Guerrilla bands still active in Van Tuong area

SAIGON (AP) — U.S. marines drew Viet Cong fire from tunnels and fortifications today as they swept back across the Van Tuong Peninsula after the biggest American battle of the Vietnamese war.

A U.S. military spokesman said guerrillas opened up on the marines with sporadic small-arms fire as the Americans continued mop-up operations on the peninsula 12 miles south of Chu Lai.

The area was the stronghold of the 1st Viet Cong Regiment, "one of the toughest," the spokesman said.

Urging salary boosts

OTTAWA (CP) — After approving extra pay increases for 22,000 postal workers, the government now is being asked by the Civil Service Federation to do the same for 65,000 Group B government employees.

The federation said in a statement today it has requested a meeting with the civil service commission to reopen consultations on a group B pay increase announced a year ago. Group B takes in clerks, stenographers, typists and other office workers.

"We feel that further increases for group B, effective Oct. 1, 1964, should be negotiated immediately," the 80,000-member federation said in a letter to R. G. MacNeill, outgoing chairman of the Civil Service Commission.

Mr. MacNeill, since named consul in New Orleans, replied that the commission will be prepared to discuss with civil service associations "the implications of Judge Anderson's reports, when his final report is available."

This report by Judge J. C. Anderson, federal commissioner - mediator in the recent postal strike, has been submitted to the government.

The federation said the commissioner concluded in his interim report that government salaries generally trailed two years behind those in industry.

Government heavy loser

Bankruptcy fraud ring revealed

QUEBEC (CP) — Big businessmen and established racketeers have cheated the Quebec government of "as much as \$1,500,000 a year" in taxes since 1959 through fraudulent bankruptcies, says a government report made public Thursday.

The 31-page report, released in French by Revenue Minister Eric Kierans, said much blame for the frauds rested on trustees, inspectors and purchasers "whose transactions came very close to being a matter of receiving stolen goods."

"At the same time, the underworld did a lucrative business to the detriment of honest creditors" who are "frequently helpless to prevent the losses which they would be called upon to bear and to protect themselves against such a fraud."

The report said one bankruptcy ring had a string of 60 companies in its operations. Its sole aim was to "appropriate funds, merchandise or other benefits, and to have recourse to the Bankruptcy Act to completely dissolve their business."

The report was based on 10 months of closed-door investigations conducted by Lucien Mercier, internal auditor of the revenue department who was appointed to investigate fraudulent bankruptcies in November, 1964.

SAW 400 FILES
A detailed study was made of more than 400 bankruptcy files from throughout the province. Total loss to the public purse between Jan. 1, 1959, and last Feb. 1 was estimated at \$5,400,000.

Mr. Mercier recommended that bankruptcy investigations be carried out by a special revenue department branch rather than by groups of investigators working for various branches of the department.

While recognizing that the Bankruptcy Act and laws regulating liquidation of assets of bankrupt firms are federal, the report recommended that all matters relating to bankruptcy be handled directly by the official investigator rather than through trustees.

The inquiry also recommended that a number of government investigations into fraudulent bankruptcies be continued with the aim of finding the amounts of non-declared revenues. No single firm was mentioned by name.

Criticism was levelled against the "disorderly state" of records at the bankruptcy court in Montreal.

INTERESTS CONFLICT
Mr. Mercier reported conflicts of interests that sometimes favored the bankrupt party rather than the creditors.

"In many cases the monies of a bankruptcy deposited in trust in a bank account in the name of the trustee served to cover embezzlements from other bankruptcy accounts or had been usurped by the trustee himself."

Still in trouble

Greek PM delays cabinet choice

ATHENS (AP) — Premier-designate Elias Tsirimokos delayed presenting his new government to King Constantine today for a second time, indicating he was still having trouble lining up a majority in Parliament.

The 58-year-old former left-wing socialist had been scheduled to swear in his cabinet before the king Thursday night but postponed the ceremony until 10 a.m. today. This morning he put it off until shortly after noon.

The delay, coming after a renewal Thursday night of street rioting in Athens, heightened tension in the crisis-ridden NATO country.

Unconfirmed reports said Tsirimokos was assured the king of at least 10 more deputies from former premier George Papandreu's Centre Union party. But Tsirimokos needed 19 breakaways from Papandreu to give him a majority.

Several thousand of Papandreu's youthful supporters battled police Thursday night during a demonstration against Tsirimokos and the king. It was the first major outbreak since July 21.

The mob shouted "out with the king" and carried placards reading "Constantine, take your mother and leave." Queen Mother Frederika has often been accused of meddling in politics, both during the reign

of her husband, King Paul, and the policemen. Police said 39 since their son became king persons were injured, 19 of them severely. Countless others suffered bruises and bloody noses in the 90-minute battle. Some 300 youths were taken into custody but most were released after order was restored.

The 25-year-old king fired Papandreu July 15 in a dispute over control of the armed forces.

The demonstrators tore down chairs from sidewalk cafes at the scene, a house in which lived Mrs. Jean-Marc Gregoire, said to be Lailamme's sister, following an anonymous tip.

A spokesman said that they surrounded the house with four agents.

The fugitive came out the back of the dwelling on the run, said a witness, heading in the direction of a nearby henhouse. There was one QPP man at each side of the henhouse, it was said.

The running man turned to one side of the henhouse, beside which was Cst. Poulin. He fired at the constable as he ran by, said a police agent, from a distance as near as twelve feet. One shot hit the policeman in the left wrist, splintering bone but completely missing both nerves and vein.

It was uncertain whether Cst. Poulin's second wound, in the chest, was the result of a second shot hitting him or of the first shot continuing its course. The bullet which wounded his wrist went clean through the arm, but that which hit his chest pierced less than an inch.

The chest wound was within inches of his heart.

Cst. Poulin, said a policeman, "is in good shape."

Prison escapee sought

Policeman shot in gun battle

WEEDON — A Quebec Provincial Policeman was wounded yesterday when he and several other OPP agents attempted to capture a man believed to be a prison escapee near this community about 35 miles north-east of Sherbrooke.

Constable Raymond Poulin, 20, of the Weedon detachment of the OPP, lies in good condition in the Hotel-Dieu Hospital in Sherbrooke today, with wounds to the wrist and chest.

His attacker was believed by police to be still hiding in a densely-wooded area near the farm where the shooting occurred.

An intensive search of the area, in the tenth range of District 1, is being conducted by provincial policemen from several detachments, notably Sherbrooke, Megantic, Thetford Mines, Granby, Weedon.

