World News In Brief

Johannesburg — (P) — The South African government lifted price controls on a wide variety of articles Friday. The list of goods affected includes cigarettes, sweets, many groceries, radios, refrigerators, jewelry, electrical appliances, imported books, cameras, sports goods, nuts and bolts.

London — (P) — Natives of Britain's tiny Gilbert and Ellice Islands in the western Pacific have offered 2,000 volunteers for service with British forces in Korea or Malaya, it was announced Friday. Colonial Secretary Oliver Lyttelton sent a message to the islanders expressing Britain's deep appreciation "for this very loyal offer of service but regretting that it is not possible on practical and administrative grounds to accept it."

Buenos Aires — (P) — Police Friday night announced the arrest of a former lawyer for the British railroads in Argentina as a suspected bomb plotter. The lawyer, Domingo Negues Acuna, was accused of engaging in subversive activities since 1945 along with other railway lawyers. The British companies have been in process of liquidation since 1948 when Argentina nationalized the lines.

Berlin — Reuters — A record 3,793 East Germans fled to West Berlin Friday, most of them driven by hunger. An official said "many of them first ask for bread and then for registration as political refugees."

Bonn — (P) — The West German cabinet Friday approved a draft law providing for payment of damages totalling about 4,000,000,000 marks (\$952,000,000) to several hundred thousand persons, mostly Jews, persecuted by the Nazis.

Scots Abandon Fight For Isle

Edinburgh — (Reuters) — The Scots are giving the Island of Soay back to the sea.

The entire population of the tiny Hebridean islet, 27 hardy Scotsmen and their wives and children, have given up the fight to make their way on the barren rock after centuries of struggle.

They and their 27 cattle will move en masse to the Isle of Mull June 18th and Soay will be left to the sea gulls.

The land is rocky and arid; the lobster catches are getting smaller every season. The islet is three miles long and two miles wide at its widest point. It lies a mile off the southern shore of Ekye in the inner Hebrides. But the population is moving to Mull, 40 miles to the south.

The move was announced Friday by the department of agriculture, which arranged it, and is leaving the bill.

The department has bought a 218-acre estate in the Craignure district of Mull, and has set up an apartment block there. The estate has arable land for crops and grazing, with good prospects for forestry and fishing.

The islanders asked to be moved. Their living was less than precarious; the school had been closed; the nearest doctor was across the water in Skye; and there were only just enough hands to man the ferry-boat.

Queen Attends Final Event Of Pre-Coronation Program

London — (P) — The Queen, bubbling with joy, danced late at a pre-coronation ball and didn't get home until 4 a.m. this morning.

Only 100 persons still were waiting outside Buckingham Palace in the cold dawn light to cheer the monarch as she returned from the dance at Hampton Court Palace, the same place where her ancestor, King Henry VIII, held his revels 400 years ago.

There had been 20,000 wildly cheering Britons gathered about as the Queen left for the ball with the Duke of Edinburgh and Princess Margaret.

The Queen brought her sister home with her, Margaret, who didn't have a date, popped into the palace for a minute and then drove on to her own residence, Clarence House.

With the strenuous routine of coronation just three days off, the Queen made no engagements for today and planned to rest and take things easy. Palace sources said she and the Duke might run down to Windsor for a breath of air, but would otherwise stay quietly at home.

The ball was given for the Queen by the Brigade of Guards. Radiant in pink and white chiffon with a diamond tiara and necklace, she opened the festivities by dancing with the commander of the Household Brigade, Maj. Gen. Julian Gascoigne.

Mishaps At Coronation Traditional

London — (P) — The earl marshal of England, in charge of Coronation arrangements, probably is keeping his fingers crossed about next Tuesday. Few coronations have gone off without a hitch.

Victoria, the last Queen to be crowned, wrote in her diary that the ring used in the ceremony was too small and hurt her finger, and Lord Rolle tripped up the steps while doing homage and she helped him up. At another point she wrote: "The archbishop came in and ought to have delivered the orb to me, but I had already got it and he, as usual, was so confused and puzzled and knew nothing and went away."

The enthronement of George III was probably the most riotous of all. The deputy earl marshal mislaid the sword of state. The clatter of plates and knives among the hungry nobility nearly drowned out the sermon. By the time the five-hour ceremony was over, it was too dark to see the procession. There had been a strike among workmen at Westminster Hall so that places weren't properly allotted. A fight went on for precedence and there were no chairs for the King or Queen.

At the banquet, the horse of the lord high steward backed into the hall to cheer from the guests. Several guests couldn't reach the tables and women in the gallery lowered knotted handkerchiefs to pull up a chicken or bottle of wine. The red-faced deputy earl marshal assured the King the next coronation would be better rehearsed. The King, apparently, instead of being angry, got a bang out of the whole affair.

At early coronations, in the ninth century, the king was carried to his throne by tossing him at time into the air.

Edward left his banquet guests after his enthronement in 950 to smooch in an ante-chamber with a young widow. The crown had been tossed into a corner. Edward was ferreted out and dragged back to his guests.

John of Magna Carta fame, apparently tipsy, took his coronation in 1199 as a huge joke, laughed so hard he dropped the lance and then refused the sacrament.

At the Charles I coronation, the royal barge ran aground. The crown was too big for James II and sagged over his forehead and a noble fell off his charger while dismounting in front of the banquet hall.

The rings for William and Mary became transposed and when William was to put money in the collection plate it was found his purse had been stolen. Mary had no money.

George IV borrowed horses from a circus for his coronation. Lord Anlesley let a brown fall off a cushion but made a one-handed catch inches from the ground. George refused to let his wife into Westminster Abbey. She came anyway but didn't have a ticket and was refused admission.

If the present earl marshal, the Duke of Norfolk, has nightmares about June, they probably deal with lesser calamities.

In 1947 Mr. and Mrs. Walker returned to Canada. Another novel, "Digby," is scheduled for publication this fall.

Born in Prescott, Ont., 52 years ago, Bruce Hutchison was taken to British Columbia as a small child and his boyhood was spent near Victoria. A newspaper man, he has been a member of the press gallery at Ottawa and prior to joining the Victoria Daily Times was for some years associate editor of the Winnipeg Free Press.

He had several short stories published in leading United States magazines and a novel, "The Hole Low Men," published in 1944, was chosen by the book-of-the-month club. In 1950 another book, "The Fraser," was published in the Rivers of America series.

Mr. Creighton, winner of the academic non-fiction award, is already well-known as the author of "Dominion of the North," "A History of Canada," "The Commercial Empire of the St. Lawrence, 1760-1850" and "British North America at Confederation."

Born and educated in Toronto and at Balliol College, Oxford, he returned to his native city to join the department of history at the University of Toronto. In 1951 he was awarded the Royal Society of Canada's Tyrrell Medal for historical writing.

Dr. Pratt, winner of the poetry award, is a native of Newfoundland. After a brief time spent in elementary school teaching he carried on his studies at the University of Toronto. He accepted an academic appointment at Victoria College in 1919. He has remained at the college ever since, the inspiration of thousands of undergraduates.

Before writing "Toward the Last Spike" Professor Pratt produced seven books of verse.

Acting Prime Minister Of South Korea Voices Bitterness On Talks.

Seoul — (AP) — The acting prime minister of South Korea today threatened to pull RoK divisions from the United Nations command, freeing them for independent military action, if negotiators sign an armistice based on the latest Allied proposal.

Pyun Yung Tai told newspaper men South Korea also is prepared to use its army to block any landing of troops from five neutral countries to guard Red prisoners of war who refuse to go home.

"In order to block these attempts . . . we are ready to use our armed forces and we would even be willing to shed blood in fighting them," Pyun said.

Literary Awards Are Announced

Toronto. — (P) — A Scottish-Canadian who got "the writing bug" while in a German prison camp today was named winner of Governor-General's Literary Award for fiction for 1952.

Author of "The Pillar," the prize-winning novel, is David Walker, 42-year-old former British Army officer who settled in the quiet resort town of St. Andrews, N.B., five years ago.

