STORM OF SMOKE.

WILLIAMSPORT, Pa., May 19.—This city was at the mercy of a storm of smoke all day yesterday, the conditions being the most remarkable ever experienced here. At mid-day it was so dark that artificial light was necessary in offices and stores. Extensive forest fires are still burning to the west and north and they have been fanned into fresh fury by a north-east wind. No rain has fallen west of this city for three weeks and grain is rapidly withering and turning yellow.

PARASITE INFECTED CURRANTS.

Bloomington, Ill., May 18.—Currant bushes in this vicinity are infected by a poisonous insect which almost covers the green fruit. A child of Edward Moll died last night from eating the parasite-infected currants. The child died in the most intense agony. Two other children are low from the same cause. Many people are ridding their gardens of currant bushes.

CONTRACT LABOR DISPUTE.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., May 19.—John and James Dobson, carpet manufacturers, recently imported a number of weavers from Bradford, England. The weavers were to be put to work at manufacturing velvet in the plush department. Yesterday, when the imported weavers began work all the operatives in the plush department to the number of five hundred struck. In the evening 500 more struck out of sympathy with the striking plush weavers. The strikers claim that the Dobsons have violated the contract labor law by importing the carpet weavers from England, but the Dobsons claim their right to bring them over under the clause in the law, which permits a manufacturer to import workmen for the purpose of starting a new industry.

KOCH LYMPH OF LITTLE VALUE.

PHILADELPHIA PHYSICIANS ABANDON ITS USE. PHILADELPHIA, May 18.—The Press says: "In all of the hospitals of the city the use of the Koch lymph for the cure of tuberculosis in man and cattle has been practically discontinued. Where there is no absolute discontinuance of the toxic agent, it is only being experimented with in a few selected cases. Even in these special cases the treatment of the lymph is becoming narrower and narrower in scope. Resident physicians of the hospitals say the fluid has proved to be of such small value that, together with the great danger attached to experimentation, there is no reasonable escape from abandoning it."

QUEEN NATHALIE was doubtless a wronged wife and mother, but she was also a very foolish and wrongly ambitious woman, who sought to array herself against the policy of her husband and his advisers, and who tried to interfere by intrigue with their plans and course. She has succeeded in alienating the affections of her son, as well as of her husband, and if she has the sentimental sympathies of schoolboys they will not, in all likelihood, prove of permanent value.

THE GENERAL PUBLIC will probably agree with the Trans-Atlantic Cattle Trade Committee in its conclusion that both the cattle foreman and his assistants should be required to sign the ship's articles, thus placing the men under the care and management as well as the authority of the captain of the ship. The men would, under such circumstances, get better quarters and food, and would be selected with a view to their ability to do their work at times when too many cattlemen are now seasick.

THE DEATH OF LORD EDWARD CAVENTISH, the member for West Derbyshire, opens a formerly Liberal constituency. The late member was elected in 1885 over his Conservative opponent, by over eight hundred of a majority, and on running in 1886 as a disinterested, he was not opposed by a Gladstonian. Lord Cavendish was the youngest son of the Duke of Devonshire, and a brother of the Marquis of Hartington, the leader of the Liberal-Unionists. Lord Frederick Cavendish, the Irish Secretary who was assassinated in Phoenix Park, was another brother.

THE CANADIAN PACIFIC RAILWAY COMPANY has elected Mr. Macdonnell, the Government candidate, to represent Algoma by a majority of about three hundred. If the agreement concluded between the Government and the Company at Toronto is to be carried through, the Canadian Pacific Company will have to do its very best in the coming by-elections which are said to be looked for as the result of the unsating of Liberal members by means of money furnished from Ottawa. A considerable reversal of the people's recent verdict is called for as the Government's present majority is by no means large enough or subservient enough to make it safe to serve the Company too openly.

THERE SEEMS to be a good deal of difficulty in keeping the members of Parliament together at this busy season of the year. Government organs are complaining that the Liberals refuse to give pairs to Ministerialists who have to be away, although why they should pair unless they have to be away themselves it is hard to say. It is every member's duty to be present at every vote if he can be, and he has no right to lay aside that responsibility except at the call of necessity. The prohibition vote has been postponed on account of absence of members, showing that temperance men are not above irregularity. There ought to be some forfeit that members would feel for absence from the House, such as a substantial reduction of their indemnity. This would be nothing but fair.

