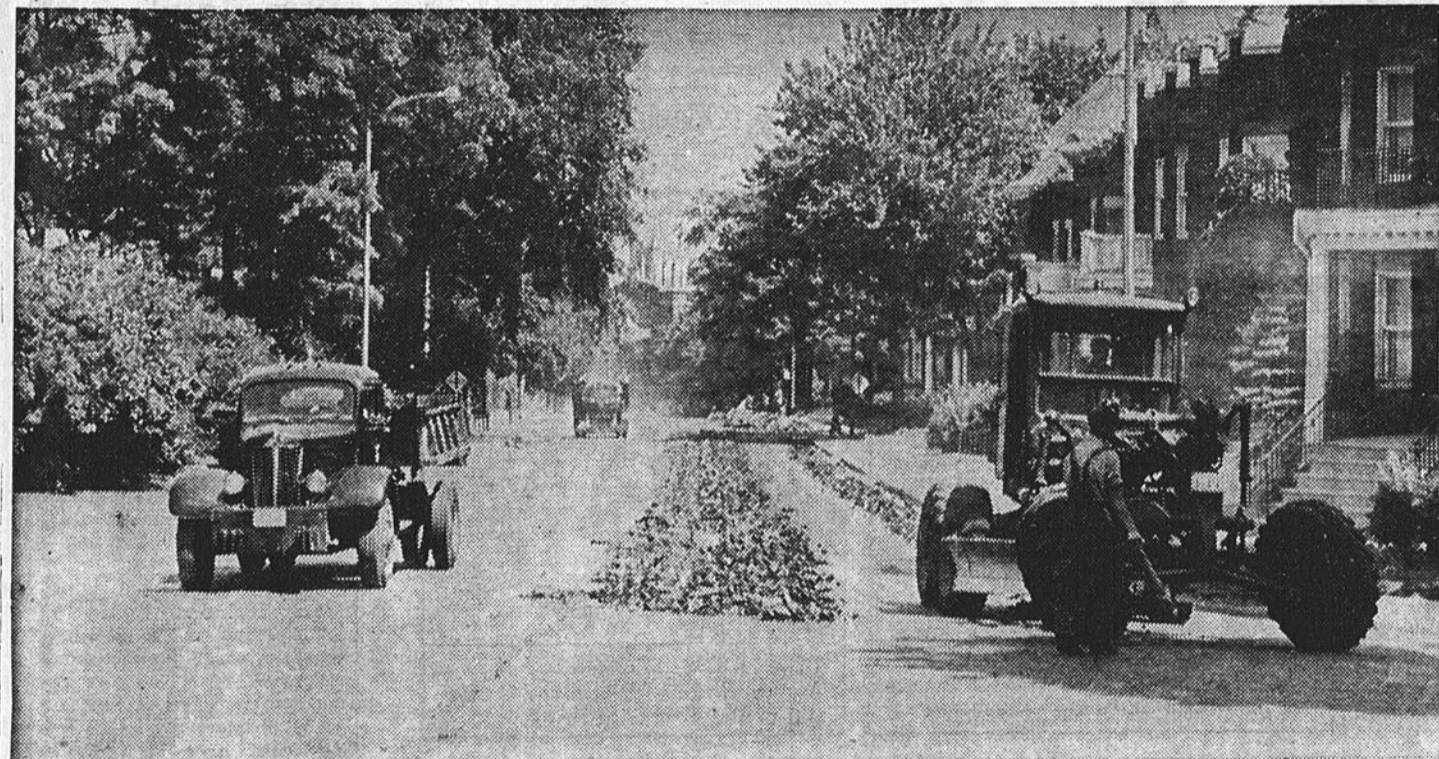

Teenage Girl Suffers Injury In Bike-Auto Smash

Probing Begins For Foundation Of Big Project

One of the few remaining open tracts of land in Westmount will soon be the site of an apartment project. The area, opposite the Athletic Grounds, bounded by St. Catherine street, Western, Redfern and Clarke avenues is now being "drilled" by a company of foundation investigators.

