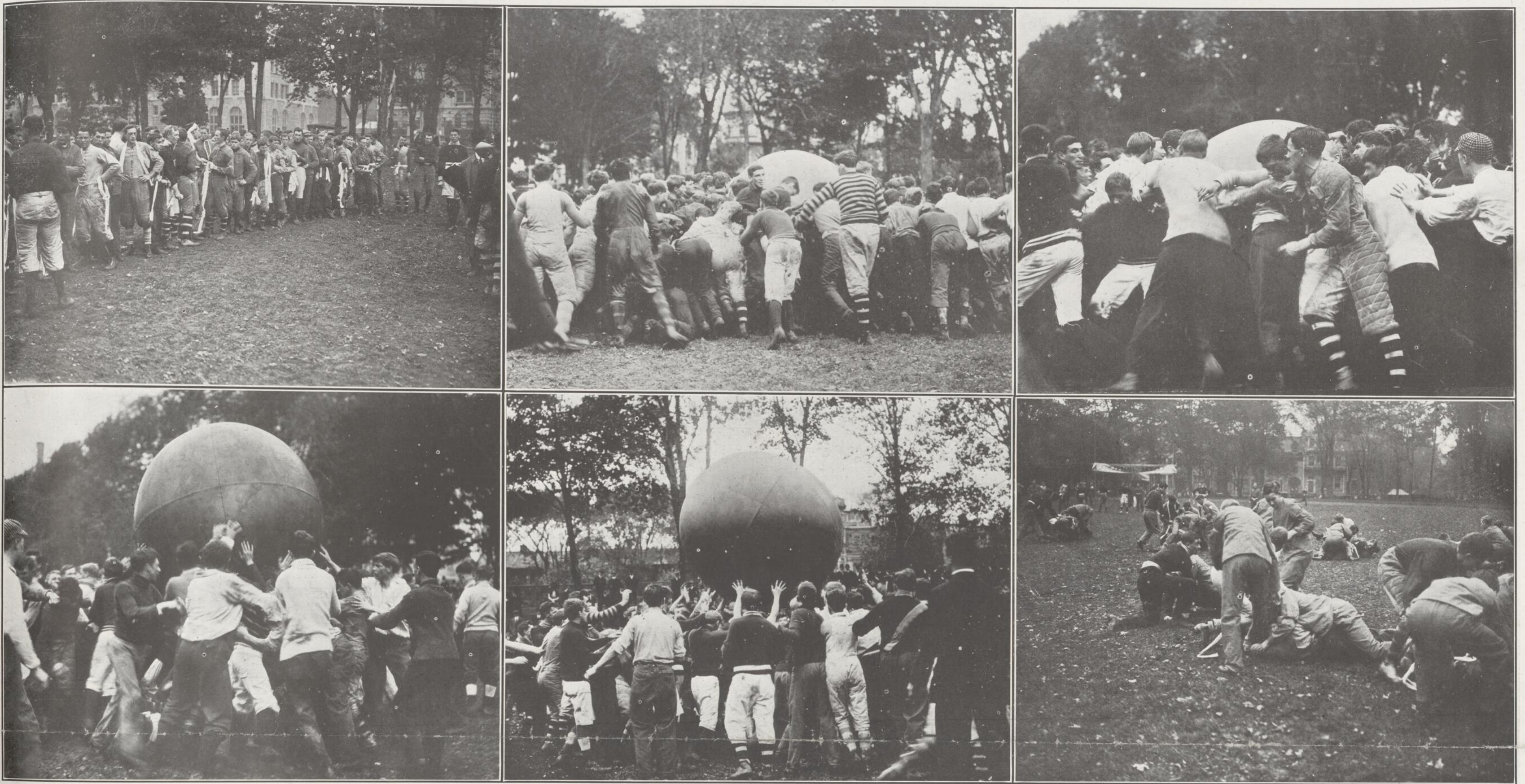

PANORAMIC VIEW OF PORTUGAL'S CAPITAL, NOW IN THE HANDS OF A REPUBLICAN GOVERNMENT—Lisbon, the scene of last week's remarkable revolution, is situated on the northern bank of the Tagus, at a spot where the river broadens to a width of 9 miles. It stretches along the margin of the river for 4 or 5 miles, and extends northward over the hills for nearly 3 miles, but much of it is scattered among gardens and fields. In the older parts the streets are very irregular, but that portion of it which was built after the great earthquake of 1775 consists of lofty houses arranged in long