THE STORY is that the Czarewitch is to be betrothed to the daughter of the Prince of Montenegro. This is done, of course, to give Russia a hold upon the Balkan peninsula, and implies an extension of Russian power to the Adriatic. There is, however, a certain fitness in marrying the heir of the Romanoffs into the family of a brigand chieftain. It has become a serious degradation for any civilized princess to marry a member of the Russian house. How sad the account of the enforced parading of a Protestant princess, wife of the Grand Duke Sergius, as a victim at the altar of a Greek Catholic cathedral. This lady, whose conscience evidently forbids the act, was before all the people much agitated at thus being required to bow in the house of Rimmon. Heartless treatment of a wife is, however, not the greatest cause why an honest woman should recoil from union with a family in whose veins are the lees of the worst blood in the world, and whose sway is extended by systematic treachery, not shrinking from kidnapping and assassination.

THE NESTORIAN CHURCH, according to a Frenchified ecclesiastic, who has gone as an envoy to the Pope, desires union with the Roman Catholics, not having found satisfaction in Protestantism or with the Greek church. It is easy to see why they cannot fall in with Protestantism. The Congregationalist missionaries who have gained a very successful entrance among their people and who quite changed the aspect of the Nestorian Valleys, to whom, in fact, the Nestorians owe all that they know either of real Christianity or of modern civilization, made it their aim not to plant their own polity, but to bring light and life to the Nestorian Church. The clergy of that church however, found their slothful supremacy interfered with by the new life that was spreading among their people, and persecuted the praying Christians out of their church. The church that this "monsignor" speaks about is not the Nestorian people, but the Nestorian clergy. Very natural that they should prefer Romanism. Issa makes it very plain that it is clerical loaves and fishes that he is after.

THE UNWISE POLICY of the Dominion Government in regard to the carrying trade of the Great Lakes and the St. Lawrence routes is well illustrated by a case which has just arisen this spring. A Montreal firm has a quantity of Canadian grain at Duluth, which they wished to ship to Europe via Montreal. They chartered an American vessel to carry the grain from Duluth to Kingston, and then they were confronted by the Government with some absurd provision of our precious coasting laws which makes it illegal for Canadian grain to be shipped from an American port to a Canadian port in an American bottom; it must, according to law, be carried in a Canadian vessel. Unless the order to ship by the vessel chartered is cancelled, the grain will probably have to be carried to Ogdensburg and shipped thence via Boston. Thus, not only the Canadian St. Lawrence route is deprived of the trade, but if there is any advantage in having Manitoba and North-West Territories' grain shipped via Duluth as there probably is under certain circumstances or this grain would not have been sent to the head of Lake Superior, the grain dealers of Canada and the farmers and people of Manitoba generally are deprived of that advantage. This game of retaliation, which is being played between Canada and the United States, is one that the people of both countries suffer by, and only the politicians and certain monopolists on both sides of the line gain anything by it. To cut off our noses to spite our faces is a bad policy. The utmost freedom of trade and commerce is what will best serve the great natural route from the Great Lakes to the sea, and the Dominion Government is only playing into the hands of the enemies of Canadian trade and shipping, and of the enemies of this port, when it hampers the carrying trade as it does by its absurd regulations, of which there are so many that it is impossible to keep track of them.

WHY THE WARDENS RESIGNED.

The letter of resignation of the three churchwardens of Notre Dame has been made public. The principal grievances complained of by them are that the curé contests their right to fix the salaries of the church employees; that the curé seems to be disposed to take notice of the decisions of the churchwardens only in as much as they meet his own views, interpreting the law and claiming or dispensing with the authority of the bishop, according to the needs of the case, which he himself disposed of; that although the accountant churchwarden is alone authorized to collect the church revenues and to render an account thereof, still the curé continues to take in the collections, without rendering any account, although repeatedly asked to allow the amount of said collections to be credited to the Fabric.

A DRIVER'S ACCIDENT.

Robert Long, a laundry driver, met with an accident at the corner of St. Charles Borromeo and St. Catherine street yesterday afternoon. As he was driving past an opening in the street one of the wheels suddenly sank down, causing the horse to take fright and run away. The wagon was overturned, and Mr. Long was thrown violently to the ground, receiving a severe wound on the head about four inches long. The injured man was taken up in an unconscious state, the ambulance was summoned, and he was taken to the General Hospital. The horse ran about three blocks before it was stopped. The wagon, which is worth about \$150, was completely smashed. Mr. Long left the hospital for his home last night and to-day is much better.

