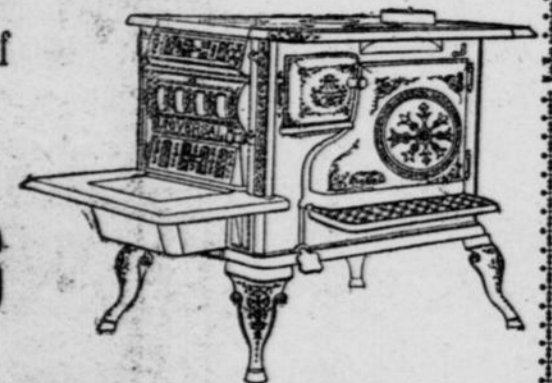

PONTOON GOES ADRIFT.

CARRIED AWAY BY HEAVY ICE, IT FLOATS DOWN THE RIVER TO NEAR BERTHIER, WHERE IT IS SUBSEQUENTLY PICKED UP BY THE STEAMER POLARIS.

About eight o'clock on Sunday evening Dr. Edwin Turcot received a telephone message from ex-Alderman Daniel Griffin, informing him that the large covered pontoon which lies at Chouinard's wharf during the season of navigation had broken away with the heavy ice from its moorage at Hall's boom, and was floating down the river, and in danger of being driven on the rocks below.

It is felt that the whole neighborhood is consecrated by the bravery and devotion of the French and English generals alike, so that to-day their names are linked together, not as X they were enemies, but as if they had gone down to death in an imperishable friendship to be known forever as Wolfe and Montcalm."

AMERICANS AND THE FILIPINOS.

Santa Cruz was Occupied by United States Troops. AFTER SHARP QUICK FIGHTING THE ENEMY WAS DISLOGBED—GRAPHIC ACCOUNT OF SCENES AND INCIDENTS DURING THE MARCH OF THE TROOPS TO THE POINT OF ATTACK—IT WAS PICKED MEN THAT ACHIEVED SUCCESS.

Manila, 7 P. M., April 10.—Santa Cruz was the Filipinos stronghold on Lake Laguna de Bay, and it fell into the hands of General Lawton's expedition, after some sharp, quick fighting, forming one of the most interesting and important battles of the war. The plans of the American Commander worked perfectly, with the exception that the progress of the expedition was delayed by the difficult navigation of the river. About 3,000 picked men composed the expedition, which was under the personal command of General Lawton, on account of the illness of General King.

THE MYSTERIOUS ANDREWS' FIRE.

A Man Arrested Under Suspicious Circumstances.

HE HAS A DIAMOND NECKLACE

WHICH, IT IS SAID, BELONGED TO THE LATE MR. WALLACE C. DREWS—THE PRISONER KEEPS HIS OWN COUNCIL—THE STORY OF AN INFERNAL MACHINE.

New York, April 10.—The police believe that an arrest made last Friday, may help to throw light upon the mysterious Andrews' fire. On that day a man, who gave his name as Richard Cunningham, was arrested as being a suspicious person. A diamond necklace, with a heart adorned with pearls was found in his possession. He was remanded in the Police Court. It has since been found that this necklace was sold six months ago to Wallace C. Andrews for \$3,000. The police think Cunningham may possibly know something about the fire. So far the prisoner has revealed nothing.

THE 22 TO 1 SILVER RATIO.

BLUEBOOK GIVING THE EVIDENCE OBTAINED BY THE INDIAN CURRENCY INQUIRY COMMITTEE, PUBLISHED IN ENGLAND—AMBASSADOR HAY'S LETTER ON THE SUBJECT.

London, April 10.—A bluebook giving the evidence obtained by the Indian Currency Inquiry Committee, was published to-day. It includes a letter from the United States Secretary of State, Colonel John Hay to Lord Alderman, a Director of the Bank of England, dated Nov. 25th last, saying the Washington Cabinet does not consider it expedient for the United States to re-open the bi-metallic question, at present in view of the character of British Ministry's reply to the Bimetallism Commission in 1897. Col. Hay added that the Cabinet was opened to consider the question of a ratio. Lord Alderman suggested before the committee, that the negotiations entered upon the part of Great Britain with the United States, with the view to come to arrangements for the re-opening of the Indian mints, should be conducted in a friendly and amicable spirit, and that there was a possibility in the future of the American Government taking the bit in its teeth, and re-opening the old ratio. He quoted Col. Hay's letter in support of his views that the American Government was disposed to adopt the old ratio of 22 to 1, and added: "I talked with Col. Hay when he was here as ambassador, and he seemed favorably disposed to this ratio, but said I am an outgoing ambassador, and of course have no power. I pointed out that he would have considerable influence when he got back to America, and assumed the Secretaryship of State, and I asked him to communicate with me. He waited for some time after he returned, but he did not mention it until after the Congressional elections and then wrote the letter."

THE SEALERS DOING WELL.

AT A MEETING OF THE CITY COUNCIL, of the City of Quebec, held at the City Hall, in the said City of QUEBEC, on the FOURTH day of APRIL, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, in conformity to law, and in virtue of a By-Law passed by this Council pursuant thereto, and after the due observance of all the formalities prescribed by the statute in such case made and provided at which meeting are present two-thirds of the members composing the Council of the City of Quebec, that is to say: His Worship the Mayor, and Aldermen Delanquer, Blouin, Boisjoly, Donaghy, Cantin, (St. V.), Cantin (St. S.), Cote (St. S.), Cote (St. J.), Dinan, Drolet, Drouin, Dussault, Duchaine, Falard, Foleys, Gilchen, Madden, Marois, Norris, Poitras, Rancour, Reynolds, Roy, Tangway, Tessier.

Be it ordained and enacted by the Council of the City of Quebec, and the said Council doth hereby ordain and enact as follows:

1. Section 18 of By-Law No. 329, passed by this Council on the 29th of March, 1895, is repealed and replaced as follows:

No person shall exercise or follow the trade or business of peddler, within the limits of the City of Quebec, without having obtained from the City Clerk a license to that effect, for which said license he shall previously pay to the City Treasurer a sum of four hundred dollars, and also, as his license, a numbered piece of metal of the same number as the one inscribed on said license, and shall in a visible manner on his person, when he shall exercise his trade or business.

3. Any infraction to the said By-Law shall be punishable with a fine not exceeding forty dollars, and in default of payment of said fine and costs by an imprisonment not exceeding two months.

4. The present By-Law shall be enforced and take effect on the first day of May, 1899.

Concerning the Poles Erected in Streets and Public Places.

(Drawn up in the French language.)

AT A MEETING OF THE CITY COUNCIL, of the City of Quebec, held at the City Hall, in the said City of QUEBEC, on the FOURTH day of APRIL, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, the following By-Law was read for the first time:

Be it ordained and enacted by the Council of the City of Quebec, and the said Council doth hereby ordain and enact as follows:

1. Every company constituted as a Corporation, shall paint, with gray paint, every post already erected, or that shall be erected in future, that belongs or is used by said Company in the streets or public places, or any other place in the said City of Quebec, to suspend or uphold electric wires, cables, or for other use.

2. On each said pole must be inscribed, in a visible and comprehensive manner, at a height of not more than ten feet from the ground, the name of the Company to which such pole belongs, or the initials of the words which form the name of the said Company.

3. Any infraction to any of the dispositions of the present By-Law shall be punishable with a fine not exceeding forty dollars and the costs.

The present By-Law shall be enforced on the FIRST day of MAY, 1899.
