoicing over the accounts of the election trial which occurred in Montreal a few days since, and say that the Canadians are clinging to the old English custom of breaking heads at the polls. There may be some truth in this, and although any disorderly conduct of this kind is very disgraceful, Canadians will, we trust, always adhere to it in preference to the delightful practices of gouging, shooting and stabbing, so much in vogue during elections in the "great republic."

AMERICAN NEWS.

NEW YORK, Sept. 7. Gold 142½. The Post's financial article says:—The loan market still remains unchanged. Stocks dull; Governments unchanged, but closed with a better feeling and a partial recovery. Railway shares without animation. Foreign exchange closed firm. The shipments of specie to-day were \$673,000.

CUSTOM HOUSE RECEIPTS.

The amount collected at the Custom House to-day was \$2642.67.

STEAMERS OUTWARD.—

The Nova Scotia sailed this morning with 65 passengers, the mail and a general cargo, for Liverpool. The Belgian also sailed this morning with a general cargo for the same place, but no passengers.

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THE ATLANTIC CABLE.

ALLEGED VEXATIONS AND EXTORTIONS.

We find the following letter on this subject in the London Times:—The persons in charge of the Atlantic cable have at last given the public an instalment of those reforms by which, for some months past, they have been promising to widen the usefulness and popularity of the mighty instrument they control. The improvement does not, as might be anticipated, consist in the reduction of rates fifty per cent, or in the cessation of the charge for the address and signature of a message, or in the abolition of the one hundred per cent imposed upon code or cipher, without the protection of which commercial telegrams thanks to telegraphic indelicacy, lose all the value derived from secrecy. These changes have been too long promised, and are perhaps, too obvious and common place in their appeal to propriety to be adapted; at all events, they are said to be indefinitely postponed. What has been vexatiously embraced in a rescript issued last Monday to sub-offices, under the directions of which the clerks to whom a message for America is offered is obliged to exact double rates for the entire message if it contains words which are not abbreviated or contracted, however palpable the sense. The former regulation presupposes an intelligence approaching omniscience on the part of a half-paid subordinate; the latter calls for every letter of the most ordinary words, and even of words of which the full orthography would, in common practice, be declined. A message has actually been declined at one of the offices this week unless the writer accepted the alternative of paying "Mr. X" as "Mister," or paying £1 a word for the whole telegram. The only further step possible in the direction of the absurd is to require the clerk, in any case he may choose, to couple the sender of a message to make affidavit that the words mean precisely what they express, under penalty of redoubled charge. When we consider that these regulations are sought to others whose words are restricted to five letters, that the opinion of charging by words or letters, by the company and when we know, beside, that the operating staff and a single cable are occupied no more than four hours a day, while the income of the line is daily about £1,000, the broad public spirit of the managers, and their eagerness to serve and oblige the business community, would seem to be indisputable. Yet there are obstinate people among their customers, and all I meet are in this impracticable category, who see nothing but excessive respect in the innovation, and who believe that losing faith in the performance of the cables, or fearing competition, the proprietors are disposed to defy public opinion and make hay while the sun shines.

MIDNIGHT DESPATCHES.

BY THE CABLE.

LONDON, Sept. 6. Recent despatches received from Alexandria seem to discredit the reports of the release of the English citizens in Abyssinia. In the meantime preparations for an expedition to Abyssinia here are progressing.

PARIS, Sept. 6. M. Moustier, Minister of Foreign Affairs, has issued a circular in regard to the conference recently held at Salzburg. He states that the meeting of the Sovereigns was merely one of condolence over the fate of the Archduke Ferdinand. To be sure there was a general interchange of views on the situation of Europe, but no alliance or combination was planned by the Emperors, as has been stated.

It is stated that M. Drayn de l'Huys will soon re-enter the French Cabinet. It is thought he will take M. Moustier's place in the Foreign Office.

CARLUZE, Sept. 6. The Grand Duke Frederick William made a speech at the opening of the Baden Diet in this city yesterday. He took strong ground in favor of Baden's union with North Germany.

MADRID, Sept. 6. Strict orders have been issued to the proper authorities at all the ports in Spain requiring vessels hailing from the United States to be subjected to a rigid quarantine.

