

Like a bomb
May cut
defense
spending

OTTAWA — (CP) — The government may try to reduce defence spending further by manpower cuts in the armed forces and civilian staff of the defence department.

Reliable sources said Tuesday the government, possibly over the objections of Defence Minister Pearkes, has ordered the defence department to survey the effects of manpower reductions ranging from five to 20 per cent.

There now are about 168,500 employees of the defence department — 118,000 servicemen and 48,500 civilians—who are paid a total of some \$860,000,000 annually.

A five-per-cent manpower cut in the department would top about 8,500 from the payroll. Any cut likely would fall more heavily on administrative staffs than on combat forces.

LIKE A BOMB

The government order to conduct the survey fell like a bomb among defence planners. They have held that the armed forces need more instead of fewer men to carry out the services assigned jobs.

For instance, officers have said the army has only about one-quarter of the soldiers it needs to carry out its civil defence role properly.

The RCAF soon will have to find about 1,500 more personnel to man seven new heavy radar stations.

The navy has already had to put warships into mothballs to provide the manpower for new vessels coming from the shipyards.

Mr. Pearkes is said to be opposed to any manpower reductions in the armed forces though he has been able to cut his civilian staff by about 5,000 in the last three years, including 1,500 this year.

He said in reply to a question by Harold Winch, CCF MP for Vancouver East, in the Commons defence committee last week:

"My own firm conviction is that to cut down the Canadian Army as you suggest would not provide the degree of security that this country should expect in the event of nuclear attack." The army has about 48,000 personnel, the RCAF 51,000 and the navy 20,000.

The government cut the defence budget this year to \$1,586,000,000 from \$1,685,000,000 in 1959-60, a drop of \$99,000,000.

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Washington party-giver Perle Mesta had a go at out-Hollywooding Hollywood Tuesday with a gin and eggs brunch that drew 7,500 Democratic convention-goers.

In the four-hour crush at the famed Coconut Grove nightclub hungry guests gobbled up 1,100 dozen eggs, 650 pounds of bacon and sausage and 275 gallons of chicken à la king.

They emptied 22 cases of gin in screwdrivers, silver fizzes and bloody marys and drank up 700 gallons of coffee.

The party, which was a Lyndon Johnson-for-president shindig, cost more than \$10,000, a Coconut Grove spokesman said.

Four remain aboard

OTTAWA — (CP) — Five of nine stranded yachtsmen including the lone woman were rescued today by a jet-powered boat from the Ottawa River's boiling Deschenes Rapids where they had spent a long night aboard two sailboats.

The shallow-draft jet craft made two trips into the quarter-mile-long chute of rock and water seven miles west of Parliament Hill. All the rescued were in good condition and spirits.

The remaining four persons — two on each sailboat — were staying aboard until tugs come to their aid later today.

A third attempt was scheduled to take the two men from the sloop Talisman halfway down the rapids. The anchor cables would be severed and the boat allowed to ride through by itself.

Sharply-worded note

Charge US bomber 'wantonly destroyed'

WASHINGTON — (CP) — The United States has charged that Soviet airplanes "wantonly" destroyed a U.S. RB-47 reconnaissance bomber over international waters in the Arctic July 1.

A sharply-worded note to the Kremlin Tuesday warned of "most serious consequences" in the event of any repetition of the act.

The note also demanded release of two officers who survived the Soviet Air Force attack. Washington officials held little hope of accomplishing this, however. They said they expect the two to be tried on espionage charges.

The U.S. note rejected Soviet charges that the aircraft was on a spy mission similar to that of the U-2 high altitude jet shot down in central Russia May 1. The RB-47 was never closer than 30 miles to the Soviet coast, the note declared.

"It is therefore evident that pursuant to instructions of the government airplanes of the Soviet Air Force wantonly attacked the American airplane over international waters with the admitted loss of that aircraft and the life of at least one of the members of its crew."

"Two other members of the crew have, according to the Soviet note, been taken into custody without any legal basis and are to be subjected to trial under what is called 'full severity of Soviet law.' The three other members of the crew remain unaccounted for."

The United States demanded the release of Lieut. John R. McKone, 28, of Tonganoxie, Kan., the navigator, and F. B. Olmstead, 24, of Elmira, N.Y., the co-pilot.

The return of the body of the pilot, which Russia claimed to have recovered from a life raft, was also demanded. He has been identified as Capt. Willard G. Palm, 39, of Oak Ridge, Tenn.

PROTEST DELAYED REPORT

In addition, the United States protested the "cynical failure" of the Soviet government to re-

port the action until Monday. "It should be clear to the Soviet government that a repetition of acts of this nature cannot fail to have the most serious consequences, responsibility for which would rest upon the Soviet government alone."

The note offered to join Russia and perhaps other countries in "a thorough search for the downed airplane and the missing members of its crew and examination of such remains of the aircraft as may be located."

2 Canadians smuggled mink stoles

BRATTLEBORO, Vt. (CP) — Two Canadians were convicted of smuggling and conspiracy by a U.S. district court jury here Tuesday.

Gabriel Blouin and Mrs. Antoinette Roy, both of Coaticook, Que., were convicted of illegally transporting five mink stoles and one mink corsage into the United States from Coaticook Sept. 1, 1959.

Sentence was deferred pending an investigation by a probation officer. The pair were freed on continued bail of \$500 each.

Blouin, a bread truck driver, was apprehended with the furs in his truck at the U.S. customs station at Norton, Vt., officials said.

Mrs. Roy, a fur shop proprietor, was convicted of arranging with Blouin to take the furs into the U.S. during one of his regular bread runs, thus avoiding duty.

Total value of the furs was estimated between \$1,600 and \$1,800. Duty would have been 25 per cent.

Belgian paratroopers seize airport

LEOPOLDVILLE, The Congo — Reuters — Belgian paratroopers seized Leopoldville airport today and began fanning out toward this capital city.

The paratroopers landed at the airport shortly after Belgian officials rejected Congolese demands for withdrawal of all Belgian troops to their bases.

Landing in Belgian Air Force planes, the green-bereeted paratroopers opened fire at Congolese troops molesting whites.

One Congolese soldier was killed and three Belgians, including two women refugees, were wounded. A number of Congolese were taken prisoner.

At noon, the Belgian troops were in full control of the strategic airport, the main entry to the republic capital 20 miles away.

But in Matadi, the Congo's only seaport, 150 miles from Leopoldville, the Congolese forces, who drove off the Belgians Tuesday, were reported still in control.

After today's airport battle, Belgian Gen. Roger Gheysen told a reporter: "The situation of the last few days could not go on. This morning some Congolese began brutalizing some wounded paratroopers flown in to Leopoldville. They attacked the airport first - aid room."

The paratroopers spread over the scorched grassland around

opened fire on rebels stationed on the roof. The airport was reopened two hours after it closed.

The battle came shortly after President Joseph Kasavubu and Premier Patrice Lumumba demanded the withdrawal to their bases of Belgian troops fighting mutinous Congolese soldiers throughout the infant republic.

The demand was rejected by Belgian Ambassador Baron van den Bosch. Kasavubu and Lumumba said they would use their

own armed forces to protect whites in the republic but Belgian officials said they did not consider this assurance "sufficient in the light of latest events."

