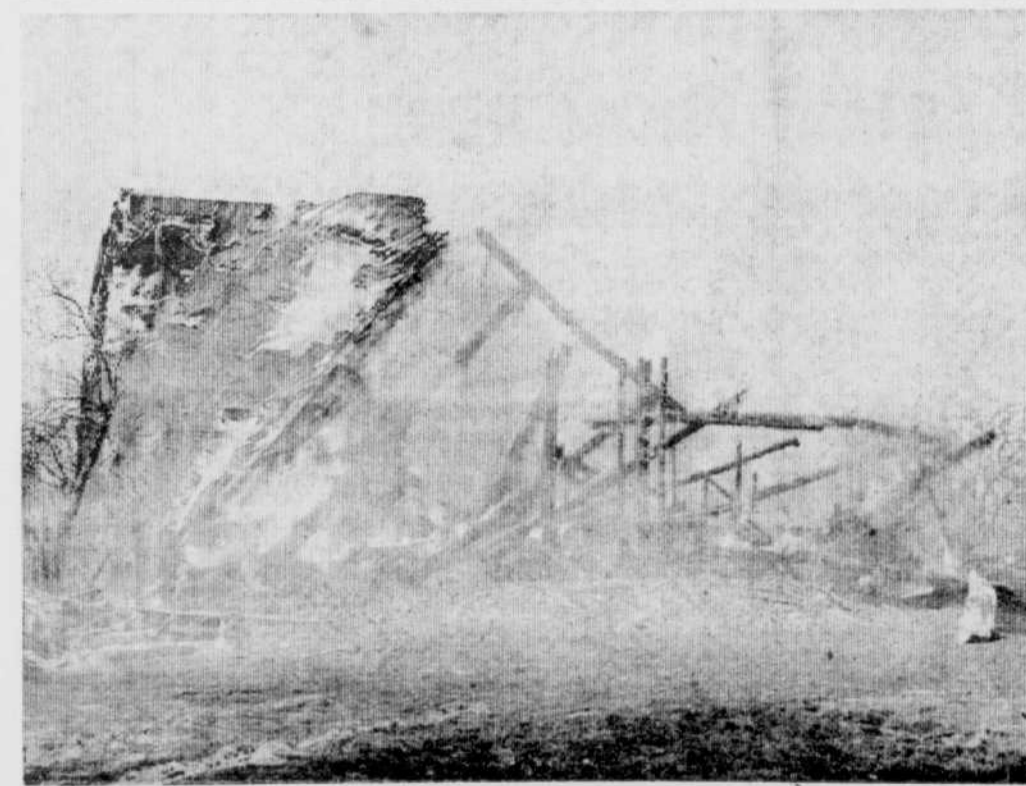

## South Stukely carpenter is charged with murder

**SWEETSBURG** — (Staff) — Forty-three-year-old carpenter Ubaldo Robitaille, of South Stukely was arraigned on a murder charge when he appeared before court clerk Antonin Bourassa this morning, in connection with the death of his wife Bernadette, Thursday April 27.  
 He will be detained at the Sweetzburg jail until Tuesday morning, when he is expected to appear before Judge Patrick E. Delaney for the setting of the date of his preliminary hearing.  
 It is believed that his hearing will take place within the next three weeks. Following his hearing, Robitaille will be transferred to Montreal-Bordeaux Jail where he will await his trial.  
 His trial will be held at Sweetzburg during the Bedford District Criminal Assizes next October.  
 The body of his wife, mother of seven children, was found last Monday under a pile of hay in an abandoned chicken coop at the rear of the Robitaille home, located on Route 1, two miles East of South Stukely.  
 Dr. Jean-Paul Valcourt, pathologist and medico-legal expert attached to the Montreal QPP office testified at the coroner's inquest held at the Knowlton High School Friday night, that he had performed the autopsy on the body May 1 at the LeDoux Funeral Home at Waterloo.  
 Most evident marks on the body were at the back of the head where there was a one and one half inch-long superficial cut, Dr. Valcourt said.  
 The blow, according to pathologist Valcourt, was given at the moment of death.  
 No fractured skull was reported and he said he believed the woman died from strangulation, shown by four fingermarks on the left side of her throat and a thumbmark on the right side.  
 Twenty-year-old Bernard, son of the deceased told the jury Friday he found his mother in the chicken coop, 125 feet from the house under a pile of hay.  
 Sergeant - detective Alfred Gagne, produced a red woollen shirt and pair of pants belonging to Robitaille. There was a small spot of human blood on the pants.  
 The chairman of the opening session, Portuguese Foreign Minister Dr. Alberto Franco Nogueira, also stressed the need for Western vigilance against Russia.

