It is a genuine safeguard, both for the pedestrian and the rider.

No one could cross the street after he had passed St. Louis Gate, until he reached the Toll Gate. Mud, sticky and clammy, was everywhere in evidence. LONDON, April 24.—With reference to the statement, in the Times this morning, that the securing of the proxies by the committee which is running Sir Charles Rivers-Wilson for the Presidency of the Grand Trunk Railway Company, in opposition to Sir Henry Tyler, it may be said that the committee have their reasons for their success upon the securing of the admission of proprietors holding £25,000,000 of securities, to any candidate. They also claim £6,000,000 proxies which they say were sent to them for use against Sir Henry Tyler. Speaking of this to-day, Mr. Lindley, the Secretary of the Grand Trunk Railway Company, informed me this morning that this was probably a wild and gross estimate, for the bondholders have no means of registering their holdings of bonds. "And further," he said "proxies are not received until just before the meeting, so I cannot say what support the anti-Tyler people will have. "But the capital of the Company is about £57,000,000, of which, on the committee's own showing, only £13,000,000 have been pledged against Sir Henry Tyler."
