## WARNS AGAINST POLISH AGGRESSION

### Two Premiers To Preserve Czech Border

**Great Britain and France Prepared to Call Conference With Italy and Germany if Poland Insists Upon Invading Czechoslovakia's Eastern Territory — Polish Officials Declare Seizure of Slovak Town Is Merely "Anticipatory Occupation."**

Paris, Nov. 25.—(P)—The Prime Ministers of Great Britain and France warned Poland today against invading Czechoslovakia's eastern territory.

Alarmed by reports from their ambassadors in Warsaw and Prague, Prime Minister Chamberlain and Premier Daladier instructed their Warsaw representatives to caution the Polish Government against the "danger of such action."

France and Great Britain, along with Germany and Italy, agreed in the Munich pact to guarantee the new frontiers of Czechoslovakia.

The statesmen, who last night concluded a review of Anglo-French relations, were informed Poland had massed twelve divisions of troops along the frontier of Ruthenia and that Czechoslovakia was sending heavy reinforcements to the eastern provinces.

If the tension continued, informed quarters said, Mr. Chamberlain and M. Daladier were agreed it might be necessary to call an immediate conference of the "Munich Big Four"—Chancellor Hitler, Premier Mussolini and themselves.

The decision of Daladier and Chamberlain to form the defence forces of their two countries into a co-ordinated system was widely hailed by French cabinet ministers, who repeated the declaration of Mr. Chamberlain and M. Daladier that Great Britain and France would seek peace with Germany and Italy, but "just to be sure" they would arm to the teeth.

The new Anglo-French agreement was said to provide that:

1.—Great Britain will train a large expeditionary force to help the French army in wartime.

2.—Production of all war supplies will be co-ordinated.

3.—France will purchase 6,000 bombing planes, many of which may be built in Canada, with payment assured by British loans to France.

4.—Army, navy and air force general staffs of the two countries will be in permanent consultation.

5.—A common policy of buying and giving credit will be followed by the two countries in their dealings with Central European nations to enable them to keep out of Germany's sphere of influence.

### Reduced Majority For Government Candidate In British Bye-Election

London, Nov. 25.—(P)—The sixth bye-election since the Munich agreement resulted Thursday in the Government retaining West Lewisham but with a majority of 5,648 votes compared with 12,370 in the 1935 general election.

The test of the Government's foreign policy followed the paths laid down in each of the five preceding bye-elections. A large group of voters turned over to the Opposition and in two cases, in Dartford and Bridgewater, the swing was sufficient to score Opposition gains. The Government held Oxford City and Walsall while Labor retained Doncaster.

Henry Brooke, Conservative member of the Hampstead Borough Council, was victorious in West Lewisham, a constituency in suburban London regarded as a safe Conservative seat. He defeated A. M. Skeffington, lecturer and eco-

### NO TRACE YET FOUND OF MAN REPORTED LOST

**Search Party Continued Hunt Today for Olea White, of Mansonsville, Missing Since Tuesday Afternoon.**

Mansonsville, Nov. 25.—With hope that their efforts would not be in vain, searchers today continued to comb district woods and countryside for Olea White, sixty-nine years old, who disappeared Tuesday afternoon.

A party of forty volunteers under the leadership of Mayor J. P. Giroux searched all day yesterday and returned to their task this morning. White was last seen on the roadbed of the old Orford Mountain Railroad, and his footprints were traced leading from that spot into the fields. Newly fallen snow obliterated the tracks today.

"White was in good health and we have not abandoned hope for his safety," Mayor Giroux stated to a Record representative this morning. "We will carry on the search until he is found."

### Foreign Boycotts Bring Move To Modify Anti-Jewish Drive

**Order Issued by Field Marshal Hermann Goering Bans Further Street Action Against Jews and Holds District Nazi Leaders Responsible for Maintaining Order — Anti-Semitic Decrees Declared to Be Taking Care of "Jewish Problem."**

Berlin, Nov. 25.—(P)—A new order by Field Marshal Hermann Goering banning further street action against Jews was interpreted today to indicate that foreign boycotts were having a telling effect on Germany's foreign trade.

Chancellor Hitler's chief lieutenant told thirty-six Nazi district leaders last night that the time for extrajudicial action against Jews was past and that he would hold them responsible for any new outbreaks.

Sources close to Goering said his order undoubtedly was in the interest of foreign trade. Goering was said to have told Nazi leaders the series of anti-Semitic decrees issued were now taking care of the "Jewish problem" and that these regulations must be obeyed.

**ABANDONS PLAN OF DISCUSSING COLONY RETURN**

Berlin, Nov. 25.—(P)—Oswald Pirow, South Africa Defence Minister, made it clear today he had given up whatever plans he may have had for discussion of Germany's colonial demands during his present visit.

When he left South Africa, informed quarters said, he was prepared to listen to Germany's demands, but by the time he arrived his frame of mind was such that he said "colonies is one subject I am not interested in."

Mr. Pirow was represented by friends as being greatly disappointed over the turn Anglo-German relations have taken as a result of the Nazi anti-Semitic campaign. Yesterday's press information from Berchtesgaden emphasized he had discussed these relations with Chancellor Hitler during their talk.

**AUSTRALIA WILL NOT SURRENDER NEW GUINEA**  
Melbourne, Nov. 25.—(C.P.—Havas)—Prime Minister Joseph Lyons today said Australia has no intention of surrendering New Guinea to Germany.

Prime Minister Chamberlain, he declared, had never suggested any such retrocession. The Commonwealth administers the former German colony under mandate.

### MADE A LONG JOURNEY

Decatur, Ill., Nov. 25.—(P)—A Masonic emblem, found on a battlefield of France twenty years ago, has been returned to its owner—who never has been in France. The emblem, which came into the possession of Charles Borchers, of Decatur, bore the inscription of the Brooklyn, N.Y., chapter. The chapter found the owner who, in a letter to Borchers, he lost it twenty years ago—not in France, but in Brooklyn.

### His Holiness Recovering From Sudden Attack Of Illness

Vatican City, Nov. 25.—(P)—Pope Pius suffered a serious heart attack this morning and oxygen was administered immediately after his collapse to overcome a difficulty in breathing.

This treatment was suspended, however, after the difficulty had been remedied and the Vatican announced officially that the Holy Father's condition was improving this afternoon.

The eighty-one-year-old Pontiff was stricken suddenly as he was about to leave his private apartment for an official ante-chamber for his daily round of private audiences.

A Vatican medical bulletin described his illness as cardiac asthma. Another informant said it was myocarditis (inflammation of the muscular part of the wall of the heart).

Secretaries who saw the Pope overcome by dizziness immediately carried him to his room and put him to bed. Physicians were summoned and his personal physician, Dr. Amintore Milani, still was with the Holy Father late in the afternoon.

