### Westmounters are Westmounters In Spite of "Snow Removers"

People throughout the Island of Montreal claim you can always tell a Westmounter no matter where you may find him.

There are usually two reasons advanced to back up this theory. One is that a Westmounter has that "certain look about him," an expression of calm superiority. The second reason, these people claim,

is that a Westmounter seems to speak of only one subject — Westmount.

Where Montrealers are sometimes mistaken is that they always conclude that Westmounters remain in a constant state of adoration for this fair metropolis within a metropolis.

Is this so? — well let's take the example of one proud Westmounter, Miss Sophie Elliott. Like two other local residents this week, what she had to say about the city's Roads Department, is not what would make the collective chests of the city administrators swell with self-satisfaction.

Like the other two residents she finds Westmount's rotary snow removers nothing more than "mechanical monsters", which should never be allowed on the streets.

Ms Elliott said, "I think it's a shame that Westmount lawns should be ruined and hedges permanently destroyed by blowing snow, sand and cinders from the street onto front yards.

"It wasn't long ago that the city hauled the snow away in trucks, instead of dumping it onto lawns. Many people in Westmount have spent considerable money — let alone much valuable time getting earth spread in their yards and planting grass.

"These snow blowers may be quite efficient, but as far as I can see their use is a very short-sighted policy."



### \$17,000 Jewel Theft Solved With Arrest Of Seaman Here

William B. Johnston, 32 pleaded guilty in Westmount on arraignment Saturday to nine charges of housebreaking including the \$17,000 jewel robbery at 33 Forde Crescent a few weeks back.

The former Great Lakes seaman will be sentenced next week. Meanwhile, victims of jewel robberies in the area are gathering at the city's police station to continue an identification of their property. Total value of the

jewelry recovered was estimated at \$40,000.

Johnson was arrested last week by radio patrolmen at 622 Sydenham avenue, Westmount. He was described as a "cat-napping burglar."

The jewelry was recovered in Montreal and Toronto after a valise containing \$16,000 worth of gems was found in a locker at the

### New Mayor Addresses Gathering

Mayor Roy L. Campbell was sworn in as Chief Magistrate of Westmount Monday evening succeeding retiring Mayor J. S. Cameron.

Also sworn into office by Secretary Treasurer A. W. D. Swan were Aldermen Lloyd Blachford, Réal Panet-Raymond, John S. B. Pemberton, Allan Turner Bone and James A. de Lalanne. All were elected by acclamation, with the two new incumbents being Aldermen Turner Bone and James de Lalanne.

In a brief address, Mayor Campbell, traced the history of the city. He noted that its essentially residential character had been maintained through its history as it changed to the Village of Cote St. Antoine in 1879, Town of Cote St. Antoine in 1890, Town of Westmount in 1895 and City of Westmount in 1908.

Mayor Campbell also spoke of the improvements affected under the leadership of ex-Ald. Reginald H. Dean, including the remodelling of the police and fire station, the improvement of traffic signs and regulations, and the organization of Civil Defence.

Retiring Mayor Cameron noted that the work of the City Council had been made easier by the friendliness and co-operation of the citizens. He thanked council for its support during his term as mayor and praised the warden service in the civil defence organization set-up. It would be of great service in war, fire or flood, he said, and would also be of help to neighbouring municipalities.

In tracing the history of Westmount Mayor Cameron said that Westmount began its municipal life in 1874 as the Village of Notre Dame de Grace. From being "the Cote" or series of farms along Cote St. Antoine road in the style of the settlements of the 17th century as on the St. Lawrence, the area had become one of homes of people who wished to have some space about them to enjoy the beauty of the countryside with its woods and fields and numerous springs and brooks, ponds and little lakes finding their outlet ultimately in such streams as went down what is now Atwater

**Canada Protected By Passing Of Food Law**

A little over seventy-eight years ago, Canada's parliament passed the first statute to "prevent adulteration of food, drinks and drugs." The act was fairly brief and a lot was left uncontrolled. From small beginnings, the act has grown to include not only food, drink and drugs but also the vast production of cosmetics.

