Owner confirmed as Cookshire fire victim

SHERBROOKE

The Sûreté du Québec has confirmed that human remains found in the ruins of a burned-out assembly plant in Cookshire are indeed those of the owner, 57-year old Marc Duquette.

The information was provided to investigators from the Sûreté du Québec (SQ) of Haut-Saint-François (HSF), who will now be able to wind up their investigation.

"The DNA is in effect that of Marc Duquette, but that does not necessarily allow us to move the investigation forward, only to continue in the same way," says Haut-Saint-François SQ Director, Jocelyn Rose.

"We were already 99.9 per cent sure that the bones were his. Now we are at 100 per cent. Family members had perhaps hidden hopes, but with this confirmation, these doubts are now dispelled. So we will continue our investigation, although it will be extremely difficult to determine the cause of the fire and death," Rose added.

A memorial service for Duquette, the owner of the destroyed Portes Cookshire plant, was held on April 27.

High schools in the ETSB are using a loophole to avoid the issue of students smoking.

While the ETSB maintains a strict

non-smoking on campus policy on paper, students with parental consent step off school grounds to smoke. In some cases, they are within two feet of school grounds.

The Quebec Tobacco Act, in force since 2006, is clear on the issue, and ad-

resses the grey area faced by ETSB administrators. The Act acknowledges that challenges or situations that are likely to cause problems may arise and provides possible solutions. Accommodating smokers is not one of them.

Police to target motorcycle noise

SHERBROOKE

Police throughout the province will be paying particular attention to the sound coming from motorcycles this spring in an attempt to reduce noise that can become distractions on the province's roads.

Quebec's automobile insurance agency, the SAAQ, is on the brink of a three-year pilot project that will focus on control of noise from exhaust systems. The goal is to reduce pollution on the road, but also to ensure the tranquility of the people who live near highways or traffic areas.

The sound level recorders that police will be using as of this year will be set to the J2825 standard of the Society of Automotive Engineers (SAE). For motorcycles and mopeds that exceed a certain threshold, the owner shall be liable to a fine of \$100 - \$200. If the driver refuses to cooperate, the fine would increase from \$200 to \$300.

Fifteen different police departments are involved in the project this year, including the Sûreté du Québec (SQ) and the municipal forces from Saguenay, Trois-Rivières, Sherbrooke, Montreal, Gatineau, Laval and Longueuil, several municipalities on the north shore of Montreal and the Richelieu-Saint-Laurent regional police agency.

Summer 2013 at Musée des beaux-arts de Sherbrooke

This summer, we invite you to meet two strong personalities that, each in his own way, put his stamp on the century: Zidane, A 21st Century Portrait, Presented in Spanish and in French with English subtitles and organized by the National Gallery of Canada in Ottawa and Marc-Aurèle Fortin's Paysages modernes du Québec traditionnel, an exhibition developed and circulated by the Musée national des beaux-arts du Québec.

From Jun. 1 to Sept 2, Zidane, A Portrait of the 21st Century will highlight a member of the French national soccer team that won both the 1998 FIFA World Cup and the Euro 2000 Championship.

In Zidane, A 21st Century Portrait, internationally renowned artists Douglas

Gordon (b. Glasgow, Scotland, 1966) and Philippe Parreno (b. Oran, Algeria, 1964) have deployed contemporary conventions of mass media both to "paint" a portrait of the soccer star, and to portray our cultural creation of, and fascination with, heroes and icons.

This contemporary portrait of Zinédine Zidane was filmed during a championship match between Real Madrid and Villarreal on April 23, 2005. The artists positioned seventeen cameras throughout Madrid's Santiago Bernabéu stadium and directed a team of camera operators to remain fixed on the French soccer star throughout the entire match. This installation juxtaposes a film composed of footage from all seventeen cameras with the raw footage from

camera number one. Zidane's image is projected larger than life so that his every gesture and expression are emphasized.

The soundtrack shuttles the viewer between the sounds of the game and an ethereal, introspective space, creating a radically different experience of both soccer and portraiture.

Zidane is highly experimental as a portrait, as cinema and as soccer, fusing familiar mediums and genres to produce a radically different experience of spectatorship.

It is interesting to note that Zidane, A Portrait of the 21st Century is scheduled to coincide with the Canada Summer Games / Sherbrooke 2013, which will be held from August 2 to 17 this summer.

From May 25 to Oct. 6,

Marc-Aurèle Fortin, Paysages modernes du Québec traditionnel will be presented. This is an exhibition developed and circulated by the Musée national des beaux-arts du Québec consists of thirty rural and marine scenes produced in oils or gouache by Fortin between 1910 and the 1950s.

The works are grouped both by subject and by pictorial technique, with the aim of demonstrating how the practice of painting can be associated with tradition by thematic choices, but also, paradoxically, by the expression of a certain modernity in these choices.

From June 24 to September 2, 2013, the museum is open every day, from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Fire at Kruger Lennoxville quickly controlled

A fire broke out in a production machine at the Kruger plant in Lennoxville Thursday, the fourth in seven years.

Thirty Sherbrooke firefighters responded to the College St. facility to assist the company's own firefighting efforts.

"This is a building with a large area and the risk of fire in paper production is high. Given the high risk at this point, we deployed several teams," said Sher-

brooke Division Chief, Stéphane Simoneau.

The fire was brought under control quickly and did not spread to other machines or buildings, keeping damages to a minimum.

"Water in the machinery causes problems. Paper dust can ignite from the friction from the machine. In any event, we have not yet determined the exact cause of the accident, Simoneau said.

Syrup producers are required to pay: Fédération

The situation of syrup producer Steve Côté who is facing \$650,000 in fines and who had 3,200 gallons of maple syrup seized by the Fédération des producteurs acéricoles du Québec (Record, May 1) prompted both commentary and questions about this branch of the Union des producteurs agricoles.

Paul Rouillard is the Deputy Director of the Fédération and he spoke to The Record yesterday. Even though, because of legal considerations, he was unable to comment on Steve Côté's case, he was glad to speak about the Fédération and what it does.

Speaking mostly in English, he began by explaining membership. "The Fédération is made up of 12 regional syndicates or unions. Legally, a maple sugar producer does not have to belong to the regional union or syndicate. There are 7,400 registered maple business in Quebec which are owned and operated by some 12,500 individuals. Some 97 per cent or 98 per cent of them are members of their regional union. There are no dues or fees to pay for membership."

"Whether a producer is a member or not," he said, "anyone who sells maple syrup has to pay 12 cents per pound to the Fédération. The exception is the case when the syrup is being sold in cans, from the sugar bush, to individual consumers. Essentially, anyone who is shipping syrup in commercial quantities, either in bulk or in cans, is required to pay this sum."

"Of every 12 cents collected by the Fédération," he continued, "five go towards research, development and promotion. That works out to about 40 per cent, and that is high compared to other industries. Research is ongoing and it always takes time, but it does bear fruit. Shortly, grocery chains like IGA and Metro will be carrying a new product on their shelves: maple sap. It will be sold with things like orange or apple juice. If you've been to a sugar bush you've probably tasted sap from the trees. It's like drinking sweet water and it's good fresh. If you let it sit for six or seven hours it will start being invaded by micro-organisms. The sap soon

to be sold in stores will be pasteurized and stabilized and will be a nice, alternative treat."

"Much of the promotion done by the Fédération is aimed at expanding markets," he said. "Currently 80 per cent of Quebec's syrup is exported. The U.S. takes about 65 per cent of our exports; Japan and Germany take eight and seven per cent respectively. The remaining 20 per cent of our exports go to 49 different countries."

"The Fédération keeps a reserve of maple syrup," he explained. "We hold some 40 million pounds of syrup in stock so that, if there's a poor crop, as we had in 2007 and 2008, we will still be able to provide syrup to our customers by tapping into this reserve."

It was part of this reserve of maple syrup that was targeted by thieves late last winter. The theft is still being investigated but even if the syrup is never recovered, it was insured against theft and producers will not be on the hook for any lost syrup.

Maple syrup, like any other vegetarian product, is dependent on weather and crop yields can fluctuate considerably. Despite this, members of the Fédération do operate on a quota system.