## Tshombe faces trial in Lumumba's death

**COQUILHATVILLE** (AP) — President Joseph Kasavubu's Leopoldville government says it will prosecute Katanga President Moise Tshombe for treason and will try to bring his breakaway province back under central government control.  
 Foreign Minister Justin Bomboko told a press conference the imprisoned Tshombe would be tried for a series of crimes, including the assassination of former premier Patrice Lumumba. Katanga authorities reported Lumumba was killed by natives following his escape from their custody but Kasavubu blamed it on Tshombe.  
 Tshombe was arrested April 26 after he walked out of a meeting of Congolese leaders called to try to work out a new form of government for the strife-torn nation. The Katanga president accused Kasavubu of "selling out" to the United Nations.  
 Bomboko said the Leopoldville government would use force if necessary to restore its control over Katanga. The Congo's rish mining province which seceded from the republic soon after independence last summer.  
**WILL EXPEL BELGIANS**  
 Bomboko declined to specify just how President Joseph Kasavubu's government would go about taking over Katanga. But he announced that all Belgian advisers would be expelled from the province.

# New Laos clash despite truce

## Warns Nato over Berlin

**OSLO**, Norway-Dirk U. Stikker, new secretary-general of NATO, warned the 15-nation Western alliance today that the Communist threat to Berlin may assume "new proportions and a new immediacy" this year.  
 Addressing the opening session of a three-day meeting of NATO foreign ministers, Stikker declared the Soviet threat "even reaches into outer space."  
 "What it may at times have lost in brutality, it has gained in subtlety and resourcefulness," he said.  
 The threat was not solely military, he said. It was just as much political, economic, scientific, psychological and propagandist.  
 He warned of a possible new threat to Berlin this year and said NATO also was "deeply concerned at the situation in the Congo, Laos and Cuba."  
**SACRIFICES NEEDED**  
 Stikker said NATO could meet the Communist challenge if its members made "those sacrifices, individual and collective, which in the past have been the price of greatness and which today are the price of peace."  
 "I am happy to say that our most powerful ally, the United States, under the vigorous leadership of President Kennedy, has again and again affirmed its determination to give reinvigorated leadership to our alliance," he said.  
 The chairman of the opening session, Portuguese Foreign Minister Dr. Alberto Franco Nogueira, also stressed the need for Western vigilance against Russia.  
**WANTS MORE FORCES**  
 State Secretary Dean Rusk of the United States was set to ask members to bolster the alliance through increased co-operation and more non-nuclear forces.  
 Rusk wants the 15 members of the alliance to increase their consultations with each other—to seek advice from their friends when their specific problems are in an early stage.  
 He wants NATO to build up its conventional military forces so it can answer a little fire alarm with something besides an all-out nuclear response. Nuclear weapons would be kept at the ready.  
 The other ministers are reported to agree with the goals Rusk seeks to attain and are expected to give formal approval to both proposals during their three-day conference.  
 The NATO allies have been talking about increasing consultation for the last 10 years but doing little about it. The foreign ministry of any country finds it difficult to share its worries and doubts even with its closest associates.

## Show trial is feared

LONDON (Reuters) — Prime Minister Harold Macmillan returned today from a country weekend to face a strong demand for a frank government statement on the George Blake spy case.  
 Macmillan planned early private talks with Labor leader Hugh Gaitskell on the extent of the security setback caused by the former foreign office employee, sentenced to 42 years in prison last Wednesday.  
 Blake, 38, today lodged an appeal against his sentence, the stiffest passed in Britain in modern times.  
 The severity of the sentence has touched off gloomy speculation in Britain.  
 The Daily Telegraph warned that Russia may be planning a mass roundup of British intelligence officers betrayed by Blake "for a show trial to overshadow that of Capt. Powers, the American pilot of the U-2 spy plane."  
 "Whether Russia will decide on a purge of his case is hourly in the balance," the paper said. "But, meanwhile, every agent who stays at his post is risking death."  
**Mark Radio Day**  
**MOSCOW** (AP) — Russia celebrated Sunday what the official Soviet news agency Tass termed the 60th anniversary of the invention of radio by Russian scientist Alexei Popov. The Tass account made no mention of Guglielmo Marconi or other pioneers in the radio field in its Radio Day observance.

