HERE AND THERE. To-day Col. O'BRIEN will likely move his anti-Jesuit resolutions in the House of Commons. The Colonel is not a hot-headed Orangeman, but a kindly and gentlemanly man. He supports, moreover, the Conservative party. A good many persons believe that the Colonel's resolutions will be full of pepper and salt and mustard. We do not think that they will be highly spiced, for though the Colonel is a good Protestant, he is also a very excellent Conservative, and we may be sure he will move no embarrassing resolutions. In the Dominion Cabinet we have six zealous Roman Catholics. The leader of the Opposition is a zealous Roman Catholic. Neither side wishes to see the House divided on this question. We feel certain therefore that the resolutions will be only apologies for resolutions. They will mean little, but by introducing something against the bill, Col. O'BRIEN will meet the wishes of the ultra-Protestant party about half-way, and that is always a point gained. The precise value of such points is another question. In Ontario there is some excitement about the Jesuits bill, but it is nearly confined to the newspapers and a few clergymen of certain denominations. One prominent church, if not two, has declined to take any part in the agitation. In the Maritime Provinces the question is not mentioned at all, either in the churches or in the newspapers. Manitoba has not spoken for or against the bill, either in her press, or in her pulpit and platform. British Columbia has not taken up the parallel yet, and the great North-West is trying to provide homes for immigrants instead of plunging her people into a venacious dispute. As for Quebec, what is going on in relation to the Jesuits bill? The measure has passed both Houses of Parliament. Hardly a newspaper has dealt with the subject, and among the people little of an adverse character has been said. And yet Quebec is more interested in the question than a dozen Ontario. All the talk comes from the Western Province, and we feel bound to say that that talk is not wholly sincere. The Montreal, up to a certain date, was the only really great paper that took the subject up, and rode the Protestant horse after the manner of GEORGE BROWN in his young days. Three or four days ago the Globe executed a somewhat on the subject, but the people only laughed. And Mr. J. D. EDGAR, M.P., the real power behind the throne, has come out strongly against the Globe's course. The Globe, since it published Mr. EDGAR's letter has been engaged in trying to maintain its position, though its arguments are weak and puerile, and no one believes that its opinions were changed solely because a law paper published an article on the subject. The Liberal party dare not follow the Globe on this question. Mr. EDGAR was prompt to see that Mr. LAURIER is in favour of the bill. He is the leader of the Opposition. On this question, he would resign his position. Sir ROBERT CARSWORTHY is, of course, available, but where would the French Canadian contingent be, were LAURIER to be deposited in order that CARSWORTHY might gratify his ambition? Sir JOHN MACDONALD, whose Government has not disavowed the bill. And this leads us to remark that the Globe of 1889 is much stupider than the Globe of 1888-89, when it played, and backed and filled with the BRENZ question. In the meantime, it will be interesting to read the text of Col. O'BRIEN'S resolutions.

THE SENATE. Hon. Samuel H.