Cardinals and prelates who were to have been received in audience were informed of his illness when they arrived at the Vatican.

News of the attack spread rapidly. Cardinals in Rome and members of the diplomatic corps at the Holy See immediately began calling at the Vatican to inquire about the Holy Father's condition and express wishes for his speedy recovery.

The Pontiff collapsed and sank to the floor when he was stricken, but members of his household said he remained conscious. As soon as he was in bed Dr. Filippo Rocchi gave him an injection of adrenalin and digitalis.

A Vatican medical bulletin issued at noon said:

"The Holy Father after celebrating Holy Mass this morning was stricken suddenly with an attack of cardiac asthma. He now is improving."

The news service said the eighty-one-year-old Pontiff was afflicted as he was descending from his apartment to his customary private audiences with heads of church administrative bodies.

He was carried immediately back to his room.

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### REAL SOCIETY DISAPPEARS IN UNITED STATES

Eight Million Dollars Being Spent to Introduce Thousand Debutantes to Line of College Undergraduates and Unemployed Young Men.

New York, Nov. 25.—(P)—The question of debutante parties bobbed up again today with the final, announced after some research, that four papers will spend approximately \$8,000,000 to introduce their daughters to "polite society" this season.

The actual cost of the debut parties for one thousand eligible eighteen-year-old girls in New York and fifteen other of the biggest and wealthiest cities in the United States was placed by Fortune Magazine at approximately \$3,000,000—for champagne, orchids, engraved announcements, scrambled eggs with sausages et cetera. The total cost for the "coming out" year—exclusive of \$3,000 for a wardrobe—was figured at around \$8,500 each.

It's still a big business, Fortune said after a survey of the debutante scene, but the debutantes are all dressed up with no place to go because the magazine said, there is very little "polite society" left into which they can be introduced.

More "findings" from the research:

"Society" in the United States today is little more than a tag line of college boys and unemployed young men.

"Adults, and especially men—marriageable or otherwise—have almost completely disappeared from the society into which a New York girl makes her debut today. So have they in Boston, where debutantes are now presented to the Harvard undergraduate body, minus freshmen. They have disappeared because the social game costs time and money."

"In New York, for instance, three hundred old New York debutantes are being presented not to the society of their elders, but to a waiting legion of eligible bachelors, but to 2,500 college boys and recent graduates, many of them unemployed."

### Government Postpones Decision On Settlement Of German Jew Refugees

Ottawa, Nov. 25.—(P)—The Government was occupied today with intensive preparations for the forthcoming session of Parliament and with determination of a definite policy regarding Jewish refugees from Europe.

Prime Minister Mackenzie King told newspapermen last night following a Cabinet meeting he would not be in a position to announce opening date for Parliament until next Tuesday's Cabinet Council. It is expected to be January 12th.

Details concerning the visit of the King and Queen to Canada late next spring also are being worked out and the Prime Minister said progressive announcements will be made as the plans are completed. The itinerary must first be approved by Their Majesties.

Mr. Mackenzie King stated Canada's attitude to the Jewish refugee question will be decided only after careful consideration and information is received from other countries concerning measures to be adopted.

A delegation representing Canadian Jewish societies in Toronto, Montreal and Ottawa have interviewed both the Prime Minister and Resources Minister Crerar, who has jurisdiction over immigration, mainly to assure the Government the Jewish communities in Canada do not desire to embarrass the administration but to help in any way possible.

The Prime Minister said he could give the delegation no assurance concerning Government policy until the whole matter had been thoroughly reviewed by the Cabinet.

With the Bren gun inquiry concluded, interest in governmental affairs has switched to speculation on what legislation the Government plans for next session and what special committees the Senate will set up.

It is believed that the Upper House will undertake a study of Canada's constitution. The Senate Law Clerk, W. F. O'Connor, has been examining legislation connected with the British North America Act and will report to the Senate when Parliament opens.

The Railway Committee, which featured the Senate's work last session, probably will resume its work. Last session the committee recommended that the question be further explored. Discussion generally revolved around proposals for and against unification of the Canadian National and Canadian Pacific railways under joint management.

National defence issues also are likely to bulk large in the Senate's proceedings as they will in the Commons.

### ADVANCE PLANS FOR RETURN OF DUKE OF WINDSOR

Paris, Nov. 25.—(P)—A visit from Prime Minister Chamberlain appeared today to have advanced a step the plans for a return to England by the Duke of Windsor.

Mr. Chamberlain and the Foreign Secretary, Lord Halifax, called upon the Duke at his hotel last night. They talked for twenty minutes of the Duke's desire to go home, British sources said.

The Duke of Gloucester, his brother, visited him here Armistice Day and they, too, were said to have talked of a visit home, perhaps for Christmas and the customary family reunion at Sandringham House.

### A REAL CATCH

San Francisco, Nov. 25.—(P)—John Galloway, sixty-five, was pulled out of San Francisco Bay and taken to an emergency hospital. "I just wanted one of those pretty fish," he told Dr. S. P. Smith. Dr. Smith began unbuttoning Galloway's clothes. Out flopped a four-inch smelt.

### SEEKING HOMES FOR REFUGEES OF LANDSLIDE

Thousand Persons Rendered Homeless by Landslides Which Claimed Seventy Known Dead and Twenty-Four Injured.

Castries, St. Lucia, Nov. 25.—(C. P. Cable)—The Government of this British West Indies Island today faced the task of caring for more than one thousand refugees after a series of landslides spread death and destruction across inland areas.

Police counted seventy known dead and twenty-four injured in slides which blocked the main trans-island highway.

Rain, blamed as the cause of the disastrous avalanches, stopped yesterday after failing intermittently for two weeks. It gave rescue workers a chance to bury the bodies recovered from the debris. Throats of further slides prevented continuation of their search.

Two villages were in the path of the landslides which tons of earth first broke away from mountainsides Monday. Endangered areas were evacuated and hundreds of refugees were quartered in military barracks and school buildings. Soup kitchens were installed and officials constructed of makeshift hospital wards. Clothing was distributed to seven hundred refugees.

Sir Henry Popham, Governor-in-Chief of the Windward Islands, made a flying trip here yesterday to view the devastated district. Government officials said they had not decided when to start clearing the Castries-Denney road, centre of the landslide area.

Canada recently has taken a direct interest in travel facilities between the Americans and Premier Patullo of British Columbia has conferred in Washington recently about the proposed highway south from Alaska through British Columbia.

### SITUATION REPORTED EXTREMELY SERIOUS

Los Angeles, Nov. 25.—(P)—Fanned by an increasingly brisk wind, flames jumped across fire lines in the San Bernardino mountains today and ate into timber near the highly-developed community of Pinescrest.

Charles Plummer, chief dispatcher for the United States Forest Service, said the situation was "extremely serious."

