### Park Emmanuel Will Dedicate Tablet Sunday

Four stained-glass windows will be dedicated and a memorial tablet will be unveiled in Westmount Park-Emmanuel Church on Sunday morning, Feb. 1, at the eleven o'clock service. Rev. Col. J. P. Browne, M.C., senior chaplain in the Quebec Command, will unveil the tablet and dedicate the windows.

The memorial tablet will bring together in one plaque, the names of the men of the former Westmount Methodist Church, of Melville Presbyterian Church and of Emmanuel Congregational Church who served in World War I. The windows will carry the names of those of Emmanuel Church who served in World War II.

The windows are the work of C. W. Kelsey of Westmount. They represent four great scriptural events:—Peter's confession, "Thou art the Christ", the Crucifixion of Jesus, the Ascension of Christ, and the Descent of the Holy Spirit.

Relatives and friends of those whose names are on the tablet or on the windows are invited to the dedication service Sunday morning.

### Courteous Canines Capably Complete Classes At Church

Canine graduation exercises took place at St. Matthias Church Wednesday evening with 17 dogs graduating "summa cum laude." Purpose of the 10 weeks novice course is to teach the dog better manners so that he will be easier to manage. Directress of the course is Mrs. C. F. McCullough.

Later on, when the Canadian Kennel Club holds its trials, many of the dogs will strive for more important degrees.

In the novice class, the dogs are taught to walk (heeling), recall, sit, stay, down, and returning work. Any dog regardless of breed, if in healthy condition and over eight months is accepted in the novice class.

### Noted Westm'nt Pianist To Give Radio Recital

In a broadcast recital over the CBC French network Wednesday evening, Rose Goldblatt will present the first performance for Canadian listeners of the suite written about her and her two children by the Montreal composer Albertine Caron-Legris, entitled "Scenes de Famille".

Rose Goldblatt, who is a pianist of international reputation, lives with her young family in a white-painted brick house on Elm Avenue in Westmount, and it was here that the composer was inspired to write these musical character sketches.

Madame Caron-Legris wrote the dedication of this "Scenes de Famille" to Rose Goldblatt and her children Nina and Jon Darius. The three parts are entitled "Quand Nina s'amuse" (Nina amuses herself) "L'espiègle petit frère" (The roguish little brother) and "Douce Maman" (Fond mother).

Two additional works will complete the program, the Mozart Sonata in C (K 300), and the Variations Sérieuses by Mendelssohn. The program will be heard in the Montreal area over station CBF from 10:30 to 11:00 p.m.

### Tenants On Short Term Leases

Six flats on the east side of Staynor Park, situated on Staynor Avenue, will be demolished in order to extend Staynor Playground, City manager Thomas Hughes announced.

Tenants have been on month-to-month leases since the city acquired the flats in 1947 and have now been given notice to vacate by May 1.

For the present the land will be merely graded but someday the city may build a fieldhouse and comfort station on the property.

Mr. Hughes said that the flats are not in the best of condition and the city feels that it is time to demolish them.

At its first session since the recent election, the City Council appointed committees to supervise the administration of civic departments and to carry out other civic work.

The general committee to supervise the city's administration comprises Mayor R. L. Campbell and Aldermen H. L. Blachford, Turner Bone, J. A. L'Anne, R. Panet Raymond and J. S. Pemberton.

Department commissioners are: Alderman Pemberton — Finance; Alderman Bone, Roads and Municipal Buildings; Alderman de L'Anne, Police and Fire; Alderman Blachford, Electric Light and Incineration, Health and Public Welfare; and Alderman Panet-Raymond, Parks and Recreation.

## Ascension Parents-Teachers Hear Panel Discuss "Comics"

Comics, as long as they are comical, are safe for children, five speakers agreed at the Ascension Parents - Teachers' Association meeting in St. Leo's, Westmount, this week.

They also agreed that there were legal and moral grounds to stop obscene "funnies" from appearing on the newstands. But there was much talk about the danger of such "sex in technicolor" publications circulating in teenage circles outside the home.