ART SCHOLARSHIPS.

The two scholarships in connection with the Art Association have been awarded as follows: - The scholarship in the life class was awarded to Mr. J. L. Graham (No. 7), while the work of Miss Amy Budden (No. 5) was highly commended, she having shown great progress and proficiency. Mr. D. P. McMillan (No. 3), and Miss Blanche Evans (No. 5), also received honorable mention. In the class of drawing from the antique the scholarship was awarded to Miss Stevenson (No. 13), and Miss Hunsicker (No. 12), received honorable mention.

THE RESULT OF TALKING TOO MUCH.

In a case of Burrows vs. Ransom, Forbes & Co., which was an action of damages on account of false arrest on a capias, Judge Gill yesterday dismissed the action on the ground that by imprudently talking too much, the plaintiff had justified defendant in taking out proceedings against him.

A NEW CHURCH AND MONASTERY.

The "Pères du Tres Saint Sacrement" who have been in Montreal for some years past, intend to build a monastery, to be the headquarters of the order in Canada, as well as a new church, at the corner of Berri street and Mount Royal avenue.

MUST PLEAD TO THE MERITS.

Judge Taschereau yesterday granted a motion of the Ontario Express Company asking that the Grand Trunk Railway Company be required to plead to the merits of the mandamus taken against them by the Express Company.

CHEERING FORECAST.

ONTARIO CROP REPORTS - FRUIT TREES AND GRAPE VINES - FARM STOCK. TORONTO, May 18. - The May bulletin of the Bureau of Industries gives a cheering forecast of the yield of fruits and grains. So bright an outlook, it says, has not been presented for many a spring for the fall wheat crops of Ontario. The best showing is made in the west, while in the east it rests on the Ontario. A considerable amount of heavy land and that low-lying land suffered from ice. Winter rye is in fair condition. Of other grain crops, little is said. In the great barley growing districts there is a decline in the area of barley sown, owing to the fear of the McKinley bill interfering with prices. Some fields formerly devoted to barley have been sown with spring wheat, oats and peas, and grass is well advanced and clover looks well.

LITTLE HARM FROM FROST.

Fruit trees and grape vines came through the winter well. They will likely have a fair yield. Supplementary reports were sent in after the late frost. During the first week in May they show that little harm was done except in the county of Perth. The most unwelcome news as to the fruit is that the black rot has made serious ravages in plum and cherry orchards, in some cases affected trees having been cut down by the rot. Farm stock is in good general health, but not in prime condition, horses faring the worst, influenza being among the disorders named. All grains are reported scarce, but hay is so plentiful and low as to be a drug on the market. Heavy losses, ranging from 5 to 75 percent, are reported among bees.

CHARGED WITH BODY SNATCHING.

CORNWALL, Ont., May 18.—The excitement in connection with the stealing of the body of the late Mr. P. Purcell from his grave in Flanagan's Point graveyard is in no way abated, and the developments of the last couple of days lead to the belief that the perpetrators of the outrage will speedily be brought to justice and that punishment will be meted out.

DISPOSAL OF THE BODY.

Mr. Michael Purcell, brother of Mr. P. Purcell, said that the three men who were on watch at the Three Sisters Island had observed two men in a boat on the river. As soon as the watchers were seen the men in the boat steered clear of the islands and shortly afterwards returned and rowed past. On Saturday evening the watchers discovered a buoy and attempted to raise it, but failed.

NO SURRENDER.

NEWFOUNDLAND CONSIDERED TO BE RESOLVED UPON MAINTAINING HER "MORAL" RIGHTS.

HALIFAX, May 18.—A cable from St. John's, Nfld., says it has been decided by the colonial delegates now in London to at once send back to St. John's one of their number, Mr. A. B. Morine.

POLITICAL CRISIS INEVITABLE.

There is much anxiety for the future and a political crisis seems inevitable. If the legislation the delegates ask is not forthcoming by the colony, the British Government will speedily push its coercion act through.

