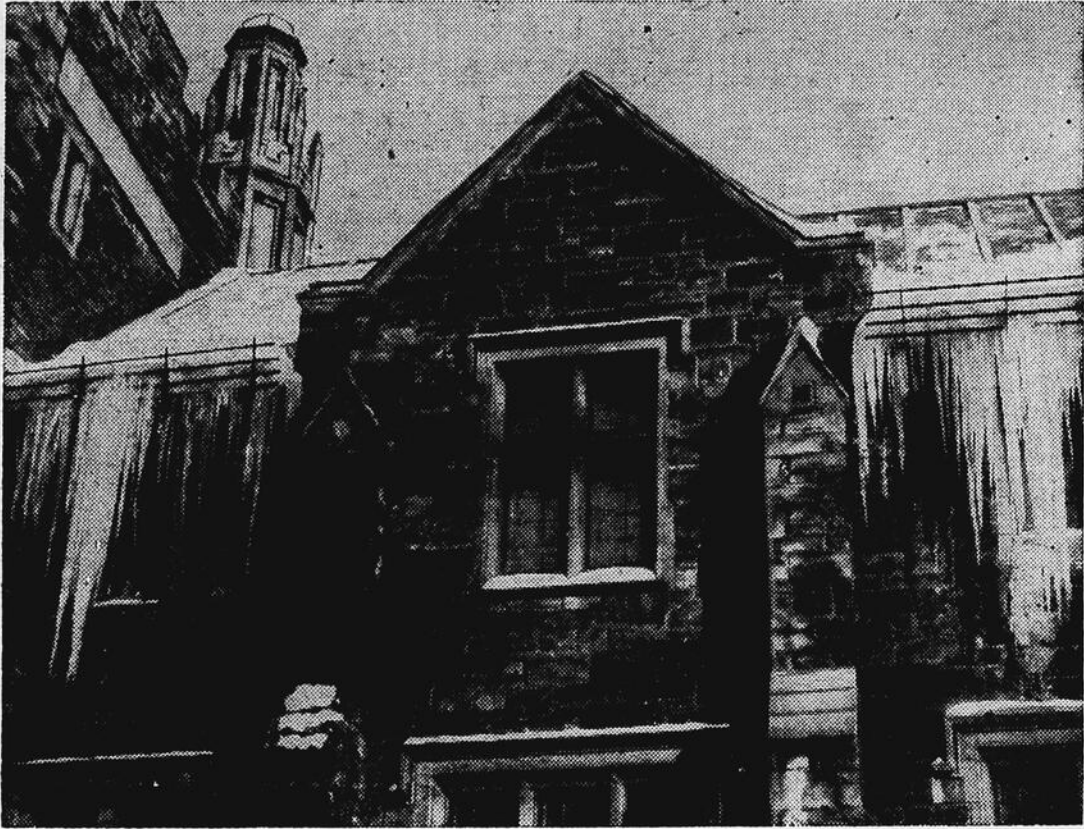

### Humanity At Crossroads May Lose Liberty Freedom, Says Rev. O. J. Ritz

"There can no longer be any doubt that the human family has arrived at the crossroads, marking it for either a glorious consummation in Christ or by deliberate choice will plunge itself into the greatest chaos ever perpetrated by human devisings," said Rev. O. J. Ritz in a week-end address at the Seventh-day Adventist church in Westmount.

"Undoubtedly within the space of a few years every man, woman and child will be called upon to make a decision for Christian Brotherhood as understood in the Word of God, or he will be forced to surrender his credentials of liberty and freedom to the powers of organized paganism, communism, monopolistic social statism, said the speaker.

"This could undoubtedly be the greatest era of mankind, but greed, human pride, religious indifference is rapidly branding our day. Not only will this generation be stigmatized a spiritual failure, but the stark naked truth is that human destruction stares at us, destruction in the hands of a few scientific giants."

"Christian brotherhood, the outgrowth of a spiritual awakening in the hearts of men would stop overnight the cold war, would send thousands of men back into the pits, would never permit man to dump millions of bushels of potatoes, while a whole segment of society lives in fear, cold and hunger." Mr. Ritz charged that Brotherhood will never take hold of men's daily lives through sentimental platitudes, but, "can only become a reality by allowing the individual conscience to be quickened by the power of God's Word."

