An unsuccessful attempt to break into Fraser's store by the back door was first made, following which entry was gained to the restaurant. A panel was then removed from the wall between the restaurant and Fraser's, but the attempt to penetrate the wall was abandoned when it was discovered to be made of brick. Cigarettes valued at about \$135.00, and cash amounting to \$30.00 were taken by the thieves. No arrests have as yet been made, according to the QPF, but there are reported to be suspects in the case. The investigation by the QPF continues.

Pollution Laws and Farm Buildings

Farmers are probably the last persons to worry about pollution. However that's all changed. Pollution requirements exist for farms too and since ignorance of the law does not protect farmers or any citizen from the law—farmers take heed.

The Quality of the Environment Act was amended on December 21, 1972. All livestock shelters built since that date must meet certain requirements with regard to distances from lot lines, public roads, neighbours houses, wells and water courses. Adequate measures for storage of manure is also required.

For example: The distance requirements. The law that new livestock shelters should be 250 feet from wells or water courses, 100 feet from the nearest lot line, 250 to 450 feet from centre of the nearest public road, and 250 to 500 feet from neighbours houses depending on type of livestock kept. There is some flexibility in some of these distances, depending on size on the farm operation and type of farming, i.e. dairy or beef or hogs and also the existence of present buildings.

Any Quebec farmer planning a livestock building should make a request for a certificate of authorization for livestock production at his county's health unit. The Gatineau South Health Unit is at 256, boul. St-Joseph à Hull. Pontiac County's Health Unit is located at Fort Coulonge. After the official request is made, the inspector visits the proposed building site and forwards the request to Quebec from where the Livestock Production Authorization Certificate is issued. Anyone planning to build should request a permit well in advance. Some time is involved in processing requests.

Some local municipalities also have strict building requirements, so a check should also be made with local authorities. Pollution laws exist for all of us, don't get inconvenienced outside the law.

Ottawa River to open for pleasure boats?

Two hundred miles of the Ottawa River from the nation's capital to Lake Timiskaming can be opened for pleasure boating, but the effort will require 16 locks and \$90 million.

Consulting engineers say the project is economically feasible because it will pay for itself through tax and tourism revenues within 10 years.

Priority would be given to construction of locks between Lake Deschenes and Lake Des Chats just west of Ottawa since the greatest concentration of boats on the river is in the capital region.

The report of a \$50,000 study, commissioned two years ago by the Department of Public Works, was released recently.

Two Liberal MPs from the Ottawa River, Tom Lefebvre (Pontiac) and Len Hopkins (Renfrew North-Nipissing) endorsed the proposal and called for its immediate implementation.

SIXTEEN LOCKS

If the overall scheme is implemented, the total cost would be \$90.2 million. This covers construction of 16 locks and the raising of four bridges.

Temporary marine railways and road transportation, provided at a cost of \$15 million, could substitute at first for the locks.

The greatest single life would be 135 feet, required three locks, to pass the Desjochims Dam above Pembroke. At La Cave Dam, seven miles west of Mattawa, a lift of 83 feet would be negotiated through one large lock.

Four stages of construction are proposed:

- Shaw Falls Lock to connect lake Deschenes to Lake Shaw.
- Ottawa to Shaw Falls, four locks and raising of two bridges, to connect the upper Ottawa River and the Rideau Canal system.
- Extension of the lock system to Pembroke and the extension of the marine railway system to Lake Timiskaming.
- Completion of the lock system through the entire length.

Revenue projections are based on estimates that 9,700 to 16,400 boats would use the system annually and each boat would represent an expenditure of \$600. The growth rate in the number of boats is estimated at seven per cent yearly.

A village has a character, just like a person, reflecting its heritage and the nature of its present situation.

Shawville's character is created by a combination of its residents and their history on this continent, as well as vestiges of their past. This past was, for most Shawville natives, recorded in the story of Ireland's 18th and 19th centuries.

