IS QUESTION OF PRINCIPLE.

Eastern Townships And Quebec Cabinet.

COUNTY COUNCILS THROUGHOUT TOWNSHIPS PASS RESOLUTIONS TO BE FORWARDED TO THE PREMIER.

The right of the Eastern Townships to an important portfolio in the Quebec Cabinet is being vigorously asserted at just now. Hon. Mr. Weir is about to retire. The question of his successor is already under consideration. In the Eastern Townships the question is regarded as one of principle rather than of party. Strongly worded resolutions from representative bodies are being forwarded to the Premier, earnestly praying his consideration of the claims of the Eastern Townships and pointing out that for half a century, almost continuously, an Eastern Townships representative has held an important portfolio of the Quebec Cabinet, generally that of provincial treasurer.

On Monday evening, as already reported, the Eastern Townships Councils passed resolutions to be forwarded to the Premier.

At a meeting of the Eastern Townships Councils, held at Sherbrooke, the following resolutions were passed:

COUNTY COUNCIL PAY.
Yesterday was county council day throughout the Eastern Townships. As a result Premier Gouin will receive in his mail this week half a dozen or more formal resolutions, respectfully calling upon him to select Mr. Weir's successor, the next provincial treasurer, from among the Eastern Townships representatives.

Sherbrooke County Council, as reported elsewhere, passed a strong resolution in this connection. Reports from other counties follow:

NEW TREASURER FROM E. T.
Knowlton, Dec. 10.—(Special)—The County Council met here yesterday. Among the business transacted was the adoption of a strong resolution addressed to the Premier asking that the next provincial treasurer be chosen from among Eastern Townships representatives. The Bromfield County Council passed another resolution of like interest, namely, to establish a "radio board" system throughout the county. These joint boards will be held at road junctions as an assistance to travellers.

STANSTEAD COUNTY UNANIMOUS.
Stanstead, Dec. 10.—(Special)—The County Council met yesterday at Ave's Cliff. A resolution was unanimously passed asking the Premier to select the successor to Hon. Mr. Weir from among the Eastern Townships representatives at Quebec.

SHEFFORD COUNTY COUNCIL'S RESOLUTION.
Waterloo, Dec. 10.—(Special)—Twenty of the 19 members were present at the County Council meeting yesterday.

The question of the Quebec Cabinet was taken up and a copy of the Daily Record containing the resolutions passed by the Sherbrooke County Council was produced. This met the views of the Shefford County Councilors, and it was unanimously adopted. The resolution was moved by Councillor Lagasse and seconded by Councillor Leclair.

Considerable time was taken up with a discussion of a watercourse question in which Granby and St. Alphonse are interested. The petition was rejected.

MISSISSQUOI PASSES RESOLUTION.
Bellevue, Dec. 10.—(Special)—The regular meeting of the Missisquoi County Council was held yesterday afternoon. Warden J. Demers presided. There were present Messrs. McPhee, Baker, Rochelandt, Prevost and Young. A resolution was passed asking that the appointment of Provincial Treasurer, which office will soon be vacated, be given to an Eastern Townships representative.

PREVOST-KELLY INVESTIGATION.

Commission Adjourned For Want of Quorum.

HON. W. A. WEIR HELD THAT THEY COULD NOT PROCEED, OWING TO WITHDRAWAL OF A MEMBER OF THE COMMISSION.

Quebec, Dec. 10.—(Special)—After sitting since early last summer the Prevost-Kelly commission yesterday afternoon adjourned, sine die without reaching any conclusion.

When the Commission met Messrs. Blouin, Patenaude, Tessier and Lavergne were present. The Hon. W. A. Weir was absent on account of illness.

The Hon. L. R. Roy has since been elevated to the Bench, leaving but five members of the original six.

Hon. W. A. Weir, writing as president of the Commission, stated that owing to Mr. Roy's removal from the Commission, they were unable to proceed as witnesses could claim that Commission was not legal as it was not the same when constituted.

This brought on a heated debate during which it was claimed that Hon. W. A. Weir not being present, could not cast a vote.

This brought a declaration from Mr. Blouin that he would not attend the committee and thus make no quorum. The committee then adjourned sine die.

DREDGE WENT DOWN; SIX MEN DROWNED.

Holes Caused by Ice Cause of Vessel Sinking.

MEN WHO WENT AFTER POSSESSIONS LOST THEIR LIVES.