The pastor concluded by announcing that within the next

### Homoeopathic Public Service In Peak Demand

Once again the facilities of the Homoeopathic Hospital have been subjected to a very busy winter season. Year after year the same story can be told, says Administrator Walter Hatch. Statistics show that every winter season brings forth a bumper crop of bruises, ailments, fractures, and babies.

Even with all the modern methods on the market designed to minimize peak loads, no one as yet has found a device to control the number of winter accidents or to spread hospitalization more equally throughout the year.

Straining the hospital's facilities, as it does, the demand for public service has approached an all-time high record during the past few months. One indication of the amount of work done is revealed from the fact that 91 per cent. of the available bed space in the Homoeopathic Hospital was filled continuously in 1949. Such occupancy figures are boosted greatly each year by the number of patients brought in during the winter, particularly emergency and accident cases.

Each month an average number of 229 emergencies and 35 fracture cases can be expected. However, in January this year 241 emergencies and 55 fracture cases were presented for treatment in the Outpatient Department.

### Vehicle Garage Contract Passed

Three money bills were passed by the Westmount City Council at a meeting, Monday.

The largest of the three was the approval of a contract for the building of a vehicle garage at the Bethune street yard. The Council authorized a tender of J. L. E. Price and Company Limited, for \$128,680, including extras and changes required.

They also authorized the purchase of additional equipment for the new electrical sub-station on Oliver avenue, amounting to \$1,044, while the third purchase to be made by the City will be for a new snowblower, valued at \$14,250.

### Mayor Cameron Attends Joint Action Meeting

Mayor J. S. Cameron, of Westmount, stated to The Examiner, that Westmount will be represented by legal council, collectively with the majority of municipalities on the Island of Montreal, when the Montreal Bill which seeks to create a Montreal Transportation Commission comes before the Lower House at Quebec. His Worship said that he would prefer to withhold further comment at the moment.

The Bill has been expected to come before the Private Bills Committee on March 7th, but the presentation has been delayed until March 16, according to an announcement by Councillor J. O. Asselin, chairman of the executive committee of the City of Montreal.

#### Suburban Mayors Meet

The mayors and representatives of the municipalities who were called into session by Mayor Romuald Bourque of Outremont, agreed to submit a brief to the Tremblay Arbitration Board on the tramway question, and to appoint a lawyer to represent them when the Montreal transportation bill comes before the Provincial Legislature.

The brief to the Tremblay Board will be delayed until Lachine receives a report now being prepared by an economist on the local tramway question.

#### Autobus versus Trams

The Montreal Bill provides that after the projected commission's appointment, it shall without delay take into consideration the advisability of replacing tramways by autobuses wherever economically recommendable.

This is only one of the reasons why the surrounding municipalities are so vitally interested, besides which, the question of possible loss of taxes now paid by the Montreal Tramways Company to the various cities and towns

### Snow Pile Good Toboggan Slide

It looks as if Westmount will have a toboggan slide well into the summer, judging from the huge hill of snow which has been dumped on Westmount Park at the corner of St. Catherine and Lansdowne, close to the Royal Montreal Regiment's Armory.

The snow pile appears to be about 60 feet in height and should create a fair sized stream down the Glen when it starts to melt.

Presumably the city works department are acting on the suggestion made by Royal Werry, K. C., that vacant land, farm land, and parks, should be used for dumping the snow rather than dispose of it by the more expensive method of melting it in the plant at the Glen, as has been done previously.

The recent shortage in coal due to the strike of the miners may have had some bearing in the decision to try out this new method of disposal.

### True Power Of Education Stressed At Rotary Club

"More and more in our community we are beginning to realize the power of education," Heber R. Matthews, guidance consultant of the Montreal Protestant Central School Board told members of the Westmount Rotary Club at a luncheon meeting, Wednesday.

Speaking in connection with "Education Week," Mr. Matthews outlined the four basic frontiers of education today, and paid particular attention to the fight against mental illness.

He said that four of every 100 students in the public schools today would end up in a mental home and that another two would be juvenile delinquents. "Millions and millions of dollars are being spent on curing and keeping the mentally ill and the delinquent, while only nickels and dimes are being spent on preventive treatment," the speaker said in drawing a comparison.

