BRITISH TROOPS ARRIVING DAILY ON FRENCH SOIL

500,000 Have Already Arrived and Another Million Will Reach France Within Next Few Weeks. Germans Were Thwarted When They Set Out With Submarines to Look For Transports. Among Lately Arrived Soldiers Are Regiments From Malta and Canada.

Paris, Feb. 16. — (Special) — In confirmation of recent messages stating that about 500,000 British troops were to be landed on French soil within a few days, visitors returning from Etaples, near Boulogne, report regular cities of British soldiers with a population of 300,000 to 600,000.

The rest of Kitchener's Army of one million are expected to be landed in France within the next four weeks.

CANADIANS ARRIVE.

Among the lately arrived soldiers are regiments from Malta and Canada.

NOT AMAZED AT GERMAN RAIDS.

No amazement is now expressed at the many German air and submarine raids of the latter part of last month.

GERMANS MISSED TRANSPORTS.

The Germans undoubtedly were searching for the British transports, but Kitchener thwarted them. He did not send the troop ships directly across the Channel to try to land in the north of France. They were sent out into the ocean and then to southern French ports.

Some of the troops, it is known, have been landed as far south as Marseilles and Bordeaux.

HOUSING BIG ARMY.

To meet the requirements of housing the big army of British soldiers, miles of water pipes have been laid, and acres of forests have been razed.

EXPECT TO REMAIN LONG.

That the British troops expect to remain in France for a long time is proved by the erection of reinforced concrete houses for the officers.

PREPARATIONS AT ROUEN.

At Rouen preparations for receiving the British Empire soldiers are going on even on a larger scale than at Etaples.

GERMAN ADVANCE HAS BEEN STOPPED

SITUATION OF RUSSIANS COMPELLED HINDENBURG TO CHANGE HIS TACTICS

Petrograd, February 16.—Since the great German forces brought their last concerted sweeping movement across East Prussia to the borders of Russia, the conditions facing them have imposed a radical change in their tactics.

The central aim of the operations was very clearly defined up to a point when the Russians succeeded in drawing out from the gap between the swift columns of the enemy north

and south, which were beginning to pass beyond them on both flanks. The Germans now find they have still to fight a combination of Russian columns inside the fringe of Russia and in the bare, thinly populated plains of Poland.

The determined fight the Russians have maintained in the angle along the line Lyck-Grajewo, where they still hold the ascendancy, has prevented co-ordination of attack by the German army across eastward on the borders of Poland and its northern part, which is now held up against the Russian defences on the Nieman.

ARREST GERMAN MOVE

This arrest of the German combination has led to a noticeable scattering of their operations.

HINDENBURG'S PLAN FAILS

Field Marshal von Hindenberg hoped that the vigorously begun advance was to achieve such complete success that he could spare some army corps for the spring campaign against the Allies in the west. This plan has failed and it is more likely that he will have to send substantial reinforcements to link up the broken and scattered lines into which his invading army is now spread.

The trackless country along the narrow Naraw is rendered still more difficult by the soaking thaw, and is a natural barrier to a flank in force against the Russian northern communications and with the central campaign in Poland.

STUBBORN BATTLE EXPECTED

The immediate prospects is a succession of stubborn battles under the most trying natural conditions. Even when not in contact with the enemy, the infantry columns, with only barest necessary transport, can scarcely cover six miles a day.

DOING WELL IN CARPATHIANS.

The Russians are doing well in the Carpathians, and in western Galicia they have secured the strong position of Gorlice, with control of the railway.

The Germans and Austrians together lost very heavily in the efforts to reach eastern Galicia and the Naptha region in the Stry Valley. The Russians have made some progress southward across the heights covering the Munkacs road and the Germans are now on the defensive under Kozimnoka Pass.

GERMANS OUTCLASSED IN ARTILLERY ACTIONS

Paris, February 16.—The following official communication was issued by the War Office last night: "Only a few actions are reported, and these favorable to our artillery. Near Poelcapelle, northeast of Ypres, one of the batteries of the enemy was silenced. At Beaurains, south of Arras, several German trenches have been destroyed. In the neighborhood of Soissons, and in the region of Perthes, some earthworks of the enemy and collections of troops have been efficaciously cannonaded."

POST MORTEM AND INQUEST

Examination Will be Made of Body of E. Vintinner Murdered Near Lake Megantic

BELIEVED THAT THE DETECTIVES HAVE IMPORTANT EVIDENCE BEARING ON THE CASE.

Bury, February 16.—(Special).—Tomorrow morning a post mortem examination will be made of the body of Ethel Vintinner, the young girl who was murdered near Lake Megantic. Following the post mortem examination an inquest will be held, to be conducted by Coroner Bachand, of Sherbrooke.

This information was given out by Detective Aitken this morning. The original intention was to have the inquest to-night, the detectives intending to reach here from Lake Megantic on the afternoon train. The C.P.R. has taken this train off, and consequently the detectives could not reach Bury until this evening.

Although no information is available, it is understood that the detectives have new evidence to introduce. They delayed the calling of the second investigation until they had secured sufficient evidence to throw some light on the case.

SPAIN WOULD JOIN WITH U. S.

If Latter Proposes Joint Measures on Part of Neutrals Over Germany's Note

THE SPANISH GOVERNMENT HAS ADOPTED AN ATTITUDE OF RESERVE REGARDING POSITION.