One spokesman at the Weedon office said that the fugitive was believed to be Odilon Laflamme, who took part in an escape two weeks ago from a minimum security prison in Valleyfield.

The police officers went to the scene, a house in which lived Mrs. Jean-Marc Gregoire, said to be Lailamme's sister, following an anonymous tip.

A spokesman said that they surrounded the house with four agents.

Cable troubles add to GT-5 launching woes

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — Thwarted by last-minute equipment troubles and the boiling black clouds of a thunderstorm, two American astronauts smiled their way through the disappointment Thursday and aimed for another try at their space flight Saturday.

They turned today to repeating the preflight routine they had stepped through two days ago—mission review meetings, more flight rehearsal and early-to-bed tonight.

After postponement of their eight-day space stint, astronauts L. Gordon Cooper, Jr., and Charles Conrad, Jr., got a short recess Thursday.

"We gave them the afternoon off and I don't know what they're doing," said astronaut co-ordinator Donald K. Slayton.

The astronauts were "fairly disappointed," he said, but they didn't "get clanked up about it or anything like that."

'AW, GEE'
On the word of postponement, command pilot Cooper said, "Aw, gee, you promised us a launch and not a wet mock" (simulated mission).

It was to be man's longest voyage in space — nearly 192 hours and covering 3,120,000 miles.

This is what happened: There were difficulties the night before the scheduled launch when engineers tried to cram extra pounds of the valuable deep-frozen hydrogen fuel into spherical tanks.

That caused a three hour and 18 minute hold in the countdown. When it was solved, things rolled along smoothly until 10 minutes before the nine-storey Titan II rocket was due to blast the capsule into orbit, when space officials announced they were holding again.

This time the trouble was in the telemetry. A switch that at first glance seemed to be operating poorly, checked out all right. Still, the switch would have to be checked again and the hold continued.

Then lightning, travelling by some unknown route — by ground or cable or otherwise — surged into the power lines of the launch complex. In a complicated system that depends on controlled electricity, it struck a vulnerable spot. The memory of a spacecraft computer.

Flight officials were fairly certain the computer was damaged. They had to replace it.

At 1:43 p.m. (2:43 p.m. ADT) — with the sky now black with a summer thunderstorm — flight officials called off the flight.

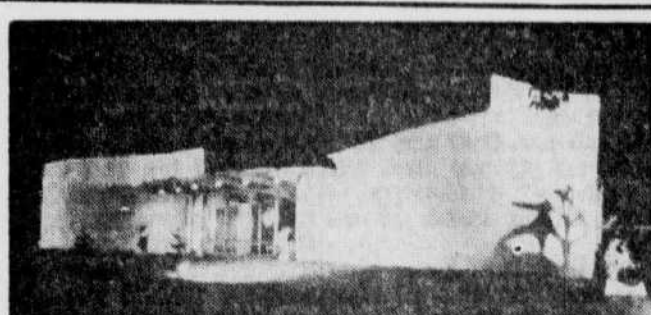

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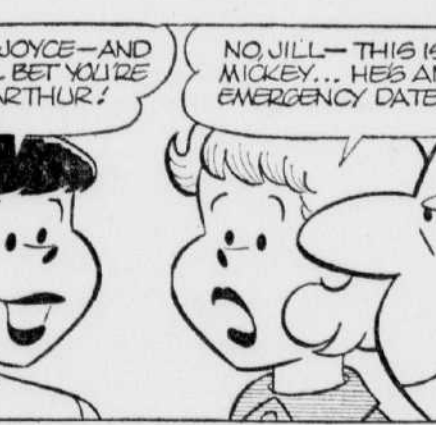

Is ordered to trial in tile theft case

The long drawn-out preliminary hearing of Gaetan Roy of Sherbrooke, in progress since last November, was finally concluded yesterday with Roy being ordered by Judge Turmel to stand trial. He is to appear before the next session of the Court of Criminal Assizes. Roy is accused of theft of \$1,800 of tile from the American Biltrite Company.

The case was concluded by the reading of the evidence presented to date by Jean Rouillard, lawyer for the defense, and Guy Blanchette for the Crown, plus the admitting of new evidence, which according to Judge Benoit Turmel proved without a doubt that there was sufficient evidence against the accused to warrant a trial.

Bail was set at \$500 cash or \$950 property.

The new evidence was the

testimony of two American Biltrite office men, Donald Ives and Michael Scovell, that no tile or other merchandise was legally sold by the company without an invoice and identification marks on merchandise cases. Roy could produce no invoice.

Lawyer Rouillard had attempted to prove that the many cases of tile ordered put aside by Roy who was foreman in the tile department, were put aside in open view of fellow workers and company officials alike.

Two workers said that on several Fridays uncut tile was on Roy's order put on the work bench and Roy later put the tile in his car.

Walter Mutchler, Jr., an official of the company had previously testified that that tile was sold freely to customers but the tile in question was not for sale in Canada.

English twelfth grade sponsored by Roman Catholic school board

A co-educational English-language twelfth grade for Protestant as well as Catholic pupils will be sponsored this coming school year by the Sherbrooke Catholic system.

It will be conducted in the new Institute of Technology building on Galt Street West near Joliette Street.

The deadline for applications, to be made to Pierre Laurence at St. Patrick High School, was scheduled to be today, but has been extended to Tuesday, 7 p.m. to 10 p.m.

Applications are being accepted from Sherbrooke and the entire surrounding district, said Mr. Laurence.

This is the third year in which the Catholic system has sponsored the course in Sherbrooke. It leads to a senior matriculation.

Mr. Laurence said that it will be decided soon whether one or two classes will be formed. If it is one, it is doubtful that more than thirty students will

be accepted, he said, but if two classes are formed, fifty or sixty may be accommodated.

As of last night, said Mr. Laurence, thirty-six students had registered their applications for the grade.

Twenty-eight of these had achieved per cents over sixty in their eleventh-grade examinations, he said, and there is a strong possibility that this figure will be a requirement for admission to the course. However, he stressed, this will depend on the total number of applications received and on whether the Catholic board decides to organize one or two classes for Grade Twelve.

Another criterion for acceptance may be number, if any, of subjects failed in the Grade Eleven examinations, he added.

The results of supplemental examinations will be taken into consideration when decisions on accepting or rejecting of pupils are made, he said. The

Mr. Laurence said that he felt a Grade Eleven standing of sixty per cent and no failures to be desirable for any student attempting to enter Grade Twelve, but added that admission requirements would depend on the capacity of the grade and the number of applications to it.

