

PC convention called for Monday night

Hon. F. Alvin Hamilton, PC, Minister of Northern Affairs and National Resources and Member of Parliament for Qu'Appelle, Saskatchewan, will be guest speaker at the nominating convention to select a Conservative candidate for the federal riding of St. Antoine-Westmount.

The convention will be held in Westmount Junior High School, Monday, at 8:15 p.m.

In announcing the convention, R. L. Hunter, president of the St. Antoine-Westmount Progressive Conservative Association, said that they look forward to one of the largest and most enthusiastic conventions in years. Approximately 375 voting delegates will be in attendance, Mr. Hunter said. It is anticipated that a very large gathering will be attracted to hear the minister and the candidate that will carry the Progressive Conservative banner in the next federal election.

Two voting delegates from each polling division, plus members of the St. Antoine-Westmount Progressive Conservative Association in good standing, who will be appointed voting delegates at large, will comprise the voting personnel.

Voting will be by secret ballot and, in the event that there are more than two candidates an absolute majority must be obtained to secure nomination. If, after the first ballot, there is no absolute majority, the nominee receiving the least number of ballots will drop out automatically and voting will continue until one candidate has received an absolute majority. Each duly nominated candidate will have the right to appoint one scrutineer. Scrutineers in turn will select a chairman.

To date, A. Ross Webster, is the only definite candidate. It is understood that there are considering entering the contest but no definite decisions have been announced.

The proposed rules of the Executive committee are that nominations must be received by the Association 24 hours before the president or secretary of the convention, duly signed by ten electors in the riding.

Each nominee must, in writing give their consent and pledge their support to the successful nominee. The convention may, however, decide to accept nominations from the floor.

This will be Mr. Hamilton's first appearance in this constituency. Born in Ontario and educated in Saskatchewan where, in 1938, he graduated from the University of Saskatchewan in honors history and economics. After service overseas as a Flight Lieutenant in the RCAF, Mr. Hamilton engaged actively in Conservative party politics in Saskatchewan, was Provincial organizer in 1948 and leader from 1949 to 1957. He was elected to the House of Commons in the 1957 General Election and was sworn in as Minister of Northern Affairs and National Resources on August 22nd, 1957.

'Give child doorkey' - Dr. Nix

Even if you feel that it would probably be safer to drop the keys of the front door into the river than into your children's hands, there is nevertheless no need to worry about their first venture into the world alone if independence and reliability have been taught them through the love of the family, Dr. Margaret Nix told Roslyn Home and School Association Tuesday.

Dr. Nix, assistant professor at McGill University Department of Health and Social Medicine, continued, "one half of hospital beds in Canada are occupied by people with mental illness. Many of them are lost in the world because they have never received the type of love that can only come from a family unit. If a child can be sure of 'mum and dad' then everything else in the world will be alright."

Dr. Nix said that for most people early in life the centre of

their existence was "I", as many of the popular songs demonstrate. But the important thing was that the "I" should be turned to the outside. People who have been taught to practise this could cope with any problem in life and need never be lonely.

"That doesn't mean that love is weak," Dr. Nix emphasized. "It has to be strong and firm. Even when you punish your child it should be because you love him, and in fact if you love him enough you can 'wring his neck'."

The speaker pointed out that before punishing a child parents should always ensure that he knew the correct way to act. Punishment should be swift and effective, and should never under normal circumstances involve sarcasm, derision or withdrawal.

PRAISE BETTER

"Remember also that punishment weakens and can never be as effective as praise, which

presses down and makes firm. The highest reward you can give a child is a feeling of belonging and acceptance."

Dr. Nix said young children starting school brought three things with them which a teacher could use in starting to build his career. His physical condition, his IQ and the impression that family-environment had made on him.

Dealing with the IQ Dr. Nix said that it depended mainly on hereditary factors and social environment. Much could be done within the scope of a child's IQ but it was unlikely that the IQ itself would ever change substantially.

DON'T PUSH

"It is important that parents realise this and not try to push their children into things of which they are incapable."

Dr. Nix also said that the emotional maturity of a child is

UNICEF total for Westmount reported \$2,100

A grocery bag containing \$18 has become the forerunner of a million dollar fund for children's relief, and \$2,100 of this amount was collected by children in Westmount on Halloween.

The children also collected one pair of earrings, a nail, five school bus tickets, a gold star, and a quarter tin of apple juice.