Will send technicians

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States is reported willing to provide technicians and financial support—but no troops—for any United Nations force sent to put down the mutiny in the Congo.

Top officials outlined the administration attitude in the wake of a White House declaration that countries other than the United States should provide the forces the Congo government has requested to restore order.

President Eisenhower, at his vacation headquarters in Newport, R.I., late Tuesday, turned down the Congo appeal for 3,000

American troops. Eisenhower said via a White House spokesman "it would be better for the Congo" if no troops were sent from "any of the large Western nations" on such an emergency mission.

Authoritative officials said the United States did not propose to stand aloof entirely from any UN action which might be decided upon.

MIGHT SEND PLANES

American planes and ships might be used to rush a UN force to the trouble spots, authorities said. And civilian technicians as well as funds could be allocated to meet other requirements.

Expect first-ballot victory for Kennedy

LOS ANGELES — (CP) — Democrats name their presidential candidate tonight with Senator John F. Kennedy riding a crest his backers believe will give him a first-ballot victory.

The initial voting is expected to be completed around 10 p. m. MDT.

A restive, noisy and generally disorderly convention which exploded with an ovation for Adlai E. Stevenson left the Massachusetts Senator's major opponents clinging to the cliffs of hope that Kennedy's tidal wave will recede quickly if it doesn't engulf them at the start.

But they had only a precarious hand - hold. Kennedy had what were regarded as solid commitments of delegate votes only 18 short of the 761 needed for the nomination. Nobody ever came that close in the past and then lost out.

WANT A WINNER

This, moreover, was a convention thirsty for the wine of November victory. As such it approved Tuesday night a platform that included the toughest civil rights plank the party ever adopted.

Southerners interested in making a record for the home voters tried unsuccessfully to kill this declaration. But not a southern

this was that they didn't want to upset by a bolt whatever chance Senate Democratic leader Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas might have to get the nomination.

Despite Kennedy's formidable lead, campaign strategists for his opponents looked off their determination to place their favorites' names in nomination.

Sam Rayburn of Texas, Speaker of the House of Representatives, said he will offer Johnson's name with confidence the Senate Democratic leader will win out in the end.

Signs of a crack in the Kennedy armor showed up Tuesday night as the California delegation, which Governor Edmund Brown predicted would give most of its 81 votes to Kennedy, decided to provide its main support for Stevenson.

California said it will give Stevenson 31½ votes and 30½ to Kennedy. Kennedy had hoped to get about 50 from California. The big Pennsylvania delega-

tion which promised to give Kennedy 66 of its 81 votes indicated it will have another look at its decisions if Kennedy doesn't carry the convention on the first ballot.

The convention got its first taste of the excitement delegates and spectators craved when Stevenson, twice the party nominee, paid an unannounced visit to the floor Tuesday night.

Surrounded by admirers as he reached the outer gates of the convention area, the former Illinois governor literally had to fight his way to the floor behind a cordon of policemen.

The previously lethargic galleries whooped and cheered as they have had few occasions to

do.

While Stevenson is not an official candidate for the nomination he has said he will accept a draft.

Governor Buford Ellington of Tennessee and Robert G. Baker, secretary of Senate Democrats, contended Johnson had gained substantially in the last - hour maneuvering.

They contended that Kennedy's failure to top Stevenson in a poll of the California delegation demonstrated this discontent. The Johnson forces hope Stevenson and Senator Stuart Symington of Missouri will muster enough votes to keep Kennedy from reaching the 761 mark needed for nomination.

Kill revolt over Negro rights

LOS ANGELES (CP) — The Democrats have crushed a threatened rebel revolt over Negro rights. But it may cost them votes in the 1960 presidential campaign.

Rejecting protests and warnings of its southern delegates, the national convention Tuesday night approved the most powerful plank ever adopted by the Democrats in favor of improving the social status of American Negroes.

Ten southern states failed to smash the plank. They charged

Quebec health heads discuss hospital plan

QUEBEC (CP) — Provincial health authorities are meeting throughout this week with federal health representatives in efforts to establish a hospital insurance plan in Quebec by Jan. 1, 1961 Premier Lesage announced Tuesday.

He told a press conference the committee set up by the Union Nationale administration a few months ago to study hospital insurance has been disbanded.

The committee, he said, was not doing any work directly useful to establishing a hospital insurance plan. Disbanding it would save the province \$1,000,000. Salaries of the committee members and their staff alone amounted to \$250,000 a year.

Meeting with provincial Health Minister Dr. Alphonse Courcier and deputy minister Jean Grogan here this week are Dr. Roger Goyette, Dr. E. A. Lossing and Dr. K. C. Charron, representatives from the health department in Ottawa.

Quebec is the only province which does not participate in the national hospital insurance plan. Mr. Lesage said all possible plans are being studied, including one in which the patient pays nothing and one in which he pays a dollar a day as a deterrent to the abuse of the plan.

Premier Lesage also announced a treasury board has been set up to control the government's spending, similar to the one in Ottawa. It would guard against what he called the abuses of the Union Nationale government spending methods.

The treasury board members are Premier Lesage, also finance minister, Mines Minister Paul Earl, Trade Minister Andre Rousseau and Lands Minister Bona Arseneault.

The board will verify every expenditure of more than \$15,000. Said Mr. Lesage: "One may imagine the spending orgy of the Union Nationale government in connection with the election campaign when one notes a sum of \$15,777,575 spent during the 1959-60 fiscal year remained unpaid until the current fiscal year went into effect."