A company official said today that bore-holes will be made in three locations on the lot in order to classify the condition of the sub soil. Among other things the tests will determine the density and water content of the soil which have an important bearing on the type of structure best suited for the land.

The depth of the drilling varies and in this particular case it will reach an approximate depth of 40 feet he said.

Real Estate Sales Top Million Mark Here During May

The value of real estate sales in the city topped \$1 million during the month of May according to figures released this week by the Montreal Real Estate Board.

Statistics show that 37 transactions were recorded here for a value of \$1,048,214. Saint Laurent led all suburban municipalities with \$2,813,184.

Overall totals in all municipalities for the month showed an increase over May, 1955. This year 1,006 sales were recorded worth \$18,645,769 compared to \$17,594,162 on 1,156 sales last year.

For the January to May period, Westmount showed 134 sales worth \$4,070,215 with Saint Laurent again leading during this period with \$11,730,662.

Overall totals for all municipalities during the five months showed 4,784 sales recorded with a value of \$81,476,581 which is an increase over the corresponding period in 1955 when the figures were \$64,380,441 and 4,224.

College Professor Defends Today's Young Generations

A veteran professor of education came strongly to the defence of young, modern generations Thursday in a talk before members of the Montreal Westward Rotary Club at their weekly luncheon meeting.

Scoring the frequent charges levelled at today's youth, Professor John Hughes said "they are grand material and if given the chance will become citizens of whom this great country of ours will be proud."

The speaker expressed annoyance at the oft-repeated charge "the young people are going to the dogs." This complaint, he said, has been heard down through every generation but was not true "because if it were the world would have gone to the dogs years ago."

Professor Hughes, retired from McGill University and now on the staff of Sir George Williams

College, however, emphasized that the responsibility of giving the young people a chance rests on the shoulders of parents and teachers.

"The greatest need of Canada today," he said, "is for first class teachers and first class parents . . . We have a duty to God to bring up our children in a climate

of high principled business ethics . . . otherwise there is the danger of miss-educating our youth."

Branching out into a wider theme on the question of teaching, Professor Hughes called everyone a teacher. "We all learn from everyone . . . all life is an education to the very end and once a person closes his mind to

further learning he is, in fact, dead."

The speaker was introduced by Aubrey Legge and thanked by President Eric Denman who presided at the meeting.

Seeking a new route to the Arctic, he left Chipewyan in June, 1789. At Whale Islands his guide faired. Mackenzie turned home.



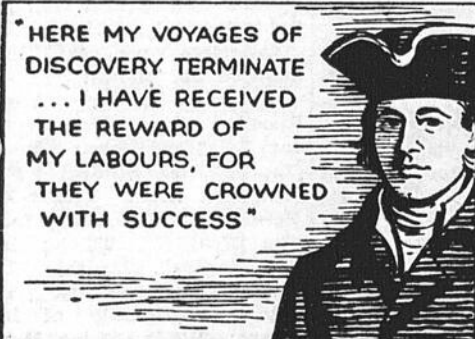

TCA Traffic Volume At Record Peak For 6-Month Period

The heaviest volume of traffic in the history of Trans-Canada Air Lines was reported for the first six months of this year. All phases of traffic — passengers, freight, express and mail — showed substantial increases.

From January 1 to June 30 this year, a total of 966,135 passengers were carried on scheduled services, a 29 per cent increase over last year and more than the number of passengers carried for the whole of 1950. It is estimated that some 2,000,000 passengers will have flown on TCA aircraft by the end of the year.

Almost 10,000,000 pounds of air freight were carried and 5,498,200 ton miles flown for an increase of 19 per cent over the first half of 1955. More than 3,000,000 pounds of air express were carried, an increase of 11 per cent over last year's first six months period. Mail ton miles increased 14 per cent.

With the introduction in service of three more propeller-turbine Viscounts and two more Super Constellations, TCA was able to substantially provide more accommodation in the first half of the year.

Westmount Student Second In School Leaving Exams

A Westmount High School student ranked second on the list of 1,746 successful candidates in the Protestant high school leaving examinations released this week.

James W. Boake obtained an average of 94.2 which followed closely the 94.4 gained by leader, Melvin Silverman of Strathcona. Three other Westmount students obtained averages which placed them among the first 26 candidates from across the province.