No longer may impure substances contaminate the foods we buy; cleanliness in food-handling plants is enforced; the formulae of patent medicines must be approved by government scientists, and no exaggerated claims may be made for any product.

All advertising for these products must be government approved so that the public is protected from untruthful advertising even on the package label.

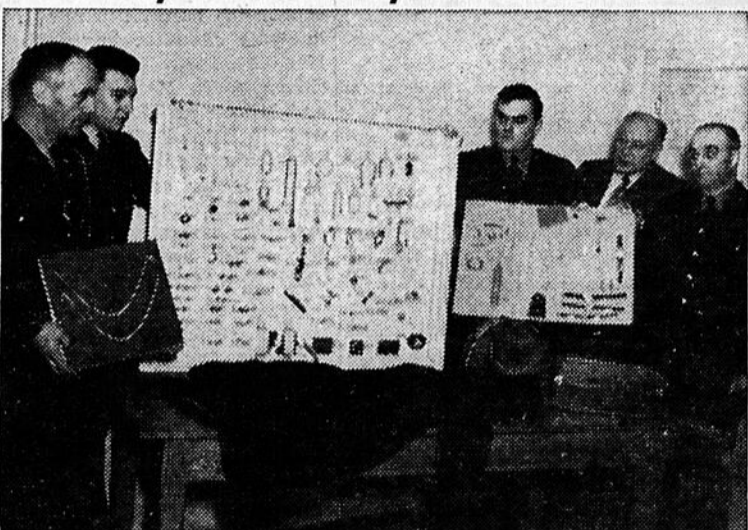
In the 1952 contest, Jerry A. Kerland, a student of Sir George Williams College, won honourable mention.

## Britain's Policy-Slogan Discussed By A. Heckle

Britain's policy-slogan of "trade not aid" can only be a success if "there are some very strenuous efforts by the debtor countries and some bold decisions by the creditor countries," Arnold Heckle told Westmount Rotary Club.

In the U.S., he said, it touches particularly on tariff policy and procedure, quota restrictions, shipping discrimination and subsidies. "Moreover, the trade not aid policy would be greatly strengthened by a continuance and expansion of U.S. overseas investment—both governmental and private," Mr. Heckle said.

He said reasonably steady U.S. purchase of raw materials at "stable and economic" prices would be "a very great help in maintaining equilibrium between the U.S. and the rest of the world."

The British aim, he said, is to move by stages toward greater freedom of currencies and trade. "The rate of removal of restrictions must depend on the rate of advance towards a lasting balance between the U.S. and the rest of the world", he said.

He said the only remedy for the U.K.-Canada trade problem "is for business people to keep plugging away at this difficult but rewarding market."

"I am glad to say that a lot more British businessmen came over here last year and had a look at the market for themselves than came over in 1951. I hope even

more will come in 1953," he said.

He commented it was easier to sell in the soft-currency markets than in North America until 1952 but last year "some of these easy markets were severely restricted."

"The result has been that the emphasis now is more and more on selling rather than production and I think you will find that more British firms are planning their production with an eye to the North American market," he told the club.

He said Canada is the U.K.'s second-best customer but the British are buying twice as much as they sell to us. He said, however, that if the U.K. could get another six per cent of Canada's total imports "we could close this formidable gap."

## For Safer Highways

### Leading Transport Company Takes Significant Action

Traffic accidents tend to be a lot like Mark Twain's weather about which everyone talked, and no-one did anything.

Jocular as this sounds, it is an alarming state of affairs, and is in immediate need of remedy. The president of the Royal Automobile Club, in his recent annual report, referred to the accident rate in this province as approaching that of a "national calamity".

It is reassuring to note that various parties have indicated initiative in the effort to reduce accidents.

