### TRINIDAD.

We have been politely favored with TRINIDAD papers the 23d June last. This Island it appears has at least three newspapers, two of them semi-weekly, the other, the *Trinidad Guardian*, daily, and both in English and French.

The EDITORIAL article of the *Trinidad Guardian* of the 2d June is an exceedingly indignant one, commenting in severe terms on the supposed influence of the ANTI-SLAVERY Society in LONDON, over the advisers of the GOVERNMENT. We should rather be inclined to doubt that such influence exists. Sir GEORGE MURRAY has in part of his COLONIAL management shown a disposition to overlook the vested rights of the SLAVE PROPRIETORS; and we are persuaded he will never violate any principle of justice in his dealings with the SLAVERY question. That great excitement should prevail in the WEST INDIES at the exaggerations and calumnies of those who profess themselves the friends of the Black population is very natural; but the fears of the TRINIDAD Editor can have no other foundation than in a heated and overexcited temperament. Speaking of the ANTI-SLAVERY Society in LONDON, he says: "It is most lamentable to see the pernicious ascendancy which this implacable faction manages to maintain over the advisers of the CROWN, in the face of justice, truth, and every honorable and constitutional principle—but we must bide our time—the day of retribution will assuredly one day come, and whenever it does come, we will take ample vengeance for all our injuries and long sufferings."

The *Trinidad Guardian* also mentions, that the *St. Vincent's Gazette* by Authority is principally occupied with a report of, and observations on a Court Martial instituted by Assistant Commissary General ROBERTSON, against Deputy Assistant Commissary General BISHOP, upon charges which have amused the people of St. VINCENT for 13 or 14 days. The EDITOR says the charges were gratuitous, and remarks the great expence it must necessarily put the Government to, even if proved. Major GOSNOLD, 93d Regt. was President of the Court.

Assistant Commissary General ROBERTSON is ordered from St. VINCENT to MALTA, and is succeeded by Assistant Commissary General JENNINGS.

An undescribed species of the Sword fish, *Xepheas*, has been met with in JAMAICA. The fish measures eleven feet ten inches in length, and its sword-like snout was three feet and a half long.

His MAJESTY'S ships *Aracine* and *Victor*, of 18 guns each, arrived at VERA CRUZ on the 21st of March. The *Winchester*, 52, *Durham*, 50, and *Grasshopper* 18, were at HAVANA on the 13th April.

CHARLES MACKENZIE, Esquire, Commissioner for the adjudication of slave questions, was expected to arrive at JAMAICA in H. M. S. *North Star*, Capt. Lord WILLIAM BIGHT, M. P.

The *Port of Spain Chronicle* of the 23d June contains a well written article on the subject of Emigration to TRINIDAD. The number of slaves are said to be gradually decreasing, and ruin is prognosticated to the COLONY, unless the gangs of slaves can be recruited either by new importations, or unless a race of free laborers could be gradually established, sufficiently numerous to lower the price of wages. It is stated that the land is every day worthy of cultivation, that it has been the practice to give away the waste lands to any one who asked for them, and it is suggested to turn these lands to account by selling them, and to pay the expence of the transport of settlers and emigrants from the BARTHELOMEW dominions, out

of the proceeds. The settlers are then to become free laborers. As far as we can see into the scheme, however plausible the article is written, it appears to us altogether impracticable.

We are sorry to see by these papers that the weather in TRINIDAD and GRENADA had been so extremely unpropitious, that great fears existed of the total loss of the harvest in these islands. The situation of some of the Planters is likely to be deplorable.

Sir GEORGE HILL BART, the new Governor of St. VINCENT, was not expected in that Island before October next.

Lady and Miss BRISBANE, the widow and daughter of the late Governor, Sir CHARLES, embarked for ENGLAND on the 10th June, under salutes from the Colonial Artillery.

### CURE FOR HYDROPHOBIA.

The real existence of such an antidote, a plant indigenous in the new world, is said to have been ascertained by Sir ROBERT KER PORTER in the CARACAS. This gentleman, in June 1828, transmitted to the Horticultural Society at CRISWICK, and to his brother Dr. PORTER, a packet of seeds for the experiment, together with an authentic detail of their uses and virtues. The Plant is called the GUACO, by the South Americans, and is said, confidently, to be a specific against the bite of venomous animals, snakes, scorpions, and such like. What will be of vastly more importance in countries where these animals are infrequent, it effectually prevents hydrophobia after the bite of a mad dog, on being applied externally to the wound, and continued for forty days.