They were: Mary Jane Long, 91; Michael Braza, 90.8; and Peter Haley, 90.6.

A total of 2,765 candidates were registered for the examinations. Of these 2,305 wrote the complete examination; the others wrote partial or supplementary examinations.

This is the largest number ever written for Quebec's Protestant high schools, exceeding 1955 by 70 and 1954 by 271.

Of the 2,305 students writing the complete examination, 1,746 or 75.7 per cent passed. This proportion is practically the same as it has been for the past five years.

North American literature and chemistry led the list of subjects failed. More than one candidate out of five failed these. There were the least number of failures — 8.8 per cent — in oral French.

To obtain high school leaving certificates candidates must pass in English literature and composition, oral and written French, and at least four other subjects from a lengthy list of options.

When students write on more than six optional subjects the six highest marks are taken with the compulsory subjects of English and French to make up a maximum of 1,000 marks.

Candidates who received certificates by means of supplemental examinations are not included.

Supplemental examinations will be held beginning on August 24 at the High School of Montreal, 3457 University St.

UTOPIA II

Suppose it were possible to develop a new race of men with greater brain power as it is possible to produce new breeds of cattle with more beef or more milk. Then would arise the old question which goes back to the days of Plato's Republic — Who will govern the governors? Is the whole of mankind to be endowed with greater brain power or is it to be confined to the chosen — or self chosen — few, who will govern the rest of us? And will they be men of the character of Abraham Lincoln or Adolph Hitler? I am very glad to fall back on the statement of Charles Darwin the younger, that no such thing is possible, that you cannot deal with man as you can deal with an ox, for man is a wild animal who cannot be brought under that kind of control.

Perhaps the columnist did not mean what he said and that when he referred to brain power he meant wisdom. If he is a thorough-going materialist they would probably mean the same thing to him. But actually brain power and wisdom are not the same thing at all. There are men of very considerable brain power who are clever but far from wise. We say they are too clever for their own good, and certainly too clever for ours. Then there are men of average ability to whom the community resorts not because they are clever, but because they are wise and understanding. Fortunately you find them in every community. Such wisdom is marked by respect for one's neighbour; in fact, by respect for human nature. I cannot claim that this is confined to the Christian point of view. It will be found in every religious tradition and where there is no religious connection at all. You note it in Kipling's Red Llama

in Kim; you see it in Tolkien's great myth of the Hobbit. You will find it in all the stories of chivalry, and in all these fictional narratives we recognize it as valid because we know it in life. Isocrates the Athenian philosopher summed it up in one sentence without any reference to religion: "Philosophy makes us kind." Philosophy was not greater brain power but an ability, or at least an attempt, to see the wholeness of things and not simply the part in which one is particularly interested.

Perhaps the most blatant assumption of the columnist is that man can shape his own destiny. He is up against his natural environment and also his human environment; but there is another environment — the divine — which enfolds him completely. And he has another handicap. That is sin, his own and his fellows'. Man is not in a universe as it came to him from the hand of the Creator, but in a universe which he has corrupted through his own folly. In other words, it is not a greater brain power that man wants to live in a new and over-populated world — it is a personality renewed by the Holy Spirit, because, as H.E. Wells admitted, man has come to the end of his tether, and he must seek renewal or perish.

The months since Princess Margaret made the dramatic announcement, "I would like it to be known that I have decided not to marry Group Captain Peter Townsend," have been the loneliest and least glamorous she has known, reports the Ladies' Home Journal's London correspondent in the August issue. Her daily routine has been very much the same in these monotonous months since Captain Townsend was sent away. The Princess is at her desk at Clarence House at 9.30 each morning, going over necessary correspondence with Iris Peake, her lady in waiting, and with Lt. Col. Martin Gilliat, the Queen Mother's secretary. Her afternoons are usually taken up with official functions, she may launch a Cunard liner, standing in a driving rain; visit the Atomic Energy Authority's radiochemical center; or inspect new housing projects and factories.

Cliff Bowles will start the first game, with Sonny and Gordie Smith in reserve. The rotation afterwards will depend on the outcome of the opener.