Madrid, via Paris, February 16.—(Special).—The Spanish Government has adopted an attitude of extreme reserve regarding its position on Germany's note announcing its determination to include the waters around Great Britain in the war zone.

While Spain will try to avoid any action which might give any belligerent an excuse to accuse it of departing from its attitude of neutrality, it is understood the Government will join with the United States if the latter proposes joint measures on the part of all neutrals.

ONTARIO LEGISLATURE OPENS.

Toronto, Feb. 16. — (Special) — Lieut.-Governor Hendrie opened his first Ontario Legislature and Premier Hearst was present in the House for the first time as prime minister, this afternoon.

HORSES FOR MOUNTED RIFLES

Expected That a Large Number Will Arrive Within the Next Few Days

RECRUITING THROUGHOUT THE EASTERN TOWNSHIPS REPORTED TO BE VERY GRATIFYING.

A number of applications for enlistment in the Fifth Mounted Rifles keeps steadily increasing and the opening of additional recruiting offices in the Townships is contemplated. Seven applicants passed the medical examination in Sherbrooke yesterday and others will be examined this afternoon.

Matters are proceeding very satisfactorily at the camp on the Exhibition grounds. The issuing of clothing commenced to-day and a contingent of horses is daily expected. While awaiting their arrival the time is occupied with the usual physical and squad drill.

It is expected that the Sherbrooke recruiting office will be transferred from the 53rd Army to the Exhibition grounds in a day or so. This decision has been arrived at in order to facilitate matters and to render the process of recruiting more convenient for all concerned.

ANOTHER CONTINGENT FROM MONTREAL.

Another draft of fifty men arrived this morning from Montreal and went into barracks at the Exhibition Grounds. About fifty others will be sent on later, which will complete Montreal's contribution to the Mounted Rifles, unless further orders are given.

GERMAN CRUISER ATTACKED

That on the Gazella Said to be Work of British Submarines

ENTERED THE BALTIC SEA ALTHOUGH ROUTE THICKLY STREWN WITH MINES

Amsterdam, Feb. 16.—The Berliner Tageblatt says numerous communications leave little doubt that the recent attack on the German cruiser Gazella was undertaken by British submarines. Russia possesses no underwater vessel adequate to operate so far from its base.

The submarines are alleged to have entered the Baltic Sea by way of the Great Belt, although this is thickly strewn with mines. They accomplished this by following closely in the wake of steamships which were carrying a pilot to guide them through the mine fields. Another version says the craft must have been shipped via Russia.

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DISCUSSED WATER RATES

Ald. Denault in Supporting Amendments Claimed Presented By-Law Unworkable

MR. BEAMAN, ROAD COMMISSIONER, GETS NOTICE TO QUIT POSITION ON THE FIRST OF MARCH.

"I have heard that some people leave their taps running all night so as to use up the quantity of water necessary to secure the lowest rate for water provided by the present by-law" was the statement made by Ald. Denault in support of his amendments to this by-law submitted to the council last night. He maintained that the present by-law was manifestly unworkable and unfair, inasmuch as a condition of affairs such as mentioned above was possible.

PROPOSED CHANGE IN THE WATER RATES.

The council did not show a disposition to finally dispose of the new by-law, and on the suggestion of Ald. Brault the council adjourned and the measure was discussed informally. The most drastic change in the by-law is the change in rate to manufacturers from a sliding scale of seven and one-half cents per thousand gallons to thirty cents per thousand gallons to a straight charge of fourteen cents.

Ald. Jenckes stated that if this were put into effect it would mean that the industries would have to pump their own water, and this would mean a considerable loss to the department, as the revenue from industries amounts to quite a lot.

At the present time the Jenckes Machine Company was paying from three to four hundred dollars per year for water. For a little more than this they could pump all the water they required. If the present amendments became law they would have to pay twice that amount, which they could not afford to do, and, as a result, would install a pumping plant.

TRIMMED SEVERAL CLAUSES.

At the informal meeting which followed, several clauses were "trimmed," and when the by-law is read the third time and passed it will be stripped of its objectionable features.

THE GAS DEPARTMENT.

In answer to a question put by Ald. Denault at the last meeting, asking if it would not be wise to consider the placing of the gas department with the water department, Mr. B. A. Dugal, accountant of the gas and electric departments, submitted a comprehensive report on this question. The gist of the report was that he could see no object in transferring the gas department to the water or any other department. There was always a deficit, and the gas and electric department was in a better position to handle this deficit than the water department. Taken from the electric department this deficit would have to be met from the taxes. The report gave interesting figures as to the cost of manufacturing gas, showing it to be one dollar and sixteen cents per thousand feet. The retail price was one dollar and a quarter per thousand feet.

RECOMMENDS NEW GAS PLANT.

The report strongly recommended the installation of a new plant. The (Continued on Page 5)

Bloemfontein, South Africa, Feb. 16, via London.—(Special).—The trial of General Christian De Wet and other leaders of the South African rebellion against Great Britain, who are charged with high treason, began here to-day.

BERLIN HAS HAD ANOTHER WILD DREAM

Berlin, February 16, via wireless to London. — (Special) — An official statement reading as follows was issued in Berlin to-day:

"Inasmuch as it is to the interest of Great Britain that conflicts arise between Germany and neutral powers, it is thought in German shipping circles that English submarines in order to bring about this end may purposely sink one or more neutral ships.