straight streets. Here are the four principal squares, the handsomest of which, the Praca do Comercio, is open on one side to the river, and on the other three is surrounded by the Custom House and Government Offices, with a spacious arcade beneath. The public gardens, five in number, are small, but are much frequented in the evenings. The churches are numerous, and the Cathedral is gloomy without being grand. Two or three small forts, one on a rock at the mouth of the Tagus, afford a very inadequate defence against the attacks of a hostile fleet.

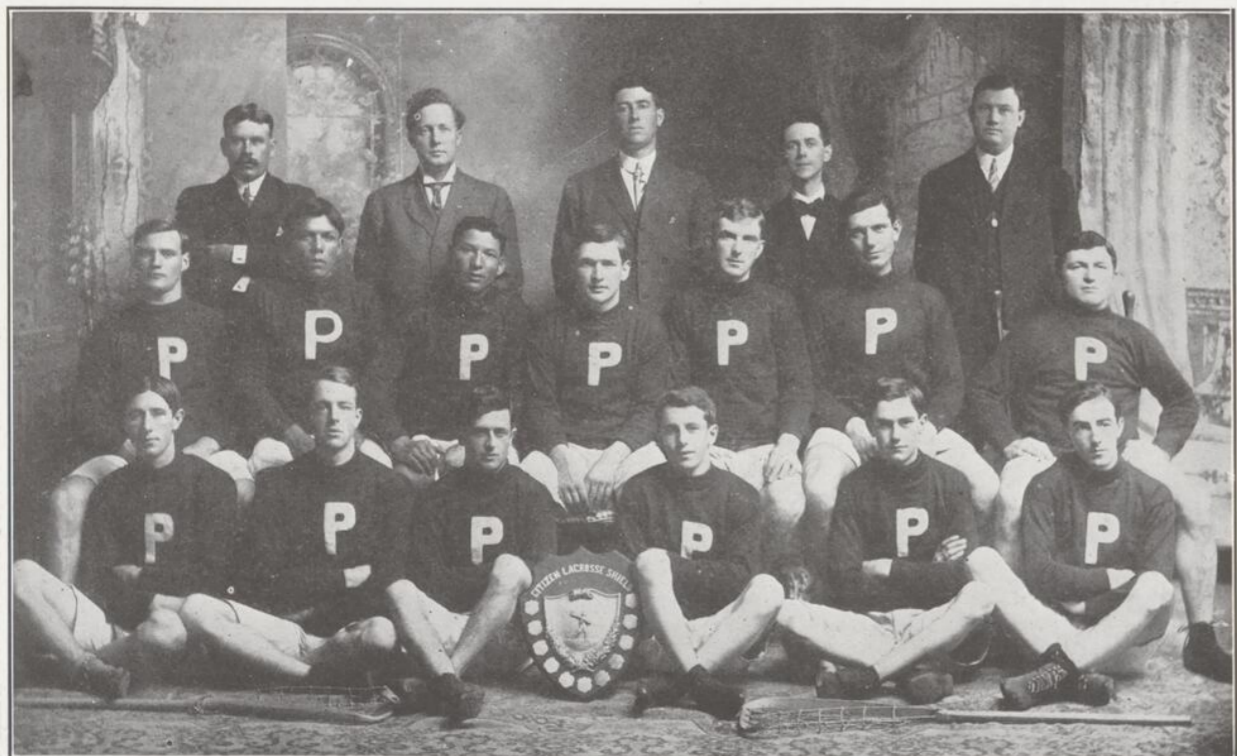

KING MANUEL'S CAREER.

