### Local Red Cross Society Hold Meeting Next Week

The drive for funds to carry on the activities of the Canadian Red Cross opened up throughout Canada on Wednesday March 1st. This Society that did such a fine piece of work during the war years for the soldiers and the needy people of war ravaged countries, is now making its appeal for peace time activities. These arise because of disasters that come to individuals and communities from fire flood, tornadoes, etc and which requires immediate help. Always prepared for any such emergency, a disaster is no sooner reported than the Red Cross swings into action and alleviates suffering and dire need.

Other activities of Red Cross include their provision of blood banks for any necessary blood transfusions in hospitals and homes. A number of mobile units are carrying on the work of gathering blood in all parts of Canada. Help for children that are undernourished is also provided by furnishing to schools and homes cod

liver oil to keep their physical condition high. There is hardly any limit to the ways in which the Red Cross provides needed aid.

Shawville and district have always given largely and willingly to this important society. During the war years donations ran as high as \$3600, a year to say nothing of tons of blankets, quilts, clothing knitted and sewn goods that were sent in during the periods of two World wars. During the year 1949 the donations from this district were as follows: Shawville \$267. Clarendon \$60.00; Bristol \$73.00 Thorne \$33.00 making a total of 433.60

It is hoped that donations may be even larger in this 1950 drive. The executive of the Red Cross at present is President R P Eades, secretary Rev D W Noseworthy; Treasurer Rev A F Fokes. Donations may be handed in to the treasurer and shortly announcement will be made as to district stations to receive donations.

### Two Children Die In Allumette Island Fire

Two children, one of them a baby in arms, were burned to death when fire gutted the square two storey stucco farm house of Mr and Mrs Fred Raymond, three miles east of Chapeau on Allumette Island early Sunday morning.

Dead are: Lillian Raymond, seven year old daughter of Mr and Mrs Raymond and Leo Chassie, seven months old son of Mr and Mrs Aurele Chassie.

Mr Raymond is in Pembroke General Hospital suffering from second degree burns about the head shoulders and hand, also from severe lacerations of the hands and back. He received the injuries when he ran back into his blazing home when he saw the children had not escaped.

The fire one of the most tragic in the history of the community struck without warning at seven o'clock in the morning and in a few minutes had spread through out the entire building claimed the two lives and destroyed life-long belongings.

There were ten persons in the house at the time. Mrs Raymond was the first to notice the flames. She was about to prepare breakfast on the kitchen stove, the only stove in the house which had a fire in it when she noticed smoke coming from her first floor bedroom.

Mr Raymond had just come in from doing the morning chores and his wife mentioned something about the smoke as she went over to the bedroom door to investigate.

As she opened the door she was

met with a blast of flame and smoke.

In the upstairs bedrooms were: Mrs Aurele Chassie, daughter of Mr and Mrs Raymond who with her three small children, had spent Saturday night at her parents home. Cecile, 15 Lillian, 7 and Romeo Raymond, 19 and Lillian Chaput a fire girl.

Mrs Chassie grabbed two of her children while Lillian Chaput took the baby Leo, and hurried to get down the stairs as flames swept up.

Mrs Chassie reached safety although she lost some hair and her eyebrows were badly singed. The teenage hired maid, following her was also burned and despite repeated efforts could not get the baby out.

