Escaped Convict Recaptured

The large crowd at the door of the court room unwittingly helped a thief escape custody yesterday after he had been sentenced to two years at St. Vincent de Paul Penitentiary.

Robert Lepine, 29 year old father of seven children, mingled with spectators filling out of court dashed down the stairs and outside to freedom as the two jailers and the two police officers were busily escorting the other ten prisoners to the jail cells.

Lepine was charged with stealing \$250 from the person or Albert Gauthier of Calumet Island, on August 8 this year. He appeared before District Judge Jacques Boucher. umet Island, had been before the courts before on similar charges.

Federation Of Agriculture President Addresses Small Group Here

With music and Farm Forum reports to fill out the program, Dr. H. H. Hannam's visit to Sawhville last Friday evening provided a very worthwhile event for the 83 people who took this opportunity to meet the president of the Canadian Federation of Agriculture.

The music was provided by the Hearty sisters and William Grace of Vinton and the reports were by Lawson Corrigan, County Farm Forum President, and Keith Gregg, Provincial President of the Farmers' Association.

Lawson spoke on the proposed Provincial budget for the coming season. He told of his recent trip to Toronto where two days were spent with representatives from across Canada planning the Farm Forum Guide for the first half of the coming season.

Keith Gregg, of Huntington, spoke of the reluctance of farmers to advertise their efforts and to let the world, as it were, know that they exist!

Wyman MacKechnie introduced the guest speaker, Dr. Hannam. Among his remarks he raised some pertinent questions of problems facing farmers today such as: Is the family farm on the way out? How can farmers compete with industry in regards to wages for hired help? Why can't agriculture have a standard of living equal to other walks of life? Is farming a way of life or a place to make a living? What about vertical integration?

Dr. Hannam expressed thanks for the support of Pontiac in Farm Forum and other organizations down through the years. He spoke of the increased efficiency of farmers during the past 15 years where less than half the farmers produce so much more food. It has been said that agriculture has increased productivity in excess of any other industry during the post war years.

The basic problem in agriculture today, said Dr. Hannam, is that during these last years when our country has been experiencing great prosperity the farmer has been bypassed to a large extent.

An hour's wages in industry today will buy so much more food than an hour's wage did ten years ago.

Why, wondered Dr. Hannam, can't farmers achieve the same standard of living as other industries which perform a necessary service to our country as a whole? Farmers must organize and work together in order to help themselves and the industry as a whole.

Local deep thinkers have come up with an idea worth considering. Here it is: Put Shawville Tiger, Quyon, Camp-

Dr. Hannam explained the purpose of the Canadian Federation of Agriculture. In the past year and a half the following things have been achieved to benefit farmers, directly or indirectly, through the efforts of C.F.A.

Amendments to marketing legislation.

Support prices under dried skim milk, fowl turkeys and sugar beets.

Increased support on butter, eggs, hogs.

New supports on wool, soybeans, cheese, B.C. tomatoes, Ontario and B.C. asparagus, and most recently on peaches, wheat, oats, barley in Ontario, P.E.I. potatoes, B.C. raspberries, apricots, apples, and honey from Ontario, Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta.

Import controls on turkey, fowl, dried skim milk and butter oil.

Increased freight assistance. A price-spreads Royal Commission.

The new stabilization bill promising more regular and more systematic use of price supports, increased financial assistance to agriculture and government assistance to agriculture as an integral part of national policy in Canada.

A recently announced payment to Western grain growers to supplement unreasonably low farm incomes from grain production.

Compensation for reactors increased from \$40. to \$70. for grades and from \$100 to \$140 for purebreds.

Promises of improved measures of farm credit, crop insurance and land use programs.

The C.F.A. was organized in Toronto in 1935 and has been active and growing ever since. They have brought to light such facts as that price support for Canadian agriculture has cost only 16 cents per person per year for the past twelve years.

C.F.A. also takes a stand in international affairs which include the international wheat agreement and Canadian Wheat Board program, as well as planned marketing and the formation of an International Federation of Agricultural Producers, representing thirty million families.

