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WHAT SHALL WE WEAR?

STYLES THAT FIND FAVOR IN THE WORLD OF FASHION.

Graceful and Becoming Cloaks, Designed Especially for Youthful Wearers—A Handsome and Striking House Toilet for Afternoon—Fashions in Flowers.

Many of the cloaks designed for children are but miniature copies of those made for their elders, but these are by no means the prettiest for young folks and fortunately we see many others that were fashioned with more thought for their youthful wearers. Such, for instance, is the graceful and attractive cloak for a little girl in short dresses, shown in our cuts



CLOAKS FOR YOUNG GIRLS.
This cloak is in heather mixture, trimmed round the neck and down the loose fronts with fancy gimp galon. It is close fitting at the back and loose in front, where it is confined to the waist by a belt under the independent fronts that simulate sleeves.
In the same cut appears an ulster for a young miss. The material is drab diagonal cloth. Velvet in a shade to harmonize forms the stylish and becoming turn down collar and lapels and also the pockets. The trimming consists of scrolls of mixed cord.

Fillets, Aigrettes and Bandoaux.
For full dress, fillets and other addenda of attire belonging to the Empire period seem for the time to have taken the place of the little aigrette and Pompadour wreaths which gave to English girls and women a touch of the stateliness of the ladies of the reign of Louis XV. Yet there are some adornments of the fashion of the earlier period still in favor—among them miniature pompon wreaths of tinsel, with an osprey; aigrettes entirely composed of curled osprey; and the bewitching tiny half wreaths of rose wreaths, with three or four of the little blossoms and buds set in an upright cluster on one side.
The newest device, however, takes the form of bandoaux of narrow curled feathers, the stem of the feather being followed by a line of gold, and either a cluster of feather buttons or an aigrette of small plumes set at one side, after the mode in vogue at "the court of the Empress Josephine;" while another becoming headpiece of the same period has narrow fillets of twisted ribbon.

Afternoon Costume.
Our cut depicts a handsome and striking house toilet for afternoon wear.
The high pointed bodice and slashed panels are in corsetry red Bengaline silk, strewn with flowers. The turned down collar and puffed epaulettes are of plain silk, to match in color. The velvet belt, finished off with a short bow in front and the bows on the sleeves, are all in plain color.



AN AFTERNOON DRESS.
The skirt is composed of plaited bouffons of cream colored pongee silk, over which the long slashed panels, with their bright hues, look very effective. The chemise of pongee is fashioned in keeping with the skirt.

Silver Ornaments.
Silver ornaments for gowns seem to be becoming the rage. They are put on side pockets, revers and cuffs, or wherever they can be advantageously adjusted. One leading English dressmaker told a customer that she would try and think out a fashion for displaying quaint old silver spoons on a costume "Rococo" that was being ordered for a winter fancy dress ball. We may live to see them dexterously placed as the centers of bows, or after the same style as the long narrow ornaments that one year became fashionable. Some pretty little silver brooches were recently given to bridesmaids in the form of a large hook and eye, connected with the initials of the bride on one and those of the bridegroom on the other, with the date. The two boys who acted as pages had smaller ones mounted on sleeve links.

Nun's Veiling Night Dresses.
A material which is gaining favor for night-gowns is nun's veiling, principally in pale pink or cream. It is the very finest that can be had, and is soft and warm. It is trimmed with platings of the same, and sometimes with frills of cream Valenciennes lace in addition. Some are made rather low in the neck, and with shorter sleeves than formerly. The fashion for cashmere sheets is also gaining in popularity for those who can afford them, for they are costly. They are recommended by physicians as being warm and healthy for winter use.

THE ARIZONA KICKER.

Not Much Money in It, but a Good Deal of Honor.

We extract the following items from the last issue of The Arizona Kicker:
(ANOTHER CUT.—We desire to announce to the readers of The Kicker that we have made another cut in the price of bar soap, and for the next two weeks shall offer six bars for a quarter. THE HERALD'S REDUCED SIZE.