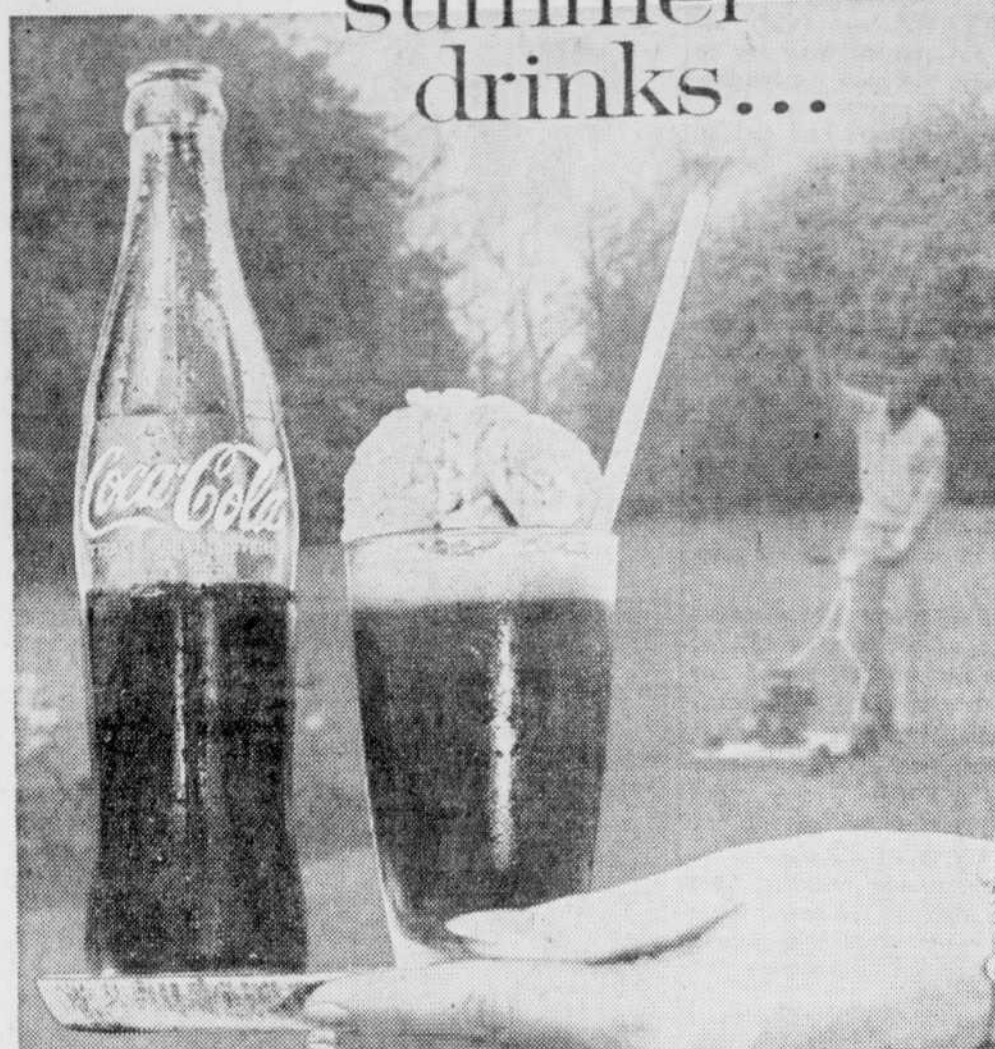

Editor says

Responsible press best guardian against circulation of rumors

A responsible and inquisitive press, far from being a rumor factory, is one of the best protections that we have against rumors, John H. Cranford, editor-in-chief of the Sherbrooke Daily Record, told members of the Sherbrooke Rotary Club at their luncheon meeting yesterday in the Hotel Sherbrooke.

Answering the oft-heard "rumor factory" charge hurled against newspapers, Mr. Cranford said by and large rumors are not considered news by responsible newspapers, but rather news leads, points from which to start in ferretting out true news stories.

He said that newspapers are aware of their vulnerability to rumors and it is a careless editor indeed who will put a rumor into print without making reasonable checks to prove or disprove its authenticity.

The true rumor factory, he contended, was the man in the street — the person who rarely thinks of checking any juicy bit of gossip before passing it on.

"There is something in human nature, it seems, that allows a man or woman to accept information, garble and distort it and then send it packing on its merry way," he said. "Few people feel any obligation to check into the authenticity of what they hear particularly when it is derogatory. And when it concerns someone of whom they are not fond, it is immediately accepted as gospel truth."

While both the newspaper and the man in the street can be held accountable in court for any untruths they may utter, it has proven a lot easier to get a judgment for libel than for slander, according to Mr. Cranford.

Tracking down a rumor is next to impossible, but a newspaper's blunder is preserved in bold print for any subsequent court action, a very practical reason for exercising discretion.

The editor maintained that when a newspaper hears gossip, it can and should pick up its ears and start asking questions, and by doing this it may succeed in picking the chaff from

Souvenir hunter's troubles

Conventional war

We hear a lot of talk these days about conventional war.

If war comes, we are told, it will not be an atomic war but a conventional one fought with conventional weapons.

No one will dare use thermo-nuclear bombs for fear of reprisal.

But just what is a 'conventional war'?

To many North Americans the term no doubt conjures up a picture of 'the boys' going overseas, stories of bombings and hardship in Europe and Asia and the inconveniences of rationing.

Those days, however, are clearly gone forever.

Between wars in the twenties and thirties, people referred with awe to a German war machine — Big Bertha — which reputedly hurled shells on Paris from 75 miles away. By the end of World War II buzz-bombs and rockets were regularly crossing the Channel and striking at London with deadly accuracy.

In any future war missiles fired from around the world can seek out any and all of our great cities.

They may or may not carry nuclear war heads. But we will in no way be able to consider them conventional.

Electoral reform urgent

Evidence arising at the judicial recounts of votes cast in the recent provincial general elections indicates that the new Liberal Government faces an important task in its pledge to cut down electoral abuses in this province.

Judges presiding over the recounts, especially in the Montreal area, were repeatedly told of improperly initiated ballots being found in large numbers in many boxes, of ballot boxes disappearing between the polling station and the headquarters of the returning officer, of goon squads stealing bundles of marked ballots during raids on polls while ballots were being counted and other similar fraudulent practices.

The extent to which these improper practices were carried on indicates they cannot be isolated instances staged by over-zealous supporters of one or other of the contending parties. Rather, they bear out frequently-heard reports that election-stealing organizations can be hired to operate at any level of politics — municipal, provincial or federal.

Bilingualism

Canadians, from coast to coast are becoming more and more interested in bilingualism.

And what's more, many of them are prepared to do something other than talk about it.

In Calgary, Alberta — far from French Canada — parents and their eight-to-twelve-year-old children are to be given an opportunity of learning French to-

gether.
Starting in the Fall, the University of Alberta will conduct an early-evening course in family French during which parent and children can learn and apply phrases having to do with every-day living.

'Liberal policy'

Transform Soviet rural society

By DEREK WILSON

ROME (Reuters)—The Soviet Union is carrying out a "complete transformation" of its rural society aimed at strengthening farmer unity and already marked by important changes in the collective farming system, says the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization here.

A monthly bulletin of agricultural economics of the FAO says that as a result of changes carried out during the last "few years," Soviet agriculture is assuming more and more the pat-

tern of Soviet industry.

The collective farms, or kollektives, once co-operatives which hired machinery from the state, made payments in kind and shared profits among members, are today, the FAO says, increasingly turning into large-scale farmers, similar to the state farms, or sovkhozes, with the original farmers turning into wage-earning laborers.

OLD POLICY SCRAPPED

In favor of the new system, the "liberal policy" adopted in 1953, which encouraged collec-

production on family plots as well as working on the collectives, has been scrapped, the bulletin adds.

From 1956 to 1958, 4,000 to 5,000 collective farms were converted into state farms and while in 1959 collective farms numbered 123,700, in 1959 the number had fallen to 80,000 through amalgamation.

The FAO lists four other changes undergone by the collective farms.

First, in 1958, the farms were able for the first time to buy their own machinery, previously owned by a state organization which did the work for them.

Second, a complicated system of sales of products to the state was replaced by a single selling system with standardized prices.

Third, the state fixed a profit ceiling for collective farmers, profit in excess being diverted into an unfundable capital fund which in 1958 absorbed 23 per cent of their total cash income.

Fourth, the old system by which members of a collective farm shared out profits in cash and kind each year has been jettisoned in favor of fixed cash payments.

CAPITALIST TINGE

(Fort William Times Journal)
Communism in the Soviet Union seems to be taking on a tinge which smacks suspiciously of capitalism. Consider, for example, the Kremlin's recent move to promote a bit of competition among the USSR's state-run enterprises and agencies.

A case in point is the circulation war now being carried on between two of the staunch organs of official Soviet opinion, Pravda and Izvestia. The latter "newspaper," it seems, is out to scoop Pravda by switching from morning to afternoon publishing, thus catching most of the hard news out of the Kremlin, which is usually released after Pravda goes to press.