Somebody came along a few years ago and erected a "Bureau de Poste" sign on our post office and gradually we got used to the idea. But now we are faced with more of the same and there is a limit to what our people want to get used to.

After all, will it still be Shawville when the Shoe Shop is "Le Boutique des Souliers", when W.A.'s grocery store is "L'Epicierie", with a "Quincillerie" for Morley's place and so forth. Well, we don't mind too much putting "Imprimerie" on our own building but how are we going to translate "Home of The Equity"—and more seriously, what will be expected of us next?

Each time the Quebec Government opens its mouth these days it seems to say something stupid—unless you are convinced that step by step progress towards an independent and totally French nation is not stupid.

We feel it is time we stopped in our headlong dash out of Canada and that we should somehow make our Provincial Government stop and take stock of its people. There are others than us who are annoyed by this Frenchification of everything here. French is just great, don't get us wrong, we love the language, but we sure hate to see it destroyed by spreading it all over such unlikely places as Shawville, for God's Sake!

Considering how culture-conscious our Quebec Government is, when can we expect to see a Department of Government charged with the responsibility of protecting a culture from artificial changes which do not grow naturally among the people of a place?

Considering that vast numbers of people, whose normal language is English, are trying their utmost to learn French and become bilingual, why can't Quebec let it happen gradually— all in good time.

We reiterate— legislating a language is wrong!

SECOND THOUGHTS ABOUT A NAME

There is a flurry of concern around Breckenridge because, although the Minister of Municipal Affairs has promised no more forced amalgamations, it looks as if Breckenridge residents might suddenly find themselves no longer in Pontiac, but amalgamated with Lucerne.

They have only been in Pontiac County since January 1st and already they are being threatened with removal. This threat came as a surprise to the people who live at that end of Eardley but probably the Government of Quebec has had it planned all along. Probably that's why they refuse to move the County boundary signs, because they know the boundary is still in for more changes.

Anyway, since we have been having discussions with people from that end of this County, we have come to realize that it would be a mistake to call the whole new municipality Quio, or even Quyon. That name should be reserved for the populated area which has always been Quyon. It would create confusion for Breckenridge, for instance, or even Luskville or Beech Grove, to be called Quyon. Those villages should keep their names and the whole large municipal area should choose from between the more general and all-encompassing names of Eardley and Onslow, or think up an entirely new name.

As for the decision about where Breckenridge will be tomorrow, let's hope it is not made by politicians on a "you scratch my back I'll scratch yours" basis. The population of the area concerned, and nobody else, should decide. And wouldn't it be wonderful altogether if things could be done this way!

Bill Prankard, 30 year old Hamilton born evangelist, will conduct a service in Shawville on September 23.