Announcement of the fiction prize and four other annual awards was made by Dr. Frank Stilling, chairman of the awards board of the Canadian Authors Association. The award for creative non-fiction went to Bruce Hutchison, editor of the Victoria Daily Times, for his biography of the late W. L. Mackenzie King — "The Incredible Canadian." His classic book, "The Unknown Country" won him a similar prize in 1943. A week ago the biography of the former prime minister won for Mr. Hutchison the University of British Columbia medal for a popular Canadian biography.

Donald Creighton, Toronto, won the award for academic non-fiction with his latest book, "John A. Macdonald, the Young Politician." Professor of history at the University of Toronto, Mr. Creighton is a well-known author.

Dr. E. J. Pratt, professor emeritus of English at Victoria College, University of Toronto, was awarded the poetry prize for "Toward the Last Spike," during his long career Dr. Pratt has won many medals for literary achievements. The award in the juvenile class went to Marie McPhedran, wife of a Toronto doctor, for "Cargoes on the Great Lakes."

Mr. Walker, winner of the fiction award, grew up in Fife, Scotland. He went to military college at Sandhurst and in 1931 joined the Black Watch and later spent five years in India.

He first came to Canada in 1938 as aide-de-camp to the late Lord Tweedsmuir, then governor-general. A year later he married Wilma Magee of Montreal and the couple have three sons.

After war broke out he rejoined his regiment and was captured at Dunkerque in 1940 and spent the rest of the war in German prison camps. Subsequently he went to India as controller to the late Lord Wavell, then viceroy of India.

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South Korea's rebellion against the UN truce proposal mounted steadily as the time neared for negotiators to return to Panmunjom Monday after a week-long recess. The Communists are expected to answer the proposal handed to them in secret session last Monday.

The Reds were reported to have turned down at least part of the plan on the spot, but silence from the Peiping Red radio indicated to some observers that high-level discussions may be under way.

United States diplomats and officers of the UN command were said to be deeply concerned over the bitter South Korean revolt. One source said Allied officials are devoting every effort to quiet the clamor before negotiations are resumed.

Ellis O. Briggs, U. S. Ambassador to South Korea, flew Saturday to the Republic of Korea naval base at Chinhae near Pusan where, with President Sungman Rhee, he will attend naval academy graduation exercises.

Briggs had been dealing directly with the 78-year-old Rhee and has conferred with him at least twice since the Allied proposal was given to the Communists.

Pyun's warning of possible bloodshed if "foreign troops" land in South Korea to guard prisoners followed a similar threat from Maj. Gen. Choi Duk Shim, South Korea's delegate to the UN truce delegation.

In a letter delivered Friday to Lt. Gen. William K. Harrison, senior Allied negotiator, Choi said he could not assure the Allies that there will be "no unexpected violent actions" against such troops.

Rhee and other South Korean officials have threatened to fight on alone if the UN agrees to any armistice which leaves Korea divided.

The UN proposal for breaking the long deadlock over prisoner exchange, last major barrier to a truce, has not been made public officially. But irate South Korean officials have divulged many details.

The plan reportedly provides that all of the 48,500 North Korean and Chinese prisoners who refuse to go home will be turned over in Korea to a commission comprising India, Switzerland, Sweden, Poland and Czechoslovakia.

The Reds then would be given 90 days to try to change the

Canadian Onslaught On London Should Reach Its Peak Today

London — CP — The Canadian onslaught on Coronation London should reach its peak today.

After a full-dress rehearsal Friday at its camp at Pirbright, Surrey, the Canadian services contingent arrives by train here today to pitch tents at Earls Court and Kensington Gardens.

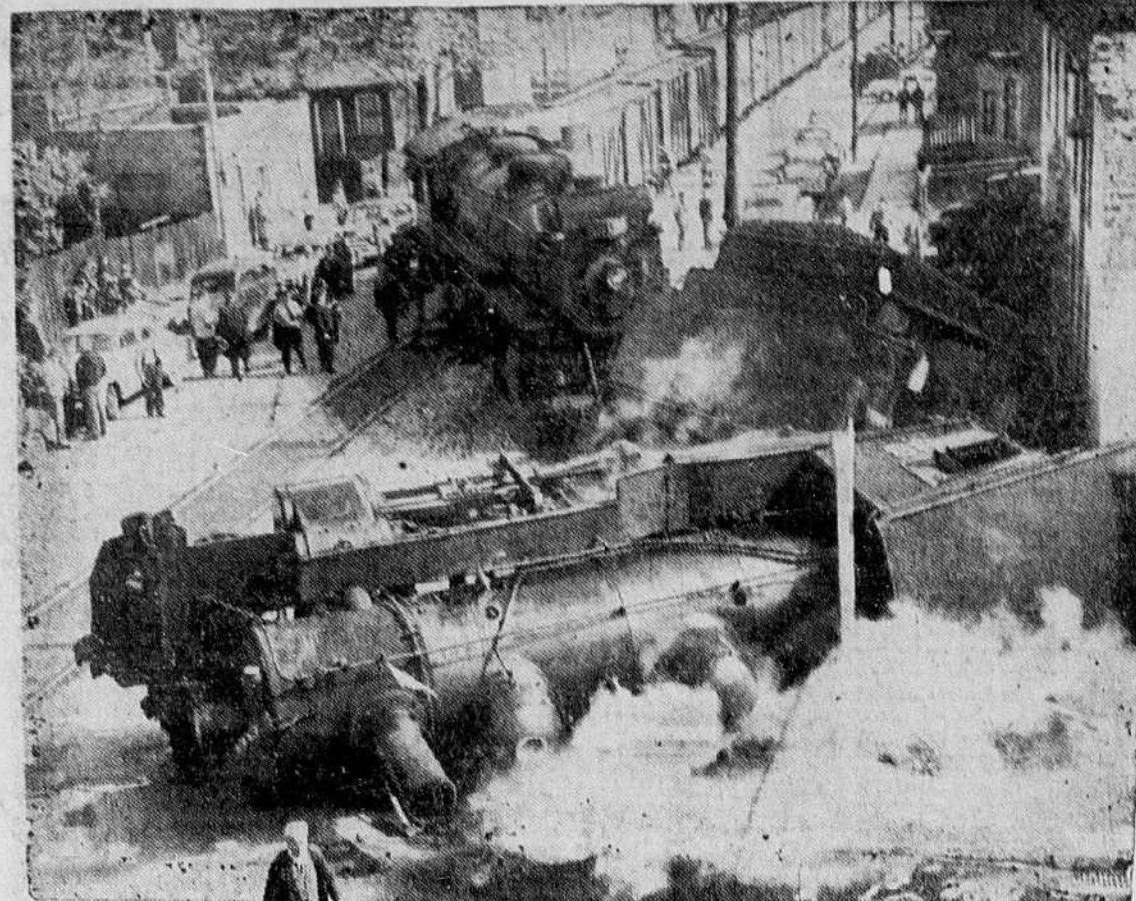
The marchers in the Coronation parade will bivouac at Earls Court and the troops who will line the route near Canada House in Trafalgar Square will bed down in Kensington Gardens, along with some 16,000 other Commonwealth and colonial troops.

Three Canadian navy warships, the destroyer Sioux and frigates Swansea and La Hulloise, sail up the Thames today for anchorages near London. They have a series of parties and receptions scheduled. The other Canadian ships which will participate in the Royal naval review June 15—the carrier Magnificent and the cruisers Quebec and Ontario—are berthed at Portsmouth.

Prime Minister St. Laurent Friday took part in a 2½-hour Coronation rehearsal in Westminster Abbey and later attended a reception at Canada House for Commonwealth parliamentarians. Norman Robertson, Canadian high commissioner, and Mrs. Robertson were the hosts.

Today St. Laurent will take in the Caledonian Games at White City Stadium. Canada's RCMP pipe band will be on hand from No. 1 fighter wing at North Luf-fenham. Saturday night, St. Laurent will attend a British government reception.