He also maintained that the greatest defence against communism within our country was the teaching of democracy and clear understanding of the world,

pointing out that this is best accomplished when the children are first going to school.

"The individual must think for himself so he won't be swayed by every idea that is presented," the speaker continued. The fight for recognition was also stressed by Mr. Matthews who maintained that the best foundation for a happy and full life were the teachings and trainings the individual received while at school.

"To do this training means to select those with the most competence, but society still feels that less training is plausible," he said, stressing the fact that people often say they want the best car, house or other luxury that money can buy.

"But why not say they want the best personality and character training that money can buy for their children," Mr. Matthews declared, for remember we get in the end, exactly what we pay for; no more and no less.

The speaker was introduced by Frank Sharpe and thanked by Jimmy deLalanne of the Westmount Rotary Club.

## Sales Tax Waived On Cars Donated If Gift on Level

Westmount car owners will be interested in the following information pertaining to the transfer of autos, as given by Philippe Jemael, Director of the Sales Tax Department of the Provincial Government at Quebec.

Since January 1st, sales tax must be paid prior to the transfer of an automobile license in case of an actual sale.

The enquiry was prompted by the fact that in some cases when an automobile was donated to a relative, the Montreal office of the treasury department demanded payment of the sales tax.

Mr. Jemael states that when payment was made compulsory before issuance of an automobile license, personnel were instructed to make no exceptions.

"However", he stated "employees at Montreal offices should advise persons who claim that their cars have been given to them by relatives, to refer the case directly to the Quebec City offices".

In any case involving the transfer of a car donated, interested parties should write directly to the director of the Sales Tax Department.

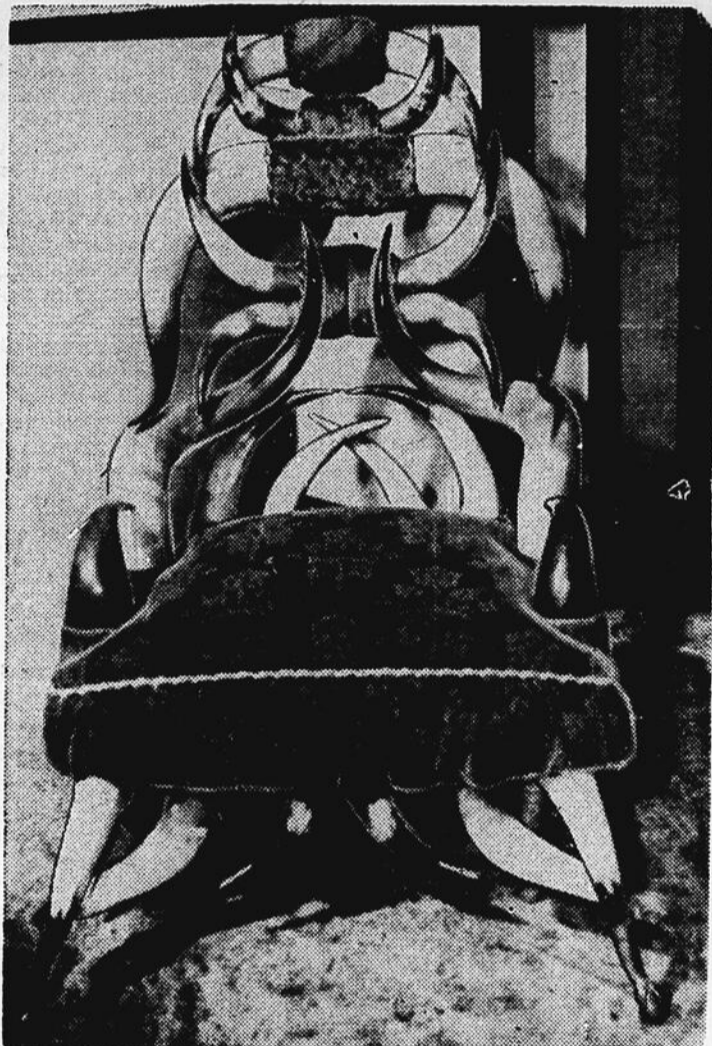
The letter must be accompanied by a certificate of donation, clearly stipulating the automobile is being transferred without any exchange of money, and asserting that the donation is bona fide.

Percentage of transfers of ownership not including a sale of some kind is extremely small, and the sales tax director said that it amounted to "less than one per cent".