"It is known also in the shipping circles that Great Britain has laid large quantities of mines against German submarines."

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PATRIOTISM---PRODUCTION CAMPAIGN IN TOWNSHIPS

First of a Series of Meetings Organized by Mr. John McClary Largely Attended at Lennoxville. Agricultural Experts Told How Farmers Could Assist in Great Cause by Paying More Attention to Production From Land and Stock. Duty of Canadian Farmers at Present Time to the Empire Forcibly Presented.

The first meetings in connection with the patriotism and production campaign in the Eastern Townships, which has been organized by Mr. J. A. McClary, superintendent of the Experimental Farm at Lennoxville, under the direction of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, were held in the Town Hall, Lennoxville, yesterday afternoon and evening.

DUTY OF CANADIAN FARMERS.

The duty and opportunity of Canadian farmers to the Empire at this time was very forcibly presented by the lecturers and speakers. The enthusiasm displayed at the meetings yesterday may be taken as sufficient indication of the success of the other

had gone to the battlefields, the citizens had subscribed their share of funds for patriotic purposes, and he hoped the farmers would do their part in increasing the production.

WORLD'S NEEDS IN CEREALS.

Mr. F. C. Nunnick, Agriculturist, of the Conservation Commission, Ottawa, spoke on "Increased Production as Pertains to Farm Crops." He pointed out the world's needs in cereals—wheat, oats, rye and barley. There was a shortage in these and even had there been no war the crop was smaller than normally; with the expectation of the devastation and destruction of the European fields, this shortage would probably become more extensive than at the present time, for with the unfavorable conditions under which the European fall crops were put in and the lack of men, motors, labor and all things needed to put in their spring crops, the shortage would be greatly aggravated.

PROSPECTS FOR 1915.

Mr. Nunnick outlined the prospects for the 1915 crop. There was a large increase in the acreage of fall crops practically all over the world, but with the expectation of our present supply being consumed entirely, even if we had a larger crop in 1915 than in 1914, every bushel would be needed and it was quite safe to say that production could scarcely overtake the demand, at least for this coming year's crop.

HOW TO INCREASE YIELD.

The speaker pointed out some means of increasing the yield on the farms, mentioning amongst others the elimination of losses that exist now, touching on the question of preserving the manure on the farms, the necessity and advantage of sowing only good seed, and the advisability of preventing diseases of crops. As an illustration, he gave the treatment of seed grain for smut, the need for better cultivation, and the need for reducing the loss from weed and insect pests. He also dealt with the question of conveniences on the farm, labor saving devices such as the use of wider implements and operating by less man power and greater horse and implement power. Taking all things into consideration the economic interests of the farmer united with his patriotic duty in making it safe to stimulate the production on farms this year.

LIVESTOCK MARKET PICKING UP.

Mr. E. S. Archibald, B.S.A., of the Dominion Animal Husbandry Department, spoke on "Livestock." At the outset he said it was difficult to talk on the live stock industry in regard to increased production as many steers were bought last fall which have been fed at a loss during the winter and possibly will have to be marketed at a loss. Many farmers had felt this in the hog industry, this state of affairs being largely due to the weakening of the live stock market and the increase in the price of foodstuffs. In spite of these facts, there was reason to believe the market was beginning to pick up again, and if so, there was an opportunity for a profit margin in feeding live stock.

20,000,000 NON-PRODUCERS.

Owing to the war there were 20,000,000 non-producers at the present time who previously were producers. This gap must be filled in order to keep up the food supply. It was the duty of the Canadian farmers to do everything in their power not only to fill this gap but to increase production as well. They must stay in the business in spite of weak markets (Continued on Page 8)

PEACE SUNDAY AT STANSTEAD

Principal Trueman of S.W.C. Spoke on the 100 Years of Peace Between U. S. and Canada

GREAT NATIONS OF THE WORLD HAVE BEEN DEVELOPED THROUGH GREAT WARS

Stanstead, February 16—(Special)—On Sunday morning at Centenary Church Principal Trueman of the College preached a deeply thought out and appropriate sermon for Peace Sunday which was observed Sunday throughout the countries to celebrate the 100 years of peace between the greatest Empire and the greatest Republic in the world. The trend of Principal Trueman's remarks was to show that throughout all ages from the beginning of the world to the present time the nations which are now the great nations of the world have been developed through the process of great wars as all nations have by this means developed themselves having used all their efforts to act and react against their opposing forces but that now with the present means of immigration and transportation war was not necessary to bring out the strength of the people. The following are interesting notes in connection with the Peace Anniversary and the Treaty of Ghent:

"No centenary deserves so well to be celebrated as that which marks the completion of one hundred years of peace between the United States of America and Great Britain. That two such great nations should so through full hundred years, not only without fighting against each other, but with an ever-increasing feeling of friendliness, is surely cause of sincere rejoicing. The terrible scenes now being enacted in Europe reveal what an awful tragedy war is. We should be sincerely thankful that upon this continent we still enjoy the blessings of peace.

"The treaty declared that there should be a firm and universal peace between the two countries. "It is worthy of note that the Belgian city in which the great event took place a century ago is now the centre of the bloodiest war that was ever waged. The very building in which the peace delegates signed the historic documents still stands, while all around it has been heard the roar of cannon and bursting shell.