KING MANUEL II., who was deposed from the throne of Portugal last week, was born on November 15th, 1889, and was the younger son of the late King Carlos I. and Queen Marie Amelie, daughter of Philippe, the Duke of Orleans. He succeeded to the throne on the assassination of his father and elder brother, Prince Luiz Philippe, February 1, 1908. He is unmarried. The reigning dynasty of Portugal belongs to the House of Braganza, which dates from the end of the fourteenth century. The young monarch is tall and well developed and of the blonde type. He is considered handsome and his agreeable though retiring disposition has won him many friends in other courts. He is popular in England, which he has frequently visited. In May, 1904, he was appointed a naval apprentice. As a lad he displayed manly traits and was fond of outdoor sports. He was reared with great care.



DOM MANUEL II., THE DEPOSED KING OF PORTUGAL—His Majesty is the second son of the late King Carlos, whose awful death at the hands of a band of political assassins started the world on Feb. 1, 1908. King Manuel was proclaimed immediately after his father's murder, and at once issued a manifesto swearing to uphold the Roman Catholic religion and to work for the good of Portugal. He was born Nov. 15, 1889.

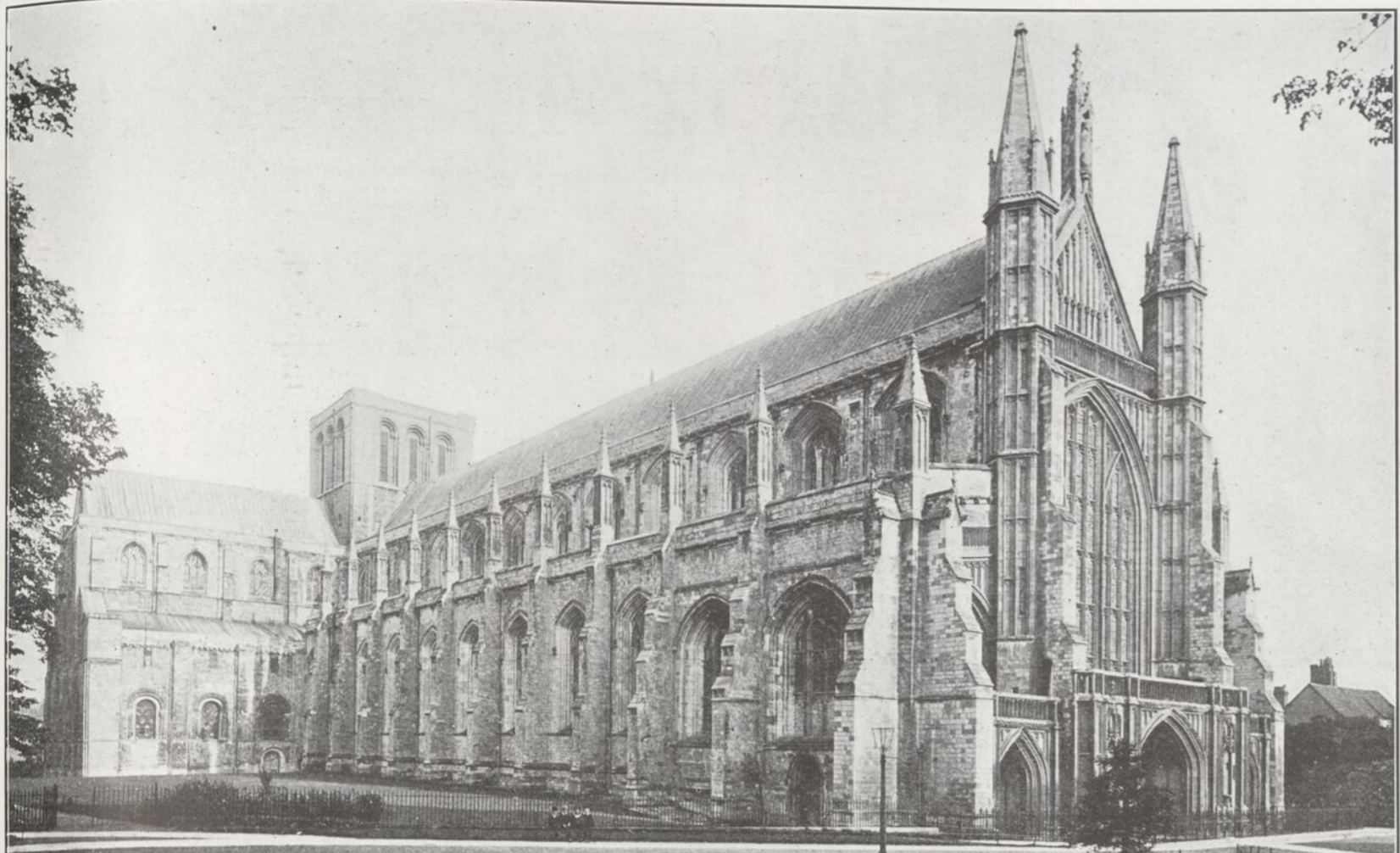

THE TWENTIETH PLATE IN THE STANDARD'S SERIES OF GREAT CATHEDRAL PICTURES—The exterior of Winchester Cathedral, and the splendid reredos in its beautiful choir. This Cathedral was commenced by Bishop Walkelin in 1070, and in 1093 the eastern portion was consecrated jointly to St. Peter, St. Paul and St. Swithun. At the end of the 14th century the whole of the Norman nave was pulled down and rebuilt on a more modern scale by William of Wykeham, one of the world's greatest ecclesiastical architects. The choir was also remodelled in the 14th century, and again was much altered by Bishop Fox (1501-28). The length of the whole building is no less than 546 feet, being greater than that of any other church in England, with the exception of St. Albans, which measures about the same in length. One of the chief beauties of Winchester is the magnificent reredos behind the high altar; this consists of a lofty wall, the full width of the choir, pierced by two processional doors, and covered with tiers of rich canopied niches, containing statues. In the choir is the plain tomb of William II., and under many of the arches of the nave and choir are a number of elaborate chantry chapels, each containing the tomb of its founder. During recent years a determined effort has been made to save this venerable building from destruction. Happily, it is going to prove successful. The cost, however, has been enormous.

