

MR. D. L. MOODY.

VISIT OF THE GREAT REVIVALIST TO MONTREAL.

The Albert Hall was crowded to its utmost capacity yesterday morning by a large number of Christians workers to hear Mr. D. L. Moody, the great Evangelist, speak on Christian work, he being in the city on his way to England. Mr. Geo. Hague, President of the Y. M. C. A., presided, and among others present on the platform were noticed Rev. Dr. Jenkins, Canon Evans, Hugh Johnston, J. S. Black, J. L. Foster, Dr. Fisher, Dr. Clarke, Revs. E. Lafleur, Dr. McCaul, Dr. Hoff (of Sherbrooke), E. A. Telford (London, Eng.), and Messrs. — Murphy, G. Bishop, H. A. Nelson, M.P., and D. A. Budge. The meeting opened with the singing of a hymn, after which Rev. Dr. Jenkins offered prayer. Another hymn was sung and prayer offered by the Rev. Canon Baldwin. A book of prayer was then read, and prayer again offered by the Rev. Hugh Johnston, after which Mr. Moody commenced his address. He said he believed the greatest power on earth was not intellectual nor physical power, but the power of a consecrated life. There were several great essentials that a Christian worker should have and he would confine himself at this meeting to these essentials. The first essential which was necessary to Christian workers was assurance of faith, assurance that they were saved themselves. He did not believe that we had to wait until the judgment day to do this, but he believed that every man should know it at once. Another essential was boldness, which was so necessary to the preacher, to the superintendent or the teacher. We must all, also, have faith, which was so necessary to the Christian worker. The next essential was to win some people, but which was one of the most important elements in a Christian worker—enthusiasm. One of the most important essentials was love. He believed that the hardest character could be pierced if he was only convinced that the person loved him and did not do it out of a sense of duty. Human sympathy was another great quality, though it was often overlooked. To sympathize with any one it was only necessary to put ourselves in their place. There was one more essential which the Christian worker should have, namely, the spirit of power. During the address Mr. Moody related some of his best anecdotes, and was listened to with great attention throughout, the meeting closing with the pronouncing of the Benediction.

The meeting in St. James Street Methodist Church. A large number of people gathered in St. James Street Methodist Church at four o'clock in the afternoon, to hear the public address by Mr. Moody. The church was crowded to the doors. Among those present were Mr. George Hague, President, and Mr. D. A. Budge, Secretary, of the Young Men's Christian Association, and Revs. Hugh Johnston, A. B. Mackay, G. H. Wells, Gavin Lang, J. McCaul, E. A. Stafford, Prof. Shaw, James Chalmers, J. S. Black, S. Saunders, Knowles, A. H. Munro, J. Scrimger and Prof. Cousinart.

