REDS CUT OFF U.S. INFANTRY POSITION

World News In Brief

London, July 5.—(AP)—Romania announced today the expulsion of Roman Catholic Bishop Gerald Patrick O'Hara of Savannah-Atlanta (Georgia) on charges of spying. He is the last diplomatic representative of the Vatican in an Iron Curtain country.

Two other members of the apostolic nunciature—in which Bishop O'Hara was regent—were expelled on similar charges. Vatican sources said the move had been expected from day to day and "doubtless is the prelude to the complete suppression of the Bucharest nunciature." This is the office of the diplomatic representative of the Vatican.

Augusta, Me., July 5.—(AP)—Official tabulations received last night by Maine's Governor and council gave Earl S. Grant of Portland a margin of 5,189 votes in winning the Democratic nomination for the governorship from Leland B. Currier of Litchfield. Governor Frederick G. Payne, unopposed for the Republican renomination, polled 75,421 votes.

Paris, July 5.—(CP)—President Vincent Auriol today invited Guy Mollet, secretary-general of the socialist party, to "undertake a mission of information" with a view to forming a new government. Socialist opposition last night brought down Premier Henri Queuille's two-day regime on its first test in the national assembly.

Queuille lost out by a vote of 334 to 221 on a proposal asking endorsement of his cabinet and its policies.

Hamden, Conn., July 5.—(AP)—A bolt of lightning turned a holiday birthday party into a tragedy here yesterday, killing three persons and injuring seven.

Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Dorman, their five children and three friends, gathered under a tree in the Dorman yard, had just finished singing "Happy Birthday" to Leonard Dorman, Jr., 20, when the bolt struck. Otis Dorman, 22, Arthurina Dorman, 16, and Elizabeth M. Lyons, 18, were killed.

London, July 5.—(Reuters)—Suggestions that Dr. Klaus Fuchs, atom scientist who has served four months of a 14-year sentence for espionage, will shortly be released from prison, were authoritatively denied today.

The Daily Mirror yesterday reported that Fuchs, who gave atom secrets to Russia, may soon be doing scientific work for Britain again. It stated "a provisional period of two years had been fixed for a thorough vetting of the ex-spy. But he may be released earlier if it is felt that his allegiance to communism has waned sufficiently."

New York, July 5.—(AP)—Lt. Gen. James H. (Jimmy) Doolittle, who led the first air raid by United States planes on Tokyo during the second world war, yesterday was named winner of the Harmon International aviation award as the outstanding aviator of the 1940-50 decade. Miss Jacqueline Cochran, who organized and directed women's pilot auxiliary unit during the war, was named at the world's greatest woman pilot.

American Troops Pocketed South Of Suwon In First Duel With North Koreans

U.S. Moves To Protect Sea Lanes

Washington, July 5.—(AP)—Protection of the all-important sea route linking Southern Korea with Japan is getting high priority in the Far East war operations. Ships of the United States and Royal Navies and land-based patrol planes of the American navy are scouting along the Korean coast, and the sea lane across to the southern port of Pusan to keep them clear of raider vessels or aircraft.

The expected arrival of a U.S. carrier in the area will augment this protective cover for the supply ships and troop transports upon which the heavier part of the military build-up in Korean hinges.

Dispatches from the Far East and reports at Washington indicate that up to now the only menace has been from small surface craft, chiefly of the motor torpedo boat type, and the North Korea air force. A communique yesterday by the Far East command said laconically: "transportation of munitions, material, supplies and troops from points in Japan to Korea continued unimpeded throughout the day."

No one here was inclined to bury, behind easy victories of cruisers over motor torpedo boats, the possibility that submarines might enter the picture. One of the serious problems of American military forces is the fact that virtually all men and material being rushed to South Korea must funnel through the single port of Pusan.

London, July 5.—(Reuters)—Patrick Gordon-Walker, Commonwealth relations secretary, in the House of Commons last night denied a Labor backbencher's suggestion that the crisis in Korea would not have developed if the British Commonwealth had played the part it should in the Far East.

"I do not agree that the Commonwealth, through failure to act in various ways, was responsible for what has happened in Korea," Gordon-Walker declared.

Labor member Raymond Blackburn said that if the influence of the British Commonwealth had been more clearly expressed and British opinion had been made more effective in relation to Japan and Korea he did not believe the situation would have arisen.

Gordon-Walker retorted: "The way in which the entire Commonwealth has quickly and unanimously adopted the same policy towards Korea is a great example of the success of the present methods of Commonwealth consultation."

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American Gunners Knock Out Two Red Tanks—Seven Aircraft Are Destroyed By American Planes.

Tokyo, July 5.—(AP)—Tank-led North Korean infantry today pocketed an American infantry position south of Suwon.

That happened after the communist tanks apparently had been turned back in a duel with United States artillery.

It was the first combat in Korea for the Americans who were rushed into action to try to save the faltering South Koreans.

The action occurred some miles south of Suwon, which the Reds captured yesterday.

Gen. MacArthur announced British and American carrier planes made slashing attacks on communist targets Monday and Tuesday. Planes from the U.S. carrier Valley Forge and the British carrier Triumph struck Pyongyang, North Korean capital. They accounted for two Russian built Yak fighters in the air and strafed six more and two Li-2S on the ground.

All personnel from both carriers returned safely to their ships, MacArthur said, and heavy damage to Pyongyang air installations was reported.

The fate of the trapped Americans was not reported to U.S. advance headquarters in South Korea. That word came from Associated Press correspondent O. H. P. King.

Reports of the surprisingly quick Red manoeuvre came not long after the American commander in Korea, Maj.-Gen. William F. Dean, had gone to the front to try to learn details of the tank-artillery duel.

In that engagement, two tanks were reported knocked out and the other six retreated.

But the surviving tanks bypassed the artillery, then cut in between the forward gun positions and their supporting infantry.

An undisclosed number of South Korean troops also were trapped—between the tank-led Red infantry and their own defence lines.

A U.S. liaison plane said a Red force of undetermined size was moving southeast from Suwon.

Earlier, Gen. MacArthur's headquarters said American planes had destroyed seven and damaged four North Korean aircraft in the war which began 11 days ago.

American forces went into action against a North Korean force pressed to the south of captured Suwon. The Korean force spearhead was estimated at about 40,000 men.

The announcement of the ground action came from a spokesman at an advanced American base who said his information came from Korean sources.

Gen. MacArthur's communique announced the air victory. It listed seven Korean planes destroyed and four damaged.

MacArthur's headquarters estimated that the communists have between three and four divisions south of the Han river, the South Korean defence line until the Reds broke through. The Reds were involved in an enveloping action near the American positions.

MacArthur's communique reported that the Reds had lost, in addition to the seven destroyed planes, eight armored cars, 119 trucks, 22 locomotives, 18 box cars and seven tanks.

Warships accounted for six Red trawlers and five motor torpedo boats. Two other communist vessels were damaged.

A U.S. correspondent at an advanced American base, said the two tanks destroyed by American artillery were among eight engaged. He added in a dispatch that the withdrawal of South Korean forces from the Suwon area had been stopped.

If the Americans succeed in breaking up the communist spearhead, King said this may be the turning point of the Korean war which began 11 days ago.

No statement has been issued by MacArthur's headquarters on the ground fighting since the announcement that the Americans had gone into action.

Gen. MacArthur confirmed the fall of Suwon to the communists during the day.

His communique said the invaders were taking part in an "enveloping" movement against the Seoul-Inchon-Suwon triangle which embraces more than 200 square miles.

Tanks that smashed into Suwon yesterday rolled on southward as the Reds apparently sought to hit new defence lines before the Americans could bolster the South Korean forces.

A steady movement of American troops and supplies continued from Japan to South Korea. But it was a gray, rainy day. Aerial operations were sharply reduced this probably meant that fighters planes were unable to support front-line troops.