It is singular also that about the end of November 1828 General DAVID STEWART of GARTH, transmitted from St. LUCIA, of which Island he was Governor, to the Medicobotanical Society of GREAT BRITAIN, his knowledge of a West Indian Plant of a similar important character, it having been found there a complete antidote to the bite of venomous serpents, and he promised to furnish specimens of it.

We trust we shall have further of these valuable discoveries, and of the experiments made upon them in the BRITISH Botanical Gardens.

### From American papers.

MEXICO, June 14.—Gen. Badojo marched with a division of Bravo to occupy Tecpan, when a contest ensued, in which he was discomfited, and retired with loss.—Capt. Roman had taken, in Alahuistan, all the faction of Juan Cruz.

Gen. Armajo went out on the 12th, from Morelia, with a respectable force, to succour the troops of that state, which remain in the greatest security.

Bravo was at Acapulco. That place was represented as not being in the least danger.

GUATEMALA, May 3.—The anniversary of the taking of this capital has been terrible for its unfortunate inhabitants. Every thing that was left by the civil wars, is now doomed to destruction by the earthquakes. Since the first of April, they began to be felt in the village of Amatitlan, where there were many resident families, and others that had gone there that they might not witness the celebration of the anniversary of the capitulation of Guatemala, on the 12th instant. In one day, there were felt no less than thirty five shocks, and the inhabitants were obliged to go out in the utmost haste. These shocks succeeded each other with such force that they destroyed all that place, as well as the neighbouring ones of Panula, Petasa, and the plantations of Villalobos, Guilleu, Frajanies, et Rosario Lagunilla, and los Dolores.

Up to that time, this capital had suffered nothing in its edifices, but on the 27th ult. they were repeated so forcibly that every building suffered—every house is abandoned—sheds and huts are built up in the squares and in the houses that have large courts. The rains have commenced, the distress among us is incalculable, particularly among the poorer classes. The State Assembly has suspended its sessions for a fortnight, as the shocks do not cease. The state government, and all the authorities, are in Jocotenango, with a great proportion of the inhabitants who are now living in the houses of the Indians. The Federal Government is in the Great Square, where they have put up an awning made out of a sail, and the Congress is under a shed, placed upon the site of the University. The scarcity and dearness of provisions are beginning to be felt. Some robberies have been committed in the houses abandoned by their owners.

The handsomest buildings are ruined, with the exception of the Cathedral, in the churches of St. Domingo and la Merced. The rest are left almost useless, especially the magnificent one of St. Francisco, which was not entirely finished, and those of Recoletos, Santa Theresa et Carmen, Santa Catalina, and Candelaria. It has been found necessary to take out the Nuns from the convent of Santa Clara, not only because it has suffered much, but also on account of the ruined towers of San Francisco, which threaten to fall in the direction of the convent. The government has ordered those towers to be pulled down, and the neighbouring streets have been stopped up, to prevent the people from passing by them. The private houses have suffered much, but few of them, however, are entirely ruined.

Even while I am writing this letter, violent shocks are again repeated; and this day the parish of San Sebastian is demolished. It is impossible to conceive the terror of the inhabitants.

#### KINGSTON.

We learn with much regret that ill health is likely to oblige Colonel Douglass to leave Kingston for Europe.—We can assure him that he carries with him the best wishes of the inhabitants of this place; by all of whom, we doubt not, his return in renewed health will be hailed with pleasure.

It is said that the gallant Colonel has commanded the 79th Highlanders for nearly 20 years.—*Chronicle*.

#### MONTREAL, 28th July.

On Monday last, about noon, a man named George Briggs, a blacksmith, threw himself into the river, from the little wharf of the *Edmund Henry* steambot, and was drowned. He was a Yorkshireman, and had been only about seven weeks in the country. He had been in a desponding state for some days previous, and among other matters of which he complained was the injury done to his daughter's looks by the small-pox, from which she had just recovered. He has left a widow and four children. His body was found on the afternoon of the same day, within a short distance of the place where he threw himself in.—*Herald*.

Among the strangers who have been lately in town, during their tour through the Canadas, we notice the names of General Lavalla, formerly Governor of Mexico, and Minister of Finance of that State; Madame Iturbide the widow, we understand, of the late celebrated Emperor of Mexico; Colonel Fernel, who holds a diplomatic appointment from that Republic in the United States; and the Hon. David Finlayson, Speaker of the House of Assembly in the Island of Jamaica.—*Old Gazette*.

