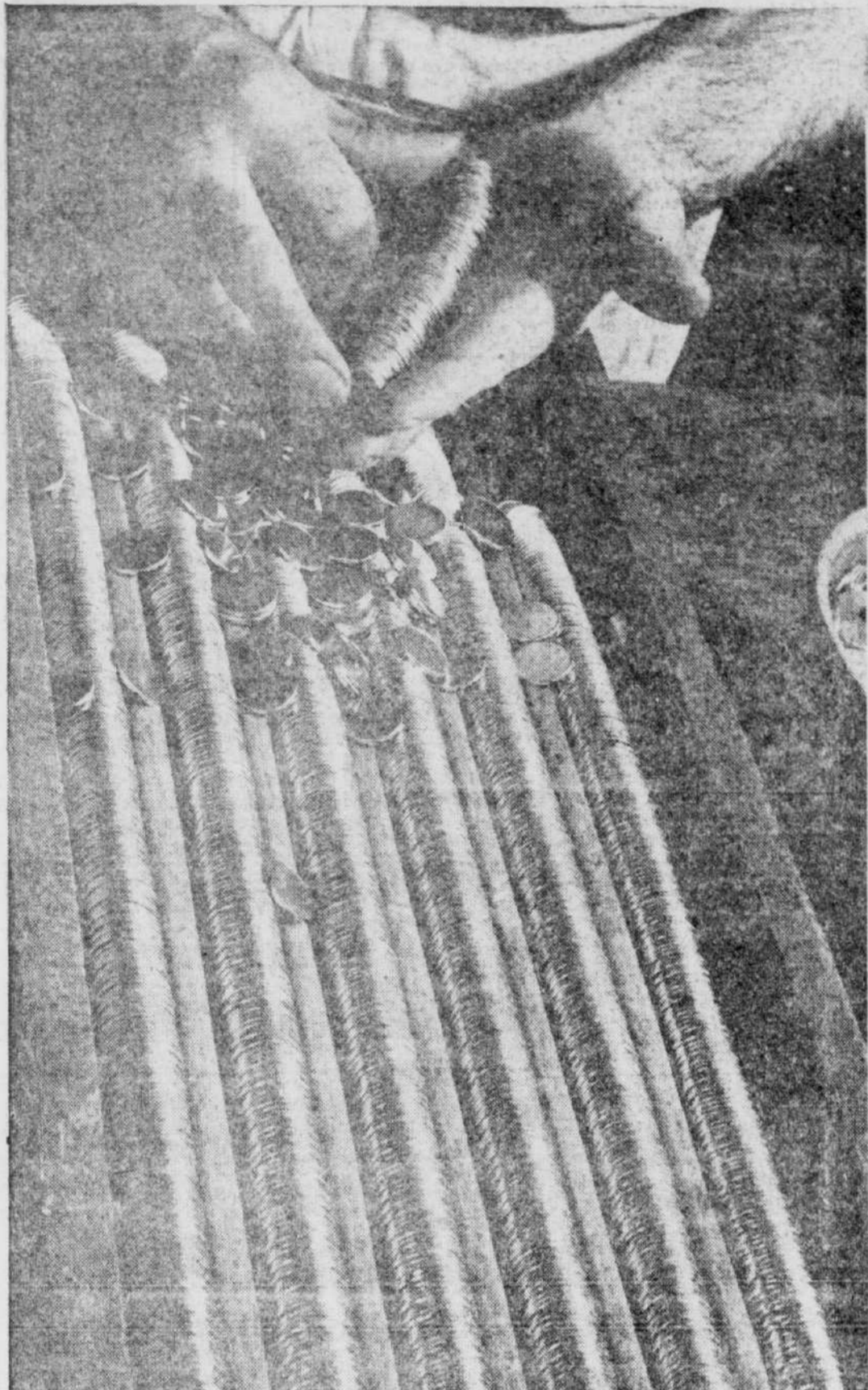


Royal Canadian Mint "Hard Money" Source

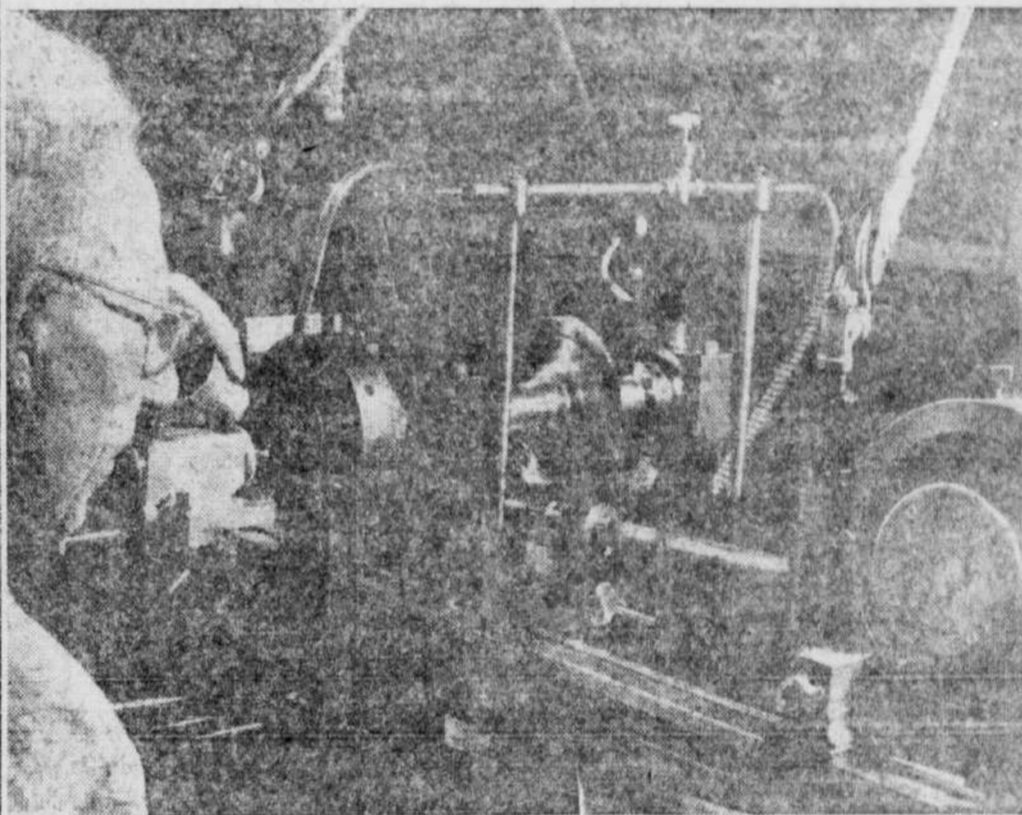


Each coin is cleaned, inspected and individually weighed before being passed for use. Imperfect pieces, returned to Mint refinery, are remelted. Coins moving along roller (above) are turned over automatically for examination of under surface.

Because precious metals are handled in large quantities, elaborate precautions must be taken to prevent losses. Each day's work is accurately weighed while main gate (above) and grounds are guarded by members of RCMP. Mint building of Tudor design was completed in 1908; marked beginning of Canadian manufactured coinage.



New designs are prepared by the artist in the form of 8" plaster mold from which the coin stamping dies are cut on the Janvier reducing machine (above). In cutting die, machine can also reduce the image to as little as 1" diameter. Each steel die, mounted in the press, 'strikes' thousands of coins before it must be replaced with fresh one.



Coin blanks are punched like cookies out of a metal strip alloyed and rolled at the Mint. Fed into hydraulic press, shown here, up to 170 a minute can be stamped. With each stroke, the impression is stamped on top and bottom simultaneously.