## Capital acclaims Shepard

WASHINGTON (AP) — Cmdr Alan B. Shepard Jr., first United States spaceman, flew into Andrews Air Force Base here today to receive a hero's welcome from the nation's capital and a medal from President Kennedy.  
 Waiting at the military airbase was Shepard's wife, who flew in just ahead of him for her first meeting with her husband since his historic flight 115 miles into space last Friday.  
 A crowd of about 1,000 was on hand near the landing ramp, Associates at Grand Bahama Island, where Shepard relaxed during the weekend, said they thought the test pilot was more apprehensive about facing the public acclaim and ceremony than his space flight.  
 The National Aeronautics and Space Agency ruled out any other public appearances and New York City's hopes for a Shepard ticker tape parade went down the drain.  
 Shepard will hurry back to his space training after five to six hours in the capital. He and his fellow astronauts, with him in Washington to share the acclaim, go to Langley Air Force Base in southwestern Virginia later today.  
 Shepard is to receive the NASA's Distinguished Service Medal, the second man so honored. The first was John W. Crowley, one of NASA's first officials.  
**PROPOSE ANOTHER SITE**  
 The rebels want both military and political matters to be discussed together at Na Mone, inside their territory 35 miles north of the Hin Heup cease-fire line.  
 When the rebels rejected government demands that military talks be held at Hin Heup, the government agreed to talk at Na Mone. But it insisted that the political talks should take place at Phon Hong, 15 miles south of the cease-fire line and inside government-controlled territory.  
 The government sent a brigadier-general to Hin Heup, 55 miles north of Vientiane, to make the concession and counter proposal Sunday. But when he learned that only a rebel major would meet his party, the general flew back to Vientiane.  
 The rebels then accused the government of failing to send a delegation to Na Mone. The government in turn accused the pro-Communist Pathet Lao and their ally Prince Souvanna Phouma of dragging their feet.  
 The Pathet Lao also rejected King Savang Vathana's call for political talks in Luang Prabang, the royal capital.

## Hurled children from window, Glasgow spinster ruled insane

GLASGOW (AP) — A 37-year-old spinster who hurled five children out of a fourth-floor window was ruled insane and unfit to plead to a murder charge today.  
 A psychiatrist told the court that Jean Waddell lured the children into her apartment and flung them down to the street because she would rather be hanged than go back to a mental hospital.  
 One of the children, a four-year-old girl, was killed. The others survived with injuries.  
 The court sentenced Miss Waddell to indefinite detention. The psychiatrist, Dr. Hunter Gillies, said she was released from a Scottish mental home last January. She began contemplating suicide when doctors asked her to go back for a checkup.  
 "She formed a plan to get out of this world by doing something terrible," the psychiatrist said. "on the way home one day she saw a little boy and girl and invited them to her house. She collected more children and finally had seven in the house."  
 Dr. Gillies said Miss Waddell meant to throw out all seven children but two fled.

 His two companions, Rene Burelle, 20, and Andre Lussier, 19, both of Granby were taken to La Providence Hospital in Magog. Their condition is reported not to be serious.  
 Mrs. Raymond Pouliot 39 driver of the other car was not injured. Provincial police said the accident occurred as Mrs. Pouliot was turning into the driveway of her home.  
 The date for an inquest into Crevier's death has not yet been set.  
 Richard Lefebvre, seven, of Saint Camille, son of Mr. and Mrs. Gaston Lefebvre was killed early Saturday afternoon when he was struck by a car driven by Jean Claude Sevigny, 17, also of St. Camille.  
 The accident happened in front of the boy's home. An investigation into the circumstances of the accident is being undertaken by provincial police. The date of the inquest has not yet been announced.  
 A 10-year-old boy, Jean Cote, of Rock Forest, was killed Saturday morning after being hit by a car as he was riding his bicycle near his home.  
 Provincial police said the child apparently lost control of his bicycle, and was hit by a car driven by Rene Veraille, 39, also of Rock Forest. The boy was taken to the St. Vincent de Paul Hospital but was dead on arrival.  
 An inquest into his death is being held tonight in Rock Forest.  
 The funeral will be held on Tuesday in Rock Forest. Jean was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Armand Cote and one of three children.  
 A 60-year-old St. Sylvester man, Pantoleon Roussel died Sunday after he apparently suffered a heart attack and fell into a pile of leaves he was burning.