Wealth Of Northland Is Outlined

Edmonton, July 5.—(AP)—Resources Minister Winters said today that Canada's northern territory is "potentially one of the richest sections of the continent in terms of natural assets."

In a speech prepared for delivery to the Alberta and Northwest Chamber of Mines, Mr. Winters said that from the earliest times of production had been a mainstay of the northern economy. But the mining industry, more than any other, was responsible for the opening up and permanent settlement of Canada's 1,500,000 square miles of northland.

"There is no doubt that the basic long-term development of the north will depend on the continued discovery and use of mineral wealth," he said. "Drilling programs continue to multiply and the spirit of the men active in northern mining enterprises is definitely optimistic."

Besides the search for minerals, efforts now were being made to locate petroleum and natural gas near Fort Province and Big Island in the Northwest Territories.

"Should these efforts meet with success, the whole mining outlook in Canada's sub-arctic would be rapidly transformed," said Mr. Winters.

He received the assistance of the Federal government has given the north and said that this year \$2,400,000 is to be spent on road improvements in the Yukon.

Previously announced plans for a power project at Mexico call for the construction of a \$3,000,000 development to produce between 6,000 and 8,000 horsepower by 1952.

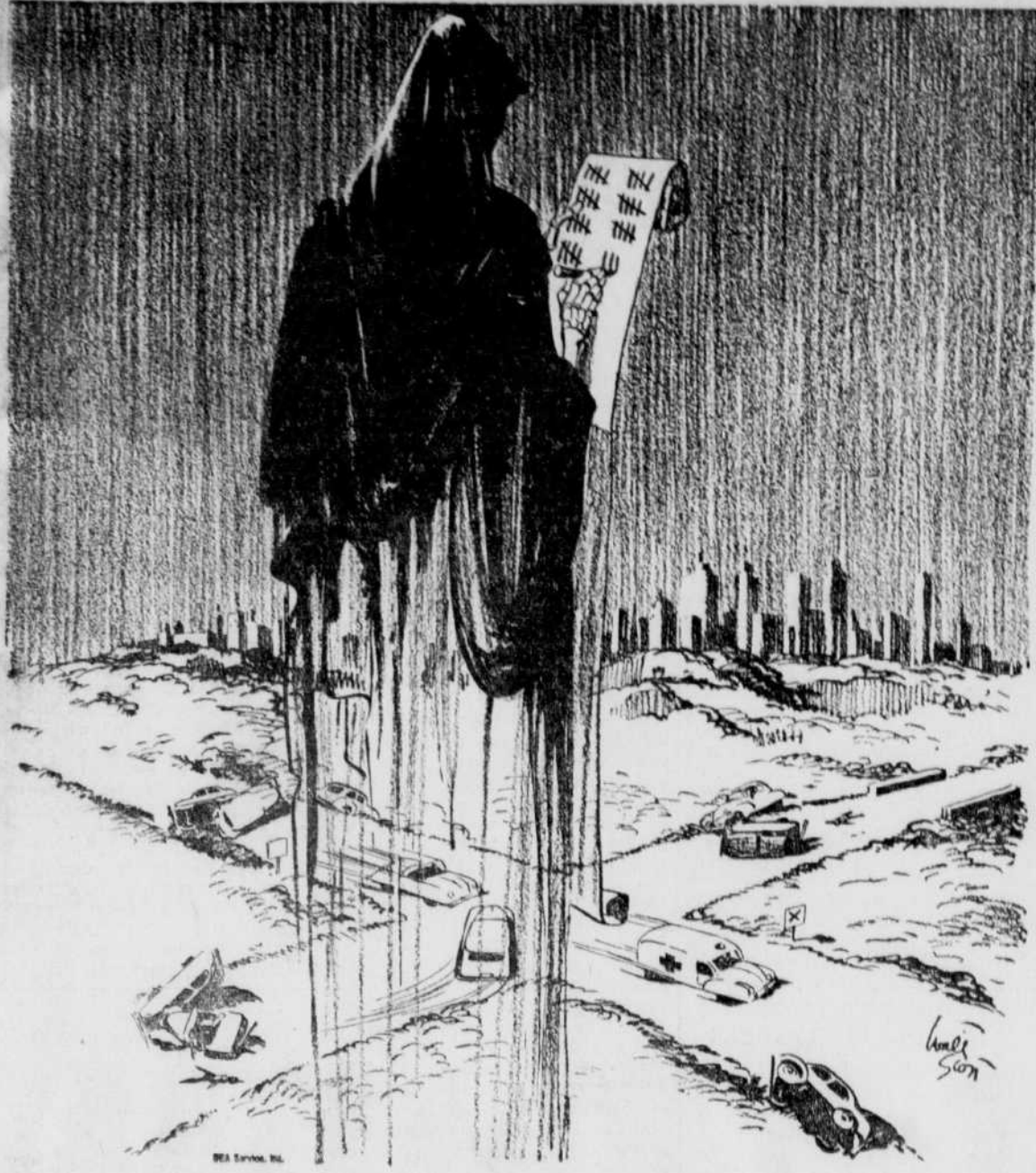

Chance Shot Kills Man At Ball Game

New York, July 5.—(AP)—A bullet aimed by chance or incredible marksmanship whipped through the Polo Grounds yesterday and struck one of 50,000 baseball fans dead in his grandstand seat.

Twelve hours later part of the 40 detectives working on the case found several empty .22-calibre shells on the roof of a nearby apartment building — and a 22 target pistol and two .22 rifles in an apartment one floor below.

They questioned a 14-year-old boy who lived in the room with his grandmother, but said he denied any connection with the holiday shooting.

The boy was booked on a charge of juvenile delinquency made in connection with possession of the guns and pistol. The grandmother, Mrs. Marie Bell, was charged with violation of the Sullivan (anti-weapon) law.

The victim was 54-year-old Bernard Lawrence Doyle, of Fairview, N.J., a former fight manager who launched James J. Braddock on the path to the world's heavyweight championship.

Doyle was sitting in an upper left-field stand with a 12-year-old neighbor boy, watching Brooklyn Dodgers' pre-game batting practice.

Chicago, July 5.—(AP)—Accidental death struck down at least 739 persons during the four-day Independence Day week-end in the United States. The toll was much higher than expected and rocketed toward the all-time high set in 1936 — 761 deaths.

Americans died in traffic crashes, by drowning and by miscellaneous accidents at a little better than one every 10 minutes during the 102-hour period between 6 p.m. local time Friday and last night at midnight.

Highway smashups claimed 458 lives.

Water deaths totalled 168. Miscellaneous mishaps killed 113.

No one was reported killed in Fourth-of-July fireworks tragedies, but the other deaths were tied in with Independence Day celebrations.

The National Safety Council had predicted that 385 would die in traffic crashes. But the toll mounted and mounted as holiday drivers coursed along the highways.

Mid-way through yesterday, as death figures kept piling up, Ned H. Dearborn, council president, issued a sane-driving appeal to "try our best to save at least a few lives by acting like civilized people on the highways."

Dearborn had predicted that 36,000,000 automobiles would roll 5,600,000,000 miles over U.S. roads. He classified it as the United States' biggest traffic jam.

The 1936 death record was set during the four-day Christmas holiday period. At that time 555 of the 761 deaths were in automobile accidents.

Winston Churchill Receives Medal

London, July 5.—(Reuters)—Winston Churchill last night added another medal to his rows of decorations — this one awarded for his contributions to military literature.

The award, the Chesney gold medal, is for authors of "an original literary work, treating of naval or military science and literature, and which has a bearing on the welfare of the British Empire." The medal has been awarded only 19 times since its inception.

Capt. A. T. Mahan of the United States Navy, was the first to receive the award in 1900.

