RUSSIAN SEAL PROTECTION. Chicago, October 11.—A special from San Francisco, California, Nicholas A. Grevenitsky, of the Russian seal industry, whose home is on Behring Island, is now on his way to Washington, with the draft of a new treaty aiming at the regulation of the seal industry. There are ninety of these seal islands, located two hundred miles from the Asiatic coast, and the governor resides three hundred miles from Kamohaska City. The treaty which he will present to the President through the Russian Minister, establishes a thirty mile limit, and provides for a strict patrol system.

ANTI-MASONIC CONGRESS. London, October 14.—The anti-Masonic Congress at Trent was attended by 800 people. Of those more than 600 were in holy orders. The lay element, which it was hoped would be numerous, was but scantily represented. No fewer than twenty-eight archbishops and bishops promised to attend, but only twelve put in an appearance. Mr. Valasi, Bishop of Trent, made the introductory speech. It was resolved, besides other things, that wherever the Freemasons had founded charitable institutions their example should be followed by the Catholics.

DROPPED BUSHEL'S NAME. Concord, N. H., October 14.—At the seventh annual meeting of the Concord & Montreal Railroad here, the directors dropped the name of the late Governor Busiel, as they said they could not recommend to the stockholders for election as director a man who publicly declared that he favored a policy which is prejudicial and injurious to the interests of the corporation and its property. Views were expressed by Busiel in an interview favorable to electric railways.

RIVERS-WILSON UPHOLDS HAYS. Grand Trunk Shareholders Adopt the Report.

ALL OPPOSITION TO ITS PROVISIONS VOTED DOWN. Interesting Announcement About Canadian Coal Duty. (By Cable from the Star's Special Correspondent in London.) London, October 14.—The Grand Trunk half yearly meeting to-day was called to order with a large attendance. In his address the president and chairman, Sir Charles Rivers-Wilson, said the Grand Trunk Railway Company expected the Canadian Government to increase the road's mail allowance. As to business conditions, he said there were symptoms of returning confidence in trade, both in Canada and the United States. This would be increased when the Presidential elections were over. He laughingly denied a charge of personal extravagance tendered against himself respecting the new president's car. The old car, he alleged, was reported unsafe. In fact, the attack was a result of the picturesque imagination of the Canadian reporters who had dwelt upon the beauty of the new conveyance provided for the president. Next, Sir Charles turned to the Grand Trunk's changes in its staff. In this respect were saved \$500,000 yearly. The Company had in Mr. C. M. Hays probably the best man to be found. As to the charge of "Americanizing" the Grand Trunk it was a gross exaggeration. "If," said Sir Charles, "the Company committed an error in taking on Mr. Hays from the United States to Canada, I wish in the interests of the Company that they could commit many such errors."

A few of the new officers were from the United States, the president continued, but the Grand Trunk was, in certain sense, an American line. The natural terminus was Chicago. He would remind his hearers that the Board, too, had their personal feelings; but would never allow such sentimental considerations, however respectable and commendable, to override the best interests of the company. It was a fact that the mass of employees would be entirely recruited from Canada and England. (Cheers) The Board's policy must be a waiting policy, pending expected improved conditions. The present period must be an experimental one. He was convinced the existing conditions were exceptional and transitory. In accordance with this general conviction the speaker announced that no scheme for the reconstruction of the capital of the company had been considered. Some people asked how the accumulated debt balances were to be dealt with. His reply was that when the company had earned the fixed charges, the Board would be prepared to submit a proposal to remove the incubus, in conformity with certain precedents of the Grand Trunk. Sir Charles Rivers Wilson, said that he had discussed the coal question with the Canadian statesmen, and had great confidence that the duty would be removed. Mr. Jefferys, an ex-director, and some of the other speakers urged, in view of the recent strained relations between Great Britain and the United States, that it was unwise to let the Grand Trunk road, built with British money on British soil, be managed so largely by Americans, appointed over the heads of Canadians and Englishmen. Mr. Baker then moved an amendment to the director's report refusing the sanction of the expenses on the Portland, Me., grain elevator. Mr. Baker's amendment was then rejected. It was the only one. The motion supporting the report was adopted unanimously and the meeting then adjourned. (Continued on Page 5.)