The topic was "What About our Children and the Comics?" Taking part in the discussion were Prof. Louis Chattel, psychologist; Mrs. Murray Ballantyne, Priory School director; Rev. Shaun Govenlock, chaplain, St. Patrick's Orphanage; John Thompson, managing editor, The Ensign; John Dalton, boys' services director, Catholic Charities.

T. P. Slattery, Q.C., president of the association, was chairman of the discussion.

Father Govenlock said the very fact that such a topic should come up for discussion indicates an uneasiness and worry on the part of parents about comics.

"Placing the blame on the comics for any wayward actions depersonalizes the sense of guilt held by adults themselves," Father Govenlock felt.

"Comics—the real 'funnies'—are not intrinsically bad. They provide youngsters with a substi-

tute adventure that has been lost in our actual urban society," he said.

"The great phenomena of the comics is only one exemplification of a broader factor in our culture where the graphic is stressed over the grammatical."

Mrs. Ballantyne said "funny and entertaining" comics formed good relaxation for children. But she deplored any efforts to portray a religious or educational lesson in any comic strip.

"Comics should be funny and nothing else. The classics should be left alone. If Ivanhoe isn't worth reading as a classic, it is certainly not worth reading in the funnies," Mrs. Ballantyne said.

Mr. Thompson said that two decades or so ago, the comics were merely funnies for amusement only. He said many new serials have arisen without even "the saving grace of humor."

He said reading the comic books was not restricted to children. Even soldiers representing the Western Powers take to comics as staple reading diet.

Prof. Chattel said obscene comics "not sold on stands" form a very serious menace for the young. He said, however, that there was not sufficient scientific evidence to link comics directly with crime.

Mr. Dalton criticized the "primitive language" of the comic strips and the "vicious ideas sometimes visualized."

More than 50,000,000 comic books are sold each month over 100,000 stands in North America, Mr. Slattery said.

The meeting will be held in the Macdonald Physics Building, McGill University, at 8.15 p.m.

Dr. Beale is recognized as one of Canada's leading astronomers. The subject will be "Our Universe As We Know It Today."

## Closer Family Ties Vital To Society Rotarians Told

"The home is the smallest but the most important institution of our complex society", Kenneth Greenaway, Public Relations Director of Zellers, told the Westmount Rotary Club at the weekly luncheon meeting.

He pointed out that clergymen could preach from the pulpit "until they are blue in the face", but unless parents exemplify his sermons to their children in the home, the child is not convinced.

"What the world needs today more than anything else is better homes where there is perfect harmony, friendship and loving understanding between father and mother and brother and sister," Mr. Greenaway said.

The speaker said that the age of adolescence is the age of doubt: "I recently talked to a man who had just had the interesting privilege of talking to 21 boys and girls of high school age. Among those 21, he found just one girl who believed implicitly in God and who was confident that there was a life beyond the grave."

He added that it was "shocking" when the interviewer discovered that not one of the 20 doubters had ever discussed the matter with either one of their parents.

"When a boy or girl has reached the higher grades of the public school, his immature mind doubts God, doubts the government, doubts that virtue is always triumphant and that honesty is the best policy," he said.

"Although these doubts are healthy doubts", Mr. Greenaway said, "our duty as parents is to guide the child's stumbling mind which is just beginning to think alone."

He said that in guiding the child, parents should establish harmony by mutual understanding, rather than cowed obedience or by dictatorial methods.

