LATEST CABLE NEWS.

Cabinet Making.

LONDON, July 25.—Lord Salisbury was

cordially received by the Queen at Os-

borne House. It is reported that Her

Majesty has made a direct personal ap-

peal to Lord Hartington and other Whigs

to join the new ministry. Lord Harting-

ton attended a conference held yesterday

evening at the offices of the Liberal

Unionist Association, at which he an-

nounced his rejection of Lord Salis-

bury's overtures. The announcement

was applauded by the meeting. To-

day a Queen's messenger arrived at

Devonshire House, bringing special de-

spatches from the Queen to Lord Harting-

ton, who afterward held a consultation

with the Earl of Derby. Lord Salisbury

will return from Osborne to-morrow. He

has asked Lord Hartington and the Earl

of Derby to meet him. There is intense

excitement in the clubs over the pros-

pect of royal interference in the

cause of a coalition ministry.

An Alliance Against England.

BERLIN, July 24.—The St. Petersburg

Journals are discussing the probabilities

of a coalition between Austria, Germany

and England against Russia.

A Championship Match.

LONDON, July 24.—Jacob Gaudaur will

row Beach, the Australian, on the Thames

September 18, for £1,000 a side and the

championship of the world.

Bismarck and the English Tories.

BERLIN, July 24.—The Cologne Gazette,

Bismarck's organ, rejoices in Lord Salis-

bury's restoration to office, and says it

assures the peace of Europe.

Interference.

PARIS, July 24.—The French Govern-

ment has notified Madagascar that the

loan which that country proposes to raise

in London is a violation of existing

contracts.

The German Iron Trade.

The failure of Remy, the Dortmund

iron founder, aggravates the crisis in the

German iron industries. The Rhish,

Westphalian and Silesian works are at a

standstill.

A Decree Against Betting.

BERLIN, July 24.—The German cabi-

net has forbidden Prussian officers betting

with bookmakers, riding horses owned by

professional horsemen, or figuring in

races unless in uniform.

A Boat Race.

LONDON, July 24.—A boat race for

£1000 between Buebar and Kelly, the

Australian oarsman, took place on the

Thames to-day. The course was from

Putney to Mortlake. Buebar won in 24.25.

A Regatta.

HAMBURG, July 24.—Splendid weather

favoured the regatta here to-day. The

contest between the Thames Club and

the Berlin Rowing Club, which was the

advance, but the stocks offered were ab-

sorbed readily, checking the fall and

causing yesterday's market to close the

strongest of the week.

PARIS, July 24.—Owing to the holi-

days a small business was done on the

Bourse during the past week, there being

only a thin attendance of speculators.

BERLIN, July 24.—Stocks on the

Bourse were firm during the week. The

dealings were limited.

Disorderly Doings.

DUBLIN, July 24.—A large crowd to-

day stoned, beat and kicked two con-

stantables who were attempting to arrest

disorderly citizens. Reinforcements

arrived and six persons were arrested.

The funeral of the Fenian Hickey, which

took place to-day, was conducted in an

orderly manner, several thousand persons

including Messrs. Harrington and John

O'Connor, M.P.'s, Alderman O'Connor

and Sheriff Clancy were in attendance.

At the cemetery Chas. McCarthy made an

address in which he urged his auditors to

follow Hickey's example.

A Challenge.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 24.—The Porte

has issued a circular to the governors

of the various provinces, instructing them

to enforce the law which stipulates that

the naturalization of Turkish subjects

abroad shall not be recognized. The gov-

ernors are requested in the event of the

return to Turkey of the class referred to,

to continue to treat them as Turkish sub-

jects and not permit consular interven-

tion in their case. The issuance of the

circular at this time is mainly directed

against the numerous Armenians return-

ing from the United States as naturalized

citizens of that country. The American

Consulate referred the matter to Wash-

ington.

THE ANARCHISTS IN COURT.

A Clever Detective's Testimony.—What

was said and done at the trial of the

sections.—The Advice that was

Given and the Plans that were

Concocted.

CHICAGO, July 24.—Intense excitement

was caused about Judge Garey's court

room this afternoon by the report that

the innermost councils of the anarchists

were to be revealed through some mys-

terious agency. The calling of a Pinkerton

detective was believed to be the beginning

of the revelation to which the other

startling evidence was only a prelude.

Breathless attention was given as the

witness commenced his testimony. A

few moments had been previously con-

sumed in taking the evidence of R. S.

Barnum, August York and Richard

Reichel. The first proved that an adver-

tisement in Parsons' handwriting was

published by an evening paper, May 4th,

calling an important meeting of the

American group at 7 p.m. The time set

was about three hours prior to the throw-

ing of bombs. Goerke and Reichel, both

employees of the Arbeiter Zeitung, testified

that Spies wrote the revenge circular

and caused it to be printed. In this circular

was the call for the meeting in the Hay-

market. A sensation was here created

among the anarchists by the appearance

in the witness box of Andrew C. John-

son, one of the Pinkerton detectives.

Spies regarded him with an expression of

surprise and alarm and immediately be-

gan an earnest conversation with his at-

torney. The witness began his testi-

mony by stating that he was a member of

the American branch of the International

Workingmen's Union and belonged to the

armed section of that force. He had

joined the organization for the purpose of

finding out their objects and taking

secret notes of their proceedings. He at-

tended all their meetings from February

22, 1885 to January 1886, he took reports

in writing of the meetings and turned

them over to W. A. Pinkerton, Superin-

tendent of the Detective Agency. The

witness said he had learned that

other Pinkerton men had been

detained on the same service.