Catholic students will be able to take the grade without charge; Protestants will have to pay a tuition fee of \$400, which will cover the cost of all textbooks and transportation to the Institute as well as that of instruction.

Mr. Laurence added that Protestant students would be able to apply for government aid in paying this fee.

As for the course, English (composition and literature) and French (composition and literature) will be compulsory for all students in the twelfth grade. Religion will be compulsory for all Roman Catholic pupils, but Protestants may skip these classes.

Six electives will be offered: intermediate algebra, trigonometry, analytical geometry, physics, chemistry, and history. Students will be required to take at least four of these, said Mr. Laurence, but may take more.

If the twelfth grade is completed with sufficiently good standing in certain courses, students will be accepted into the second year of the province's universities. Thus, it can be the equivalent of first-year university, in the province of Quebec.

Denies Richmond robbery

Pilgrim's Progress is traced as part of camping activities

If one happens to be walking in the woods by the shore of Lake Massawippi about four miles south of North Hatley this month, one may well encounter young boys attending a summer camp.

Like most boys attending most camps, they may be talking about archery and boating, or swimming and handicrafts, or nature study and athletics, or such.

But, too, they may well be talking about the journey of one called Christian from the City of Destruction to the Celestial City.

They may, in fact, be discussing the experiences of this Christian at such places as the Slough of Despond, the Valley of the Shadow of Death, or the Delectable Mountains.

They may, in short, be talking about that classic of seventeenth-century English literature, John Bunyan's allegory The Pilgrim's Progress.

CLASS HANDBOOK

Young campers with this unusual topic for conversation are to be found at Quebec Lodge, an Anglican campsite bordering the lake. Like most church-run camps in the Eastern Townships, Quebec Lodge gives daily classes in religious instruction to its charges; but unlike probably any other, it is presently employing The Pilgrim's Progress as a class handbook.

The camp padre, who directs these classes, is currently Rev. Richard Blythe of Bury. He explains:

"The nature of the religious instruction here varies with the different priests who instruct at each of the four summer camps (two for boys in July, and two for girls in August).

"But when I arrived here to direct the fourth camp (for senior boys), I found that my predecessor as padre, Rev. John Pierce, had based his instruction in Christian life on a reading of The Pilgrim's Progress. I thought this was a good program, and followed it.

"Actually, the children don't read the original classic themselves; rather, I read to them a version especially adapted for the young. This adaptation has the same story as the original, but the language is simplified and a change is made in the age of the hero Christian, who becomes a child."

Father Blythe reads at each of his daily religious classes, expounds a little upon the themes in his own words, then leads a discussion on the reading among the camp-

Survival car presented Canadians

Growing concern over the steady increase in the toll of death, injury and property damage on North American highways is reflected in increasing demands on the part of organizations and individuals that something be done to reduce the loss.

But, unfortunately, most of these demands have limited themselves to insistence that the government or manufacturers or somebody take some action without offering any clear suggestions as to the nature of this action.

Thus the campaign conducted by Howard Graffley, MP for Brome-Missisquoi, differs importantly from most of the others.

Mr. Graffley, in collaboration with a prominent Boston insurance company, has presented the Canadian public with a "survival car" which it is believed will cut down the number of highway fatalities to fifty per cent of the current toll.

The twenty-four safety features incorporated in the prototype car are bound to cost money, perhaps up to \$200 per car, as the sponsors admit.

But the question facing the motorist is whether he is willing to make this additional outlay in the belief that the danger of becoming killed on the highway is reduced?

Then there is the thought that by eliminating the practise of offering new models to the public every year and restricting major changes to three-year periods, the manufacturers could achieve enough economies in normal production cost to absorb the extra cost of the safety features.

Perhaps the introduction of a safety car next year might create such a public demand for the new vehicles that the need for model changes to stimulate demand would be eliminated.

With the price of haircuts, nobody can accuse the Beatles of being dumb.

Human urge to discredit computer

Perhaps we may have more than our share of human perversity, but somehow or other we feel a sneaking admiration for whoever put that single misplaced punch in the computer cards which caused such a snafu in the Quebec school examination reports.

We have enough feeling of sympathy left to appreciate the anguish caused to hundreds of students by the ghastly mistakes that appeared in many of the report cards and extend them our sympathy.

But now that the errors apparently have been sorted out we must confess some feeling of satisfaction over these mighty mechanical brains being taken down a notch or two.

Our mental battle with the computers is of long standing: Almost as old as the introduction of these monsters to send out bills, cheques and invitations to subscribe to this or that periodical.

Every time we receive one of these cards, all covered with punch marks and

containing such instructions as "Do not fold," "Please keep in good condition" or "do not trim the edges," we have felt the urge to put a punch or two of our own in the card before returning it to the sender — through the banks if it happened to be a family allowance cheque or income tax refund.

Perhaps because we have little personal knowledge of the habits of these machines when they come across an indigestible number, we imagined all manner of results — clanging of bells, blowing of horns, blinking of lights and even a joy to behold, the spewing of tens of thousands of the little cards contained in the computer into a glorious pile on the floor.

While none of these things happened at Quebec — the machine contenting itself with giving out the wrong information — some one in the Ancient Capital must be obtaining much cussed satisfaction when he beholds his work — provided he does not lose his job.

Must speed up bargaining process

The strike of postal workers has again pointed up the need for effective procedures to remedy grievances held by public employees against the Crown.

That the strike was illegal is readily admitted. But, to prevent a recurrence of this situation, the Federal Government should move quickly to tidy up the bargaining position not only of postal employees, but of civil servants generally.

The proper step would be to permit public employees to bargain collectively with the Government. Arbitration, binding upon both parties, should be the final step.

The Civil Service Act, which applies to postal workers as well, does not provide for

walkouts by government employees. The ultimate weapon of being permitted to go on strike should not be granted to public servants.

A strike against the Government is different than other walkouts, for it is tantamount to a strike against the people of Canada. The postal workers' strike emphasized this point. Not only was an essential public service disrupted, but the economy suffered through dislocations to communications, commerce and industry.

The Government has acknowledged the need for adequate machinery to enable public employees to bargain

collectively. The situation as it now stands is totally unsatisfactory.

At present, the Government has to do the bargaining with its employees on behalf of the Canadian people. But, since civil service associations have no legal status, this only complicates the matter.

Employees of industrial firms have unions to bring their grievances to the attention of management. Postal workers and other government servants are not able to air their problems before the cabinet. They must rely on their associations and what the Civil Service Commission is prepared to do for them.