"It's very different to the quota system used by milk producers," said Paul Rouillard. "A maple syrup quota does not cost money to buy, nor does it belong to an individual. Rather, it goes with the sugar bush. Its primary purpose is to maintain a certain stability in syrup production and it permits considerable flexibility to the producer."

Syrup which is shipped to the Fédération is classified according to a set of criteria and given one of several grades. The value of the syrup is determined by its grade. Producers who ship maple syrup to the Fédération are paid for their syrup according to one of two payment schedules.

"One option for producers is to be paid \$1.25 per tap at the beginning of the season," Rouillard continued. "That works out to about 20 per cent of the total payment. A second payment in June and a third in December will mean the producer will receive around 85 per cent of the money owed to him for his

"Students smoking or supplying tobacco at the school property line or on neighbouring property: While the school operator is no longer responsible, such situations can cause student safety or civic problems because of busy road crossings, students clustering in "gangs," lack of respect for property, or vandalism. Such problems can be greatly reduced or avoided altogether if students are informed and involved from the first stages of implementation. In more difficult cases, school management could ask the school resource officer with the local police force to step up patrols in the areas in question," the Act reads.

At Massey-Vanier, Secondary 3, 4, and 5 students are given a consent form for their parents to fill out at the beginning of the year. It is assumed the parents are aware of the risks off school grounds, and absolve the school of responsibility for the students while they are gone. Student with permission to leave are given a sticker to add to their ID card, and are required to present it to a supervisor before leaving the grounds.

"It is not our responsibility to police students," said Massey-Vanier principal Tom Hamen, regarding what students do once they leave the property. According to him, the onus is on parents to be aware of the risks involved in allowing their child off school grounds, and evaluate that child's level of responsibility before giving consent.

Smoking on campus at Massey-Vanier is allegedly a non issue. It is a large campus with youth and adult programs, and facilities used by the public, so there are many places to step off grounds, and a variety of smokers bordering the grounds at given moment. Hamen voiced his disapproval for students smoking, and insisted that he addresses the issue at length with students he sees, informing them of the risks, but his strategy is not a punitive one. "Do you make an issue out of

something that will ultimately affect a students education?"

Richmond Regional High School also uses a parental consent form, however they are very open about what students do off school property. Posted on the RRHS website, the permission slip reads as follows: "Any student who would like to leave the school grounds at noon time, must get the 'Student and parent agreement' form from the main office, have it signed by his/her parent and return it to us as soon as possible. Students who do not return the form are not allowed to leave the campus. Please note that we do not recommend that you give your child permission to leave school grounds as many students use this permission to be influenced by their peers and start smoking once they are off school grounds. We offer healthy positive noon hour activities to students who remain on campus."

RRHS principal Isabelle Beaulac insisted that despite education programs and preventative measures, parents who condone smoking are adamant about the rights of their children.

"It is difficult to fight against certain parents whose views are not in accordance with our own." Beaulac mentioned that she has to surprise students with activity days that focus on health and wellness, otherwise the kids will stay home. She also noted that upon the announcement of a recent activity day, the office was flooded with calls from parents insisting their kids be allowed to leave. Beaulac has involved the town and police, trying to address the loitering in front of the school, but despite efforts, kids stand in front of the school, just a few feet from school grounds, to smoke during lunch hour, and even during recess. One of the teens seen outside smoking said there could be 15-20 kids outside smoking on a good day.

Galt Regional high School is in a unique situation. Far from town, and bordered only by a chain link fence and a highway, students have no access to a smoking area. Where other schools are able to focus on education and preventative measures, Galt suffers a much

higher level of disciplinary action for smokers, because the entire campus is smoke free. Unlike the other schools, there is no area that, even if afforded parental consent, students could go to smoke. This results in the rules being broken on a regular basis. Recently, a section of fence was removed, and a crosswalk was painted across the staff parking lot leading to a space beyond the chain link enclosed by a snow fence.

When approached about the newly built enclosure, Galt Principle Randy McLean denied the space was intended for students to smoke. Regardless, ETSB representative Eric Campbell was quick to point out that the

board was unaware of modifications to the fence or property, and said that any structural changes would be undone within a few days. Campbell said that last year the board was approached by Galt with a similar proposition. The intention was to get parental consent specifically for smoking, have the student participate in a very involved information session about smoking, and then be given a designated area to smoke. The proposal was refused by the health ministry.

Student charged with assault changes plea

A student arrested last spring during local demonstrations against tuition fee hikes was supposed to plead guilty to assaulting a police officer, Tuesday, but changed his mind at the last minute

Nicolas Lachance-Barbeau, identified by police as a protest leader, was arrested during student protests on April 17, 2012.

According to the charges, Sherbrooke police officers were trying to gain access to the offices of the Sherbrooke Chamber of Commerce offices, which had been occupied by members of the radical

student group CLASSE, when one of the officers was pushed by a student, identified as Barbeau. Charges of assault and obstructing police were subsequently filed against the 28-year old.

Defence attorney Denis Potvin and Crown prosecutor Nathalie Robidoux will meet May 30 to arrange a trial date.

Transformer explosion leads to major Saint-Elie grow-op

A Hydro-Sherbrooke malfunction led Sherbrooke police to dismantle a major marijuana

grow-op in Saint-Elie, Thursday morning and the arrest of a woman after the discovery of over 2,000 plants.

"A week ago, we received information from Hydro-Sherbrooke indicating that there could be a problem with the meter," said Sherbrooke Police spokesperson René Dubreuil. "Our investigators arrived on site expecting a theft of service and quickly realized it was a hydroponic greenhouse."

In total, 2,215 cannabis plants were found in the basement of the house and a 52 year old female resident was arrested.

syrup. He will receive the remaining 15 per cent over the course of the next few years as the syrup is sold. The other payment plan sends cheques to producers in July, November and March and also withholds about 15 per cent of the money owed awaiting future sales."

The mission statement of the Fédération reads, in part, "The Federation of Quebec Maple Syrup Pro-

ducers was founded in 1966 with the mission of defending and promoting the economic, social and moral interests of its 7,400 maple businesses. These men and women are working together to collectively market their products. The quality of their work and their products has made Quebec the producer of close to 80 per cent of today's global maple syrup output.

Officials tight lipped about diversification fund

Six months after touting its future economic benefits, officials are still tight lipped about a \$50 million diversification fund promised for the area following the sudden cancellation of a government loan for the Jeffrey Mine.

"We hope to hear some news in about a week," said town manager Georges Andre Gagne. The Quebec government still has to approve the spending at the cabinet level."

Gagne's comment came a week after Asbestos mayor Hugues Grimard told The Record news of the fund would

be made public in mid-April. According to Francois Gouin, head of a local committee created to find ways to invest the fund, the money cannot be made public before a government decree is passed.

"We expect the decree will be passed in April, but we cannot divulge any news about it until then," he said in a report made public in late March.

"We believe the fund will give us the tools to help our local businesses and new companies that want to establish themselves here."

The fund was promised by Premier Pauline Marois last September after she cancelled a \$58 million loan to the local Jeffrey

asbestos mine. The loan would have encouraged a further investment from the private sector of \$25 million and created up to 400 new jobs. But the loan was made by the previous Liberal government last summer, two months before the Liberals were defeated by the Parti Quebecois in the Sept. 4 election. Marois argued Quebec should stop asbestos mining for health and environmental reasons.

The government has promised the fund will replace the jobs lost by the mine. But soon after it was promised, economic development minister Elaine Zakaib stipulated the fund would be dolled out slowly in \$10 million amounts over

five years. Local provincial assembly member Karine Vallieres has argued the five-year period is too long and slow to create effective economic benefits for the area.

"Why do we have to depend on this fund, when our government is supposed to have other economic stimulus programs for local businesses," she said.

"Why do we have to wait for special government decree for this money?"

Local businesses are also waiting to hear if the federal government will come through with the \$50 million aid package it promised last fall.

The promise was made by Industry minister Christian Par-

adis for both Asbestos and Thetford Mines after the Conservative government decided to allow the controversial fire-proof fibre be added to the Rotterdam Convention toxicity list.

Inclusion on the list means exporters have to warn their clients that their products are toxic and special precautions be made before they are shipped. The asbestos industry had long argued being on the list meant overseas clients would think twice before buying asbestos mined in Quebec.

