

CITY COUNCIL VOTES FOR HIGH TENDER FOR ENGINE

Costs the City Just \$400 More Than the Price Offered by Canadian Co. Grant of \$10,000 Was Made Towards the Exposition Co. on Certain Conditions.

The City Council yesterday afternoon passed the report of the Fire and Light Committee, accepting the tender of the Waterous Company for a 1,000 gallon engine at \$5,900.

Ald. Walsh and Dagenais did all they could to give the contract to the Canadian Fire Engine Company at \$5,500, but the forces against them were too great and the higher tender won.

The tender of the Waterous Company was accepted by a vote of fifteen to eight, made up as follows: Yes—Vallieres, Lariviere, Robertson, Clearhue, Robillard, Chausse, L. A. Lapointe, Bumbay, N. Lapointe, Stearns, Bastien, Leclaire, Proulx, Duquette—15.

Against—Seeing Montreal. A letter from President Thompson of the Hackmen's Union, protesting against the canvassing agents of the Seeing Montreal cars, drew out a long discussion.

Ald. Clearhue complained that if carters were deprived of the right to employ agents, then the Street Railway should be also. He understood that it was an outside company that was running the Seeing Montreal cars and not the M. S. R.

Ald. Clearhue thought that it would be as well to leave the matter over, so he called "next meeting," but later withdrew it.

Ald. Dagenais thought that the \$10,000 would be better spent on streets and sidewalks.

Ald. Clearhue was opposed to the scheme if the city had to be responsible for any debts incurred.

The Finance Committee report recommending a grant of \$500 for the distribution of pure milk amongst the poor people of the city was passed.

The Finance Committee report rejecting the demand of Roy & Chevalier for a \$1000 contract for removing dead animals from the city was passed.

Mr. Fielding next asked credit for eight years of successful administration, and in this connection singled out the departments conducted by Hon. Messrs. Mulock, Paterson and Sifton for special mention.

Mr. Fielding said that he believed the business men present would bear him out when he stated that no gentleman ever had administered the Customs Department more intelligently, more usefully and more successfully than had Mr. Paterson.

Referring to Mr. Sifton, the Minister of Finance said: "They are developing and filling up the back country in a way that makes every Canadian proud."

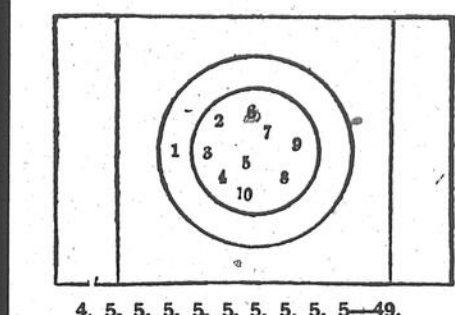
BISLEY SHOOTING DOWN IN PROGRESS

Sergeant Crowe Makes 21 Bulls in Succession at 800 Yards.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.) Bisley, July 12.—The shooting at the annual meeting of the National Rifle Association of the United Kingdom commenced yesterday, there being a large representation of the Empire's marksmen.

In the Gregory competition, with service rifles, seven shots at 300 yards, Lance-Sergeant Fowler, of Toronto, scored 33 points; Private Smith and Capt. Dunn each 34.

This morning there was a strong wind. In the Alexander Martin competition ten shots at 800 yards, Staff-Sergeant C. R. Crowe scored an inner and nine



bull's-eyes, 49 as per diagram. He followed this up by putting on twelve more bulls. N.B.—These additional shots only count in the event of there being a tie.

Sergeant Mortimer made 47. For the Steward Challenge Cup, seven shots at 500 yards, Private Smith scored 24.

In the Armourers' Company contest, ten shots at 900 yards, Major Moore scored 47; Private Smith 46.

COLONEL ANDERSON'S SPEECH.

The Canadian Bisley team on Sunday visited Bisley churchyard and laid a wreath upon Major Perley's grave, who died here while superintending the erection of the Canadian rifle pavilion some years back.