It all started in 1952 when a few American children collected \$18 at Halloween and sent it in a grocery bag to the U.S. committee for UNICEF. Shell out for UNICEF projects then began throughout the United States, and two years ago the UN association set up a UNICEF committee in Canada.

Over 15,000 children went out for UNICEF in the Province of Quebec last Halloween. They collected more than \$25,000, over three times as much as last year.

In Westmount hundreds of children collected for UNICEF on Halloween and brought their donations to the YMCA where Lloyd Welton, Mrs. J. C. Portnuff and Mrs. Mark Farrell, co-chairmen for Westmount, counted the pennies, nickels and apple juice.

Groups from St. Mathias, Dominion Douglas, Church of the Messiah, St. George's School and Weston School turned in outstanding collections. The amount received this year tripled the collection last Halloween.

Mrs. C. F. Bayard buried Monday

Final tribute was paid Monday to Mrs. C. F. Bayard of 4874 Victoria avenue, who died Friday in St. Mary's Hospital after a short illness. She was the daughter of the late Dr. Eugene Lafarge and the late Emily Berger.

Mrs. Bayard was educated at the Congregation of Notre-Dame convent in Boucherville, and for many years had been associated with charitable organizations in Montreal.

She is survived by her husband, Dr. C. F. Bayard, retired superintendent of the city's health department. Also surviving are a daughter, Yvette; two sons, Eddie and Roland, a daughter-in-law, Mrs. Eddie Bayard, the former Aline Benoit; two sisters-in-law, Mrs. J. R. Bourdeau and Mrs. J. E. Marcoux.

Funeral services were held at St. Antonin Catholic Church, and the burial was in Cote des Neiges cemetery.

Alfred O. Secord buried on Monday

Funeral services were held Monday for Alfred Osman Secord of 306 Grosvenor avenue, who died last Saturday in his 84th year at the Montreal General Hospital.

He was born in Hamilton, Ontario in 1874, and educated at Woodstock College. At the turn of the century he entered the service of the CPR, and worked in Ottawa and Toronto before coming to Montreal in 1915. He retired from the CPR 17 years ago as Divisional Freight Agent, and during the last war worked for Allied War Supplies in charge of traffic and shipments.

An ardent golfer, he was a member of the old Senneville Golf Club. He was also a former member of the Engineers Club, and a member of St. Matthias Church.

He is survived by his wife, the former Clare Robinson, and one daughter, Frances (Mrs. Eardley-Wilmot).

'Taking children shopping' alters food sale methods

When Queen Elizabeth mentioned during a recent visit to an American supermarket that it must be "nice to be able to take the children shopping with you" she hit upon a factor which is radically changing methods of advertising and packing in the world of consumer-products, Westmount Rotary Club was told Wednesday.

Speaker was William Clark making his classification speech on "Canned Foods Manufacturing."

"More than ever before," he said, "Mothers are taking the youngsters with them into the stores, and our advertising and package designs are being directed more and more towards them. They influence their parents a great deal in their choice so you find we are introducing brighter colors and more attractive designs to catch their eye."

Illustrating this point Mr. Clark showed an older label for tins of "pork and beans." It was dark blue, and not too distinctive. He then showed a later design in which the colors had been changed to blue and white and a picture of "beans" was on the front. The last design he showed was the one in current use was in much brighter colors with an even more appealing picture of the "beans" adorning it, which was hardly likely to be missed by young eyes.

Mr. Clark said that Canadian canned food specialists were rather wary in their approach to the ordinary advertising market because of the terrific competition given them in this sphere by the American "giants." Also that advertising had taken on greater importance in recent years with the introduction of chain stores and self-service, which means that the salesman no longer personally sells the article.

"Under these circumstances we find the most effective method is to purchase advertising space in the chain-store, special and display positions and stage actual demonstrations. These are all accepted forms of advertising today."

Describing the actual canning process Mr. Clark said that hygiene rules were rigidly enforced in the factories. The actual cans are conveyed from railway cars onto a conveyor belt leading into the factory and that is the last time the tins will be touched by hand until they reach the grocery store. Both the cans and the foodstuffs used are thoroughly sterilized by steam before use.

The fluctuating prices of canned goods are mainly the result of the industry's dependence on the successful growth of the foodstuffs. A glut of tomatoes, for example, might mean that

the price of tomato-juice would fall well below the factory cost to produce it.

"The making of good soups, stews and similar preparations for canning has become an art of balancing between technology and the ancient art of cooking."