Reds Grimly Hold Newly-Won Positions Against Allied Plane And Gun Attacks

Captain Says Reds Moved At Gunpoint

Hong Kong — (Reuters) — The captain of the 3,221-ton Panamanian ship Perico today agreed with Senator Joseph McCarthy of Wisconsin that he had worked for the Chinese Communists, but only at the point of a gun.

McCarthy's Senate investigations sub-committee said in a report published two days ago that British ships, including the Perico, had carried Chinese Communist troops since the outbreak of the Korean war.

Wallem and Company Limited, Hong Kong owners of the Perico, said the ship carried 462 uniformed Chinese Communists 300 miles along the China coast in June, 1951.

The master said he was threatened if he did not carry the soldiers "somebody would be shot."

The captain, unnamed in the shipping company's statement, said the soldiers were in uniform but wore insignia or rank badges. He said his passengers were allowed to be sick. They were guarded by about 12 armed Communists.

He took them from Kwong Chow, south China, to Canton, south China capital, June 22, then he loaded rice, the ship's normal cargo, and eventually returned to Hong Kong.

"On the vessel's first return to Hong Kong, the master gave a full report on the incident to the Hong Kong commissioner of police and we understand that copies were sent to local naval authorities and to the colonial secretariat," the statement added.

Fifth air force fighter-bombers and twin-engine B-26 bombers roared over the western front today, dropping almost 200,000 pounds of bombs before noon.

B-29 Superforts bombed a North Korean dam north of Pyongyang Friday night in an attempt to loose flood waters over main Communist supply routes. Fourteen Superforts hit a big earth-fill dam at Kijong, on the Hamchong river, but were unable to observe results, the air force said.

An 8th army briefing officer said fighting still raged around two outposts on the east-central front. South Korean soldiers counter-attacked repeatedly in an attempt to drive Chinese soldiers off the strategic hills near Finger Ridge and Bloody Ridge.

Sketchy reports from the front listed more than 1,000 Chinese casualties in the continuing battle.

Among Canadians arriving Friday was Chief William Scow of the British Columbia Kwakiwilt Nations Indian tribe. He wore a brightly-colored Chilkat blanket, Koolas headdress and carried a ceremonial raven rattle. Field Marshall Earl Alexander, British defence minister, and former Canadian governor-general, is honorary chieftain of Chief Scow's tribe.

Other arrivals were members of a Canadian women's golf team which will compete in the British Open and in matches against England, Scotland, Wales and Ireland. The seven members include Captain Ada Mackenzie, Toronto, Dainty Chisholm, Montreal and Mrs. Graeme Pyke, Hudson Heights, Que.

All plan to see the Coronation. One of the shortest trips to the Coronation by Canadians is to be made by two undergraduates of Oriel College, Oxford, Tom Harpur and Ron Watts. They plan to canoe down the Thames, starting tonight, and camp by the riverbank at night in sleeping bags.

Among Empress of France arrivals at Liverpool Friday were 50 girls in Canadian industrialist Garfield Weston's annual party to Britain. They were dressed alike in neat blue tailored suits. This afternoon at Marlborough House, the Duke and Duchess of Gloucester will receive Commonwealth Coronation service contingent members of regiments allied to those British regiments of which the Duke is colonel-in-chief.

Seoul. — (P) — Chinese Communists clung grimly to three battered outposts near Panmunjom today as Allied big guns and planes poured tons of explosives and blazing napalm on the smoking, shell-torn hills.

The Red wrested outposts Vegas, Carson and Elko from United States and Turkish infantry in a division-strength assault which opened Thursday night along a five-mile front only 30 miles north of Seoul.

Fighting continued on the east-central front where the Reds seized several outposts Wednesday night in a 6,500-man attack along a 20-mile front defended by South Korean infantry.

There have been no official casualty reports from either battle yet, but losses on both sides were believed high.

Turkish officers estimated the Chinese lost 3,000 killed and wounded in the 28-hour battle for the low hills which guard the invasion route to Seoul and the main Allied defence line.

Lt. Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor, 8th army commander, said Communist capture of the three outposts did not threaten the UN main line. He said the Red attacks so far were local engagements rather than a general offensive.

British troops of the Duke of Wellington Regiment hurled back two Red battalions of about 1,500 men, which attacked the Hook, another strategic outpost about 12 miles east of Panmunjom.

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Seeks Post As Premier Of France

Paris — (P) — Deputy Pierre Mendes-France, who believes military expenses must be trimmed sharply to give France a sound economy, Friday accepted an invitation from President Vincent Auriol to try to form a new French government.

A 46-year-old Radical Socialist known as a financial and economic expert, he will go before the National Assembly next week, perhaps Wednesday, to seek investiture as premier.

The Radical Socialists, despite their name, form a middle-of-the-road party that draws much of its support from farmers and small businessmen. It is the party of Rene Mayer, whose coalition government was ousted May 21 on a vote of confidence over Mayer's request for power to cut governmental expenses by decree.

Mendes-France declared in a finance committee session Thursday the situation is graver than we have been told up to now, and demanded that the nation be advised fully of the financial crisis that finding expenses exceeding income by billions of francs yearly. He will have a chance to do this in asking the assembly to confirm his nomination for premier.

As a student of French economic affairs, Mendes-France has declared many times that a sound economy must be the starting point for the nation's other efforts.

Any drastic slash would affect France's commitments as a member of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization and the effectiveness of her defence against communist Ho Chi Minh's Vietnam in Indo-China. Some of Mendes-France's statements have suggested a belief that an approach should be made for negotiation of an armistice in Indo-China, where seven years of war have led only to a deadlock.

From London to Goose Bay, Labrador, her flying time was eight hours and 21 minutes, slow compared to the continent-to-continents record established by the British Canberra jet bomber—four hours 38 minutes—but then the four-engine Comet wasn't trying for any record. She was just cruising at 420 miles an hour, a good 200 below her top.

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State Ball Will Mark Coronation

Ottawa — (P) — A tradition comes to life again here June 2. The first state ball in almost 40 years will be held at Government House to mark the Coronation.

The governor-general has revived this social ceremony of bygone days to climax Coronation Day celebrations in the capital. About 700 Ottawa residents have been invited to dine and dance at Rideau Hall.

The origins of this formal social function are obscure. So also are records of previous state balls. However, six and possibly seven similar balls were given by previous governors-general to celebrate special events. The last is believed to have been in June, 1914, given by the Duke of Connaught.

State balls are strictly formal affairs with guests invited on the basis of a table of precedence beginning with the governor-general and listing the prime minister, cabinet ministers, lieutenant-governors, senior churchmen, judges, members of Parliament, senators, senior officers of the armed forces and top government officials.

However, this ball will vary the procedure. Many of those who would ordinarily be invited are in England for the Coronation. Accommodation is limited at Rideau Hall so only Ottawa residents will be invited.

About two-thirds of the 700-odd guests are included in the table of precedence. The other guests will be prominent Ottawans in business, social and church life.

Most members of Parliament and senators will not receive an invitation because their permanent residence is in the constituency they represent in Parliament. This procedure also rules out the lieutenant-governors of the provinces, members of provincial legislatures and judges of provincial courts.

Even then Rideau Hall will be crowded. Most of the ground floor rooms and the rolling lawns of the old, freestone building will be used by guests. They will dance to fox trots and waltzes played by the band of the Governor-General's Foot Guards, an Ottawa regiment.

The ball begins at 9:45 p.m. with the appearance of the governor-general, and ends about 1 a.m. when he retires.

He receives the guests in a room adjoining the ball room. From the reception line, guests move into the cream-and-gold ball room or one of the half-dozen smaller rooms adjoining, there to chat with friends or listen to the music.

Later in the evening, the doors separating the ball room from a large adjoining room

Jazz Saxophonist And Band Featured At Arena To-Night

Illinois Jacquet, who comes to the Arena tonight, the renowned "Dynamo of the Saxophone," was born and raised in Houston, Texas, his first name of Illinois to the contrary. His full given name is Illinois Battiste Jacquet and he's one of four Jacquet brothers, all of whom played in the same band in Houston.