Father May thanked Dr. Hannam for his interesting and educational lecture and the ladies served refreshments.

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ONE FIRM POLICY

Everyone who reads The Equity knows that crime is not sensationalized in its pages. In fact the only mention of misdemeanors of any sort are the very factual and rather dull Court Reports where are listed names of offenders, what they have done and the penalties for same.

These Court Reports are very reliably submitted to The Equity by an officer of the Court and are factual beyond question. No comment is included in the reports. Even the facts surrounding the cases are omitted because it is not the purpose of this paper to fill up its pages with how and why some lawbreaking citizen has gone about disturbing the peace or driving dangerously. Who cares? Our pages are for the accomplishments of the law abiding ones who achieve something worth writing about, as far as possible.

Occasionally some item of lawlessness becomes interesting news, such as the recent case in Shawville where a bunch of juveniles had the whole town worried and the Provincials baffled; or the case of the man in Coulonge with a penchant for kicking in store windows. But most of those who seek attention by breaking laws get only one paragraph in The Equity.

The reason all Court Reports are published is that it is a duty of this paper to publish them. People must know what the law provides in penalty for wrong doing. People must also know that the Court is a public institution and everything done in Court in a free country is public information. The only means of disseminating public information is through the free press of Canada and The Equity is a stand-out in this connection. Under the present owners nobody has ever told The Equity what to, or what not to, publish.

But we do have certain people who insist that someone will have a stroke if their son or nephew or brother is mentioned in this Court Report. They take the attitude that it would be The Equity which caused the stroke, not the son, nephew or brother who obviously doesn't give a darn anyway. These people would like to see the Court Report appear with all names listed except their particular relative. But if the news is altered, what has happened to our hard earned free press?

It all boils down to "Will the weak hearted relatives of the weak minded lawbreaker really have a stroke or is it just a matter of family pride being hurt because family discipline was forgotten?" Since we can't make this decision in each case — and it happens two or three times a year — we must stick to one firm policy.

The last thing in the world The Equity wants to do is hurt people. The paper holds little brief (though lots of patience) for public officials who do not fulfill in every way the terms of their office, but in the case of a private citizen it is different. Their actions are beyond criticism UNTIL THEY MANAGE TO GET THEMSELVES INTO THE PUBLIC COURTS. Then their doings become public information.

WHAT Is Brookdale Farm?

It is the only Protestant Home for children in this part of the Province of Quebec, with 25 children now in residence. It is a place that cares for boys and girls who, through no fault of their own, have lacked proper parental supervision and the necessary comforts of life. Brookdale offers a refuge for such needy cases and brings them up in a healthy Christian atmosphere.

It is also a real farm with 180 acres of land in use; 140 acres owned, and the balance leased. Mixed farming is carried on with crops, gardens, animals, poultry, and dairying. A certified herd of Holstein cattle roam the pasture land. Buildings include the old Hyde homestead, the new Dormitory building, a Staff cottage, a small Schoolhouse, and the usual barns and other farm structures.

WHERE Is Brookdale Located?

Directly north of the City of Hull, Quebec, 3½ miles from Wakefield and about one mile from Farm Point Village. The Farm is situated just West of Highway No. 11 in a peaceful valley among the beautiful Gatineau Hills. A large sign is placed on the turn off the main highway and small signs 2½ miles to the North and to the South approaches.

The Farm is a scenic spot in Summer or Winter, but especially in the Fall when the colourful trees are dressed in all their Autumn splendor. It is an ideal location for the children with pure air and fresh water in abundance and plenty of healthy food, hobbies, sports, etc., to satisfy their needs. Spiritual appetites are fed by Quiet times, Sunday School, and Worship services.

WHO Operates Brookdale Farm?

The Home and Farm is controlled by a Board of Directors of ten representative citizens, and has a Staff of six consecrated workers. The latter, some of whom are graduates of Bible Colleges, are as follows:- Mrs. Lloyd Waterston, Matron and Secretary, Lloyd Waterston, General Manager; Allan Dennison, Farm Manager; Mrs. Allan Dennison, House Mother; Miss Shirley Orok, School Teacher; Miss Marjory Moffat, Cook. During the Summer months a nurse was engaged.