OTTAWA NEWS NOTES. Happenings at the Canadian Side of Government. Ottawa, October 14.—(Special)—The report of the general saw-off in the election protests is authoritatively denied as regards Quebec, though in other provinces it may be different. Joseph Martin has gone to Detroit. Mr. Frederick Ireland, of Detroit, arrived here yesterday. He will accompany the Behring Sea Seizure Claims Commission as stenographer to Judge Putnam. Lefebvre vs. Aubrey was argued in the Supreme Court yesterday. The parties each took suit against the other, claiming balance of the other party's settlements of partnerships formerly existing between them in the horse trading business. These cases were consolidated and conflicting decisions rendered as to the rights of parties in the Superior Court of Review and the Queen's Bench at Ottawa. Both parties ask modifications in the judgments of the courts below. Geo. Frison, Q. C., and Martineau for appellant; Lafleur and Bonin for the respondent. In the Supreme Court this morning the case of the Montreal Rolling Mills vs. Corcoran was argued. This is an appeal from the judgment of the Court of Queen's Bench at Montreal affirming the judgment of the trial court, awarding respondent \$3000 damages for the death of her husband, who was the engineer of the Montreal Rolling Mill, and was killed by the machinery in the engine room, while occupied there alone in the discharge of his duties. The appellants challenge the theory of the accident assumed by the courts below, and propose as a more likely consequence that he was at the time imprudently experimenting with the machinery under his care, and unnecessarily exposed himself by going inside the machinery while in motion, and that it was not necessary, as the trial court held, that the machinery should have been fenced off as a precaution against accident at the point where deceased appeared to have been caught. McGillivray, Q. C., and Riddell, Q. C., for appellant; Guerin for respondent. This is the last case on the Quebec list, and on the close of argument court will probably adjourn to a day fixed for taking up Ontario appeals. The Ministers in town met in council at 2:30 yesterday afternoon, and at three o'clock Hon. Mr. Cameron of Manitoba, was admitted to the anti-room and a long conference was ensued. Nothing was allowed to transpire afterwards, however, as the anti-room is called for Friday, when it is rumored that a settlement of the school question will be finally effected. Hon. R. W. Scott was busily engaged this morning in examining the records in the Manitoba school matter, with a view to being prepared for the anti-room meeting of the Council on Friday. Hon. R. W. Scott, Hon. W. Mulock and Sir Oliver Mowat are the only members of the Cabinet in town. After this week it is understood there will be no council meetings for a couple of weeks as some of the Ministers are going west, and others desire to visit their own provinces. The attention of the Customs Department has been called to the fact that a needle company in New York has been supplying false invoices to their customers. Collectors are being instructed to take every precaution. It is rumored that Mr. Lovitt, of Yarmouth, N.S., will be long be called to the Senate, via the Ontario vacancies. The names of Mr. George Cox, of Toronto, and Mr. Robert Jeffrey are mentioned in connection with the Ontario vacancies. It is stated, on the authority of high legal advice to the Government, that the judgment of the Supreme Court, delivered yesterday in the matter of the provincial fisheries legislation will be reversed, and the case before the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council.

HARCOURT DENIES IT. Says He Has Not Resigned Liberal Leadership in Commons. London, October 14.—(Special)—Sir William Harcourt, replying to an enquiry on the subject to-day, telegraphs that there is no truth in the report that he has resigned the leadership of the Liberal party in the House of Commons. The St. James's Gazette this afternoon, referring to the reported resignation of Sir William Vernon Harcourt as leader of the Liberal party in the House of Commons, says it may be stated that he has arrived at no hasty decision. He has been dissatisfied at being obliged to seek a Welsh seat, and was disagreeably surprised at so many Liberals rallying to Lord Rosebery's side. Continuing, the St. James's Gazette says that the report of his intended resignation is semi-official, and that beyond doubt Sir William Harcourt contemplates a sensational move. London, October 14.—(Press despatch).—It is impossible to confirm the report that Sir William Vernon Harcourt has resigned his leadership of the Liberal party in the House of Commons. The Liberal papers do not appear to have any information on the subject. The St. James's Gazette, which published the report yesterday, and insists it is true to-day, is a Conservative organ. Sir W. Harcourt was defeated at Derby at the general election; it may be stated in supplementing yesterday's sketch, and was afterwards elected for Monmouthshire, Wales, by a Liberal member there resigning his seat in his favor.

IT WAS A LOVE AFFAIR. Jealousy and Attempted Poisoning—A Queer Case at Melbourne. (Special to the Star.) Richmond, Que., October 14.—Walter Blake and his wife, a weak-minded couple, living in a hotel in the township of Melbourne, took as a boarder John Kilkenny, a recently discharged convict from St. Vincent de Paul Penitentiary. The trio existed principally by begging and by petty pilferings. Kilkenny fell in love with Mrs. Blake, who was a very jealous disposition, naturally objected, and the pair of lovers decided to remove him from this earth by a very simple but effective means—starvation. Fortunately the dose was not strong enough, and Blake recovered after some hours of violent sickness. Determined to have revenge, he put the police upon the track of a projected robbery, and, as a consequence, Kilkenny the following night was caught red-handed in Mr. David Taylor's henhouse. He was taken to Sherbrooke, and remanded for trial on a charge of robbery. Several pills were found, which, being analyzed by Dr. McKenney, were found to contain arsenic in large quantities. The authorities are investigating the matter. The three parties are almost imbeciles, and are fully subjects for an asylum rather than a prison.