"And just as in the old days the bubbling stock-pot was always the finest way to obtain a rich flavor as it simmered all day over the old stove, we find still that the characteristics of the stew and such like can only be really brought out by employing the same process on a larger scale," he concluded.

Inoculate local dogs, health director urges

Rabies threat real Doctor D. G. Mackay says in interview

If you are a Westmount resident and you own a dog — perhaps this is the time to have it inoculated against rabies.

That is the impression gathered following an interview with Dr. Donald G. Mackay, city health officer.

There are many valuable dogs in the city of Westmount, and Dr. Mackay, questioned by The Examiner about the rabies situation, confirmed stories that domestic and wild animals in the Laurentian mountain area are known to be rabid.

"Many local people take their dogs to the Laurentians and other rural areas both winter and summer," said Dr. Mackay, "and I believe that as a precaution it would be well for them to have their dogs inoculated."

A number of veterinarians in this area consider the situation so serious, he added, that they recently went to New York to consult with state public health officials there and to be briefed on the latest findings and newest developments in rabies control. This group included such well-known veterinarians as J. C. Jasmin and J. M. Baker.

Dr. Mackay stressed that there is no need for panic, but he believes that it would be foolish for residents not to realize that the threat of rabies on a large scale exists.

Dr. R. Denton, chairman of the Health Committee of the Westmount Municipal Association, who recently attended a session of WHO, the World Health Organization, reports that the question of rabies was given serious consideration at the deliberations of that body.

Municipal meeting test for democracy

WESTMOUNT citizens will have a rare opportunity Tuesday evening at Victoria Hall to make their wishes known in civic affairs.

Westmount Municipal Association meets to deal with a variety of business. Most important will be nomination of two candidates for the new City Council as aldermen.

In the recent history of Westmount, few City Council members have been other than Municipal Association candidates. What's more, rarely have there been elections. Association nominees generally can expect acclamations.

This saves the City of Westmount expense and trouble. But it also puts to its severest test the democratic ideal that those who make laws and by-laws do so by the people's choice.

In this instance, the citizens of Westmount are content to let a nominating committee of their not-too-broadly-supported Municipal Association, in effect, name their aldermen. To the extent of this public contentment, or indifference, the process is democratic.

There is, however, another reason why as many citizens as possible should pack Victoria Hall next Tuesday evening. The Examiner is informed that a motion is to be put before the meeting requiring aldermanic candidates of the association to be in favor of the public business of the City Council be debated and conducted in open meetings.

The present system is the antithesis of democratic procedure. Mayor and Council meet behind closed doors "in committee" to discuss civic affairs, then move to the Council chamber for the briefest of formal, per-

An Examiner Profile:

He's influential, but little known

ON a list of the 100 most influential business executives in Canada published recently in a national magazine appeared the name of Lazarus Phillips.

Opposite his name was the following information: assets directed (in millions) \$3,705; number of boards, 15; main interest, Phillips, Bloomfield, Vineberg and Goodman.

This telling and titillating line hardly does justice to one of Canada's leading corporation lawyers and one of Montreal's distinguished citizens. Like many others on that illuminating list who have reached Canada's economic summit, Mr. Phillips is little known to the public.

Lazarus Phillips, QC, OBE, senior partner in his law firm, is a man of many artistic pursuits, a patron of the arts who owns a fine collection of French Impressionist paintings, a bibliophile who has one of the finest private libraries in the country.

Dignified

A quiet-spoken, modest man of distinguished appearance, dignified mien and

erect bearing, Mr. Phillips has a gentle sense of humor. His public life has been primarily that of a corporation lawyer. "I am one of those terrifying personalities called a 'big business' lawyer," he laughed.

Mr. Phillips' second interest is in the communal life of Montreal, both Jewish and non-Jewish. "Naturally I am interested in bringing about a closer, harmonious relationship between all segments of the community whether it be English, Jewish or French," he said. "I try to be a little help."

Dominating his tastefully-appointed office at 464 St. John street is a striking portrait of Mr. Phillips dressed in his law robes. Painted by the late Richard Jack, the portrait was a gift from a group of clients on the occasion of his 50th birthday in 1947.