Acknowledging the award, the Conservative leader said: "We have always to be careful these days, we politicians, if we take an interest in military matters lest we should be described for electing purposes as war-mongers."

East German Police Will Go To Korea

Berlin, July 5.—(AP)—Some members of east Germany's communist "people's police" are to be shipped to Korea, a young deserter from the force said yesterday.

His statement coincided with reports from Russian-zone political sources that east Germany is expanding the police force, declared by the western powers to be an illegal army, by about 15,000 men to nearly 100,000, and preparing to issue it new weapons.

The youth, 20, is one of more than 120 east-zone policemen who have sought asylum in the west since May 1. He asked that his name be withheld to protect relatives still in east Germany.

He said he was told secretly last week that he and 10 comrades were "to go into battle in Korea against the American imperialists." A group of 38 had previously left for an unannounced destination.

The youth reported that he joined the force as a private last year after a labor office gave him the choice of doing so or working in the Russian-operated uranium mines.

Record For Parachute Drops Broken

Fayetteville, N.C., July 5.—(AP)—Sgt. John W. Swetich made his 123rd jump at 11:15 last night and then called it a day after setting a world's record for the most consecutive parachute jumps.

Following his last jump at Sandrock airport near here, the 23-year-old veteran paratrooper from Dillon, Ont., said:

"That's enough. I've got the world's record and I better quit now. I almost broke my neck on that last jump because of the wind."

Swetich broke the world's record when he made his 107th jump. The previous record of 105 jumps was set by Juan Iriarte of Buenos Aires, May 10, 1950. Iriarte did it in seven hours and 23 minutes.

Swetich started at 2 a.m. He made the jumps in free falls from a Piper Cub plane, using a backpack type chute and an emergency chest pack.

He missed his goal of 150 jumps, but that didn't make any difference to the more than 10,000 persons crowded around the torch-lit drop area.

They hustled him off the field in fine hero-style, cheering and slapping him on the back.

Swetich, attached to the noted 82nd U.S. airborne division at nearby Fort Bragg, wore out five pilots.

Asked why he did it, he told reporters: "I wanted to keep the title in the U.S. I did it one time and I wanted to do it again."

The "one time" Swetich referred to was when he set a U.S. record of 60 jumps at Sioux City, Iowa, in 1946.

His only mishap came on his 50th jump when he suffered a slight knee injury.

It took, besides the five pilots, two Piper Cub airplanes, seven parachutes and six parachute riggers, going full blast, to keep Swetich going. Also one pack of crackers—that's all he ate from start to finish. He trained for six months to get in shape for the grueling effort.

What will he do next?

"I'd like to try for a record delay," Swetich said.

That's going up as high as possible, bailing out, then waiting until the last possible moment to pull the rip cord. He thinks the present record for a free fall of that type is about 40,000 feet.

Japanese Still Hold Island

Honolulu, July 5.—(AP)—Five years after the end of the war, 21 Japanese on a tiny mid-Pacific island are still holding out against American forces.

A United States navy communique yesterday said the island—Antanan in the northern Marianas—is so small and unimportant it won't risk sending a landing party to take it by force.

Holding the navy at bay two Japanese soldiers, five sailors and 14 fishermen. They man machine-guns concentrated around Antanan's harbor entrance.

The U.S. navy has tried everything short of war to get them out. Pamphlets and food have been dropped from planes. Boats circle the island broadcasting over loudspeakers that the second world war is over.

The Japanese are not convinced. The communique said the navy hopes the Japanese will "fire of their present existence and surrender."

Two Soldiers Drown During Filming Of Battle Scene

Quebec, July 5.—(AP)—Two members of the Royal 22nd Regiment parachute corps were drowned last night and two others were rescued in the filming of a battle scene of a film to be entitled "Quebec."

Names of the victims was withheld by the army pending notification of next-of-kin but it was learned that they were not residents of Quebec city.

The drownings occurred at the height of a battle scene on the St. Lawrence river near Brown's wharf on the city's water-front.

Thirty men, all members of the Royal 22nd Regiment and most of them members of the Regiment's parachute corps, participated.

They were distributed in nine large canoes and were simulating an attack. The men were dressed in multi-colored costumes of early "voyageurs Canadiens" and carried ancient muskets made of rubber.

They were paddling in an area in which explosive charges set just underneath the water's surface were to explode.

One of the participants in the mock attack told The Canadian Press that all but one canoe either

filled with water or tipped, spilling its men in the river when the explosive charges blew up. One canoe was directly over a charge.

The eyewitness related about 75 persons, including army officers, were watching at the time. Some of the onlookers leaped into the river when they realized what was happening.

One of the men who jumped into the river to rescue the men in the water was an official of the filming company, Lemay-Templeton of Hollywood, an affiliate of Paramount studios.

One of the bodies was recovered early today. The body of the other parachutist was found hours later by dragging crews.

Filming continued on the site of the tragedy after order was restored.

The film is said to be based on the 1837 rebellion in Quebec province.

No statement could be obtained from the filming company on last night's tragedy.

Army personnel have been taking part in many of the scenes which have been filmed in the city, on the Island of Orleans and on the Plains of Abraham where battle scenes were re-created.

Police Finally Catch Up With Italian Bandit King

Palermo, Italy, July 5.—(AP)—Police shot and killed Sicily's notorious bandit king, Salvatore Giuliano, in his mountain hideout shortly before dawn today.

Officials said the outlaw leader, who had defied and eluded the law since 1943, was trapped and slain in the Castelvetrano area near here, long his favorite hide-out.

Apparently he was surprised in the house where he was hiding with members of his gang.

Police cut him down with sub-machine-gun fire in the courtyard of the home. His comrades escaped.

The police who finally got him were part of a special force of 2,000 carabinieri man-hunters who had been closing a dragnet on him for eight months.

In that time most of his band had been wiped out. A dozen or more are on trial and nearly that many have been killed in fights with police.

Giuliano and his men have been accused of killing nearly 100 police in battles with the carabinieri

and local police forces trying to track him down and halt his reign of robberies and kidnappings.

He once proclaimed the "free state of Sicily" and challenged government leaders in Rome to determine who should rule Italy.

The government replied by sending in police reinforcements to hunt him down.

The husky, handsome Giuliano tangled first with the law Sept. 3, 1943, when he shot down a policeman trying to arrest him for black marketing wheat. After that he carved out a career of murder, banditry and extortion unrivaled in recent years.

Giuliano and a small group of his followers were surprised by the police today. The bandit king was shot down in the brief battle which followed, but his band escaped. There were no police casualties.

The operation was personally led by Col. Ugo Luca, who was sent to Sicily last August at the head of a commando police force of 2,000 to wipe out the outlaw leader and his gang.

Canadian Golf Open To Draw Star-Studded Field Next Month; Top American Pros To Compete

With Canada's top-ranking golf tournament, the Canadian Open, still almost two months away, Royal Canadian Golf Association officials are predicting that a star-studded field of entries from the United States will be in Montreal come August to vie with Canadian hopefuls for the Seagram Golf Cup and the lion's share of \$10,800 in prize money. Specifically, they have high hopes that the entry list will contain the names of at least two of the three players who took an extra playoff round in the recent U.S. Open at Marion, Pa.

One big reason for the official optimism is the fact that this year the Canadian Open is on the schedule of top-ranking tournaments for which points will be given for places on the U.S. Ryder Cup team. In addition, scores posted in the Canadian event will be counted for the Vardon Trophy — awarded annually to the U.S. pro with the lowest average over the tourna-

ment year. That makes the 1950 Canadian Open — scheduled for August 24-27 at Royal Montreal Golf Club — virtually a "must" for most of the cream of the U.S. circuit.