"We have reports that the fire is in the settlements of Horse-shoe Bend and Valley View," Plummer said. "We have stationed men throughout the Crest Forest district to assist in evacuation if that becomes necessary."

### Britain Determined To Maintain Palestine As National Home For Jews

**Although Standing by Balfour Declaration, British Government States that It Cannot Open Wide Holy Land to Flood of Jewish Refugees from Germany—Prepared to Assume Full Responsibility for Administration if Conference Fails.**

### B.C. HOUSE REJECTS PRESS CENSORSHIP

Victoria, Nov. 25.—(P)—A Co-Operative Commonwealth Federation amendment which would have permitted press censorship in connection with misdemeanors of inmates of British Columbia industrial schools for boys and girls, was withdrawn in the Legislature yesterday after Government and Opposition members questioned its validity and necessity. The amendment was introduced by Harold Winch, C. C. F., Vancouver East.

London, Nov. 25.—(P)—Government spokesmen told the House of Commons Thursday that while Great Britain stands by the Balfour declaration giving Jews a homeland in Palestine, it cannot open wide the Holy Land to the flood of Jewish refugees from Europe.

Earl Winterton, Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster and chairman of the Inter-Governmental Refugees Committee, said that the Government stands by the Jewish national home plan and that declarations by previous governments still were in effect.

He closed a general debate on Palestine. Earlier Malcolm MacDonald, Secretary for the Dominions and the Colonies, declared Palestine did not hold the solution to the refugees problem.

Lord Winterton said it was unfair to suggest Britain should force large numbers of Jews upon Palestine without regard to local conditions or the difficulties of the Holy Land situation.

"The policy of the Inter-Governmental Committee," he declared, "is not to thrust in refugees blindly wherever there is an opening, but to induce various countries to admit refugees willingly on their value as citizens so that they can contribute materially and intellectually to their adopted country."

Mr. MacDonald said he had every sympathy with the views of both Jews and Arabs in Palestine and that the Government would do all it could to reconcile Jewish and Arab rights. It would take full responsibility for governing Palestine if the coming roundtable conference failed.

Winston Churchill, Conservative, charged the Government had no positive programme for Palestine. "Where are we?" he asked. "We have to look for something else and so the right honorable gentleman (Mr. MacDonald) comes forward and says: 'I have another idea. Let's have a conference, commissions are worn out. We have exhausted their virtue. But it is some time since we had a conference.'"

Mr. Churchill offered his own suggestion, a ten-year plan which would permit Jews to enter the Holy Land in proportion as the Arab population increased. This would give Jews an incentive to encourage Arab growth and should have the way to immigration of between 30,000 and 40,000 Jews annually.

Herbert Morrison, Labor, also complained that Mr. MacDonald had given "no reasonably clear idea of where the government are going." He reminded the House that unfavorable reaction would develop in the United States if the Balfour declaration were repudiated.

Colonel Josiah Wedgwood, Labor, cited Palestine as the latest instance of a series of "British Surrenders" he charged had been made in Ethiopia, Spain, Austria and Czechoslovakia.

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### Commissioner Preparing Report On Bren Machine Gun Purchase Scheme

Ottawa, Nov. 25.—(P)—With stacks of recorded evidence and documents before him, Mr. Justice H. H. Davis of the Supreme Court of Canada today began preparation of his report on the Bren gun contract.

After thirty-six days of testimony and argument, his inquiry into the arrangement whereby John Inglis Co. of Toronto, will supply the National Defence Department with seven thousand Bren light machine guns ended yesterday. The official record is spread over 4,700 pages and amounts to 1,500,000 words. Added to this are 388 exhibits.

By Order-in-Council the Judge is directed to investigate negotiations leading up to the contract, shareholdings and transactions in shares of the Inglis Company, connection of activities of any member of the House of Commons with the contract or the company, and to report upon these matters.

The contract represents one of the important measures taken to improve the defences of Canada. The Bren is a light automatic gun, an improvement over the machine guns used in the Great War. Invented in Czechoslovakia it has been adopted as the standard arm of the British army and following this was adopted by Canada.

Terms of the contract are that the company shall receive the cost of manufacture plus ten per cent, that the Government shall pay for or supply the machinery, own it and be free to use it after the completion of the contract in any way it wishes.

The company is also to make five thousand guns for the British Government on the same terms except that, while the British Government will pay a share of the cost of machinery, the entire ownership

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## Martial Law Enforced As Daladier Takes Strong Stand Against Strike

Paris, Nov. 25.—(P)—Premier Daladier summoned troops today as the mounting wave of strikes against his Government threatened to sweep over the nation.

With the strike toll nearing 100,000 and climbing hourly, Premier Daladier ordered 30,000 Mobile Guards and 20,000 Gendarmes concentrated in the strike centres about Paris and in the North.

Parliamentary deputies said Daladier was determined to crush the movement and was planning to declare a state of siege, similar to martial law, unless the strikes were mastered quickly.

Some deputies said they understood the Premier even considered the arrest of former Socialist Premier, Leon Blum; Leon Jouhaux, General Confederation of Labor Secretary, and Maurice Thorez, Communist Party Secretary, along with dissolution of the Communist and Socialist parties.

Blum, through his newspaper, Le Populaire, warned that France faced a "real social battle whose consequences none can longer foresee."

Estimates were that 45,000 strikers were out near Lille in the north and 40,000 in the Paris region. Strikes broke out early today in western factories.

Shortly after dawn 5,000 Mobile Guards and police were ordered to dislodge 1,000 strikers who remained throughout the night barricaded in one of the Renault automobile plants on an island in the Seine near Paris. They were told to "take the plant by storm if necessary."

Premier Daladier assumed the Ministry of Interior, giving him direct control of the nation's police. As Minister of War and National Defence he already controlled the army.

Usually refraining from such direct statements, Leon Blum declared of this that "after having provoked movements of the working class by useless bravado this Government is trying to suffocate them by force."

It was reported Daladier again would postpone calling Parliament, presently scheduled to meet December 6th.

## Windsor Mills Man Seriously Hurt In Mill Accident

## FOURTH CENTURY SAINT'S BIRTH MARKED TODAY

Unmarried Girls in Twenty-Fifth Year Entitled to Wear Especially Fine Bonnets in Attempt to Snare Male.

Today, November 25th, is St. Catherine's Day, this date marking the birth of the fourth century virgin and martyr who holds an exalted position among the early saints of the Romish calendar, both for rank and intellectual abilities.

St. Catherine is said to have been of noble birth and was one of the most distinguished ladies of Alexandria in the beginning of the fourth century. According to legend the Emperor Maximinus II became so enraged at the powers St. Catherine exercised over the pagans that he devised an instrument of torture especially for her. She was placed in a machine composed of four wheels sharpened together and they revolved the victim would be torn to pieces. It is recorded that a miracle prevented the completion of this project.