The strike of THE HERALD compositors—an action which we cannot help thinking was hasty and ill-advised—makes it compulsory on the part of THE HERALD Company to issue this journal, for the present, in reduced size. The compositors having declined to return to their cases except on their own terms leaves the management no choice but to do without them, and we have therefore to ask the forbearance of our friends and general readers for a short time until the men who have left us shall have been replaced. We trust that this will be before long. We find that the point of difference between the management and the men is not a new one; the Toronto World and the New York Times having become non-union offices by reason of their taking the stand which has caused the difference in this office.

IMMIGRANTS WANTED.

The Manitoba people expect a large immigration from Ontario if this year's crop should prove to be a good one. From what is said on the subject it may be assumed that Manitoba is justified in the expectation, but this robbing Peter to enrich Paul, though agreeable to the latter is not quite satisfactory to the family generally. Ontario settlers as distinguished from Europeans are the best for the new country, but unless the places made vacant by their departure are filled by men from across the Atlantic, the Dominion's sentiment on hearing of the immigration to Manitoba will be one of only modified rapture. No doubt all good Canadians when they die go to Manitoba, but they are not then useful as agriculturists, and the Manitobans being essentially practical people are anxious to secure them still in the sinful, mortal, cash bearing, wheat creative body. Immigration is becoming, if it has not already become, one of the most important points of public policy. Its advancement is difficult while the policy of protection is enforced, but next to the abolition of that harmful heresy the duty of attracting European agriculturists and capitalists is the most important.

MOWAT SUSTAINED.

The result of the Ontario elections is that Mr. Mowat's government has been sustained by a large majority. There are 89 constituencies of which 56 have elected Liberals, so that even if all the Equal-rights candidates should prove to be Tories the majority for Mr. Mowat is 23. In spite of the jubilant clamor raised by organs of the opposition thinking men felt confident of Mr. Mowat's success. His government is recognized as being the best in the Dominion and it is the envy of all other provinces that desire an economical and pure administration. Besides this the combination against him was weak. With the exception of Mr. Meredith whose character and ability is admitted even by his opponents, there is no one, and there seems to be little doubt that Mr. Meredith has to some extent been knifed by his friends at Ottawa. Ontario is to be congratulated on its good sense in retaining an excellent and well tried administration.

The Royal Visitors Depart.

The Grand Trunk Railway Company had Bonaventure depot most artistically decorated yesterday on the occasion of the departure of the Duke and Duchess of Connaught. A beautiful carpet was laid in the main entrance right through to the special train. The company was represented by Messrs. L. J. Seargeant and Jas. Stephenson. Acting Mayor Stephens was early on hand and took an active part in making the final arrangements. Mrs. Stephens carried a beautiful bouquet which she presented to the Duchess, who thanked her for her for her attention. Sir Donald Smith, Sir F. Johnson, Chief Justice, the Aldermen, military men and citizens were there to say good-bye to the Royal party. About three o'clock the party arrived. His Highness recognized familiar faces and heartily shook hands and spoke of his former visit. Among those who seemed to be most favored were the Acting Mayor, Lieut. Col. Stevenson and the veteran angler Geo. Horne, who had quite a conversation with His Highness. Before boarding the special train the Duke, returned hearty thanks for the reception and hospitality extended to them. Acting Mayor Stephens and Ald. Rolland conveyed the thanks of the Royal party to the police for their behaviour. The engine, No. 106, attached to the royal train was neatly decorated with the royal coat of arms, etc. Amid a scene of great enthusiasm the special steamed out of the station.

BREVITIES.

The riflemen are complaining about the slowness of some of the markers at the Cote St. Luc Ranges.

Mr. Edgar Genl. Pass. Agent of the Grand Trunk Railway has published a neat little guide to the fishing and hunting resorts along the line of that railway.

Capt. Busted and Lieut. Desbarats of the Vics, who are on the Wimbledon team, leave on the Steamship Parisian on the 24th inst.