Managers of state-shops, too, are being urged to show a bit more spunk in competition with each other, and a bit more

West Berlin's school problem

Avoid Nazism, totalitarianism

BERLIN (Reuters)—West Berlin's school authorities are trying to warn children from the age of 10 upwards of the dangers of nazism and totalitarianism.

Karl-Heinz Evers, West Berlin's chief school officer, gave reporters details of a new curriculum defining what teachers are to tell their pupils on subjects ranging from Spartan youth education in ancient Greece to slave labor in the Soviet Union under Joseph Stalin.

At school — leaving age, West Berlin youths should be well-informed not only about general history, he explained, adding that the aim is to get to the roots of false glorification of, or sympathy for, Adolf Hitler and his regime.

"Youth has to be made aware," he said, "of its responsibility towards the community and of the equal rights of all people. That calls for whole-hearted opposition of youth to Nazi ideology and to any totalitarian system which restricts the freedom of people."

ABOUT CIVIL DEFENCE

(Ottawa Journal)
The chairman of Toronto's civil defence committee told citizens they would be "clapped in jail" if they didn't turn out for civil defence drills, backtracked when he discovered there was no law enabling him to do anything to anybody.

There is too much of this sort of thing in the civil defence picture; too much uncertainty, too much confusion, too much talk that doesn't mean anything.

The reason, we suspect, is that few people really take civil defence seriously.

And this, we fear, includes governments.

Two weeks ago the federal authority put out a booklet of instructions for building and equipping home fallout shelters, recommended that each household should have one. It is hard to believe that this was meant seriously. For what about the hundreds of thousands of people who live in apartment houses? What about the hundreds of thousands of others who would be in office buildings if nuclear attack came? What about the hundreds of thousands who are unemployed—unable to afford home shelters?

It may be that some people are taking this government advice. We haven't noticed many of them taking it, nor heard about them taking it. And we doubt much that many of them will take it.

The cold fact is that the vast majority of us haven't given real thought about what we should or could do if nuclear bombs started dropping on us — we are just fatalists.

That is why, up to the present, talk about civil defence has been just talk; meaningless.

consideration of the customer. Shop managers in the USSR will now be free to reject goods which they don't think will meet customer preference, and to stop around from other state-run factories for consumer goods which will sell better.

The Kremlin, to be sure, is still a long way from unleashing its throttle-hold on the discipline of the competitive market economy. But it certainly looks as if something is happening in the Soviet Union to move away from too rigid planning and state control of the market. Maybe the reason is that too many plans have gone awry, and too much control has throttled and distorted production.

The new form of history lesson begins with the 10-year-olds in West Berlin's school system.

They are to be told the biblical story of Herod and the killing of children at Bethlehem, and, simultaneously, about the mass murder of Jewish children in Nazi concentration camps.

During the following school years, detailed information is to be given the children on various aspects of the Hitler system, mostly in relation to similar, and earlier, events such as the persecution of Christians and Jews by the Romans and the persecution of Christians and Jews by the Nazis.

It is then that the Spartan education system will be compared with the ideals of education propagated by the Hitler-youth movement. Slavery will be explained from its ancient forms and on through the end of the feudal system to the slave workers' system used by Hitler in Germany and Stalin in the Soviet Union, Evers said.

Colonialism also will be part of the history lessons. Hitler's colonial policy in the conquered European countries will be explained along with the end of European colonialism in Africa, Asia and India's independence in 1947 will be presented, Evers said, together with

the French policy in Algeria, apartheid (racial separation) in South Africa and the continued existence of Soviet colonialism in Georgia, Kazakhstan and the Baltic states.

In the top grade of the primary schools, pupils will be told about Hitler's racial laws, the pogroms against German Jews in November, 1938, the mass extermination, and the compensation and restitution efforts of the West German government.

In this grade, too, the pupils will learn about the Second World War, Germany's unconditional surrender, the war crime trials and the German anti-Nazi resistance movement.

At Salamis

Uncover Roman theatre

NICOSIA, Cyprus (Reuters)—A magnificent Roman theatre at Salamis, the premier city of ancient Cyprus, has been partly uncovered, revealing an auditorium which leads archaeologists here to believe that this may have been one of the largest theatres in the ancient cities of the Mediterranean and the Middle East.

A hollow resembling an amphitheatre near the Salamis gymnasium had puzzled archaeologists for some years. Now, excavation carried out under Dr. V. Karageorghis has revealed a theatre whose semi-circular orchestra measures about 90 feet in diameter, compared with the about 70 feet of the theatre at Epidaurus, in Greece.

The Cyprus antiquities department said that in its present state of preservation the theatre could hold 1,000 spectators, which leads authorities to believe that its original capacity must have been enormous.

STATUES FOUND

Several headless marble statues so far have been discovered. It is believed that they once adorned an elaborately carved stage.

The theatre is believed to have been restored sometime in the third century A.D. and finally abandoned after the big earthquakes of the fourth century A.D. which destroyed Salamis.

The original limestone seats of the auditorium have been preserved only in the lowest one or two tiers and in the foot-board in front of the first tier of seats; of the remaining six tiers, only the sandstone substructure now remains.

CHINESE CROPS

He had two aces and his partner had opened the bidding, but as you can see I ruffed East's opening spade lead; dropped the king and queen of clubs together and romped home with my contract."

This hand illustrates one of the interesting features of competitive slams. Sometimes a pair is pushed into a slam and just bids it because their opponents have completed. Other times the slam is bid as a sacrifice, but the bid actually makes. East could have opened the ace and another diamond and beaten the hand, but that would have been quite a lead.

Another point of interest is Frank's comment that perhaps his partner should have doubled two diamonds for takeout. The answer to that one is that South certainly should have done so. The one time that you should make a takeout double with a two-suiter is after your opponents have bid the other two suits.

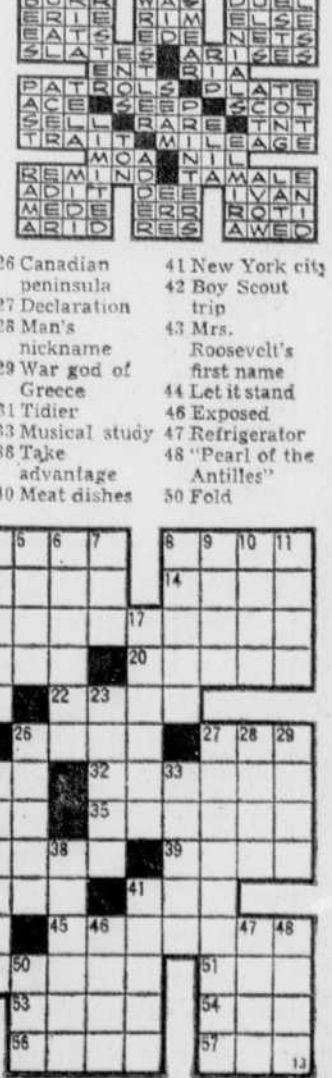

Covered 2,150 Miles Ward Seeley Returns To Thetford After Long Trip

THETFORD MINES — Ward Seeley has returned to Thetford Mines after a year's absence on an adventurous journey by canoe and sailboat, which covered in all some 2,150 miles.