Paradis official Alexandra Fortier has asked for patience in waiting for the package, arguing the money is not an "empty promise."

Status quo on water fluoridation issue in Richmond

While the wheels of government are reputed to turn slowly, on one issue at least, they spun with head-turning velocity.

On Feb. 12 a petition was submitted to the National Assembly asking that water fluoridation be abolished. A commission was appointed and on Apr. 22 and 23 it conducted two days of hearings on the issue. Eight days later, on May 1, the commission submitted its report.

The process was provoked, at least in part, by the Regroupe-

ment citoyen et citoyennes pour une eau saine à Richmond, and while the commission's recommendations are at least a little disappointing for the Richmond group, they also represent a partial victory.

Taxpayers should be pleased both with the rapidity with which the commission acted, and by the brevity of its report which uses only three pages to outline the context which led to the forming of the commission, notes the 31 briefs received, summarizes the submissions of the 10 individuals or groups who addressed the members of the commission, and presents

its five recommendations.

The commissioners (all elected officials) were faced with something of a dilemma. On the one hand they heard from anti-fluoridation groups which pointed to health and environmental risks associated with fluoridated water. These groups also pointed out that fluoridating drinking water infringes on the individual's right to accept or reject medication.

On the other hand, commissioners heard from those in favour of fluoridation who pointed out that dental cavities are a serious problem in Quebec and that the Order of Dentists

and Health Canada are both in favour of water fluoridation.

While it is unlikely that anybody will be entirely happy with the recommendations made by the commission, those recommendations reflect the fact that since the 1940s, fluoridation has been a deeply divisive issue in North America.

The commission's recommendations are:

- 1 That water fluoridation be neither imposed nor forbidden
- 2 That Quebec maintain its fluoridation program
- 3 That municipalities be encouraged to fluoridate their water while favouring a greater

social acceptability of the practice through education

4 That there be an awareness so as to follow the evolution of scientific study of this domain

5 That a regular follow-up of relevant findings be carried out and that this information be made available to the population and interested groups.

The commissioners chose to sit on the fence and refused to say aye or nay. The last two recommendations indicate that further study is necessary and that the population has to be kept abreast of scientific findings.

On the rocks...

As this merry month of May begins we get closer to being on the rocks! The UN Climate experts made it official: we are passing the 400 ppm mark in our race to emit even more greenhouse gases. Four hundred part per million...may sound, well, very small, but the last time there was that much carbon in the atmosphere, a mere 2 million years ago, life on earth was quite different and sea level was much, much higher. A couple of metres higher in fact.

The last time the average global temperature was two degrees above where we are now, roughly 12,000 years ago, there was a mile of ice over Southern Quebec and most of Canada.

But the ice melted away, we occupied the land northward. Then in the mid 19th century we got real serious about burning coal. Oil came shortly after and we have not relented since. As a result we went from 280 ppm's to 400 in a little over a century, and there is no telling where it will stop. Most experts agree that 450 probably will not be avoided and that 500 by the mid to late century is not an impossible level.

So this is where we are. This acceleration of global emissions will result in some immediate effects and others will follow suit. The total ice mass of the Antarctic has gone from close to 17,000 cubic kilometres to under 3,300 in the last thirty years. Unprecedented in this planet's history in this scale of time. This lost ice is not coming back anytime soon either. Where did it all go? Into the oceans mainly of course. In a curious twist this cold water is compensating for some of the extra warming the oceans are faced with because of their huge capacity to absorb a part of our extra emissions. The oceans expand

with this warming and of course with the added melting of the ice caps.

At some point there will be less and less ice to melt and then sea level rise could very well be in the order of a few feet over less than a century. On this planet's time scale, it's less than the blink of an eye.

So Greenland is increasingly on the rocks, the glaciers are disappearing at an alarming rate and cracks are appearing all over the place, leaving scientists in so much awe they make their calculations over and over because the numbers are surprisingly scary.

Reaching the 400 ppm mark is more of an alarm signal than an absolute number. The IPCC (International Panel on Climate Change) has sent out warning after warning that "we must act and reduce our carbone emissions as of now or else." There are more than 5,000 scientists on this task force. Most have remained silent to date. Others, like James Hansen have been quite outspoken. Hansen was so fed up with his government's attitude he quit his job as the head of NASA's Goddard Institute. He has hit the streets and you will hear and see a lot of him in the next little while.

The very frustrating negotiations on climate will move to Warsaw in November, and another attempt at getting our common climate mess in order will most likely make very little progress. One has to wonder how much rock we have to bare before we realize ice is essential in stopping this planet from overheating.

Apocalypse now?

Gwynne Dyer, my favourite read in The Record, explained "The third option," (April 25, 2013) which I understand to be, global warming Disaster A, has to be mixed with Disaster B, which means, "there is no money left to do anything about Disaster A."

Well, what is the third option? Is there a paragraph missing? In my book "option" is an alternative. Perhaps, there is no money?

Now I have had the displeasure to read about Canadian Finances in a recent Maclean's issue, dated March 4, 2013, that Canada has become a "Dead beat nation." While Canada's federal debt of \$660 billion looks reasonable with 36 per cent of its GDP, compared to its gross domestic product value, the US ratio is a whopping 72 per cent. However, by adding the growing budget deficits in all provinces, currently estimated to be \$589 billion, Canada as a whole has an incredible 86 per cent debt ratio to the national GDP.

That's not all: factor in all pension liabilities and debts of crown corporations (like Canada Post), the total Canadian debt ratio to GDP rises to 104 per cent. It is of little comfort that we are better off than Italy which has a 126 per cent debt ratio to its GDP. In the U.S.A. the debt load ranges from a mere minimum of 2 per cent in Tennessee to a maximum of 20 per cent in Massachusetts.

In a bold headline the article states: Ontario's relative debt load is where Greece was in the 1980s. At the current rate of spending, Canada

with all the provinces - would be bankrupt in 30 Years.

So far, my belief in the human enterprise to find solutions to fix problems in coming generations is not shaken. However, it only needs for human science to find proof of life extinction on one planet or another, indicative of the possibility of aging of planets' surface, with life support coming to an inevitable end. Once the radiating energy of a sun, providing life supporting conditions on its orbiting planets is diminished, these planets will turn their surface into dust bowls or into an ice crust. In any event, that is still billions of years away. Scientists have not been able to accurately tell us when the end for civilisation on earth will run its course, independently of running out of money.

The ancient prophets had it right, that there will be an ending called Apocalypse. Only God, the Intelligent Designer, will know - if and when, the end is intended to happen.

Which is worth more – a t-shirt or a human life?

Every person rescued alive from the ruins of the garment factory in Bangladesh is reason for celebration. How could we not be glad in empathy with those who were saved and their families? Human society has its benevolent side at times. I wonder though, what mixture of our relief is because we believe, "it didn't turn out to be as bad as we had feared?" Do our feelings of sympathy and relief blunt both the magnitude of the tragedy and our sense of complicity in it?

Sweat shops, work mills and other dangerous, dehumanizing work conditions aren't new so this kind of event isn't new either. We might harken back to Asian workers blasting rock for our railroads or the textile factories and work houses of Victorian England but that wouldn't go back far enough into human history. The crumbled ruins of the Roman, Greek and Egyptian empires were made possible because vulnerable people gave their lives for the grand ambitions of the powerful.

The modern age gives us immediate access to images and reports of disasters like the one in Bangladesh. Such scenes of the reckless endangerment of men,

women and children are repeated over and over again in other workplaces far from our peering eyes or scrutiny. This while we continue to buy, wear and eat their products at bargain basement prices.

The public reaction to this "tragedy" is telling. Loblaw chairman Galen Weston is reported to have been "deeply shaken by the events." He will offer compensation to families of victims. This of course is our typical response to things like this. Give our victims some money. We'll feel better and we expect that they will too. This multi-billion dollar business and its directors won't have to sacrifice very much compared with the families of their dead and wounded employees but when we feel that dollars represent our highest good we can't imagine how exchanging dollars for lives isn't the best we can do. Apparently Mr. Weston was shaken not stirred.

A retailer spokesman from another company has, "called for government action" in view of the 427 deaths. This is an astonishing act of hand washing on the retailers' parts. Oh how helpless they must feel since obviously, in their eyes, they are forced to support such wretched conditions because of government indifference and the real-

ities of competition in the marketplace.