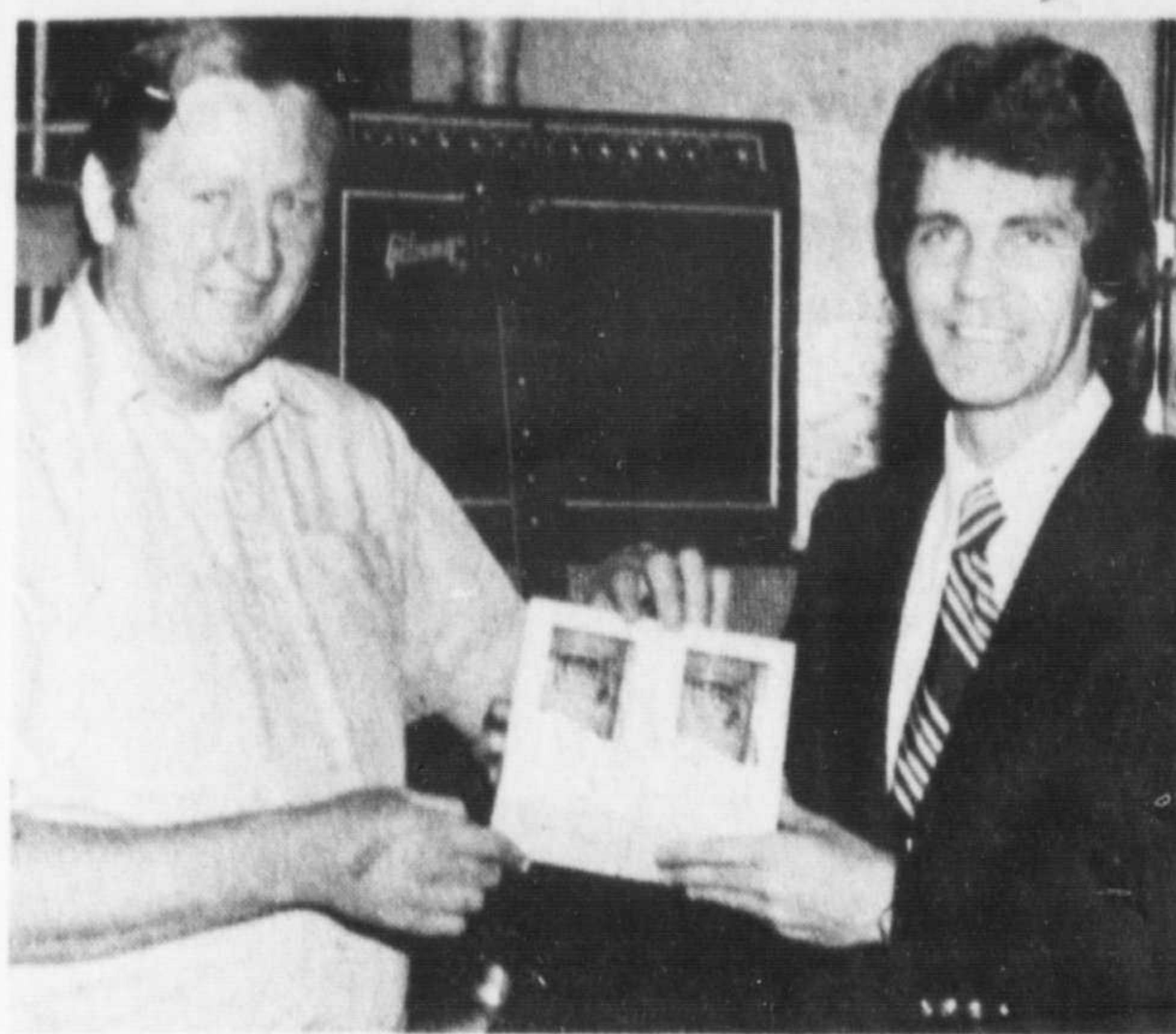

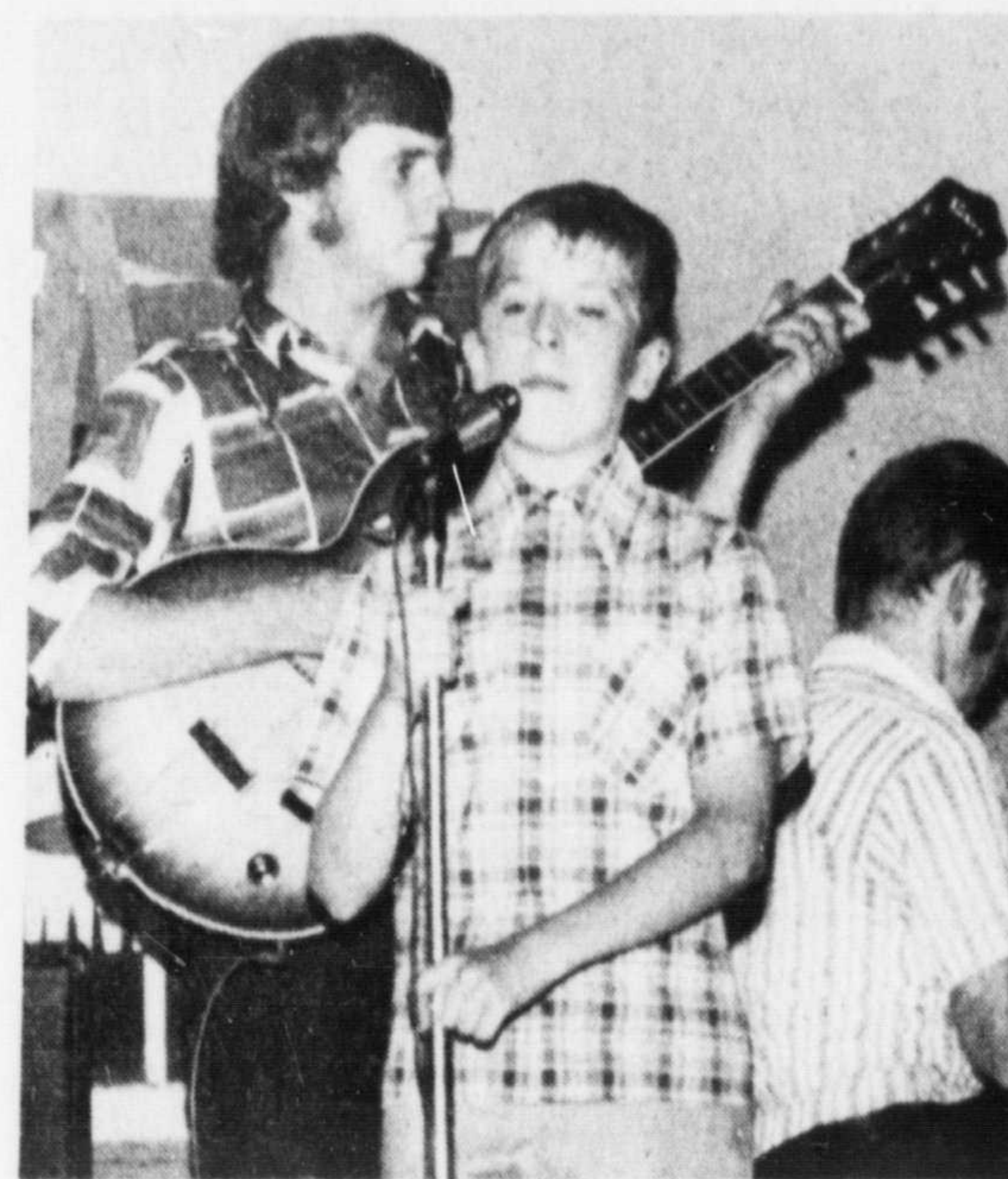

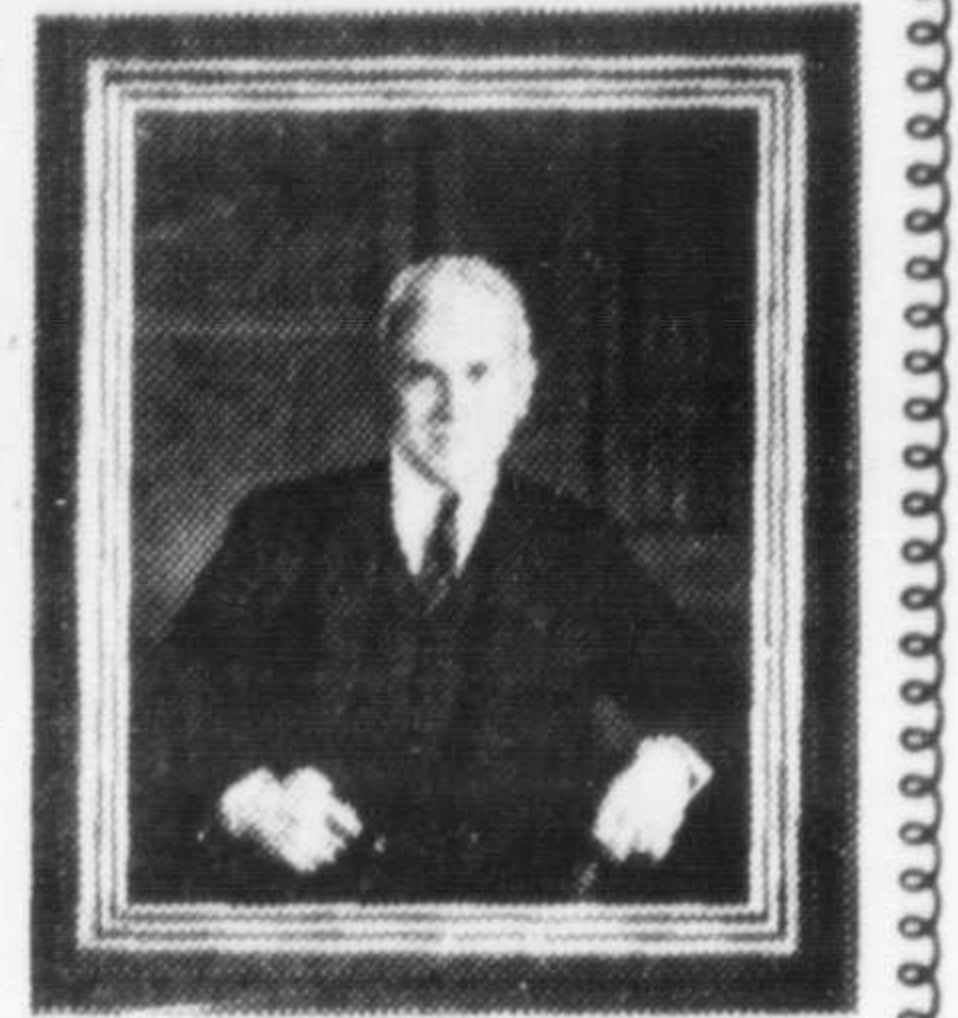