Canadians who enter the civil service have both advantages and disadvantages. There is considerable security in a government job. They have many benefits: holidays with pay, sick leave, and pensions. They are not covered by unemployment insurance, however, nor can they legally go on strike.

While everything is not rosy for public employees, their situation is improving. Within recent weeks, a special committee that looked into the question of collective bargaining for civil servants recommended early action by the Government to institute such a step.

The committee, headed by Arnold Heeney, former civil service commissioner, did not propose the outlawing of strikes. But it suggested that a walkout by public employees would be unthinkable.

If their grievances could not be settled by arbitration, the issue should then be referred to Parliament for final decision.

There are reports that the Government intends to introduce legislation at an early date to clear the way for collective bargaining by civil servants. In view of what happened in the postal dispute, this matter should be placed high on the agenda when Parliament reconvenes in September.

French Canada says

Things fine now, but later...? and what about Canadian Arctic?

Montreal - *Matin* — Economically, this is a critical year. All is prosperous, but there are so many clouds flitting across the horizon that businessmen are becoming increasingly alarmed. The president of the Federal Reserve Bank of the United States has spoken of similarities between the present economic situation and that of 1929. In Canada, without being so alarmist, some economists and bankers have pointed to pressing economic problems, the main one being poor management of a wealth of resources.

Prime Minister Pearson's warning to the construction industry has something paradoxical about it, in view of the old dictum, "As construction goes, so goes everything else." Canadians joyfully go into debt. At the end of May they owed finance companies alone the sum of \$5,762,000,000, or \$300 a head. The rate of savings is going up but so is that of indebtedness. Economists say that by the end of the year our commercial debt to the United States will reach \$10,000,000,000. And there are signs of inflation at home.

While the situation is far from desperate, it promises many bitter consequences if Canadians are not careful. If we don't decide to restrain unnecessary expenditure, we'll be in for another period of drastic cutbacks, of acute austerity. This would mean, as usual, much unemployment and deplorable social unrest.

We must, at any price, take immediate precautions. The government should firmly set out directives, which up to now it has not done. But maybe tomorrow will be too late. *Clement Brown, (Aug. 11)*

Montreal *La Presse* — Northern Affairs Minister Laing was bowled over last May and June by what he saw of the industrial development of the Soviet Union's vast Siberian holdings. Meantime, our own Arctic areas remain what member of Parliament John Turner so rightly called them — "Canada's great enigma."

Do we want to concentrate on developing the minerals of the northland or, like the Soviets, build within the Arctic Circle cities teeming with busy people? The population of Canada is only one-tenth that of the Soviet Union, which makes such an expansion program far less urgent here. Also, there is one major consideration that hardly bothered the Soviet authorities at all when they decided to industrialize their immense northern territories. That consideration is, "Can man be happy living up there?"

Even if the workers established in Siberia are treated with all the care lavished on precious plants, even if they are offered all the comforts possible to help them withstand the isolation involved, the cold weather, the endless winter nights, one cannot forget the many thousands of forced laborers who, at the price of their lives, established all these northern de-

velopments in the first place. ... Our own lethargy thus can be explained and to some extent excused by reference to the fundamental difference between the Soviet and Canadian philosophies of life. But nevertheless we think it's high time for finding the best means possible of developing at least some of this immeasurable expanse that constitutes two-thirds of Canada and doubtless contains very considerable riches.

But where are the pioneers, the adventurers, the builders, the men who can function in the fashion of the oldtime frontiersmen? ... While, a taste for the new and the strange takes hundreds of young Canadians overseas for work in underdeveloped countries, one wonders if a similar number would be inclined to give some years of their lives to development work in the north. But these youths can rightly reply, "Start the ball rolling yourselves, give us a program of action and we'll see."

Some Soviet experts on the north are coming here for a visit. Will this dispel the clouds of our lethargy? Can we hope, with Mr. Laing, that the visit will be followed with an agreement by which teachers, students and Arctic specialists from the Soviet Union could inject their counterparts here with imagination and enthusiasm? — *Renaude Lapointe, (Aug. 12)*

Trois - *Rivieres Le Nouveliste* — The Federation of Malaysia has seen its best days. This artificial creation of British policy did not last long. The decision of the state of Singapore to withdraw from it will prove fatal.

London, taken by surprise, fears that Singapore's act will have serious consequences, both short- and long-term, for Great Britain and for the West in general in Southeast Asia.

The real cause of the break is the racial conflict between Malays and Chinese. It was a break which long appeared inevitable. But it is nevertheless a victory for the "crush Malaysia" policy of Sukarno of Indonesia.

Singapore has 1,200,000 Chinese, 70 per cent of its population. They control the country's economy. And Chinese constitute 42 per cent of the whole 11,000,000 population of the federation. They are slightly more numerous than the Malays.

Great Britain has a powerful naval base at Singapore. Can she maintain it?

The Malaysian Federation, a creation of the West and particularly of Britain, met from the start the opposition of Indonesia and the Philippines. A state of war has existed in fact between these two powerful countries and the federation ever since.

London only a short while ago recognized her inability to impose her will by force in this region of southern Asia — in spite of her solid military position in Singapore. *(Aug. 11)*

Britons marvel at Yankee extremes

LONDON — (NEA) — Americans are known for being sentimental softies. But the current American project of shipping 630 tons of bombed-out church ruins to Fulton, Mo., is seen here as the last word in sentimental extravagance.

The ruins are all that is left of St. Mary Aldermanbury, a church built by Sir Christopher Wren in 1677 and destroyed by Nazi incendiary bombs in December, 1940. It is planned to re-erect them on the campus of Westminster College in Fulton.

In fact, the entire Wren church is to be restored on the Missouri campus as a memorial to Sir Winston Churchill. (It was here that he made his famous "Iron Curtain" speech in 1946.) The cost of the restoration has been estimated at \$1.5 million, most of which has already been raised by public subscription.

Meanwhile, with workmen here busy crating up the stones for shipment to the States, it is no secret that the Corporation of the City of London is glad to get rid of the smoke-charred ruins. The bomb site where the Wren church stood has been overgrown by weeds and has long been regarded as an eyesore.

Londoners are puzzled why the Americans have gone to all the trouble and expense of transporting the assorted masonry 4,500 miles to Missouri.

St. Mary Aldermanbury, which is one of the 50 churches that Wren built in the City of London after the Great Fire of 1666, is not regarded as an outstanding example of his art. Even before the war there was talk of demolishing the church in order to redevelop the valuable site it occupies.

"If the Americans are so intent upon having a Wren church, why don't they copy one of his better examples?" commented an architectural student at the site. "They could even incorporate some of the stones from St. Mary's," he added. "But hauling all of this rubble to America seems frightfully expensive."