One responsible organization taking a significant step in traffic education and safety is Kingsway Transports Limited, which recently called into its service as Safety Supervisor one of the best known experts in Canada on the subject, Vernon H. Page, B.A., former director of traffic for the Toronto police. Mr. Page in 1951 was largely responsible for Toronto winning the highest award in traffic law enforcement on the North American continent. The public thus may well appreciate his appointment to this newly created office. He was the founder, in 1947, of the "Elmer the Safety Elephant" program for school children in Canada, a program which has been widely and success-

fully employed in Montreal school districts. During his police safety career, which has taken him to United States universities for special courses on the subject, the former police inspector has made over 1000 platform speeches, as well as radio addresses, in the interests of traffic enforcement and safety education, to service clubs and other organizations throughout Ontario.

Mr. Page's ability to disseminate such valuable information will no doubt be made available to Montreal audiences as well, for, judging by statistics, we in Montreal probably have considerable need of such advice.

## Health Insurance?

### Sound Argument Against Plan Advanced in Victoria

A sound argument against compulsory health insurance is advanced by The Victoria Times, which points out that it would take huge amounts merely to administer such a scheme. Reckoning that a national health scheme would cost \$500 million, it warns that the administrative costs would add another \$50 to \$75 million.

This is assuming that the total cost of medical and hospital services under health insurance would be no greater than it is today. But in fact it would be substantially greater. Hospital costs have vastly increased in B.C. under compulsory hospital insurance. The U.K. health scheme, when studied in 1946, was estimated to cost less than \$400 million a year. It is now costing \$1.2 billion.

Another point made by The Times is that if Ottawa is financing a health service, it will collect higher taxes for this purpose in the wealthy provinces than in those not so wealthy. This means that B.C. people would be paying more into the health service than they took out of it, the balance used to subsidize health services in N.B., Newfoundland, etc.

### Imagination Always Important, Says "Y" Cooking Instructress

Small culinary miracles are continuously taking place in Mrs. M. Gosse' and Mme Jehane Benoit's cooking classes at the YWCA. Mme Jehane Benoit, who lives at 1 Churchill Ave. Westmount, has always been interested in food that looks and tastes good and costs little: "A lot of cooking success, she says; comes from using the imagination."

Her colorful approach to cooking, however, rests on a solid background of training in Home Economics, dietetics, and the chemistry of food at the Sorbonne, Paris. She is now supervising three new cooking classes at the YWCA, starting February 3, 1953, and to be lasting 15 weeks, besides doing a dozen other jobs in the community.

Her first class is teaching the ABC of cookery for business girls, spring brides, and anyone who is mystified by a cook book. As she says, "You will learn how to make a meal in 20 minutes; to cook without a cook book; to make bread without kneading it; to make fowl taste like chicken." Those are some of the secrets.

Her second class will be in "The use of the Pressure Cooker". Mme Benoit says that books on pressure cookery are already outdated because there is continuous experimenting in this type of cooking. She now finds that a pressure cooker will not only make a complete meal of meat and vegetables in ten minutes but will make delicious puddings, cakes, bread; it saves your oven and you only have one pan to wash.

How to buy, cook and carve all type of meat and poultry is the third course and very popular. "How to sharpen knives is one of the most common questions," says Mme Benoit. "We take a little time on that. I give five lessons on beef alone; for example, I teach how to change a porter-house roast at 84c lb. into an economical buy."

Whenever she feels the need of a refresher, she takes another trip to Europe and as she says "Come back with a gold mine in my head," which she shares with her students.