Three hundred and thirteen Swedes, Norwegians and Finns—men, women and children—in a large room at the C. P. R. station. A scene of multiform color, of picturesque and intense human interest.

INCREASED MORTALITY.

The death list was heavy last week, the total having reached 117, as compared with 100 during the previous seven days. The list included 53 Catholics and 20 Protestants.

AMICABLY SETTLED.

The summary division of the Superior Court, presided over by Judge Pagnoulet, was concluded yesterday morning with the case of E. W. Gilman vs. A. R. Oughtred. After the case had been argued for some time Mr. R. C. Smith, counsel for Mr. Oughtred, drew the attention of the Court to the fact that the note sued on was prescribed, and the case was continued until to-day to allow the Hon. Mr. Gilman, counsel for his son, the plaintiff, to consider whether he would consent to a judgment in his favor.

BY ALL MEANS "CREMATE."

At last evening's meeting of the St. Cenegeogou Council, the question of joining with St. Henri and Cote St. Antoine in the erection of a crematorium was discussed.

OBITUARY.

Mr. Wm. Scott Hutchinson died at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. S. Archibald, yesterday, at the age of 78 years. He was born at Masseyville, near Halifax, N.S.

JOE BEEF'S CANTEN.

GROUNDING IN THE RIVER.

STEAMSHIP "ATHENS" AGROUND AT MAISON-NEUVE—HER CARGO BEING TAKEN OFF BY LIGHTERS.

The sugar steamship "Athens," from Hloilo, Philippine Islands, with 2,800 tons of raw sugar for the St. Lawrence Sugar Refinery, went aground in the river, while making for her berth at Maisonneuve yesterday afternoon.

POLICE ENQUIRY.

THE CITIZENS' LEAGUE TO GET A HEARING TOMORROW.

The secretary of the Citizens' League having written to the City Clerk asking that a deputation to address the Council and submit a petition asking for an investigation into the case of the Mayor's resignation, be given a hearing tomorrow, the City Clerk has agreed to do so.

CANADIAN CATTLE.

WHAT THE FIRST CONSIGNMENT OF THE SEASON SOLD FOR.

The season's first consignment of Canadian cattle was put on the market at Birkenhead yesterday. There were 672 head of the SS. "Lake Superior." The price realized was six pence half-penny per pound as compared with seven pence at the market.

JUSTICE MUST BE DONE.

In the case of Bidigare vs. the Oblat Fathers, which is an action taken by one of the members of the Order to force them to pay expenses incurred in connection with his illness, Judge Gill, yesterday granted defendant's motion to have the record transferred to Quebec for the trial.

ANOTHER COLONIZATION RAILWAY.

Ald. Brunet, M.P.P., returned from Quebec this morning, where he has been looking after the interests of the proposed Colonization Railway in the County of Terrebonne, to run from St. Sauveur on the "Great Northern" northward for a distance of some 63 miles.

FURTHER EXTENSION ASKED.

It will be remembered that the first instalment of \$45,000, due on May 1, by the town of St. Henri to the St. Cenegeogou Electric Water Works Company asking an extension of 15 days, was granted. At the last meeting of the St. Cenegeogou Finance Committee a further 30 days' respite of time was asked.

FIREMEN AT DRILL.

The Brigade began summer drill yesterday, the eastern section on Papineau square, the central on the Champ de Mars and the western on the Haymarket. At the close, in August, the different hose-reel teams will compete for the silver trumpet, now held by No. 3 (Wellington street), whose fastest time for attaching hose, running 300 feet and getting a stream on was 1m. 19s. last year.

A SUGGESTION FROM THE BENCH.

In the Court of Appeal, this morning, when referring a certain matter to a judge in Chambers, the Chief Justice remarked that he was surprised that the Bar did not make a movement for a new code of procedure which would fix for Chambers a number of matters which can be disposed of by a single judge, as this would simplify matters and leave time for cases which have to be heard in Court.

Mr. Sweet will visit France, returning in about a month.

A DISGUSTING ACTION.

Hugh Neil was arrested on Sunday by Special Constable Hamelin of the Water Department for spitting in the water of the Upper Level Reservoir. Yesterday before the Recorder he claimed that he was leaning over the railing and did so thoughtlessly. The Recorder fined him \$1 or eight days. Arthur Gariepy was fined for a similar offence on May 3.