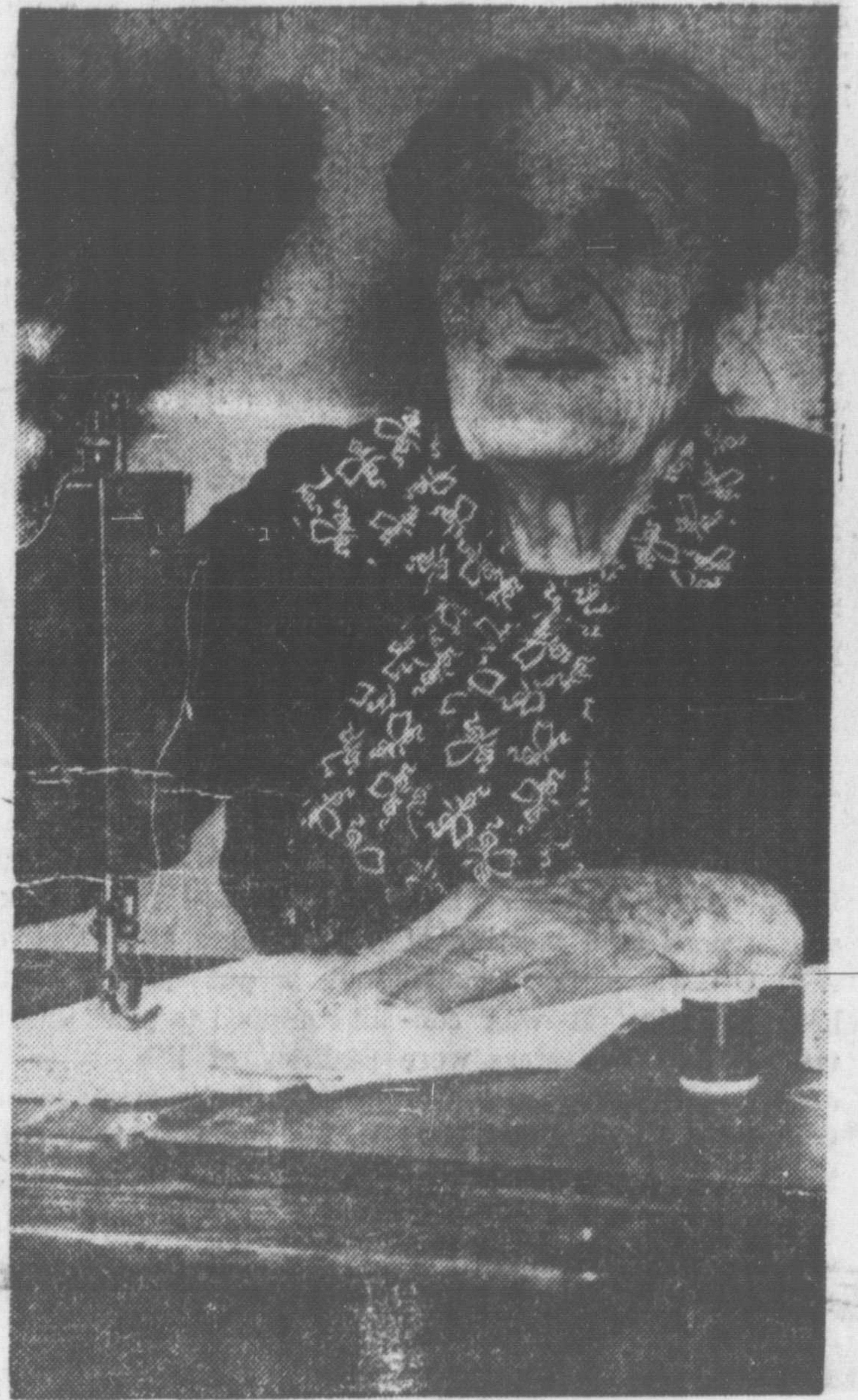
Romeo and Cecile managed to get to the open door, but their sister lost her way in the smoke and flames.

Her body was found by volunteer firemen and neighbours in the corner of the house, where she may have tried to hide.

Once outside, the two missing children were noticed and Mr Raymond dived through a glass covered side window crawled into the house then an inferno, and tried to search for his daughter and grandchild. Only severely burned and overcome by smoke did he make his own escape after the futile search.

Mr Raymond who had been injured as well as burned in his heroic attempt to rescue the children, was taken across the perilous ice covered Ottawa river to hospital.

### Local Man Commended By Commissioner For Police Work

## Future For Weekly Fairs

An important suggestion that was made at the recent annual meeting of Class "B" Fairs in Toronto was that more fairs extend their length from three or four days to an entire week.

The idea is worth giving a trial. Once the exhibits are assembled it would cost little and entail only small inconvenience to keep them in form for six days. Showers and fact whole days rain, do easily beset fall fairs, and nothing is more injurious to them.

Aware that a Fair will extend over a whole week people are inclined to come

from long distances; also people nearer at hand will attend not once but more frequently. Moreover a weeks Fair can chime readily with old boy's reunions.

People kept at home by rain have wider choice in the matter of a day's attendance, whereas four day Fairs if striking a wet period will miss the patronage of many people altogether. Moreover the modern trend is to hold Fairs within Fairs there being junior divisions and divisions in cattle and horse breeds, each disposed to claim at least a day of public attention.