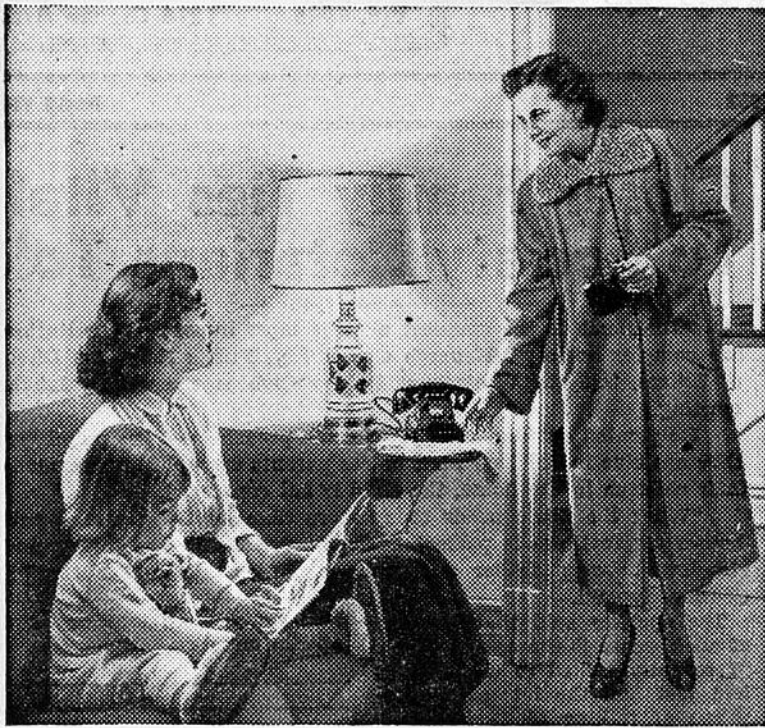

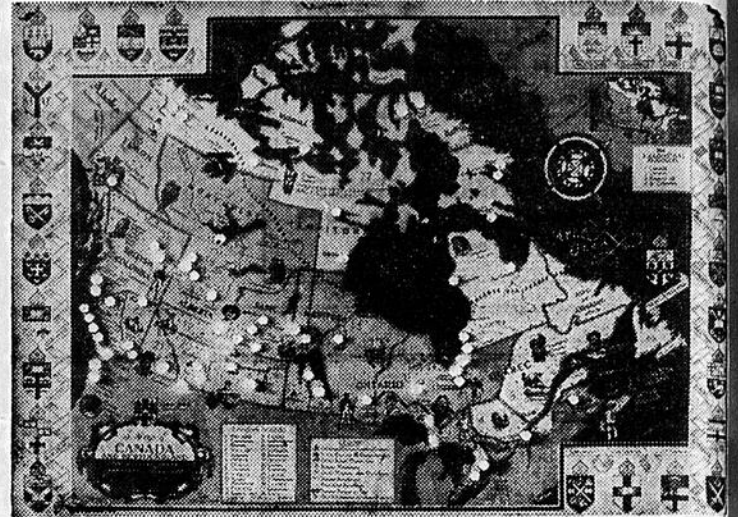

## New Teachers' Salary Scale

\* \* \*  
**School Board Does Well With Difficult Problem**

The new salary scale for Protestant school teachers, announced yesterday, will, we think, meet with general approval.

The Board had a difficult assignment in solving a long-time problem, but out of the multitude of complaints and conflicting suggestions and demands, have worked out a solution with which few can find any serious fault.

The new scale is, wisely, based on years of preparation and length of service; brings parity between men and women teachers reasonably close; and is high enough to attract good men and women to the profession who otherwise might be lost to it.

The position of the teacher in the community, and the heavy responsibilities inherent in the training of our youth, make it essential that the profession attract the best. Teachers' salaries should be, but haven't been, higher than many positions in the business world requiring considerably less in the way of qualification and responsibility. The new scale will help to correct that.

We hope the Board won't go any further with the so-called merit plan. Like Canon Kenneth Naylor, we are decidedly "uneasy" about such a system. Who arbitrates merit, and on what basis? Who can decide whether a teacher who does brilliantly with a brilliant

class is better than one who does only moderately with a poor class?

However, that is far in the future. The Board members are to be congratulated upon a satisfactory solution to a very difficult problem.

## Eager Markets

"Go South, Young Man" Today's Best Advice for Trade

A generation or two ago Horace Greeley advised the eager and forward looking to "Go west, young man." There was the land of still-untapped opportunity. But, in time, opportunities are satisfied. They have been satisfied largely in the west, and there is evidence that Europe have been forced to a policy of self-containment. So the Horace Greeley of this day might well urge that we turn our eyes south to the last great frontier of opportunity. The United States, always, quick to sense an opportunity, in its investment policy thinks of Canada and next of South America.