"Let us show the world that international differences can be settled by arbitration without appealing to the cannon and the sword, and let our splendid lakes remain forever unhaunted by the destroying dreadnoughts of war. Let us pour our money into education; into the missionary enterprise; into the social uplifting of the people, and learn to trust one another."

So Sir John French is Said to Have Told a Couple of Questioners

With considerable skill and graciousness the stranger proved that strategically Napoleon held the first place. "Ah! Then you won Waterloo?" was the rejoinder. In quiet and reverent voice the stranger said, "God won Waterloo," and the speaker was General Sir John French—Presbyterian Witness.

SCOTSTOWN AND DISTRICT

C. P. R. Paid no Attention to Petition Re-Cancelling of Train Service

WHOLE QUESTION MAY BE SUBMITTED FOR CONSIDERATION OF RAILWAY COMMISSIONERS AT OTTAWA

Scotstown, February 16—(Special)—In spite of the strong protest entered by the section most affected by the taking off of the morning and evening train, the C. P. R. took no notice of it and took them on as stated in the circular which was posted in the several stations where the travelling public was affected. It was the feeling that the protest would have little or no effect on account of the experience obtained on former occasions. It is not yet impossible that they (the C.P.R.) may be made to at least pay some attention to those whose wishes ought to have some weight, as the people in the district affected can still send in an appeal to the Railway Commission at Ottawa and it will be at least taken some notice of should the Commission decide to investigate the matter. Judging by the feeling of the people it should not be a difficult matter to draw up such a petition and have it circulated so that it could be signed by a sufficient number to make it perfectly evident to the Government that the removal of these two trains is working a real hardship to the inhabitants of this section of the C. P. R. system. It seems as if this corporation had been so used to acting without proper consideration of those most concerned in the change, that nothing short of a strongly worded petition to the Railway Commission will have any effect in this instance so that it is up to the residents to start something that will be more effective than any move they have made so far.

FIGHTING IN MASS

German Soldier Not Trained to Use His Brains—Has no Initiative

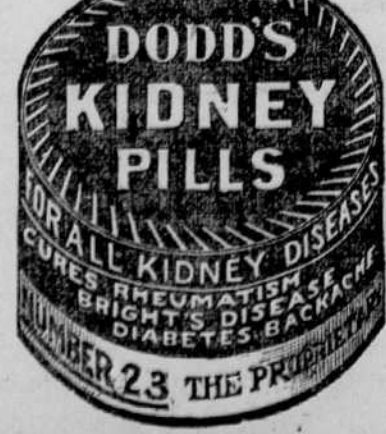
The German soldier fights in close order because he is not able to fight in any other way, declares a man who has soldiered with Germans, writing in an English periodical.

Why is this so? he asks. Is the ordinary German not as quick-witted and as intelligent as the ordinary Briton or the average Frenchman?

The German is obliged to fight shoulder to shoulder because he has not the initiative and the self-reliance necessary to enable him to fight well in extended order. Originally the average German may be as quick-witted and intelligent as the average Briton or Frenchman; but those Germans with whom I came in contact while serving in the French Foreign Legion—and there were hundreds of them—certainly did not compare favorably with either French or British soldiers in the quality of their intelligence or their capacity for independent action.

The fact is that initiative is killed and intelligence is stunted by the German system of training. A German soldier is taught to do as he is told, and nothing but what he is told. He is just a machine and quite incapable of displaying the initiative and self-reliance that is necessary to the making of a good open-order soldier.

The close formation would be the best method of attack if there were an unlimited supply of men, and it didn't matter to anyone how many of them were killed. The Germans haven't an unlimited supply of men, though they apparently think they have; but it certainly does appear as if it doesn't matter to any of the German generals how many of their people's relations are killed.

RECOMMENDS COLD STORAGE

Dr. Tracy, Meat Inspector, Confirms Certain Conditions Surrounding Meat Market

4470 POUNDS OF MEAT SEIZED IN 1914—PRIVATE BUTCHER SHOPS GREATLY IMPROVED

The following is the report of Dr. A. W. Tracy, Meat Inspector for the City of Sherbrooke, as presented at the last Council meeting by Ald. Fortier:

To the Chairman of the Market Committee:

Sir:— I have the honor to make the following report of the result of market inspection in this city for the year 1914.

During the past year the following seizures of meat, owing to disease and other conditions making it unfit for human consumption, were made:—

Beef—tuberculosis	2000 lbs.
Beef—emaciated	950 lbs.
Veal—Immature	1220 lbs.
Pork—sour	250 lbs.
Fowl—diseased	50 lbs.

Total 4470 lbs.

In addition to the above several small quantities of decayed fruit were confiscated during the hot weather. These were largely bananas that were partially or wholly decomposed. On four other occasions complaints outside the city limits were investigated and in three cases meat was condemned and destroyed.

On various occasions, during the last three years, I have felt it my duty to complain of the conditions surrounding the meat market. We have a table along the two sides, that has no protection from weather, and when it rains or storms, the meat exposed for sale there not only receives the rain and storm but also all the drippings from the roof—this is hardly an ideal sanitary condition but as no effort is being made to improve it, I imagine your committee intends to let it remain in this condition.

I would like to respectfully suggest that a cold storage be put in the market for the convenience of the out of town vendors for the purpose of storing their meat during the hot weather. More or less good meat spoils every summer owing to the fact that the out of town butcher has no proper contrivance for cooling his meat before the market opens on Saturday morning.