Illinois, who has been acclaimed as the most exciting instrumentalist of all time, is often referred to as the mighty mite of the saxophone for he's just five feet, six inches tall. In spite of the fact that he's only 25 years old, he can be called a veteran musician for he started tooting his sax at the age of nine and at the age of 18 was a star sax soloist with Lionel Hampton's band.

While attending Phyllis Wheatly High School in Houston, Illinois played in a family band that included his brothers Russell on trumpet, Louis on sax and Linnton at the drums. Brother Russell is presently the featured trumpet soloist with Illinois high-flying Sextette, which was enlarged to eight men a year ago but still carries the original sextette billing.

After playing with a number of local bands in his native Texas, Jacquet headed for California in 1941 to enroll at Los Angeles City College. By way of paying the costs of his college tuition, he worked nights with several small bands in Los Angeles, and in 1942 was covered by Lionel Hampton's band, who offered him a lucrative job with his band and thus ended Jacquet's search for a higher education. His exciting tenor sax solo on the Hampton record of "Flyin' Home" for Decca brought him fame as a star instrumentalist.

Following two years with Hampton, Illinois was featured with the bands of Cab Calloway and Count Basie. During his stay with Basie, he established himself as the peer of all jazz saxophonists with his exciting solos on the Basie records of "Mutton Leg" and "The King" for Columbia. In 1946 he went on tour as the star of the Norman Granz "Jazz At The Philharmonic" jazz concerts and built such a tremendous following that he set out with his own outfit in January, 1947 and a short time later was signed to an RCA Victor recording contract.

Jacquet is famed for his upper register, sax-ootin', which has been called the "Supersonic Sound." He has the highest range of any tenor saxophonist and demonstrates this in such RCA Victor Records as "King Jacquet," "Jet Propulsion" and "Mutton Leg."

Jacquet holds the all-time attendance record for a jazz concert at New York's Carnegie Hall, having registered a gross of \$9800 in a concert there in November, 1948. He's regarded as the most potent box office attraction in the jazz field and has shattered attendance records in ballrooms, theatres and concert hall throughout the country.

Police Tell Of Violence By Strikers During Riots At Asbestos In 1949

"The men and women at the blockade were cursing us police. We had nuts and bolts thrown at us," Det. Paul Benoit, a special agent for the Provincial Police force said here yesterday during the Superior Court trial of eight Provincial Police officers who are facing an action totalling \$200,000 and taken by eight miners.

The miners, on strike at the Canadian Johns-Manville Company during 1949, are claiming \$25,000 each for false arrest, damage to their reputation, medical expenses and after effects.

The plaintiffs have concluded their evidence and they said that they were punched, slapped and some kicked by the Provincial Police.

Det. Benoit said that those forming the blockade were cursing the police, threw things at them, told them they were going to send them home, that they would smash their faces and that they would even kill them.

Det. Benoit told of how some of the miners, not on strike attempted to get out of the mine but could not. "They had to wait for extra police protection."

Det. Benoit said the barriers were comprised of cases of soft drinks and beer bottles. "Things quieted down from midnight to around 3 a.m. but there was always some commotion."

Det. Benoit admitted questioning several of those who had been arrested by the other police officers.

cers and said he knew that the police threw tear gas at the strikers.

Det. Benoit said he stayed at the Iroquois Hotel while in Asbestos and that he did not think that the hotel was being used as a Provincial Police headquarters. He said that the lobby of the hotel was filled, half with police and half with other persons.

Jean-Marie Grogier, Clerk of the Court, testified that the photos which he produced had been used in the trial of Rene Rocque, one of the organizers of the strike.

Rene Benoit, of Montreal, a photographer, said he took the photos produced with the exception of a couple which he mentioned and that they were taken in Asbestos. He took each photo, they were about 50, and described each one.

Laurent Olivier, 50, secretary-treasurer for the town of Asbestos, said that a curfew had been enforced between April 26 and May 7. He produced a document regarding the curfew. He also said that he had seen people in the basement of the church hall during the strike.

Two brothers, Adelard Thiboutot and Isidore Thiboutot, told of how they worked at the Canadian Johns-Manville on the first, second, third and fourth of May but were stopped about one mile from Asbestos on the 5th.

Adelard Thiboutot said he was beaten, had rocks thrown at him, was called a scab and spent four days in the St. Vincent de Paul Hospital in Sherbrooke recovering from wounds which he received in the scuffle.

Isidore Thiboutot said that his car was heavily damaged. "The windows were smashed, the wires were pulled out and the gang burned the car after they had turned it over." Both men said they had to flee from the gang to prevent further injury.

Lawyer Jacques Perrault, of Montreal, who with Theodore L'Esperance, of Montreal and Carrier Fortin, of Sherbrooke, are representing the plaintiffs, made an objection that anything which occurred other than on the 6th of May be not heard as evidence. The objection was taken under reserve and Leon Methot, Q.C., of Three Rivers, who with his son, Jean, are representing the police, continued with his questions.

Mr. Justice Antonio Garneau, of Montreal, is presiding.

The plaintiffs are: Gerard Chamberlain, Alfred Blanchette and Adelestin Lavalliere, of Thetford and Emile Grinard, Jean Noel Hamel, Joseph Beaudoin, Jeffrey Roux and Jean Paul Houle, of Asbestos.

The defendants include: Inspector General Norbert Labbe, Det. Charles Nadeau, Constable Leo Lefebvre, Sgt. Det. Alfred Gagne, Sgt. Det. Adrien Casavant, Lt. Traffic Officer Emile Constant, Det. Adrien Daniel and Lt. Det. Marcel Patenaude.

The trial has lasted five days so far and is expected to go on for several more days.

The case was adjourned yesterday afternoon until Wednesday morning. The courtroom was crowded yesterday as the interest in the case is mounting daily.

Judge Rules In Favor Of Belmont Spread

Judge Joseph Marier, in Court of Sessions here yesterday, ruled that grocer-butcher Julien Levesque, of Sherbrooke and Lennoxville, did not violate any provincial law by selling Belmont Spread.

Mr. Levesque, who was accused of selling Belmont Spread, indeed admitted that he had been doing so, said he did not advertise this product as a butter substitute.

In ruling in favor of Mr. Levesque, Judge Marier said that the prosecution had not proved that the product, made of lard, was a butter substitute. Judge Marier declared that the Lieutenant-Governor in Council had not decreed that Belmont Spread is a butter substitute. Armand Nadeau, Q.C., was defence counsel.

Special Services At Lennoxville This Sunday

At the evening service, the sermon deals with the growth and significance of the British nations and their unique responsibility and opportunity in a world of tension.

The subject of the sermon is "The Steep Places in Ignored History."

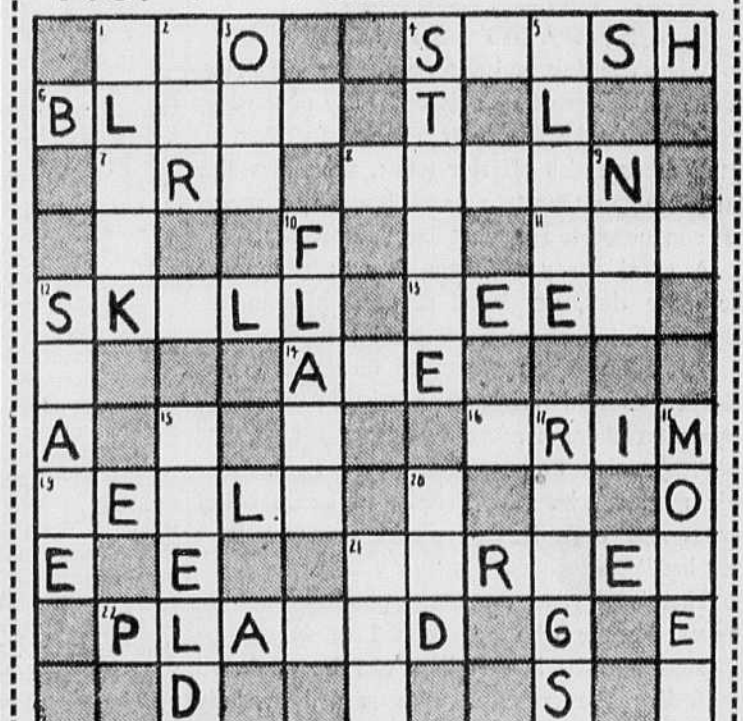

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DOES LITTLE FOR THE NEEDY

The carceral nature of Canada's old age pension scheme is indicated by the decision of the Toronto City Council to give pensioners special assistance with their rent. The city's welfare department will spend \$45,000 a year subsidizing rent of citizens who are living—or trying to live—wholly on Ottawa forty dollars a month.