When the executioners were binding Catherine to the wheel a flash of lightning descended from the skies, tied the cords with which she was bound, and shattered the machine, causing the death of both the executioners and a number of by-standers. Maximinus, still bent on her destruction, ordered her to be carried beyond the walls of the city, where she was first scourged and then beheaded. The legend says that after her death her body was carried by angels over the Red Sea to the summit of Mount Sinai.

In Brittany on the feast of St. Catherine a ceremony is observed called "coiffer le bonnet de la Sainte Catherine," or, in English, "don St. Catherine's bonnet." All unmarried girls in their twenty-fifth year are entitled to wear especially fine bonnets on this day in a final attempt to lure some young man into matrimony. If they do not succeed in their effort they earn for themselves the sobriquet of "vieille fille," or old maid.

Taffy is de rigueur among French-Canadians on the feast of St. Catherine. It is sold in most stores and many a child and grown-up, too, looks forward with pleasure to the taffy pull which is associated with this day. This custom has been handed down from the time of Marguerite Bourgeoise, founder of the Grey Nuns in Canada, taffy, it is said, on that day, distributed taffy to all the Indian children in the village of Rochelaga, now Montreal.

### New Tide In World Affairs From The Trade Treaty

It will be quite a while before we can tell whether the new British-American trade agreement is going to work out as well as the people who drew it up hope it will. At the moment, however, it can at least be said that the signing of the agreement is one of the most hopeful signs that has appeared on the world horizon in a long time.

For whether it works out well or badly, it is an attempt to restore to the world part of a long-lost freedom. It is a step toward a saner and more equitable form of world society, and the mere fact that such a step can be taken at all is immensely encouraging.

There are in the world today two diametrically opposed philosophies of life. One finds its expression in dictatorship, the other in democracy. The differences between them are not mere differences in governmental forms; they are fundamental, and affect every aspect of life and social organization.

Under the one philosophy, war and the international rivalries that go with war are taken as a matter of course. Every activity of life is conditioned by that assumption, international trade most of all. The old idea of a free exchange of goods between nations is discarded; instead, each nation strives to be "self-contained"—as if any nation, in this day and age, could possibly attain such a state!—and the theory is that one people can profit only at the expense of some other people.

The opposing philosophy is based on the belief that there is enough for everyone in this world if only some proper means of distribution can be found. Peace rather than war is looked on as the normal state; consequently, it is held that a nation prospers best by cultivating the greatest possible interchange of its goods with the goods of other peoples.

The first philosophy means regimentation, restriction, a steady narrowing of the orbit in which individual enterprise can operate; the second means the exact reverse of those things.

Which is why the Anglo-American trade agreement is so important.

For by this agreement the two greatest industrial nations in the world reaffirm their belief in the philosophy which works for freedom and abundance. They do more than reaffirm it; they offer a practical, working demonstration that that philosophy pays greater material dividends than any other.

Viewed in that light, the question whether the agreement is the best that could be obtained is relatively unimportant. It may need a good deal of revision; some of its clauses may work rather badly; it may take months or years to get it into final shape. But the big thing is that the step has been taken.

A new tide in world affairs has been set in motion, flowing away from regimentation and toward freedom. And it may yet develop that the most important news of 1938 was the news of the signing of this trade agreement.

### The Proposed Jewish Havens

Although numbered among the smaller of Great Britain's overseas possessions, the proposed havens for Jewish refugees in Africa and South America are by no means unimportant territories. Rather they are generally productive and fertile lands awaiting economic development.

British Guiana, one of the principal territories mentioned is larger than England, Scotland and Wales combined. It has a population of only about two persons per square mile.

Sugar is the principal export of this South American colony, but aluminum ore virtually has equalled sugar in value in recent years.

The former German colony of Tanganyika in East Africa, now governed by Great Britain, has also been suggested.

Tanganyika's 366,000 square miles of territory support profitable lumber and agricultural operations.

Kenya, north of Tanganyika, also offers opportunities for settlers. It is larger than France and contains thousands of square miles of excellent farm lands.

Among Kenya's principal products are cotton, sugar, coconuts, wheat, corn, coffee and tea. Its capital, Nairobi, is one of the big game hunting centres of the world.

Northern Rhodesia, mentioned as another possible refuge, occupies most of the central plateau of Africa.

### The Middle-Aged Worker

Cheering to the person in his early forties and in marked contrast to the oft-repeated declaration that a man's usefulness has passed when he reaches the age of forty is the declaration by Paul Griffith, of Washington, D.C., American Legion Re-employment Director, that life only begins at forty insofar as the matter of workers' usefulness to industry is concerned.

"The contention that men and women reaching the forty-year age group no longer are assets to industry," he said, "has been disproven definitely."

Continuing, he told a Legion conference that studies by a national committee of employment of older workers had shown the average worker at forty, because of his maturity and greater stability and responsibility, was just reaching the prime of his usefulness.

Sorry indeed would be the world if the person of forty, having completed barely half of his working life, were condemned to take to the shelf as many of his critics propose.

### The Feminists' Heaven

The answer to the feminists' dream, the land where the female of the species holds complete control of power, appears to exist in the hill tribe of the Sahirs of Bengal, where the women are the rulers. Women have the right to marry anyone they like and to marry as many times as they like. If they do not like their marriages, they simply dissolve them, and the children of such marriages do not recognize their fathers, only their mothers.

Recently when one of the tribesmen advocated "faith in fatherhood" as the basis for tribal life, other members of the tribe were so shocked at this attack on their customs that they speared him to death.

Three of the murderers were sentenced to death by the Sessions Judge at Rangpur.

The fact that a meeting of the tribe's elders decreed the death and that the murderers only carried it out made no difference, said the judge, adding that the law could not recognize customs which permitted such crimes.

### Editor's Note-Book

Christmas is just one month away.

Brantford and Guelph have discarded street cars in favor of buses. We hope the residents of these two towns do not have to tolerate the odor of foul oil which the Sherbrooke buses have scattered so freely and generously.

The Sherbrooke Chamber of Commerce will have achieved something truly worth while if they can awaken the City Aldermen to the importance and necessity of a second bridge. It will take quite a bit of awakening—the aldermen are sound sleepers—at times.

#### TWEEDSMUIRS AS HOSTS OF ROYALTY

(By Writer in the Glasgow Bulletin) When the King and Queen go to Canada next year (all being well) their principal host and hostess will be a Scotsman and his wife, Lord and Lady Tweedsmuir. The Governor-General of Canada is perhaps best known to most of us through his books, and I am told by one who should know that both their Majesties have read every one of John Buchan's works and are therefore well acquainted with his merits as a purveyor of literature.

Government House, Ottawa, is said by those who know both to resemble Buckingham Palace architecturally. But whereas the latter stands in considerably less than half a hundred acres, "Rideau Hall" is surrounded by a private estate of a thousand acres. Much of its present beauty is due to the efforts of Princess Louise, Duchess of Argyll, the ninety-year-old daughter of Queen Victoria, who was its chateau for five years.