THE PALMA TROPHY.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.) Bisley, July 12.—At a meeting of the N. R. A. council the secretary was instructed to forward the following letter to the secretary of the N. R. A. of America: "I am directed by this council to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of June 18 and to report the same arrival of the Palma Trophy. I am further instructed to say that they accept the resolution passed at the meeting of your executive committee which accompanied your letter as a generous admission that the rifles used by the American team did not conform to the conditions of the match and that by returning the trophy it was their intention that the match of 1903 should be regarded as null and void. It is a matter of regret to my council that the rifles in question were not officially submitted in accordance with his instructions by the captain of the American team. In view of the material difference which is now known to exist between the rifles used by the American team and those issued to United States troops it would be impossible under the conditions of the match for the former to have been allowed to be used in the competition. Thus the unfortunate discussion which has since taken place would have been avoided. My council having in their previous correspondence disavowed any wish to reverse the result of the match or claim the trophy are consequently unable to accept it as the accredited holders for 1903, but they are prepared to act as its custodians provisionally and pending any future arrangements that may be made in connection with a match. In conclusion I am to inform you that the council of the N.R.A. are unanimously in accord with our committee as to the importance to international rifle shooting of terminating the correspondence regarding this controversy as speedily as possible.

HON. G. W. STEPHENS' WILL PROBATED TO-DAY

By the will of the late Hon. George W. Stephens, which was probated this morning, the whole of the estate is left to the deceased's immediate family. The use of the home is given to the widow, Mrs. Frances Ramsay McIntosh, during her life, to be a family home, supported by her out of her share of the estate. All the household furniture, plate, horses, etc., are also left to the widow.

The balance of the estate is left in trust to the executors, Mrs. Frances Ramsay Stephens, and the son, Mr. George Washington Stephens. The net income of the estate is to be divided one-third to the son and two-thirds to the widow absolutely. Should the homestead be sold or rented, any income derived from it is to be added to the general estate and divided between the widow and son in the same way.

The widow is to receive the full two-thirds of the estate's income until her death or until she remarries. Should she marry again she will forfeit this share in the estate, including the homestead, and cease to be executrix or trustee, and receive a bequest of \$20,000. At the death or marriage of the widow, the whole estate is to be divided equally amongst the son, George Washington Stephens, and the two daughters, Elizabeth May and Marguerite Claire, and any other children that might be born since date of will (June 4, 1877). Should any of these die their share will be divided amongst the remaining heirs. Should all the children die without issue the entire estate will revert to the widow, whether she marries again or not. Should the widow and the widow remarry, the estate will be divided between the two daughters. The will is a holograph will and was written by the late Mr. Stephens on June 14th, 1897.

WHY COL. GREGORY WAS SUSPENDED

Papers in Connection With the Case Presented in Parliament.

Ottawa, Ont., July 12.—(Special.)—Sir Frederick Borden presented to Parliament to-day the papers and correspondence in connection with the extension of time of Lieut.-Col. Gregory of the 2nd Canadian Dragoons. The Minister hoped that his presenting to the House in this case papers which were of a confidential character would not be taken as a precedent. In this instance it was absolutely necessary that they should be brought down, but he deprecated the idea of having to do this frequently.

The papers presented to Parliament for the extension of time for Lieut.-Col. Gregory, of the Second Dragoons, contain a report from Col. Otter recommending an extension for two years. This was on Nov. 3, 1903. On the retirement of Major Ferguson, Col. Gregory refused to recommend Major Glasgow for promotion. It was signed by Col. Lessard, of the Royal Canadian Dragoons, as Col. Gregory refused to do so. The fact of Col. Gregory's refusal was communicated to the general officer commanding in Toronto personally on June 15, 1904.

Col. Gregory wrote from Niagara camp as follows: "As a protest against the system of political intrigue that compels my superior officers to recommend for promotion officers whose qualifications before I recommended him for promotion to the position of second in command, I hereby tender my resignation as commanding officer of the Second Dragoons." Col. Otter, in forwarding the resignation, says: "I resent and deny the charges of 'political intrigue' which are made in the appointment of Major Glasgow as second in command of the Second Dragoons. As I have already explained, I considered it advisable in the appointment of the officer to the position of second in command of the regiment that the appointment should be filled with the least possible delay, and as Lieut.-Col. Gregory would not make a recommendation in the matter, I felt justified under the circumstances in doing so without his recommendation. Col. Otter said that Major Glasgow was in possession of the necessary qualifications for the appointment, and he had the concurrence of the inspector of cavalry. On report of Lord Aylmer, adjutant-general, Lieut.-Col. Gregory, on the 20th of June, was suspended for insubordination, and provided with the necessary transportation to cover his immediate return to his home. The discussion of the Militia bill in committee was resumed. To a section providing for nine ranges Mr. Bourassa offered an amendment to make the Government responsible for the death or injury of any person in the vicinity of a range, if there on business, or for injury to property. Mr. Gourley suggested indemnity for spectators, and Col. Thompson damages for riflemen. The latter suggestion, in the opinion of the House, should be drafted. The clause was filed for re-drafting.