"Money, money everywhere, but not a cent for free," is the lament of many souvenir-hunting visitors to the Royal Canadian Mint at Ottawa where over 15,000 persons come annually to watch the 'hard money' being produced. Unknown to many, paper denominations are manufactured commercially in Ottawa. Here, 'roll sorting' copper penny blanks for stamping.

Salvation Army Aids Many Families

How many times have we dropped a penny in the gutter and not bothered to pick it up? How many times have we over-tipped just to be good sports? Add those pennies to a few extra quarters you have dropped in the headwaiter's palm and you can help lodge a transient for one night. Let the coins accumulate and you can pay the expense of feeding an underprivileged family. Last year \$800 of groceries were given to needy local families and some 150 transients were sheltered and served some 300 meals through the efforts of the Salvation Army's Sherbrooke garrison. The Salvation Army has also continued its work of comforting the aged and counseling the wayward, offering sympathy and understanding to prisoners and unmarried mothers. Many ex-prisoners will remember the man in the red-banded hat who distributed reading matter and,

more importantly, offered a kind word. Captain Frank Taboika in charge of the Citadel on Wellington street south is proud of the clothing depot which was recently built through donations to the Salvation Army. Although space is still badly needed to house contributions of furniture as well as clothes, Captain Taboika, with the aid of Senior Captain John Chamorro, has done marvels in sorting out the apparel. "Clothes," says Captain Taboika, "are available to underprivileged families in case of dire necessity free of charge. At times," he adds, "we charge a minimum to cover overhead expenses." The "charge" Captain Taboika refers to, is negligible. For those who can afford it, an overcoat is sold for 35 cents. Also included in the Clothes Depot is a plentiful supply of books. The Salvation Army received a complete library that was recently dissolved in Coat-

cook. Captain Taboika invites students in the area who wish to buy good reading matter at a nominal cost to visit this library. In order to continue the work of the Salvation Army in Sherbrooke, the Annual Red Shield Drive starts today with an objective of \$6,000. RICHMOND — The people of this community were saddened on Saturday morning, April 14, when they learned of the sudden passing of one of its most highly respected citizens, Evelyn Florence Laroche, wife of the late Thomas Gleason, of Richmond. Death occurred while on a visit to her son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. J. Larry Pollock, at Ottawa, Ont.

Although in failing health for some time, the news of her passing came as a great shock to her many relatives and friends. The remains were conveyed to Richmond, where they rested at the J. H. Fleury Funeral Home, Adam Street.

Mrs. Gleason was born in Richmond in 1891, eldest daughter of Alphonse Laroche and his wife, Mary Ellen White. She received her education at the Mount St. Patrick Convent.

Discussion On Housing Project At Richmond

RICHMOND — Details of the possible construction of a number of modern homes were placed before a public meeting of citizens held in the town hall on Thursday night.

The building committee of the Richmond and Melbourne Board of Trade, under the chairmanship of George H. Brouillette, has been studying the advisability of instituting a housing project within the limits of the municipality and in the course of their investigations visited Cap-de-la-Madeleine, where a housing project had been undertaken. Since the plan was first suggested, a number of interested people have given their names to Mr. Brouillette and in view of this it was decided to hold a public meeting.

Phil Blouin, who will be responsible for the building of the homes, explained in detail to the meeting that the proposed houses would all have different ex-

teriors and comprise three bedrooms, tiled bathroom and full basement and would be modern in every respect. Local labor would be employed to do the work. He also dealt with the financial aspects of the project.

Judging by the enthusiasm shown at the meeting, the project should meet with success. Additional residential building may also be undertaken, as the building committee has called on the executives of local industries to interest them in building homes for their key men and this suggestion has been well received.