The meeting was opened by the singing of "What a Friend we have in Jesus," after which the Rev. A. B. Mackay offered prayer. Mr. Moody took for the topic of his discourse—"I will give you rest." He said that Christ came to call sinners to repentance. The invitation, "Come unto me all ye that labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest," was for sinners. Jesus Christ died for the ungodly, and the chapter of Mark they were told of a man who was full of leprosy. This man had been looked upon by his neighbours for years as unclean, and had been avoided by them; in fact, he was an outcast of society. But when he saw Jesus, he cried out to him, "If thou wilt, thou canst make me clean," and he was made clean. But the leprosy of sin was far worse than the Eastern leprosy. It was the leprosy of sin that had blighted this fair earth and that had caused the fall of some of the angels from their lofty position. But Christ had promised to put away that sin, and if they would come to Him He would say to them, as He did to the leper, "I will be thou clean." Christ said again, "He that cometh unto Me, I will." Christ wanted them to come just as they were. Sin would keep them out of heaven, but it would not keep them from Christ. "He that cometh unto Me, I will in no wise cast out," Mr. Moody then related the story of a sailor boy, whose mother had been praying for him for a long time, and finally, on one voyage, this boy said, "I will reform and give up drinking." So when he came to New York he applied for admission to a Lodge of Freemasons, thinking that that would help him to keep his promise, but he was blackballed. He next tried the Oddfellows, with the same result. But one day this sailor boy received an invitation to go to the Fulton street prayer meeting, and when he went there he was converted, for the Lord Jesus Christ did not blackball him. It was about the hardest thing, and it was about the easiest thing to be a Christian. That seemed strange, but yet it was true. People were generally ashamed to confess Christ before men. A man who professes to be a Christian, but who does not live as a Christian, is a greater hindrance to the religion than that of Jesus Christ would hurt him through the streets, and would not be ashamed of it. But the Christian religion, the only thing in the world which is worth having, they were ashamed of. The speaker related that, at a prayer in Boston, at which he was present, a man who had been converted at a revival meeting, but when he got to his home he was afraid to take out his Bible and read it before his room-mate, for fear he would be laughed at. Matters went on in this way for about a week, when one night he made up his mind to read his Bible, and he made up his mind to do so. Imagine his surprise when his room-mate said, "I have been trying for about a week to do the same thing, but was ashamed to do so." Many a man in the time of war would be bold to face the cannon's mouth, but would not have the moral courage to take out his Bible and let his comrades know that he was a Christian. The great trouble with men was that they were perfectly willing to be Christians, but they did not want to bear the cross. The cry of the age was, "Give me religion, but no cross." But they could not be disciples of Jesus Christ without taking up the cross. There was just one way, and that was by the Cross of Calvary. Jesus Christ said to Peter, James and John, the fishermen of Galilee, "Follow me and I will make you fishers of men." That promise of Christ was fulfilled, for Peter never saw the day in his life when he caught so many fishes as he did men at the Pentecost, when he was baptized in the Spirit. A great many wanted to shine in to save souls for Christ. It was quite the thing now-a-days for a man to say, "I will give you \$50,000 for charitable purposes, if you will make me the town after me," but in a few years time no one

would know whether the town was named after a mountain or a man. The speaker then referred to several personages in Holy Writ, whose kind acts to the Saviour had been handed down to posterity, as wherever the Gospel was preached these acts were spoken of. A Jewish Sunday-school teacher once neglected his class to attend a meeting which was to be addressed by Mr. Moody, and when he saw her there he asked her if she had got another teacher to take her place. She replied in the negative. He then said to her, "How can you expect to be a successful teacher if you neglect your class in that way?" She replied that she had only five little boys, but she forgot that perhaps one or two boys might be a Wesley or a Whitfield or some other great preacher of the Gospel. Andrew brought his brother Peter to Christ; that was the best day's work that Andrew ever did. It was a great privilege to lead a soul to Christ. He said that he would never have the honour of saving a soul for Christ. Mr. Moody then related a story of a fashionable young lady who left her fashionable friends to teach a poor little girl whom she found on the street, and the results which led from it. He also related how, before his own brother was converted, he spent anxious days and nights in praying for him, until at last at one of his meetings his brother rose up with those who wished to be prayed for. Another passage said, "Where I am there will my servant be." They found that if they would confess Him before the world, He would confess them in the Court of Heaven. And then there was the "I will" of the resurrection. Mr. Moody concluded an eloquent and earnest appeal by asking his hearers to trust in Jesus Christ, and all would be well with them.

AMUSEMENTS.

ACADEMY OF MUSIC.

This drama, from the pen of Mr. L. O. David, was introduced to the public last night at the Academy of Music. A first presentation, is usually little better than a bungling public rehearsal, to which liberal allowance is generously given. But there was no reason for the author or his director, for the play was a masterpiece of smoothness throughout. The costumes were good, the same may be said of the scenery and of the stage arrangements generally. Those engaged in presenting the piece were letter-perfect in their several parts, and what might be lacking in animation was amply made up by the fact that the actors were so accustomed to their representation. We do not propose to discuss the performance of last night in detail, but will do so after its repetition. The play itself is professedly historical; but no play that was ever put upon the boards is so, except in the sense of having a historical basis. Facts (whether might be either unquestionable or traditional) as its basis, was ever such. The paths of the dramatist and the historian lie apart, just as the narrations of fact and the creations of fancy do. Mr. David has produced what deserves to be called a drama—a historical drama—and the audience last night fully appreciated it. It will be repeated to-night. At the close of the third act the author was vociferously called for and bowed his acknowledgments.