The Montreal Rifle Association will have a challenge match and an extra series at Cote St. Luc ranges to-morrow afternoon.

The Presbyterian Women's Missionary society will celebrate the fifteenth anniversary of the commencement of missionary labors, this afternoon in Crescent Street church.

Those who take an active interest in shooting are of the belief that with such energetic officers as Capt. Hood and Lieut. Carter, the Montreal Rifle Association will soon find its way to the front.

The coal handlers' strike is still going on. An assembly of 1711 have agreed to arbitrate the board of arbitrators consisting of three members appointed by them and three by the stevedores.

Yesterday being the feast of Corpus Christi, religious services were held in all the Roman Catholic churches in the city. It being also a Provincial holiday, the City Hall, Court Houses, Banks and many commercial institutions were closed.

The Chief of Police yesterday received a letter from the police authorities of New Westminster, B. C., asking for the whereabouts of one Morrison, a gardener of Montreal, who has been left considerable money by a relative in New Westminster.

Yesterday afternoon a man, whose name the Notre Dame Hospital authorities have not been able to ascertain, was instantly killed by falling down the hold of the Steamship Tyndale. Peter Hansey also employed on the same steamer had his leg badly crushed during the morning.

Plumber was arrested yesterday by Sgt. Lafontaine, on a warrant from the Queen's Bench for defaulting bail.

The western section of the Fire Brigade was called out at 5.45 last evening for a fire in the house of Ed. Kennedy 26 Young street. The damage by fire was slight but considerable by water.

The last opportunity of seeing that excellent drama Across the Atlantic during the season will be afforded to-day and to-morrow. The attraction at the Royal next week will be the renowned Marco and Reto's European Vaudeville Company, which is said to comprise some of the most talented artists now on the variety stage.

CANADIAN PACIFIC RAILWAY

Change of Time

New time card takes effect Sunday next June 8th on the Atlantic section of the Canadian Pacific Railway. The principal changes effected are that a train will leave at 4.00 p.m. week days running through to Cookshire and at 5.35 p.m. for Newport instead of at 4.00 p.m. at present. The Halifax express train will be 7.45 p.m. daily except Sundays.

On the St. Lambert section trains leave St. Lambert 9.00 a.m. for Marieville and at 5.20 p.m. Bonaventure Station for Marieville, St. Cesaire and Farnham.

THE BEL-AIR RACES.

The first day of the Summer meeting of the Bel-Air Jockey Club was held yesterday. The weather was of the most unpropitious character and the track very heavy. Five events were keenly contested.

The principal ones on the program were the Queen's plate which was easily won by Mr. Dawes bay gelding Mokans, out of Moccasin, and the Merchants' stakes which was won by Mr. T. H. 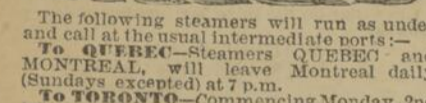

Miss Florence Nightingale was born in Florence and named after that beautiful city, but her early years were passed in England.

where her father owned two estates, Embley Park, in Hampshire, and Lea Hurst, in Derbyshire.

Lea Hurst was the favorite residence of the family during the summer months, and it is this house which our picture, a reprint from Garden and Forest, represents.

It is a stone house, not very large, which stands among woods in a place containing about 5,000 acres, and commands wonderful views of the Peak country.

In the vicinity of Lea Hurst stands Willesey Hall, once the home of Arkwright, with the mill where the spinning jenny was first used, and likewise Wingfield Manor, where Mary Queen of Scots was imprisoned for nine years.

The house at Lea Hurst is in the Elizabethan style of architecture. The interest of the building lies, first, in its associations with a very famous and admirable woman, and then in its typical charm as an example of an English country house of a modest kind, tastefully surrounded by luxuriant plantations.

Miss Nightingale, although a lady of fine education and brilliant accomplishments, early exhibited an intense devotion to the alleviation of suffering.

Her untiring devotion to the wounded soldiers of the Crimean war has made her name known throughout the civilized world.