The private butcher shops in the city have been inspected twice during the past year and with the exception of a few minor defects which could be easily remedied they were found to be in a very good condition. I have received no complaints from anyone with regard to the condition of our shops this past year. On the whole, I must say that our butchers are doing the best they can to give the public good value for their money, and I find that they are all making permanent improvements in their places of business as fast as they can.

With regard to the abattoirs, unfortunately, there is much to be desired. Some of our butchers have built and maintain first class private abattoirs and these are being largely used by many of the butchers, but we have some that ought not to be used at all under any circumstances.

From the conditions as I have seen them in other cities, I think we can congratulate ourselves on having a very good meat supply in this town. There are, of course, many desirable conditions that we have not yet acquired, but in looking back over the last six years I find that we have made very material progress along many lines, and I am sure we will continue to do so as the city council continues to take a helpful interest in this work.

You will notice that we have a large falling off in tubercular meat from this date five years ago when the total seized amounted to over 15,000 lbs. alone.

This is no doubt largely due to the fact that we have done a large amount of testing of the milk cows in the dairies with the later removal of all those which reacted. When this is done thoroughly year after year, records show that the disease gradually dies out, and it is a remarkable fact that most of the tubercular meat seized on this market has been brought to Sherbrooke from the herds of cattle in this locality. SALE OF CARGO OF WILHELMINA

BRITISH GOVERNMENT MAKES DEFINITE ANNOUNCEMENT ON QUESTION.

London, Feb. 16.—The Foreign Office announced definitely yesterday afternoon that if the cargo of the American ship *Wilhelmina* should be diverted for the relief of the distress in Belgium, the decision to send her cargo to a British prize court would be reconsidered. Otherwise her cargo must be submitted to the decision of the court.

HOLLAND HAS ENTERED PROTEST

Notes Have Been Presented to Germany and Great Britain

OBJECT TO WATERS AROUND THE BRITISH ISLES BEING DECLARED IN WAR ZONE

The Hague, via London, February 16.—The Netherlands has maintained the strictest neutrality by presenting notes of protest at the same moment to Germany and Great Britain regarding the acts of these Governments in respectively declaring a war zone of the waters around the British Isles and in using neutral flags.

Diplomats here have been awaiting action of this kind, and their expectations were fulfilled last evening when it was announced that the Dutch minister at Berlin had been instructed to hand the note to the German Foreign Office, the other note being communicated to Great Britain at the same time.

BRITAIN READY TO MEET MENACE

Winston Churchill Gave Interesting Review of the Conditions in Navy

EVERY SHIP IN BRITISH NAVY WAS FIT FOR SERVICE AND WERE FULLY MANNED.

London, Feb. 16.—The Right Hon. Winston Spencer Churchill, in introducing the navy estimates in the House of Commons yesterday afternoon, gave an interesting review of the present naval situation. He said that efficiency was the keynote of the Admiralty's programme, and that at the outbreak of war, the supplies of ammunition, men and oil were complete. Every ship in the navy which was fit for service, as well as new ships which were being built for foreign governments and armed merchantmen, had been fully manned.

"In fact the German army was no more fit for an attempted war on a gigantic scale than was the British fleet for nation defence," he said. "After six months of war, with new dangers and difficulties coming into view we have every right to be content with the results of our labors in making provision for the navy."

NATIVE WOODS USED

Maritime Provinces Produce Nearly All Lumber Used in Their Factories

Two hundred million feet, board measure, of wood per year are required by the various industries of the Maritime Provinces that use wood as their raw material—not to speak of the many millions of feet of timber used in rough building construction for poles and railway cross-ties fuel and the many other uses of timber.

Such is the conclusion of an investigation made by the Forestry Branch of the Dominion Department of the Interior into the wood-using industries of the Maritime Provinces. The value of the wood used is nearly \$3,700,000; of this entire amount only 12.8 per cent—about 25,000,000 feet—is imported. Twenty-eight kinds of wood are used in the industries, spruce occupying first place.

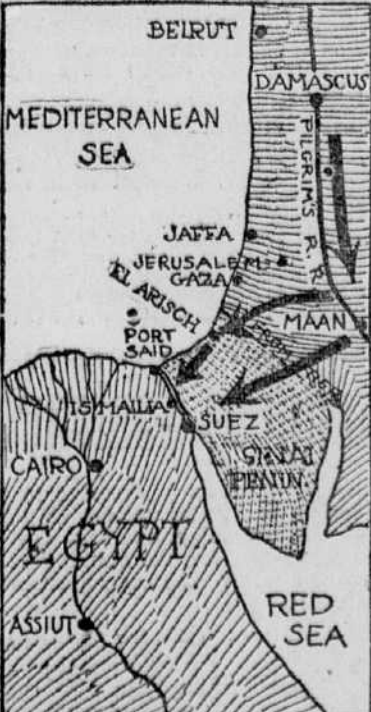

WAR TO COST \$10,000,000,000

This Amount Will be Expended During Current Year by Entente Powers

GREAT BRITAIN ABLE TO FINANCE STRUGGLE FOR FIVE YEARS FROM FOREIGN INVESTMENTS

London, February 16.—In a statement explanatory of the agreement made at the recent conference between the Finance Ministers of France and Russia, Mr. Lloyd George said, was the most expensive in material, men and money that had ever been waged.

