## Weredale education level up

Weredale House in Westmount, temporary or semi-permanent home for hundreds of boys is not "one of Red Feather's problem children" re-elected president H. Roy Crabtree said Tuesday at Weredale's 93rd annual meeting.

He noted that despite the number of boys under care and the rising costs of living, Weredale's demand from Red Feather has not increased in recent years.

"As a charter member of the Red Feather services we are strong believers in the Welfare Federation approach to fund raising for operational expenses," he said.

The number of boys in residence at Weredale during 1963 averaged 62.8. Executive director V. T. McAdam pointed out that when the organization moved to Weredale House in 1930 the ages of the boys under their care were practically the same as today — average 15 years for those leaving — but 68% of them were working. "Today 85% of them are still at school," he said.

Following the meeting, officers and guests watched the Weredale version of the musical comedy "Oliver" with the boys showing the year's activities in drama form.

The show, first presented in

## Westmount Park redevelopment work to start

The large scale redevelopment of Westmount Park, eight months in the planning, will begin early next month, it was announced this week. The city is now calling for tenders for the job which will be received until February 28.

It is expected that most of the work in the first phase will be completed by late Spring. Involved is the complete reconstruction of the waterworks system supplying the park's two ornamental ponds, rebuilding of the ponds themselves, construction of new concrete and brick paths and preliminary earthmoving to re-contour the entire park.

The second phase of operations which is expected to begin July 1

will primarily be concerned with planting and beautification, tree planting, laying of sod.

Last June the city retained the park planning firm of McFadzean and Every to draw up a master plan for the entire park. Special attention was given to the ponds which formerly constituted a water-course draining into a ravine at Western and Lansdowne. Both had badly deteriorated with age and would not hold water. The water course between them was also a constant source of trouble to city engineers.

The popular duck pond operates independently and will not be changed to any great extent.

## Eskimo priest here Sunday

An Eskimo priest from the tiny village of Igloodik on Hudson's Strait in the far reaches of the North-West Territories comes to Westmount Sunday as guest preacher at St. Matthias' Church. He is Rev. Noah Nasook, rector of another St. Matthias' Church in the Arctic.

Mr. Nasook speaks no English and church officials last week launched a wide search for an interpreter. Arrangements were

made with a teen-aged girl, one of four Eskimos living in Montreal. She will stand below the pulpit at a second microphone at the Evensong services.

The City of Westmount is well-known in Igloodik. Last year as a thank-offering on its 50th anniversary the congregation of Westmount's St. Matthias' raised \$7,000 to pay for the construction of an Anglican church in the Arctic settlement, the first of any deno-

## 98% favor autonomy Examiner poll reveals

Only about two per cent of Westmount citizens wish their city to join up with Montreal, according to an Examiner ballot survey presented last week. Westmounters by the hundreds gave full vent to their feelings and made it clear they wish Westmount to remain autonomous.

Among the scores of reasons for retaining independence emphatically stated on the ballots, five were predominant: Citizens preferred autonomy because:

- "Westmount's efficient government, free from graft, managed by practical businessmen rather than by politicians could not be equalled in Montreal."

- "Montreal's burning interest in this city springs from a desire to grab Westmount taxes and put them to work elsewhere."

- "Only as an autonomous city can Westmount retain its unique character and charm."

- "Municipal services, such as street cleaning, snow removal, garbage collection are unequalled anywhere on the island and would certainly not be improved by joining Montreal."

- "English speaking citizens are in a minority on the island and prefer to remain in a com-

munity administered by their own kind."

Few among the small group voting in favor of annexation by Montreal gave reasons. There was a single theme only: "to run a large metropolitan centre, it is necessary to have one central government; we may have our private clubs and societies, but not our private cities within cities."

In several cases, members of the same family were apparently divided on the question and sent in separate ballots.

About 25% urged closer co-operation between Westmount and Montreal and other island municipalities while still opposing annexation: Many suggested a metropolitan type of control for traffic, police and fire departments, sewage disposal, etc. A few suggested that it was not fair for Montreal citizens to pay for such services as the subway, "used by the whole population of the island."

## Diefenbaker speaks here March 18

Opposition leader John Diefenbaker will speak at Victoria Hall March 18, it was announced Wednesday by the Montreal Junior Board of Trade.