LONDON, Sept. 6, EVE. Consols 94½. U. S. 5-20's, 73½. Erie, 45½. Illinois Central, 77½. Atlantic and Great Western, 22½.

AMERICAN NEWS.

NEW YORK, Sept. 2. A despatch has been received which states that an officer of the First National Bank failed for \$200,000, and the bank for \$70,000.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 6. Wendt, the Lutheran minister, guilty of gross outrages on orphan children, has been sentenced to 15 years solitary confinement.

NEW YORK, Sept. 6. The affairs of the Farmers' and Citizens' National Bank, of Brooklyn, were to-day placed in the hands of the Receiver. Bill holders, of course, are secure, and no doubt depositors also.

HARTFORD, Conn., Sept. 6. A passenger train on the Nantucket railroad, last evening, broke through the bridge across Branch river, about two miles from Thomaston. Ten persons were drowned.

The dam of the West Hartford reservoir, six miles from the city, which supplies the city with water, was washed away this morning, carrying everything with it. The damage to private property is considerable. The loss to the city will be \$100,000.

THE PEOPLE THAT CANNOT WRITE.—

A Parliamentary paper brings down to 1866 the return of English men and women who, on marrying, have to make their mark on the marriage register instead of signing their names. More than a third of the Welshmen who married in that year had to make their mark; very nearly a third of the men of Hertfordshire, Cambridgeshire and Norfolk were put to the same shift; more than a third of the men of Suffolk, 35 per cent. of the men of Bedfordshire, 38 per cent. of the men of Staffordshire, 40 per cent. of the men of Monmouthshire. In all Lancashire one man in every four who married had to make his mark. Still, the number of the ignorant constantly lessens. In 1845, 68.8 per cent. of the men who married in England and 50.4 per cent. of the women were able to write their names on the marriage register; in 1855, 70.5 per cent. of the men and 58.8 per cent. of the women; in 1865, 76.5 per cent. of the men and 68.8 per cent. of the women—more than three-fourths of the men and more than two-thirds of the women. In these twenty years the women have been improving faster than the men. Foremost amongst the ignorant stands South Wales, where the women stand half unable to write their names, and in North Wales, Montgomeryshire, Staffordshire, and Lancashire the number exceeds 46 in the 100. In Bedfordshire, where the children have been accustomed to work so early at straw plaiting, two women in every five who married in 1865 had to make their mark. These are people able to marry and probably in a smaller proportion, of the very lowest of the "residuum." It is remarkable that in the eastern counties, and in many counties in the Southern half of England, more women sign the marriage register than men. As in 1864, so in 1865, Westmoreland had the largest proportion of its men able to write, nine in every ten; and Sussex the largest portion of its women, more than eight in every ten.

REWARDS TO IRISH CONSTABULARY.—

A Parliamentary return, presented by the Government, gives an account of the distribution of the sum of £2,000, voted by Parliament for the purpose of rewarding certain members of the Irish constabulary free who, being under fire in the defence of their barracks against the Fenians, or in collisions outside the barracks, particularly distinguished themselves by their courage, gallantry and fidelity. Three sub-inspectors—R. Gardner, F. Burke, and O. Milling—received £104 each; the head-constables in charge at Kilmallock received £70, two other head constables received £50 each; five constables in charge £20 each; nine constables £18 each; 74 sub-constables £15 each.

DISTRIBUTION OF THE BRITISH NAVY.

It appears that at the commencement of the spring of this year the number of vessels of war employed on foreign and colonial service was as follows:—Mediterranean station, 29; the Royal Squadron, 34,617 tons; North America and the West Indies, 29, of the aggregate burden of 34,827 tons; South-east coast of Africa, 9, of the aggregate burden of 7,646 tons; East Indies, 7, of the aggregate burden of 7,590 tons; the Cape of Good Hope, 3, of the aggregate burden of 3,078 tons; West coast of Africa station, 19, of the aggregate burden of 15,179 tons; the Pacific station, 14, of the aggregate burden of 19,342 tons; China station, 46, of the aggregate burden of 39,256 tons; and Australian station, 6, of the aggregate burden of 6,793 tons.