The fact that donations are rather rare, caused the instructions to be issued to consider all transfers as sales.

## E. J. Henderson Receives Appointment by Council

E. J. Henderson, Superintendent of Parks and Playgrounds in the City of Westmount, was appointed as Weed Inspector for the City, under the Weed Enforcement Act and the Corn Border Control Regulations.

## Unique Chair Of Horns Owner By Westmouter

Ernest Hutchison of 379 Grosvenor Avenue, Westmount, is the proud possessor of probably the most unique chair in the metropolis.

The chair over 65 years old, is constructed of horns of all sizes, some of which are the great sweeping sharp pointed curving type, which at one time adorned wild South American steers from the Pampas.

In sitting down on this chair, care must be taken to miss some of the points which protrude from the framework of the nicely cushioned siesta chair, otherwise a sharp jab may cause some discomfort and surprise.

## One-Man Trams For 83 Route

Westmouters were agreeably surprised to find that eighteen new one man cars had been placed in service on the Windsor car line. These one-man cars will replace the customary two-man trams and will be in use seven days a week.

Van Horne will also be serviced by the new one-man cars but only fifteen cars will operate on this line.

On Saturday afternoons two-man cars will be used on the Van Horne route.

It is hoped that the service on the two lines will be improved by the changing of the type of cars in use.

**Carefully Does It**  
 If one slips into the chair carefully, it is quite comfortable. Mr. Hutchison in discussing this heirloom, said that his father made the chair more than 65 years ago from the horns of steers sent to his canning factory for slaughtering.

Some of the horns are four to five feet long, and measure as much as 10 inches around the base and taper to needle sharp points.

Mr. Hutchison recalls that as a boy it was his chore to have to polish the horns in the chair, and during his boyhood he formed a great attachment for this rather awesome chair.

**Polishing a Chore**  
 Polishing the horns was quite a complicated business, as first the horns had to be scraped with glass, and then rubbed with pumice stone and a combination of oil and sand, in order to bring out the high gloss.

During the time that Mr. Hutchison's family were young, the chair was carefully stored in the basement of his home.

Now that the family are grown up and not likely to get impaled on the horns, Mr. Hutchison has moved the chair upstairs, and is planning to replace the upholstery with genuine leather with the hair still on it, so as to give an appropriate wild setting to the horns.

Under the chairmanship of District Commissioner, Mrs. Cynthia Chalk, reports were given by various Guide Captains and Broyn Owls, as well as the Badge Secretary, Mrs. Errol Clift and by Mrs. D. Harbert who is in charge of the First Class Tests.

The Guide Enrolment was placed at 120 with two first class, 10 second class and 149 proficiency badges awarded during the year. Mrs. Clift paid tribute to the Guides who tried proficiency badges.

A report on the Brownie enrolment showed the total number at 113, and six members took their first class badge during the year.

Mrs. W. Hyde, Provincial Commissioner who was a guest of honor at the meeting, told the members of the Guide work, its past accomplishments and its plans for the future.

### Court Rules That Death Does Not Break Lease

An important decision as affecting a tenant's rights, was handed down by Mr. Justice Edouard Tellier, in his first judgment as judge of the Superior Court, in a case brought by a Westmount landlord, who sought to evict the mother, brother and a widowed sister of Lionel Coviensky, who died in March 1949.

In deciding against the proprietor, E. Bleau, owner of the premises at 330 Olivier street, Westmount, Judge Tellier, recalled that the late Mr. Coviensky was a bachelor, and the three members of his family named as defendants, had lived with him for 12 years. They were also his heirs.

His Lordship threw out the landlord's case, noting as he did, that the landlord based his claim on a section of provincial law, which states that if a tenant has ceased for five months to occupy the premises leased as his principal residence, he may be ejected, and the landlord may take possession.

Looking into the definition of a "tenant" as contained in Wartime Prices and Trade Board regulations, Judge Tellier decided that the heirs possessed the same rights under the lease to stay in the premises, as had the actual signer in his life time.

Referring to the provincial statute, His Lordship commented, "This law simply means that if a tenant who had a right of possession ceased to occupy the premises for five months as his principal residence, he may be evicted. Heirs have the same rights and obligations as had the deceased lessee. If the heirs had ceased to occupy

the place as their principal place of residence, they too would be subject to the same restrictions." Arthur Levin acted for the defendant heirs.