Great Britain, the chancellor of the exchequer told the House of Commons could finance the war for five years out of the proceeds of her investments abroad. France was able to do so for about two or three years, with something to spare. Russia, he said, although prodigiously rich in natural resources, was in a different position. Mr. Lloyd George said that it was decided at the conference of the finance ministers not to issue a joint loan.

DEHORNING CATTLE

The cruelty connected with cutting off the horns of cattle is the more to be condemned because it is wholly unnecessary. The time to take off the horns is before there are any horns to take off.

Many have an exaggerated notion of the trouble involved in stopping the growth of the horn. Take the calf anywhere under two weeks of age, preferably from three to eight days old, moisten the finger in a cup of water and wet well the hair about the little nub where the horn is to start, then rub with a pencil of caustic potash till the place looks quite red. That is all that is necessary. There is no need of clipping off the hair, and to rub till blood comes is wholly needless.

Julius Kayser & Co. One of Amer-
ica's Leading Manufacturing
Concerns

IS WHOLLY AMERICAN.—NO GER-
MAN OR AUSTRIAN INTER-
ESTS IN THE COM-
PANY.

In connection with the new silk
company which has decided to locate
in Sherbrooke, reports have been
published in some Canadian news-
papers to the effect that there were
German financiers connected with the
concern. Besides denying this state-
ment, the company has authorized
the publication of the following re-
port, for which the secretary of the
Board of Trade is endeavoring to
secure widespread publicity:

Sherbrooke is looking forward with
great expectation to the latest enter-
prise which its Board of Trade has
succeeded in bringing to see the ad-
vantages of this city for big manu-
facturing purposes. This is the new
silk plant which will begin business
in the spring on Frontenac street, in
first in leased quarters but later, in
buildings to be erected for the pur-
pose.

The fact that the concern back of
this new venture is Julius Kayser &
Co., of New York, the biggest silk
glove producers in the world, adds
to the general feeling of satisfaction,
especially as the new factory will be
the only Canadian branch of the com-
pany for silk glove manufacturing
purposes. The Canadian sales office
is located in Montreal in conjunction
with Perrin Frères, the famous
French glove makers. Mr. H. W. Aus-
tin acts as Canadian agent for both
concerns.

THIRTY YEARS OLD.

Julius Kayser & Co. have been
manufacturing in the United States
silk gloves and also Italian silk
gloves and hosiery for more than
thirty years, and in that time have
grown from a small concern into the
largest producers of this kind of silk
wearing apparel in the world. They
have a very successful branch in Lon-
don, and the great stores there have
made a feature of these American silk
products.

The house was founded by Julius
Kayser, who was originally a manu-
facturer of silk mitts in New York,
and then by the invention of the
double finger-tip for silk gloves laid
the foundations of this great busi-
ness.

The firm was originally com-
posed of Mr. Julius Kayser and the
other young Americans who had
helped him succeed, but about four
years ago the business was incorpo-
rated, and its shares are now listed on
the New York Stock Exchange. The
1914 report of this company has just
been issued, and the financial writers
have been astonished at its success—
unparalleled in the face of conditions
unfavourable in American history.

The headquarters of this company
have been from the beginning in New
York City, and the largest factory is
in Brooklyn. To take care of the
great volume of their business, how-
ever, they have gradually extended
their factory resources, and now own
and operate seven factories in the
United States, besides a factory in
Grenoble, France.

The new factory in Sherbrooke will
give employment to a large number
of Canadian operators. The establish-
ment of the factory here is due in a
large measure to the very successful
Canadian business built up for this
New York concern by Mr. Austin and
his Canadian selling staff.

AN OFFICIAL STATEMENT.

"Our locating in Sherbrooke," said
an officer of the company, "is the
outcome of several years' planning,
always with a view toward develop-
ing further our Canadian business.
Our New York factory and other aux-
iliary plants are kept busy supplying
the merchandise demand in the
States, and by operating in Canada
we can take care of the needs of
Canadian merchants much more
promptly and give a more direct and
efficient service. One thing has some-
what surprised us, and that is the
fact that our concern should be
thought other than an American or
organization. According to published
reports, we have seen this mistake
has been made."

"The statement has been made that
our stock is owned by German and
Austrian interests. This is not true.
Julius Kayser & Co. are an American
firm, and its officers and execu-
tives are all Americans. It may be
that the pronunciation of our name
has brought about this misapprehen-
sion. That is something we cannot
help, for it has been odds for more
than thirty years and carried with it
an introduction into the confidence
and good-will of thousands of mer-
chants, not only in the United States
but also in Canada."

"The facts are that no German or
Austrian financiers are connected
with this company, and there are no
such directors in the concern. Our
product is distinctly an American
product. It is difficult for us to
believe that you Canadians would be
so unfriendly as to create or circulate
maliciously untrue statements about
a concern which is bringing
business to your country and giving
employment to your people; conse-
quently we prefer to attribute it all
to misapprehension, which we natu-
rally wish to correct."

Do Bees Hear?