## Does Not Help Youth

Doubts about the advantages of recreation centres were voiced at a meeting of the Ottawa City Council held recently. It was contended that youngsters were often becoming too much over stimulated for their own good through such activities.

A number of school teachers had recently stated that it took two or three days for a boy or girl to get over the excitement of being a carnival king or queen. Reference was also made to complaints of parents that their children were taken too much away from their homes by community recreational activities. All work and no play will make Jack a dull

### Ladysmith Man Dies In Ottawa

Lee Holt 21 of 418 Gladstone avenue, died in the dentist's chair of Dr Percy Nesbitt at the Booth Building, Ottawa Monday while undergoing a number of extractions.

Mr Holt a driver for Robert Simpson company, was the son of Christie Holt of 418 Gladstone who told police the boy had apparently been in good health. He was married with two children.

Mr Holt was born and educated at Ladysmith Quebec and was married in Ottawa to Mins Brown who survives him. Surviving also are a daughter, Judy, two and a son Brian, six months; and his grandparents Mr and Mrs R Holt of Ottawa and Mr and Mrs W. McCleary of Ladysmith, as well as his father.

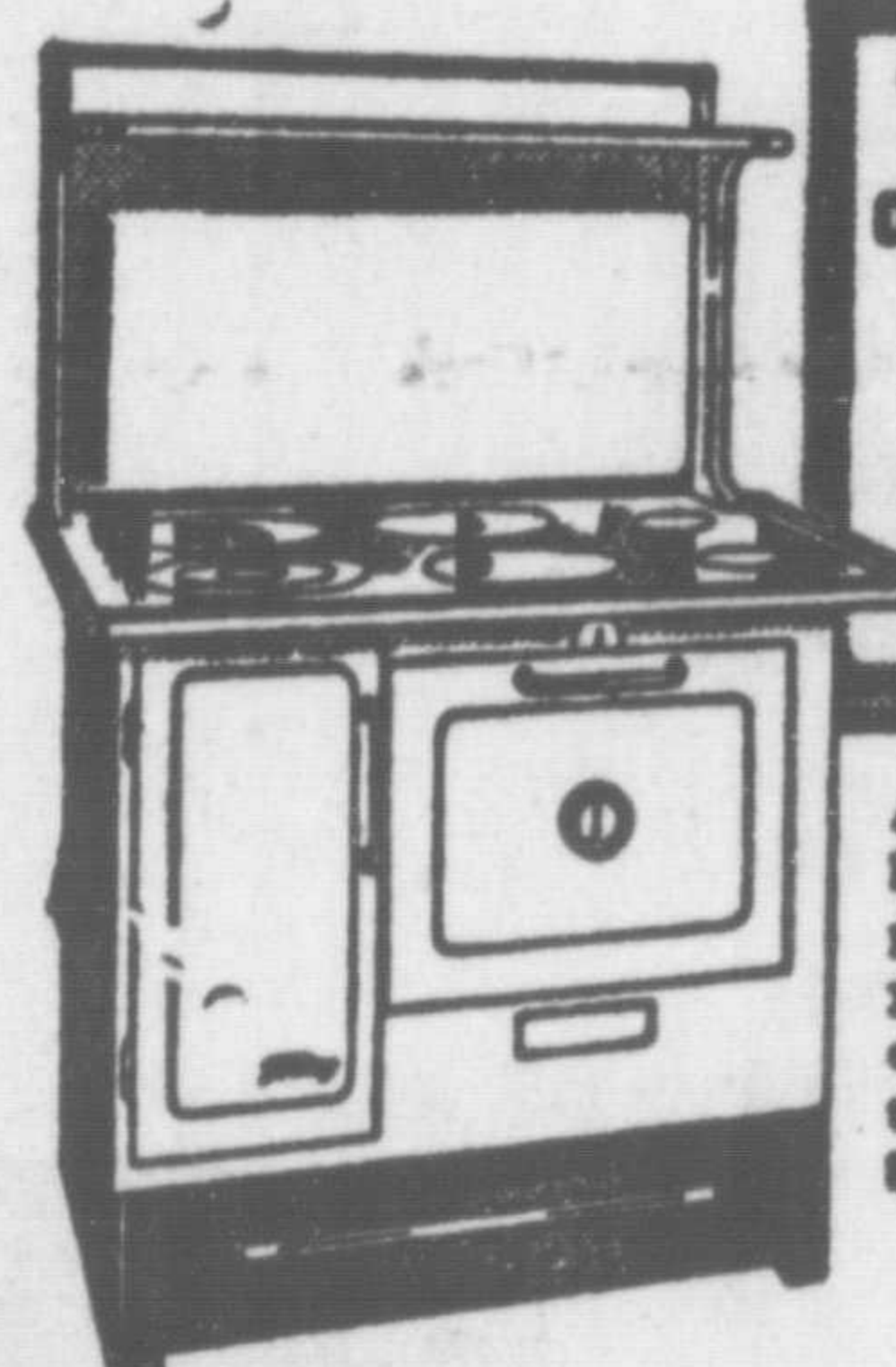