White-haired Marshall Sisson, the British architect responsible for dismantling the church ruins, violently disagrees that the church is without artistic merit. While admitting that it is not one of Wren's greatest, he contends that it is "very pleasant."

"The East Front with its big arched window and volute scrolls is quite remarkable," says Sisson, who has visited the United States several times in connection with the project.

At the weed-choked bomb site the remaining stones of

MAJORITY AGAINST — Much of the backbench pressure being applied to Prime Minister Pearson for a fall election is said to be coming from the members whose seats are most affected by redistribution.

A party source said the majority of party members appear to favor Parliament carrying on. The same pattern exists in the opposition parties, especially with Western Conservatives. Under redistribution, Saskatchewan's 17 seats—now all Conservative—will be reduced to 14, and most sitting members from that province would rather fight on existing boundaries.

One Ontario Liberal member has already opened a campaign office in expectations of a fall vote, although he insists there has been no official indication of such an event. Several members have opened campaign accounts in their local banks.

While many MPs will speak privately against an election, not many have made public statements against it. Social Credit Leader Robert Thompson and Stanley Knowles (NDP—Winnipeg North Centre) have both argued publicly that it would be immoral for the government to call an election before redistribution is completed.

"The worst part of this business is the waiting," said one member. "I am still going to be angry if there isn't one after all the nervous energy I've spent."

WASHINGTON (AP)—Elmer Brown, president of the International Typographical Union (AFL-CIO) said Thursday that publishers in the Toronto news-paper strike are trying to run the union out of Canada.

But, Brown said, many other Canadian publishers are not in sympathy with the effort.

Brown made the comment as some 450 ITU convention delegates rejected a proposal to instruct the union's executive committee to approach the three Toronto publishers.

No price break in sight for Canadian food costs

OTTAWA (CP) — The Canadian household appears to be paying about three cents more than a year ago for every dollar's worth of food.

It's mostly because of higher meat prices and, with no break in immediate sight, food costs are likely to remain up for a while yet, government officials say.

Even at \$1.03 for food worth \$1 a year ago, the Canadian shopper is better off than his American counterpart.

A recent U.S. agriculture department survey estimated that American food costs are up 10 per cent from 1964 levels.

"In comparison with the United States, our supplies are certainly more ample," said crop last year hampering our agriculture department spokesman.

"In fact, except for the meat market and one or two other items, our prices have been relatively stable."

The problem in the meat market, the spokesman said, is directly related to the United States.

With a shortage of U.S. meat supplies, particularly beef, Canadian producers have been exporting larger quantities south of the border, thus decreasing volumes available for Canadian

consumption.

The result: Higher meat prices in this country, as reflected by the fact sirloin steak averaged \$1.14 a pound last month compared with \$1.02 in July, 1964, while bacon cost 58 cents a pound versus 49 cents a year earlier.

Outside of meat, the main price increase has been for potatoes, listed at \$1.12 for 10 pounds in July compared with 93 cents a year earlier.

"This market has been partially affected by the U.S. situation, too, with a short American supply," said the agriculture official.

"Judging by this year's acreage, though, prices should start to go down again in September."

On the brighter side of the picture, a heavy world sugar surplus has cut Canadian prices to a July level of 10 cents a pound down three cents from a year earlier. This, in turn, has helped reduce prices for such sugar-heavy items as jam and candy.

Several of the staple foods are showing a high degree of price stability.

Bread at 18 cents a pound, milk at 25 cents a quart, and

flour at 11 cents a pound are unchanged in July from 1964 levels. Eggs were up to 49 cents a dozen compared with 46 the previous year.

FRESH MINTED CANTALOUPE

1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup water
2 tablespoons fresh lime juice
1 teaspoon chopped fresh mint

1/2 teaspoon anise seed
1/16 teaspoon salt
5 cups fresh cantaloupe slices

4 cups fresh peach slices
2 cups fresh blueberries

Combine sugar, water, lime juice, chopped mint, anise seed and set in a small saucepan. Bring to boiling point and boil 2 minutes. Cover and steep 10 minutes. Cool and chill. Place fruit in a bowl and strain syrup over fruit to remove anise seed. Cover. Chill for 2 or more hours or until ready to serve the same day.

Yield: 10 servings.

Cooler sleeping ideas for hot summer nights

Getting a good night's rest in warm, humid weather is a problem for most people. As a long, hot summer is the weather forecast for most of Canada, night sleeping tips for cool comfort are welcomed.

Medical authorities advise that physical exertion and tension probably contribute more to sleeping discomfort in summer weather than the temperature. If you are following an exercise or calisthenics program, do it in the morning, not before retiring. Prepare for bed in the summer months in slow, easy stages. If the dog has to be walked or the house is to be locked up, it should be done at a leisurely pace.

If you have problems on your mind, forget them when you go to bed on warm summer evenings. A relaxed mind and a relaxed body will result in complete rest.

Loose, light weight night clothing is better for both health and comfort than doing without. A shower or bath with lukewarm water will do wonders if it is taken just prior to retiring.

Most people find that a cotton sheet is sufficient bed cover for humid nights. Again, no covers at all will usually result in a fitful sleep at best.

Turning the pillow is a trick that often works. When you first go to bed use the one side of the pillow but turn it over before you fall asleep.

Women's rights—last in series

Impending changes in Quebec's civil code may give married women superior legal rights

MONTREAL (CP) — Should married women have protection or equality?

Some women here think the province's married women—until recently denied any rights by Quebec's Napoleonic civil code—will soon have both.

Montreal lawyers Diane Dunton and Lillian Birtz think revision of sections of the code dealing with married women—started in July, 1964 with Bill 16—will eventually produce an arrangement superior to the separation-of-property system governing wives in the rest of Canada.

"We are hopeful that Quebec will soon have the best system," Mrs. Birtz said in an interview.

"Community of property with equal partners would be ideal."

Community of property—the legal regime in Quebec only—is a system that joins the movable possessions of both partners at marriage and gives only the husband power to administer them. Although the wife had no control over the community property, half of it was hers by law and automatically fell to her without succession duties upon the death of her husband.

This system provided the Quebec wife with a great deal of protection, but if she happened to find herself saddled with an unco-operative or imprudent husband, she discovered she had almost no legal rights to fall back on. She needed her husband's signature for almost everything.

Bill 16 put her in a much better legal position and allowed her to execute certain transactions without her husband's consent. But it left the prime authority with the husband.