This will be part of a series of five lectures at which representatives of all federal parties explain their party's economic policies, a spokesman said. Exchange hall in the Board of Trade Building will be used for the other four but was unavailable on March 18.

Most of the seats will be taken up by board members, but a few will be available to the public.

E. J. Sardis, chairman of the board's economics and finance study committee said the purpose of the meetings is to permit the public to examine the parties' economic policies separately from other issues. "The public often loses sight of economic policies in the myriad of policies put forward," he said.

State Secretary Maurice Lamontagne will speak February 26 at Exchange Hall; T. C. Douglas, leader of the New Democratic Party, March 4; Mr. Diefenbaker, March 18; Real Caouette, leader of Le Ralliement des Cr ditistes, March 25, and Robert Thompson, leader of the Social Credit Party, April 1.

The addresses will begin at 8 p.m.

## Station tenders out

Montreal, already at work relocating sewers and cables within the City of Westmount will soon begin actual construction of a subway terminus on Western avenue. The Drapeau-Saulnier administration has authorized calling of tenders for the job which covers 1,428 feet from Elm avenue to a point east of Atwater.

## Fire-fighting courses set

Westmount police and firemen this week began a second Civil Protection Drive, this time to recruit at least 15 volunteers to undergo extensive training in auxiliary fire-fighting.

Courses will be held twice a week in two hour sessions starting February 20. Applications are now being received at the Westmount Fire Department for volunteers between the ages of 18 and 55. A physical examination will be required.

Four weeks ago Westmount began Civil Protection Courses in rescue work. Fifteen citizens registered for the program.

The Force is designed to assist the regular municipal police and firemen in case of local disaster or nuclear attack. In the latter instance the Westmount group would take orders from district eight headquarters in Montreal.

## Cold? It's the wind

Did you find it exceptionally cold certain days recently.

Well, it's not so much the temperature as the wind, which in effect makes the temperature lower than it is, according to Eric Neal, Examiner weather expert.

"The chill factor may be considered as the loss of body temperature due to cold and wind," he says. "It is similar to the calculation for evaporation losses under hot conditions."

According to a table prepared by the RCAF, at 20 below with a 20 MPH wind, the equivalent is 70 below — and that's cold!

Montreal Public works director Lucien L'Allier, in charge of the subway project, reported that he has made arrangements with Westmount authorities for the work.

Western avenue will be closed for a maximum of 450 days after construction begins, using the "open-cut method."

Westmount does not participate directly in the building of the subway and does not pay for it. Plans for the Westmount section, however, have been submitted to local city engineers for approval.

The main platforms for the terminal will be located astride the Westmount-Montreal border. Stairs will connect with both sides of Western.

The tracks beyond the station which will extend to within 100 feet of Green avenue will first be used for storing subway cars, later, perhaps, for a proposed extension through Westmount.

When the subway is completed this station will be the western terminus for the 4.3 mile line which is to run under Demontigny, Ontario, Burnside and St. Luke street with 10 stations. Eastern terminus will be located on Harbor street, near Ontario street.

Wood avenue, from St. Catherine to Western is also closed for sewer work in connection with the subway.

## WE SAY

### Traffic still moves through

WITH Montreal pouring more and more traffic into Westmount at the dinner-time rush hour and with one of the four major arteries closed for subway construction it is remarkable how smoothly the traffic moves.

Of course since the closing of Western at the beginning of the month there have been no heavy accident-causing snow storms during the peak period. And much credit must go to the extra traffic constables on duty during rush hour periods.

But the situation was never too bright for the motorist to begin with. Pedestrians often moved faster than traffic on east-west streets here. Many motorists are now frequently adding 10 minutes to the time for the homeward trip.

Consequently reports this week from Montreal Public Works Director Lucien L'Allier that work on Western avenue may take as long as 450 days, about three months longer than originally planned, are greeted with a sigh of deepening resignation . . . followed by a rush to lay in bulk supplies of bus tickets.

### Wrong accent is detected

ONE thing is sure: the disquietude between English-speaking Canadians and French-speaking Canadians will not be ended by an English-speaking native trying to act like his French compatriot. It would be just as reasonable to say that an English oak can be, or even look like, the roses of Picardy.