Another retailer spokesman, Vincent Trius, said that he hated to mix the tragedy of the situation with comments about sales. Nevertheless he noted that the consumers have not slowed in buying the products. "The bottom line" is the thing that will determine their ethics and the value they place on the lives that were lost.

Listen to the rationalizations that come up so readily around any similar situation. If our company did all our manufacturing at home our competitors would soon out compete us and we would go bankrupt. Thousands of our employees would be out of work and shareholders would lose millions. After all, our economy is based on growth so aggressive cost cutting is necessary for economic and national health and the public good.

Also, they point out, our consumers expect affordable prices. They want to maintain their lifestyles and to be able to stay current with fashion and technology. So what we're doing is demanded of us. In effect it is a public service.

Finally, the investment being made in developing nations by establishing factories and creating jobs is good for them and

they want it. Even though our foreign employees are paid far less than they are here and must work in worse conditions by our standards, they feel lucky to have this kind of work and an income. Millions of dollars are being injected into their economies and they are growing. We can congratulate ourselves for being so benevolent.

Since growth and the ability to consume is our highest value – ask our customers – we are actually providing a needed service all around and we are the good guys. Blame construction standards. Blame foremen and plant managers. Blame governments. Don't blame us.

It is, of course, easy for us to pass the buck of blame to big corporations like Loblaw one moment and then pass them our consumer bucks a few moments later in exchange for their products. Seeing no hypocrisy in our transaction we expect rock bottom prices without our having to do one thing to change the situation. It's their plant. It's their problem. Just give me a good price. I deserve happiness and happiness requires lots of stuff.

Without paying any attention I've bought shares in the culture that kills factory workers in Bangladesh. "Tragedy," "disaster" and "unfortunate

event" do not describe the reality of the situation. "Crime" would be closer. Even "evil" would be better. How about "murder?"

Yes, I am guilty. No, I am not the one who forced workers back inside cracking walls. No, I am not making millions of dollars off the suffering of others. Nevertheless, I participate in and benefit from a society that is willing to risk the death of human beings so that it can sell me a cheaper T-shirt.

What does repentance mean for people like me? It means checking the labels before I buy. It means purchasing "fair trade" when I can. It means not buying things that aren't necessary. It means acting and speaking for justice. It means being alert to the persuasive carnival barkers and hucksters of my society that appeal so much to my willing greed.

We need to hear the voices of prophets like Amos who once said, "Thus says the LORD: 'For three transgressions and for four, I will not revoke the punishment, because they sell the righteous for silver and the needy for a pair of sandals.'" This kind of voice won't be popular, though, will it?

Will I listen? Time will tell the next time I pull out my credit card.

The road to the 2013 Canada Games Ruth Atto: Dedicated all the way

Ruth Atto is a Bronze volunteer for the Sherbrooke Canada Games.

"I didn't want to work for administration and I didn't want to work for athletics, so the committee put me in hospitality and welcoming," says Atto in a phone interview. "I love that because I can use my bilingualism and my nursing background if anything happens. I don't have my nursing license anymore, but I do have background knowledge."

Atto will be welcoming families of athletes and making sure they feel comfortable in the region. "In some areas I will be their first contact, which is fine by me."

Atto registered to be a volunteer the moment she heard that Sherbrooke would be hosting the Canada Games. "This is going to be a wonderful opportunity for the city, which has so much to offer, such as history," notes Atto. "I wanted to volunteer to represent the city but also because Tom Allen, the CEO of the Sherbrooke Canada Games, is a personal friend of mine."

When asked what the volunteer hopes to get out of the Games, Atto laughs. "Call it selfishness. I'd like to get to know more people. When I was a nurse, I used to always have contacts and keep up with my contacts. Now I hope to meet people from around the country."

Atto volunteers quite a lot. "I volunteer at the CHUS (Centre Hospitalier Universitaire de Sherbrooke), because when the Sherbrooke hospital became a long-term care facility, everyone had to go to the university hospital, which is mostly Francophone. The rector of the university hospital suggested that volunteers visit English patients at this hospital, to provide some conversation, that kind of thing. So half a dozen of us volunteered. I volunteer at Fleurimont once a week and sometimes I go to the Hotel-Dieu hospital," explains Atto.

Although Atto has a Syrian background, she was born in Thetford Mines and raised in Sherbrooke. "My people originally came from Mesopotamia. My parents were born in Mardin, a city in southeastern Turkey. But then my mother moved to Canada when she was 12 and my father moved when he was 17. They met here in Canada. I would speak English at school and French or Arabic at home with my grandmother, which is great since I am fully bilingual for the Games. But I really grew up in this region," concludes Atto.

When asked if she is athletic, Atto hesitates before explaining, "I love to watch teams play, like baseball. I remember sneaking down to the arena to watch hockey games. I wouldn't say I am athletic but I do play golf. I will be very versatile during the Games, ready to watch any game along with the families. It is going to be fun," says Ruth Atto.

Equiterre: Fresh from the farm to your table

Equiterre announced the launch of its organic food basket season for the Eastern Townships once again this year.

The consumer supported agriculture (CSA) program will give Townshippers the opportunity to support a local farm by purchasing a share in the harvest at the beginning of the growing season. Shareholders will receive a basket weekly, containing a variety of fresh, locally grown, organic vegetables made available close to their home or place of work. Twelve farms will deliver organic baskets to 28 drop-off points in several of the region's municipalities, including Sherbrooke, Magog, Asbestos and Cookshire-Eaton.

Supporting CSA contributes to preserving the vitality and sustainability of Quebec's rural areas. Isabelle St-Germain, Equiterre's deputy director and head of food projects pointed out, "Not only do you get delicious produce grown without synthetic pesticides, but by ordering baskets from one of our family farmers, you are taking a concrete step toward supporting local farming and the local economy." This year, close to 35,000 will receive baskets from the network of family farms.

Based on the individual farms' offerings, people can choose from baskets for one person, two people or a family. Most farms offer a swap basket that allows substitutions to be made. St-Germain mentioned that people would undoubtedly be introduced to unfamiliar produce at some point, but that recipes and cooking instructions would be made available to help shareholders learn about new food and discover new favourites. Arrangements can also be made for people who go on summer vacation. Subscriptions can usually be paid in several installments. The average cost for an entire season (12 to 22 weeks, depending on the farm), is approximately \$350. In addition to vegetables, several farmers also offer a variety of other fresh, local products at

their drop-off points, including eggs, bread, herbs and cheese. It is also possible to order meat from livestock farms.

The farms in the network are bio diverse, offering a variety of produce, and are either certified organic, or transition farms, meaning the practices are organic, and they are moving towards certification. St-Germain noted that organic farms with single or limited crops are welcome to contribute as associate farmers. She also said that young farmers can be linked with more experienced farmers, to improve their knowledge and skill set.

Johanne Breton is a family farmer with the Ferme des Jardins Naturlutte in Ulverton. Her farm will grow roughly 30 different types of produce throughout the season. The farm will sell the produce at the Marche Locavore in Racine, and with the CSA program, the farm's target is 180 shareholders.

"Most people don't come from a farming background," she said. "People that take a share get to meet the farmer and learn about the process." Breton described the direct connection between shareholder and farmer as "putting a human face on your vegetables." Breton boasted an eighty per cent return rate for shareholders at her farm.

For the past five years, Equiterre has been developing partnerships with local businesses. For the third year, Cascades Inc. will serve as a drop-off point at its five townships locations. Carl Blanchet, corporate director of innovation and sustainable development at Cascades, explained the motivation for the partnership is to "improve the quality of life of our employees at work by giving them easy access to healthy food. This commitment is also a way for us to help promote sustainable development in the region."

In addition to the CSA program, Equiterre fosters social movements by holding conferences and information sessions encouraging individuals, organizations and governments to make ecological and equitable choices.