THE CHICAGO GRAIN MARKETS. Remarkable Increase in Speculation—The Boom in Wheat. Chicago, October 14.—There has not been such a general revival of speculation here in fifteen years as has taken place within the past thirty days. It was started by the advance in wheat, and has spread to corn, oats, flaxseed and provisions. THE POPE'S PRONUNCIATION

With Regard to the Anglican Claims DISCUSSED THIS MORNING BY ARCHBISHOP O'BRIEN OF HALIFAX,

Who Also Made a Passing Reference to the Late Archbishop of Canterbury.

His Grace Archbishop O'Brien, of Halifax, arrived at the Windsor last evening for the purpose of attending a meeting of the Council of the Royal Society of Canada, of which he is the president. The business to be considered includes arrangements for the next annual meeting of the society and the part which it will take in the contemplated Catholic celebration.

His Grace, who is enjoying excellent health, gave some interesting information concerning his visit to Rome. "I found the Holy Father physically rather weaker than when I saw him ten years ago," he said, "but intellectually and mentally as strong as ever. When a person enters his eighty-seventh year he cannot be expected to stand a great deal of physical exertion, and as a general rule we scarcely expect to find him mentally as strong as he was at fifty. In this latter respect the Pope is a wonderful man. He talked to me at length regarding affairs in my own diocese, and manifested a keen interest in the welfare of the Church in the United States, but when he learned that I had been in the East and travelled through Palestine he became keenly alive and plied me with question after question. He has a wonderful knowledge of what is going on in the world, and loses no opportunity of adding to his store."

Asked for his opinion on the recent Papal pronouncement with regard to the infidelity of Anglican orders, the Archbishop replied that he had not anything else could have been expected. Every English-speaking priest felt certain that the Roman pontiff's pronouncement was ultimately made in the only possible way, and that for more reasons than one. Admitting for example, that a certain member of the Anglican Church was fully and properly ordained in the manner in which we recognize ordination, yet that member of the Church has no power to ordain others in form and substance, which in reality makes the ordination void. Not only so, but a recognized bishop of the Anglican Church could not so ordain validly. You see there is the matter of history to be considered, as well as the matter of faith. However, I suppose the matter is not one which will cause any very great commotion in the Anglican Church of England who desired a ruling which has received it from the highest authority, and may reflect on the matter as they see fit. It is not for me to recognize that authority will not worry themselves concerning the decision. You see the announcement was made by the Pope, and it was not to a certain extent challenged to declare his attitude. The letter was not given of the Pope's own spontaneity, but altogether it was the result of numerous demands to know in what right the Anglican orders were to be regarded. It may have been that some Englishmen thought that from motives of policy or time-serving, His Holiness could not speak out plainly as he did, but this was the case, as they made a most lamentable mistake.

The resolution was not decided in a day. It was thoroughly enquired into, and all the so-called evidence in favor of the claim to recognition was carefully examined. Two French priests who appeared to think that possibly there might be some reason to be obtained upon, and they were given every opportunity to state their theories, but when confronted by the mass of historical evidence as well as the well known fact that they themselves at once admitted that their knowledge of the case was imperfect, as did also one English Catholic priest, who had devoted the greater part of his life to the subject and written a great deal upon it.

NOTRE DAME HOSPITAL. The Annual Meeting Being Held This Afternoon.

The sixteenth annual general meeting of the members of the Notre Dame Hospital was held this afternoon, Mr. C. P. Hebert, the president, in the chair. The total number of patients treated during the year was 1637, as against 1622 in 1895. The total number of 1603 men and 614 women. There were 1592 Catholics and 75 Protestant patients, 1482 were French-Canadians and 185 of international birth. Above the number 1469 were discharged, 876 of them as cured, and 537 improved, 72 not improved, and 100 died. There were 70 patients in the hospital on July 1 last. During the year 101 patients died in the wards, 34 of them within 48 hours of their admission. The death rate was 6.11 per cent, including all, but only 4.7 per cent, of those dying within 48 hours are excluded. Number of consultations in the dispensary, 20,658, free prescriptions 34,151, number of surgical operations 144, ambulance calls 128.

The financial report showed the ordinary expenditure to have been \$25,579.24, and the ordinary revenue \$23,628.10, leaving a deficit of \$1,951.14. The ordinary receipts were: Kermesse and concerts, \$8,735.55; donations, \$3000. The expenditure for each patient was \$71.35, and for the hospital as a whole \$71.35.
