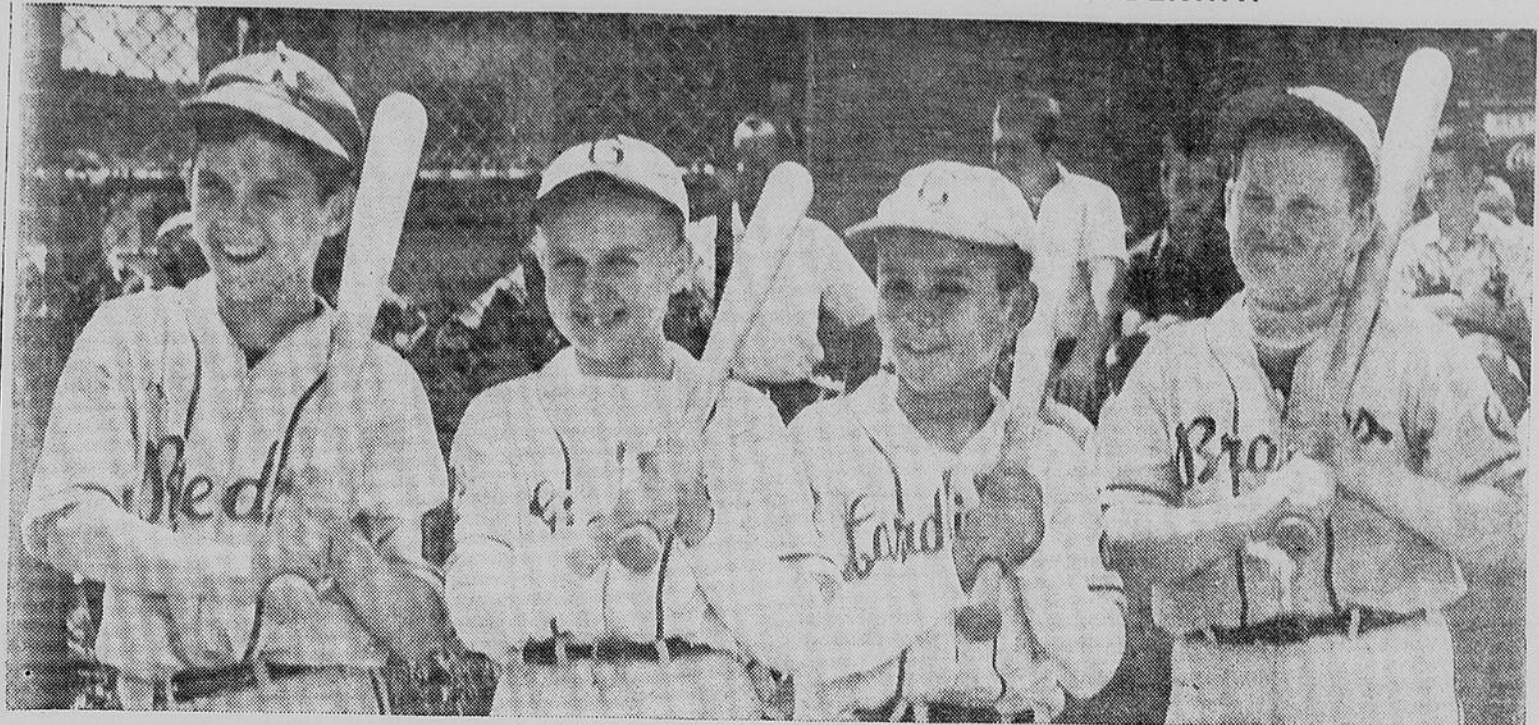
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Quevillon's Vote Ends Council Battle Over School Site

**BOYS HIGH SCHOOL
TO GO ON
EXHIBITION GROUNDS**

The political battle between Valleyfield's aldermen over the site for a new High school for boys in Valleyfield came to an end last Monday afternoon when Mayor Quevillon cast the deciding vote in a divided council and only the formal signing by the Valleyfield School Commission is now necessary. On a motion by Alderman Belanger, seconded by J. Degre and supported in the vote that followed by alderman Albert Marcell and Mayor Louis Quevillon it was decided to offer for sale to the School Commission a site which now forms part of the Exhibition grounds, for 15 cents per square foot. The piece of land concerned is 300 feet wide and 600 ft. deep and 15 situated between 200 feet from the Valleyfield Arena building and the grandstand on the Exhibition ground, and St. Thomas street and what will be the extension of Nicholson street. Nicholson will have to be extended through what is now the main gate of the exhibition ground. The acceptance by the School Comm. of this offer is almost a certainty as they wanted the new school on the Exhibition grounds in the first place.