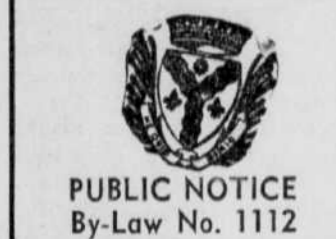

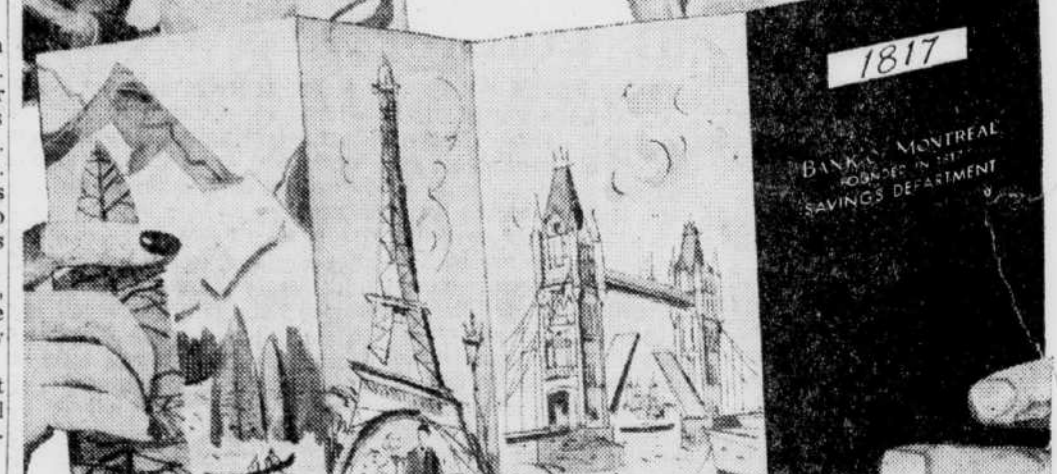

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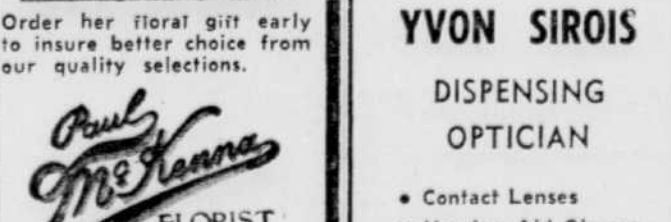

## Germans still Russian captives

Following World War II, many German troops were seized by the Russians and while many of them were subsequently released, German authorities claim that even after fifteen years even more are still detained by the Soviets.

Although the Soviets have stated repeatedly that there were no Germans left in Russia, Chancellor Adenauer recently released a letter from Ambassador Smirnov stating that the Soviet government will continue to be guided by reasons of humanity as regards re-participation — thus running directly contrary to earlier Russian claims.

The Russian census of 1939 showed

that there were 1,416,000 residents of German ethnic origin, but another count in 1959 placed the number of people of German ethnic origin at 1,619,000.

These figures indicate that approximately 200,000 people of German origin, probably prisoners-of-war granted Russian citizenship or Germans evacuated from Soviet zones immediately following the war, have been absorbed into the Russian life. But it is feared that many, many more are held in labor camps on bare sustenance.

## Hidden motives?

One advocate of fluoridated water supplies deserves everyone's sympathy.

A resident of Cooksville, where the issue is a hot and as yet unsettled one, was fluoridating his own water supply to protect his eight-year-old son's teeth.

But during the hockey season, the prudent parent's measures were knocked

ed into a cocked hat. The son had all his front teeth knocked out.

To the toothless, fluoridation is obviously an empty issue.

This leads one to wonder a bit about some of those who see in fluoridation all sorts of fantastic schemes — including Communist plots and Nazi revivals.

Could it be that these people all have false teeth?

## Selling the farm?

It's been the boast of Scotland that the excellence of its most famous export is to due to special qualities of Scottish water.

No one, they say, will ever duplicate that touch of the heather, or whatever it is, that makes Scotland's water different from all other.

But now some enterprising Scots are proposing to sell the farm, so to speak.

A firm in Glasgow is bottling plain, straight, undiluted water and offering it for sale abroad at 10 cents a bottle.

Of course it's intended for use as a mixer with that other famous Scottish export.

But they'd better be careful. Some equally enterprising country with a low wage scale is liable to realize that 10 cents a bottle is not a bad price to pay for raw materials.

## Major fight in store for Ngo Dinh Diem

SAIGON, South Viet Nam — Reuters — Ngo Dinh Diem, stocky, 60-year-old pro-Western president, faces a major fight in keeping this Southeast Asian country from falling to Communist guerrillas as he begins his second term of office after a sweeping victory in national elections.

The guerrillas, acting behind the "neutralist" facade of the "national front for the liberation of South Viet Nam," have won a dominating influence over large parts of the nation's rice lands in 18 months of terrorism and propaganda warfare.

Diem's government still maintains full control of the nation's towns, which up to now have been largely free of incidents, but the Communists exert a powerful influence in the countryside.

Starting with a nucleus of well leaders who stayed on after the Indochina war, the Communists gradually have built up a coalition of dissident forces at Tay Ninh in western Viet Nam and made off with number 9,000.

These troops have become

progressively better armed due to a steady trickle of weapons taken from dead government troops and captured militia posts. Deaths of civilians and government forces since their campaign of terror began generally number about six a day and often go higher.