Getting back to the recent U.S. Open, that major event was won by little Ben Hogan, the comeback boy of Golf, after a playoff with Lloyd Mangrum and George Fazio. Canadian officials aren't too hopeful that Hogan will be on hand because Hogan is spacing out his tournament play pretty carefully following the automobile accident that almost ended his playing.

Mangrum, one of the top money men of golf in recent years, took in the Canadian Open at Montreal Beaconsfield right after winning the U.S. Open five years ago, and he has been turning up pretty regularly in the Canadian event ever since. Fazio, who won the Seagram Gold Cup at that same Beaconsfield tournament, hasn't missed a crack at the Canadian title since. And both of them are very much in the running for Ryder Cup recognition.

At the present time, Slamming Sammy Sneed of White Sulphur Springs is far out in front in Ryder Cup points — so far ahead that he might pass up a few tournaments from here on out. Whether the Canadian event is one of those passed up is a matter of conjecture, but there is no conjecture about the fact that many of his competitors will be eager for the chance to add to their point total at Royal Montreal.

They include Dutch Harrison, who shot an amazing 17-under-par 271 to take the Canadian title last year at Toronto, Jimmy Demaret of Ojai, Calif., Jack Burke Jr., of White Plains, N.Y., who is now third among the Ryder Cup rankings, Henry Ransom of St. Andrews, Ill., who is fifth, Skip Alexander of Knoxville, Tenn., who never missed a Canadian Open, and Johnny Palmer of Badin, N.C. The Ryder Cup team is made up of the eight top U.S. professionals, plus two spares, each year.

HOW TO PLAY IN A TOURNAMENT

"We have had many friendly arguments," writes a San Francisco reader, "about the best way to play in a Canasta tournament. Some say that you must play defensively to prevent your opponents from running up a big score. Some say that you play your regular game, just as though it wasn't a tournament. Others say that you must play aggressively, in the hope of piling up a big score. Who is right?"

Perhaps I'd better start by explaining how tournaments are usually conducted. Then my answer will be clearer.

In a tournament, you play against a different pair of opponents every half hour. When you finish at each table, both pairs must agree on the score. The lower score is subtracted from the higher score. The difference is carried forward as a plus score by the winning pair and as a minus score by the losing pair.

For example, suppose the Smiths score 3200 points while the Browns score 4800 points. The difference is 1600 points. The Browns are given credit for plus 1600. The Smiths have a score of minus 1600.

It's important to notice that the Smiths don't get any credit at all for their 3200 points. A high score doesn't mean a thing if your opponents have even a higher score.

At the end of the tournament (usually above five half-hour rounds), you add up all the scores that you made against the various opponents. For example, you might have minus 1200 on one round; plus 1100 on the second round; plus 2500 on the third round; plus 800 on the fourth round; and minus 200 on the fifth round. The sum of all this would be plus 3000.

A final score of plus 3000 probably wouldn't win a large tournament. Some other pair would probably have four or five good scores and come in with a score of more than 500 points. You can sometimes lose one round and still get the highest score for the session, but you can't afford to lose more than one round. There's no rule about this, of course, but that's the probabilities.

This helps us decide on a winning line of play. In general, you must play aggressively in the hope of piling up a big score. At the same time, you must try to keep the opponents from scoring too much. It will do you no good to let them score as much as you do.

During the first rounds, you should take any reasonable risk in the attempt to get more points than the opponents. You can well afford to take somewhat bigger risks than you would in an ordinary game. In a tournament, it's a case of all or nothing.

During the last two rounds, you must let your score dictate your tactics. You act to protect a big score. Nurse it along against a big loss. Play somewhat conservatively.

If you have only a mediocre score, you go all out during the last two rounds. It will do you no good to add a measly hundred points or so. You must get a couple of thousand to have any chance.

If you have a really poor score, just relax during the last two rounds. You aren't going to win, so you might as well have a good time. However, don't play so foolishly that you let your opponents run up big scores. That may let those opponents walk away with the tournament just because you weren't playing seriously.

BOYER ISN'T TAKING THE RAP FOR 'ARCH OF TRIUMPH' FLOP

Hollywood — Charles Boyer isn't taking the blame for the peculiar order of a \$4,000,000 omelet known as "The Arch of Triumph."

The star has sniffed the surrender-you-fool perfume of screen sirens so often that he reacts with all the snap of Lassie to one false whiff from the chicken yard.

But there are no stains from the eggs laid at the box office by "Arch" on the hands that have lovingly cupped the expensive faces of so many movie queens.

"I won't take the rap," he told me on the set of "The First Legion," his first picture since 1947's "A Woman's Vengeance."

The Attar of "Whew," Boyer wants it known, came strictly from the room where they stack the greenbacks that go into high-budget epics.

"Why," protested the heart-flutterer, "should I take the blame for a picture that lost at the box office because it cost \$3,000,000 too much? It was the 'storia' of two people. The producers got it confused with 'Ben Hur,' I think."

A lot of Hollywoodites, he confesses, gave him the look that small boys who've been near skunks generally get after the picture was released.

"When you're associated with a flop, it always hurts you in pictures. The same thing was true with Ingrid. She, too, suffered from it."

No Reflection

As far as Boyer knows, nobody tossed dripping tomatoes at his enlarged screen image in the Enterprise smeller—"I got the best notices of my career," he said proudly—and no studio chieftains sketched skulls and cross-bones after his name on the roster of Screen Actors Guild.

The Boyer telephone went right

on ringing. He beamed:

"I turned down more things than I could eat."

"The Arch of Triumph" was No. 3 in the star's Hollywood gripe sheet, carefully annotated since he swung from a big part with Jean Harlow in "Red Headed Woman."

"Then I could hardly speak 10 words of English" to full five-pointed stardom.

Each time, Boyer generated the kind of anger that could fry crepes suzettes.

The first was when Fox put the curling irons to his locks and gave him Shirley Temple ringlets in a picture with Loretta Young tagged "Caravan."

"The whole picture I was playing fiddles," he said. "I packed. I was ready to go back to France for good."

He still burns, but with a philosophical slow simmer, at the jokesters who keep running "Come,

weeth me to de Casoa, 'Edy," with built-in falling plaster, thank you, and no lover-boy roles that ought to be played by Peter Lawford or Roddy McDowall, either.

He says:

"I want to do the type of love storee befitting a man of my age."

There's a gorgeous new dish named Barbara Rush in "The First Legion" but he doesn't once beam his voice into her chambered ears.

He plays a Jesuit priest in the picture.

Whenever the still photographer comes around, Boyer ducks away from Barbara. He says he had enough of the forbidden love stuff as Marlene Dietrich's eager plaything in "The Garden of Allah," and he doesn't want moviegoers pausing before posters showing him with Barbara and going "Hmmm."

Bubbling on Boyer's cinematic stove now are a production of Albert Camus' "The Plague"—the author killed MGM's plan to do it with Spencer Tracy, and a screen biography of Clemenceau, the French statesman.

Boyer grinned:

"I can afford to lose a few more hair in the picture. You see, Clemenceau was completely bald."

"I assure you," he shrugged, "that I do the best I can."

Stays In Bounds

Right now Boyer is thrusting the memory of pin curls, Casbah jokes and his only movie flop behind him. He doesn't even wince in shoe stores when loose-talking salesmen toss around gab about fallen arches.