Further legislation is expected in the near future and Mrs. Dunton and Mrs. Birtz are hoping it will somehow revise the community system to make the partners equal.

If this could be done within

the existing framework of the husband and wife would jointly administer "the property of the community. They would be equal partners but the wife would have more protection."

They say that a wife in a separate-property marriage because half of the community is legally hers and can't be willed

away by the husband without her consent.

"What the explanations give are two different things," says Montreal lawyer Rejane Colas. "I was hoping it would be more than a patching of laws already existing and that it would all be done at once."

Mrs. Colas said the right granted wives in common-property marriages by Bill 16 to veto proposed sale of land or buildings by the husband is not of much use because most money today is tied up in stocks and bonds which can be sold by the husband without the wife's consent.

She thinks the community system has outlived its usefulness and should be replaced by separation of property with protection clauses requiring the husband to will a certain amount to his wife and children.

REVERSE LAWS

"The law should be made for the majority and left for the minority to complicate," Mrs. Colas said, explaining that approximately 70 per cent of the province's married couples now have marriage contracts ensuring separation of property and thereby putting them outside the community regime.

Revision of the community system, she said, is therefore being undertaken only for the benefit of the other 30 per cent.

Therese Casgrain, one of the original leaders of the movement for women's rights in Quebec, agrees that the existing law should simply be reversed.

"Separation of property should be automatic," she said. "Then marriage contracts can

be drawn up by couples who want community of property—since they are in the minority—and not by those who want separation of property as now is the case."

Marriage contracts are drawn up before the marriage and most of them provide for a sum of money or equivalent property to be given to the wife by the husband during the marriage.

Mrs. Casgrain said Bill 16 "made things better but didn't solve anything. It's still the community, it's confused, and everyone is hesitating—the banks and so on," she said.

Cases of banks, trust companies, and hospitals asking for the husband's signature when it is no longer required by law have been reported by others.

Claire Kirkland, Casgrain, Quebec minister of transportation and communications, said such cases "aren't necessarily acts of bad faith—it's just that the old habits are ingrained."

The minister said a number of women had written to her to complain about being asked for the husband's signature, and that she had advised them to change bank managers.

"But women must remember Bill 16 gives them the right to act alone—it doesn't give them credit," she said. "In Ontario or anywhere else in the world, bank and credit managers want the husband's signature if the wife hasn't any money of her own."

"It's going to take time for the law to settle because it involves so much in business circles," said Alice Desjardins, professor of law at the University of Montreal. "But wives must stand firm and insist their rights be applied."

Miss Desjardins agreed, however, that the wife confronted with his denial of her new rights found it easier to ask her husband for his signature than to go to court, although she had the legal right to do so in such a case. As yet, there are no court cases of this nature on record.

Therese Crompt, a lawyer for the City of Montreal, suggested the law had been more updated in practice than in writing and that Bill 16 simply codified much of what had already been achieved through jurisprudence.

Roger Comtois, a law professor at the University of Montreal who is working with the Nadeau commission, says Bill 16 didn't give the wife in common-property marriages any power but only took some away from her husband.

Mr. Comtois who says the separation-of-property system is "the one most unfair to the wife," favors community of property with equal partners who both have full power to act alone. Many European countries, he said, are adopting this type of community system.

"It would be just like separation of property except that the wife would receive half of the community upon the death of the husband."

In other games Los Angeles Dodgers regained first place by defeating San Francisco Giants 8-3 in 15 innings, Milwaukee Braves dropped to second, one half game out, by losing to St. Louis Cardinals 5-4 and the Cubs edged the Reds in the nightcap 5-4.

Maloney achieved another distinction. The 10 walks he gave up were the most ever issued in a no-hitter.

The Cubs won the second game after trailing 4-0. Willy Wood came home on Woody Wood's bad throw.

Diary of a Northern Trip
continued — Tuesday, August 17.

Left the New Liskeard area early this morning to continue the trip north. The clear, cool morning contrasted with yesterday's steady drizzle. Mowing machines on the go, and side-walks turning over sodden winds.

The gently rolling hills smoothed out toward Englehart, then the good farm land yielded to bush and rock once again for the 100 miles to Cochrane. Pocket of good farms at Monteth. Passed a sign, 'From this Point on, all Water flows to the Arctic'. Then another, 'You are now crossing the 49th Parallel'. Bit of a shock to realize that this is the southern boundary for much of Canada. No longer did I feel the thrill of being north. The Great Clay Belt is north only because we think it so.

Found Cochrane a clean, cheerful town with remarkably wide streets. Agricultural Representative Andre Demers took half a day to show me around. Some

excellent farms if you know where to look, but few in number. In Cochrane North only 60 dairy farms, 8 beef, 6 poultry, 18 potato. Keen competition for the dairy quotas. One man with 50,000 cabbages, another with 5,000 caged layers. Tremendous potential in land; something like 5,000,000 acres good clay soil still to be developed.

Spent the night in the splendid Provincial Park at Driftwood, but just about froze; my sleeping bag is much too thin. There was actually a white frost.

Wednesday, August 18: Drove another 75 miles west to the pulp-and-paper town of Kapuskasing. If there were good farms along this stretch I didn't see them. Spruce forest covers most of this low, flat land. Visited the Experimental Farm here. Excellent barley ripening up and oats tall enough to lodge. All the usual varieties of legumes and grasses doing well; winter killing is the least of the problems. Perhaps this station can't be justified by the number of farms it serves at present, but in terms of worded agriculture, it is good to have facts

about farming in our Canadian North. Back-tracked 150 miles to Kirkland Lake to cross into Quebec and to the twin mining cities of Rouyn-Noranda.

Thursday, August 19: A short visit with my friend the editor of the Monitor, and with the regional agronomes, and then drove northward once again.

Surprise after surprise as the naked hills of the mining country opened out into the magnificent farming land east of Lake Abitibi. A province within a province, as my host agronomer Lucien Fournier put it.

Just two years ago, a cyclone destroyed 300 barns in the area. A disaster at the time, it was perhaps a blessing in disguise. Today, with all its new buildings, there is concession after concession of attractive farms. Most of the 800 commercial farms in Abitibi West are dairy; outlets are the mining towns and two creameries.

Beef raising is being officially encouraged; 95 of the 100 herds have registered bulls. Last spring's grand champion Angus to Sherbrooke Fair is there; one bull, purchased from the Legros

farm at New Liskeard, is reported to have made a remarkable average daily gain of 3.6 lbs. on R.O.P.