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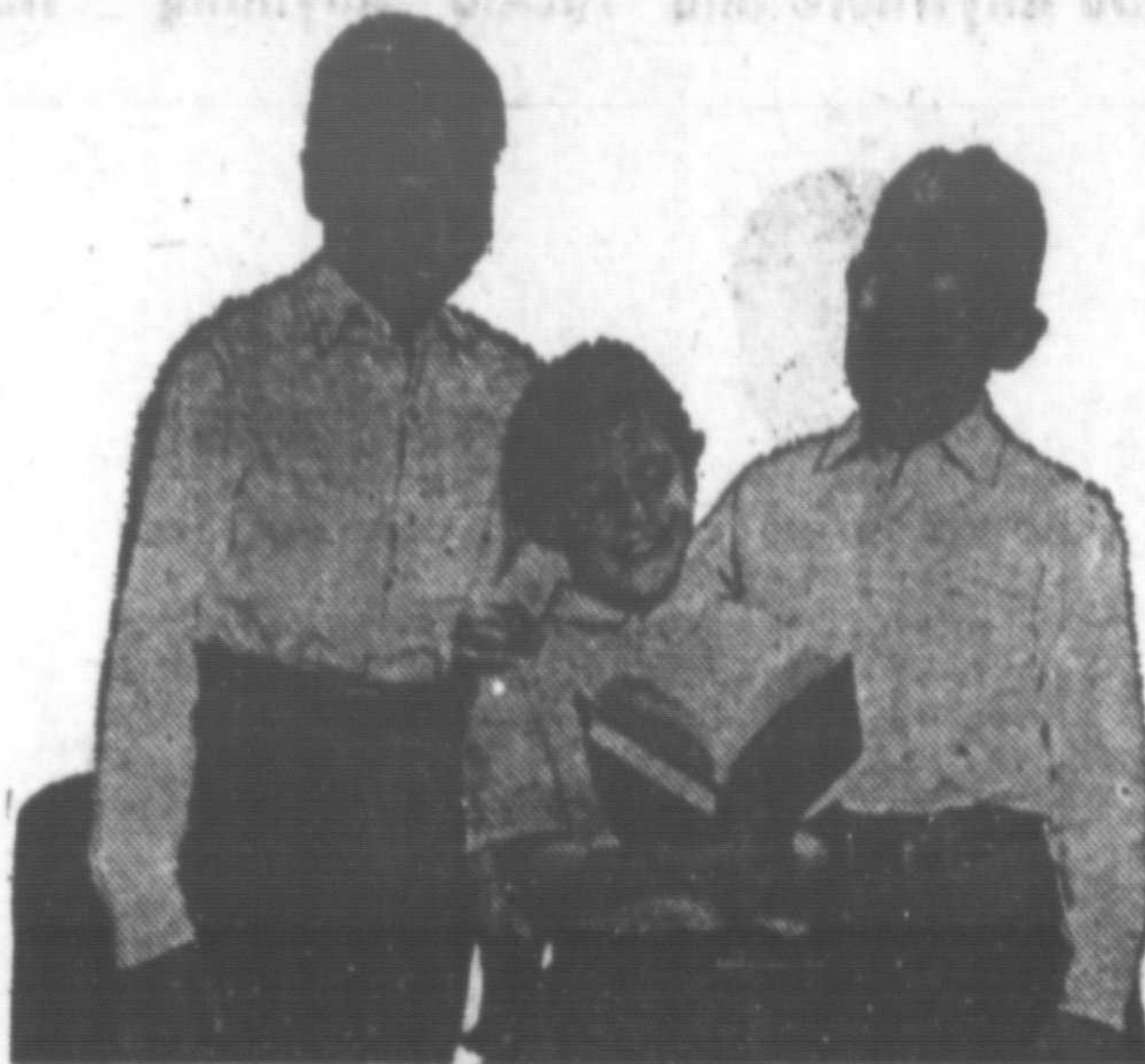

**WHEN Was Brookdale Begun?**

At the close of World War II Miss Jessie Hyde caught the vision of the great need for such an institution in this area. She is now Mrs. Lloyd Waterston who is known affectionately as "Aunt Jessie" to all who come under her tender care. As a result of her persistent struggle, and with the prayerful assistance of Christian friends and advisers, the Quebec Government issued a Charter of Incorporation in May, 1953.