His own attendance at the meetings of the

armed section was confined to two

occasions at a meeting of the American

group the report of the debate of which

was given by the witness Fischer. One of

the defendants introduced a resolution

denouncing a man named Wright who it

was alleged had secured payment for

some crime by means of his high standing

in the society. Spies opposed the

resolution saying, what is the use of pass-

ing resolutions? Now is an opportunity

for some of our young men to go and

shoot Wright. At another meeting in

April Spies in a similar manner

advised the shooting of a police

sergeant who had been tried upon a

serious charge, but acquitted on the

testimony of his brother officers. As a

further example of how the leading an-

archists were continuing to stir up

every incident, engaging public attention

and urging subordinate members to

make it the occasion of some startling

act of violence, the witness related

that Fielding, referring to the dedication

of the new Board of Trade, said at one

of the meetings, "what a splendid op-

portunity there would be for some bold

fellows next Tuesday evening to make the

capitalist tremble by blowing up the

building and all there in it."

The witness then took each separate

meeting of the American group of the

International Working People's Associa-

tion between February 22nd, 1885, and

January 22nd, 1886, mentioned the dates

specifically and proceeded by reference

to memoranda to detail exactly when,

where, how often and under what circum-

stances an attack on the militia and police

and particularly the use of dynamite.

Incidentally detective Johnson told how

Parsons in a certain speech, had said, "I

lived on snowballs all last winter, but by

— I won't do it this winter." At the

narration of this story of her husband,

Mrs. Parsons laughed till the tears ran

down her cheeks and then wiped her eyes

with a big red handkerchief. The alarm

that had manifested itself among the

eight delegates upon the first appearance

of the detective on the stand had by this

time somewhat subsided. When the de-

fective, however, began to recount his

experience at a meeting of the armed

section, held Aug. 24 at 54 West Lake

street, the prisoners again looked serious.

Twenty or twenty-five men were there

and two women. A man with a long

sword, dressed in blue blouse and wearing

a slouch hat, ordered all to fall in.

Whoever wished to join the company

were told to step to the front. The

detective and two others stepped forward.

Upon the officers demanding that each

should be vouched for by some member

of the company, the detective was for a

moment at a loss how to proceed; to his

great relief Parsons volunteered to be his

SIR DONALD'S FARM.

A Visit to Sir Donald A. Smith's Farm at Silver Heights.

Sir Donald A. Smith farms, as he does everything else, in an unostentatious manner, but, as a visit to his farm at Silver Heights will show, most efficiently. A few days ago a visit was made to his farm at Silver Heights.

After viewing the thoroughbreds, Highlanders and Herefords, sheep, poultry, etc., a ramble took place over the farm, which consists of 240 acres under crop, and some 500 acres grazing land, and from general appearances one would not suppose this section of the country has suffered from drought. It appears the farm has been sown mainly for exhibition purposes, and the proceeds will probably be distributed, gratis, throughout America and the Old Country. There was one field of 80 acres of Red Fyfe wheat, the seed being the prize wheat of last year. It has a splendid appearance, very even, well headed out, and will be ready for the reaper in two weeks, and promises an extra heavy return. Next came a field of oats, the seed being that grown on the farm last season, and which was "highly commended" at the Exhibition. Next a field of oats was visited, the seed of which came from Quebec, and was considered extra good. Then followed a field of barley, seed also from Quebec, which is quite ripe, and will be cut to-day, July 20. Then comes a field of barley, from seed grown on the farm last year, which drew second prize at the Exhibition. Then comes one acre of the famous Dunmore wheat, which attracted so much attention in England, and received such high testimonials from over 100 millers in Great Britain last year. This acre is sown with all of this noted wheat that remained in Manitoba, the rest of the Dunmore crop having been distributed in England. It promises to be quite equal to the seed, though on account of the dry season the return may possibly not be so heavy. The next field is from wheat grown at Silver Heights last season, and which, although not securing the Hudson's Bay prize, was a very little better than the field of the "Empress" Barley, imported last winter from England at considerable expense. It was considered the finest barley for malting ever grown in England. The grain is already turning yellow, and is going to be equal, at least, to the seed. It will be ready for cutting by the end of this week. Then follows an English two rowed barley which is equally as good as the malting, excepting in color. The return promises to be excellent. There are three qualities of oats, also imported this season from England, the potato, the barley and the sandy samples of all of which were seen at Lord Commissioner McTavish's office. The remainder of the 240 acres are sown with a variety of seeds, two or three qualities of peas, two of native oats, one of No. 1 hard wheat grown at Glenora, 5,000 feet above the sea, and within sight of the Rocky Mountains. The grain is also at Glenora, which presents a splendid appearance, and will shortly ripen. The garden proper at Silver Heights is planted with almost every variety of vegetable and flower hitherto grown in the Northwest, with over sixty varieties of potatoes, and considering the dry season it is no special facilities for watering, and without "the acres of glass conservatory" as described by "Rhumus" in his letter headed "The Manitoba Bubble," published in the Dakota edition of the St. Paul Daily Globe of 3rd July. A visit to the establishment of our enterprising Knight will show anyone what Manitoba can produce, even in a season like the present, which is considered unusually dry, and without any attempt at scientific farming, for the farmer, although an excellent gardener, never worked on a farm in his life before this year, either in this or any other country.