It is sixty years since the Princess went out to Canada with her husband on his appointment as Governor-General. She was delighted with the official residence and grounds, and spent much time and thought on further enhancing their beauty. Among other things she had a wonderful carriage drive cut through the woods to give what is really an unforgettable view of the surrounding country; while here and there remains to this day little huts which she had built in particularly fine spots that delighted her artistic soul. The house has one hundred rooms, including a huge ball or reception room, and Lady Tweedsmuir, now the presiding genius, makes one of the most charming of hostesses.

#### THE HERO-STATE IN ACTION

(New York Herald-Tribune) Because a Polish Jew, suffering under all the brutalities which have been imposed upon his people, shot and killed a Nazi diplomat in Paris, the citizens of that great, enlightened god-state which is to be a model for all mankind gave themselves a long day yesterday of dynamiting and burning German synagogues, wrecking and looting Jewish shops and similarly demonstrating the heroic virtues of their culture.

One would not have supposed that a single assassination would have been taken so seriously by a nation which only four years ago reorganized its own government by cold-bloodedly and officially assassinating half the most eminent of its own political leaders. One might have thought that a system which has made it a cardinal principle of state to rob, oppress, torture and vilify a minority too weak to resist, would have taken it as just a part of the beastly game when one of the victims managed to find a means of striking back. One might even have thought that a nation which puts such emphasis upon the soldierly qualities of courage, fortitude and honor would hesitate, just for the looks of the thing, to do all its fighting against the feeble and the helpless.

One might have supposed these things. But the ugly child who enjoys tying tin cans to the tails of stray cats has rarely failed to shriek with rage and pain when he gets scratched. The gospel of brutality has rarely failed to breed brutality; but grosser brutality in its devotees. Contempt for the worth and mystery of the human spirit, in whatever body it may live, has rarely failed to make those who practice it anything other than contemptible.

One can understand the new wave of Nazi outrages. What one cannot understand is how even the present masters of Germany imagine that in permitting this sort of thing they are inviting for their great creation anything but the disgust of all civilized men.

#### SOUTH AMERICA IS U.S. PROBLEM

(Washington Cor., Detroit Free Press)

The intense rivalry for economic and moral hegemony over South America constitutes diplomatic problem No. 1 at the White House. It will become more acute—and more important—as European conflicts inspire a Western withdrawal from Old World alliances and disputes.

As Uncle Sam turns his eyes southward for new friends and markets, he finds the proud South and Central American states doubtful about their future. To the north is Mexico engaged in land and property experiments which appear to be radical, almost communistic, on their face. Then there is Brazil, which has recently revealed its distaste for fascist philosophy.

Now that he has established himself in Central Europe, Herr Hitler will move for greater economic penetration of South America. In no time at all the great and little powers below must decide which they will team with—communistic Mexico, the Italo-German axis, the Brazil-Argentine-American group.

It is not a problem that can be solved with treaties, conferences, vague mummings about a Good Neighbor policy. Too many factors—racial, religious, economic, social, political—are involved to permit an orthodox solution.

But the fact that Secretary Hull will probably attend the December peace conference at Lima indicates his preoccupation with the question. The Americas, in his opinion must stand together against foreign invaders.

#### MEAT FROM COAL IN GERMANY

(London Sunday Dispatch) Synthetic meat, made from coal, water and air, is being developed in Germany.

thrive on substances like beet-sugar molasses and potatoes only.

These substances, however, are not very cheap, and now Dr. K. R. Dietrich, a British chemist, has isolated a strain of yeast that can live on such inexpensive chemicals as lactic acid, acetic acid and glycerine.

These compounds are now largely produced synthetically from coal and brown coal, so that the ultimate source of the artificial meat is coal.

Water, the second ingredient, is indispensable, for, whether the yeast's diet consists of sugar or lactic acid the substance must be provided as a solution in water.

The third factor is important, too, for yeast needs its ration of nitrogen, which it captures from the air. It is calculated that yeasts in great masses when supplied with these factors will yield about half their dry weight in crude protein.

Crude protein is the chemical name of the stuff of which lean meat is made.

Yeast protein is not yet suitable for direct human consumption, but it can be fed to cattle, and thus transformed into meat and milk.

#### DOUBLE WASTAGE

(Providence Journal)

If in the name of all that is wise—economically, socially, and culturally—the nations should return to a more sober sense in ordering their preparedness, they might also, for the same basic reason, give some consideration to the abnormal wastage represented by excessive governmental expenditures for a variety of needless purposes. The whole world keeps plunging deeper and deeper into debt for things it does not need. Here in our own country, for instance, we are currently using an extraordinary percentage of our national income to finance non-essential undertakings planned and executed by politicians. Such spending, even when allotted for justifiable projects, does not ordinarily possess the efficiency that attends private spending where every dollar is made to count. The injury to the workers of the nation becomes manifold when their hard-earned substance is spent by politicians for things the citizens neither need nor want.

### REDOUBLE IS NO EXCUSE FOR BIDDING IF HAND LACKS NECESSARY STRENGTH

This is the fourth of a series of six articles discussing the latest in bidding and play which will be seen at the twelfth annual convention and national bridge championships of the American Contract Bridge League at Cleveland the week beginning November 28.

ner, "The redouble makes it unnecessary for me to bid. I do not have a strong hand nor a good five-card suit. I want you to take yourself out." Good players today have found that opponents do not get into a contract of one, doubled and redoubled, unless they can make it. North redoubles because he believes that he and his partner can make one heart doubled and redoubled. East's hand is weak and lacks a good five-card suit, so the common sense thing for him to do is to pass and let his partner who doubled take himself out. In other words, it isn't stylish with the experts to bid over a redouble on weak hands.

The bidding procedure when one player has opened the bidding, second hand has doubled and partner of the opening bidder has redoubled, is one which has brought sharp disagreement between contract authorities. It has been contended that in the bidding sequence shown on today's hand, East's first pass literally says, "I'm passing for penalties because I think I can defeat the contract." Otherwise, they argue, North in every case could make a psychic redouble with impunity.

However, that argument does not hold today. When such a bidding sequence occurs in Cleveland next week, as it frequently will, East's pass will simply convey to his partner,

**Cabbage and Meat Rolls**  
(6 servings)

Six large cabbage leaves, 1-2 pound ground round steak, 1 tablespoon raw rice, 1 small onion chopped, 1 teaspoon minced celery leaves, 1 teaspoon minced parsley, 1-2 cup water or stock, seasoning, 2 cups tomato juice.

Plunge cabbage leaves into the boiling water. Cook two minutes only. Cut down the heavy midrib of each leaf. Combine round steak, rice, onion, celery leaves and parsley. Season and add water or stock. Place about 1 tablespoon of this mixture in a base of each cabbage leaf, then roll up. Pack the rolls in a double boiler, pour over the tomato juice, cover and cook two hours.