Whole purpose of pension scheme, as announced, was to take away the "stigma" of public charity. Yet the aged are still dependant on public charity, for the simple reason that the pension is not nearly enough, by itself, to support them.

Remedy for this is not to increase the universal pension (now costing close to \$350 million a year) but to stop making it universal. If pensions were paid only to those who prove need they could be much higher; and the general pensions bill would be much lower. Same thing applies to family allowances which this year will pass the \$350 million mark. On the present shotgun basis, they do little for the poor and nothing for anybody else.

NEGOTIATIONS AND PUBLICITY

A commentator on the news declared the other day that too many reporters of the international scene were trying to treat negotiations between countries as they would a sporting event. They were always on the lookout to discover which country was beating the other country on the various phases of negotiations, he claimed.

The point he was making was that with all sides trying to make peace their goal, public interpretations of proceedings made in such a manner naturally impede progress, stirring up animosities unduly.

Those who agree with the point of view will find encouragement in the fact that no pronouncements followed the meeting of negotiators at Panmunjom on Sunday evening. The nature of United Nations proposals has not been revealed, and the communists will have a chance to bring back their answers after unpublished study by their men at top level.

In the history of international negotiations throughout the centuries, in days when leaders felt no sense of responsibility to the people they represented, the 20th Century problem of publicity presented no difficulties. On the other hand, the succession of negotiations that actually lead to wars and public misery might not look so ghastly in retrospect had they been braked, or impeded by public opinion of the day.

SYMPATHY MISPLACED

When the dust and shouting of the 1952 riots at Guelph reformatory subsided, fifty of the biggest troublemakers were transferred to other institutions to finish off their terms, none of which ran for longer than two years. Recently a survey was conducted to see what had become of them.

A good many of them, it was announced the other day, are back at Guelph Reformatory, convicted of fresh offences.

To make things worse at Guelph's Superintendent Gerald Wright reported that the prison population there is more vicious than ever, and less responsive to corrective punishment. "The only answer," he said, "seems to be in better homes and even better parents than we have ever had."

That is a good diagnosis, possibly—not an answer. People who are robbed or beaten by repeaters and by incorrigibles can be pardoned for feeling that parental cure is a beautifully gilded stable door; just a little late. Instead of wallowing in sentimental remorse about the psychological quirks of those who flout the community's laws and decency, isn't it time to spare a thought for their victims—for individuals who may be their victims? Is not the protection of the defenceless a highly important aspect of law?

Among the chief protests and alibis paraded by inmates after the famous Guelph riots were complaints about the food. Dietary shortcomings were at once corrected, and other "reforms" carried out in the reformatory. Far more attention was paid to this—as usual—than to the bigger quandary of how to curb vicious assaults and robberies now so prevalent. The correction that cries for consideration, remains uncorrected. It is the assailant, not the victim, who draws out wails of sympathy.

A prison sentence is a harsh process, but it is imposed to forestall something harsher. The law fails when it cannot protect those who rely on it for defence. New menus won't achieve reform. Protection of the public has been looked on for some time as a sort of whimsical aberration belonging to the nineteenth century, but if it is we don't seem to have come up with much of substitute.

VON RIBBENTROP'S TREASURE

The discovery by the police of Salzburg province of an ironbound box filled with golden ducats has revived the hopes of treasure hunters that the missing fortune of Von Ribbentrop may yet be discovered somewhere in the district.

Although the acquisitiveness of Goering and Hitler have been more talked about, the Reich's foreign minister, Joachim von Ribbentrop, let little plunder slip through his fingers. His interest lay more in precious metals than in art treasures.

During the war, Schloss Fuschl, on a lake near Vienna, became von Ribbentrop's favorite residence. Here, under the protection of a double cordon of black uniformed SS guards, he stored away much of his booty. Here, too, he watched the fortunes of his fuhrer and his fellow gangsters declining in 1944 and 1945. But when at last American troops occupied Schloss Fuschl, von Ribbentrop's fabulous gold hoard had vanished with the SS guards—or at least at the same time.

Recently a shabby individual aroused talk in Salzburg by offering here and there a gold ducat for the price of 600 shillings (approximately \$24). Although he professed to have only 20 ducats in all, police investigations revealed he had sold several times that amount, and led to the discovery of the ironbound chest.

Salzburgers, recalling that in 1945 a peasant plowed up a small chest of "Ribbentrop's gold" which was seized by the Allies as war booty, are now searching the grounds of Schloss Fuschl and the shores of the lake for further treasure. Some of it is believed to have been in the possession of one of the SS guards, who was found, apparently murdered in a near-by mountain stream in May 1945.

SOME DOUBT WILSON'S LOWER MANPOWER GOALS WILL LAST

Washington. — (NEA) — Defence Secretary Charles E. Wilson's plan to cut back the size of the U. S. armed forces and keep the draft call under 25,000 men a month may avoid—temporarily—what was becoming an exceedingly tight manpower squeeze.

This squeeze was developing from the fact that the number of men reaching draft age between 1950 and 1960 averages only a little more than a million a year. When physical and mental rejections are taken from this number, the figure is reduced by 20 per cent to around 800,000 eligible for service.

The low number of directly traceable to the depression years, when U. S. marriage and birth rates fell off sharply.

Beginning in 1960, the number of boys reaching 18 years of age will rise to 1,400,000. It will stay at this level for the next three years. In 1964 the number will rise to 1,600,000 and for the next two years it will be over 1,800,000.

This period will mark the end of the draft-age manpower shortage for whatever emergency may arise. But getting beyond the next seven years has been a cause for concern.

Until Secretary Wilson announced his recent cut of the U. S. armed services from a planned total of 3,647,000 to 3,356,000 and expressed his hope that the draft call could be kept under 25,000 a month, a number of drastic proposals were being considered.

They included lengthening the period of draft service from two to four years, lowering the selective service mental and physical standards still further, ending educational and occupational deferments and the drafting of young fathers.

On top of all these extreme measures there has always been in the background the possibility of putting in universal military training. General of the Armies Omar N. Bradley, U. S. Chief of Staff, put in a plug for UMT in an Armed Forces Day speech in Washington only a few days ago.

Congress is afraid of UMT. President Eisenhower now says he doesn't want it. Just the same, military men regard it as an ultimate necessity and the only way to make man do his duty to his country.

But Secretary Wilson's lowered military manpower goals have caused the politicians to have a great sigh of relief. While the majority of congressmen is against any weakening of U. S. defences, they are taken off an embarrassing spot by not having to vote for UMT or lengthened selective service or the ending of deferments.

The great unanswered question is whether this solution of Mr. Wilson's will last. It is the experience of draft board officials all over the country that when quotas are lowered, the recruiting of new volunteers and the re-enlistment of men already in the armed services fall off sharply.

Re-enlistments have already fallen off. Last year they averaged 12,000 a month. So far this year they have averaged only 12,000 a month.

The same thing has happened to recruiting. Last year the average of new recruits was 36,000 a month. So far this year the average is only 33,000 a month.

FEAR RECRUITING WILL FALL OFF

It is fear of some manpower officials that the cut in the draft quota—now announced as 23,000 a month for June and July—will further curtail recruiting and re-enlistments. If that happens it will, of course, be necessary to raise the draft quota again.

This is exactly what happened last summer and fall. In June, 1952, the draft quota was reduced to 10,000. For the next three months it had to be raised to 30,000 and for the last three months of the year to 47,000.

In the first three months of this year the number of inductees averaged 56,000 men a month. This big jump had to be made to replace the late 1950 and early 1951 inductees who completed their two years of service and did not re-enlist.