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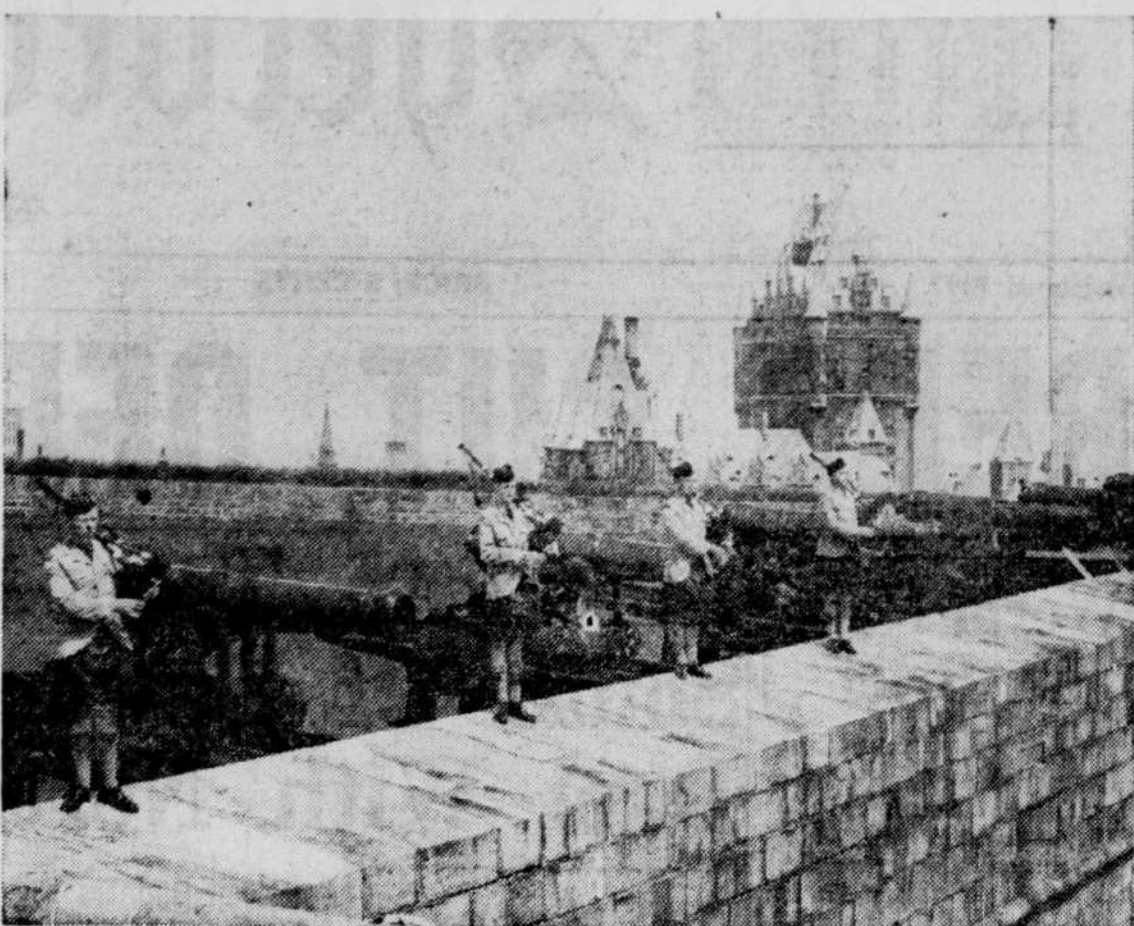

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Russia Could Be Curbed By Depriving Her Of Oil Resources, Rotarians Told

Depriving Russia of oil resources outside her own boundaries by negotiating with the United Nations is a means of checking the Soviet lust for world power, in the opinion of Milton Brown, of Willoughby Lake, Vt., a member of the St. Johnsbury Rotary Club.

Addressing the local Rotarians here yesterday, Mr. Brown delivered a stirring speech entitled "What Price Communism?" and his words went deeper into the minds of his listeners because of the fact that he lived in Russia for a number of years and therefore spoke from first-hand information.

Besides residing in Russia, Turkey and the Balkan States, he was liaison officer between the Russians and the American admirals.

in-charge. He had charge of 20,000 Armenian refugee children and later of all orphanages under the jurisdiction of the Near East relief.

He believes that Russia will require large quantities of oil outside her own boundaries if she is to carry on any kind of a lengthy warfare and that therefore external resources should be watched and eventually controlled by nations who have signed the Atlantic Pact. "We must safeguard the world's oil supply and quickly," he said.

Should Russia succeed in Korea she will then turn to Turkey, Iran, Iraq and finally to Saudi Arabia, there to snatch the biggest oil catch of the Middle East.

"Communism," he said, "is a social, political and economic creed which permits a single political party to control not only the government but the assets of the country, the lives and very thoughts of the people. It eliminates all morals, decreeing that whatever is necessary is right, while a few self-aggrandizing despots in the Kremlin decide what is necessary."

He stressed the importance of knowing about communism, of teaching its dangers in the schools, referring to a statement made by General Eisenhower to the effect that "ignorance of communism is far more dangerous than ignorance of the most virulent disease, and the truth about it is an indispensable requirement."

"Compromise is wholly against the Kremlin policies," Mr. Brown continued, "members of the Soviet do not sit down to confer, they either get their way or they walk out."

The Soviet government wants to impose its dictates on the whole world and Stalin goes so far as to say that "The Communist party of the United States must be armed to head the forthcoming class war."

"Believing that we are headed for an economic collapse," the speaker said, "grossly misled Rus-

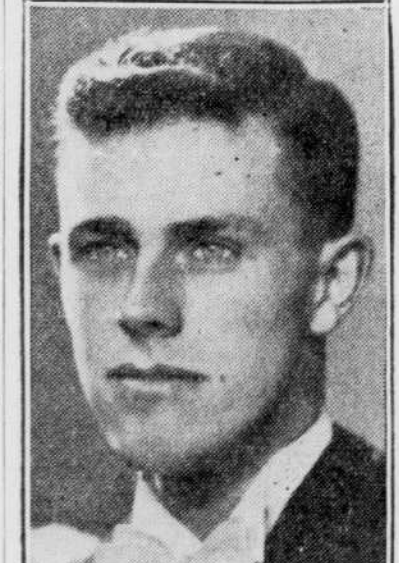

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STILL PLAYING POLITICS

The French Socialists have caused the downfall of the Queuille Government, just as they forced the overthrow of Georges Bidault's cabinet. They refused their co-operation with the latest Government and withdrew their support from its predecessor. Their action could hardly have come at a worse time.

On the one hand Korea is aflame with war and the western nations must take important decisions to combat Russian aggression there. On the other hand, the six nation parleys on the French-sponsored plan for a pool of Europe's coal and steel resources are just warming up.

No doubt the French are long since weary at being lectured by outsiders on how to conduct their affairs, but they have to take enough of it as a necessary accompaniment of the economic and military aid they get from other members of the United Nations.

But apparently the facts of life in 1950 just will not sink in over there. In bygone days the world looked with amusement upon the frequent flip-flops of French premiers. It was something like the regular Monday morning revolution in a South American country.

There is no humor in this sort of performance in today's troubled world; nor is their evidence of political maturity in it. The French still seem to think they are playing some kind of child's game—musical chairs with the Premier's seat the prize.

Any seasoned politician in any free nation ought to know that the great conflict raging with the Soviet Union—the Cold War—cannot be won unless a solid front is maintained continuously. And solidity demands stability.

Stable government is a circumstance France has seldom enjoyed. But it is one she had best set about achieving soon if she wants to be taken seriously in the 1950 world. There is no room in this grim age for three to six months, or two-day, flyers in government. Who can count on the word of a Premier who may be stripped away tomorrow.

Apparently the mercurial French are not going to be herded into a few large parties each of which might be capable of governing France alone. Instead they are sticking to their old habit of splitting off into many parties, none strong enough to rule and some so small their membership would hardly fill a single hall.

Perhaps therefore the French should adopt a constitutional limitation on the frequency with which governments may be overthrown. It might be provided, for example, that any premier could not be ousted within less than a year of his taking office.

The penalty for failure to achieve a substantial measure of political stability could well be the shutting of France to the minor councils of international action. The French may not have many more chances to prove they deserve a bigger role.

