### BRITAIN'S DECISION

Alone Prevented European Intervention in the Late War.

LORD SALISBURY MAKES THE ANGLIO-AMERICAN ALLIANCE A FACT.

LONDON, Sept. 2.—William Wilson, editor of "The London Year Book" and other publication, supplies the article which was published by the Spectator on Saturday last regarding France's attitude toward the United States in the late war.

He says that not long after the opening of the war the French Government conceived a plan, the object of which was to rescue Spain, to administer a rebuke to American ambition and to assert European supremacy in the complications in the western world.

By a combination of good fortune and diplomatic adroitness the French Government secured the support of the other Continental powers, Germany and Russia included. The stroke was all but completely prepared and nothing remained but to secure if not in active adherence, at least the tacit consent or neutrality of the English Government. At this point the first and last check to the scheme was received.

The English people, so reasoned the French Cabinet, have suffered more from American aggressions of late years than any other nation. Deeply angered by the wrong part of the American press, they must have reached the limit of their endurance under the menace of President Cleveland. Here, therefore, is their opportunity for an easy and overwhelming revenge.

Accordingly the proposition of diplomatic intervention if that should be sufficient, or force of arms if needful was definitely submitted to Lord Salisbury. To the unimagined surprise and grief of the French Cabinet a reply was delivered to the effect that if the plan was not directly abandoned not only would Her Majesty's Government refuse to countenance its execution, but would join forces with the American Government and declare war on France and such supporters as should come to her assistance.

The negotiations at once fell through, and the French Government was compelled to beat a retreat.

The Star printed the news of the failure of the proposed European coalition against the United States when the attempt was made to enlist the co-operation of Great Britain, three weeks ago.

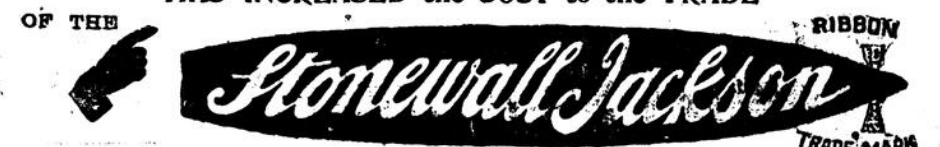

#### A BAD BLAZE.

Bertram Shipyards at Toronto Wrecked by Fire.

THE NEW RICHELIEU AND ONTARIO STEAMER TORONTO HAD A NARROW ESCAPE.

(Special to the Star.) TORONTO, September 2.—At an early hour this morning a remarkably quick fire did \$400,000 worth of damage to Bertram's ship yards. The fire was discovered in the carpenter shop and before the firemen who were handicapped by the lack of hydrants, could get to work, the flames had secured a firm hold on the wooden machine sheds, office buildings and the docks. The Richelieu & Ontario Navigation Company's new steamer, City of Toronto, which is nearly completed, had a narrow escape from destruction. The danger was so great at one time that all the available hose was turned upon the vessel. The stern was scorched, but \$200 will cover the damage. The steamer is valued at \$250,000. The fire was so fierce that the men were unable to approach within striking distance of the buildings, and were forced to confine their efforts to keeping the flames from spreading to the cars in the adjacent railway yards and to an immense stock of lumber immediately to the east of the burning area. The Bertram buildings were only valued at \$10,000. The loss sustained was principally in the destruction of valuable steel cutting and shaping machinery used in preparing plates for the new vessels. This machinery was valued at \$40,000. The damage to the docks was \$300,000. The loss is fully covered by insurance. About 116 men will be temporarily deprived of employment. Last year Mr. George H. Bertram, M.P., the head of the firm, asked the City Council to provide him with additional fire protection. This application was opposed by several aldermen, but was finally passed this summer, and the pipe for the waterworks extension was upon the ground.

The United States Greengard Whittier reached this city on Thursday from Porto Rico. The Whittier brought heavily armed private army of 100 soldiers of the Second Wisconsin Regiment, who killed Private Thomas Stafford of the Prince and who was tried by court-martial and sentenced to life imprisonment. Stafford was a Canadian.

THE CANAL TOLLS.

These tolls are now a burden upon their business, although they are nothing more than a just rental for the use of facilities provided by the Canadian people.

RUSSIA IN THE EAST.

However credible to the personal character of the Czar his remarkable appeal to the nations of the world to inaugurate an era of peace may be, it is difficult to see how his aim with the deliberate policy which he has adopted, sooner or later, will result in anything but a disaster to the Russian Empire.

For the present we can only look upon this utterance as an incident in the controversy regarding British and Russian interests in the East. The undoubted irritation which exists and is being expressed in the principal organs of British public opinion, is largely due to the rapid growth of the contention that sooner or later, a war with Russia is inevitable.

Mr. Curzon, who will so soon represent the Empire where it most nearly meets Russia on land, and whose brief but brilliant career has been devoted to the study of the problems which face us in the East, is now lacking in England and quite as much so on that of Russia.