The letter has been referred to the Police Committee.

Mr. Henry Lyman has written to Mayor McShane suggesting that a suitably inscribed tablet be placed on the rear of the pedestal of the Queen's Statue, Victoria square, to commemorate the opening of the city water works, and the establishment of the basin and fountain there in 1890.

PROTECTION FOR THE NORTH END.

The Fire and Police Committees are to hold a joint meeting to decide on the proposal to build a joint fire and police station in the northern section of St. Jean Baptiste Ward, above Logan's Park. Money has been voted for the improvement, but no site has yet been selected.

MORE ILLEGAL DUMPING.

The Board of Health has entered an action before the Recorder against Messrs. J. W. Smith and J. J. Smith for permitting the scavengers to deposit garbage on the vacant lots fronting on Papineau avenue.

TORRE HER RAILING.

While the Allan steamship "Corean" was moving up the wharf this forenoon, she came against the stern of the "Sarmatians," tearing off about twenty feet of railing on her gunwale.

PERSONAL.

Ald. Rainville has left the Continent and is now in England. He expects to leave for home on June 11. A letter just received states that his health is not improved.

CITY ITEMS.

The total shipment of cattle last week amounted to 3,70 head. The Mayor has placed the report of the committee on the water rate question as the first order of the day for to-morrow's Council.

ATTENDED THE BALL.

Ottawa, May 19.—The ball given by Major-General and the Hon. Mrs. Herbert last evening was attended by His Excellency the Governor-General and Lady Stanley of Preston, and Viscount Kilcourse, A.D.C. Lady Macdonald was also a guest, and several members of the Cabinet and the Speaker of the House of Commons. It is a most unusual thing for a Governor-General to attend at any private house.

TRAIN BLOWN TO PIECES.

Eight Italians and two Americans instantly killed. Tarrytown, N.Y., May 19.—At 11:25 this morning a train containing a large amount of dynamite was blown up a short distance from the station. The explosion was terrific. It blew the train to pieces and the report could be heard a mile away. Two Americans and eight Italians were instantly killed. The train was picked up and carried to the station. A large number of people were injured. It is impossible to tell the cause of the accident. The shock was tremendous.

CHAREWITCH LEAVES JAPAN.

At a conference at Glasgow yesterday of representatives of the Scotch miners it was decided to recommend all the mining districts in Scotland to contribute to the support of the striking miners on the Continent, and also to take steps to restrict the export of coal to the Continent.

ENGLISH MURDER MYSTERY.

SAILOR'S BAG DISCOVERED CONTAINING THE MUTILATED CORPSE OF A BOY. LONDON, May 19.—A sailor's bag, painted black, decorated with the British and Norwegian ensigns, represented as flying from crossed staffs and bearing the initials "F. A. M." and the name "Girvan," was today found floating in the Handon dock at Liverpool. Upon being taken out of the water and opened, the bag was found to contain the terribly mutilated corpse of a boy apparently about 15 years of age. His throat had been cut and both legs had been removed below the knees in order to make possible the packing of the body in the bag. There was also found in the bag a knife and a saw, both being knawed and both having fragments of flesh adhering to their blades. A careful examination of the condition of the body added to the appearance of the bag, as well as of the instruments with which the crime was committed, shows that the police are as yet without a clue to the identity of the murderer or murderers. A most thorough search, however, has already been instituted among the crews of the ships in the harbor and the sailors lodging-houses are under close watch.

PINTER'S "DISCOVERY."

LONDON, May 19.—Edward Pinter, the American, alias Sheehey, Al, who is charged with attempting to obtain \$10,000 from Edwin Streeter, a jeweller, by false pretences, was again under examination in Court today at the Strand. Pinter testified that one of the powders found in Pinter's possession was composed of calomel mixed with charcoal. The prisoner again affirmed that he was able to make gold and said he was anxious to prove the truth of this statement in an experiment. The magistrate, however, objected on the ground that he understood that a horrible stench was one of the features of the experiment. The prisoner then demanded that an official analysis of the powders should be made, and the Magistrate agreeing to this, Pinter's case was adjourned for a week.

ENCITEMENT IN BELGRADE.

