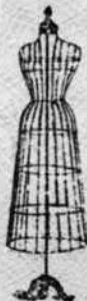

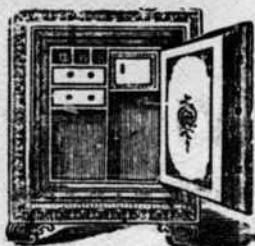

PREFACE.

CARRYING out the plan of last year, the Publishers have inserted the names of those residing in Coteau St Pierre, Delorimier Municipality and Petite Cote (formerly Cote Visitation), Longue Pointe, Montreal West, Mount Royal Vale, Notre Dame de Grâce, Notre Dame des Neiges, Notre Dame des Neiges Ouest, Outremont, Turcot Village, Villeray and Verdun in the Montreal Directory proper. Subscribers will not now have to refer to separate portions of the Directory in search of a name, as all names (except those residing in Lachine, Laprairie, Longueuil, Montreal South, Sault au Recollet, St. Lambert and St. Laurent) will be found in the Alphabetical portion of the Directory. The total number of names in the Directory this year, not including those found in the Outskirts, is by actual count 71,933. In the compilation of the work the following results have been obtained; Names taken out 21,264. New names 25,039. Changes made in names 17,167. Names remaining unchanged 29,727. This shows that 4,033 names have been added to the number of last year. With this issue a handsome and correct Map of the City, especially drawn and engraved for the book, is inserted in every copy. In the Street portion, houses that were unoccupied at the time of going to press are shown by the number of the street; three calls and over were made at each, and every one of these unoccupied houses.

The Miscellaneous portion will be found more full and complete than ever before.

It need hardly be said that the same labor and effort to secure accuracy which the Publishers have always put forth have not been withheld in the preparation of the present edition. The wish of the Publishers is to give the latest and most correct information, and with that end in view no expense or labor is spared on the book; but it has to be taken into account that the whole of the work—compilation, printing and binding—is done between the 4th of May and the 27th of June, a period of eight weeks, so that some allowance should be made for errors or omissions.

As usual, the book is divided into five parts, viz.: (1) The Advertisers Classified Directory; (2) The Street Directory; (3) The Alphabetical Directory; (4) The Miscellaneous Information; (5) The Outskirts.

This book is respectfully dedicated to its generous patrons—THE PUBLIC.

REVIEW OF THE PAST YEAR.

In June last the whole country was in the turmoil of a Dominion Election contest the vital point being whether the Government should or should not be supported upon its policy of restoring to Manitoba the Separate School system repealed by the Premier of that province, Hon. Mr. Greenway. The Liberal party won in the contest, and the Conservatives, who had ruled for eighteen years, passed into opposition. In the excitement Montreal shared, and the once almost solidly Conservative city returned only Dr. Roddick and Mr. Quinn as members on the Conservative side. Sir Charles Tupper resigned and Mr. Laurier entered office early in July, since which time a settlement of the Manitoba School Question has virtually been effected and a new tariff with a most favored nation clause adopted. The Liberals were also successful in the elections in this Province this month. Hon. Mr. Marchand becoming Premier, vice Hon. Mr. Flynn.

During the year the question of amending the city charter was again before the legislature, the aldermen being mostly in favor of extending the borrowing power, to which citizens made objection unless the excess was well protected against being applied to what is euphoniously termed boodling, and is really equivalent to thieving. The influence of the Mayor was thrown into the scale in favor of due protection of the citizens' money, and according to a statement issued by him, the City stood in the following position :

which showed the City to have already gone \$407,164 deeper into debt than it was legally authorized to do. The City was ultimately permitted to borrow \$2,000,000 for specified purposes.

During the year the City maintained its reputation as a favorite convention centre. The Dominion National Association of Master Plumbers was organized in Montreal in July, the American Pharmaceutical Association convened here in August, and was followed by the Canadian Medical Association towards the close of the month. On 9th September the quaint continental army uniforms of the Putnam Phalanx of Hartford, Conn., were to be seen in our streets, and in October the Brotherhood of St. Andrews were in convention.

During the year the British Medical Association, one of the most important scientific bodies in the world, decided to meet in Montreal in 1897, and elected Dr. T. G. Roddick its president.

The Railway Men's Christian Association also held a convention in the city, while several other Christian bodies held meetings more or less local, and Rev. Mr. Gale, the well known revivalist, made a successful visit.

In addition to conventions the city entertained H. M. warships "Intrepid" and "Tartar," was honored by a visit by Lord Russell, of Killowen, Chief Justice of

England, Ian Maclaren, Albani, Marquis Ito and other celebrities, including W. J. Bryan, the silver advocate and defeated candidate for the Presidency of the United States.

Among the events of 1896 was the burning of the main Exhibition building 29th July, an historic edifice that once stood upon St. Catherine street, and in which the great Montreal Exhibition of 1850 had been held. The Exhibition Company, with commendable promptitude, erected a more commodious building in time for the usual September Fair, which was held and with great success.