### QUEBEC, JULY 31, 1830.

The *Dryad*, Capt. Power, 18th June from Liverpool brought London papers to the 15th of that month, seven days later than previously received. We feel great pleasure in being able to announce an evident and no doubt a lasting improvement in His Majesty's health.

LONDON, 12th June.—The King continues less embarrassed in his respiration. His Majesty passed another good night. (Signed) H. HALFORD, M. J. TIERNY.

June 13. The King has been less incommoded than usual in his respiration; and His Majesty has passed a good night. (Signed) H. HALFORD, M. J. TIERNY.

Since Thursday morning His Majesty has experienced less difficulty in his respiration; in other respects also the King has improved. The swelling of the legs, in particular, has subsided. The disorder under which His Majesty is labouring is not dropsy; and the assertions that he has been tapped are not true. It is but too true that this amendment in His Majesty's health has been brought about by an operation of no ordinary kind—an incision in the side, near the region of the heart. This operation was performed last Wednesday by Dr. Brodie, in the presence of Sir H. Halford and Sir M. Tierney, and as it appears at present with unexpected beneficial effect.

The Duke of Wellington had a long audience of business with the King on the 12th June.

WINDSOR, Sunday Evening 13th.

Throughout the whole of yesterday and to-day His Majesty's health has continued to improve; and he is now comparatively free from that difficulty of breathing from which he has suffered so much; indeed he is better in every respect; in proof whereof the physicians are now only in alternate attendance again; and Mr. Brodie, after leaving the Castle on Friday morning, did not return until yesterday evening, and this morning early he again went back to town. Up to this hour (five P. M.) His Majesty has not only had no relapse, but manifestly continues to improve. There have been no visitors at Court to-day.

French papers to the 10th June say "we have not yet received any positive accounts of the expedition to Algiers. The fleet is stated to have been scattered in a storm, and to have been obliged to put into several ports. Part of it was seen the 29th May, 10 leagues from Barcelona.

LONDON, 13th June.—The transactions in the money market, have been limited to-day; prices are however a shade higher. Consols closed at 92½ 3/8.

Extracts from Liverpool letters of the 16th June. The wet weather the past 14 days has had an unfavorable effect on the crops and the prices of grain have risen in consequence. American flour in bond 1s. to 2s. per barrel—present price 26s. to 26s. 6d. per barrel. English wheat 9s. 3d. to 10s. 9d. per 70 lbs. Very good Upper Canada wheat would bring 10s. 6d. per 70 lbs. Ashes are likely to be lower, Montreal Pot at present 33s. 6d., Pearl, 37s. 6d. to 38s. per cwt. The Timber market is very dull.

A late arrival at NEW YORK from GIBRALTAR has furnished the Editor of the *New York Gazette*, with papers of that place to the 10th June, from which we copy the following intelligence:—

Respecting the French expedition, an object at present of all engrossing interest, we find the following note:—"No part of the expedition was to be seen off Algiers on the 6th instant, (6 June) but, by a vessel arrived to day, it is known that a great many sail were despatched off the Balearic Islands, steering to the southward, on the 29th ultimo, and that it blew very hard from the southwest three days after."

The annexed extract dated Malta, June 2, announces the horrible fate of the unfortunate crews of the two French brigs, which were recently driven ashore near Algiers, in a gale. The following instance of the most barbarous outrage committed by the people of the territories of the Dey of Algiers, on the crews of two unfortunate ships of the French Navy, has been communicated to us through Captain Hastings, of His Majesty's Brig *Ferret*, who arrived thence on the 29th ultimo:—"On the 20th, Capt. Hastings arrived off Algiers with letters from Vice Admiral Sir Pulteney Malcolm to the French Commander blockading the port. It seems that a French brig, with despatches from Toulon, had fallen in with another brig of the blockading squadron, which offered to conduct her to their Commodore; but, in consequence of the thick and foggy weather, they both ran on shore on the 17th, and the French Commander knew not what was the fate of their crews, when Capt. Hastings arrived. Permission was, therefore, granted to the *Ferret* to enter the port; and Cap. Hastings had the honor of learning, on his arrival at the residence of the British Consul, that one hundred and ten heads of His Most Christian Majesty's sailors had been brought to the Dey's palace, and that the senior Captain and eight men were all that had been brought to the town alive. Notwithstanding this dreadful slaughter, no less than seventy men were missing, who, it is supposed have been massacred, as a reward of 200 dollars is offered for the head of a Frenchman. This information was obtained on the spot, from the Foreign Consuls resident in Algiers, some of whom had seen the Frenchmen's heads piled up thus barbarously, and others had spoken with the senior French Captain, whose recital and miraculous escape was enough to make, the bloodthirsty while telling it."

