Dr Allana Reid-Smith writes in her organization's newspaper that it is their most sincere hope that a teachers strike will not be necessary but if it should be necessary they hope they will not stand alone.

They appeal for support of the parents of the children whom they teach.

The teachers are asking for complete recognition as professional educators, to participate at all levels in making pedagogical decisions for a workload which will enable them to do their work effectively, for adequate provision for professional improvement, for sick leave, for a salary scale adequate to responsible workers and which will give encouragement to teachers to improve their professional qualifications.

## 48 American industrialists will visit Waltham and Litchfield and enjoy Arnprior hospitality

The Town of Arnprior and the nearby Village of Braeside are preparing a bang-up bash for a visiting delegation of 48 industrialists and lumbermen from Michigan.

What started as a straight business visit at the invitation of the Ottawa Valley Lumber firm of Gillies Bros and Co Ltd., has turned into a community splash with townspeople and villagers planning a formal welcome, a parade, a band concert, receptions, dinners, luncheons and a wind-up breakfast. There will also be a trip to sawmills and a pulp mill in the valley.

Even the federal government is coming into it, with a welcome by officials of the Department of Trade and Commerce when the visitors arrive from Flint, Mich at Uplands Airport in Ottawa at noon, Monday, Oct 7.

From the airport, the delegation will travel to Braeside where there will be a tree-planting ceremony at the Gillies sawmill and a grading demonstration put on by the Canadian Lumbermen's Association.

Later, there will be a parade to the Town Hall in Arnprior and an address of welcome by Mayor Taylor. Fitz-

patrick. The band concert, arranged for by the Arnprior Chamber of Commerce is next on the program, followed by a cocktail reception offered by the Town.

Dinner, after the reception will be given by the Village of Braeside, with Reeve Richard Robbins as host and J. J. Greene federal Minister of Energy, Mines and Resources, as guest speaker. Mr Greene, the Liberal MP for Niagara Falls, formerly sat for the old riding of Renfrew South.

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## PRAISE THE LIVING

Isn't it always amazing how many words of praise can be said about a person after he is dead? Doesn't it always come as a shock to hear people who have condemned a man heartily in his lifetime change their entire attitude upon his decease?

It all stems from a fundamental misunderstanding of human personality. It starts when people confuse the man with his actions, or even very early on when people confuse the boy with his actions. There is a tendency to say "He is a bad boy", and later on to say "He is a bad man" simply because his behaviour doesn't conform with one's own wishes.

How much better to have said, "this boy's behaviour is dreadful" but to keep an open mind and a closed mouth on the subject of whether the boy himself is bad. Then when he is older and has power in whatever circle of the world he influences, if we still don't like the way he does things we can say we still disapprove of his behaviour and can do whatever we find possible to change it for the better. But we still are not entitled by any means to judge the whole man.

Politics would rise to a plane so much more worthy of human participation if everyone involved could adopt this charitable attitude.

Prompting these remarks have been the articles of great praise in all the papers on the death of Daniel Johnson, Quebec's Premier. But the situation also refers to attitudes towards all those who receive scorn during their lives but can count on flowers at their funeral.

## Pension plan benefits raised

As of January, 1969, benefits under the Quebec Pension Plan will be raised for the second consecutive year.

The new increase results from a two per cent rise in the Pension Index. The Department of Revenue calculates the Pension Index annually on the basis of the Consumer Price Index for Canada.

As another result of the higher Pension Index, maximum pensionable earnings under the Quebec Pension Plan will rise from \$5,100 to \$5,200 a year. This will entail higher maximum contributions to the Plan.

All retirement pensions being paid at the end of this year will rise two per cent next January. Some 10,000 retired beneficiaries will thus receive higher payments.

The two per cent increase will apply equally to survivors' benefits, paid by the Board since last February. The orphan's pension will rise from \$25 to 26.01 a month.

## COURT REPORT

Court was held at Campbell's Bay on Sept 24 with Hon Francois Chevalier, JSC.

Out of five accused who appeared before Justice Chevalier two of them pleaded guilty while the other three were remanded to stand their trial at the end of October next.