The other three aldermen Leduc, Gagné and Lalonde wanted to offer the School Commission a site on the far end or South side of the Exhibition ground. Alderman Leduc and Gagné had originally proposed a site near the St. Ignatius School in Belleville. However, the School Commission informed the Council before Monday's special meeting that it much preferred a site on the exhibition grounds.

BEACH DECISION WED., JUNE 10th

While a "BUILD A BEACH" campaign is going on full steam ahead behind the scenes in Valleyfield, no definite decision will be taken by the City Council until its meeting of Wednesday, June the 10th.

In the meantime the Aquatic Activities Committee of the Club Nautique reports that some 400 children have already been registered for the swimming courses planned for this summer. This is double the total number that took the course during all of last year. It is expected that many more will register once the lessons get underway. The interest in these courses clearly reflects the need for adequate swimming facilities, such as are envisaged in the beach plans, for the Valleyfield area.

VALLEYFIELD BLOOD DONORS CLINIC NEXT TUES. AND WED.

The Blood Donors Clinic Committee of the Valleyfield Red Cross Branch is asking the residents of this city to give some 1,000 pints of blood on Tuesday

and Wednesday, June 9 and 10, of next week.

On Tuesday and Industrial Clinic will be held at the Montreal Cottons sponsored by the

St-Lawrence Valley Foremen's Club. However, the committee wants to make it clear that anyone is more than welcome to come to the plant to give blood even although he or she is not in industry. Times are from 1 p.m. — 5 p.m. and from 7 p.m. to 10 p.m.

On Wednesday, June 10th the Mayors Clinic will be held with M. Louis Quevillon no doubt donating some of the first pints of blood. This clinic is being held at the Knights of Columbus Hall also from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. and from 7 to 10 p.m.

Last year only some 728 pints of blood were donated in two clinics while the Hotel Dieu Hospital used close to 1,000 pints of blood. This means that the more than 200 pints which were short had to come from elsewhere. Surely Valleyfield has enough "red blooded" citizens to keep its own hospital supplied with blood!

In charge of this year's Clinic are Mrs. H. L. Nixon and Mr. Gunnar Oleson with of course Mr. Harris Buttress, as president of the Valleyfield Red Cross Branch acting for the Red Cross.

2 DIE IN HEAD ON COLLISION

M. H. VALLEYFIELD NEEDS 1,000 PINTS OF BLOOD

EDITORIAL — 1,000 Pints of blood are needed in Valleyfield

This year the Blood Donors Clinic in Valleyfield, to be held on June 9th and 10th is aiming for an all time high of 1,000 pints of blood which for a city, the size of Valleyfield, is really not an exaggerated objective. This objective is based on the needs of our own hospital, Hotel Dieu, which last year used almost 1,000 pints of blood.

The Canadian Red Cross collects and distributes blood for hospitalized patients in the ten Provinces of Canada. It is estimated that the potential requirements for blood is slightly more than 600,000 pints a year. In the Province of Quebec 150,000 bottles are required.

In case of a sudden disaster, such as a plane crash, a train wreck, or a great fire, dozens or scores of pints of blood may be needed quickly at the site of emergency. In the

event of all-out-war or the bombing of one of our cities, thousands of pints of blood might be needed.

It is estimated that for the patients who need blood to survive, the average use is six pints of whole blood and more than three pints of plasma. Some need less than this amount; some need much more. Because whole blood has a usable life of only 21 days, the nation's needs for whole blood must be met on a day-to-day basis. In this Province the minimum requirements are 2,400 pints per week.

The blood needs are met by the response of donors who understand the necessity of contributing to the Red Cross blood bank. There would be no shortage of blood if healthy Canadians between the ages of 18 and 65 donated one pint of blood each year for someone who is ill. But a person can safely give blood three to four times a year.

"WORK... OR GET OUT"

High school teachers are too familiar with the type of student described as a "seat-warmer." Much of the difficulty in dealing with him springs from the fact that he is not usually the obnoxious type, but represents a hard core of "students of good capacity" who simply possess a rooted determination not to work.

This student type has, moreover, frequently figured as a kind of campus hero, and his "passive resistance to education" has been both demoralizing to teachers and a corroding influence on the entire student body.

The Calgary School Board has found a way of coping with this problem, which in the last five or six years has succeeded in stripping the halo of respectability from low-pass or failing grades. The Board has adopted the slogan "Work—or get out!"

The Calgary method has attracted wide attention both in Canada and the United States. Recently in Toronto, the man who engineered it, Robert Warren, Calgary's superintendent of schools explained how it works.

Once a student is identified as a seat-warmer, his parents receive warning by letter in October. Should he show no improvement, further warn-

ing letters are sent in December and January. In February, a letter announces the student's dismissal.

The dismissal is open to appeal; moreover, the final letter points out that the student may return in September if he is willing to work. About 50 per cent of those dismissed come back, and of these "about half make good."

Much more emphasis needs to be laid on the fact that going to school means — primarily — a dedication to honest work.