More serious in its effects was the Gilmour fire on St. Peter Street, whereby three brave firemen lost their lives on 16th October, leaving two widows and eighteen children to depend upon the kindness of their fellow-citizens. Their confidence was not misplaced, for a large amount was raised in subscriptions and handed over to the bereaved families. The funeral of these firemen was one of the largest and most imposing ever seen in Montreal. By another fire, in a small dwelling, several children lost their lives before the eyes of their agonized parents, and notwithstanding desperate efforts on the part of the firemen to effect a rescue.

There were several other important fires, chief among which was that of the Barron Block on St. James Street, in which an aged woman lost her life.

The movement of trade up town to St. Catherine street has continued, and now such firms as the Messrs. Morgan, Murphy, Ogilvy, Birks, Notman, Hamilton, Tooke, Dickson, Cassidy, Hollands are to be found upon this fast improving street. The Carsley Co., however, remain down town, and have greatly extended their premises. The fine offices of the Bell Telephone Company on Notre Dame street have been completed, and the Company has laid its wires underground in conduits at a cost of \$100,000, after much litigation and not a few street scenes with the Civic authorities. The Lachine Hydraulic Power Company has followed this example, both companies having acquired charter rights in the premises which placed them beyond control of the city.

The munificent gift of a building to the Diocesan Theological College by Mr. A. F. Gault took place Oct. 21, the late lamented Principal of the College, Dr. Henderson, passing away only a few hours previous to the ceremony, to which he had looked forward so earnestly. The Young Women's Christian Association building was also opened during the year.

The year 1896 will long be remembered as Canada's year in the sporting world. Gaudaur, the Canadian oarsman, won the sculling championship, the "Canada" yacht of Toronto carried off the prize at the Toledo races, and Mr. Duggan in his half rater "Glencairn" brought home to Montreal the Sewanika cup, in honor of which event the lake shore was illuminated for ten miles, from Lachine to St. Anne's. In England the Canadian Firemen and Artillerymen had distinguished themselves.

The past twelve months have held high carnival in spite of the weather prophets and almanacs. The middle of August afforded Montrealers, in common with other cities on the continent, a foretaste of the proverbial future punishment. On Aug. 10th the thermometer registered 88° in the shade, and many were prostrated. In New York the heat was even worse; many deaths were recorded, horses died by scores, and the fire departments watered the streets every night in the congested districts where whole families camped in search of relief. The winter which followed was noted for its almost entire

lack of snow, so little falling that throughout the province a great deal of grass was killed at the roots by frost, while the spring has been unusually rainy and cold, only recently leaping into summer at a bound. On 17th September last the city was visited by a severe windstorm which wrecked several houses, and did much damage in and around the city. Curiously enough the storm arrived at about the time predicted by one Abbé Combe of France for cataclysms marking the approach of the millennium, and much anxiety was felt among the superstitious in consequence, not greatly relieved by the frequent and unusual earthquakes which have up till quite recently shaken the city.

One of the strangest sights in a new country like this was the sailing from the port of an emigrant ship bound for Brazil, on the 15th September last. Deceived by false promises, and notwithstanding the warnings of the press and officials of Canada, some five hundred souls left Canada to seek fortune under alien skies. The scenes on the deck before the vessel sailed were unparalleled. A large crowd assembled and hooted the officers of the ship, while now and again some emigrant, halting between his faith in the false and glowing promises of the agents and his own common sense, would rush to or from the ship. The vessel sailed for Brazil, and for months after the unfortunate emigrants have struggled home as best they could, aided by the charity of friends or by the British consuls and vice consuls in Brazil.

The year has also been marked by the introduction of the United States railway system in the Grand Trunk, following upon the appointment of Mr. C. M. Hays to the general managership. The new management continues active, and contracts have been signed for reconstructing the Victoria Bridge with a double track. The Canadian Pacific Railway was subjected to a serious strike among its train dispatchers, lasting from September 28th to October 7th, and which was finally settled by the intervention of a delegation from Winnipeg.

The trade of Montreal in the past year was well maintained. The arrivals of ocean vessels were 709, of 1,216,468 tons, and the value of the imports was \$45,900,270, that of the exports being \$49,160,364. The shipments of wheat in 1896 were 7,425,742 bushels, against 3,827,201 in 1895, an increase of 3,598,541 bushels. The shipments of corn showed an increase of 4,289,971 bushels, or nearly 200 per cent., while the shipment of oats sprang from 10,200 bushels to 2,653,176. Lumber showed an increase of 45,961,604 feet board measure, and pease increased a hundred per cent. Sheep shipments, however, fell off 129,659, and cattle and horses showed a decline. The exports of butter were 177,169 packages, against 77,828 in 1895, and the shipments of cheese were 2,015,253, against 1,729,061 boxes. The bank clearings were \$527,851,000, against \$583,160,000 in 1895, and \$546,600,000 in 1894. The stock exchange has been usually firm almost throughout the year, and the following table shows the business of some of the local banks which hold meetings in June.