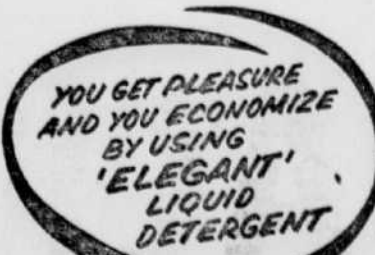

Lobster Souffle Special Treat For Family Or Guest

The crusty lobster has little claim to good looks. Beneath its sea-going armour, however, there is hidden beauty in the form of delicate pink and white meat. In most localities, lobster meat is readily obtainable in canned form and it is a handy item to have on hand when unexpected guests arrive, or for occasions when you wish to give the family a special treat. Try it sometime in a fluffy souffle. The home economists of Canada's Department of Fisheries have sent us the following tested recipe for a lobster souffle which they recommend serving with a crisp, green salad and hot, crusty rolls.

LOBSTER SOUFFLE

2 tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 cup milk, 1/2 cup mayonnaise, 3 egg yolks, 1 (5 or 6 oz.) can lobster, 3 egg whites.

Melt butter. Blend with flour and salt then add milk. Cook stirring constantly until thickened. Remove from heat and stir in mayonnaise and egg yolks which have been whipped until light in colour. Drain the lobster meat and break into fairly small pieces, taking care to remove the cartilage lodged in the meat of the claws. Add lobster to sauce. Beat the egg whites until stiff but not dry. Fold the cooled sauce into the beaten egg whites and combine thoroughly. Pour into an ungreased 6-cup casserole. Place casserole in a shallow pan of hot water and oven-poach in a moderate oven at 350 F. for 45 minutes or until set, puffed and lightly browned. Serve immediately. Makes 4 or 5 servings.

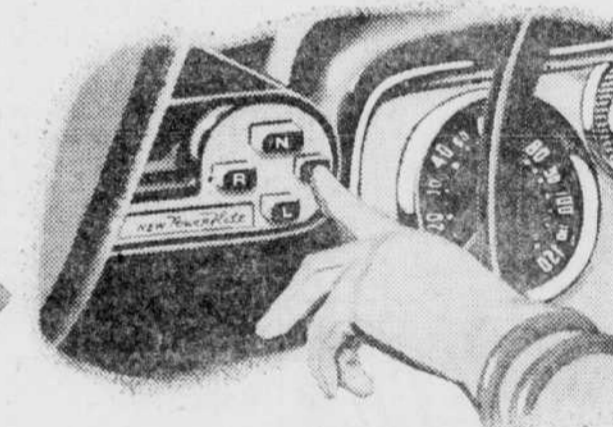

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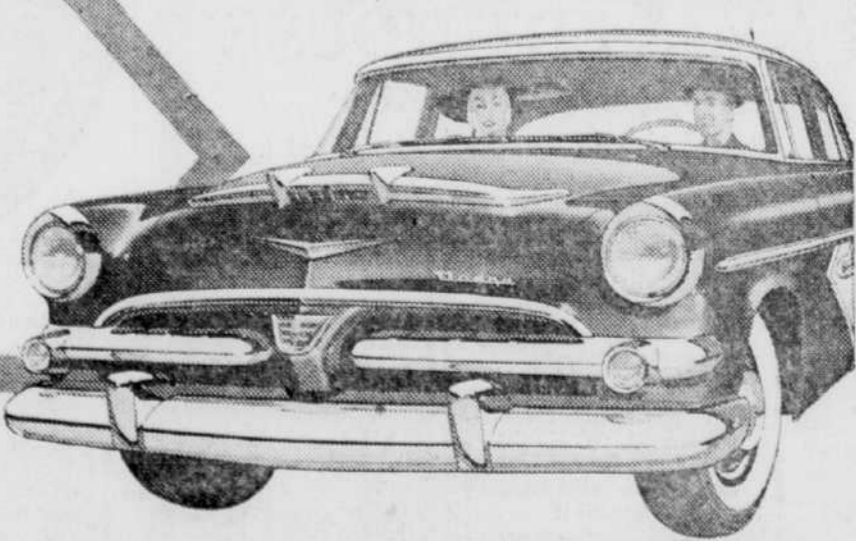