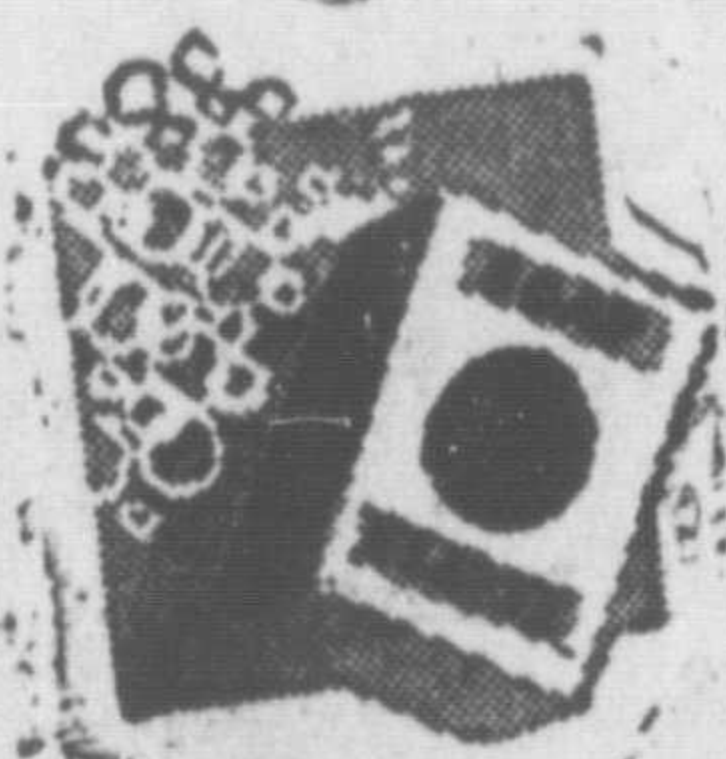

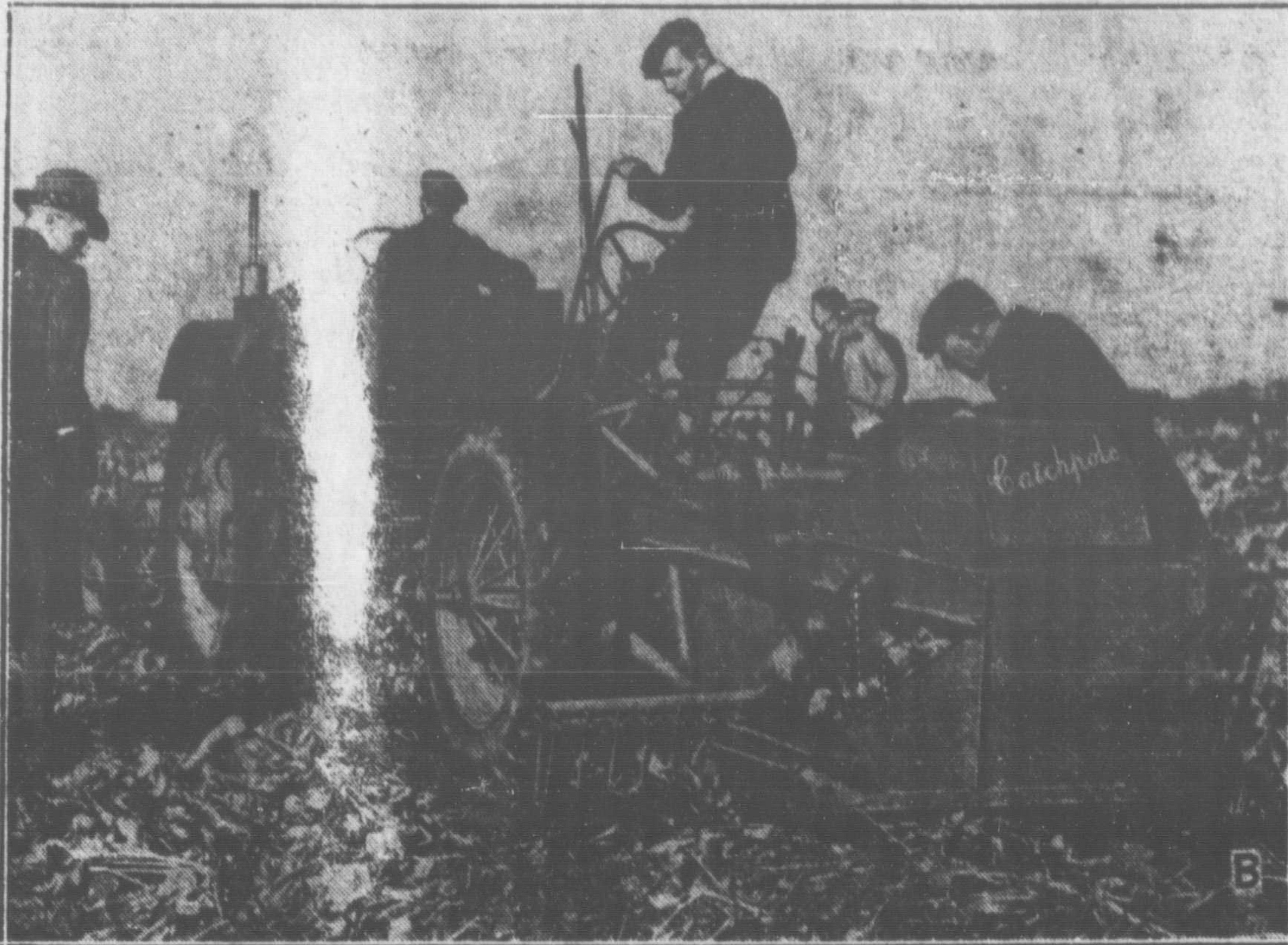

### New Machines Produce Food For War-Shattered Countries



SELF HELP, not leaving it all to Uncle Sam, is expected of countries participating in the Marshall Plan. An example of this is Britain which, under Europe's "little Marshall Plan," known as the Inter-European Payments Scheme, between June 1948 and June 1949 gave some of her neighbors the equivalent of \$244,000,000 to help them to buy essential products. Pictured here at a sugar beet root harvesting demonstration in Britain is the Catchpole, a British machine weighing about a ton, which, behind a 20 h. p. tractor, digs and tops about 2½ acres of roots in a day. Among war-shattered countries to which it has been supplied are France, Holland and Denmark. In the last three years Britain has exported more than 340,000 long tons of agricultural equipment, much of it to Europe.

"Quebec Women's Institutes have always shown a generous interest in Education," says Mrs. A. Coates provincial convener of Education for that organization. In a statement released for Education Week, March 5 to 11. "Our interests are wide," concludes Mrs. Coates, "and we join with other Institutes, here and across the seas, to promote Education as the greatest factor in protecting Home and Country."

The numerous other greetings also included a card from the Officers and Members of Pride of the North Loyal True Blue Lodge, 428 North Bay of which three nieces of Mrs Riley's are members.

Eagerly anticipated by the Grand Old Lady is the visit today of her brother eighty two years old Mathew Smith of Fort William who with his wife has made the journey to be with his sister today. The only other surviving member of the family, Mrs A Emmerson of Hodgins, is not expected to be able to travel the wintry roads.

Mrs Riley has spent most of her life in Pontiac County. She was born at Yarm, the daughter of John Smith and his wife, the former Mary Dagg, on March 2 1850.

It was a banner day for Mary Ann Smith when she attended her first Fall Fair at Shawville just 93 years ago. It was a banner day for Shawville and Pontiac, too for that was Pontiac's very first Fall Fair. Mrs Riley remembers every detail of the great day.

She married James H. Riley an English stone mason at Mat-tawa in 1884. They moved to newly opened land in the Township of Thorne eight years later and lived there 40 years. Twenty years ago they moved into Shawville and Mrs Riley has been here ever since.

Her husband died at Shawville ten years ago. He left her with one son, Thomas who carries on monument business, and one daughter Miss Gertrude Riley who lives with her in the house on Centre Street.