This situation had caused Dr. John A. Hannah, the new Assistant Secretary of Defence for manpower, to talk freely about how much better it would be if the selective service term could be raised to three or four years instead of the present two.

With nine months required to train a recruit, it gives only 15 months of active duty in a two-year service. From this fact it was deduced that one four-year enlistment man was worth two-and-a-quarter times as much as a two-year draftee.

The tight manpower situation had also caused Brig-Gen. Lewis B. Hershey to begin making speeches on the need for ending the deferment of what he called "prospective fathers."

All these things and others would be necessary if the U. S. armed forces have to be maintained at 3,700,000 or more men.



ELIZABETH the Queen

I am reminded of what someone near to the King told me about his feelings at the time of the Abdication.

King Edward VIII had forfeited his crown and thrown the country into a turmoil. Such a thing had not happened to Great Britain for hundreds of years, and it is true to say that there was no precedent to guide the Government's actions.

It was assumed that the next eldest son would automatically inherit the Throne. But some in high places questioned this. It was thought that Abdication was such a serious step it changed the course of normal things.

"Why thrust this Crown and its great responsibilities on a man whose every action through life has shown his dislike of publicity and love of the quiet life?" they said. "The Duke of York has no sons; he suffers a speech defect which make every public appearance an agony to him. Let us take the chance this whirlpool on our midst has given us to appoint the Duke of Kent King. He already has a son; he is a man whose temperament equips him more easily to take the center place in life. Spare the Duke of York a task which he must consider a burden."

But the King had too strong a sense of the duty he owed the country to take this easy way out. He remembered the pain in his eyes, the pallor this new responsibility cast over his features, which seemed suddenly to age.

His main concern, my friend told me, was not for the weight the Crown would place upon his shoulders, but the thought of the weight one day to be transferred to his elder daughter.

He was loath to condemn her to a lifetime of public servitude where she would have no peace and never be allowed the quiet domestic enjoyment which is every woman's birthright. Few people comprehend the rigorous routine thrust upon Royalty. Every moment of activity is planned far ahead.

In spite of the many restrictions put on the personal liberty of Royalty, such as their being unable to choose flat-heeled shoes for public appearances, or hats that would hide their faces, the last century has brought to them small freedoms denied to their grandparents.

One of these is the carrying about of handbags and money.

OUR QUEENS CORONATION

On Elizabeth II all eyes as well as tongues and hearts will be focussed on Tuesday June 2nd. For in Westminster Abbey that day the Archbishop of Canterbury, by the grace of God and Providence, will anoint and crown our Sovereign Lady Elizabeth II as Queen of Our Realm in succession to her father, the late King George VI of blessed memory.

A SACRED CEREMONY

Now the magnificent Coronation ceremony is basically a religious one yet there are those who only associate with it color, music, pageantry, romance, gaiety. Like a friend of mine who, before attending the 1937 coronation talked of things secular—entertainment, travel, exciting adventure. But on his return he delighted me with his observation that henceforth the coronation would always represent an act of mystic dedication set in the heart of the Holy Eucharist itself.

THE ANOINTING

What was true in 1937 holds true today for the Sovereign goes at the beginning of a new reign as

The days when a lady-in-waiting used to pay for any small thing that took the Royal fancy is over; both Princess Elizabeth and Princess Margaret carried bags and two or three pounds in ready cash like any ordinary girl or woman.

of us—is something that I have thought must be hard to bear if you are a woman.

Never for Princess Elizabeth the happy prowling round the stores comparing the prices, colors, and textures of the materials for a new coat or dress; not for her the quest to get calf or suede shoes to match exactly the color of her handbag, and the excitement that lasts through several days when the tricky piece of shopping is satisfactorily accomplished.

All that personal, exciting, challenging side of choosing a wardrobe was taken out of her hands by her dressmaker, shoemaker, and milliner.

I do not say that Queen Elizabeth does not choose her own clothes. Of course she does, but within circumscribed limits. She has to remember, for instance, that however much she might long to wear a certain color, she cannot do so if it is a shade that will get lost among a large crowd and so make it difficult for her to be easily and immediately seen by the loyal crowds who congregate wherever she is to make a public appearance, in the hope of catching a glimpse of her.

Jacoby On Bridge

STUDY THIS HAND: IT'S REAL TRICKY

The slam contract shown today seems to depend on the location of the king of hearts. South must obviously lose a trick to the ace of clubs, and then he will make his contract if the heart finesse succeeds.

If that is your impression, you've let me talk you out of a slam! You can make 12 tricks very easily even though the king of hearts is in the unfavorable position.

When today's hand was actually played, West opened the queen of diamonds, and dummy ruffed at once. Declarer got to his hand with the king of spades and led a low club towards dummy.

West could not afford to tam with the ace of clubs, for then dummy's high clubs would allow South to discard both the queen and the jack of hearts. West therefore played a low club, and dummy won with the king.

South returned to his hand with a trump to the queen, and led another low club towards dummy. Once more West was on the horns of a dilemma. If he put up the ace of clubs, he would set up enough high clubs to give declarer two discards. West therefore played low in the hope that South would have to lose two heart tricks even if he lost no clubs.

After West had ducked for a second time in the club suit, South had no club loser. He could now afford to abandon the clubs and give up a heart trick.

In short, West was given his choice. He could make either the ace of clubs or the king of hearts, but not both.

Harry Grundy, Earl Sears and Bert Lyon, and presented to Archbishop Gagnon at the great Synod Service to be held in the Cathedral on June 9th. Those who are prevented from bringing in their Thank-offering this Sunday are asked to see that it is in by the following Sunday, the last one before Synod opens.

On Tuesday, Coronation Day, there will be two morning services at St. Peter's. A Youth and Children's Service will be held at 10:00 o'clock and a Sung Eucharist at 11:00 o'clock. These will follow the forms authorized for the occasion.

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The Doctor Says

MEDICAL OPINION IS DIVIDED
ON CHANGE OF LIFE IN MEN

By Edwin P. Jordan, M. D.

A correspondent who signs her-
self "Puzzled" writes a sad but in-
teresting letter which I shall quote
at some length.

"My husband and I are in our
early 50's. I have been going
through the change of life and am
pretty well along except that my
nerves are still a problem. This
condition is aggravated by my hus-
band's abuse the past few years.
He seems to me like a woman go-
ing through the change.

"Please tell me if this is mak-
ing him as he is, as I have been
told that a man also experiences a
change. He is moody some days
and gets peeved over trivial things.
He starts arguments, and I find
that I can't defend myself or he
gets furious with me. I have told
him that he needs medical care,
but can't get him to go."

It must be almost intolerable
living with a man like that. He
may be just naturally ornery, but
it is possible that his age is also
making him worse.

The question of a change of life
in men is complicated and medical
opinion is divided as to whether
or not there is a rapid decrease
in the functioning of the sex glands
in men in any way comparable to
that which occurs in women. Cer-
tainly many men do not have any
symptoms at all which can be at-
tributed to it.

Some, however, do show fairly
definite physical or emotional
changes some time in their 50's.
Feelings of tension which are made
worse by excitement or fatigue are
sometimes described. There is a
tendency for excitement to be ex-
aggerated and unfavorable news,
arguments, or slight disturbances
which would not bother a person
ordinarily may cause extreme ner-
vousness.

Sex Gland Function

These symptoms, including quar-
relsomeness, and possibly diffi-
culty with sleeping, decreased ability
to concentrate, mild depression,
and the like, are perhaps—but not
certainly—associated with de-
crease in the function of the sex
glands.

Authorities have studied the ef-
fect of injections of the male hor-
mone—testosterone propionate—in
men complaining of such sym-
ptoms as those mentioned. The re-
sults of this are still doubtful.

As one authority puts it, "sex
hormones should not be adminis-
tered to men and women of cli-
matic change (change of life) age
with the idea of stimulating in-
creased sexual potency; if this is the
object of treatment, disappointment
will result in the great majority
of instances."