Just a year ago July 1 Mr. Seeley took off by canoe from a starting point on the St. Francis river, near Thetford, for Miami Beach, Fla., arriving there the end of December, the six months crowded with varied experiences.

After spending two or three weeks in Florida, he wound up a guest aboard a sailing boat (50-foot yawl). With the owner, a man from Quebec, he toured the islands of the West Indies. They visited such beauty spots as the Bahamas, Jamaica, Haiti, also Cuba, and many other remote little islands, as yet untouched by tourists.

The expression "It's a Small World" certainly applies to Ward. In Florida, the owner of the sailing boat in which he toured the islands was a Quebecer. In Nassau he ran into a group of people from Thetford attending a convention. While in Jamaica, he visited Albert Nakash, a successfully established business man, and on the island of Haiti, in the Caribbean Sea, in a remote village, he met Alcide Pelchat, a missionary teaching in a Catholic Mission School, who came from Thetford Mines.

Of the whole trip, of which Ward speaks so interestingly and enthusiastically, he considered

Blue Mountain Inn, in the hills above Kingston, Jamaica, the most picturesque, and the remote parts of Haiti, the most desolate. There in an isolated village, with a donkey trail over the mountains their only contact with the outside world, the cattle dying of cholera, the fowl diseased and people sleeping on the street, he found conditions of the most abject poverty and misery.

The return trip, by sail from Fort Lauderdale, via an inland route to Quebec City, terminated his year's holiday, at a cost of about \$600.

As to what his plans are for the future, after a short visit with his relatives and friends in Thetford, he plans to move on and locate in Toronto. Ward highly recommends a year's holiday but not more for one could become a drifter. It is so easy to make a living on the islands and it is a temptation, he said, but feels now that he prefer to settle down.

The Doctor Says

TAKE PROPER PRECAUTIONS, MAKE VACATION A LARK

M. D.

When you arrive at your resort area, make sure allergic mem- bers of your party don't go wan- dering in fields of poison ivy or sumach or begin collecting bou- quets of goldenrod.

For reasons of health as well as economy, bring most of your food from home.

By skillful use of wrappings of waxed paper or foil and careful storage in large insulated coolers, you can carry a weekend supply of sandwiches, cold cuts, ham- burger meat, sausage, hard cheese and bottled mayonnaise.

For supplementation, you can safely purchase unopened bottles or cartons of iced beverages, in- cluding milk; boxed or individ- ually wrapped cake, cookies, crackers or ice cream; fresh fruit you can peel or clean yourself (oranges, apples, bananas, peach- es, plums, melon or berries); canned meats, fish or spaghetti; and packaged cold cuts, sliced cheese and pies.

Hygienic lapses in food prepa- ration and food handling (salads, salad dressings, custard fill- ings, etc.) are responsible for most attacks and epidemics of what is incorrectly called "pion- maine poisoning."

Once settled in, act your age. Unless you've been in spring training, like ball players, don't get mixed up in contests with teen-agers, college students and persons of your own vintage who fancy themselves as eternal ad- olescents.

Even if you think you've kept in shape with calisthenics or on- the-job activities, remember you

use entirely different sets of muscles for softball, baseball, tennis, swimming, diving, rowing and even golf.

One moderate to severe attack of Charley horse can ruin a holi- day.

Respect the rays of the sun. Limit yourself to a few minutes of full body exposure on arrival. Guided by your skin reaction, in- crease or decrease the time of exposure so as to get a uniform tanning (not bronzing) with fine flakes (not large peelings).

As to sunburn "protectives" or "sun-tan" preparations, the for- mer have limited value, if any, and the latter have not yet been sufficiently tested by the Federal Drug Administration.

Between exposures, protect your skin surfaces with a head cover- ing and loose clothing. Preferably wear a hat that shades the tip of your nose.

If you suffer a sunburn, don't add to your troubles and expense by smearing yourself with oint- ments, lotions and the like. The most effective, safest and cheap- est type is simple exposure to fresh air and protection from ir- radiation.

Before resorting to any kind of medication, remember that most burns of any extent or severity are accompanied by fever and in- flammation of the kidneys.

Finally, with regard to the sun, don't use tinted glasses unless they're made to your prescription. Even most publicity-seeking stars of stage, screen, TV and radio no longer resort to this attention- getting subterfuge.