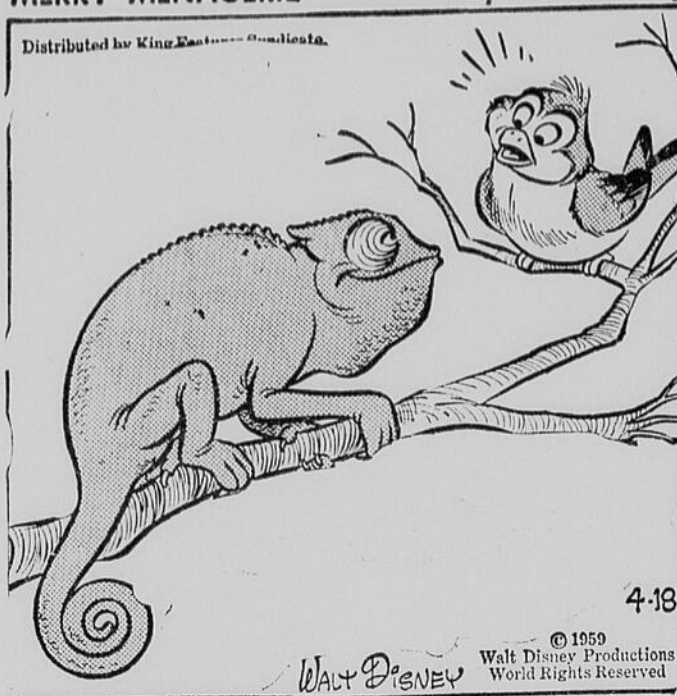

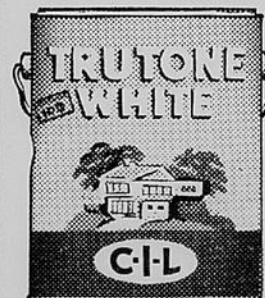

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Five Day Week For Local Milkmen Probable In Fall

Local Dairy man, Paul Charette was recently elected Vice President of the Milk Dealers Association of the Province of Quebec at this organization's annual convention in Quebec City. Mr. Charette has been a director of this organization for a number of years and has represented the Valleyfield-Beauharnois-Huntingdon-Chateaugay area. This year's president is Jean Royer of the Borden Milk Co. of Quebec City.

One of the interesting discussions at the convention concerned a suggestion to change from the present 6 day work and delivery week to a 5 day week and a 5 day delivery week, with no delivery on Wednesday. This would be necessary in order to keep the milk price down at its present level. In Montreal the milk producers also have a 5 day work week but delivery on 6 days resulting in a price increase. There is a good possibility the 5 day work and delivery week will be implemented this fall. The milk distributors have been under pressure from the employees for some time to shorten their work week.