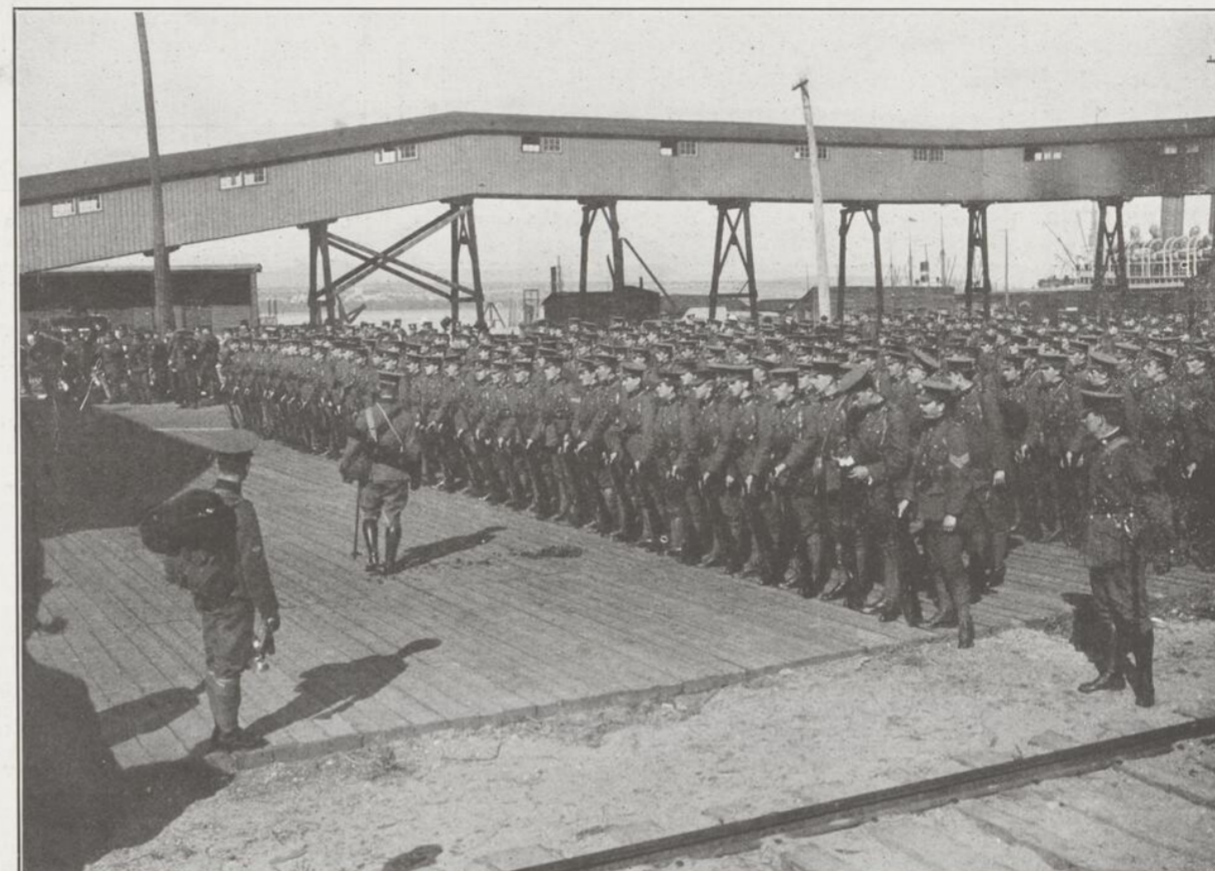

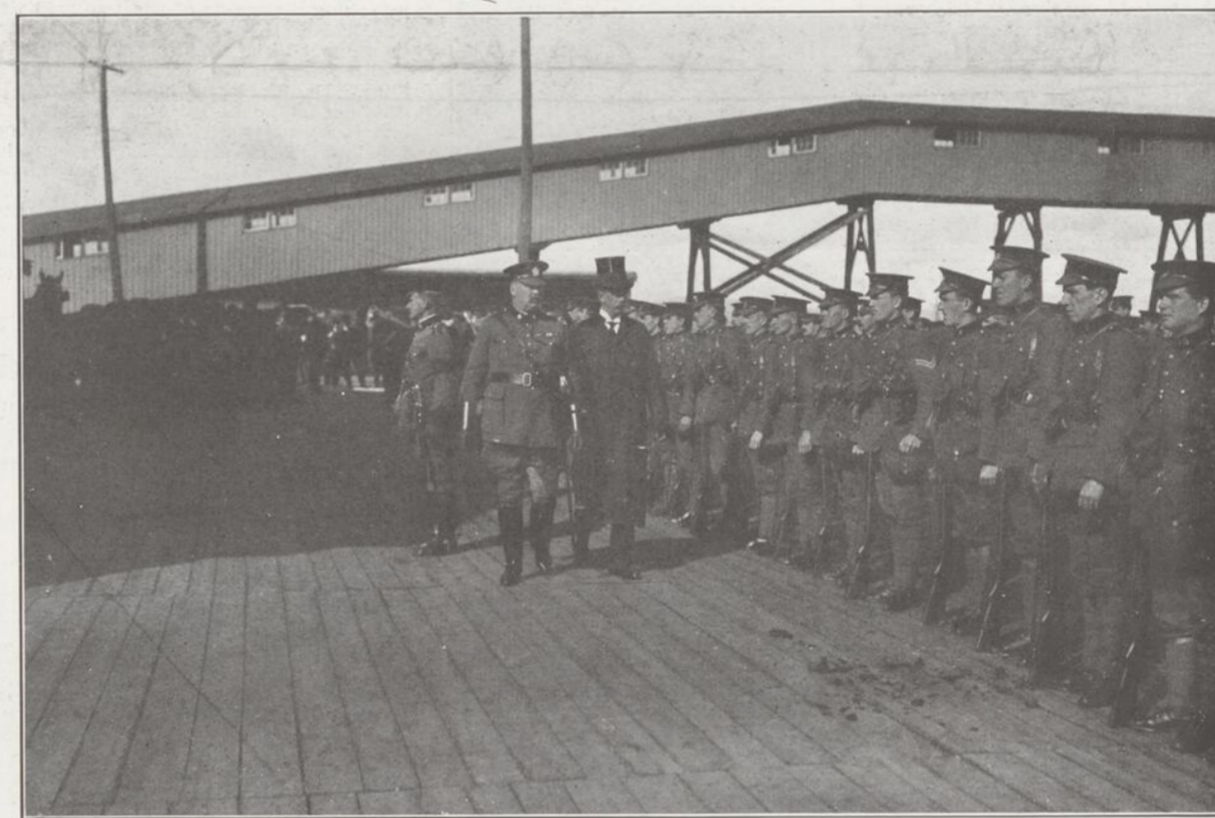

sington, from pneumonia. He was eighty-four years old. Dr. MacLagan who was the son of an Army doctor who went through the Peninsular war, was born at Edinburgh in 1826. He was educated at Edinburgh High School, and in 1847 obtained a commission in the 51st Madras Native Infantry. He was invalided home in 1852, when lieutenant, and retiring from the Army, went to Peterhouse, Cambridge, where he took his degree in 1856. He was ordained in the same year. After curacies at Paddington and Marylebone, he was for five years secretary of the London Diocesan Church Building Fund, a position in which he first displayed the organizing ability which eventually raised him to the Archbishopric of York. He became vicar of