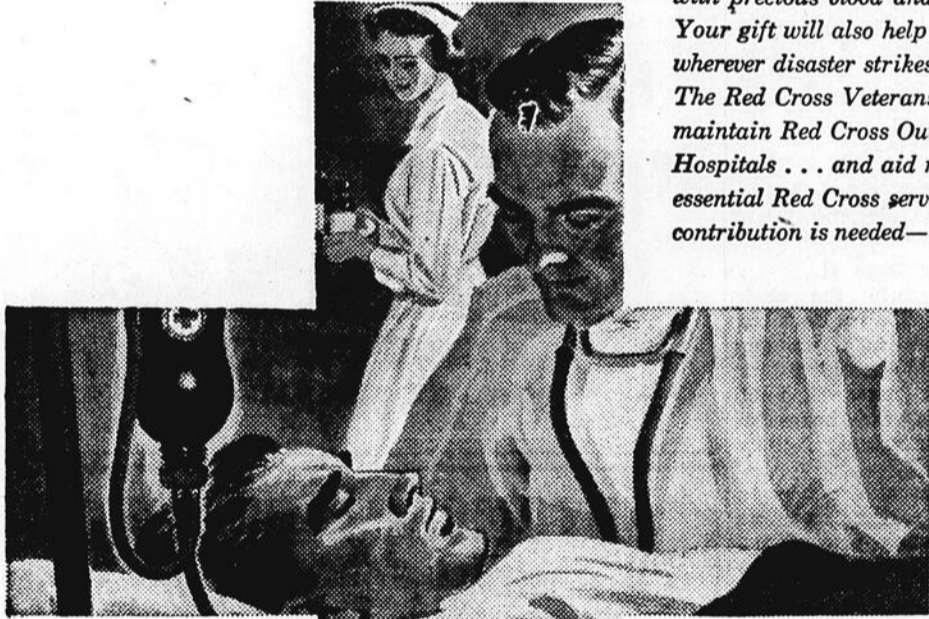

## D. C. Abbott Elaborates On Social Security Plans

Finance Minister Douglas Abbott of Westmount told McMaster University Politics Club at Hamilton on Monday that he is hopeful that the Dominion-Provincial conference to be held this fall will be able to settle many difficulties standing in the way of a better program of social security.

The Minister also said that social security is only one of the desirable objectives of national policy. It must not be allowed to become a dead weight upon the initiative and enterprise of the Canadian people.

The instinctive re-action to any proposal for social security benefits is to ask how the cost is going to be met.

"There is no monetary magic or fiscal sleight of hand by which we can in fact get something for nothing," Mr. Abbott said.

"I suggest that the right point of departure . . . is to assume that the people of Canada like their tax bill to be as low as possible."

An addition to social security benefits does not necessarily mean a corresponding additional burden on the country at large. A health insurance scheme would represent in part, at least, merely a redistribution of real costs.

Though Mr. Abbott said that his

## GUARD YOUR EYESIGHT

### Don't Wait Until It Is Too Late

This is "Save Your Vision" week, sponsored by the College of Optometrists of the Province of Quebec.

"VISION WEEK" was inaugurated 23 years ago in the United States and Canada, in an effort to draw attention to the importance of efficient and comfortable eye-

sight; and has made great strides towards making the public vision conscious.

An earnest endeavour is being made to make the public take inventory of their "sense of sight". Too often we neglect our eyes; we take them for granted. Fortunately, most visual shortcomings can be overcome by proper care if they are discovered in time.

Periodic eye examination is of great importance. Employers and employees would both benefit; they would do better work when once the strain was relieved. It can be compared with "night and day". Visual deficiencies, often unsuspected, has caused inefficiency and poor work in offices, close-range jobs, factories, and much spoiling of material in some lines of work, such as the needle trades. Statistics show us that 50 per cent of highway fatalities are caused through faulty vision in judging distance. DON'T WAIT UNTIL YOU HAVE AN ACCIDENT; it is too expensive.

It is also of paramount importance that our School Children receive proper visual analysis throughout their FORMATIVE years.