The question of whether bees hear
or whether they receive impressions
in some other way, is a mooted one
among scientists. Nothing has been
found that corresponds to the ears in
ordinary animals, although it has been
supposed that the antennae may serve
the purpose in some way. We know
this: Bees are very sensitive to a jar
or any vibration; that loud shouting
in a bee-cellar will bring back a re-
sponse from the bees; but as sound
always produces sound-waves in the
air, the bees may get the effect of
the sound by a concussion on their
bodies or their antennae.

and high prices of food stuffs, and in
the long run they would win out.

LIVE STOCK HAS DETERIORAT- ED.

Mr. Archibald went on to say that
the live stock of this country has
really deteriorated during the past
ten years. Many of the best cows,
mares and sows had been disposed of
whereas, they should have been kept
for breeding purposes. The farmer in
the dairy business must choose the
cows which he is going to keep dur-
ing the year by the scales and Bab-
cock test. Feeding was an important
element in this work as the farmer
who weeds out poor cows has more
feed for the good ones.

KEEP BOY ON FARM.

By keeping milk records the boy
and the hired man would pay more
attention to, and take more pains
with the stock, for by this means
they acquire a natural interest in
their work—in other words, the boys
would stay on the farm. The farmer
should not dispose of his poor cows
to his neighbor, but should send them
to the butcher.

ONLY WAY TO IMPROVE LIVE STOCK.

The improvement in the standard
of live stock depended entirely on the
using of pure blood or registered
sires—this was the only way. One
community should adopt the same
breed in any class of live stock. In
this way the district would become
known for this breed and good buy-
ers would be attracted to the dis-
trict as they would be able to buy
uniform stock in large numbers.

WHAT BEST TO FEED.

In regard to hay, alfalfa hay was
the best for feeding. Where this was
not available clover ranked second,
and if neither of these were obtain-
able mixed clover and grass hay
would substitute. More attention
should be paid to such crops as corn;
corn made a better feed when put in-
to the silo.

At the present time oats and bar-
ley were out of the question for feed-
ing, owing to the cost. Therefore,
the farmer should choose his feeds
from two viewpoints—from the actual
feeding value and from the fertilizing
elements in the manure. Not only
from a patriotic standpoint should
the standard of live stock be improv-
ed, but from the actual benefit to the
farmer.

SOME USEFUL HINTS.

Mr. Archibald gave some useful
hints on the management of heifers
when freshening. He complained that
too many Quebec farmers were plac-
ing their live stock on the market in
an unfit condition. This must be
remedied, and it would tend to re-
duce the cost of living and bring
about greater prosperity.

WILL GIVE ASSISTANCE TO FARMERS

Mr. W. G. MacDougall, Macdonald
College Demonstrator at Lennoxville,
having been called upon by the chair-
man, said he would be very pleased
to assist the farmers in selecting the
varieties of seeds most adapted to
this locality and also in procuring
these seeds. He advised them to sow
only the best seeds and if they could
not purchase these, to sow only the
best produced on their farms, mak-
ing good use of the fanning mill. He
would be glad to suggest remedies
for plant diseases.

CHOICE OF CROPS

Mr. MacDougall made a few re-
marks on the proper choice of crops,
advising the growing of those which
gave the largest returns per acre.
Corn should be grown wherever pos-
sible but in a locality where corn
could not be grown the root crop
could be resorted to and in this dis-
trict that crop gave good returns.
By selecting feeds like this, many
farmers would not have to continue
the common practice of buying hay.

SHEEP SHOULD BE RAISED IN E. T.

The Eastern Townships afforded a
splendid opportunity for sheep rais-
ing, but this industry was somewhat
lacking at the present time. In con-
clusion the speaker outlined and ad-
vocated the system of co-operative
marketing of wool, which would tend
to increase its price, giving as an
example the marketing of wool at
Shawville last spring. The enhanced
price of wool would be one step to-
wards promoting the sheep industry.
Questions were put and answered at
the close of the meeting.

EVENING SESSION

At the evening meeting letters of
 regret for inability to be present
were read from O. E. Therrien, M.L.
A., and F. N. McCrea, M.P. A tele-
gram was also received from Hon.
Mr. Meighen to the same effect.

Mr. F. R. Cromwell, M.P., was the
first speaker. He said today the
farmer was a happy man and had a
right to be so, as he was absolutely
wearing the tall hat. The ladies of
Lennoxville and throughout Canada
had done a grand patriotic work
since war broke out, in fact they had
done more than the men, and he
hoped the men would take a pattern
by them.

E. T. MEN AT FRONT.

Mr. Cromwell also congratulated
the districts of Sherbrooke and Len-
noxville and the Eastern Townships
for the boys they had sent to the
front, and referred to Col. Baker, the
Q. C. of the Fifth Mounted Rifles
now being mobilized in Sherbrooke,
as one of the finest young men in
Canada, with good, sound judgment.
The patriotic funds were growing
throughout the Dominion and it was
the duty of the Canadian people to
see that the committees in charge of
those funds were kept amply sup-
plied with money so that the women
who were left behind would not suf-
fer for food and the conveniences of
life.

FOODSTUFFS PROHIBITED

Great Britain Will Not Allow Neu-
tral Ships to Feed the
Germans

HON. WINSTON CHURCHILL HAS
ISSUED A STATEMENT. BER-
LIN THREAT MORE THAN
BLUFF.

London, Feb. 16.—In a statement
yesterday Minister Churchill stated
that Britain would not permit the
feeding of Germany by food carried
in neutral ships. Although possibly
not so intended, this in a way might
be taken as an answer to the offer
of Ambassador Bernstorff, who offi-
cially informed the United States
Government that Germany would
modify the war zone decree if Eng-
land would permit foodstuffs to enter
his country.