Port Arthur, Ont., Dec. 10.—(Special)—By the sinking of Dredge No. 8, owned by the Great Lakes Dredging Company, near Mutton Island, in Thunder Bay, last night, six men lost their lives.

They were John Fradenburg, whose home is in the United States; Peter McDonald, watchman, Port Arthur; J. Phalen, fireman, Port Arthur; John Wilson, cook, Sarnia; Cameron, deck hand, Port Arthur, and A. Smith, second cook.

The disaster was caused by the ice cutting holes in the hull of the dredge while the craft was being towed into Port Arthur.

Eight of the fourteen men on board were able to jump on the scow alongside but others, who endeavored to save some of their possessions after the dredge started to sink were unable to get on board the scow.

The dredge was in tow of tug Inez and sank so quickly that the tow line had to be chopped with an axe to prevent the tug from being hauled down.

EIGHT HOUR DAY BILL BEFORE HOUSE.

Was Referred to A Special Committee to Report On.

WITNESSES WILL BE HEARD UNDER OATH ON THE MATTER.

Ottawa, December 10.—Mr. Verville in the House of Commons yesterday pressed the second reading of his bill calling for an eight-hour day on public works. After four hour's talk it was referred to a special committee of seven members, with power to call witnesses and take evidence under oath and report to the House this session.

TWO MEN ARRESTED ON SUSPICION.

One is Said to Have Confessed to Cookshire Robberies.

GOODS RECOVERED—HAS BEEN IDENTIFIED BY MERCHANT.

Two men named Bisson and Belanger were arrested last evening in the lumber camp of Mr. W. Gates, near Cookshire, charged with having been implicated in recent robberies in Cookshire. They were brought to Sherbrooke jail this morning, and will come up before Judge Mulvena tomorrow.

A quantity of stolen goods was found on them.

Belanger who is quite a young man is said to have made a confession and as a result the gold watch stolen from Mr. Gauthier's house a few weeks ago was found hidden under the Cook bridge. The gold chain was sent to Montreal he said, along with other stuff, and disposed of there.

Some of the goods stolen were identified as having been stolen from the stores of Mr. McRae, Mr. Clement and also belonging to Mr. Gauthier.

Some of the goods could not be identified and it is believed they belong to Mr. Darche of Ascot Corner whose store was broken into a few months ago.

Belanger said that he did the watching while his companion Bisson who is about 50 years of age entered the buildings.

A special meeting of the shareholders of the Eastern Townships Agricultural Association was held at their offices at four o'clock yesterday afternoon.

Mr. Wm. Morris, the newly elected president, occupied the chair. The following shareholders were present: J. A. Cochrane, W. R. Webster, S. L. Clough, J. H. Bryant, G. A. LeBaron, Sherbrooke; Dr. E. The first business before the meeting was to act on the report of the committee appointed to suggest names.

Mr. J. P. Royer, Sherbrooke, one of the new directors of the E. T. A. A. was elected.

After some discussion it was resolved that the board of directors, if they deem it wise, be empowered to appoint at least ten commissioners from the various parts of the townships.

DANISH SCIENTISTS ARE AMAZED.

Inclined to be Incredulous Regarding Charges Against Dr. Cook.

SOME THINK THEY WILL STRENGTHEN CONFIDENCE OF THE PUBLIC.

Copenhagen, December 10.—A summary of the affidavits of persons claiming to have aided Dr. Cook in the preparation of his polar data, published in London and New York, yesterday, was read here with amazement. Scientific circles are inclined to be incredulous regarding the charges, and some persons, like Dr. Carl Braun, the astronomer, consider them so improbable that their effect will be to strengthen confidence in Dr. Cook.

HUNTING GROUNDS OF THE TOWNSHIPS.

TRAPPERS ARE GETTING HIGH PRICES FOR MINK AND FOX SKINS.

The Eastern Townships are not the happy hunting grounds they once were, and yet the local Nimrods and trappers are meeting with considerable success. Success in trapping fur-bearing animals means money nowadays.

Local buyers are paying \$8 for mink skins, \$6 for foxes, \$1.25 to \$1.50 for skunks, and 45c to 50c for muskrats.

Young trappers from the surrounding district have already brought in quite a quantity of skins, especially of foxes. Buyers have been through the country parts picking up all they can secure.

With the present high price of furs, mink and foxes will have a hard fight for life.

LAKE MEGANTIC.

The first real sleighing of the season at Lake Megantic was on Wednesday, Dec. 8, after a southeast snow storm on Tuesday night, when about eight inches of snow fell, making good roads.