The renewed Communist uprising about August, 1959, and first produced results in the province of Kien Hoa — a number of fertile islands in the delta of the Mekong River — which had been a key Communist base during the war against the French.

The Communists' influence spread quickly to the provinces along the Cambodian border and to the marshy forests in the extreme south of the republic.

But the national alarm was not sounded until February, 1960, when Communist troops overran a regimental headquarters at Tay Ninh in western Viet Nam and made off with five truckloads of weapons.

The effects of the Communist

## Keynes' money plan may be resurrected

LONDON (CP)—In an odd twist of history, a plan that was killed by a supposed Communist sympathizer may be revived to ease the free world's money worries.

The story goes back 17 years. At the Bretton Woods conference in 1944, a high-powered British economist named John Maynard Keynes proposed a dazzlingly simple way of solving global monetary problems.

It was called the "bancor" plan and it virtually amounted to setting up an international currency as a base for post-war trade.

The idea was quashed by Harry Dexter White, a top United States treasury official, later implicated in U.S. investigations into Communist activities. White died in 1948.

Today, financial experts are again disturbed by "monetary disequilibrium" and statesmen are having another look at variants of the bancor plan.

In essence, the Keynesian solution consisted of applying the principles of domestic central banks in an international setting.

He proposed a world-wide "clearing union," operating with gold-based units called bancors. Member countries would transfer their foreign exchange reserves into the pool in return for

automatic drawing rights on the fund.

Penalties would be imposed on countries accumulating excessive reserves, just as debtors would be charged interest on their overdrafts.

This would put pressure on chronic creditor nations and help to ensure a proper balance in drawings from the global central bank, which would probably be run by the International Monetary Fund.

The British government, it is understood, attaches a high priority to the monetary problem. Financial experts have the ear of Prime Minister Macmillan, who has described it privately as the major difficulty now confronting the free world.

Both Britain and the U.S. are facing embarrassing balance-of-payments deficits, at a time when Western Germany is stashing away immense reserves and underdeveloped countries are clamoring for capital. Under the bancor plan, or the reasonable facsimile now being sponsored by Professor Robert Triffin of Yale University, such fiscal disparities would be prevented.

Terms like "international liquidity" leave the average reader glazed of eye. All it really means is that nations should have enough money, or credit, to buy what they need.

It is something like a poker

game. If a player runs out of chips in a family contest, he can borrow some from a friend or relative. If it's no holds barred, he may be muscled out.

That's why the bancor plan puts pressure on the persistent creditor, the one who "has the chips" as Germany is doing now.

The issue is important because post-war world trade has increased more quickly than the credit base on which it rests, and a more flexible monetary system is needed to facilitate the bigger exchange of goods.

SELLING THE GOLD  
(Saturday Night)

The B. F. Goodrich Company of Canada has issued its 18 thousand employees and associates with large lapel buttons proclaiming "business is good — as good as I make it." The objective, according to the president, is "to reflect the positive attitudes of each of us that will bring about prosperity."

On Easter Sunday a group of boosters in downtown Toronto painted the pavement from one side of Yonge Street to the other a pale pink, hoping that this color would bring out a number of sightseers who would then look in the shop windows and decide to buy.

Not very long ago in the United States, similar positive thinkers put on a drive proclaiming, "You Auto Buy Now!" — a desperate attempt to persuade people to buy a new car.

Such shenanigans, it seems to us, make industry a laughing-stock. If the retail and manufacturing trades can only take to personal exhortation to increase business, they are in sad need of some truly positive thinking.

What we need is new and aggressive products; well conceived, but effective sales drives; and ingenuity in the factory to bring about lower costs, higher quality and better service on goods once they are bought.

The inculcation of mass hysteria is only possible among the utterly unthinking who are also the utterly moneyless. Has any one of these campaigns ever sold a single product? Has any such publicity stunt ever increased the confidence of the public in the economy? We think not.

Positive thinking means ingenious and competitive manufacturing, increased employment and a consequent addition to the money supply. And, as many a government spokesman has said constantly in the past 20 years, if you give people money, they will spend it. But to urge them to do so when they don't have any is surely a counsel of despair.

## NATION IN THE NEWS

In 1954, after a bitter seven-year war, the old territory of French Indo-China was carved into three parcels by the Geneva Conference: the monarchy of Cambodia, and the republic of North and South Vietnam. Cambodia is independent; North Vietnam strongly pro-Communist and South Vietnam strongly anti-Communist. All have become centres of strife in the Cold War.

The search was conducted under a new 10 p.m.-to-dawn curfew Friday that eased by one hour the curfew clamped on the city two weeks ago.