St. John's Church W. A. At Bedford Hears Address On Kitima Development

Bedford, May 30.—At a recent meeting of the Senior W. A. of St. John's Church, held in the parish hall, a most interesting address was given by Rev. Mr. Randall, rector of St. Martin's Church, Montreal.

The meeting was opened with the W. A. prayer by the vice-president, Mrs. A. Hewitt, after which the minutes of the previous meeting, which was held at the home of Mrs. Allan Palmer, were read by Mrs. Griselda Gould in the absence of the secretary, Mrs. Richard Craighead.

The treasurer, Mrs. George Harland reported a balance of \$55.95. The guest speaker for the evening was formerly stationed at Bedford, where he had delivered an address on Yellowknife, N.W.T., several years ago. Mrs. John Ewing introduced Mr. Randall and expressed the pleasure of all, at again being given the opportunity of hearing him.

Last summer Mr. Randall took a trip to British Columbia, at which time he visited the vast Alcan (Aluminum Company of Canada) development at Kitimat and Kemano in northern British Columbia. Many colored slides were taken of the territory, which were especially good, and this added much to the interest of the address.

The project which is expected to cost \$550,000,000, is making good headway and it is easy to visualize what Kitimat will be like, when the first stage of the project is completed. The future residents of Kitimat will be among the fortunate, as the town has been planned by some of the world's experts.

One year after completion, in 1955, it is expected that Kitimat will have a population of 7,000. It is the desire of the Aluminum Company that Kitimat will not be a company town, meaning by that, that not only one industry will be carried on. A strong drawing card for bringing companies to the town is the abundance of cheap hydro-electric power, which Alcan will be able to provide. Alcan and the British Columbia government are united in their efforts to make Kitimat an attractive town for additional companies to locate in.

When the location of Kitimat is considered it is easy to see why it should have a bright and prosperous future. Kitimat is laid out with an area of 62 square miles in the open valley and sloping land, where Kitimat River flows into Douglas Channel 70 miles from the sea. The site has been laid out with the view of accommodating 1,200 to 1,500 families in the ten neighborhoods.

Planning has been carried on, to allow each of the ten neighborhoods to have their own schools separate from each other, within one quarter mile walking distance for primary schools and half mile for elementary grades. Junior high schools have been planned in the neighborhood, to the growth of the communities. Adequate shopping facilities are provided for each unit, food, general merchandise, hardware, restaurants, dry cleaning, etc., all the necessary conveniences of every day life. Each unit will also have a hotel, intended for single workers, bowling alleys, movie houses and other centres of amusement, in addition, a medical-clinic.

One centre will be provided for civic buildings, local transportation and bus centres. A service centre has been recommended by the town planners near the city's railroad station. The Canadian National is currently building a \$10 million, 42-mile line to join the race, its main northern line to Kitimat. This service centre will provide space for industries, which are best located near the railroad, and away from residential sections. The planning also included sites for a hospital in a central location, also churches. It is of interest to know that a recent graduate, the Rev. Graham Tower, of the Montreal Diocesan College, is going out to Kitimat, working under the Fellowship of the West, to carry on the Church of England work there, as well as at Kemano. Provisions has also been made for outdoor sports, including a golf course and an area for aquatic sports.

The first unit of the work to be completed is the Kenney Dam, which was named after British Lands and Forests. This dam is on the Nechako River, 125 miles east of the power plant site.

Kenny Dam, which was made by rock fill, is the third largest type of this kind in the world. The total area and capacity of the dam is 333 square miles and 873 billion cubic feet. It is built through the Coast Range of mountains.

The boring of the tunnel is now half completed, when finished a head will be provided of 2,585 feet for the powerhouse turbines. The boring was commenced at the same time at four points on the single tunnel, at each end and by boring down the centre. It is expected it will be completed next October. At first eight turbines will be placed in the 750-foot cavern at Kemano, this installation will deliver 450,000 horsepower of electricity.

Wales Home Wing Expected To Be Ready For 1954

Richmond, May 30.—Good progress is being made on the new wing of the Wales Home at Richmond, the construction of which commenced last fall, and the general contractor, Newton Construction Co., of Sherbrooke, expects to have it ready for occupancy by the end of the present year.

Apart from a grant of \$175,000 received through the generosity of the Provincial Government in 1950 and payable over a term of years, this very much needed extension, estimated to cost over \$700,000 when completed and furnished, is being financed entirely by the Home itself. Any help from the generous-minded will be appreciated.

Costs of maintenance and of operation of the Home, which with the present extension will be capable of comfortably housing and caring for 165 inmates, plus an augmented staff, will naturally be much lessened by liquidation of securities required to meet costs of the building extension and necessary furnishing and equipment.

At a recent meeting of the Executive of the Board of Governors of the Home the thought was expressed that a number of societies and other organizations as well as individuals throughout the Townships, who have in the past shown great interest in the Home and its effort on behalf of the Protestant aged, might wish to furnish a room or rooms in the new wing of the Memorial.

It was decided to fix a price for these on the basis of \$400 for a single room, \$750 for a double room and \$1500 for a four-bed room. Suitable plaques will be installed showing the name of the donor or of the person in whose memory it is given. Anyone interested should get in touch with the Secretary-Manager, Dr. C. E. Manning, of Richmond.

Another topic discussed by the Executive was the disposition to be made of the Greenshields Estate, located near Danville, which a short while ago was deeded to the Home by Charles Greenshields, Q.C., of Montreal. This estate which consists of over 900 acres of good farm land and an exceptional fine residence, with over 20 rooms as well as other buildings has been a showplace for years and is a decided acquisition to the Home.

The Governors have had offers of purchase at a fairly substantial figure, but at the moment are undecided as to the best disposition of this beautiful home. A decision in this respect, however, will be made at the annual meeting of the Home, to be held early in July, to which all interested are invited. Due to building operations it is unlikely that the usual reception will be held in August, but the new wing has been fully completed and formally opened.

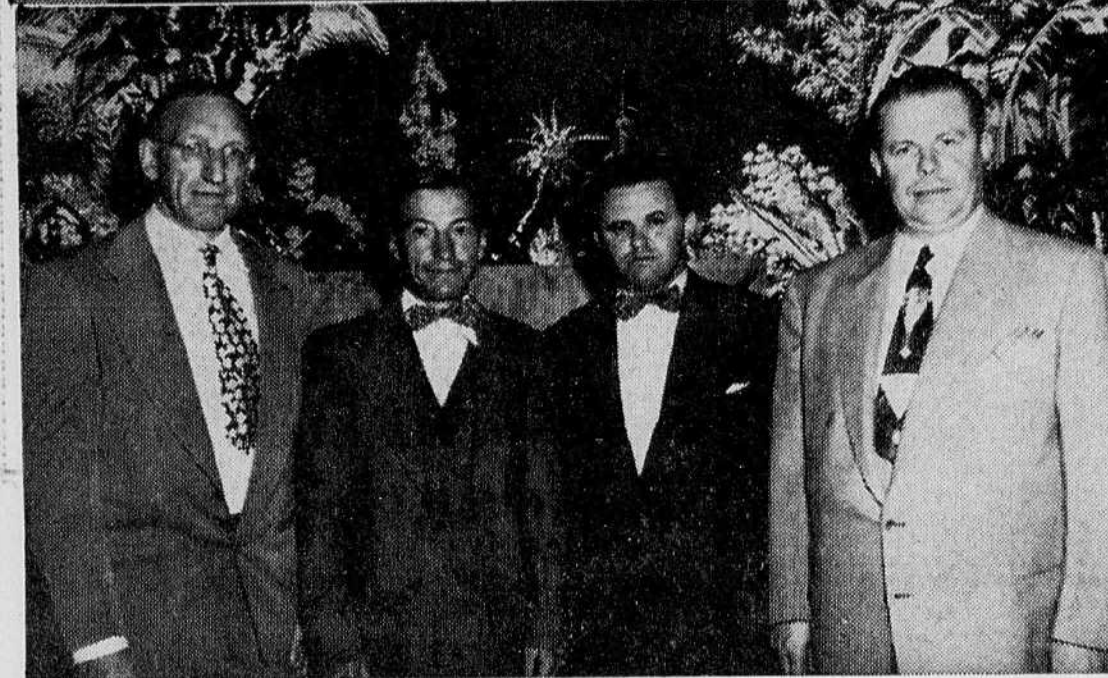

Toronto. — (CP) — A filly may be crowned queen of Canadian bred three-year olds on Coronation Day.