This weekend in Campbell's Bay was the second phase of the Summer Festival. The crowds gathered to see the Moto-Cross racing in which, 150 contestants participated.

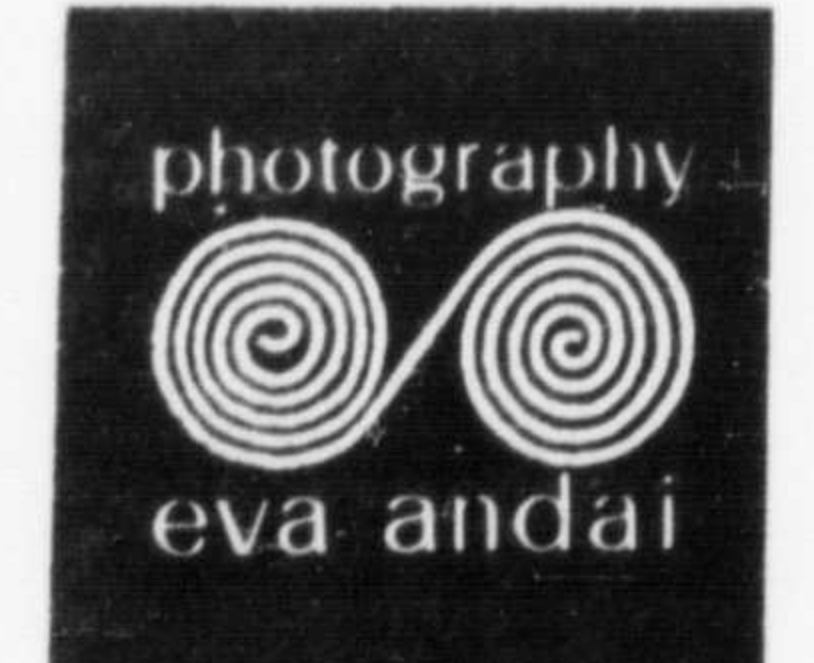