Volume of beef doesn't yet warrant an abattoir. Which has to come first? New stockyards being built at La Sarre for North West Quebec's first Feeder Sale October 13. It's being co-ordinated with the five very successful Northern Ontario Sales.

Good 200-acre farms can be bought as a going concern for \$20,000; underdeveloped farms for \$30 acre.

Friday, August 20: Headed east to home. By the road sign, 60 miles to Amos, 90 to Val d'Or and 400 to Montreal. Surprised to find good farms, some beautifully located on the many lakes, as far east as Val d'Or. Excellent dairy herds, mostly Holsteins. Hay far from finished; the few fields of oats just heading. Looks as if these farms have all the land they can use.

Into the bush once more at Val d'Or, south through the peaceful wilderness of the Laurentide Park, into the Laurentians to face the mad explosion of week-enders from the city. I like the North.

Now's the time trees, shrubs need food most

Until recently one of the most widely circulated bits of garden advice was not to fertilize trees, shrubs and evergreens after August 15 because this would stimulate soft growth that is readily winter-killed.

Dr. Milton Carleton of Chicago says the latest research shows that if not fed after August 15 many plants are starved for plant food in late April and early May, just when they need it most.

If you go into your garden around the middle of August and examine your shrubs, trees and evergreen you will see that they have stopped growing at the tips of the branches.

But at the same time, although you won't be able to see it with the naked eye, the diameters of the branches and twigs will be enlarging.

GROWTH

This is caused by the intake of plant food which is stored over winter in the wood in the form of starch. The trees and shrubs are remembering that next spring they'll have to produce a big crop of leaves and new growth in just a few days. At that time of year the plant foods in the soil are in an insoluble form which prevents the roots from supplying the necessary plant food for the required quick growth.

It will be almost the end of May before the roots will be able to carry enough plant food from the soil to keep the trees and shrubs growing at their normal rate.

The amount of growth made early next spring will depend almost entirely on the food stored in the wood during late August or early September.

If you do not make a yearly feeding at this time of year you can be certain that the growth of your trees, shrubs and evergreens next spring will not be as vigorous as if a first class tree or evergreen food had been applied.

In the case of evergreens a middle of August feeding will provide them with increased resistance to winter killing. Anyone whose yews or cedars turned brown last spring will certainly be able to appreciate the importance of this. An increased accumulation of food in the plant tissues of evergreens acts as an anti-freeze.

Another advantage in late August feeding is the strong stimulation of root growth, which is always more active in fall than in spring.

TREES

One of the most neglected tasks in the gardening world is the feeding of various ornamental shade and fruit trees.

It is hard to get the home gardener to realize that it is just

as important to feed trees as it is to feed the lawn or any other part of the garden.

Maybe he still looks upon trees as belonging to the forest primeval where the base of each tree was surrounded by humus accumulated over hundreds of years.

Virgin forest is another familiar term which leads many persons to think that once a tree is set in the ground it can be left there forever without any further attention other than a little pruning and spraying.

Such is not the case. Trees need an annual feeding starting the first year after planting and continuing for the life time of the tree.

For the first three or four years of a tree's life all you need do is to scatter some complete fertilizer or plant food around the tree and then work it into the soil.

Later on as the trees start to grow vigorously and become larger it is necessary to use an altogether different method.

First of all you must realize that the feeder roots of any tree are to be found as far out from the trunk as the outer ends of the branches which we call the drip line.

That being the case, there is no point in putting the fertilizer around the trunk where it would be of no value whatsoever.

HOLES

The best way of feeding established trees is to make a series of holes two inches in diameter, 18 inches deep and 18 inches apart.

To make the holes you can use either a special auger, obtainable from most garden centres and nurseries or one of the lighter crowbars.

The holes should not be made in a regular circle, but staggered just inside and outside the drip line or outer circle of branches.

Each hole should be filled with a mixture consisting of one-half a complete fertilizer high in nitrogen and one half dry sand or soil.

A regular feeding towards the end of August or in early September will help a tree grow to maturity much faster and acts as an effective preventative against insects and diseases.