This Swedish recipe as given in the Swedish Princesses Cook Book, compiled by Jenny Akerstrom, deserves royal favor.

**Swedish Meat Balls (Kottbullar)**  
(6 servings)

Ten ounces boneless tender beef, 10 ounces boneless lean pork, 5-8 cup bread crumbs, 1-4 to 2-3 cups milk, 1 egg, 1 medium yellow onion minced, 2 tablespoons cooking fat, salt, pepper, allspice.

For frying: 3 tablespoons butter or fat.

For gravy: meat juice, stock, 1-2 tablespoons flour.

Soak crumbs in half the milk. Wipe, trim and cut the meat into small pieces, run through a grinder four times, combine with crumbs and knead well. Add egg, seasonings and gradually the rest of the milk. Cook onion in fat without browning, chill and add the meat mixture. Shape meat into balls with 2 tablespoons dipped in cold water.

Fry in fat, shaking the pan and turning the balls to brown uniformly. Remove balls and fry remainder in the same way. Rinse the pan each time and reserve the juice for the gravy. Mix flour with cold water and stir into the juice, cook while adding cream and stock enough to give gravy the desired thickness.

Season to taste, return balls to the gravy to reheat and turn into a serving dish. Serve with green vegetables and potatoes.

## Free Library Is Fine But 'teener Needs His Own Collection

The problem of good reading for adolescents is really no longer a problem at all, with the hundreds of magnificent volumes now published for children of early teen age. Public libraries are stocked to bulging with high class material for these boys and girls, better still, reference clerks ready to advise with selections are different from the old time ditty which merely pointed to the catalogue.

Furthermore, school libraries with their shelves of selected and required reading are a boon indeed to the youngsters of our day.

The child in his teens is more than ready for a personal library, however. It is one thing to read a fine story of biography and another to own it. I have always derided the one weakness of the free-text book system, that it leaves no sources for reference later. I lay beside this grievance that of the library system. Necessary and fine though libraries are, they leave a decided gap in a young person's life. Books are friends. The people in them are friends. Everyone from D'Aragon to George Washington, from Jo March to Jean de Arc, is a present vibrating figure whose near presence is a comforting thing.

**Reading Is Education**  
All reading is education of a sort. Good reading is the agent for almost everything fine there is: inspiration, sportsmanship and facts.

Lately I have been devouring a lot of grand books for the young adolescent. I have burnt my lamp into the early hours, forgetful of time and eyesight, lost completely in new biographies such as "Leader of Deeds" by Jeannette Eaton (Harcourt Brace), a gripping life story of Washington. Boys then were mature and ready for careers at sixteen. This is a Washington stripped of his formal legends and become the human being; the awkward young

man, the uncertain lover, the discouraged soldier, the troubled statesman. Now I am reading "Penn" by Elizabeth Janet Gray (Viking), the story of the founder of the Pennsylvania Commonwealth. More midnight oil and loss of sleep. I thought I knew history. I am only learning. The little boy, William Penn, studying Latin from six a.m. to six p.m. at nine years of age off there in London under the shadow of the great Tower. His rise to royal favor. His ideals and plans for a Utopia in the new world. A very human and fascinating account of greatness at its best.

Another biography that will bring young students of American literature closer to one of its famed authors is "The Happy Autocrat" (Longmans), by Hildegard Hawthorne. Oliver Wendell Holmes, the Doctor-Author of Cambridge and Boston, who wrote "Old Ironsides," and "The Chambered Nautilus," was such a human, kindly, hard-working man, given to puns, that the reader sighs on closing the saga of his busy life.

**Books Help Memory**  
There are so many good books, but soon I shall compile some new lists for you. Adventure, science, history, everything. At a formative age when memory is retentive, how wise it is to put a shelf in John's or Mary's room and, one by one, add to the treasures they hold.

I read these books for young people with as much relish as I pursue literature for adults. They are indeed adult and not "written down." I want to add that "Andrew Jackson" by Marquis James, (Bobbs-Merrill) is not a juvenile, but if you own it, your sons of fifteen to twenty, and daughters, too, will find it a fascinating recital. I like biography, as you may have noticed.

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# FINANCIAL AND MARKET NEWS

## Bank Of Montreal Reports Progress With Business

Annual Statement Reflects Expansion of Industrial and Commercial Activities—Increase in Earnings Absorbed by Higher Taxation—Assets of \$874,255,828 at High Mark Since 1929—Current Loans Increase \$22,942,637 and Deposits \$45,357,839—Quickly Available Resources 77.80 Per Cent of All Liabilities to the Public.

Continued progress is revealed by the 121st annual statement of the Bank of Montreal for the period ending October 31, now being distributed to shareholders. In addition to growth in current loans, deposits show a substantial increase; the cash position of the Bank is stronger; the liquid position is well maintained; the total assets of \$874,255,828 are at the highest point since 1929. Profits show some contraction but

would have been above the level of the previous year had it not been for the greater amount required in Dominion and Provincial Government taxes.

Deposits, at a total of \$763,156,945, are higher by \$45,357,839. There is some reduction in the notes of the Bank in circulation, in keeping with the curtailment in bank circulations following upon the greater percentage of Bank of Can-

ada notes now being used throughout the country. In addition to the expansion of current loans to business and industry, including loans to provincial and municipal governments and school districts by \$22,942,637 to a total of \$227,703,449, the Bank's cash resources of \$152,540,082 show an increase of \$17,929,772, and there is a further growth of \$3,354,995 in holdings of government bonds and other debentures, such investments, the greater portion of which consists of gilt-edged securities which mature at early dates, now totalling \$440,736,820.

**Strong Liquid Position**  
Call loans outside of Canada at \$21,498,005 are higher by \$1,614,061, and call loans in Canada at \$5,374,980 lower by \$1,482,720. Other items among the Bank's investments include \$159,651 in industrial and other stocks, and this small amount is \$156,583 less than a year ago. Figures representing letters of credit and other banking operations are comparatively little

changed. Of the total assets of \$874,255,828, the quickly available resources total \$620,355,119, which is equal to 77.80 per cent of all liabilities to the public.

The year's net earnings, after making appropriations to the contingent reserve fund—out of which fund full provision for bad and doubtful debts has been made—and after deducting Dominion and Provincial Government taxes, were well maintained. While the profits of \$3,398,390 are \$9,937 less than for the preceding year, the government taxes referred to increased by \$209,660. The profits were equivalent to 4.46 per cent on the capital, rest and undivided profits, which compares with 4.47 per cent for the preceding year. The usual dividends were paid and, after appropriating \$500,000—an increase of \$100,000—for bank premises, a surplus of \$18,390 was carried forward, to increase the balance of profit and loss to \$1,183,254.