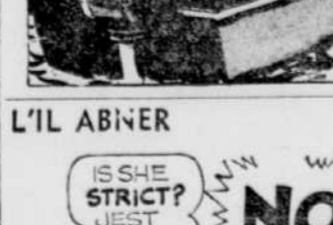

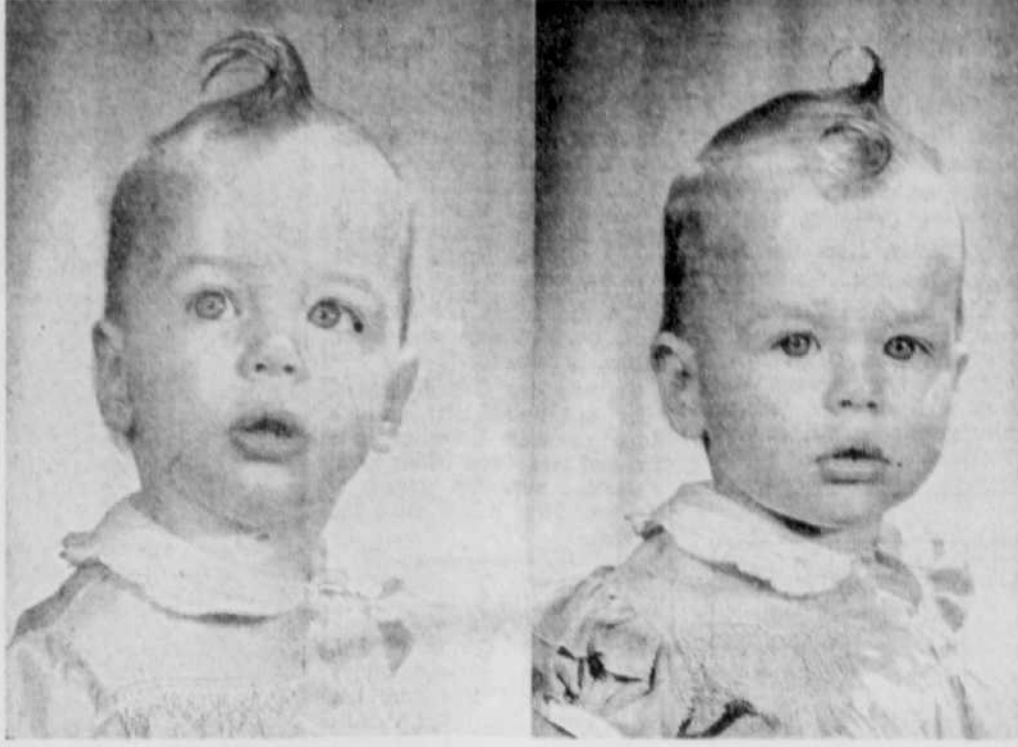

Drop from a teaspoon onto a greased baking sheet, spaced 2 to 3 inches apart.

Bake at 375°F. about 12 minutes.

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Is Carry Back a great horse, a good one or just the best of an ordinary lot of three-year-olds? This question was hashed and re-hashed by experts and laymen today as they re-ran the smashing come-from-behind victory of one of the turf's greatest bargains in the 87th Kentucky Derby Saturday at Churchill Downs.

And the consensus was that never a gamer race horse came roaring down the derby's final one-quarter mile. Jack Price, who trains Carry Back for his wife, Mrs. Katherine Price, called him "best of a poor lot." But he had a twinkle in his eyes and admitted he said it with tongue in cheek.

**PRaises Crozier**  
Price had praise for Fred W. Hooper's Crozier, who apparently had the race won and then dropped the decision by three-quarters of a length as jockey Johnny Sellers brought Carry Back down the middle of the track.

Crozier is going to take another crack at the champ in the May 20 running of the Preakness at Pimlico, the second jewel in the triple crown. The final is the Belmont Stakes June 3 in New York. Carry Back will go down as one of the greatest bargains. Price paid \$300 for Joppy, Carry Back's dam who died recently at Ocala, Fla. He bred Joppy to Saggy, called an unfashionable stud whose chief claim to fame was victory over Citation in a sprint race in 1948.

"Saggy's stud fee was \$500," said Price "but I got a discount by breeding three mares at the same time. The total cost was \$1,200." That makes Carry Back's original investment \$700.

## Night Harness In Ontario Will Open May 17 And Is Biggest Step Forward In Sport, Says Dr. John Findlay

TORONTO — Night harness racing will be inaugurated in Ontario May 17 and a director of the Canadian Trotting Association says it will be the biggest step forward in 20 years for the sport in this province.

"Night racing will mean bigger purses and that will attract better horses to make better racing," said Dr. John S. Findlay of Amnrior, Ont.

