CUSTOM-HOUSE ABUSES.

The Commissioners of the Customs have been reprimanded, in the following letter, by the Lords of the Treasury, for permitting scandalous seizures of property by their officers, under pretence of irregularity:

"Treasury Chambers, August 14, 1814.
 "GENTLEMEN—I am commanded by the Lords Commissioners of his Majesty's Treasury to inform you, that they have recently had under their consideration representations from various merchants, complaining of unjust seizures, and vexatious detentions by the Officers of your departments. In some of these cases My Lords have observed, that the precise letters of Acts of Parliament framed many years ago, in time of peace, and of more circumscribed commerce, have been rigorously applied amidst all the difficulties incident to war, and against the manifest spirit of the Acts themselves, the penalties of which were directed for the punishment of fraud or culpable negligence, and not for accidental or trivial omissions. To four cases which will serve as examples of many others, I am commanded to draw your special attention:—The first is, the seizure of twenty hogsheds of sugar, entered with the mark RS instead of R S; these hogsheds were seized by the officers of your department, at Bristol, merely for the omission of the small intervening mark; and a satisfaction has been demanded for the restoration of each of one guinea. It is quite manifest, from all the circumstances of this case, that no fraud could have been intended. To grant a satisfaction therefore, to the seizing officer, could tend only to encourage similar seizures for trifling irregularities; and therefore, My Lords cannot sanction the payment to the seizing Officer of any satisfaction whatever, but direct the immediate restoration of the goods. Another seizure at the port of Bristol, which has particularly attracted their Lordships' observation, is that two hogsheds of sugar, imported in the ship RUTH, in the month of April, and seized by the officer, as he declared, for being an excess upon the report of the cargo, against the earnest remonstrance of the owners, who contended that the cargo entirely corresponded with the report. After nearly four months' detention, and various reports and correspondence, the owners were enabled, from the accidental circumstance of no part of the cargo having been sold until the whole was delivered, to prove that there was no ground whatever for the seizure; and the very irregularity which was the pretence for the seizure, was traced to the officer himself. A third case at the port of Bristol is that of the sugar imported in the Anna Maria, a part of which has been seized, because the marks do not entirely correspond with the report, but as the whole contents of the cargo, as reported and delivered, agree, there is no ground to suspect a fraud, and the irregularity is not of an extent to call for any penalty. My Lords, therefore, desire that the sugar may be forthwith restored, without any satisfaction whatever. A fourth case now before their Lordships, is that of the Perseverance, in the port of London, which vessel and her cargo have been seized under circumstances so extraordinary, as to demand their Lordships' immediate interposition:—It appears that this ship brought some cases of sugar from Gibraltar, and under the existing laws, was not liable to seizure, but the owners were at liberty to send the vessel and cargo again from this country. They applied, however, to their Lordships to land and warehouse the cargo; and whilst this application was under consideration, your officers, construing such application into an intention to land the goods for warehousing, seized the vessel and cargo. The application to their Lordships for permission to warehouse being refused, the Memorialisist then applied for an order to transship the cargo into another vessel, for Gibraltar, "the petitioner being subject to heavy demurrage for detaining the vessel." To this request their Lordships were pleased to accede, and your Board were apprised thereof on the 6th ult. and desired to give immediate directions for that purpose. The vessel Perseverance and cargo having, however, been seized by your Officers as above stated, you have requested their Lordships' directions, submitting, "that should their Lordships be pleased to order the delivery of the goods and vessel, the seizing Officer might, according to the practice, be entitled to

"satisfaction;" but you beg to submit how far their Lordships, under the circumstance, may think he has any claim to the same. According to the views which My Lords at present take of this case, the original seizure appears to have been most unjust; and any practice which would entitle the officer to satisfaction, cannot be too much censured, or too soon abolished. In cases like this, My Lords expect, from the discriminating judgment of your Board, the prompt and vigorous execution of the powers vested in you by law; and you may confidently rely, without the delay of previous reference to their Lordships, which is in itself a heavy punishment to the merchant, upon their Lordships' full support in whatever measures may be necessary for the punishment of oppressive or contumacious officers.—Thus, my Lords feel to be due to the interest of the fair merchant, and to the character of the Government, both of which are affected by such transactions as those adverted to in this letter. Already my Lords have instructed you to injoin your officers to refrain from acting upon any new constructions of law contrary to the past practice, and to refer all such doubts, in the first instance, to your Board; and in case of great importance or difficulty, you will apply for their Lordships' determination. As the penalties contained in the various laws of Customs were intended for the punishment of fraud, and not of accidental or trivial omissions, the officers of Customs must cease to consider such mistakes as sources of advantages to themselves; for my Lords are determined hereafter to mark with their decided displeasure every detention that shall appear to have been made upon such vexatious pretences. In order to remove every doubt of their Lordships' intention upon this subject, I have it in command to desire, that if upon the delivery of cargoes of vessels it shall appear that any packages which may be erroneously marked, do in substance and contents correspond with the report and the manifest, neither such goods or vessels shall be deemed liable to seizure on account of such error.

QUEBEC AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY.

The very backward state of agriculture in this Province, particularly in the District of Quebec, most forcibly strikes the eye of the stranger who visits Canada, and in no less a degree calls forth the regret of those amongst ourselves who have had the opportunity attentively to compare our system of farming with that of other countries which may have come under their observation.

Shut out, as we in a manner are, by the nature of the climate, from a communication with the rest of the world, during a great part of the year, and situated at a distance from the mother country, part of the year, and situated at a distance from the mother country, our farmer has not the advantage that the highly improved state of her agriculture would give to him, were the example in view.