Religious Tolerance Heeded Religious tolerance is extremely important, the speaker said, and this can be brought about by a better understanding of other religions. As God made everyone equal, no one has the right to force his or her opinions or beliefs on anyone else. We should be willing to listen to the ideas of others who might agree or disagree with us, Mme Casgrain stated.

Continuing, Mme Casgrain said that there is too much class snobbery, and there is also a definite fear of anything new. We must be tolerant of new ideas, she said. Understanding Better than War Everyone can do his part in helping to teach tolerance and this especially applies to the youth of to-day, she added.

The eminent women's leader stressed that the importance of teaching tolerance through kindness is more beneficial than waging war. If we are to eliminate wars by teaching tolerance, we must start now if humanity is to be saved from another tragedy.

The Hi-Y and Men's members who made up the bulk of the audience greatly enjoyed the talk by Mme Casgrain, and expressed the hope that she would give another address at an early date.

**NAME CHANGING**

**HOLLYWOOD**, March 9 — Daily Variety, the trade sheet all Hollywoodians read with their morning Alka-Seltzer, has recently inaugurated a little feature called "Title Changes". In this slot daily are listed the changes made in names of feature films between completion of shooting and eventual release to the public.

Hardly a day passes without two or three films hitting this column. Yesterday, for instance, the corner noted Paramount's "After Midnight", an Alan Ladd starring epic, had been retitled "Captain Carey, U.S.A." RKO's "Blind Spot" had been switched to "The Secret Fury".

All this name changing gives rise to wonderment in Hollywood as elsewhere. Studios pour thousands of dollars into exploitation of one name, then switch to another and void their initial investment. Some films have four and five title revamps. Ray Milland's recent movie, "Alias Nick Beal," was first known as "Beyond Evil". This was judged too similar to Alan Ladd's "Beyond Glory", so the name was changed to "Dark

Circle", which soon gave way to "Strange Temptation".

Next, the experts advised a switch to "Alias Nicky Beal", name of the central character, a reincarnation of old Beelzebub, the devil. And some weeks before release, after long hours of consultation and debate, it was decided to drop the Y from Nicky and make it "Alias Nick Beal". Meanwhile news columns and radio commentators had used publicity releases with the varied titles, and most folk anticipated five different films instead of the single one.

Another film currently on display, "Song of Surrender", was successively renamed "Abigail, Dear Heart", "Abigail", "Now and Forever", and finally received the title under which it is now in release.

Some title changes are in the interest of better boxoffice magnetism. Producers know from experience that names with a hint of sex, crime, sensation or suspense pay big dividends at the theaters. The right title can mean the difference between profit and loss for a movie. But nobody has ever figured out why the celluloid kinglypins don't settle on a goldplated title first, instead of tossing untold dollars into discard by continuous and tardy switches in name.

Of course, the classic story concerns the plans of Paramount Studio some years ago to publicize a Mae West film, "It Ain't No Sin". The press agents purchased 100 parrots, locked them in a room with a recording on which a man repeated hour after the film's title, "It Ain't No Sin", "It Ain't No Sin", "It Ain't No Sin", etc., etc. The publicity boys hoped to place the parrots in strategic spots throughout the city where the

## Miss E. Flanagan Speaker At NDG Club Charter Luncheon

That Canada would have sufficient nurses to carry out its nursing duties provided these nurses were not carrying out non-nursing duties as well, was the opinion expressed by Miss Eileen Flanagan, B.A., R.N., Director of Nursing at the Montreal Neurological Institute, when she addressed the Notre Dame de Grace Women's Club at the charter day luncheon held Friday in the ballroom at the Windsor Hotel.

Elaborating further on the foregoing statement, Miss Flanagan continued "We must realize that there are just so many young women in this country, of the given age, educational qualifications and health necessary for our profession, and it becomes imperative, therefore, that there should be some planned allocation of woman power in our social structure. We must define nursing so that non-nursing duties can be assigned to other workers." The concept to be developed, she suggested, was that of the nursing team — graduate nurses, student nurses, nursing aides and orderlies sharing in the care of the sick in properly defined degrees. The training of nursing aides is al-

ready under way in almost all Provinces, she added.

Innumerable demands for trained personnel are constantly being made, leading to the conclusion that there is a shortage of nurses, when actually there are more nurses than there ever have been.