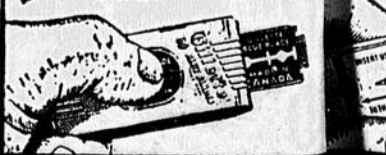

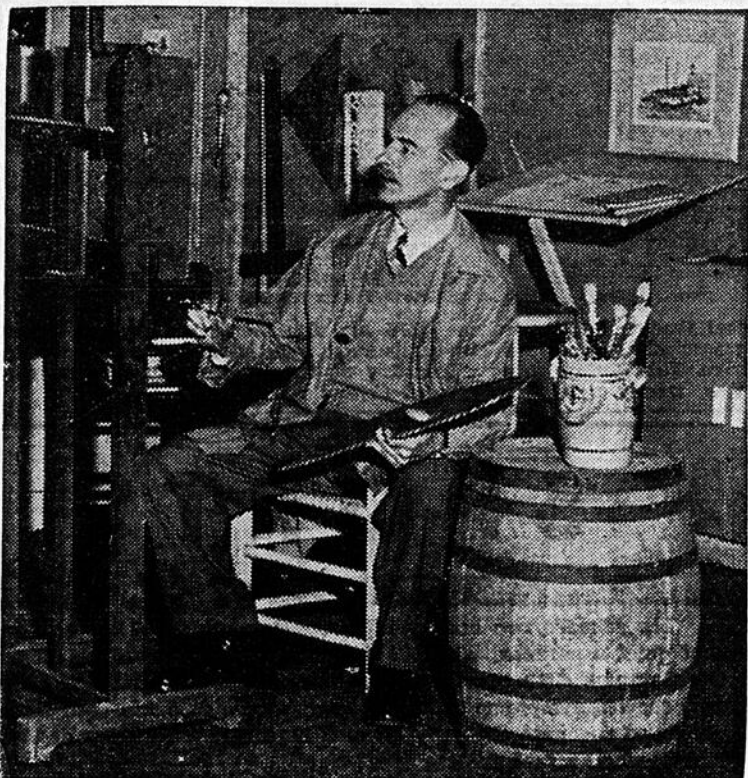

**Gerard Perrault To Hold Art Exhibit Next Week**

Gérard Perrault, an artist whose work displays a "different" outlook in this day and age of cubes, squares and blotches, will hold an exhibition of his work in the basement studio at his home, 3483 Marlowe avenue, from Sunday until Saturday of next week.

The exhibition, open daily from 4 to 10 p.m. will be a farewell gesture to Montreal, for early next month he will take up residence in Ottawa.

Mr. Perrault, a resident of NDG for three years and a former resident of Westmount for 12 years, is an artist with a long formal training, including a stint on the

left bank in Paris. His paintings—covering five years of his work—are noted for a rather unusual blend of techniques.

With the Englishman's tradition of careful water color craftsmanship and the French-Canadian's tradition of straight-forwarded landscape treatment, he has developed a style not often seen here. Coupled with this is the influence his commercial art work has had on his painting and you have a style that is peculiarly his own.

**Static Beauty**

Mr. Perrault's water color landscapes of Quebec, Three Rivers, Laurentians, Gaspé, Îles d'Orléans, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, are crisp, clean pictures which have a quite, almost static beauty. He himself calls his work "sentimental," however, the term is meant not by the artificial emotion of the kind the radio soap opera bombard us with, but more a devotion to colorful settings and soft, pleasant tones.

The artists oils, colors, are completely different in scope and technique. His most recent work, being a departure to pallet-knife execution.

A native Montrealeer, Mr. Perrault began studying art following his graduation from McGill University in 1921. After completion of his study with Wilfred M. Barnes, R.C.A., he went to New York for a year's stay at the Art Students' League. In 1927 he returned to Montreal to free lance for three years.

**Call of Paris**

By the time 1930 arrived the call of Paris beckoned and he went to the Académie-de le Grande Chaumière where he studied along with Clarence Gagnon. Back in Canada a year later he again turned to free lancing until 1934. He then went to London to serve with the National Trade Press, as an advertising artist. In 1936 he was again in Canada, this time to accept a position as an advertising manager of a local firm.

In 1941 he joined the Air Force, serving for five years in Canada and overseas. Demobilisation in 1945 saw Flight Lieutenant Perrault accept a position as head of the advertising art section of the School of Graphic Arts, where he served for seven years.

Married, the Perraults have a son, Robert, 17, and a daughter, Suzanne, 12.

The next cage meet will be Jan. 23 when WHS play host to the gals from Chambly County.