"In addition, it may mean we won't lose some of our top drivers to the United States. Many have left the province because racing remained at the one-day country fair level. The top drivers went elsewhere to seek recognition." Examples were Clint Hodgins of Ridgeway, Ont., and John Chapman of Toronto.

"All are top men and many experts consider Hodgins the best driver in the world. All would be living in Canada if good racing had been available there can't be good racing without night racing."

**START IN LONDON**  
The night racing season kicks off May 17 in London with a weeklong meet described as an experiment by Leslie Ehrlick, president of the Ontario Harness Horsemen's Association.

"But it's a step in the right direction," Ehrlick said horsemen prefer a meet of about 100 days so that owners can send their horses to the post often enough to recoup heavy operating expenses.

Closest to his ideal this season will be the 52-day meet at Toronto's Old Woodbine track starting July 1. Old Woodbine has scheduled purse money of more than \$400,000, largest in its history.

One possible drawback to racing under the lights is that it might attract so many horses that the one-day meets will be threatened.

"It's a matter of economics, says Paul Siger of Walkerton, Ont., a real estate man with two horses. "Good horses enable an owner to just meet expenses in the one-day meets. But in an extended meet an owner has a chance to earn a profit."

Finley says he thinks there will always be one-day meets, particularly where they are held in conjunction with a local fair. If top horses were drawn by the longer meets, the fairs could serve as a training ground for young standard breds.

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## Davis Cup Moves Into Second Round In Europe

LONDON (AP) — Belgium, Hungary, The Netherlands, Spain and Finland advanced to the second round of the European zone Davis Cup tennis eliminations Sunday.

The teams of the five nations scored clinching victories today as South Africa, Australia and Brazil completed 5-0 sweeps of their first round contests. The eight weekend victors thus joined West Germany, an earlier winner, and Italy, Britain, Sweden and France in the second round. The latter four were semi-finalists a year ago and received automatic first round byes.

Victors by 3-2 scores Sunday were Belgium over Chile, Hungary over Denmark, The Netherlands over Switzerland, and Spain over Yugoslavia. Finland won the decisive doubles match and assumed an unbeatable 3-0 lead over Turkey.

South Africa routed Romania, Austria blitzed Norway and Brazil thumped the United Arab Republic.

India virtually clinched the far eastern zone final by taking a 2-1 lead over Japan in the sweetering 100 degree heat at New Delhi.

## Tokyo Dates For Olympics Are Submitted

TOKYO (AP) — The Olympic organizing committee today unanimously decided to seek the dates of Oct. 11-25 for the 1964 Tokyo games.

The dates will be submitted for final approval next month to the International Olympic committee at its Athens meeting.

The organizing committee had originally selected late May to early June, but northern European countries and Russia objected that their training season would be curtailed.

The committee then suggested late June, but meteorologists cautioned that period was in the middle of the rainy season. Some officials expressed fears a September spook of any consequence would be bad publicity, but it soon became obvious that October was the only month left. July and August are hot and humid.

**JACKIE JENSEN Plans To Rejoin Boston Red Sox**

BOSTON — Jackie Jensen, the wandering outfielder, plans to return to Boston Red Sox.

## Tottenham Pulls Off English Soccer Double By Winning League Title And Association Cup, 100,000 Watch Tilt

LONDON (Reuters) — Tottenham Hotspur, already champions of the English Soccer League, won the Football Association Cup Saturday to become the first team since 1897 to notch the league-cup double.

The flashy Spurs completed the double with a 2-0 victory over Leicester City before 100,000 fans at Wembley Stadium. The North London club won with an offensive surge midway through the second half. Centre-forward Bobby Smith, who plays the same position for England's national team, scored first in the 66th minute. Winger Terry Dyson headed in the second goal in the 75th minute.

The Spurs got an early break when Leicester right halfback Len Chalmers injured his leg at the 18th minute and limped through the rest of the game.

**LEICESTER FADES**  
Playing in cold, gusty weather on the lush Wembley greensward, the Spurs mounted persistent attacks to wear down the depleted Leicester defence which held out strongly until the last 25 minutes of the contest.

The first goal came when Smith, 10 yards out, made a quick pivot and crashed home a right footer past Leicester goalie Gordon Banks.

Nine minutes later, Smith lobbed a perfect pass over the Leicester defence to Dyson, dashing in from the left. Dyson leaped and headed the ball into a far corner of the net.

The Spurs won clearly but not easily. Scotsman Hugh McIlroy, whose choice as Leicester Cup centre-forward over Welsh international Ken Leek surprised most soccer experts, dominated centre-field play through most of the game.

**FIRST SINCE 1897**  
The Spurs became the first team to win both the regular league first-division title and the direct elimination cup since Aston Villa turned the trick in 1897. It was also the third cup victory for the Londoners, who won previously in 1901 and 1921.