The first two children arrived on December 16th, the same year, and it seemed that right from the very start God was to bless the work founded on faith in Him. Brookdale serves the Counties of Pontiac, Gatineau, Papineau, and Labelle, in western Quebec. An Annual Meeting is held early in October yearly to which the general public is cordially invited.

WHY Advertise Brookdale Farm?

This year the Annual Meeting and Open House will be held at 2:30 Saturday afternoon, October 4.

In a true sense it belongs to the people of the Counties which it serves. The management wants it to be known that such a place exists to care for needy boys and girls and that the Home is at the service of the people. They also wish to publicise the fact that it has no connection with any organization and serves the community impartially.

The Home is not affiliated with any church, fraternal society, service club, political party, or any organized charitable institution. It does, however, accept assistance from any such group when it is offered. The work of Brookdale is advertised primarily to solicit the active personal interest, the prayers, and financial support, of the people. Without the generous co-operation and support of its friends and well-wishers in all parts of the country Brookdale could not carry on the great task.

HOW Is Brookdale Financed?

From the beginning the work has been supported mainly by the freewill gifts and offerings of the interested public. It is truly a "Faith Mission" depending as it does on belief that God will "supply all our needs according to His riches." Members of the Staff and of the Board work sacrificially for the Farm. The workers receive small salaries plus food and shelter. The Directors serve without remuneration or expense accounts and give freely of their time, energy, talents, and money.

No person or group of persons derive any direct profit whatsoever from the operation of the Farm and Home. The generous grant from the Quebec Government toward the new building was much appreciated. No regular Grant however is received for support of the children from Quebec City. The only Federal help comes from Family Allowances. Shawville Village donates \$100.00 yearly. The main bulk of income is from persons on the mailing list, church groups, lodges, clubs, etc, in cash and supplies.

Can Fish Smell?

Fish definitely have a sense of smell, but they can't smell anything at a great distance.

Their nostrils are little holes in the top of the snout, and lead into small sacs under the skin. Water carrying the scent enters the nostrils and passes into the sacs where the water is smelled.

The catfish is a good example of a fish that feeds principally by sense of smell. It roots around on the muddy bottom, smelling the water until some food is located. The shark is primarily a smell hunter — and that's

the reason why shark repellent was used by the navy during the war with such good results.

It's fairly obvious, therefore, that the various liquids on the market designed to attract fish the way perfume attracts men, are not going to produce much action in painting on a trolling plug. It's even doubtful that a slow-retrieved cast would attract a fish's sense of smell.

But there is little doubt that bait used for still fishing certainly attracts fish because they like what they smell as well as what they



see.

Nothing can spoil a hunting or fishing trip quite as fast as being met by a swarm of mosquitos, blackflies and no-see-ums every time you step out of your camp doorway.

Unfortunately for the fisherman, blackflies are found only near water. You can't spray against them because they live out in the open. You can't kill their larvae with oil as you can mosquitos.

The blackfly is a blood-sucker. His bite is deep and leaves a blood welt that is uncomfortable but not dangerous. The only thing I can think of in favour of the blackfly is that it is not a

disease carrier.

And the only answer to ward off these flying nuisances seems to be a good insect repellent.

During World War II a synthetic chemical was developed called ethylhexanediol. Here's how it works. It irritates the sense organs of the blackfly, mosquito or other flying insects and he flies away before he has a chance to bite. The repellent does not irritate the fisherman's skin. The only hazard is the spine tingling sensation of having blackflies and mosquitos land briefly on your exposed skin, and waiting for the bite that does not come.