In this, as in all countries, we have a predisposition to adopt the manners and customs of our forefathers; and here, as elsewhere, it may be difficult to overcome that attachment for ancient usages; a feeling which doubtless originates from motives most praiseworthy, but every where admits of any proposed change by slow degrees.

The great improvements made in agriculture, by the perseverance of many individuals in the mother country, and the benefits derived therefrom, become so obvious, that progressive improvement followed generally, and agriculture throughout Great Britain appears to have attained the height of perfection.

In Canada we have many difficulties to contend with; yet to counterbalance these, in some degree, nature has most bountifully granted to her advantages beyond that of many other countries; within itself this District possesses a variety of natural manures, which, if judiciously applied, would produce the best effects, and the rapidity of the vegetation, would compensate for the shortness of the season.

The clearing of land of the noxious weeds that overrun the country, should be the farmer's first consideration; that neglected, little could be derived from the utmost exertion of his labours otherwise: the ground can only produce a certain quantity of vegetable matter, and should that be suffered to run up in weeds, his crop of wheat or other grain would, in the same proportion prove unproductive in quantity, and in quality of the most inferior kind.

Considerations of this nature, induced some Gentlemen in this City, who strongly feel a desire to promote the best interests of the Province, amongst which agriculture most certainly ranks high, to believe that a better knowledge of this science might possibly be introduced through the joint efforts of its friends; a Meeting of the Citizens was in consequence called, for the purpose of taking into consideration the expediency of an establishment for the furtherance of the object in view, which was numerously attended, and the proposal unanimously adopted; a Committee was also then appointed to draw up appropriate Resolutions and Regulations, for the formation and future government of the "QUEBEC AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY:" these Resolutions were prepared and adopted at a second General Meeting held on the 12th day of April last.

At that Meeting it was unanimously resolved, "That His Excellency Sir JOHN COPE SHERBROOKE, be solicited to honor the Society with his patronage;" to which His Excellency has since been pleased to signify his assent in the most condescending terms, expressing, at the same time, his strong desire to promote, by every means in his power, the improvement of agriculture throughout the Province.

The Members of this Society do not pretend to a perfect knowledge of the science they have at heart;

to promote, so as to render them competent to instruct the farmer in all its branches; some few, and but a few of their Members, understand the practical and theoretical parts of agriculture; the generality of the Members have yet both to learn; but a strenuous desire to gain information, and the united researches and endeavours of the Society, it is hoped may enable them, from time to time, to disseminate such useful information to their fellow countrymen, as may lead, by degrees, to a better management of lands than is now practised in this District; the Society therefore solicits the favour from all persons throughout the Province, of any communication which may tend to that end.

The principal objects that the Society has in view, are to communicate by example, as far as in their power, improved systems of farming, best adapted to the different descriptions of soil, exposure, and local situation.

To form, for the use of the husbandman, a Library of suitable Books, and a collection of models of the most approved implements of husbandry.

To encourage, by premiums, as soon as a fund for that purpose may be provided, the adoption of such measures as may be recommended by the Society, for general improvement in the science; also for excellence in any branch that may tend thereto; and by every possible means in the power of the Society to better the condition of the industrious Canadian Farmer.

QUEBEC, JUNE 3, 1817.

The variation in European dates, since our last, is very considerable. All was quiet at the latest dates, both in the United Kingdom and in France. Trusting that the extraordinary powers with which the British Government is invested by the suspension of the Habeas Corpus Act, and the other late Acts for keeping down the spirit of sedition, will be exercised with moderation, we feel better reconciled to the temporary suspension of that great bulwark of British liberty, for such we must ever conceive the Habeas Corpus Act to be. Fervently do we deprecate any future necessity for following the precedent so lately furnished by the British Parliament. That there were evil disposed persons, the malignity of whose dispositions it became requisite to check, none will be disposed to deny; the only question is, whether that evil disposition was sufficiently formidable to render extraordinary powers necessary: or, whether the laws, aided by a numerous standing army, without any such additional strength given to the Crown, were not, if properly enforced, of sufficient efficacy to subdue the demon of mischief, and fully to arrest his progress. If the country was in such imminent danger as to render any thing like a dictatorial power absolutely requisite, for Government not to have vested themselves with the proper power, when they possessed the means, would have subjected them to a charge of voluntary imbecility: of suffering themselves to be subdued, and the country involved in trouble, with their eyes open to the coming storm. It has been said of Bonaparte, that fifteen thousand men were requisite to carry a certain post, or subvert a given number of the enemy, he would put the question beyond all hazard, by ordering twenty thousand on the expedition. For thus employing the certain means of success, will any be disposed to dispute his generalship? Has he not, on the contrary, been lauded as a demi-god for it? Shall not then, will say the ministerialist, a British ministry be equally entitled to applause, when, to the ordinary power of the laws, they added the extraordinary power of a dictatorship, effectually to carry their point? The charge brought against them is, that in so doing they consulted only their ease, at the expense of the Constitution: that, like Alexander, they cut the knot they could not untie; and thus established a dangerous precedent to be followed in every case of difficulty, whether of magnitude or insignificance. In like manner we will cut short the question, by observing, that if the extraordinary power was not necessary, the fault was in Parliament for investing them with it. True, will the Reformer say, and that is one of the great reasons that necessitates a reform in Parliament: because, as things are, the Parliament and the Ministry are but one and the same body. But we would ask how the business of the nation is to be carried on; if the Ministry have not a certain weight in Parliament; and having that weight how any modification of the House of Commons would make things better? Let them have then the requisite weight; but let opposit on also have its weight. The British Constitution is formed of checks and balances; and we do not wish to see the day when opposit on shall cease to exist. It has its use, and we trust will ever be supported, to a certain extent.