All amateur and professional teams in England that are recognized by the English Football Association play in the cup. First-division teams, such as the Spurs, join play in the third round of the direct elimination.

In their march to Wembley, the Spurs topped Charlton Athletic, Crewe Alexandra, Aston Villa, Sunderland and last year's league champion, Burnley.

Ticket scalpers did a booming business at prices up to £25 (\$70) for seats for Saturday's final.

## YESTERDAY'S STARS

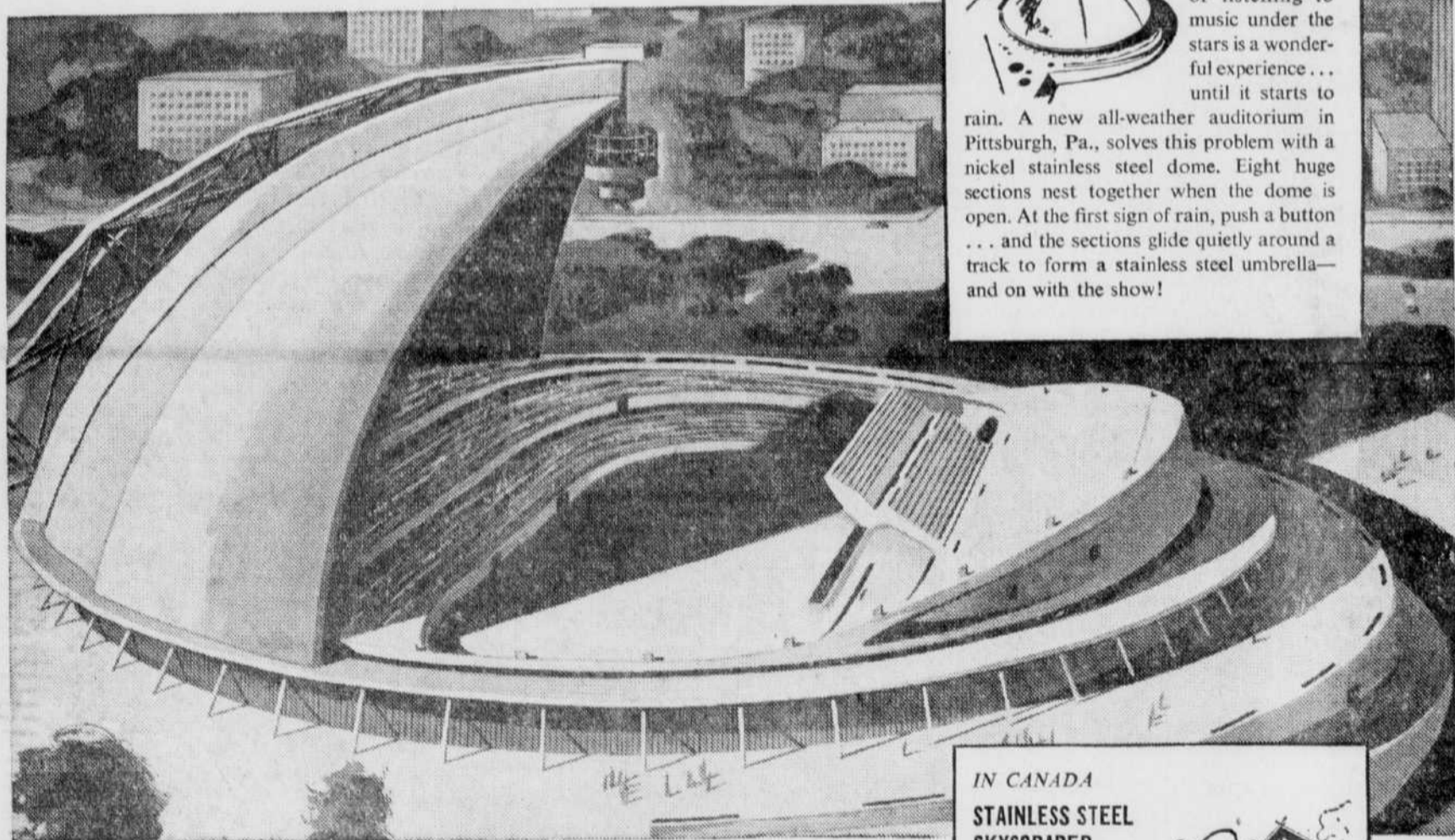

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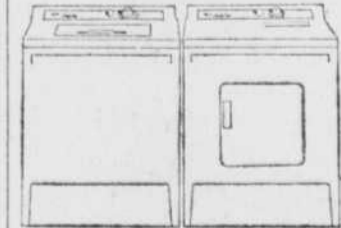
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