Around the room are spotted pictures of friends and men who have influenced his career, framed documents which symbolize its peaks. There is the late bearded Samuel Jacobs, his senior law partner until Mr. Jacobs' death in 1938 at the age of 67. Mr. Jacobs was our first member of Parliament of the Jewish faith, the most popular man in the House of Commons during his uninterrupted sojourn there from 1917 until his death and undoubtedly one

of the greatest wits and masters of repartee.

Influences

BESIDE the picture of Mr. Jacobs is that of the late Aime Geoffrion, one of the greatest lawyers of the 20th century in Canada. "Those

two men were the ones who influenced my legal life most," said Mr. Phillips. "Those were the men by whom I was guided and trained in law."

There are also pictures of Senator Vien, a former speaker of the Senate; Leonard Brockington, Canada's great orator, and H. G. Norman, head of the Montreal Stock Exchange. There is a picture of his son, Neil Franklyn, who is now practising law with him. Neil, 32 and married to a Rye, New York, girl, received his BA at Williams College, his BCL at McGill, and LLB at Yale.

Mr. Phillips produced a copy of the book which Neil had written. Entitled "United States Taxation of Non-Resident Aliens and Foreign Corporations in 1952," the book is dedicated "To My Father." Neil served as a gunnery officer in a Canadian corvette during the war and Mr. Phillips has a picture of him in uniform with his buddies.

Mr. Phillips has a second son, Ivan Edward, 23, who is a graduate of arts at Yale and is now in his second year of law. "I hope to have him in the firm, too," said Mr. Phillips.

Legal family

TWO nephews—Philip Vineberg, who has been connected with McGill as a lecturer and assistant professor, and David Goodman—are also practising with Mr. Phillips. "I guess it's a legal-minded family," he said.

Returning to his pictures, there is a framed document proclaiming Lazarus Phillips a Queen's Counsel on January 23, 1931. There is a framed citation stating that the Order of the British Empire had been bestowed on Mr. Phillips

by the late George VI, July 1, 1946, for civil services during the war period. Another document dated February 6, 1939, reveals that Mr. Phillips was a member of Mayor Houde's executive committee during the 1939 Royal visit.

Mr. Phillips was born in Montreal in 1896 of parents of modest means. His father and mother came from Lithuania near the East Prussian frontier. First they lived in London, England, where his two eldest sisters were born. The Phillips moved to Canada to become one of Montreal's pioneer families. Mr. Phillips' father, a clothing merchant, died in 1914. His mother lived to the ripe old age of 90 and died a few years ago. One of eight children, Mr. Phillips has three surviving sisters of five. He was the middle brother of three boys. The older one is dead; his younger brother is in the advertising business.

Siberia

MR. Phillips was educated in the public schools of Montreal—Aberdeen and Montreal High—and graduated, second in his class, from McGill in law in 1916. He joined the army and as a battalion sergeant-major went with the Canadian troops to Siberia as part of the allied intervention plan early in 1918. He hasn't been back to Russia since.

On January 1, 1920, Mr. Phillips began the practise of law with the late Samuel Jacobs. In 1926 he became a junior partner in the firm. On the death of his great friend and mentor in 1938, Mr. Phillips became senior partner. "From 1920 to 1935 I was a trial lawyer to a considerable degree, moving over to corporation law after that," he said.

In 1943 Mr. Phillips indulged in his first and only political contest. Peter Bercovitch, who had replaced Mr. Jacobs in the federal Parliament for the Cartier division, died that year and a by-election for the seat was held. The four Liberals, including Mr. Phillips, lost out to Fred Rose, the Communist who is now behind the Iron Curtain.

Only once

"I never ran again because my professional practise was too demanding although I have been actively connected with the federal Liberal Party throughout my career as a lawyer," Mr. Phillips said.

Mr. Phillips, as a member of the Jewish faith, has been connected with communal endeavors during his adult lifetime. From 1934 to 1945 he was president of the Jewish parochial schools—Talmud Torahs. He is proud of his background. His mother's brother was Rabbi Hirsch Cohen, the chief orthodox rabbi of Canada. Another uncle was Lazarus Cohen. He, the late Sir Mortimer Davis and Marc Workman were the three

Mackay School deficit \$7,194 report reveals

"Education is the right of all children with whatever handicap," Dr. Donald G. Mackay, president of the Mackay Institute for the Deaf, said at the school's annual meeting.

"There was in the past a tendency to divide children into those able to be educated and those considered uneducable. The latter group, like topsy, just grew dependent upon the pitiful efforts of parents struggling against the apathy of an uninterested society. Now we realize that each child has the right to learn in order to live the fullest possible life within the limits imposed by the infirmity," Dr. Mackay said.