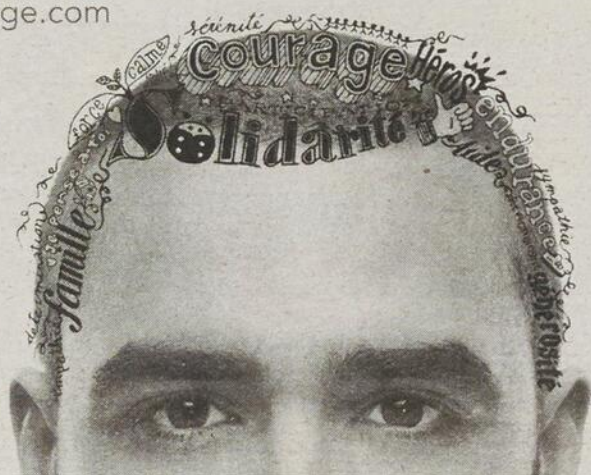

Considered the greatest country singer of all time

George Jones' music often fuelled by personal pain

George Jones, the voice of country music, famous for his distinctive voice and phrasing, passed away in Nashville on April 26, at the age of 81. He was considered the greatest country singer of all time.

In late 2012, Jones announced his farewell tour, which was to conclude with a sold-out, star-packed show at Nashville's Bridgestone Arena on November 22, 2013. Alan Jackson, Garth Brooks, Randy Travis, Charlie Daniels, Kenny Rogers, and many others were set to perform at Jones' Bridgestone show.

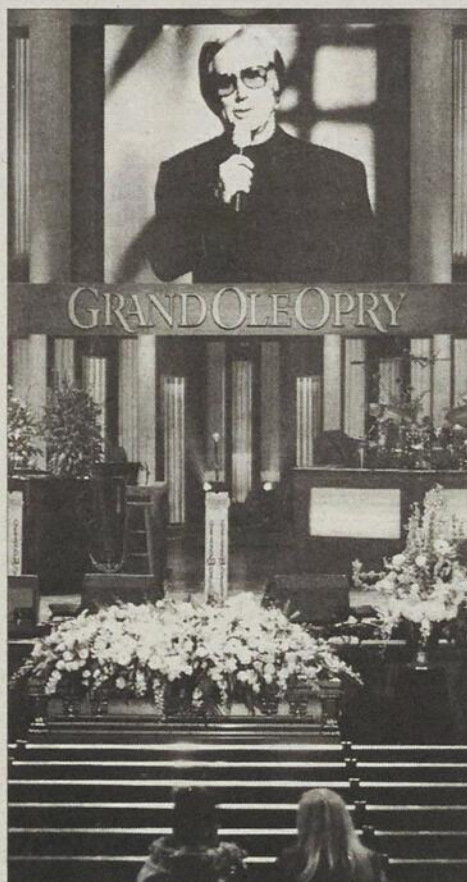
George Jones was admitted to a Nashville hospital Thursday, April 18 for observation following a routine checkup. The 81-year-old country legend was running a slight fever with irregular blood pressure but word is he died of respiratory failure.

Nicknamed "The Possum" for his resemblance to the animal, George Jones recorded more than 150 albums and became an icon of traditional country music.

Jones was also country music's finest stylist. He wrote or collaborated on some of his songs early in his career, including hits like "Just One More," "What Am I Worth," "Color of the Blues," and "The Window Up Above," but he later gave up songwriting.

Jones is the most important and influential singer in country music history. He was the singer of enduring country music hits including "She Thinks I Still Care," "The Grand Tour," "Walk Through This World With Me," and "He Stopped Loving Her Today," the latter of which is often at the top of industry lists of the greatest country music singles of all time.

12, 1931 in east Texas. His early life was marked by poverty and a violent, alcoholic father. Young Jones taught himself to play guitar, and by the time he was a teenager he was singing on the streets and in the clubs of Beaumont, Texas, not far from his birthplace of Saratoga.

After a quick marriage and service in the US Marines, Jones was discovered by Starday Records co-owner Pappy Daily, who guided his early career. His first single, 1954's "No Money in This Deal," failed to chart. It was the year he married his second wife, Shirley Corley, whom he would divorce in 1968.

But 1955's "Why, Baby, Why" was a hit, beginning a remarkable string of success. By 1959, Jones had already become a drinker. "White Lightning," a No. 1 country hit in 1959, required 83 takes because Mr. Jones was drinking through

the session.

On the road, he also began missing shows because he was too drunk to perform. In his turbulent days, Jones was given the unflattering nickname "No Show Jones" due to his penchant for missing concerts.

His career was doing great. In 1962 he recorded one of his signature songs, "She Thinks I Still Care," which was nominated for a Grammy Award. But he was still drinking more than ever, at one point his wife hid the keys to all his cars, so he drove his lawn mower into Beaumont to a liquor store — an incident he would later commemorate in a song and in music videos. The divorce came soon after that.

He had met a rising country singer, Tammy Wynette, in 1966, and they fell in love while on tour together. They were married in 1969; it was Jones' third marriage.

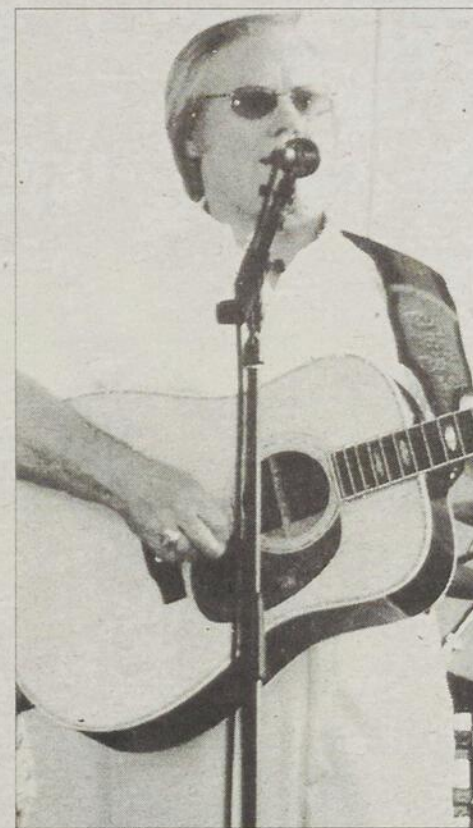
In 1971 he signed a contract with Epic Records, which was also Wynette's label, and the couple began recording duets produced by Billy Sherrill. Three of Jones' duets with Wynette — "We're Gonna Hold On," "Golden Ring" and "Near You" — were No. 1 country hits.

Jones recorded more than 168 charting singles, more than any other artist in any format in the history of popular music. By the time "Golden Ring" and "Near You" hit in 1976, Jones and Wynette were divorced, and Jones was still battling personal demons.

His solo career slowed down until 1980, when he recorded "He Stopped Loving Her Today," a ballad penned by Curly Putman and Bobby Braddock. This moving ballad revived a flagging career, and Jones won the CMA's top male vocalist award in 1980 and 1981.

He also earned a Grammy for best male country vocal performance. Wynette and Jones were divorced in 1975; the two albums Jones released in 1976 were called *The Battle*, and *Alone Again*.

But duets by Jones and Wynette continued to be released until 1980. They made a new album, *Together Again*, in 1980, including the hit "Two Story House." The two artists would reunite to tour and record again in the mid 1990s. Jones has been credited as an inspiration and influence upon countless country artists.

In 1983, Jones married the former Nancy Ford Sepulvado. The union, he repeatedly said, began his rehabilitation from drugs and alcohol and prolonged his life. He signed with MCA Records in 1990 and began a successful run of hits.

He remained a force in music until his death, playing hundreds of shows in the new century and collecting the nation's highest arts award, the Kennedy Center Honor for lifetime achievement, in 2008.

Jones' contributions to country music are undeniable, and his music was often fuelled by personal pain and loss. Part of the appeal of his poignant music was that it came from a very real and personal place. This is why he was able to keep the love and respect from his peers and fans.

His baritone voice and his unique phrasing that brought suspense to every syllable will remain in our mind and hearts forever. He leaves behind his wife Nancy, a daughter (from the first marriage), two sons (from his second marriage) and finally a daughter he had with Wynette.

Good Reads

This week, a handful of discoveries on Lennoxville Library shelves that don't fit into easy categories.

Start with celebrating the weekend! Here's the tale of a boy and a piggy, and the Saturdays they spend together. The *Adventures of Max and Pinky: Best Buds*, by Maxwell Eaton III (2007, blue dot) takes place on the one Saturday that Pinky can't be found.

Max goes on a quest to find his lost pal.