BUSINESS BLOCK WIPED OUT BY FIRE.

Winnipeg Firemen Worked With Thermometer at 34 Below.

LOSS PLACED AT \$177,000 WITH ONLY \$90,000 OF INSURANCE.

Winnipeg, Man., Dec. 10.—(Special)—Working under great difficulties and with the thermometer registering 34 below zero, the firemen put up a hard fight last night at a fire which wiped out the Sterling building and which did damage to the extent of \$177,000.

As a result of the severe weather, several firemen were badly frost-bitten and it was with great courage and perseverance that they managed to keep the fire from spreading to the adjoining buildings.

Firms who lost heavily are: Messrs. W. B. Sterling & Company, \$130,000; Messrs. Barthele, Shevan & Co., \$12,000; Lewis Furniture Co., \$20,000; and Messrs. Smith & Bruce, \$15,000.

The insurance carried by the different firms is as follows: Sterling & Co., \$85,000; Messrs. Barthele, Shevan & Co., \$5,500; Lewis Furniture Co., \$8,000; Smith & Bruce, \$11,000, making total insurance of \$99,500, against loss of \$177,000.

The Quebec Fire Insurance Company carried \$1,000 on Sterling and \$2,500 on building.

COULD NOT FACE WARRANT FOR ARREST.

Cashier, Short in His Accounts, Took His Own Life.

CASHIER SAID TO BE SHORT \$2,000 IN HIS ACCOUNTS.

St. John, N.B., Dec. 10.—Henry F. Heenan, 44 years of age, employed as cashier in the Dominion Fire Insurance Company's office here, drank carbolic acid yesterday afternoon and died after being admitted to the hospital.

Heenan was \$2,000 short in his accounts, and a warrant had been issued for his arrest. Sooner than face a criminal prosecution he committed suicide. He leaves a widow and six children. He was prominent in musical circles, being director of the City Cornet Band and of several local orchestras.

SUIT ENTERED AGAINST INSURANCE COMPANY.

Mr. G. A. LeBaron Claims \$4,000 in Connection With Glen Villa Inn Fire.

ACTIONS FOR DAMAGES TAKEN AGAINST AN ASBESTOS COMPANY.

Mr. G. A. LeBaron has, through Messrs. Cate, Wells & White, entered an action in the Superior Court against the Anglo-American Fire Insurance Company for \$4,000.

Mr. LeBaron carried a policy for the same amount with the Company last year on Glen Villa Inn, North Hatley, and he claims to have made an application and to have been notified that the application was accepted and that the policy would be sent in due course. This was about two weeks before the Glen Villa Inn was destroyed by fire at the beginning of the summer. Mr. LeBaron claims that he heard nothing further until after the fire when the company declared they had no insurance on the property.

Two actions have been entered in the Superior Court against the Asbestos and Asbestic Company, of Asbestos. Mr. Octave Stahlot, laborer, is suing for \$3,500 and Mr. B. Gevais for \$2,000 for damages.

ENGINEER KILLED AT NEWPORT, VT.

Was Struck by Switch Engine and Mangled Under the Wheels.

JAS. A. JOHNSON WAS ONE OF BEST KNOWN ENGINEERS ON THE C.P.R.

Montreal, Dec. 10.—(Special)—James A. Johnson, a C.P.R. locomotive engineer, residing on Sussex avenue in this city, was killed at Newport, Vt., this morning. He was one of the best known engineers on the road. The accident which resulted fatally took place while he was standing near his locomotive, waiting to bring the Boston express into Montreal.

He did not see the switch engine approaching, and he was mangled under its wheels.

TWO DROWNED; THIRTEEN MISSING.

STEAMER CLARION DESTROYED BY FIRE ON LAKE ERIE.

Cleveland, O., December 10.—Two men lost their lives and the fate of thirteen others is unknown as a result of the burning of the steamer Clarion, near Point Pelee, in Lake Erie, early yesterday.

AUKLAND TOWNSHIP WILL NOT BE DIVIDED.

Compton County Council Rejects The Petition.

MATTER WAS DISCUSSED AT LENGTH AT MEETING HELD AT COOKSHIRE YESTERDAY.

Cookshire, Dec. 10.—(Special)—The county council met here yesterday and the principal feature of the meeting was a lengthy discussion on the petition for a new municipality or parish, composed of parts of the townships of Auckland and Clifton.