INDIA GIVES SUPPORT

The decision of the Government of India to support the United Nations resolution on Korea is extremely gratifying to the anti-Communist world for a number of reasons.

The first is that India's action supplies the seventh vote necessary for action in the Security Council even if the vote of Nationalist China, challenged by Soviet Russia, were not counted.

Another important factor is that India is in a particularly difficult position with reference to Communist imperialism, so much so that a policy approximating neutrality would naturally look very attractive to the Reds. Prime Minister Nehru has been anti-Communist at home, but has let Asiatic anticolonialism keep him, until now, from embracing a western attitude towards the dangers in Russian efforts at world revolution.

Hence his pronouncement carries great and encouraging weight, especially as it represents the most populous self-governing country outside the Communist orbit in Asia.

NO WORD OF DUTY

Many Canadians who have been following the recruiting "campaign" of the Royal Canadian Air Force will be inclined to agree with the Calgary Herald that the whole approach to the problem leaves something to be desired.

The emphasis has been on glamor and on the outlook for a successful and profitable career in uniform. The posters dwell on the thrills of flying Vampires, on the high rates of pay and the length of annual leave and the perquisites that go with membership in the service. They never mention uncomfortable words like "duty."

The RCAF's recruiting service, obviously, has decided that words like duty are best kept in the background until the recruit's name is safely on the dotted line, and that Canada's youth has become so decadent that it cannot be expected to respond to any appeal to its patriotism or its sense of responsibility.

But why, then, is it that the RCAF had practically no recruiting problem at all during the war, when every aircrew recruit knew that he had a fair chance of being killed in action, and could hope for nothing better than a life of considerable discomfort thousands of miles from home?

THREE MINUTES AND THEY'RE GONE

Patients who visit the offices of clinics of New Jersey medical practitioners are to be given a visual demonstration of what can happen with respect to consultations should socialized medicine be introduced into the state. A bright member of the profession hit on the idea of placing a three-minute egg-timer on the desk in every consulting room. When the patient is seated the doctor turns the egg-timer and the fine sand begins to sift downwards. Simultaneously the doctor will look over the top of his glasses and inquire the reason for the consultation. The preliminaries will be about half over when the sand has run out of the glass. At this point the doctor will interrupt the patient, point to the egg-timer and inform the patient that if he, or she, had been in the United Kingdom and consulting a doctor, or if there were socialized medicine in New Jersey, the interview would be over.

The New Jersey doctors hope, through this egg-timer technique to persuade their patients that they do not want socialized medicine. The idea stems from the frequent assertions that the doctors in the British Isles can only spare three minutes when a patient consults them. Although an egg-timer is used because it is a graphic method to bring the point home to the patient, the medical men are not likely to go into the technicalities of the boiling point of various liquids, and that as the altitude increases, the boiling point decreases, and that you can get a soft-boiled egg in water of 200 degrees at an altitude of 7,400 feet. It takes the sand the same space of time three minutes, to pass from the upper part of the timer to the lower section, and the doctors are taking the chance that the normal patients will want to be at least a three-and-a-half minute egg; some of them may even want to be hard boiled and sit around and chat.

The British have again reversed the flow of aid in the face of tragedy and want, by making great contributions to the assistance of those who suffered in the Manitoba flood and the Cabano and Rimouski fires.

Side by side with the efforts undertaken officially by the United Kingdom authorities for the victims of fire and flood ravaged Rimouski, Cabano and Manitoba, has come a flood of gifts and offers from individuals and organizations in Britain.

Outstanding among these has been the collection by Britain's Women's Voluntary Services, under the direction of the Dowager Marchioness of Reading, D.B.E., of 1,000 pieces of valuable silver.

Women all over the country have been handing over to the Marchioness their most prized and valued silver, copper, pewter and brass, as a gesture to the families who have lost their homes in Canadian disasters, and in grateful memory of the assistance Canadians have given the British during food and clothing shortages in past years.

The gifts range from extremely valuable silver given by well known public figures in Britain, to small, but treasured possessions of humble families. The precise method by which they are to be distributed is still under discussion.

In addition, gifts of cheques, money, clothing, blankets, curtains and other household necessities, have been sent in large numbers by business firms, and private individuals.

CANADA ON THE SIDELINES

Toronto Globe and Mail
Canadians today must feel frustrated and disappointed by Ottawa's performance in the Korean affair. Neither ministers nor members distinguished themselves. The government in fine phrases declared Canada's willingness to help, and announced that three destroyers now in the Pacific will proceed to Pearl Harbor within the next week. The House of Commons, glad to let it go at that, prorogued without finding out what, if anything, this country is going to do to fulfill its obligation as a member of the United Nations.

To consider this display of lukewarm indifference by MP's, is it not extraordinary that they could be persuaded to go home while the present international crisis lasts? One might have supposed that, out of sheer curiosity, if for no more serious reason, they would wish to stay in the capital where they could at least watch, if not influence, developments. But no, they are content with a promise that they will be called back if the position becomes really tense.

As for the government's statements, they are in character and typical. They follow exactly the pattern of Canada's attitude to the Berlin airlift. Ottawa thought the airlift was a fine show, even sent an observer to watch it, "seriously considered" taking part, but somehow never did. Canada wasn't asked—that was the official explanation.

SOVIET HYPOCRISY

Montreal Daily Star
Russia's protests about the illegality of the Security Council resolution can be dismissed with one printable word: Bosh.

The hypocrisy of the Soviet attitude is patent. Nobody, except perhaps the Russian people who hear only what the Kremlin chooses to tell them, believes for a moment that South Korea is the aggressor. Action, timing—everything—point to a long and carefully planned attack by North Korea. Russians are the master minds behind this adventure and because it has back-fired they are now, with their customary gracelessness, trying to escape blame. They fool nobody, least of all the North Koreans, who now learn what it means to trust the Soviet.

If Russia is so convinced about the justice of the North Korean cause, why does she not move in to help? For the very good reason that she can't risk the showdown she seemed to be inviting. A prod here, a prod there; a test of western firmness here, another there. These, yes; but no direct action when the chips are down. Only a sheltering behind diplomatic verbiage and hypocritical protestation.

Attempt Will Be Made To Teach Western World About Buddhism

Colombo, Ceylon, July 5.—(Reuters)—Religious missionaries are to come to the western world from the east, under a scheme designed to spread the teachings of the lord Buddha in western as well as Asian countries.

Representatives from 29 countries, excluding Russia, who met here recently have formed a world fellowship of Buddhists to carry out the campaign.

The fellowship hopes to get into touch with Buddhists in Russia and bring them, too, into the organization.

Delegates from Britain, the United States, France, Germany, Finland, Czechoslovakia, Italy, Hawaii, Australia, Pakistan, Nepal, Bhutan, Mongolia, Tibet, India, Burma, Malaya, Laos, Cambodia, China and Japan were among the 127 men and women who met as guests of the all-Ceylon Buddhist congress to draw up a constitution for the fellowship.

The preamble to the constitution drawn up by the conference

states the aims of the fellowship as "to establish in unity and strength the world fellowship of Buddhists," "to endeavor to observe and practise the teachings of the Buddha so that we may be radiant example of living faith and to strive with all our might to make known the sublime doctrine of the Buddha so that its benign spirit of service and sacrifice may pervade the entire world inspiring and influencing the peoples of the earth and their governments to lead the Buddhist way of life."

The headquarters of the fellowship will be at Colombo, and a secretariat will be provided by the all-Ceylon Buddhist congress. Regional centres will be established in as many countries as possible. Expenses will be defrayed by voluntary contributions.

The fellowship adopted an emblem—the Dharma Chakra (wheel of law) which is the Indian National emblem.