There is, and always will be, a difference between the Canadian of Anglo-Saxon origin and the Canadian of French origin. Can ne'er the twain meet? Perhaps, but it will be only on the foundation of mutual respect, and reciprocated affection.

The two races and the two languages have got to survive together if there is to be a Canada. The alterna-

## Westmount residents by choice

My reason is based on the following considerations concerning the nature and function of municipalities.

From the point of view of economics a municipality exists for the purpose of providing and administering certain types of local services (police and fire protection, water supply, streets and sewerage, etc.) which individuals cannot arrange for on their own.

Therefore, the only reason for one municipality merging with another is to achieve certain economies of scale through forming a large municipality to obtain better or more services at the same tax rates than before.

And even her two municipalities may enjoy the economies of scale in the supply of certain services through pooling their resources but without merging. For example two or more municipalities can contract to operate a common water works that none alone could afford to operate.

Applying this general reasoning to Montreal and Westmount, I cannot see how the people of Westmount would obtain better municipal services at existing tax rates, or the same services at lower rates, by merging with Montreal. If there is any area of service such as in traffic or transportation where benefits would be achieved by Westmount and Montreal combining, then let it be done by cooperation — not political merger.

For I can see a great advantage to administrative efficiency by having several autonomous municipalities within a concentrated area such as the Island of Montreal. If people do not like the way a particular municipality is run they have a choice of moving to a neighboring municipality — a choice that is severely restricted when the number of municipalities is reduced to one.

There is only one. Chaos, confusion, bloodshed, unreasoning passion. Should not there be understanding? Is there a sharp-enough axe with which to chop down the English oak? Is there a chemical that can eat away the Quebec that is loved in the nine other provinces?

A false accent from outside Quebec is easy to detect.

# A sampling of public opinion on the annexation question

"I prefer our efficient, honest government by businessmen who are not self seekers. Despite Montreal's protestations, Westmount more than pays its own way, in a Metropolitan sense."

"With its system of mayor and aldermen not all being elected at one time and having a city manager directed by the mayor and aldermen, Westmount has had continuous good government for over 50 years. During this time Montreal has had many changes in its type of administration. Some of its administrators have been fair-

ly good, some bad and some indifferent."

"Should Westmount remain autonomous? This question borders on the idiotic to anyone who has lived in N.D.G. and then moved to Westmount. Municipal services alone in Westmount warrant perpetual autonomy."

Bill Dunlop

"I believe that Westmount should remain autonomous to ensure that we have responsible government. Drapeau is certainly responsible but his successor may not be. However, there should be more cooperation between the two governments — for example regular meetings every fortnight. Also our council meetings should be open to the public because right now the public of Westmount can find out more about Montreal's council meetings than those of Westmount."

"Autonomous . . . because Westmount can provide a more realistic, more efficient, cheaper civic government than Montreal can."

### Dirty streets and garbage

"Montreal is always in debt. Montreal is incapable of managing their own affairs; for example, dirty streets, garbage all over the place, snow removal (very poor), corruption? Montreal should mind its own damn civic affairs. Montreal has really nothing good to offer Westmount."

"Local needs are best understood by a small group. Let us retain clean government."  
"We have been residents of

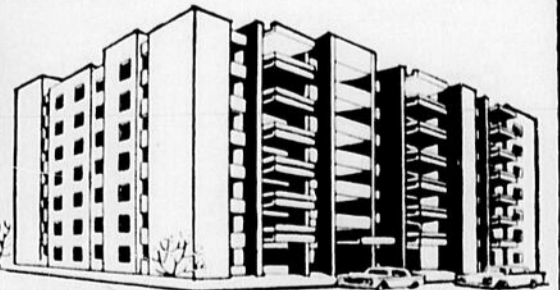

It was not announced which, if any, of the numerous suggestions for the park would be incorporated in the redevelopment program. Council has considered the placing of loud speakers in the park to provide piped-in music for Sunday concerts. Other plans included the construction of an illuminated fountain, another bandstand, and the use of shrubbery instead of fences to set apart certain areas.

It was noted earlier that while some relocation may be necessary, such popular features as the putting green and checker boards, will not be removed.