Already Canada's trade with that southern continent tops half a billion dollars annually. It is greater than our trade with all the Commonwealth countries, outside of Britain. Fortunately our trading opportunity with the south is mutual. We need the oil of Venezuela, the oil and fruit of Colombia, the tin of Bolivia, the coffee and fine woods of Brazil. In that last country there are expanding demands of a population three times our own, just beginning to discover its needs and to learn that Canada has much to spare.

During the past five years a Canadian owned company, operating in Brazil and popularly known as Brazilian Traction, has shown how quickly trade can reach high figures. This company alone bought a million and a half dollars of Nova Scotia coal, four millions of base metals from all parts of Canada. And it bought thirty million dollars worth of electrical equipment. That is the sort of business to assure the markets for Canada's expanding industry.

## Whole Education

By Rev. Canon R. Kenneth Naylor  
 Trinity Memorial Church

It was a thrilling thing to hear last week an officer of the School Board describing a project being worked out in our High Schools. We have had in our Elementary Schools classes in hand work who have contributed toys to the Junior Red Cross for Christmas distribution. This began during the War when toys were scarce, and still goes on.

The High School classes carried on a similar work, but they decided that they wanted a bigger project to work on. The Red Cross was very glad to oblige them, for their need is almost unlimited. They had one group in serious need — the cerebral palsy group. The High Schools volunteered to meet at least part of the need. The Red Cross designed equipment to help the patients walk and learn to co-ordinate hand and foot and eye. There are oddly shaped skis, then shorter skis, tables and inclined planes. These were shown and explained to the Education Committee of the Board, and were very strongly approved both for the idea and for the magnificent quality of the workmanship.

A project of this kind has more than one value. It provides the pupils with the means of developing a high technical skill in handling tools. It brings them into touch with the Junior Red Cross and its world-wide activities. It trains them in citizenship, because they must become aware of the needs of others, and especially of a small afflicted group who cannot speak for themselves. And, further, contact with that group

must make the pupils aware of the fact of suffering.

We tend to segregate our crippled children; we are almost forced to keep spastic and cerebral palsied children free of the rougher contact of life; and our normal children might almost grow up without any consciousness of the problem of pain.

Pain, sickness, sorrow, suffering are realities in life. They produce a problem that is discussed and not answered in the Book of Job. As long as we look at it only in a book — no matter how great that book may be — we cannot understand it. But when we come into contact with it in life, it develops in us that divine sympathy — that is, companionship in suffering — which turns our academic study into the real matter of life.

