Business of the meeting was the election of the chairman and vice-chairman, Dr. S. E. McDowell.

The Chairman asked the Board's approval of having Mrs. Betty Turner act as secretary of the Board and this agreement was reached. Paul-O. Goulet is in Montreal today. Also in Montreal is Attorney John Ahern who has proclaimed his intention to file a petition in Superior Court at Campbell's Bay under the Dominion Controverted Elections Act alleging illegalities in the vote April 8th. Mr. Ahern is not the petitioner but is acting for the petitioner.

To enter this petition a deposit of \$1000 is required. If the petition is filed before the May 27 deadline, the four candidates will be notified and they each have three alternatives. They can either ignore it, agree to it or contest it.

If it is ignored by all candidates, the petitioner's suit might go through the court uncontested and if successful, the seat for the Pontiac-Temiscamingue Member in Parliament would be declared vacant. The expenses would be the petitioner's.

If all candidates agree to the petition there would be no law suit and the seat would be declared vacant.

If any candidate contests the petition, the law suit would be fought in court the same as any other law suit and the judges would most likely levy charges against the loser. The seat then would or would not become vacant depending on the decision of the judges. There will be two judges if the case is contested.

Neither of the first two possibilities is likely because Paul Martineau has declared that if he receives notice of any such petition having been filed before the May 27 deadline, he will write his contest to the court which will probably cause the issue to be joined and the case to proceed.

The court case will be based on alleged illegalities and will not be directed against any candidate. Mr. J. O. Laflamme of Campbell's Bay has been assisting the Montreal attorney in investigating evidence of prejury. His office is "overflowing with complaints" he says and he has gathered enough evidence to substantiate the petition.

(A simultaneous investigation being carried on by the Provincial Police into cases of alleged perjury in connection with the election has, according to Mr. Laflamme, nothing to do with the petitioner's case. The QPP are working on criminal offenses for the Federal Government, he says.)

Now, after all this is over and if the court grants the petition, it will notify the Speaker of the House of Commons who will declare the seat vacant. Then it is up to the Government to decide what it wants to do about it.

Any Member of the House can bring it to the attention of the House that a seat is vacant and it would be decided to hold a by-election or the Government might call for a by-election immediately. Or, as has happened in the past, months and years might go by before the seat is filled.

If a by-election is ordered it would be carried out exactly in the same manner as any election in this riding. Party conventions would take place to name candidates. Any number of political parties could enter the race, as before. Campaigns would be carried out as usual and election day would ensue.

Meanwhile, as all the above possibilities are ifs and whens, Paul Martineau is the representative of Pontiac-Temiscamingue in the Federal House of Parliament and informs us he is performing his duties as our elected Member.