Prov. Safe Driving Road-E-O June 6th

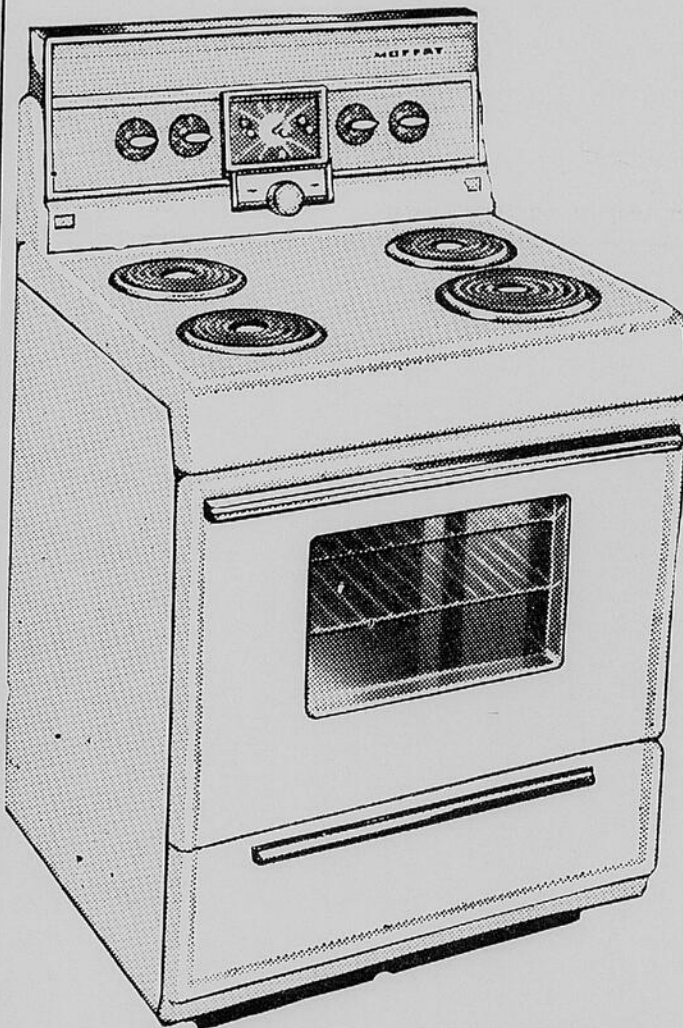

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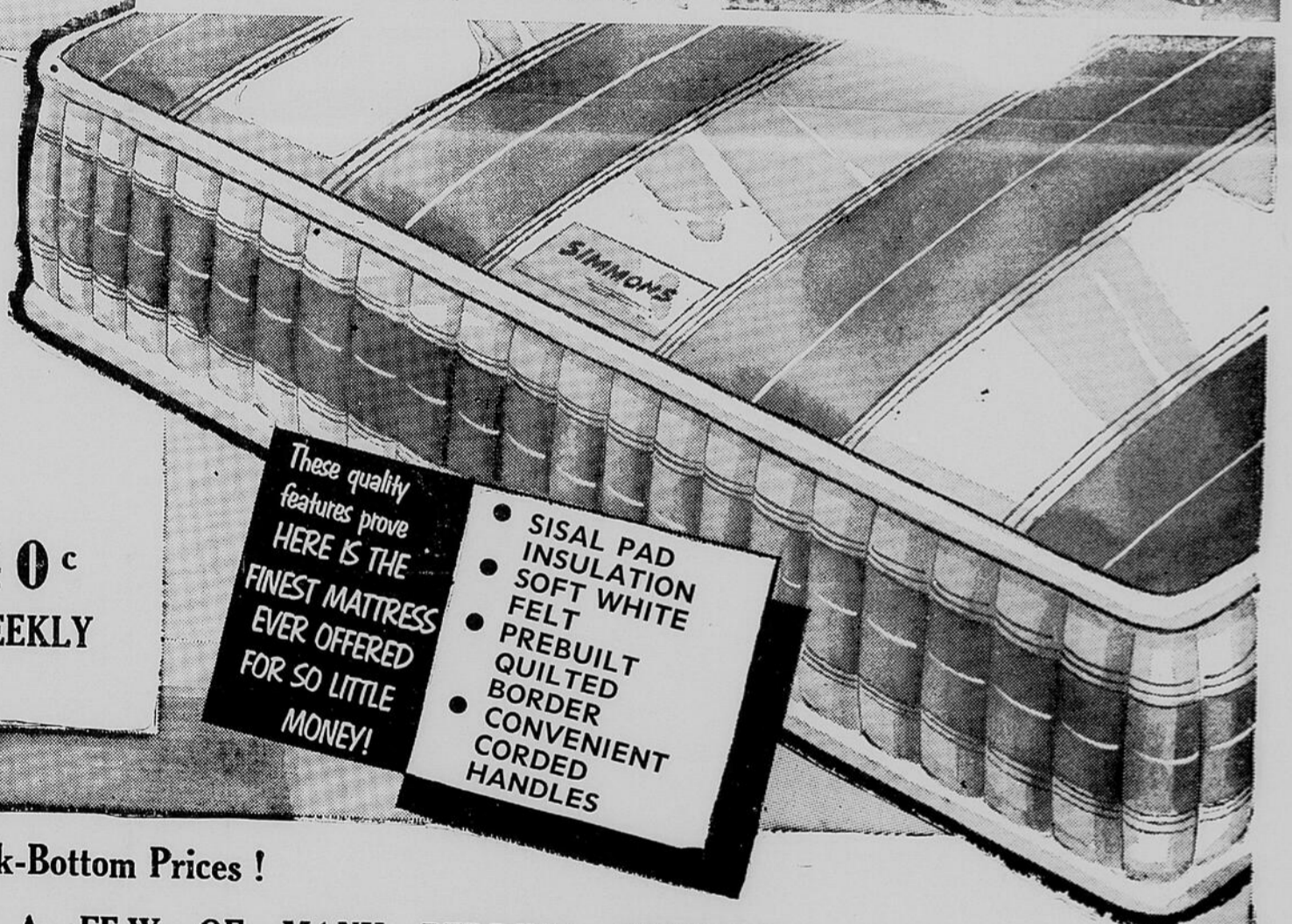

He is now employed by Montreal Engineering Co. Ltd., on the Hart Janne Hydro Power Project.

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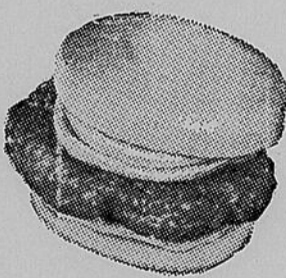
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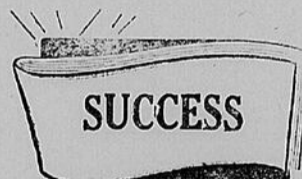