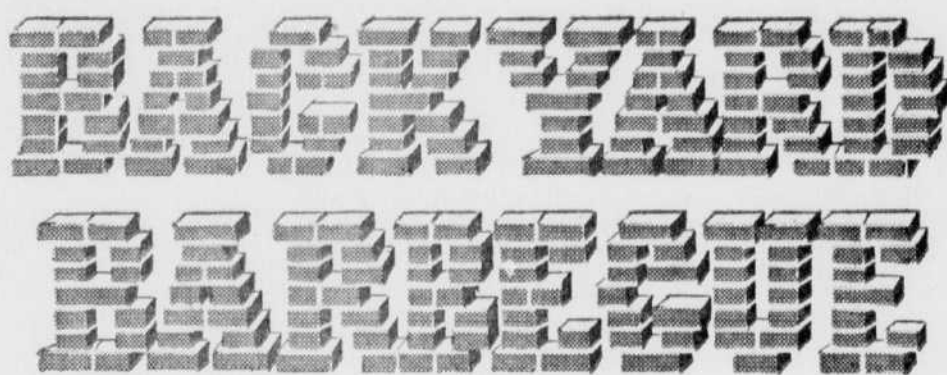

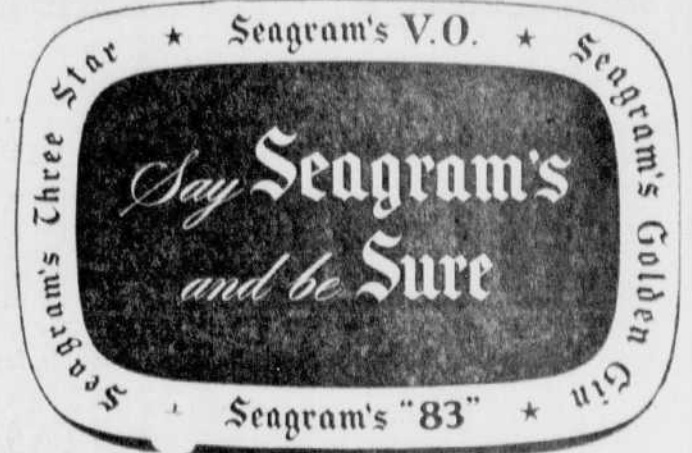

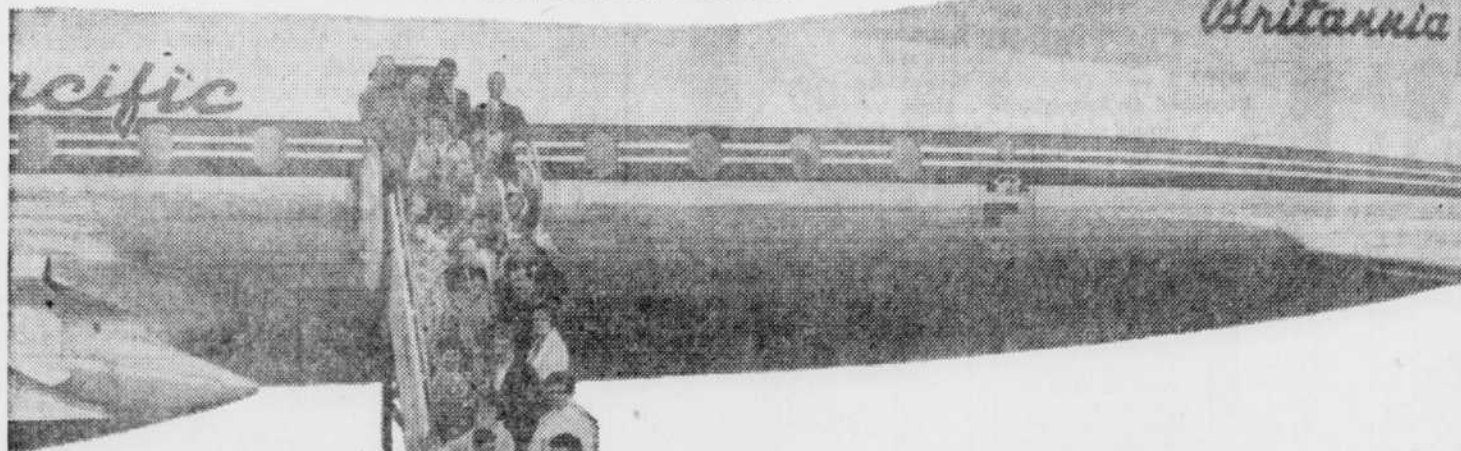

Ypres to become bird sanctuary

BRUSSELS (Reuters)—One of the most famous battlefields of the First World War in Belgium shortly will become a bird sanctuary.

The tiny Flanders town of Ypres, where Canadian troops won glory at a terrible cost and where more than 500,000 men on both sides were killed or wounded, has wiped out the physical reminders of its bitter memories.

In the last three years, the cit-

izens of Ypres have been building a bird sanctuary over the shattered region and it will be opened to the public this month.

The sanctuary consists of 12 parks, with small woods and lakes, gardens and meadows, where birds of all kinds will nest. The Ypres Tourist Association says it will be the only bird sanctuary in Europe where the public will be able to wander around.

It has been built outside the

ancient Flemish town which once was the centre of a thriving lace industry and where many battles were fought in the 1914-18 war.

54,000 CANADIANS DIED

Outside the walls of Ypres there are more than 100 cemeteries. In four main attacks German artillery plowed up the Flanders soil until the whole countryside was torn and burned, with shocking losses to the British, French and Canadian allies as well as to their German

enemies.

The Canadian Army history branch lists a total of 12 battles of Ypres, four in 1915 and eight in 1917. The First Canadian Division took part in the 1915 battles and the Canadian Corps in the 1917 struggles.

All told these actions accounted for roughly 54,000 Canadians killed—about 90 per cent of the Canadian total in the First World War. Many fell while making a famed stand against the Germans' first assault with poison gas.

So complete was the devastation around Ypres that "quite a few years passed before anything could be grown," a Ypres

tourist official recalls.

"We often thought the ground would always be useless. In fact, we never for a moment believed that anyone would ever revisit the place in our time as it became such a terrible memory for the men who fought here."

"As for the inhabitants, you can imagine how they felt, with the grim reminder of these terrible battles always before them."

CHILDREN'S ROLE

Local citizens decided to spur on the town authorities to go one better than simply clearing up rubble, filling up old trenches and repainting shattered buildings which no one would ever

live in, or rebuild.

"We decided to do something positive, and that is why we have laid out our bird sanctuary," the official explained.

The 12 parks have been "adopted" by local schools whose pupils will look after the birds.

"It is perhaps fitting that the scene of one of the world's worst slaughters should now become a training ground where children will learn the sanctity of even a bird's life as well as the beauties of nature," the official added.

The parks will contain birds ranging from herons and swans to pigeons and hawks. They all will be free to fly without any restraint.

National League Is Favored To Sweep Second Half Of Annual Classic At New York, 45,000 Expected For Game

NEW YORK — (AP) — Despite their victory in Kansas City Monday and their superior punch in the starting lineup, the National League was no more than even money today to sweep the two-game All-Star set against the physically handicapped American Leaguers.

A crowd of some 45,000 was expected to see Pittsburgh righthander Vernon Law (11-4) and New York lefthander Whitey Ford (5-5) face each other on the mound in the 29th mid-summer game and the first in Yankee Stadium since 1939. The Americans, despite their 5-3 loss two days ago, still lead the series, 16 to 12 but the Nationals have taken eight of the last 12.

AL manager Al Lopez and NL pilot Walter Alston have decided to stick to the same batting orders that faced each other in the 100-degree heat in Kansas City's municipal Stadium Monday.

LOTS OF SLUGGERS

Lopez, the Chicago White Sox skipper, once again will have the four Yankee sluggers — Roger Maris, Mickey Mantle, Bill Skowron and Yogi Berra—right in the middle where the strength is supposed to be. The quartet got only a single by Skowron and two walks by the crippled Mantle in 10 total appearances Monday.

Mantle's still nursing a sore leg and so is Detroit's Al Kaline, his understudy.

Ronnie Hansen, Baltimore's rookie shortstop, and Pete Runnels, Boston's veteran second baseman, both reported feeling better after suffering ill effects from the intense Kansas City heat.

Frank Malzone, Boston's brilliant third baseman, suffered blistered feet as a result of the scorching terrain in Municipal Stadium.

The temperature was expected to be about 20 degrees cooler for today's game.

PITCHERS IMPRESSED

Impressed by the one-hit pitching of Bob Friend in his three inning stint against the American Leaguers Monday, Alston decided to go with another Pitts-

burgh righthander today. Law, 30, was equally effective in the first tilt, snuffing out a ninth-inning rally.

It was Law's only appearance in All-Star competition. Ford, is an All-Star veteran but in six innings, he has allowed 12 hits and nine runs for an 0-1 record. He started in 1954, relieved in 1955 and 1956 and lost in relief last year.

The player the New York fans probably want to see the most is the magnetic centre fielder Willie Mays who again will lead off.

Monday Mays had a single, double and triple and he came within a few feet of hitting a home run. No one in All-Star history has ever hit for the cycle although Ted Williams once hit two home runs and two singles.

Lopez, who now has lost both games in which he managed, may use Williams as more than just a pinch-hitter as he did two days ago. The Red Sox slugger grounded out in the second inning.

Shan Musial, who sets a record every time he comes to bat, also is certain to see action. The St. Louis star appeared as a pinch-hitter Monday and he singled for a record 18 hits in his All-Star appearances.

Fiery Ted Lindsay Announces His Retirement After 16 Years In NHL, Terrible Ted Rated Top Competitor

DETROIT (CP)—"I don't want to become an athletic bum."

Thus ended a great 16-year National Hockey League career for Old Scarface Ted Lindsay.

The tempestuous little left-winger, who spent 13 years with Detroit Red Wings and three with Chicago Black Hawks, took a hard look at his hockey future and said Tuesday:

"I have come to the realistic conclusion that it is better to stop now than linger on as an athletic bum, something I promised myself I would never become. Hockey has been wonderful to me. The game and the people in it have made my life a good one."