Be warned: do not read this book unless you love marshmallows. Do not read this book unless you have a bag of marshmallows next to you. And do not read this book unless the bag is open.

Next, something of a far more serious nature. Indeed, the main character is no longer breathing. He is kaput. A corpse, a carcass, a cadaver.

There can be no confusion: The Composer Is Dead. He is, in fact, decomposing. This short orchestral whodunit was

written (in 2009, filed with a yellow dot) by the inestimable Lemony Snicket, author of *A Series Of Unfortunate Events* and the more recent *All The Wrong Questions*.

The Inspector must discover who murdered the poor Composer, and sets out to test the motives and alibis of the usual suspects – the instruments. (The snooty Violins deny involvement, noting that killing the composer would force them out of the orchestra to find work – ugh – “at square dances or in romantic restaurants.”)

You can go through this book on your own, or listen to the CD's ominously scored version, as read by Snicket himself. Each instrument is introduced and featured in turn. The story on CD lasts a half-hour – and it features extra narrative. Perfect for a rainy day, mixing a bit of music education with mystery.

The illustrations are by Carson Ellis, and music on the accompanying CD is by Nathaniel Stookey.

Writer Francesca Lia Block's *Weetzie Bat* is looking for something completely different. Or someone.

The straight Weetzie and her best friend Dirk are modern young people who dress for the 1950s, and are both looking for the man of their dreams. Both fall for the wrong ones.

“I just want my Secret Agent Lover Man,” Weetzie said to Dirk.

“Love is a dangerous angel,” Dirk said.

This Young Adult novel is a fairy tale for the older crowd, full of genies and magic and surfers, and set in the culture factory of Los Angeles. The writing is ex-



quisite. Weetzie's dad (divorced) is on the other side of the country, “But she really couldn't live in New York, where the subways made her nerves feel like a charm bracelet of plastic skeletons jangling on a chain.”

New Democrat MP Olivia Chow writing a memoir

New Democrat MP Olivia Chow is writing a memoir to be published in early 2014.

HarperCollins Canada says the wife of late federal NDP leader Jack Layton will tell for the first time in the book “the many stories that make up her private and public life.”

Chow was 13 when her middle-class family moved from Hong Kong to Toronto, where her parents grew frustrated with the job opportunities available to them.

After studying fine art and philosophy at university, Chow became a school

trustee and Toronto city councillor.

She met Layton in the early 1980s and the two were married from '88 until his death in 2011.

HarperCollinsCanada says the memoir will be published early next year.

“My story is like so many Canadians. It's a story of challenges and loss but also the story of finding my home in a country and community that has given me so much,” Chow said in a statement issued on Wednesday.

“My journey has convinced me that each of us has the power to make a difference, and that by sharing our stories, we learn, we heal and we focus our dreams.”

Beam us up Quentin

I am very fortunate to have skilled and talented people on the STOP! production team. Sometimes, it's as if they beam down from out of nowhere. Such is the case with our latest crew member,

Quentin Meek.

He worked as a sound engineer in Montreal at Studio Six from 1971 to 1976 and at the time I was recording with my band Oliver Klaus in the same studio. Somehow we never got to meet.

The interesting thing about Quentin is that he is multifaceted. He's an electrical engineer (Concordia 1986), inventor (first programmable drum machine used by Gilles Valiquette and Bertrand Gosselin), audio engineer, musician (drums, trumpet, blues harp, vocals), and a family man living in Foster.

He had encountered life in the Townships through his work on records with Bertrand Gosselin (Jim et Bertrand) in the early '80s at Gosselin's house in Coaticook, acquiring as he likes to say "...a

good feel for the beauty and creativity in the Eastern Townships.

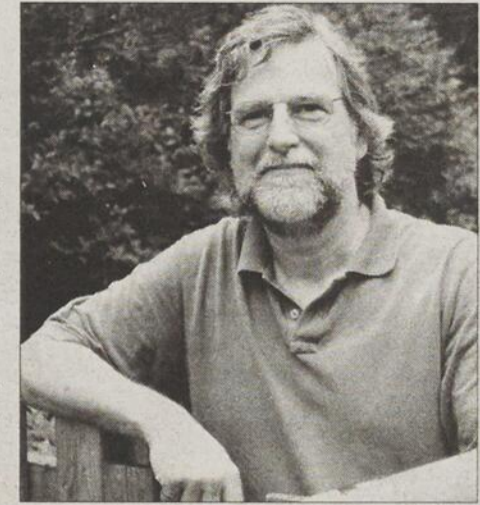
"My wife and I found a 155-year-old house in Ville de Lac-Brome, fell in love with the area and moved in in 2011," recounts Quentin.

After his days at Studio Six he went freelance working the main local Quebec studios (Son Quebec, Tempo, Morin Heights etc.) and also in Toronto, Calgary, Los Angeles, New York. During this time (1971-1983) he had recorded/mixed about 80 projects, mostly LPs.

Having worked in the recording industry during the golden era of the 1970s, Quentin understands firsthand the changes that have taken place since the beginning of the digital age.

"It is cheaper to make records today and they sound a lot better," explains Quentin. "Some people love to hear the tape/tube/transistor distortion and use these colours in their mixes (I do) but the great thing is now we have the choice."

Continuing Quentin points out: "Today's low cost of a home recording setup means that almost anyone can make music and immediately provide the result to the world with SoundCloud, YouTube etc. This is good for those who have talent since the old barriers of cost and big record companies are gone. We have seen examples of artists who probably would never have been heard 30-40 years ago 'make-it' on

YouTube. It also means that we are flooded with lots of less than memorable work. Not sure if the good/bad ratio has changed."

When asked about being part of our crew, Quentin explains: "I really love doing audio for video work and I'm thrilled to be able to work with the STOP! team capturing some amazing live music. Music videos are table stakes for artists today. This is a great service that most artists could not afford to do on their own."

'The Young and the Restless,' 'General Hospital' top Daytime Emmy nominees

YouTube earns three nominations

CBS' soap "The Young and the Restless" earned a leading 23 Daytime Emmy nominations on Wednesday, including three of the four competitors for best actor, while ABC rival "General Hospital" had 19 nominations.

The 40th annual Daytime Emmy awards will be held June 16 in Beverly Hills, Calif., televised for the second year on the cable network HLN. Nominations were announced Wednesday.

PBS' venerable children's show "Sesame Street" earned 17 nominations, including one for Kevin Clash, who played the Elmo character and resigned last November amid allegations that he sexually abused underage boys. Clash's lawyer has said that related lawsuits filed against Clash are without merit. Clash, who was nominated for outstanding performer in a children's series, played Elmo for 28 years and already has 23 Daytime Emmy awards.

Top actor nominees are Peter Bergman, Doug Davidson and Michael Muhney of "The Young and the Restless" and Jason Thompson of "General Hospital."

Nominated for top actor in a daytime drama were Susan Flannery and Heather Tom of "The Bold and the Beautiful"; Peggy McCay of "Days of Our Lives" and Michelle Stafford of "The Young and the Restless."

Kelly Ripa will have a chance for a repeat award with a different co-host this year. Victoriaville's Bergeron and Fortier receive Cascades bursaries