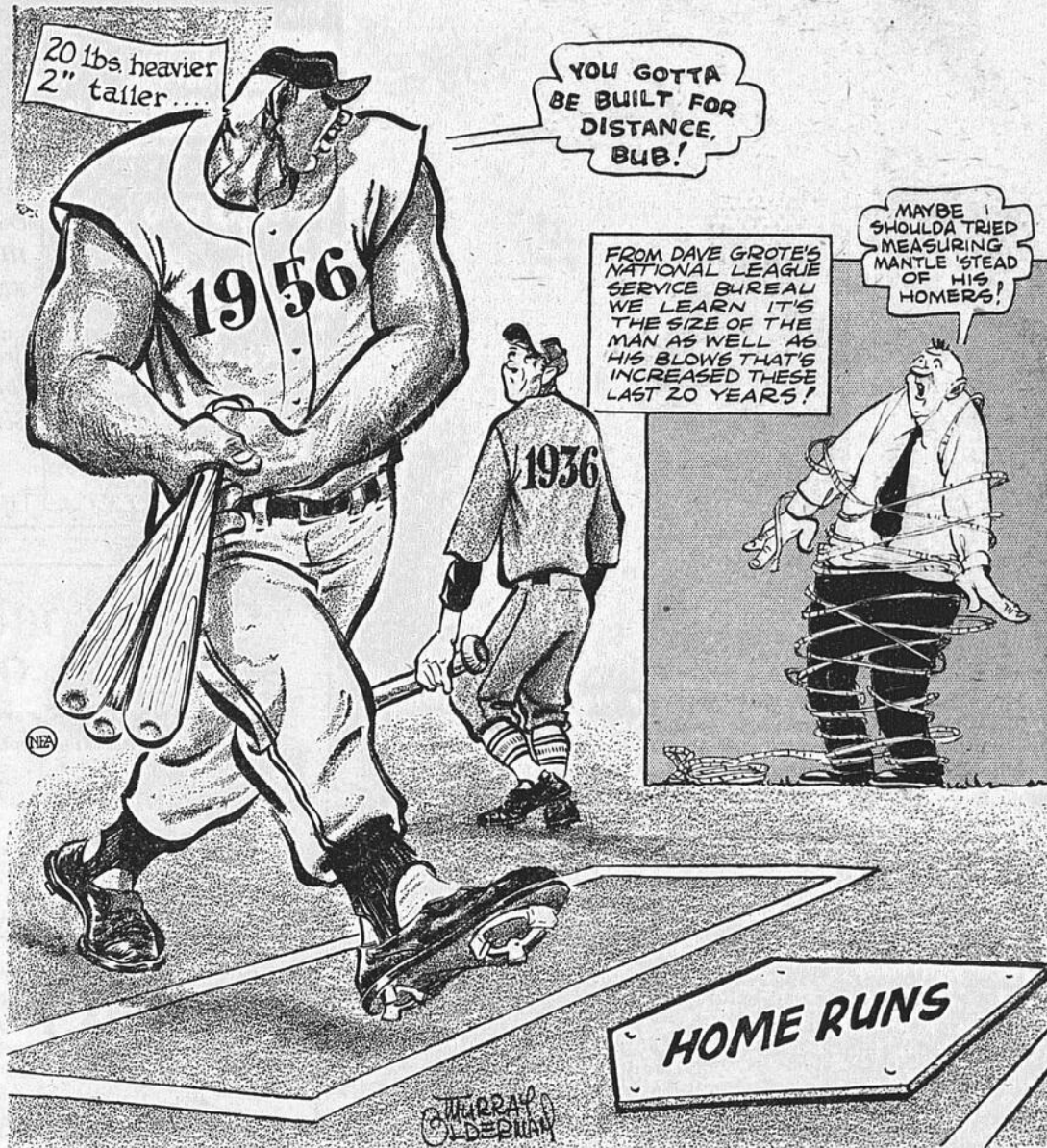
In the semifinals opener, Yves Valois tossed the seven innings for Prudential while Red Davis went the distance for Mitchell.