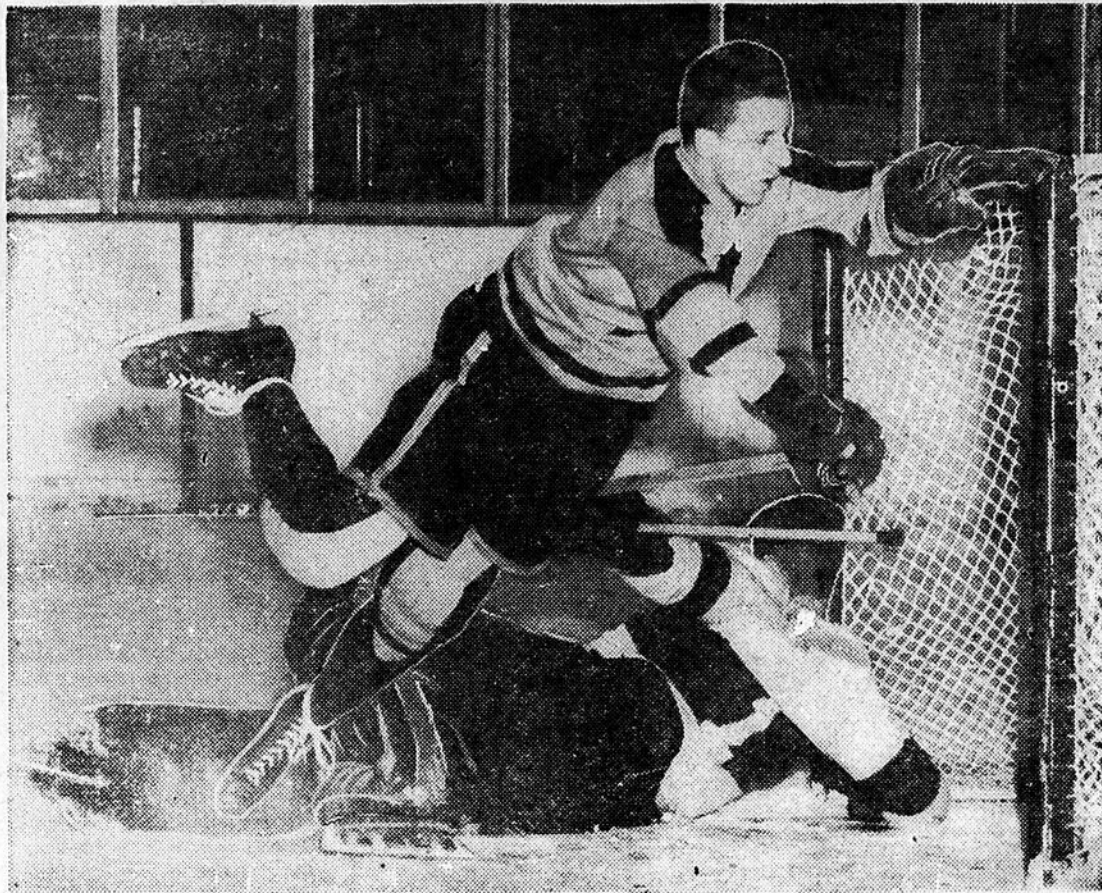
### Hockey

Since September, 1952, the Unity Boys' Club has attracted 308 boys and 188 girls with a variety of interests including: Sports, Crafts, Hobbies and Social and Group Clubs. Facilities are available for a larger number. There are no membership limitations other than the capacity of the Clubhouse, and the fees are at purely nominal level—easily within the means of any boy or girl. Its doors are always open in after-school and evening hours.

One of the main responsibilities that the Staff has undertaken was to create an environment where character develops under natural and favourable circumstances. The Club itself, is a boys and girls world, in which the guidance of its leaders functions informally and continuously. It provides for the wholesome use of leisure, for the building of health, for the development of recreational and vocational skills, and for the leadership and guidance which produces men and women better fitted for the responsibilities of citizenship.

Anyone between the ages of 6 and 16 living in the districts of Westmount and St. Henry is eligible to join the Unity Boys' Club.