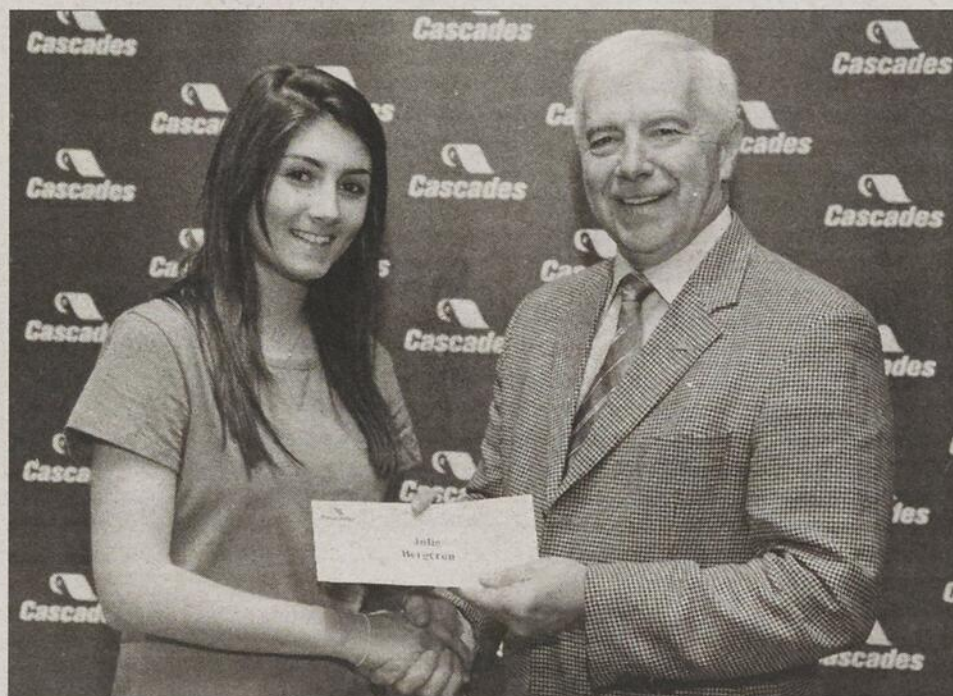

Sherbrooke ProGym Juniors set for 2013 season

The Sherbrooke ProGym Junior AA baseball club will be looking for a triple-crown season when their 2013 campaign kicks off on Sunday, May 12. The ProGym, who won the Rive-Sud Metro league title in 2009 and 2011, won the regular-season pennant last season, before falling to the Ste-Thérèse Voltigeurs in the league final series. The ProGym have made four appearances in the league final in their five-year history.

Jonathan Breton, the team's manager and the 2012 league Manager of the Year, was excited about the team's prospects for the coming season.

sition of Nelson Ercia and Alexandre Paquette, who played with the Sherbrooke A's Midget AAA squad, as well as with the Ailes du Québec, along with William Roy, Justin Bossé and Mathieu Roy, who had strong performances for the A's at the Midget AA level.

While there is relative stability on the field, there has been a change at the top, as the club introduced Michael Innes as their new president. Innes is a long-time volunteer who has been involved with numerous sports organizations in the Eastern Townships.

The ProGym will play a 35-game schedule this year in the 13-team RSM league, an increase of three over their 2012 slate. They open their schedule on Sunday, May 12 as they host the Granby Guerriers at the Amédée-Roy stadium. They will have a busy first week as home, as they host Drummondville the following Tuesday, and Longueuil on Wednesday. Opening night will include several promotions for Mother's Day.

With Amédée-Roy becoming unavailable during the Canada Games later this summer, the ProGym's home schedule is front-loaded, making their last regular-season home game July 14, before they embark on a month-long season-ending road trip.

Their first road game will be on Sunday, May 19, against the Voltigeurs, which will also be the league's "ceremonial" opening game. Ste-Thérèse makes only one trip to Sherbrooke, on Saturday, June 15.

Hesjedal prepares to defend Giro title

Ryder Hesjedal may be a marked man at this year's Giro d'Italia, but the Canadian cyclist says he has never been more relaxed.

Hesjedal will try to become the first rider to win back-to-back Giro titles since Spain's Miguel Indurain in 1991 and 1992 when the iconic race begins Saturday in Naples, Italy.

Hesjedal was considered a strong rider heading into last year's 95th running of the race — he was fifth at the 2010 Tour de France — but he was still an outsider in a field of top European racers that included two-time winner Ivan Basso and defending champion Michele Scarponi.

Undaunted, the Victoria native stayed in the mix with consistent performances in each stage and took the pink jersey on the race's final day, becoming the first Canadian to win a Grand Tour event and the second non-European to win the Giro.

Hesjedal won't be flying under the radar this year, and the likes of 2012 Tour de France winner and Olympic gold medallist Bradley Wiggins and Italian favourite Vincenzo Nibali will be gunning for him. But Hesjedal has been buoyed by his preparation for the gruelling 21-stage race, which finishes in Brescia on May 26.

Aria Tesolin is no ordinary Canadian teenager. The 19-year-old Toronto native is extraordinarily talented, well grounded and beautiful. But what really sets her apart is a level of maturity to take her success in stride while knowing the importance of keeping healthy and fit on a daily basis. 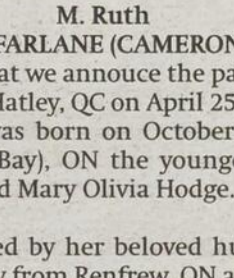

Annie's Mailbox

Dear Annie: My husband and I have a blended family with his two girls and my three sons. I am so grateful that we both took on this challenge.

We had some good times, and we had some bad times, and when I say bad, I mean horrible. Our children are all adults now, and we are still butting heads over them, mostly my boys. He has given up on two of my sons because he says they don't respect him, not to mention some less than legal activity they decided to embark on in our home while we were on vacation.

But, Annie, I feel as if he has never really cared for them. I try to help them with rides or letting them wash clothes at our house or whatever I can do. People mature at different levels, and maybe I help too much, but they are my kids. At what point am I supposed to turn my back on them? My husband says that because I help them against his wishes, it means I love them more than him. That isn't true.

One son is homeless and has to look for a place to stay every night. That breaks my heart. My husband found him downstairs sleeping one morning and told me that I'd better get him out or he would call the police. He won't even allow me to let my son shower here.

I realize the boys need to make it on their own, but am I supposed to turn my back on them when they need help? At what point do you give up on your kids and choose your husband instead? I feel like such a horrible mom. — Worried for Them

Dear Worried: Your husband should not be issuing ultimatums wherein you must choose between the man you love and the children you love. This is unfair and creates tremendous resentment. Your husband may have good cause to want the kids out of the house, but it's difficult to do when they have no place to go. How old are they? Do they have jobs? Would you temporarily assist with their rent if it got them out of the house? Are there substance-abuse issues that need treatment? Try Because I Love You (bily.org), and ask your husband to work with you on this.

Dear Annie: I am one of five siblings. My brother was married last fall in a small ceremony that was put together quickly so my mother could be there before she died. He is having a celebration of his marriage later this summer, and the party is being held in another state on the day before my wedding anniversary.

My brother's party would require travel, hotel and

meals. My husband and I have already booked (and paid for) a nonrefundable weekend getaway and made arrangements with his parents to watch our kids. We did this three months before my brother sent out his save-the-date cards.

How do I break the news to my brother? I should add that I am rarely included in anything the rest of the family does, and I worry that if I miss this event, I will never be included in anything again. — Little Sis

Dear Sis: Call your brother and let him know you have a conflict. Tell him you are heartbroken to miss his party and wish you could find a way out of your nonrefundable reservations, but it's not possible. Then send him a lovely wedding gift to make up for your absence. These things happen. There's nothing more you can do.

Dear Annie: This is for "N.N.," whose husband is depressed. Please tell her to have him tested for celiac disease. Depression is one of the symptoms.

The best sites and apps make finding savings fast and fun. ShopSmart, the shopping magazine from the publisher of Consumer Reports, suggests trying these:

SAVE ONLINE
— CouponNetwork.com. This site offers two ways to save. First, print manufacturer

coupons that you can tote to the grocery store. Then receive YourBucks vouchers when you purchase featured items, which can be spent like cash on future purchases. You'll also get additional exclusive coupons at checkout.

— CouponPal.com. Not finding great deals? Head here for online codes that you probably won't find anywhere else. CouponPal.com partners with thousands of sites to give you exclusive savings. And you don't need to sign up or give your contact information.

— CouponsForChange.org. This site is a

project of Coupons.com. For every three coupons that are printed and redeemed, the company provides one free meal to a child living in poverty via Feeding America. There were almost 300 coupons on ShopSmart's last visit, some very substantial, including one from DiGiorno (buy two pizzas, get one free).

— Reclip.It. This site is like Pinterest for savings, making easy work of organizing, saving and sharing your favorite coupons. Follow your friends and favorite bloggers to see (and use) their clips. The displayed weekly sales circulars link deals with printable and online coupons.

— ZenDeals.com. It's a scenario that trips up even the savviest online shopper: You enter a promo code at checkout only to have it rejected. This site aims to make that annoyance a distant memory. Search what it says is the deepest inventory of verified codes on the Internet; the site guarantees that every one will work.