BELGRADE, May 19.—The palace of ex-Queen Natalie, who was rescued by the students yesterday from the custody of the prefect, who had been ordered to expel her from Serbia, is still protected by an organized band of students and citizens. At eleven o'clock last night a force of gendarmes attacked the corner of students and citizens, and a severe struggle ensued. Many citizens and gendarmes were severely injured. Throughout the night the city was in a fever of excitement and further fighting is expected.

YIELDS TO SAVE BLOODSHED.

At daybreak the conflict was renewed, and this time victory rested with the gendarmes, who broke through the line of students, and made their way to the palace, where they summoned the chamberlain of the ex-Queen, and ordered him to arouse her. The Queen at length made her appearance and told the officers of the gendarmes that she would yield to force to save further bloodshed. She then permitted herself to be conducted to a carriage by which she was taken to a train that bore her to the Hungarian frontier. The bitterness of feeling, as well as of sympathy for the ex-Queen, has been increased by the events yesterday and to-day, and further trouble is almost inevitable.

SPANISH COMMERCIAL CONGRESS.

MADRID, May 19.—At a congress to-day of delegates from all the Chambers of Commerce the Government bill to extend the charter of the Bank of Spain and to empower an unlimited note issue was discussed. The congress sent a deputation to the Premier, Senor Canovas del Castillo, with instructions to ask him to postpone the bill. The Premier replied that he was unable to do so but he was perfectly willing to consider any amendments the congress might propose.

THORN AND HOPE SENTENCED.

ANTWERP, May 18.—Two men, whose passports bore the names respectively of Charles Thorn and Daniel Hope, were arrested on October 2, 1890, at Liege for presenting local bank forged letters of credit. Morgan & Co. for \$20,000. The two men to-day were each sentenced to five years' imprisonment and to pay a fine.

EXCESSES IN CORFU.

THREE, May 19.—The *Cittadino* of this city says that in spite of the siege which has been proclaimed in Corfu the excesses continue and the excitement has not abated. A Hebrew was stabbed to death at Corfu yesterday. An Italian woman was killed and a man, nationality not mentioned, was wounded. Military protect the stores belonging to Hebrews that have been reported.

It is his custom several times during the season to make a little tour of the parishes surrounding Montreal, in order to ascertain the condition of the crops. He made his first trip of the season recently through the parishes of St. Laurent, St. Leonard, Cote Visitation, etc. He says that oats and barley are well out of the ground, and look thrifty; pastures very fresh and green, with promise of a good hay crop; potatoes nearly all planted; small fruits (currants, gooseberries, etc.) in flower. Cabbages planted out in many places. Foliage backward. Wild cherries are, however, in flower. The farmers of Montreal, he states, are going more and more into market gardening, and are growing less and less grain each year.

NOTRE DAME CHURCH TROUBLES.

A number of the parishioners of Notre Dame are opposed to the resignation of the three churchwardens, whom they wish to remain in office, and claim at the same time that the resignation of the board of ex-wardens accepting this resignation was illegal because the resigning wardens were not convened for that meeting, although they had a right to take part therein, their resignation not being yet accepted. There is even some talk of a mandamus to compel the board to show cause why they should have adopted such a resolution at a meeting irregularly convened.

Godbout, the young man who stole the books from the doctors, was again brought up before the Police Judge yesterday, and pled guilty to all the charges brought against him, and was remanded for medical examination as to the soundness of his mind. To day on one of the charges he was sentenced to two months imprisonment.

REVENING THE GAUNTLET. Each morning the prisoners for the Recorder's Court, at the Central Station, have to pass from the cells across the corridor to the ante-room adjoining the dock. They have to take the policemen's hands, and are subjected to the gaze of any others in the corridor. Yesterday it appears that two women—one colored—were passing through this ordeal, they greeted their fellow-prisoners with a hearty "Hello." This was regarded as very funny by some of the constables, who laughed at the two women, and made jeering remarks.

FOUR YEARS FOR INDECENT CONDUCT. Gabriel Blouin, a middle-aged man, was this morning sent to the penitentiary for four years by Judge Desnoyers for indecent conduct.

ARRESTED ON SUSPICION. This morning a young Polish Jew was found entering in the Merchants' Institute. He was arrested on suspicion of being the person who broke open the cash box of Mr. Armstrong, of the Montreal and Sorel Railway, whose offices are in that building and who was robbed about three weeks ago. In the Police Court on proof was found against the accused, but he will be taken before the Recorder, where a charge of vagrancy will be brought against him.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

TILT BETWEEN MR. MILLS AND SIR JOHN THOMPSON.