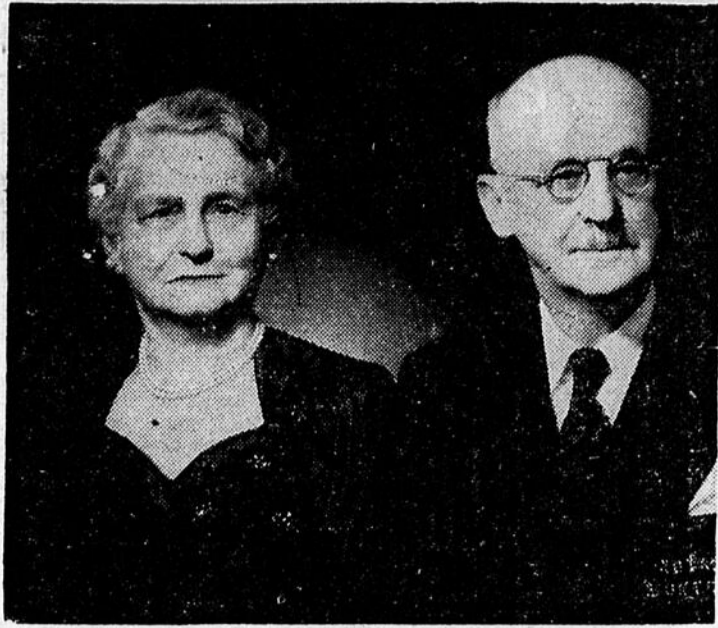

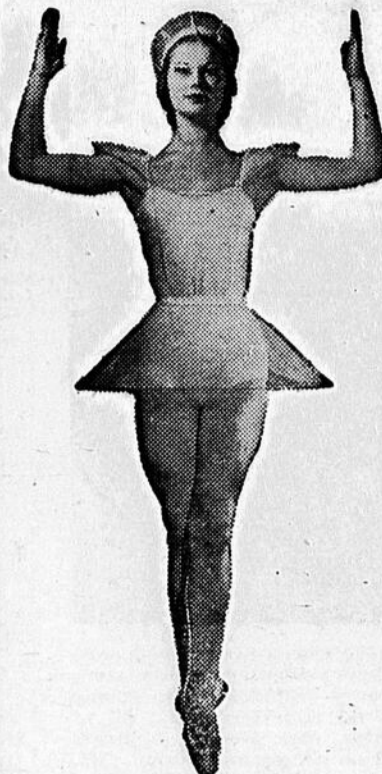

**Most Modern Incubator Added  
To M. G. H., Western Division**

Purchase of an 'Isolette' — a combined incubator — bassinette for premature babies — from donations made to the In Memoriam Fund has been announced by Mrs. Alexander Hutchison, president of the Women's Auxiliary of the Montreal General Hospital. The incubator, most modern of its kind, is to be installed in the Western Division of the Hospital. Because of its many unique features the tiny babies, some weighing less than two pounds, will be bathed, changed, weighed, and fed without ever emerging or getting a whiff of outside air.

By circulating filtered fresh outside air within a chamber which is kept constantly closed the Isolette eliminates exposure to droplet and airborne infection and minimizes the possibility of contact infection, according to Miss Herman, Superintendent at the Hospital. The doctors and nurses are able to care for the baby through four entry ports fitted with removable plastic sleeves which are simply twisted to be airtight. After four to six weeks, when a premature baby has gained sufficient weight, it will be moved to an ordinary incubator and a heated crib.

"It seems particularly fitting," said Mrs. Hutchison in announcing the gift, "that a fund founded as a memorial to those who have left us should assist in saving the lives of these tiny babies who have come too soon."

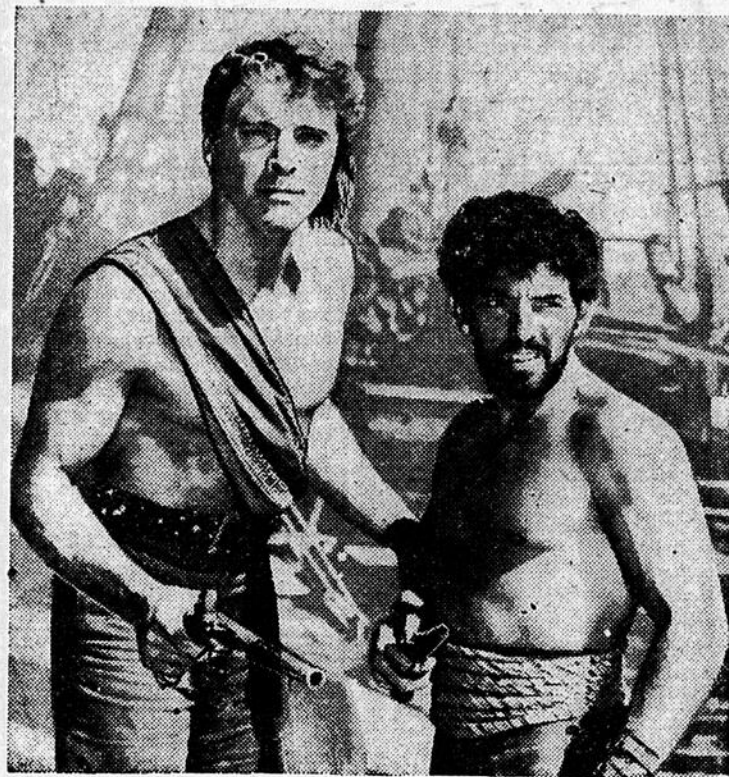