With the holiday in the United States yesterday, the foreign exchanges locally were quiet. Sterling in terms of the United States dollar was again easier and moved between 4.9475 and 4.9675, closing at 4.9475, a 64th. On a Canadian dollar basis the rate moved between 4.87½ and 4.88½.

The United States dollar after being offered at 11-16 per cent premium at the opening declined to a low of 19-32 per cent premium, closed at 19-32 to ½ per cent premium.

Gold bars were quoted in London at 149 shillings and 2 pence an ounce. The equivalent price in Canadian funds with sterling at 4.8931 would be \$95.

# RAIDERS TRAIL CORNWALL BY ONE POINT

## Defeat Cataracts 5-3 In Stormy Encounter

Penalties Fly as Sherbrooke Moves Into Second Place—Harris, Moussette Each Score Twice — "Guidoo" Roy Gets Three Assists—Ferry and McLeod Sparkle in Goals.

Continuing a victory march started last Saturday, Sherbrooke Red Raiders took over sole possession of second place in the Provincial Hockey League last night when they smashed out a 5-3 victory over Shawinigan Falls Cataracts in a rough and rugged game at the Arena. With Valleyfield Braves idle, the local senior aggregation moved up to within one point of the league-leading Cornwall Flyers, which team they are scheduled to meet over the next week-end in a two-game series.

Featured by a wild third period that saw a steady stream of players to the penalty box, the game last night proved to be the roughest so far this season with Jean-Paul Ranger stealing the spotlight when he visited the cooler for nineteen minutes of the third period. Fifteen penalties were handed out in all, nine in the hectic third frame.

Hank Harris, playing his third game this year in Sherbrooke livery, knifed in two characteristic goals to head the sharpshooters, while Moussette, who scored two and assisted in the third Cataract marker, shone for the Shawinigan outfit. "Guidoo" Roy, though scoreless, made the plays for three of the Red Raiders points and was credited with a trio of assists for his night's work.

A fair-sized crowd saw both teams open play cautiously in the first period, and for the first five minutes, neither goalie had much work as the puck remained in the centre ice area. A penalty to Belanger was the signal for a concerted Sherbrooke drive and while the Shawinigan winger cooled his heels Red Raiders made things hot for McLeod in the Cataract net. No damage resulted, however, and for the remainder of the period both teams battled on a fairly even footing. Play was spotty as players of the two outfits missed scoring opportunities through faulty passing and wild shooting.

The second frame was but scarcely a minute old when Shawinigan, taking advantage of a penalty to Harris, stormed the Sherbrooke citadel and Goulet took a pass from Moussette to sink the disc behind Ferley. The early score seemed to have a marked effect on the play of both teams and the pace speeded up appreciably as the Red Raiders battled for the equalizer. McLeod and Ferley gave a good account of themselves as they blocked what seemed to be sure goals.

Towards the close of the period Babe Leblanc, left for a minute unguarded in front of the Cataract net, took a pass from Bell to put the local outfit on even terms with Shawinigan via a pretty shot to the corner of McLeod's goal. Fireworks were not long in starting in the third frame. From the face-off Harris rushed in for a score on a pass from Cormier. Two minutes later the sustained efforts of the Shawinigan team were rewarded as Moussette again put the teams on an equal footing. Play roughened up appreciably at this stage of the game and the penalty box which had an occupant for practically all of the period, was visited by players of both teams.

Ranger, who a few minutes before had been given a minor penalty, was accorded a major as he tangled with Gauthier, of the Cataracts. On the way to the cooler the burly local defenceman got into an altercation with Belanger and, for his pains, had

a ten-minute misconduct penalty tacked on him by Referee Mallinson.

While the teams were playing one man shy, Coach Cormier, of Sherbrooke, put his outfit in the lead again when his bullet-like shot found a nesting place in the twine behind McLeod. Both teams battled furiously to score and two minutes after Cormier's goal Archambault skated past over to Archambault who gave Ferley no chance on his hard shot.

Three minutes before the finish of the game Hank Harris snared the puck while McLeod was flat on his back from a shot by Roy and, rounding the prone Shawinigan goalie, slipped the rubber into an open net. Play was held up for about five minutes as the Cataract players protested that the puck had not gone into the goal, but the referees allowed the score. In a last effort Ildege Gervais sent on five forwards, but while the entire Shawinigan team was milling around the Sherbrooke net, Bell and Babe Leblanc broke into the open. With a clear path ahead Bell had no difficulty in outguessing McLeod.

Frenette and Goulet were the pick of the losers while Roy, Harris and Laforest on the forward line, and Dugre and Bastarache, on defence, shone for the Red Raiders. Ferley, in the Sherbrooke nets, was his usual cool self and handed difficult Shawinigan thrusts in a brilliant fashion. McLeod, making his first appearance locally since he played with Granby last year, also turned in a worthy effort.

## RANGERS MOUNT TO HEIGHTS IN NATIONAL LOOP

Patricians Paste Toronto, 6-2, as Detroit Wings Down Hawks, Four-Two — Canadiens Register First Point in Eight Games.

Just as Detroit Red Wings were regaining the punch of their National Hockey League championship hockey, Charlie Conacher's old victory jinx came along and damaged a main cog in their comeback plans.

Conacher was carried from the ice before the Wings began to score in their four to two victory over the World Champion Black Hawks at Detroit last night. The extent of the leg and shoulder injuries to big Chuck—one of the heaviest, most brilliant and yet most unfortunate men in the game—remains to be determined today.

But no matter what the X-ray pictures say, the fact remains that Conacher has been lost to the Wings while the teams up front are setting a torrid pace in their bitter struggle for first place. Then, too, the last-place Montreal Canadiens, after seven straight defeats, may be knocking on the sixth-place Detroit's door.

New York Rangers took a one-point lead at the top over Chicago, Boston and New York Americans last night by trimming Toronto six to two at New York. Canadiens registered their first point of the campaign by tying Americans two to two at Montreal.

A collision with Phil Bestler, Black Hawk rookie, forced Conacher out in the second period. The injury to the right winger with the smoking shot was listed beside a shoulder hurt he suffered earlier in the season and a string of fractures, sprains and bruises he ran into during his years with Toronto.

Shortly after he went out the Wings got a chance to strike again. This time, with Alex Levinsky, of Chicago, serving a penalty, Mud Bruneteau paced the team. He scored in a string of fourteen minutes of the second and helped Syd Howe in another goal forty-eight seconds later.

Jeffrey Deslites scored for the Hawks as the third began but Rookie Syd Abel made Detroit's margin three to one and Syd Howe extended it by another goal with seven minutes to go.