Dr. G. P. Malalasekera, a prominent Buddhist of Ceylon, told the conference that when United States officials were laying out the graves of war dead in Hawaii they pointed out to the Buddhists that a cross had been erected over the graves of Christians, a star over the graves of Jews and a crescent over the graves of Moslems. What symbol, they asked, should they place over the graves of Buddhists?

Unfortunately, said Dr. Malalasekera, "there was none."

The absence of an emblem has now been met. The Dharma Chakra, an eight-spoked wheel, is an ancient Buddhist symbol.

The fellowship will appeal to all Buddhist countries to observe a special Buddhist Day every year. At present, most Asian countries observe different feast days. These will be continued; but it is hoped that the first full-moon day in May of every year will become a world Buddhist feast similar to Christmas or Easter in the Christian calendar.

Jacoby On Bridge

By OSWALD JACOBY

SLAM DOUBLE HELPS Foe IN PLAY OF HAND

When expert opponents have bid a slam of their own free will, you are not likely to get rich by doubling them. There are exceptions to this rule. Occasionally you have an absolutely sure setting trick; and you are also sure that the enemy cannot escape to some safer slam contract. Sometimes, if your partner is to make the opening lead, you may double to ask for an unusual lead.

However, slam doubles in general are a losing proposition. It is especially bad to double a slam merely on prospects. "Possible" tricks have a way of vanishing, especially when you put the opponents on guard by doubling.

The grand slam shown today was too ambitious a contract. The culprit was not South, who bid the slam, but North. The jump to two hearts was too flimsy, for North should have had a better fit for clubs or a stronger heart suit.

South found out that his partner had three aces. His bid of four no trump, the Blackwood Convention, asked for aces; and the reply of five spades showed three aces. Now South thought it reasonable to count four spades, four diamonds, two hearts and one club. If North had the king of clubs, that suit would provide two additional tricks. If North lacked the king of clubs, he should have a very strong heart suit, which would then provide the needed tricks.

West knew that something had slipped. He knew that the hearts would produce only three tricks for declarer; and the clubs in his hand looked like good insurance against that suit. It looked to him as though declarer could make four spades, four diamonds, three hearts, and only one club.

West's reasoning was excellent up to this point. Nevertheless, his doubling was a very bad idea since it told declarer how to make thirteen tricks out of twelve.

West opened the eight of spades, and declarer won in his own hand with the king. South cashed the king of hearts, took his four diamond tricks, discarding a low heart from the dummy, and then ran the spades.

By this time West was in great trouble. He could save only four cards. Three of those cards had to be hearts to prevent dummy's eight of hearts from becoming established. West therefore had to blank his king of clubs in the hope that declarer would take a finesse anyhow or that his partner had the queen of clubs.

South next cashed the ace and queen of hearts, discarding clubs from his own hand. He then had to win two club tricks to make his slam.

If West had not doubled, South might have taken the club finesse. However, the double practically located the king of clubs and South's only hope was that West had been squeezed on the spades and diamonds.

Declarer therefore led the club from dummy and played the ace from his own hand. Since this dropped the king from the West hand, declarer made his grand slam contract.

West's double would have gained 100 points if it had been successful. Since the double told declarer how to play the hand, it enabled South to win over 2000 points. It was a very poor idea for West to give up more than 2000 points in the attempt to win an extra 100 points for himself.

follows a tragically wrong and frightfully dangerous policy and when she wakes up anything can happen, for it has been said that the Iron Curtain casts its darkest shadow on those who designed it and put it into place."

He pointed out that newspapermen or other visitors to Russia may return with a favorable impression of the country's government only because they are shown precisely what the Kremlin wants them to see and no more.

"The Soviet mind cannot under-

stand anything as kind and decent as philanthropy," he added. "For them there is always an ulterior motive."

The policy of the Soviet is to let the old people die, thus relieving the housing shortage and yet they aim verbal bombs at the United States saying that it discriminates against Negroes and other minority groups while Russia only wants equal rights given to all.

He foresees that a Russian victory in Korea would be the signal for the Soviet troops to move into every weak spot in Asia, and that constant appeasement in the Pacific would surely result in conflict,

with the most calamitous results. In conclusion Mr. Brown quoted Dave Boon famous columnist, as follows: "The Politburo, as usual, says that everybody is out of step but Joe Stalin. According to the Kremlin, Wall Street has invaded Korea, the U.N. is out to lick the world, Harry Truman is Attila in a white linen suit, the American people want Asia so they can break it up into golf courses for the rich, and there stands big, hearty, gentle Russia, holding firmly for peace and brotherly love — even if she has to kill everybody else to get it."

G. Marcoux was in charge. Mr. Marcoux is connected with the Quebec Department of Agriculture and his work is with the juniors.

Agronomes who accompanied the contestants and aided in the selection of winners were J. Proulx, also connected with the agricultural department in Quebec, Jean Martin, Sherbrooke agronomist, E. St. Denis, Granby, D. Salvas, Richmond, A. Lambert, Sherbrooke, R. Scott, Cookshire, G. Martineau, Richmond, N. Dery, Coaticook, Prof. Hamilton, Macdonald College, G. Lalonde, Lennoxville, and D. McMillan, Lennoxville and Sherbrooke. Also assisting in the supervision were J. A. Ste. Marie, superintendent of the Experimental Farm, A. Morin, representative of the Canadian Council of Packers, and W. J. MacDonnell, chief agronomist in Sherbrooke.

In a noon-time address to competitors Mr. Ste. Marie welcomed the group and said that the basis of all agricultural development is pasture. By improving pastures from year to year, he said, we can best assure ourselves of improved production in quantity and quality and lower the cost of farming in general.

"Today agriculture must be diversified. In the old days a man would keep cattle and that's all, or another poultry, or another sheep," he told the group that nowadays we realize it is better not to keep all our eggs in one basket, and that it is best to have some of each. "To have it all worked out we have to assure good pasture," he concluded.

The picnic took place amidst the neatly kept lawns and gardens of the farm, tended by M. Matton, horticultural instructor. The dairy teams of young judges were requested to place animals in the various classes composed of four jerseys each, either full grown cows or young heifers, which were paraded before them. They were then asked to answer four questions put to them by four different agronomes.

The questions were to be answered orally and the competitors were to state briefly: The importance of drainage, why lime is used in the soil, the importance of pasture, and the importance of good breeding. Answers to these had a sequence for they all dealt either directly or indirectly with good animal breeding.

Calf Clubs all over the Eastern Townships are composed of boys and girls, both French and English, from the ages of 12 to 21. There is a junior and a senior group within each of these, the former composed of youngsters below 16.

The initial membership fee is only a dollar, but each member must own a calf and care for it until the exhibition. Meetings are held regularly, even if they only consist of a ball game to keep the interest up. They allow the boys and girls to get together and show them the importance of good and careful cattle breeding.

Death Claims William Birks In Montreal

Montreal, July 5.—William Massey Birks, Montreal merchant and philanthropist who was decorated by seven nations, died here last night. He was 81.

He died at his home where he had been in failing health. At the time of his death he was chairman of the board of directors of Henry Birks and Sons, Limited, the firm of jewelers and silversmiths for whose expansion he was largely responsible.

From 1885 when he entered the store founded in Montreal by his father, Henry Birks, he saw the business expand until an 18th Canadian branch now is being organized.

In recent years he was known abroad for his work as chairman of the Canadian United Allied Relief Organization. Only two years ago he undertook a 15,000-mile flying trip to Europe at the Canadian government's request to survey what the organization had accomplished in war-torn countries.

In recognition of his work, he was appointed a Commander of the Order of the British Empire. Denmark appointed him Commander of the Order of Dannebrog. King Paul of Greece made him a Commander of the Order of the Phoenix. He was awarded Norway's Victory Cross of Liberation, Poland's Polonia Restituta, Yugoslavia's Grand Cross of Saint Sava and the Netherlands made him a Commander of Orange Nassau.