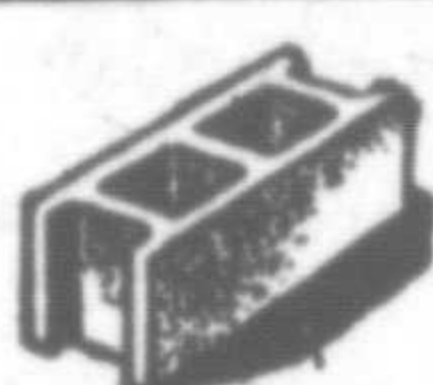

The Press Is for the People

One Sunday morning some years ago the public water supply of our town became contaminated. Fearful of civic alarm, health officials decided to have a brief announcement read at all church services. Just that, nothing more. They were therefore aghast at my announcement that our newspaper planned to print an "extra" and deliver it free to every doorstep in town—with the urgent headline: *Boil your water.*

People would panic, we were told. We argued that our citizens panic only on rumors, never when full facts are provided. Over stout opposition we printed that paper and delivered it. Later the very officials who had opposed our "extra" praised us for it, and the townspeople were full of appreciation.

A newspaper is a public-service institution. Its responsibility to serve its readers is as serious as that of any public office. Indeed, the responsibility extends far beyond a paper's readers—to the com-

to the world at large.

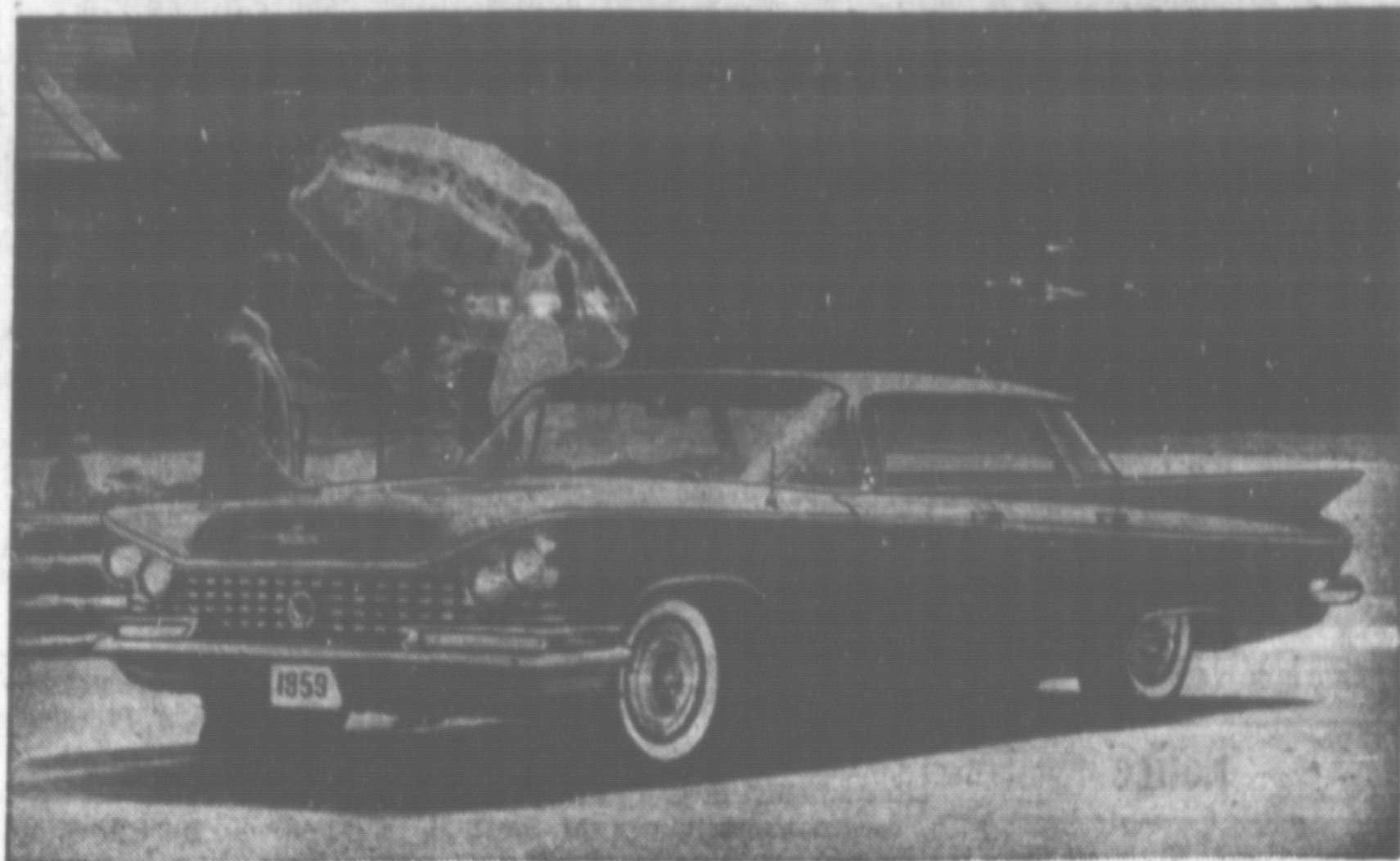
U.S. Senator William Proxmire, of Wisconsin, said it this way not long ago: "A good newspaper is a model of accurate reporting and responsible editorial policy—a force, a moral force, for better government and community responsibility, without which the State would be infinitely poorer in moral and intellectual resources."