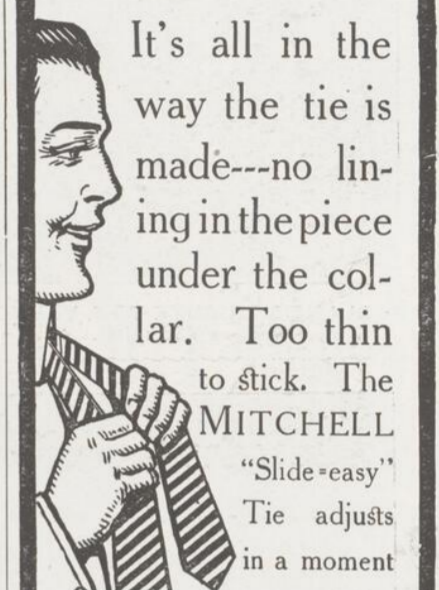

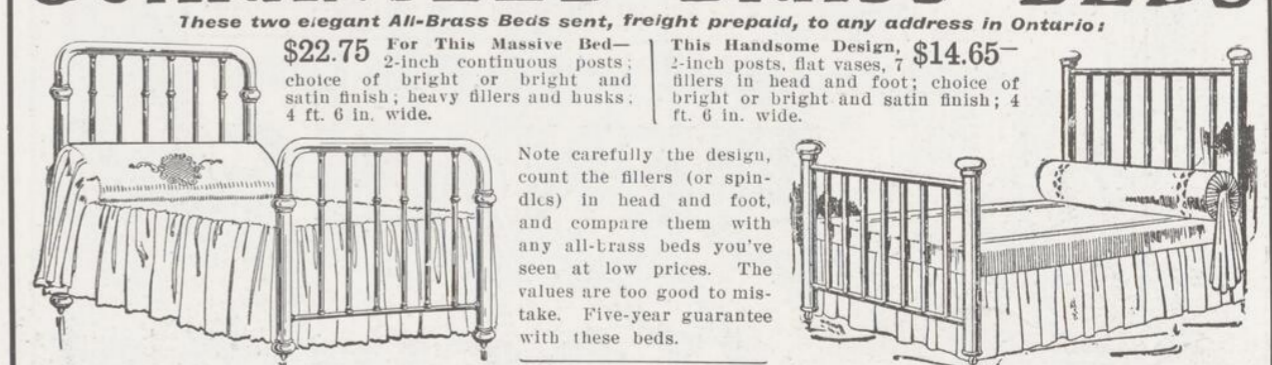

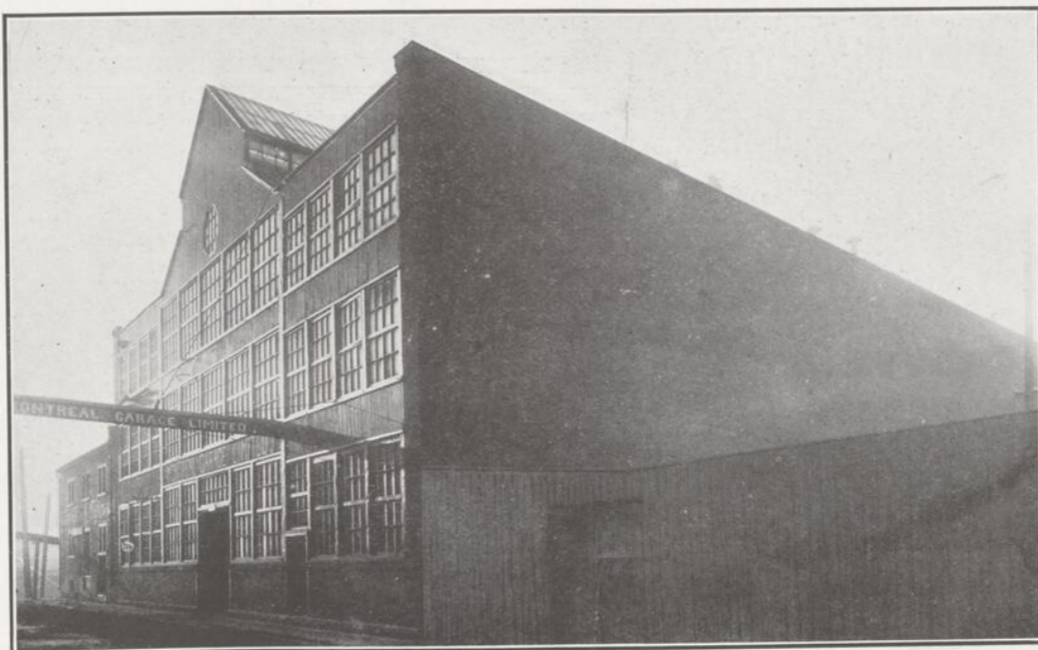

Newington, where he made friends with his neighbor, Spurgeon, and then vicar of Kensington. Here he attracted the attention of Lord Beaconsfield, who in 1878 promoted him to the see of Lichfield. He made an order that curates should preach their own sermons only once a month, and should on other Sundays read a sermon by some "good divine." In 1891 Lord Salisbury made Dr. Maclagan Archbishop of York. He was then sixty-six years old. But the new Archbishop, with the energy, patience and thoroughness which always characterized him, visited every parish in the York diocese, a task which occupied the greater part of his time for three years. It was said that he went to parishes where no Archbishop had ever been before. Dr. Maclagan is said to be the only Archbishop who ever resigned. He took that course in preference to retaining a position the duties of which he felt no longer able to discharge on account of his age. At the last Coronation he exercised the privilege of the Archbishop of York to crown the King's consort. The late Archbishop told a story of a railway ride, he once had with two drunken working men. One of the two said that he had been robbed of a £5 note, and announced his intention of making the other passengers turn their pockets out. Dr. Maclagan had a £5 note in his pocket, so he sat still and pretended to be asleep. The man was about to "wake" the Archbishop, when his companion said, "Leave 'im alone; can't yer see 'e's drunker than yerself?" Dr. Maclagan was twice married. His second wedding, in 1878, took place on the same day as the wedding of the present Archbishop of Canterbury.

EVENTFUL TRIP OF QUEEN'S OWN.

The Queen's Own Regiment, of Toronto, recently returned from England, where officers and men spent several weeks at Aldershot perfecting their knowledge of war. They took part in the manoeuvres of the British Army, and, as a result, a great deal of valuable experience relative to military matters was acquired. During their stay at Aldershot the Regiment (which, by the way, was the first Colonial regiment to visit Aldershot for purposes of tactical instruction) was attached to the Buffs. Before leaving the Motherland a detachment of the corps was reviewed by the King at Balmoral, and the regiment, as a whole, saw London.