CORONER BLAMES CANAL CO.

Coroner McMahon this morning presided at the inquest into the death of Mary Falk, the eight-year-old girl who was drowned in the canal at Point St. Charles yesterday. The evidence showed that the girl had fallen off a plank which was used as a crossing, and the coroner found the canal authorities guilty of carelessness almost amounting to criminal negligence, in having such a crossing for pedestrians. It was recommended that a proper crossing, with hand rails, be at once provided.

THE MILITIA BILL.

In his new Militia Bill Sir Frederick Borden has gone to the very root of the troubles which have so frequently arisen in the relations between the Militia Department and general officers commanding the militia.

The new Militia Bill is largely modeled upon the recent reforms in the British War Office. Its prime object is to secure more harmonious relations between the paramount civil power and the purely military officials.

Another very great advantage that will be secured by this change is continuity of work, and as far as is advisable, independent action.

Every military man will at once realize the advantage of securing this continuity of action, and vesting of power in a permanent board instead of the G.O.C. Each successive general officer sent out from the British army has had his own ideas, and many of them have vigorously tried to experiment with these on the men under their control.

The Opposition has been clamoring against politics in military affairs. Now is the opportunity to prove their sincerity by adding Sir Frederick Borden in his efforts to put the militia on a sound basis.

THE KAISER'S WAY.

The daily press, year by year, attaining a stronger position as the instrument of what has been called "the new diplomacy."

Up to the present the Opposition have not shown any wild eagerness to retain the old system which provides us with four generals in five years, each of whom seems mainly desirous of changing all his predecessor's plans.

MILITIA BILL WAS DISCUSSED

New Measure Was Before the Commons All Yesterday Afternoon.

GOOD PROGRESS WAS MADE

Several Important Clauses Held Over for Further Discussion—Alien Labor Question Will Be Discussed in Senate.

(Staff Correspondence of The Herald.)

Ottawa, July 12.—The House talked of war and preparation for war yesterday. The Militia Bill was under discussion from noon until midnight, and about all the articles and clauses which haunt the minds of members were on parade. The colonies were all to the front and the ordinary members who have been burdened with the accretions of war sought sanctuary in the peaceful precincts of the smoking-room while the fight was waged in the sally chamber.

The relations of the general officer commanding were paraded again on the scene from which he is disappearing to give place to the uniforms of various British regiments they had seen fit to adopt on organization. PEACE AND WAR STRENGTH. The new bill provided for a militia peace minimum of 40,000 men and a war maximum of 104,618. Mr. Bourassa offered an amendment providing that the Canadian militia should have a fixed maximum of 50,000. He said that Canada was certainly being influenced by a spirit of militarism and it might well be that some future Minister of Militia might take advantage of his authority to organize the militia up to the limit. It would be well, he thought, to limit his power to 50,000 and make it necessary for him to come to Parliament if he wanted more. Mr. Bourassa said he favored a good efficient militia force and the organization of rifle clubs which would train the young men of the country to hit a mark. But to attempt to organize the forces of this country to be ready to meet the United States in the field was absurd. One hundred thousand was too many men if we did not propose to fight, and too few if we did.

Mr. Goulet, Col. Hughes, Mr. Ingalls and Mr. Osler, of the Opposition, questioned the loyalty of Mr. Bourassa's words. An effective reply was made by Mr. Puttee, an Independent. He said that Mr. Bourassa had got himself in a position so if he got up in the House and read the Ten Commandments the Conservative members would at once characterize them as disloyal and traitorous sentiments. Mr. Puttee said he thought the amendment of any gentleman should be taken as such.

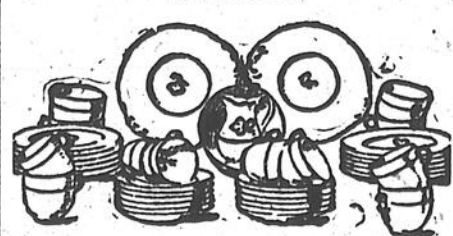

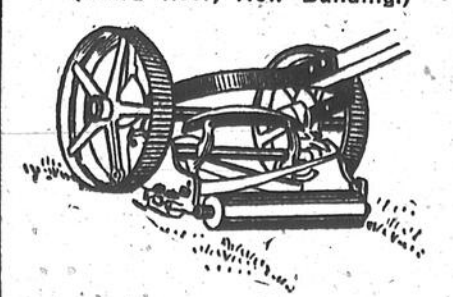