PREMIER AND OPPOSITION LEADER WELCOMED BY THE HOUSE—ESTIMATES FOR THE ENSUING YEAR.

(From Our Own Correspondent.) OTTAWA, Ont., May 19.—The Hon. Mr. Laurier appeared soon after the House assembled yesterday, and was warmly welcomed by both sides of the House. He remained, however, only about twenty minutes. Sir John Macdonald, who was detained in his office till four, was cordially greeted, in his case as in that of Mr. Laurier, by members on both sides of the House. The Premier looked well, for a man who had been sick for a week, though his face looks ten years older than last session, and there is an ashy hue on it which everyone would like to see absent.

MR. MILLS' PROTEST. The only matter of general interest in the House was Mr. Mills' protest against carrying through the modus vivendi bill without furnishing Parliament with any information. Mr. Davies said the Minister of Marine should have made a reference to the state of matters between Canada and Newfoundland as regards the refusal of the latter to sell bait to Canadian vessels.

GOVERNMENT OBSTRUCTION. We are within two days of entering on the fourth week of the session and yet almost nothing has been done. The Government press criticized the Opposition for an alleged policy of obstruction but the only obstruction of public business has come from those whose main business it is to expedite it.

MR. COCHENTHALER, of Bleury street, whose cigar store was robbed, as mentioned elsewhere, says that the policeman who should have been on the street at the time of the burglary had been sent to a fire. If the officer had been on his beat, Mr. Cochenthaler claims, the affair could not have happened. He will bring the matter before the Police Committee.

NOTES AND NOTICES. MONTREAL GROCERS' ASSOCIATION.—An adjourned meeting of the above association will be held to-morrow, Wednesday, May 20, at eight o'clock p.m. in the long room of Mechanics' Hall.

WHOLESALE PRICES. The tone of the British breadstuffs markets shows some improvement, being stronger and somewhat more inclined to activity.

ESTIMATES FOR THE COMING YEAR. The estimates for the financial year ending June 30, 1892, were submitted to Parliament to-day, the total showing a reduction of over \$5,000,000 as compared with last year.

CHIEF INCREASES. The chief increases are railways and canals, \$1,017,708; legislation, \$141,247, and post office, \$274,110. The administration of justice shows an increase of \$5,699, due to the proposed re-arrangement of the Admiralty courts and to extra allowances to junior county court judges.

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"Agriculture," there is an increase of \$15,000, for the establishment of branch experimental dairy stations in affiliation with the experimental farms, but the grants toward publishing the reports of the Dominion dairying and fruit growing associations is dropped.

MISCELLANEOUS EXPENSES. Immigration and immigration expenses is out of \$205,000 to \$160,000, but the Women's Protective Society of Montreal gets its usual grant of \$3,000. The militia vote is decreased by \$24,300, including cuts of \$10,000 for military stores, \$3,000 for drill instruction and \$1,000 for the permanent schools.

THE VOTE FOR PUBLIC BUILDINGS IN QUEBEC amounts to \$103,300—\$7,000 to complete the Lachine Post Office, \$10,000 for the Laprairie Post Office, \$1,000 for the St. Henri Post Office, \$1,000 for the Quebec Post Office, \$200 for the St. Vincent de Paul Penitentiary, and \$8,000 for the Richmond Post Office.

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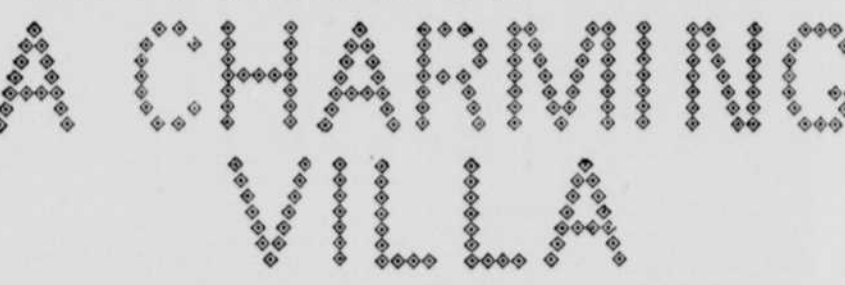
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