WILL BE 35 SOON

Lindsay, a native of Renfrew,

Ont., who makes his home in suburban Birmingham, will be 35 July 29.

"I feel I could play one more year, possibly two. But I don't want to milk the thing. I'm leaving with a good feeling."

He said he wanted to devote his time to his wife, three children and his business. Lindsay and a former Red Wing teammate, Marty Pavelich, are partners as manufacturers representatives.

When Lindsay joined the Red Wings in 1944 he became part of a line that was one of the most productive and most feared in hockey history.

FIERCE COMPETITOR

The combination of Lindsay, rightwinger Gordie Howe, who Tuesday signed his 16th season with Detroit, and centre Sid Abel, now Red Wing coach, gave Detroit a glittering team. During Lindsay's tenure with the club, the Red Wings won eight NHL championships and four Stanley Cups.

He was one of the fiercest competitors in hockey and it was inevitable that he was to become embroiled in many brawls. His hot temper earned him the nickname Terrible Ted. The Old Scarface tab came with a collection of face cuts and bruises.

Lindsay played in 999 regular NHL games and 126 playoff engagements but was never severely hurt.

Detroit fans loved him, and they sent up howls of protest in July, 1957, when he was traded to Chicago in a five-player deal.

Lindsay collected 33 goals and 19 assists to win the league scoring title in the 1947-48 season. He spent a career total of 1,636 minutes in the penalty box, more than any other player in league history.

SCORED 365 GOALS

His lifetime record includes 365 goals and 468 assists for 833 points, an NHL record for a left-winger in regular league play. He picked up 44 goals and 49 assists in playoffs.

Lindsay broke into the NHL at 18. He played his early hockey around Kirkland Lake, Ont., then went to Toronto St. Michael's College Majors of the Ontario Hockey Association A series.

His Detroit career often was punctuated with scrapes with other players and with General Manager Jack Adams.

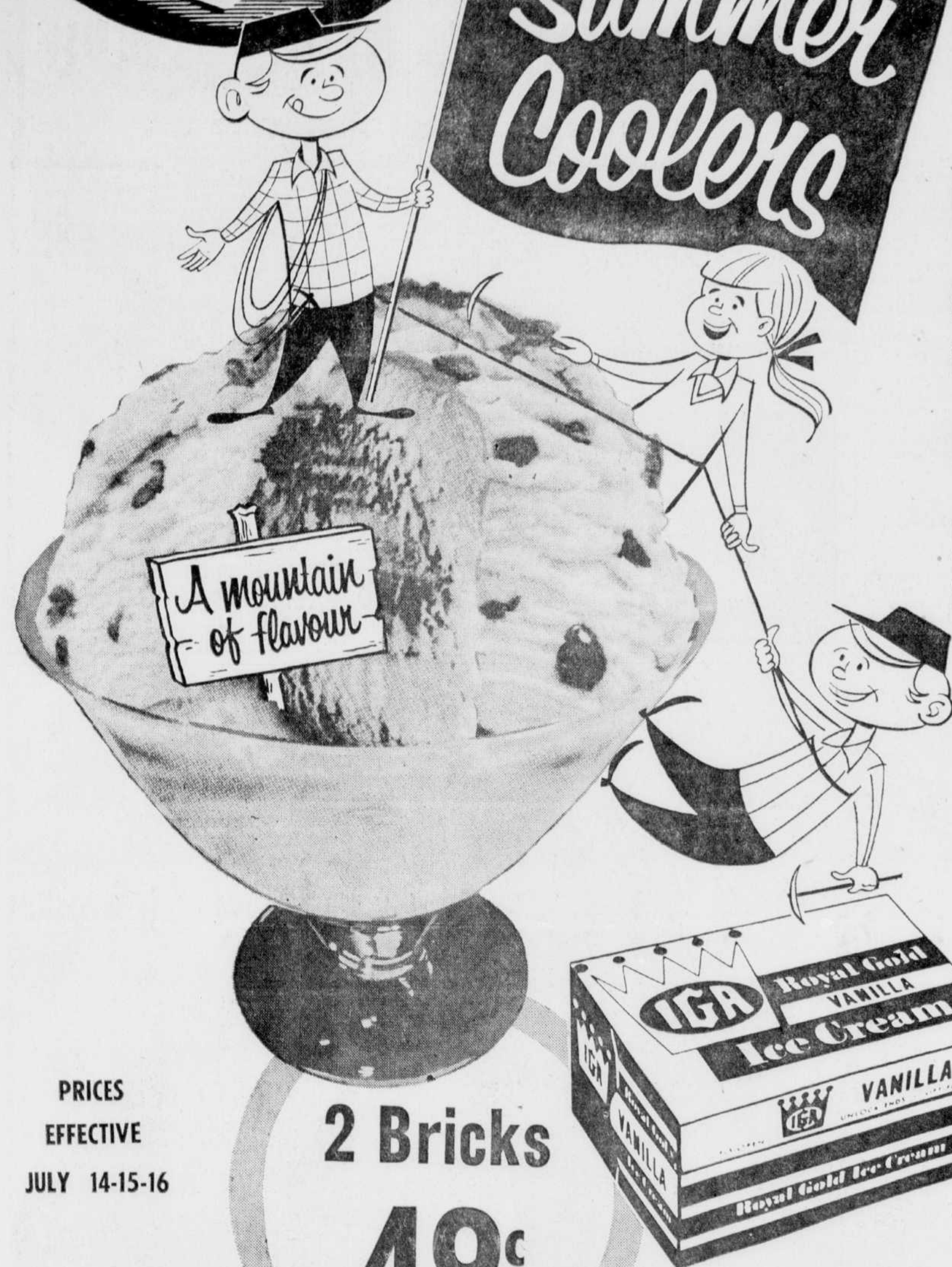

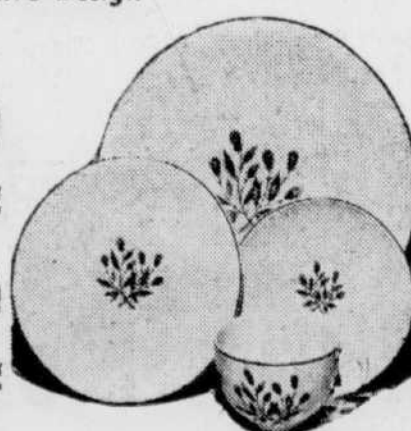

Pile-driving for building requires special training

The aim of the game is to build a sturdy building on a solid foundation. "Getting down to the root of a building is our business," Eddie Costello, co-superintendent in charge of installing the pile foundation at the new Lowney plant, said in a recent interview.

Work began May 31 and will continue until the end of the month with Mr. Costello from Cannonsburg, Pennsylvania, and Gordon Hussey, who recently arrived in Canada from England, heading the group of workmen installing the foundation of the Lowney plant on Montreal Road.

They represent the Raymond Concrete Pile Co. Ltd., with headquarters in Montreal and Toronto.

The company is in charge of installing 550 piles as indicated in the architect's plan, of two different types, to form the foundation of the new building.

Most of the piles to be used are of the 'Ray-West' type with a loading capacity of 120 tons. The rest will be 'Raymond step-taper' piles with a loading capacity of 60 tons.