The German plan, this note sets
forth, is in retaliation for what is
termed Great Britain's violation of
international law by attempting to
cut off the food supplies of non-com-
batants. The German statement is
not a reply to the United States
note of protest to Germany, but
merely another warning made be-
cause the date of the operation of
the decree is at hand.

In the meantime indication that
Britain is regarding the German
threat of a war on British trade as
something more than a bluff is found
in the fact that liners are coming
into British ports with their life-
boats slung out and watered and
provisioned. The threatened subma-
rine blockade is the absorbing topic
of discussion for English newspapers
and the English people, and, judging
from despatches from the continent,
Germany is equally interested.

he referred to her wonderful agricul-
tural system which, before the war,
had enabled her to produce three or
four times as much per acre as Can-
ada. This was due to her system of
small farms, whereas the Canadian
farms were too large. Belgium also
had a splendid railway system, with
cheap fares, which enabled the city
workers to live on their farms, keep
their families there and raise almost
enough of those small farms to
support them. Belgium was the
most densely populated country in
the world, and Antwerp was the
second largest tonnage port. Referring
to the one and a half billion
dollars as the yearly trade of Bel-
gium with 11,000 square miles, he
said the trade of Belgium was al-
most on a par, while the balance of
trade had been too long against Can-
ada. Let the Canadians wake up to
that fact. Canada had great natural
resources and could turn that bal-
ance in her favor by developing them.

OPPORTUNITY FOR FARMERS.

The farmer had a wonderful oppor-
tunity to-day. It was just as pa-
triotic to see that sufficient crops
and stock were raised so that none of
the soldiers of Great Britain or the
Allies should want for food or re-
laxation, as it was to go to the war
and fight. This great patriotic move
could be looked at from a selfish
point of view. Things were not like
they used to be when farmers felt it
their duty to tell their neighbors
when they discovered some new and
better system of doing some particu-
lar work—the old-time sociability did
not exist. It was all a mistake, and
if more sociability existed it would
help to keep the boys on the farm.
Every city convenience was now found
on the farms.

DEMONSTRATORS' WORK BENE- FICIAL.

Mr. Cromwell appealed to the far-
mers not to be too skeptical of the
Government lecturers and Macdonald
College demonstrators. They had a
practical and theoretical knowledge
of farming, and speaking from ex-
perience, their visits through the
country were very beneficial. He also
referred to the experimental farm as
one of the greatest encouragements
the agriculturists ever had; to the
assistance of the Government Live
Stock Commission in making it pos-
sible for every district to have pure-
bred sires; to the Dominion Govern-
ment grants for agricultural edu-
cation, and to the increased subsidies
to the Provincial Governments. The
demands from the farming commu-
nity had called for these things, and

it was up to them to create a pub-
lic sentiment strong enough, so that
the Federal or Provincial Govern-
ments would see that agriculture was
helped to the fullest extent.

WILL GET BEST TRADE RELA- TIONS

In conclusion Mr. Cromwell said
there was every opportunity for the
farmers to increase their production,
perform a patriotic duty, and reap a
revenue themselves; and in regard to
the transportation question the Min-
isters of Trade and Commerce and
Agriculture had under consideration
a scheme to relieve the present situa-
tion and secure the best trade rela-
tions possible.

REFERS TO CRITICISMS OF BANKS

Mr. E. W. Farwell followed and
dwelt at some length with the efforts
of the Associated Boards of Trade,
the E. T. Immigration Society and
agencies in large cities to reduce un-
employment by the cultivation of
non-producing lands.

In regard to the criticism levelled
against the banks much of it was un-
deserved. The best policy for the
farmer in the Eastern Townships
was to make his banker his best
friend and confidant, and if he want-
ed money all he had to do was to
approach him frankly with a straight-
forward statement showing he was
entitled to credit and he would not
be turned down.

The banks were here to do the
farmers' business on proper lines, and
the Government and Immigration So-
ciety were doing their best to sup-
ply their needs, and if these agencies
were used they would go a long way
towards helping the question of more
production.

EMPIRE BOUND TO WIN

Col. G. H. Baker, M.P., followed
in a patriotic speech and declared the
present was a time for serious think-
ing. Did the people throughout the
country realize we were at war? Af-
ter alluding to the cause of the war
he said the Empire was bound to win.
Germany had made four mistakes,
any one of which was enough to beat
her. She thought Italy would stand
by her, that Russia would not enter
the fight, that Belgium would lie
down and allow Germany to walk
over her, and she also thought the
British Empire was going to drop
asunder through the Irish uprising
and the secession of Canada and
other parts of the Empire.

WAR HARDLY BEGUN

The war had hardly begun and a
long arduous undertaking must be
looked forward to. The situation was
serious enough that no man could af-
ford to lose an opportunity of do-
ing something, if not in going to the
front, by doing his duty in one way
or another and making some sacri-
fice.

Col. Baker paid a fitting tribute
to the mothers and wives of those
at the front, saying their lot in stay-
ing at home waiting and worrying
was the hardest of all.

Messrs. Archibald and Nunick
spoke on the subjects of "Livestock"
and "Home Gardens."

Votes of thanks and the singing of
the National Anthem closed the
meeting.