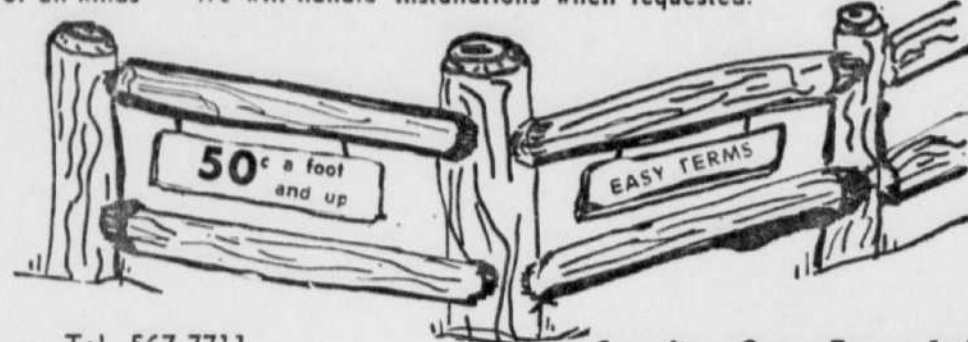

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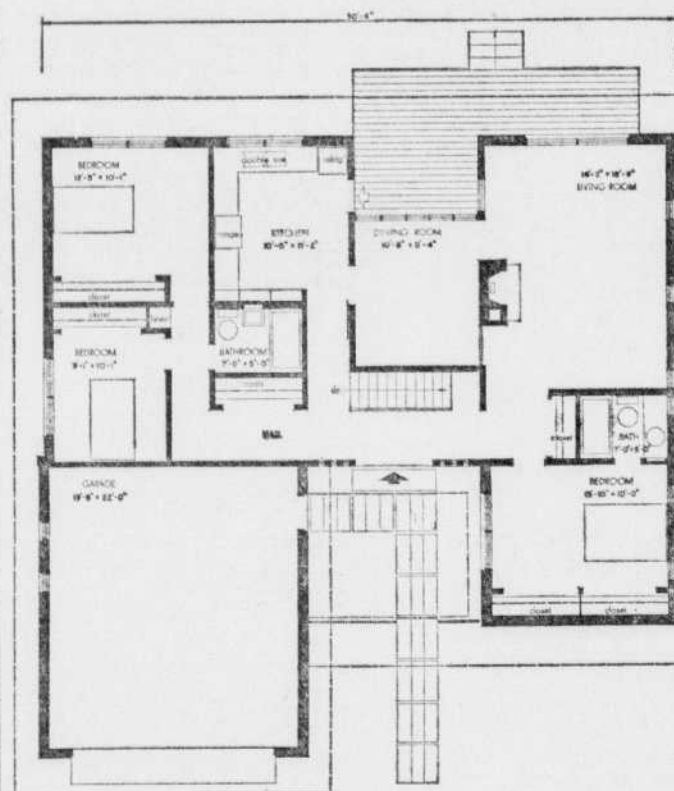
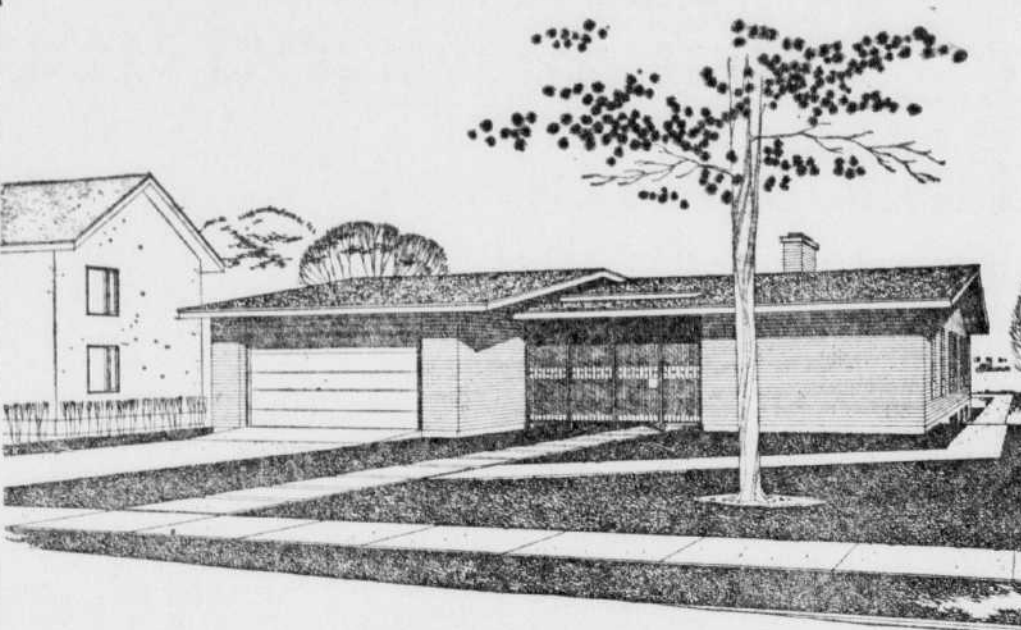

Designed by architect R. B. W. Gordon of Toronto, this large three bedroom home places accent on privacy.

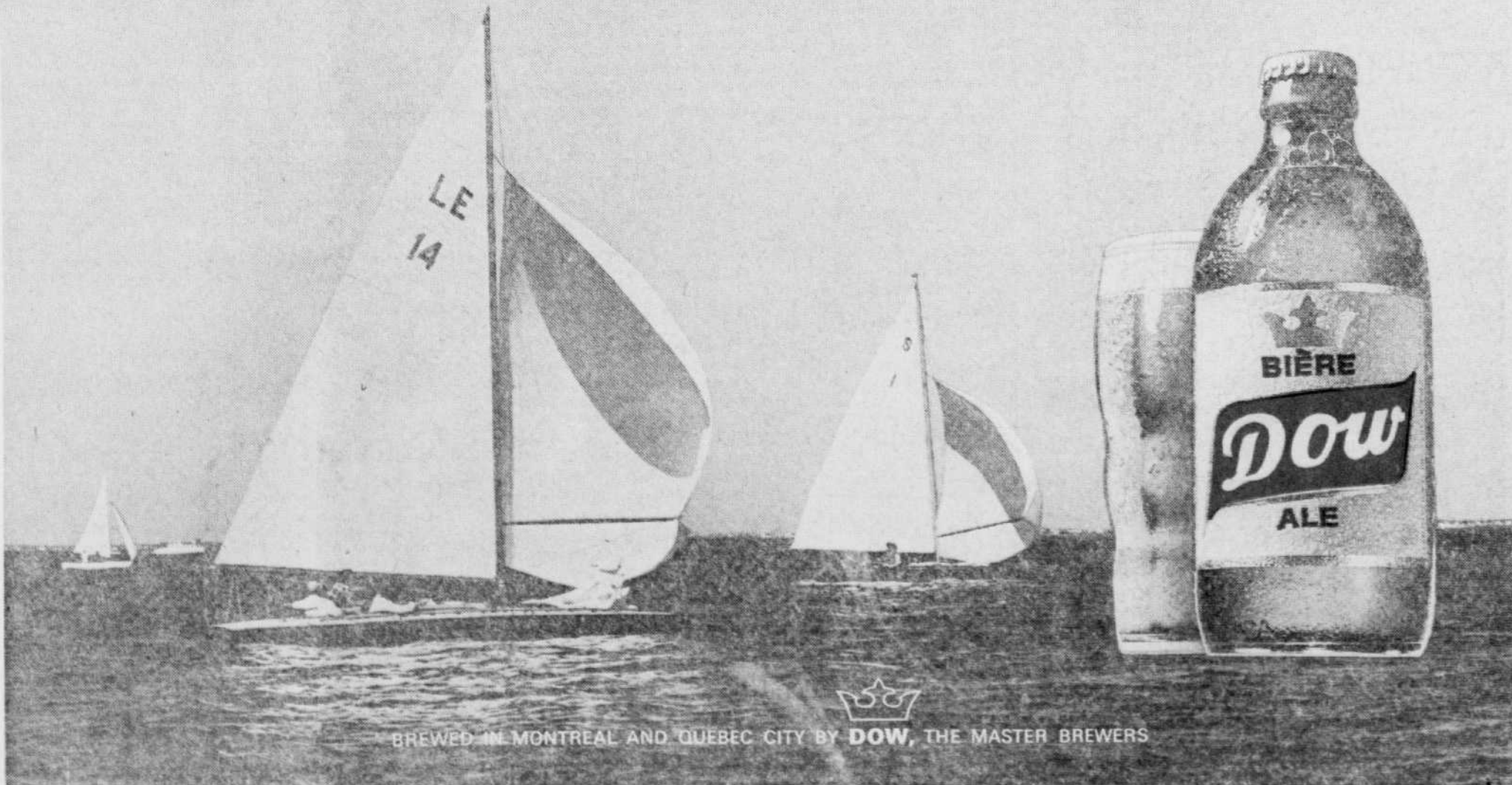
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