Procedure consists of driving the sectional piles - each three feet long, 17 and one half inches outside diameter and 12 inches inside diameter, each consisting of a re-inforced concrete wall - far into the ground with a drop hammer on the end of a boom.

How far is 'far into the ground?' This depends on the composition of the soil, Mr. Costello said.

Wherever natural rock may

form the foundation of a building, piles are not necessary.

However, in many cases it is necessary to drive piles through hard soil which is difficult to penetrate but which is unreliable for foundation purposes because it is underlain with highly compressible soils, Mr. Hussey explained.

real, send inspectors to pick certain piles which must be tested by specially trained Raymond Co. personnel," Mr. Hussey, in charge of this aspect, said.

This is a lengthy and costly operation involving at least 36 hours of time, but provides the necessary insurance that the finished plant will stand up to promised standards.

Purpose of the test is to measure the settlement of the piles to the accuracy of one one-thousandth of an inch, to record how much weight the piles can withstand without moving.

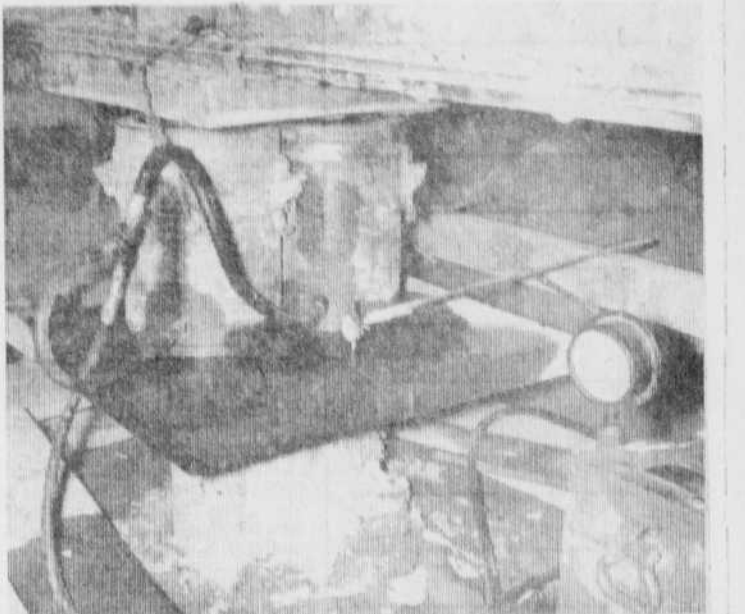
"Usually, steel pig iron is used for the test," Mr. Hussey said. "But," he continued, "we are using granite from local sources for the tests here at Lowney."

Two tests are being made on each type of pile, with 220 tons of weight being placed on each pile for the test.

The dead weight load takes about eight hours to pile on the platform made with steel beams. After leaving the full 220 tons on the pile, it is taken off in installments.

Farm Homes, Barns Follow Modern Trend

By EDNA BLAKELY

TORONTO (CP) — When some motorists pass a farm with a well-equipped barn, they expect to see a run-down farmhouse, and vice versa.

The tourists will say: "There's a farm where the man is the boss," when they spot a spic and

span barn.

But it isn't so, not in Ontario, anyway. Dr. Helen C. Abell, chief of the rural sociology unit of the federal agriculture department, has facts and figures to prove it.

The data is included in one of the first progress reports of a special study of Ontario farm homes and homemakers, carried on jointly by the federal and provincial agriculture departments.

WOMEN'S INFLUENCE

"A well-equipped home generally means a well-equipped barn," says Dr. Abell.

Of the 353 farm women interviewed during June and July last year, all had stoves—all but 15 per cent of them electric or gas stoves. Other labor-saving equipment included refrigerators, owned by 95 per cent; freezers, 58 per cent; power washing machines, 98 per cent; automatic clothes dryers, 11 per cent; vacuum cleaners, 87 per cent; and electric floor polishers, 12 per cent.

Every home had at least one of the seven items and a few had all seven. The average was five.

In her report, Dr. Abell said in Ontario the family usually owns and operates the farm on which they reside. "Ideally both husband and wife desire and seek technological and mechanical aids to minimize arduous labor for all family members. This is one logical reason for expecting that there would be some sort of equalization between possession of items of equipment used to lighten both farming and home-making equipment."

MOST USEFUL

The washing machine topped the list as the most useful piece of home equipment and was followed by the refrigerator, stove, vacuum cleaner, freezer, iron and sewing machine.

To determine a level of living, the farm home makers were asked 27 questions about such things as the type of home construction, the number of rooms for each person, the lighting system, furnishings, the type of floor and wall finish and the presence of newspapers and magazines in the home.

The highest possible score was 27 and the answers varied from 11 to 27 with the average score being 23. Scores from earlier studies in Alberta, Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Quebec varied from 15 to 17.

In the Ontario survey 92 per cent of the women said they did some sewing, and 27 per cent said they had made at least one hat.

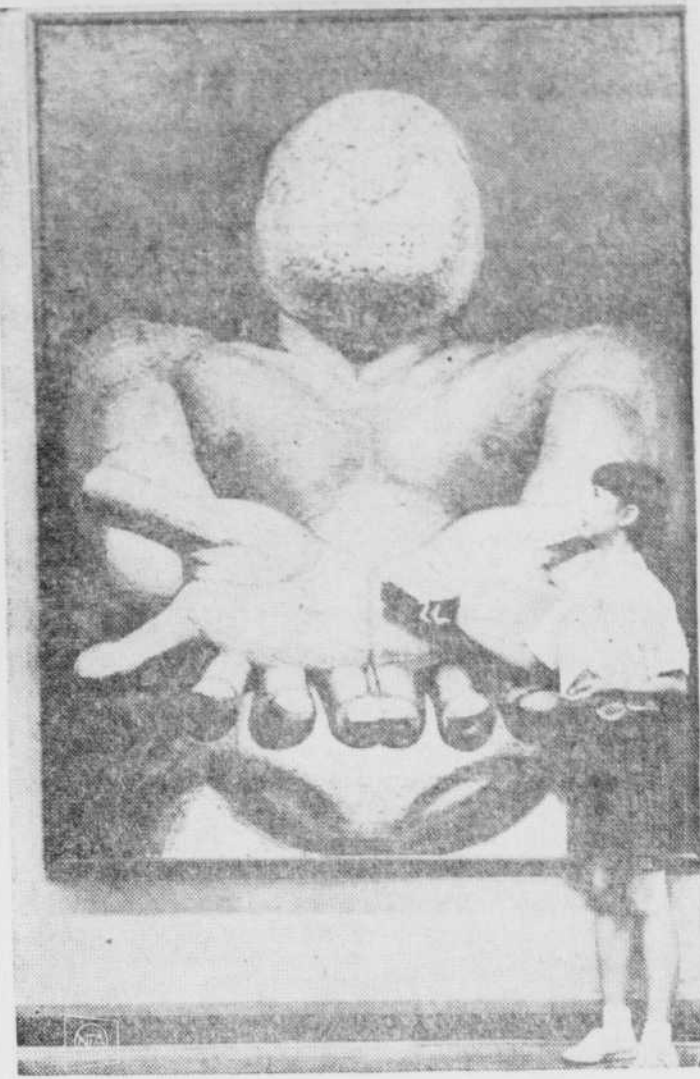