That is the day when about 20 of the country's equine aristocracy go to the post for the 94th running of the Queen's Plate at fashionable Woodbine Park. It is also the day when the country's largest sports crowd—an expected 50,000—make it the event of the turf year.

Traditionally, the Plate has the color of a royal garden party; the ladies in their summer finery and the men in toppers, striped trousers and frock coats basking in the fenced-off members' enclosure. The day-to-day race fans crowd the grandstand and spill over into the infield.

All the hopes, fears, patient care and training of months will be bundled into two minutes of drama as the horses pound over the nine-furlong course in pursuit of the Queen's 50 Guineas, \$10,000 or so in cash, and the indelible historical fact that such and such a thoroughbred won.

This year the fillies, with the big-league combination of jockey

Two Canadian Track Stars Turn Down Russian Bids

Toronto. — (CP) — Two of Canada's most promising track stars said Friday they had been asked to compete in the fourth World Youth Festival in Communist-dominated Romania next August but turned down the invitations.

Norma Williams and Shirley Eckel, members of the Toronto Track and Field Club, said they were among 12 athletes to receive the invitations from the Canadian Youth Festival committee here.

They said they were offered an expense-paid trip to "see Bucharest and travel in Eastern Europe."

This may be the year if such speedsters as Canadiana, Virginia Fair, Avella and Winter Lady are ready.

The people's choice will be Canadiana. Although the big bay filly was fourth in the May 23 Plate Trial, she probably will go to the post June 2 at less than even money. She was the 8-to-5 winter-book favorite, shortest price in history, and 1-to-10 in the trial.

Canadiana was a doubtful starter earlier this week. However, she covered a mile workout in 1:40.2 at Woodbine, in east Toronto, Thursday and Taylor, a Toronto industrialist, was convinced that she was "fit and well."

Up against her will be Virginia Fair, Western Canada juvenile champion last year, owned by James A. Charlesworth of Edmonton; Avella, second-choice favorite in the winter book owned by Jack Addison of Toronto; and Winter Lady, owned by Miss Olive Armstrong of Toronto.

The records show that only four fillies have won the Plate — the oldest continuously-run horse race in North America — in the last 25 years. This year they may get a good run from J. R. McIntyre's Blue Scooter, an 11-to-1 shot which beat out Canadiana last Saturday in the second division of the trial, and Canadiana's stablemate, Live-A-Action, which won the first division of the trial.

Here are a few Plate facts and figures:

It was started in 1860 when Don Juan, owned by James White of Carleton, now West Toronto, won the classic, then over the 1½-mile distance.

The 50 guineas is a royal donation. It was originally made in 1859 by Queen Victoria upon petition of the Toronto Turf Club.

In its unbroken history, the race has been run at Carleton, Guelph, Hamilton, St. Catharines, Whitby, Kingston, Ottawa, Barrie, Woodstock, Prescott and Picton. In 1883 Queen Victoria gave her sanction to an understanding with the founders of the Ontario Jockey Club that the race be established permanently in Toronto.

Plate winner lists have been dominated by the names of wealthy men.

The famous Seagram family of distillers has won 19 plates. R. S. McLaughlin of Oshawa has taken it three times, the late Harry C. Hatch of Toronto, five times, E. P. Taylor, twice, Willie Morrissey, Toronto hotel owner, once, and late publisher George C. McCullagh, once.

Unable To Meet Arena's New Demands Team Decides To Suspend; Financial Statement Presented For Last Year

At the annual meeting of the Sherbrooke Hockey Club, Inc., it was decided, after considerable discussion, to suspend operations for the coming season, stated Alex Allard, president of the club, yesterday afternoon following the meeting.

Mr. Allard further added, "It was felt by the shareholders and directors of the club that it was impossible to operate at the new rates insisted upon by the executive of the E.T.A.A. Our financial statement shows that the team barely pulled through and with the additional expense involved it would be impossible to make ends meet. Therefore the board decided to suspend operations for the coming season."

The Arena officials had asked an additional rate of 5% plus the rent of \$200 per game for the coming year. The extra 5% was the big point in the discussion as the team last season paid only \$200 per game for the Arena. W. G. MacDougall, president of the E.T.A.A., and L. J. Codere, member of the executive, presented the plan on behalf of the Association.

Mr. MacDougall pointed that the extra 5% could be raised without affecting the club's share of the gate by raising the price of tickets ten cents for each game and in his manner the extra sum could be raised. However the club decided that it wasn't fair to their supporters, who gave them such wonderful support last year, to increase the price of the tickets.

A motion was passed by the meeting suspending operations for a year and the club's delegates to the Quebec Hockey League were notified to present to the meeting being held in Montreal this afternoon.

Following this discussion the financial report was presented and adopted and Marcel Savard, C.A. was thanked for his very fine report for the past year. The minutes of the last annual meeting were read and adopted but the election of officers was held in abeyance until the delegates returned from the league meeting.

President Allard then thanked his board for their fine cooperation during the year and paid special thanks to Forest Keene and Ivan Dugre for their fine help and work last year. He also thanked members of the Press and Radio for their help in making the team such a fine success. Mr. Keene, a member of the League, will attend the meeting in Montreal with P. A. Gingras, vice-president today. Mr. Allard also thanked Art Laforest in handling the car raffles and it was due to his work that the team received the sum \$7,491.71.

In closing President Allard stated, "To the public who so generously came to our aid last winter the board wished to thank each and everyone. It was only due to such fine support that we were able to operate and present such a fine statement at the end of the season. We are not condemning the Arena for their demand but it is the opinion of the board that the public should not be asked to help pay the bill."

Steve Newton expressed a vote of thanks to President Allard on behalf of the board for the fine manner in which he directed the affairs of the club. The success of the club is due mainly to the untiring efforts and time in which you, as president, gave the club, added Mr. Newton.

The team has four bills outstanding for a total of \$4,587.48 to Provincial Transport, Sherbrooke Wood Products, Codere Ltd., and J. S. Mitchell plus a few small items.

The decision was only reached after a careful study of the new proposition submitted by the E.T.A.A. where they asked for an increase of 5% over last year. This additional amount, the executive decided, was too much and they figured that it would be impossible to carry on therefore it was decided to suspend.

Last year the club paid the Arena the sum of \$200 for each game played there but this year the officials decided that since they had added extra improvements it was only right to increase their price. The matter of affiliating with a pro club had been discussed but nobody was interested in it.

This was another proposition which was taken into consideration as the matter of around \$25,000 would be involved and with their only means of revenue cut the team executive decided that the best thing would be to suspend operations. The Arena officials pointed that they had given the fans more accommodation with the two new wings and that they should be willing to pay part of the bill.

Last season was the first since the team commenced to operate that they had a fair year and this was due to the good arrangement and fine support they received from both the Arena and the fans. With an added responsibility it would be impossible to make ends meet. So under those circumstances it was decided to call it a day and retire before everything was lost completely. There is the picture fans and you can form your own conclusion.

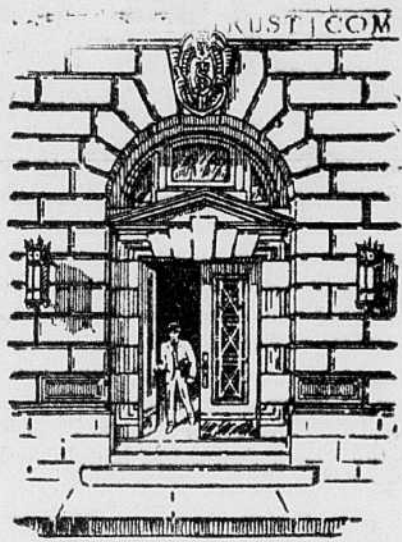