Seventy pupils, nine more than last year, are now enrolled at Mackay Institute, Dr. Mackay said in his 27th annual report. Boys and girls are about equally divided. Eleven pupils are from Montreal, 34 from Newfoundland, 14

The coming: II

We spoke last week of acceptance as one of the necessities if we are to be ready for the Coming. What are we to accept?

Let us look back to see what God's will is for us, that we are to accept. Man is a curious creature: he is made in the image of God; he knows that God is a Spirit, yet he thinks of God in very material terms; he knows that he must worship God in spirit, but actually he worships Him with things. That is the way man is made; he cannot remain on the level of spirit; he must descend to earth, because he is made of the earth. He lives in two worlds. Our Lord recognized that and taught the loftiest truths in the most earthly terms.

So, too, in the time of the Old Testament when God was preparing the world for the Coming of His Son He made use of outward means: they were His word through His prophets and the worship of the Temple carried out by His priests. And they still stand in the Christian dispensation as the means by which He prepares the world for the Second Coming of His Son.

I suppose we all ask the question: Why should God have condescended to use material things like written rolls, as in the case of Jeremiah, and animal sacrifices, as in the worship of the Temple? I do not know what the correct answer to the question may be, for I do not pretend to be a very profound theologian; but I suggest that God condescends to our human nature which

can only think in the terms which are natural to it — that is, in the terms which belong to his everyday life. Probably if he had not sinned he would have been in more direct communion with God, but, in sinning, he cut himself off from that direct communion and God in His love provided a way by which man should be able to see God in the things of the natural world. Those things include man and all the rest of nature.

Even when God had made that provision for man's needs He still had to be the active partner in providing the means of salvation. His activity consisted in calling man to hear His word and to speak for Him. They were the prophets — the forth-tellers of the will of God to His people. The prophets or their disciples committed those prophecies to writing and they became for the generations before the Coming of Christ a very large part of the way of preparation. In those writings there is a gradual revelation of the nature of God. That is one of the chief things that men need: if they are to "do business with God", to use Bryan Green's phrase, they must know what He is like. That is one value of the Old Testament, and it still remains one value even for us; it has been deepened and enlarged by Gospel and Epistle, but its value is still beyond words.

And when we take Law and Prophet, Gospel and Epistle, Wisdom and Apocalypse, and take them seriously, we have the first answer to the question: How shall we be ready for the Second Coming of Our Lord?

Bishop's fund drive reported going well

As Bishop's University approaches the half-way mark in its appeal to the public for \$3,085,000 the campaign in progress in Westmount particularly is reported to be proceeding exceptionally well.

Although no figures are yet available to show the amount that Westmount residents have contributed to the \$1,129,988 total realised to date, both the leadership and response from the City was commended at the expansion fund headquarters.

Donald J. Duff told The Examiner, "I think it is safe to say that Westmount has provided more leadership in the campaign than any of the other areas combined. There have always been very close ties between Bishop's and the City and the

response we have received is very gratifying."

Leading in returns in the campaign is the advance corporation division under the chairmanship of Edgar F. Tolhurst, with 75% of calls completed and \$813,050 reported. The advance names division chaired by A. V. L. Mills follows with a total of \$125,125. Chairman of the alumni canvass, Allan G. Magee, reports \$10,448 of an objective of \$50,000.

Other divisions: Special corporations (S. E. Williams and M. E. Hodgson), \$46,915; special names (I. E. Martin), \$18,348 Eastern Townships (L. M. Watson), \$84,867; Quebec City (A. C.M. Thomson), \$31,235.

The Toronto committee headed by James Flintoff reports returns of \$152,665. Ottawa area chairman, F. O. Lajoie, reports \$2,539.

The Bishop's appeal has been launched to finance an expansion program which will help meet the demand for university education. It is expected that the present student enrolment of 300 will be increased by at least 50%.

STAMPS GALORE

The Royal William issue of August 17, 1933 was issued to commemorate the centenary of the first crossing of the Atlantic under steam. The Royal William was a three-master but equipped with steam power. The craft, built in Canada steamed out of Pictou, Nova Scotia for London, England and docked there in a record twenty-five days.

On Dominion Day of 1934, Canada issued a stamp commemorating the four hundredth anniversary of Jacques Cartier. The stamp was rather large, blue in color, three cents in denomination. It showed Cartier on board ship with five shipmates viewing the new land.