RIOT AT THE CIRCUS.—On Wednesday evening the Equestrian Extravaganza of Billy Button or the Tailor's Journey to Brentford, having been announced for representation at the Circus, a party of operative Tailors, imitating the disgraceful conduct of their fellow-craft in Montreal, determined to oppose the performance. No interruption was given till Mr. West appeared in the Ring dressed as the Tailor, when a party, in the left horn of the Pit, opposite the horse entrance, began to hoot and groan, and a volley of stones was immediately thrown, two of which, striking Mr. West, he retreated. Mr. Page the manager then came forward and addressed the spectators. He disclaimed the intention hurting the feelings of any one, but said as he had been urged by a number of respectable persons to give Billy Button he had yielded to their request, but as it appeared offensive to a part of the audience, he begged leave to withdraw it and substitute some other performance. This proposal was rejected by the larger portion of the persons present, and cries of "go on," "perform what you advertised," prevailed. All attempts at restoring tranquility were ineffectual, and the *pro-Buttonists* drew up on the right side of the house, in front of the horse entrance, and made a charge upon the *Anti-Buttonist* party, with sticks and staves of all descriptions and dimensions.

Panches and slaps—thwaks of all sorts and sizes—  
From the knob'd bludgeon, to the bunch of fives,—

were dealt with incredible activity, and some serious injuries sustained. One person received a violent contusion on the head, from a ruffian who came behind him. The opposition appeared to have been regularly organized, and the rioters evidently acted on a preconcerted plan. The parties continued the affray in the street—There were some magistrates present in the boxes, but being necessarily occupied in protecting their families and being without a police to assist them could offer no effectual assistance. It is justice to the Master Tailors to say that they have shown a decided disapprobation of the conduct of their men.

On Thursday Mr. Page applied at the Police Office for protection, and depositions were taken which shewed a person named M'Evoy to have been most active in promoting the riot, he was accordingly arrested and is held to bail for his appearance at the next Criminal Term.—Information having also been received that other parties were forming to put down the Tailor Critics, a number of special constables were ordered to attend at the Theatre, and several suspicious looking characters were searched at the Pit door, and bludgeons taken from under their coats, they were of course refused admission and some of them passed the night in gaol, but were dismissed in the morning with a suitable admonition. The performance passed off quietly and Billy Button was loudly applauded by a crowded house.—Mr. Malhot, the proprietor of the house, actively assisted the Police.

We hope the active and prompt measures adopted will put a stop to any further attempt to create disturbance at places of public amusement, for if the operative tailors are determined that they will

they may find the Court of King's Bench or even that of Quarter Sessions no pleasant lists to run a tilt in. And those who may choose to enter the contest with them in the Ring of the Circus may also in the irregular attempts to quiet the rioters chance to be implicated in a similar charge and share the same fate—the law administering equal justice by "whipping all th' offenders."

It appears that the sufferers are principally children, one man, seven women and nineteen children having been drowned. A subscription has been commenced for their relief. Capt. Douglass of the *Triton* has not yet arrived.

AGRICULTURAL REPORT FOR JULY, 1830.

[District of Quebec.]

The rainy weather which prevailed during the last month continued till the 11th of the present month, when it set in dry and warm with some heavy thunder showers.

The thermometer on the 15th, 16th and 17th rose to about 95 of Fahrenheit in the shade.

All kinds of crops came on with astonishing rapidity. Wheat was at its full growth by the middle of the month, and is uncommonly luxuriant, as well as Oats, Pease and Barley. Some of the latter was changing colour in the third week in the month. Some fields of grain are laid by the heavy showers and wind; but no material injury has as yet been sustained.

Potatoes and Turnips, as well as other root crops, are in a promising condition, and where kept free from weeds, can hardly fail to be a good crop.

Garden Stuffs are also abundant; but there will be a scarcity of fruit.

Haying commenced about the middle of the month. The crop is good on fields sown with Timothy and Clover with the grain crops of last year succeeding well managed drill crops. The natural meadows are still very inferior and backwards, an abundance of straw will however partly supply the deficiency. The pastures have undergone a great improvement.

Markets continue good, although they begin to be affected by the diminution in the shipping and the number of strangers resorting to the city.

The reports of the state of the crops in the Upper District and adjoining countries all agree in stating that they promise to be abundant. Much will however depend on the season for harvest them, and on the state of the crops in Europe.