Mr. Birks was president of the jewelry firm from 1928 until 1938 when he was elected chairman of the board. He was also a director of the Sun Life Assurance Company of Canada, the National Trust Company and the Bank of Nova Scotia.

When the Canadian Chamber of Commerce was formed in 1925 he was made chairman of the executive. Three years later he was elected president.

He was interested in world affairs and was vice-chairman of the Canadian delegation to the Institute of Pacific Relations Conference at Kyoto, Japan, in 1929. He again represented Canada at Shanghai in 1931 and at the Banff conference in 1933. Altogether he made 120 trips across the Atlantic.

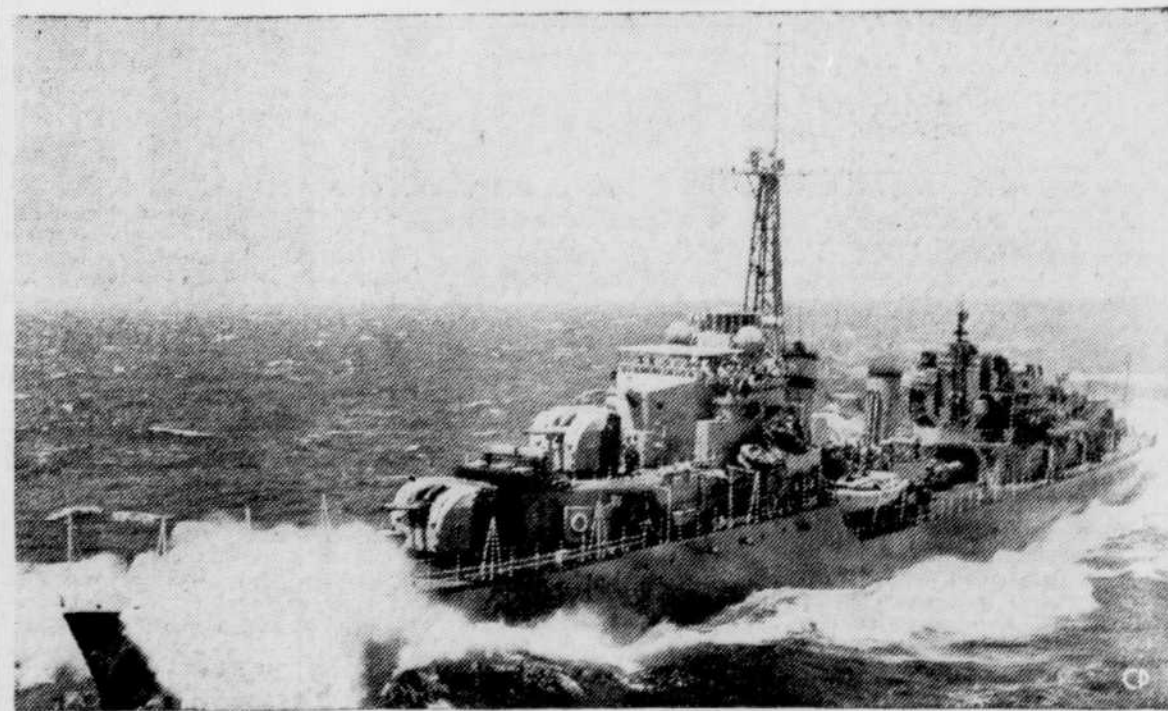

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The Doctor Says

TINY LIVING BODIES CAUSE CURIOUS RICKETTSIAL DISEASES

By Edwin P. Jordan, M.D.

Q Fever, Marseille fever, and rickettsialpox are diseases which few people have heard much about. Typhus or jail fever, Rocky Mountain spotted fever and Tsutsugamushi disease (the scrub typhus of the war) have attracted more attention. All of the diseases are caused by tiny living bodies known as Rickettsias.

Several of them, particularly Q fever and rickettsialpox, are rather new diseases and as yet have not caused much trouble though one can never be certain that they will not do so in the future.

One of the most curious of these rickettsial diseases is rickettsialpox, which was reported from New York City three or four years ago. This disease starts suddenly with chills, fever, sweats and backache. In a day or two a rash comes out. About a week before the chills and fever, a small, round, firm, reddish spot shows up on the skin.

In most cases the rash lasts between four to seven days; in the more severe cases as long as 10 days. All of the patients so far

seen have recovered without complications. Rickettsias have been found in the blood of patients with rickettsialpox. They have been found also in a louse-like parasite living on mice caught in the neighborhood where many of the patients lived. The obvious conclusion is that the infecting organisms oc-

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curred in mice, were picked up by
the mouse parasites and the para-
sites carried the rickettsias to hu-

Spotted Fevers
Another important group of
diseases caused by rickettsias are
the spotted fevers of which Rocky
Mountain spotted fever is the best
known example in this country.
This disease is carried by at least
two different kinds of ticks, the
wood tick being most common in
the western states and the dog
tick in the Atlantic region.

Reasonably good vaccines to
prevent Rocky Mountain spotted
fever have been prepared. Those
who live in or travel in areas when
this disease is prevalent should be
vaccinated.

A chemical compound called
para-aminobenzoic acid seems prom-
ising in the treatment of at least
some of the diseases in this group.
Fortunately both aureomycin and
chloramphenicol also seem to give
favorable results in treatment.

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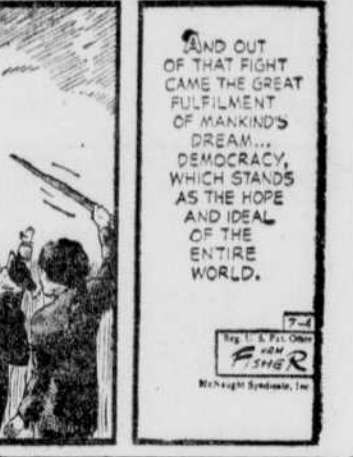
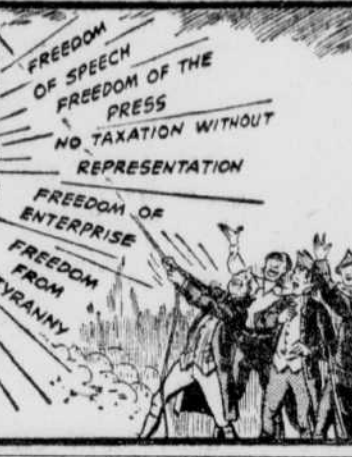
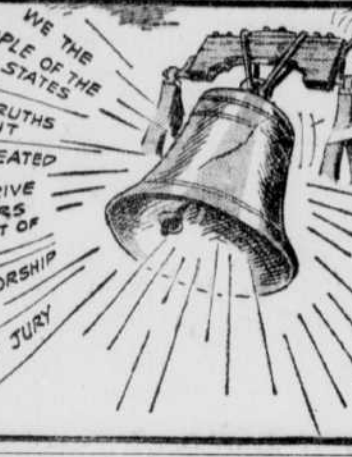
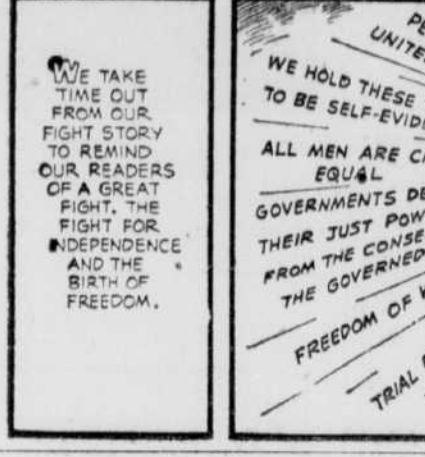