Some years ago a teacher of newspapermen—Professor Roscoe Ellard, of Columbia University—asked me to address his graduate students. "I want to talk," he said, "on the subject of 'Making Government Responsible, Righteous, Readable, and Democratically Attainable'." A definition in eight words of public service journalism!

The crusading role of the newspaperman, particularly in public affairs, is certainly no new thing. Who in my business could forget Horace Greeley and his battles for honest government... William Lloyd Garrison and his fight against slavery... Colonel W. R. Nelson and his program for the reconstruction of Kansas City... Joseph Pulitzer, who gave us all a pattern for courageous service... William Randolph Hearst with his "constructive campaigns" which suggested remedies and eschewed violent attack?

But there is more, it seems to me, to public service than crusading. There is a need, and it probably exists in newspapers the world over, for special ingenuity, for special dedication, for conscience, for a soul. That's what Felix McKnight, a Dallas, Texas, editor

calls it—a soul. If a newspaper has one, it ought to search it, he says. If it hasn't one, it ought to get one—and this it can do by mixing integrity, courage, and fervor and serving generously.

There is a need, it seems to me, for editors who by their own high qualities of character and spirit will stiffen management's backbone, for editors who believe deeply in the goodness of people and believing, can quickly spot the human resources, the human services, the exciting everyday miracles, the bursting wonder of youth—and play the news accordingly.

This is a new and welcome kind of journalistic public service. It discards some false standards of sensationalism. It refuses to join in the too-popular practice of observing with amusement the disgusting antics of known criminals as they laugh in the faces of decent officials and decent citizens. Are we sissies on my paper because we omit the details of how a burglary was contrived, or the lurid testimony in divorce trials, or gory photos that tear at the sensibilities of many readers? I don't think so. I believe it is a direct and important form of public service to make newspapers clean and refreshing as well as informative—and with no do it yourself columns for committing crimes, or circumventing the orderly processes of our society.

I feel strongly that the newspaper never does enough to awaken powers slumbering

within readers; to help them to higher civic, moral, and spiritual planes, to give them an optimism of the kind which routs despair. The good newspaper can make a subject so important to the reader that it stirs his inner capacity for service, setting free the fountain of living waters so dammed up in most of us that they are down to a trickle.

Today as never before there is a need for newspapers to enter the public arena, to pry into dark corners, to turn on lights, to tell the people what

they have a right to know, what they must know to be responsible citizens in a difficult world.

Somewhat I think of the late Sevelon Brown, beloved editor and publisher of the Providence, Rhode Island, Journal. "It is a matter of religious faith with me," he once remarked, "that we newspaper people will find some special provision for us on Judgment Day to excuse a thousand errors if we can only say, 'I meant my newspaper, with all its faults, to do good for my-