It is very seldom, indeed, that the patrons of the Academy have the opportunity of enjoying such a beautifully constructed comedy-drama as will be presented on Monday next and for the week. "Hazel Kirke" from the first night of its appearance at the Madison Square Theatre, New York, has grown stronger upon the affections of the people. It is now within a few weeks of the 1,000th performance of the play, and it is still as fresh and beautiful to look upon. The run has been unprecedented on the stage, which proves conclusively that without any of those adjuncts necessary to the proper putting on of a play, and of its success, that it possesses literary merits of a very high order. The dialogue is most pure in sentiment and a good moral is drawn from the whole. It is unnecessary for us to say more than we have already done to make our people acquainted with one of the very best plays now before the public. The artists are all of the highest rank in their profession, and what more can be said of the several characters. The Box plan is now open, and we advise all those wishing to see the event of the season to at once secure their seats.

THEATRE ROYAL.

DEACON CRANKETT. The presentation of this truly American play at the Royal again last night attracted a large audience, whose appreciation of the play was manifested in the most enthusiastic manner. In which it was acted was more than once unmistakably manifested. "Deacon Crankett" is a play with a distinctive character—a creation that does credit to American dramatic authorship, and its merits have already been warmly commended by the press. The plot is a critical circle. The plot is not strikingly strong in itself, but is ingenious enough to hold the interest and attention of the audience, and it presents types of character that are at once fresh and true to life. The portrayal of the typical New Englander is much above what the public has been accustomed to see. "Deacon Crankett" gives a genuine touch of humanity, and paints at the same time a life-like picture of New England character. "Deacon" is the very soul of good humour, hospitality and good principles. The "Deacon Crankett" of Mr. Ben Magnin is, in a word, an artistic and finished piece of acting. He simply looks and acts the piece to perfection, and is a whole host in himself. Mr. James O'Neill is not given a great chance as "Joe Thatcher," but he is difficult, and he makes the very best of it. Mr. O'Neill is an actor who has made a high reputation, and we trust to see him at some future time in Montreal in the legitimate drama. From what we have seen of him, we are ready to hazard the opinion that he will take the highest possible position in the profession. Mr. Buckley, Mr. Harry Eytzinger and Miss Young were excellent in their several parts. The last opportunity of seeing "Deacon Crankett" will be this evening, and we would advise our readers by no means to miss it.

Ten individuals, named respectively, Harry Wiseman, Antoine Fournier, Dominique Elid, Octave Thomas, Felix Denis, Jean Lachapelle, Paul Labbe, Antoine Goyette, Lazarus Crehenhaler and Edmund Martin, were arraigned on the charge of committing the shoe-stealing on a woman near the Exhibition ground which was reported in yesterday's issue. They were remanded until Wednesday next.

RECORDERS.

Present—His Honour Mr. DeMontigny.

Things were very dull in this Court yesterday, there being a list of only eleven offenders, more than half of whom were discharged. Louis Garceau was charged with assault and battery, and was sentenced to \$5 fine or one month's imprisonment. James Robinson appeared for the third time in Court, charged with being drunk and fighting on St. Paul street. He also was fined \$5 or one month's imprisonment. Jerome Maurice and Philip Chartand, two caterers, were accused with serving without a receipt, and a sentence of \$1 or eight days was passed.

The Recorder's crusade against the houses of assignation does not seem to be ended yet. Marie Belrose was yesterday charged with keeping a house of ill-fame and was sentenced to twelve months' imprisonment, while the inmates, Exile Pangman and Adele Feltre were released on the same sentence. Philomene Jasmin was also accused with keeping a house of ill-fame and was sentenced to six months' imprisonment and \$30 fine or six months more. A lighter sentence of \$10 or three months' imprisonment was imposed upon Annie Laughlin for keeping such a house.