Paul Thompson finished the scoring for Chicago and Bruneteau's penalty shot was saved by Goalie Mike Karakas in the dying moments. A Thanksgiving Day crowd of 14,000 turned out at New York to watch young Bryant Hextall score twice and add three assists in Rangers' victory for the most spectacular individual exhibition of the season. Rookie Dutch Hiller got two goals and assist and Phil Watson a goal and three assists to stamp the Hextall-Hiller-Watson line as one of the N. H. L.'s best in its first year.

The great goals-against average Turk Broda of the Maple Leafs had a compiling was knocked sky-high by the Rangers' barrage. But it was no fault of the Turk's. He had to take time out for repairs twice and on easy shots escaped him. Pep Kelly and Murph Chamberlain scored for the Leafs and Muzz Patrick was the blueshirts' other goal-getter.

Canadiens, after absorbing a seven to three beating from the Americans at New York Tuesday, stepped into a two to nothing lead in the first period in the return engagement on goals by Paul Haynes and Rod Lorrain. But their crushing defensive tactics and forward-line speed were out as Tommy Anderson scored a goal in each of the second and third. The overtime was uneventful.

## FULL HOUSE TO WATCH WELTER TITLE BATTLE

Ballyhoo About Garcia's Murderous Punching Cannot Shake Public's Confidence in Negro Wonder — Armstrong 2 to 3 Favorite.

New York, Nov. 25.—(P)—Henry Armstrong has been paid some nice compliments in the course of his mad career, but the bookmakers and the betting public have handed him his greatest one today by installing him a two to three favorite over Cefterio Garcia for their fifteen-round welterweight title bout tonight in Madison Square Garden.

The thousands of words written and said about Garcia's murderous punches have done nothing to shake the public's confidence in the little negro wonder. The fact that the husky Filipino will outweigh Henry by a dozen pounds when they enter the ring is worth only a bored "So what?" from Henry's loyal rooters.

Few fighters have gained such a hold on the customers. Promoter Mike Jacobs says indications are that the big hall will be packed, with close to \$15,000 in the till. Only four reserved tickets were turned back when the bout was postponed from its original date, November 2.

Though Garcia has a record nearly as striking as Armstrong's over the last two years, and has been belting out welterweights and middleweights while Henry was rolling up thirty-nine consecutive victories over the little fellows, Armstrong remains the drawing card.

Some 20,000 hearts will hit a faster beat when the little dark man goes charging out on his spindly legs, closes in on Garcia and begins his tireless tattoo. Every instant there will be the threat of Garcia's deadly punches, the long, vicious uppercuts that floored Barney Ross twice.

Armstrong knows how to fight only one way—ever crowding his man, ever throwing punches, bullying and wrestling his opponent ceaselessly until there is no more fight left in the other man. He plans to do just that against Garcia and never let the Filipino get set for a blow. Such wise old ring men as Benny Leonard, Johnny Dundee and others think he will get away with it.

On the other hand, there are plenty of others who think the thing is a set-up for Garcia. Armstrong, they admit, is one of the greatest lightweight champions, a terrific fighter at 135 pounds, but, they point out, he won his welterweight crown from a washed-up, tired Barney Ross. And at that he couldn't out Barry on the canvas, though the Jewish boy was a "staggering wreck" for the last five or six rounds.

Jack Corbett, the baseball man from Syracuse comes into the discussion over who started the spiral kicking and passing. Jack says way back when he was a gay young balde, he remembers it was a new stunt connected with a fellow named Heisberger playing for Stagg at Chicago. Joe Hart writes from Kansas City that in 1905 Coach Eddie Cochenis had a couple of boys teasing them at St. Louis University.

Finally, after all the evidence had been received and the question argued pro and con, the vote was taken and accorded across the decision. Casting votes were Walter Senhouse, president, James Riddell, first vice-president, and Moe Herscovitch, second vice-president of the Quebec Rugby Football Union, and the representatives of Sherbrooke and Argos.

## Quebec Union Upholds Umpire Ulley's Ruling

Officials Throw Out Protest of Sherbrooke Athletics—Question Was Not if Ball Went Over or Under in Final Analysis, but Whether or Not Umpire's Decision to Be Supported.

Declaring that in any sport the decision of an official must be accepted as final although he may have erred in judgment, the executive of the Quebec Rugby Football Union, meeting last night in the Queen's Hotel in Montreal, rejected the protest of Sherbrooke Athletics on a disputed field goal in the last seconds of play of the Verdun Argos-Sherbrooke game and declared Argos rightful opponents of St. Lambert for the Provincial intermediate championship.

The judgment was handed out, it seemed evident, on the basis of Umpire Frank Ulley's version of the play in question. Ulley declared emphatically and energetically that in his mind there was no question but that the ball had cleared the posts by about three or four inches. He stated that he saw the ball after he had run back toward the Sherbrooke goalposts when he saw that the Verdun quarterback had called a placement, and followed the flight of the pigskin over the top of the bars.

Referee Harold Platt, in a very fair report, told the meeting that he could not over-rule Ulley because he had lost sight of the ball soon after it left the toe of Halfback Cy Wagner. Platt was standing a few yards behind Wagner when the play was made.

Coach Eddie Wolfe, spokesman for Sherbrooke, based his case on sworn testimony by Hally Evans, Athletics' safety man, that the ball had passed under the bars and into his arms approximately four yards behind the goal-line, on testimony of witnesses who declared they had seen the ball pass under the posts, and on the contention that the ball, kicked from placement from approximately the thirty-yard line, could not have cleared the bar, as claimed, and still ended its flight in Evans' arms.

Jack Beach, of Montreal, and Frank Cooke, of St. Lambert, who had been standing in good positions to follow the flight of the ball, swore they had seen it pass underneath the bar. Cross-examined closely, Cooke told the executive that he would always believe the ball failed to clear the bar, and that in a Royal Canadian Air Force eye examination he had been given perfect marks.

Wagner, who kicked the ball, said that he followed its flight and saw plainly that it went over the bars. The meeting questioned the statement since Referee Platt had previously stated that he had lost sight of the ball. Platt was no farther away from the posts than Wagner, and it seemed strange that one could see it and the other not.

Letters from Carvell Hammond and Russell Gough were read to the meeting. Although the latter could not swear that the ball went under he stated that those standing around him on approximately the fifteen-yard line had told him it went beneath the bar. Hammond said that he saw the ball from the time it left Wagner's toe to the time it passed above or beneath the bars. He saw it pass under.

What's this about the Ohio State squad going on "strike" the Monday before the Michigan game till Coach Francis Schmidt returned Tackle Frank Smith to active duty? One story says Smith was fired after a fight over who was to get the ball from the Illinois game, and the squad lined up behind him to force Schmidt to lift the ban.

California Fight Commission recognizes Fred Apostoli as middleweight champ since he stopped Young Corbett. But now San Francisco promoters are planning to have Solly Krieger head their Xmas show. And Solly is recognized everywhere but in California and New York. Now how'll they bill him in Frisco?