SAVE ON THE GO
— Entertainment Membership Coupons (entertainment.com). Yep, it's that thick Entertainment Book gone mobile. And the app does the book one better: It uses your location (or any address) to find nearby spots offering deals. ShopSmart found thousands, including two-for-one museum passes and

20 percent off at a spa. One bummer: Some companies require coupon printouts. Works on Android, Apple and BlackBerry. (It's free to download but requires a \$30/year membership fee to redeem deals.)


— Mobile coupons by Shopular (shopularapp.com). This app uses "geo-fencing," which means it serves up special coupons when you're close to your favorite stores. So there's no more frantically searching your email account for codes as you approach the register. Stores include Banana Republic and Bath & Body Works. Works on Android and Apple.

— Roximity (roximity.com). This new app alerts you to coupons in your area, including those for restaurants, stores and auto-repair shops. Valpak offers are among the deals. You can specify the types of coupons you want to receive and how frequently. Works on Apple.

— Ibotta (ibotta.com). This app turns your phone into a focus group of one: Take polls, watch videos and read up on products you use. After you shop, take a photo of your receipt. The company claims you can earn \$20 or more for every grocery shopping trip. The money is deposited into your linked PayPal account, or you can donate it to a school. The app works at dozens of stores, including Giant Eagle, Kroger, Safeway and Wal-Mart. Works on Android and Apple.

— SnipSnap (snipsnap.it). Leave your stack of store coupons at home! This app turns paper coupons into digital ones. Just take a photo, and you're good to go. It alerts you when deals are about to expire and makes it easy to share the wealth with friends (and use their coupons, too). So far, ShopSmart has found that it's best for store coupons (\$5 off a \$35 apparel or accessories purchase at Target, anyone?). It doesn't yet support manufacturer coupons or supermarket redemption. Works on Android and Apple.

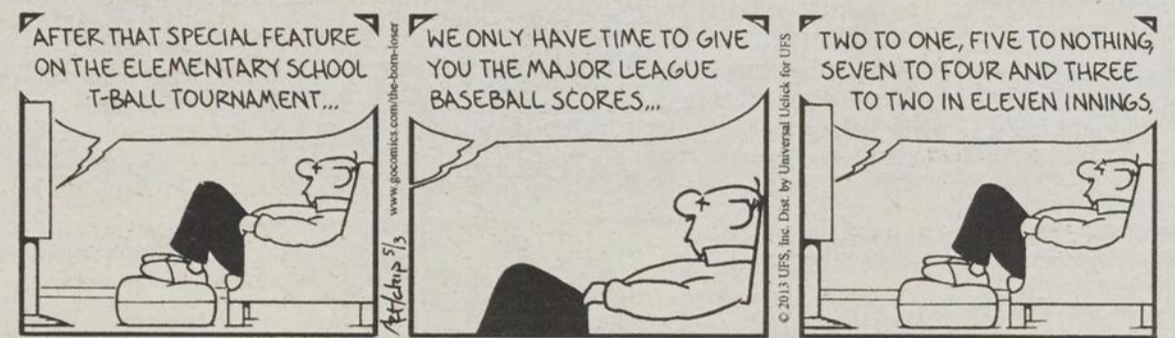

The fourth suit rides to the rescue

Looking up a quotation including "fourth," I came upon this comment by James Bryce, an English diplomat and author who died in 1922: "Three-fourths of the mistakes a man makes are made because he does not really know what he thinks he knows." That gave me pause. What's the problem?

No Englishman would say "three-fourths," he would say "three-quarters." The quotation has been "translated." How is that relevant to this deal? All will be revealed.

Look at the South hand and bidding sequence. What should South rebid?

He has no clear-cut call. He wants to get to game, but has no idea which one. He solves the problem by rebidding two diamonds, fourth-suit game-forcing. It is artificial and asks partner to do something descriptive. Usually, responder wants to get to three no-trump, but does not have a stopper in the fourth suit; or he hopes partner can show three-card support for his five-card major; or both.

Here, North continues with two spades, and South jumps to four spades. (Yes, North might have rebid two spades, not two clubs.)

West leads the diamond king, then shifts to a low club. How should South continue?

Declarer should take trick two with his ace, ruff a diamond, play a spade to his ace (getting the bad news), and ruff his last diamond. He then plays off dummy's top hearts and top clubs. East ruffs the last top club and leads a diamond, but South ruffs low and exits with a low spade to get two more trump tricks with his king and jack over East's queen. He takes four spades, two hearts, two clubs and two diamond ruffs.

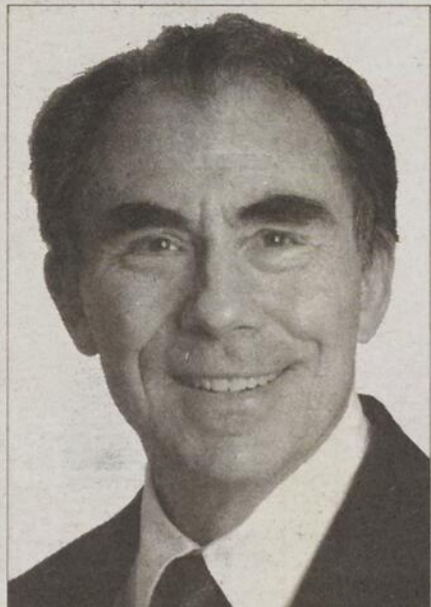

CRP blood test is not of use to everyone



ASK DOCTOR K

DEAR DOCTOR K: The last time I had blood work, my doctor didn't check my CRP level. Wouldn't my CRP level have given him a better idea of my risk of heart disease?

DEAR READER: You ask a good — and controversial — question. Let me say up front that this test has been developed and studied by a colleague of mine at Harvard Medical School, and revenue from the test comes to my colleague and to the hospital where I practice.

Also, I'm talking only about the use of the CRP test to screen for future heart disease in people who are not known to have heart disease. I'm not talking about using the test in people who already have heart disease.

The C-reactive protein (CRP) blood test measures inflammation in the body. What does that have to do with heart disease? We now know that many heart attacks and strokes occur because cholesterol-rich plaques of atherosclerosis rupture. When that happens, blood clots form that can cut off the blood supply to part of the heart or brain. Plaques rupture because of inflammation inside them.

Many studies have shown that the CRP test does, indeed, help estimate a person's risk for heart disease. The question is whether the test should be used in everyone and how much additional information it gives.

A recent article in the New England Journal of Medicine found that checking CRP levels may not tell us much about cardiovascular disease risk after all, at least in the average person. The review article looked at 52 studies that included 240,000 people. The researchers added the CRP results to standard risk factors, such as diabetes or high cholesterol. Using all of this information, they classified people by their risk of cardiovascular disease and whether they needed preventive treatment.

It turned out that the CRP tests would have prevented only one heart attack or stroke for every 400 to 500 people screened. In other words, the CRP test added little information about cardiovascular disease risk, beyond what the standard risk factors already showed, in the average person.

Several authoritative groups recommend that the test be performed in people who are at intermediate risk for heart disease based on other risk factors: high blood pressure (hypertension), smoking, high levels of LDL cholesterol, diabetes, or close relatives who have developed heart disease at a young age.

The logic in this recommendation is straightforward. If you are at high risk, according to these other risk factors, knowing your CRP level won't change your doctor's advice; you really need to eliminate these risk factors to protect your health.

And if you are at low risk, according to these other risk factors, finding that you have a high CRP level won't lead to any additional testing or treatment that is likely to help protect you. But if you're at intermediate risk, knowing your CRP level can be valuable.

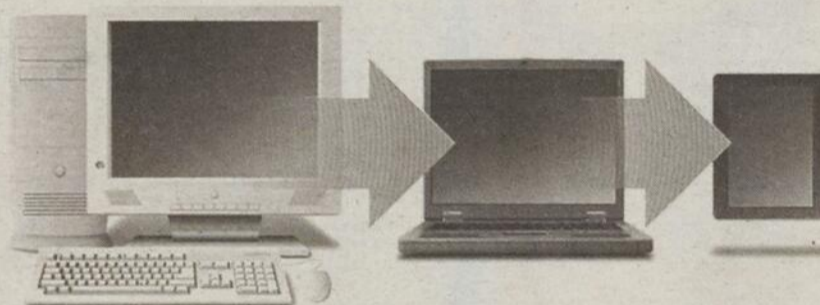
