May 13th, 1882.

At a meeting of the directors of this society, held at the residence of Mr. McClintock, the following resolutions were adopted:

4. On other Mares, over 3 years old, in harness, 4 prizes 5-4-3-2

5. On other Stallions, over 3 years old, in harness, 4 prizes 5-4-3-2

6. On other Mares, over 3 years old, in harness, 4 prizes 5-4-3-2

POSTAL.—The United States Postmaster-General directs that after the 1st of July, all letters on which full postage has not been prepaid instead of being forwarded to the Dead Letter Office shall be returned to the sender by the post office or free delivery offices and the addresses informed by postal card. It is only necessary to remit the postage due to the carrier by postal card.