This was strongly opposed by the townships affected, especially by Auckland.

After an all day discussion the petition for a new parish municipality was rejected.

A resolution in connection with the Quebec cabinet vacancy was to have come up, but owing to the lengthy discussion on the above matter was overlooked.

MORE RIOTING AT GLACE BAY.

Workman Fired Upon and Seriously Injured.

STRIKING MINERS THREATENED THOSE WHO WENT TO WORK.

Glace Bay, N.S., Dec. 10.—Angus McLean, driving home last night from Glace Bay to McKay's Corner, was fired upon from the side of the road and seriously injured.

There was a disturbance at the Dominion colliery yesterday morning when about three hundred striking miners gathered about the mines and threatened the men who went to work. The Coal Company and town police prevented serious disorder. Four arrests were made, two of them at Dominion No. 2 and one at No. 1.

Dancing was enjoyed for several hours. Sandwiches, cake and coffee were served during the evening.

The party was first entertained at lunch at the Battles House. Mr. C. B. Gordon, president of the company, and Mr. L. A. Audet, Mayor of Magog, expressed a few words of welcome. The Mayor remarked that since the establishment of the Mills here, Magog has grown from a population of 250 to 3500.

After lunch the party proceeded to the mills where all departments were visited. It was stated that the mills now give employment to over 1000 hands.

The party returned to Montreal, on the afternoon train highly delighted with their visit.

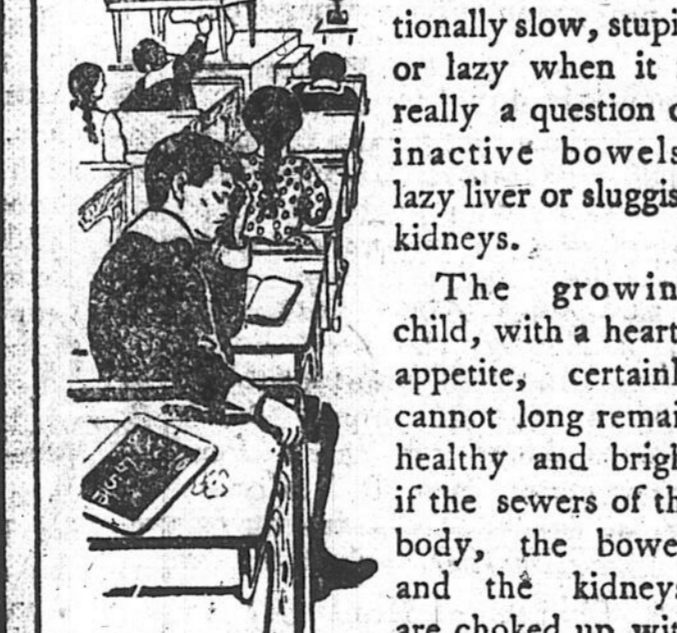

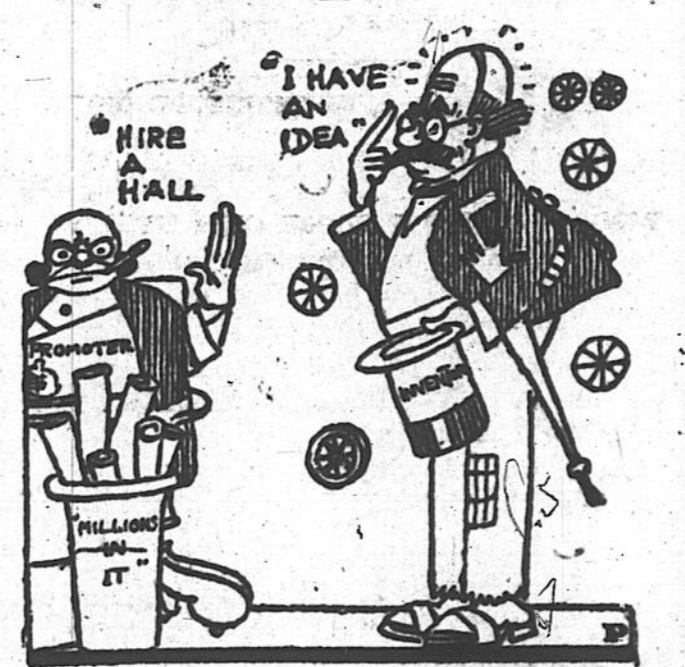
E. T. BANK WILL BUILD IN SUTTON.