Re nursing education, Miss Flanagan spoke of the interesting Experimental School for Nursing in Windsor, Ont., which is financially independent. The basic idea behind this experiment is to learn whether, if relieved of unnecessary and repetitive duties, a student can become qualified in less time.

"Florence Nightingale," Miss Flanagan noted, "was 90 years ahead of her time when she founded, in 1860, the Nightingale School at St. Thomas Hospital in London, as a financially independent school."

The influence of Women's Clubs, the speaker urged, could be used to encourage the principle of scholarships for nursing students, perhaps through forum discussions on nursing, acquainting the public with the need for financial support for nursing education, from public funds.

Other parts of Miss Flanagan's speech, which was entitled "Nursing at Home and Abroad, Today and Tomorrow," dealt with the main problems of nursing in other countries, and she also gave a graphic picture of the 50th anniversary of the International Council of Nurses held in Stockholm last June, and which she attended as one of the Canadian delegation of nurses.

Mrs. J. W. Perks, President of the N.D.G. Women's Club, presided and introduced the head table guests for whom Mrs. Frank Smith, President of the Tetraultville Women's Club, responded. Mrs. K. E. Norris thanked Miss Flanagan.

John Grant, baritone, accompanied by Phillips Motley at the piano, was given enthusiastic applause.

Mrs. W. R. Ormrod was chairman of the charter day luncheon committee.

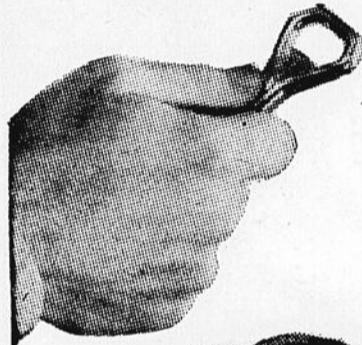

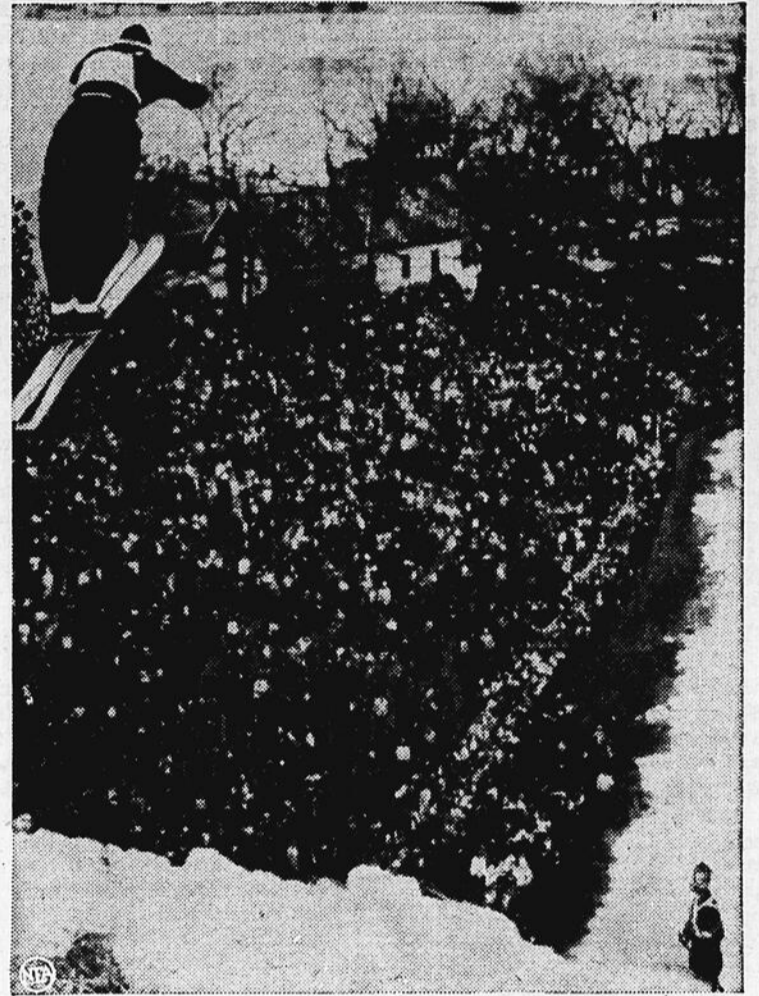