July 1, 1934 saw the issue of another stamp, this one to commemorate the sesquicentennial of the settlement in Canada of the United Empire Loyalists in 1776-1784. The 10 cent olive green stamp had a central design of the monument erected in Hamilton, Ontario.

The third and last issue for 1934 was placed on sale to commemorate the 150th anniversary of the founding of New Brunswick. The unexpected two cent brown stamp shows the Seal of the Province of New Brunswick. The Seal was granted by King George III in 1784.

In 1935 the Canadian Bank Note Company took over the printing of Canadian Postage Stamps (presently printing Canadian stamps). New stamps were required because of this change of contract.

On May 4, 1935 King George V celebrated his Silver Jubilee. To mark this event, Canada issued a set of six stamps depicting Princess Elizabeth, Duke of York, King and Queen, Edward VIII, Windsor Castle and the Royal Yacht Britannia in that order.

William Cochrane of the Westmount Junior Stamp Club reports that the following are future issues: Country — Turks and Caicos Islands; Subjects — Local scenes; Date of Issue — November 25, 1957 (Definite Issue); Denomination — 1 penny to 10 shillings.

Architect addresses Women's Art Soc.

Mr. John Bland, the Director of the School of Architecture, McGill University, speaking to the Women's Art Society at the Montreal Museum of Fine Arts recently discussed the forms of early buildings in Quebec, tracing development through the seventeenth century to very nearly the present day. He illustrated his remarks with colored slides of buildings in the countryside, villages, towns and cities.

He showed that building manners, like other manners if widely practised and understood, developed both taste and skill, and that circumstances here up to the middle of the nineteenth century fostered the development of accepted architectural manners, but now new materials and new ways of life have invalidated the old manners, without however producing anything new and acceptable in their stead.

Mr. Bland ended his remarks by listing a few places in and about Montreal where good examples of early buildings can still be found.

necessary to meet the cost of administration as well as capital outlays. The big city cannot give the taxpayer that service, satisfaction, and attention, that the smaller municipality can and does. It is because of this that the big city is divided into boroughs that permit a more direct approach for the taxpayers who seek advice or needed local changes.

The small municipality is generally successful in getting public spirited citizens to act in the quality of aldermen or councillors or commissioners. This has been demonstrated in the composition of the municipal governments of Westmount, Outremont, Hampstead and similar local bodies. Where a competent city or town manager is employed and assisted by an able staff,

the duties of the elected members are not too onerous since the business of the municipality is conducted along lines that make for economy and efficiency.

In the smaller municipality the taxpayer feels closer to his government than his counterpart in the big centre, the officials of which can rarely give him the time and consideration that he gets from the courteous official in the smaller centre.

We should do all we can to encourage an interest and participation in municipal affairs, since the municipality is the cradle of democracy, and can be used as example for both young and old of the benefits of free and popular government.

Cameron slashed seven-tenths of a second from the Canadian record for 200-yards butterfly covering the eight lap course at Davis YMHA in 2:20.4. The occasion was an open Quebec Section meet, which attracted close to 100 competitors on a 22 event card. Cameron's feat was most impressive since he handily whipped the former record-holder, Peter Rutherford in the race. Rutherford was also swimming under McGill colors, though he had set the record of 2:21.4 while racing for YMCA. Rutherford was never in contention in this one as Grout raced to the lead in the first lap with his smooth double-stroke style. He 'singled' for the next six laps and 'doubled' down the stretch to win the race by more than ten yards. Grout also won the 100-yards free style for senior men in the snappy time of 53.3. Another outstanding performer was Steve Rabinovitch of the host Davis squad. Steve established a provincial record for 100-yards breast stroke when he

covered the distance in 1:14.4. Twenty minutes earlier he stunned the full house when he edged Canadian champion Jacques Corbell of Palestre Nationale, in a 100-yards free style thriller. Concordia's Gilles Pelletier, a husky 14-year-old, won three events in the boys under 15-years of age division, winning the 50-free, 50-butterfly and 50-back. Lorne Jacobs of the Davis team won the 100-yards butterfly in 1:04.4, three-tenths of a second behind the National record. Madeline Sevigny of Concordia and MAAA's Margo Wray were outstanding performers in the women races, each scoring double wins. Miss Sevigny won the 50-yard free for girls under 15 and then came back to win the junior women's 100-free in 1:08.
