

\$90,000 Surplus in Valleyfield

CITY COUNCIL PASSES RECORD BUDGET

At the meeting of the Valleyfield Council on Monday night of this week the budget for the city for the year 1964 was passed for an amount of \$1,720,405.41. This represents an increase of about 100,000 dollars over last year. It also allows for an anticipated surplus at the end of 1964 of \$90,000 or as the city calls it a reserve fund. Here are some of the main sources the city expects to derive the necessary funds from to meet its expenses:

Total expected income is \$1,720,405.41 while anticipated expenditures are \$1,630,69.

At Monday's meeting the Council also approved the holding of a proprietors meeting on Monday February 17th for the purpose of finalizing the borrowing of \$600,000 by the city for its Industrial fund.

Mr. Guy Parent was hired by the council to be in charge of the Municipal Beach during the next summer season. The council gave Montgomery Fuels Ltd. authority to lay a pipe line to the homes in the Trudeau housing developments. This will provide home owners with an automatic oil supply. The amount each household uses will be monitored with meters. This is the first time such a system will be installed in Valleyfield.

The appointed engineers by the city to make a plan for the cities water purification plant have submitted their findings to the city. They have been entrusted to city manager Alcide Lafontaine who will make a further study of the problem. The council voted a grant of \$1,000 for the "Soeurs Notre-Dame du bon conseil" recreational facilities. Also, 230 dollars was voted for the majorettes to hold their convention on Valleyfield on July 25th and 26th.

The council has asked the Canadian National Telegraph company to make more lines available for telegram traffic to and from Valleyfield. At the moment there is only one line to Montreal.

Purification Plant for St-Philomene

The National Employment Service in Beauharnois announced that the Federal and Provincial Governments have recently approved a \$480,000 project for the construction of a purification plant at Ste. Philomene de Chateauguy.

The 90% federal-provincial share of the direct payroll costs, \$30,000, will be \$27,000.

This project will provide employment for some 60 workers.

Improved Employment Situation

Mr. J. DeSerres, Manager of the National Employment Office in Valleyfield, reports that on January 31, 1964, 1901 male and 555 female workers were registered for employment, compared to 1830 male, 489 female workers on December 31, 1963 and 2544 male, 541 female workers on January 31, 1963. This represents a 6% general increase since the last month, particularly in construction, trade, clerical work and services.

In comparison with January 1963, a 26% decrease in male division and a 2% increase in female division are noted, particularly in construction, transport, clerical work and service fields. During January, 1964, 330 persons found work through the National Employment Service in manufacturing, construction, services and municipal winter works. National Employment Service authorities are confident that this general decrease will continue during the coming months.

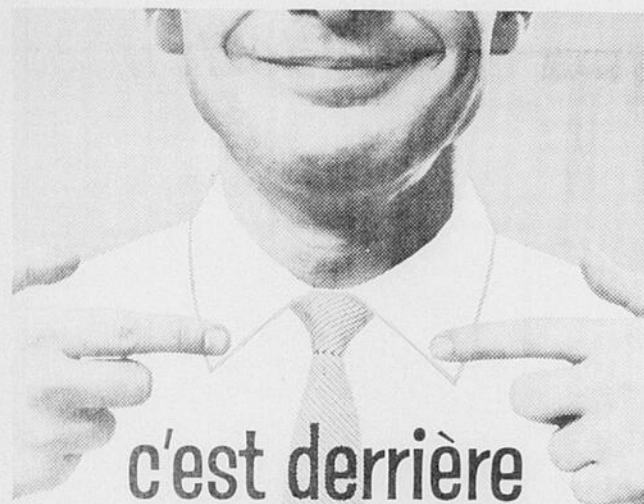

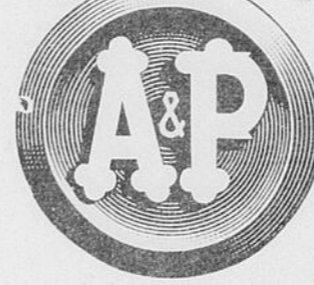

Challenging Series of Tests for New Personal Fitness Badges for Canadian Cubs and Scouts

Fitness Through Scouting is the activity theme for 1964 for over 281,000 Canadian Boy Scouts. In over 12,000 packs, troops and crews boys are currently enjoying a challenging series of physical tests, exercises and activities. Four new personal fitness badges were introduced on January 1, 1964.

It all started early in 1962 when a special staff study committee was formed at National Scout Headquarters in Ottawa to determine ways and means of furthering fitness among the boy members of Boy Scouts of Canada. After approving the committee's report in October 1962, the National Executive Committee set a theme of Fitness Through Scouting for Boy Scout Week (February 16-23) and for the rest of 1964.

In June 1963 the National Council on Fitness and Amateur Sport approved a grant to Boy Scouts of Canada to assist with the Fitness Through Scouting

theme. This helped make possible the publication of a twenty-eight page Fitness Manual for leaders. Fourteen pages of illustrated charts make this manual a mine of valuable information. Film strips and other supporting material are also

being widely used.

Each month the Movement's Scout Leader magazine provides programme ideas based on such different aspects of fitness as fit for—emergencies, space, service, fun, action, citizenship, olympics, exploring and adventure.

The new personal fitness badges form a four-stage project. The physical tests involved are based upon requirements established following the testing of thousands of children. They are designed for boys aged ten, twelve, fourteen and sixteen. Each stage is represented by a badge of identical design but

A reception for about 60 guests was held at the Rustic Motel after which the bride and groom left on their wedding trip.



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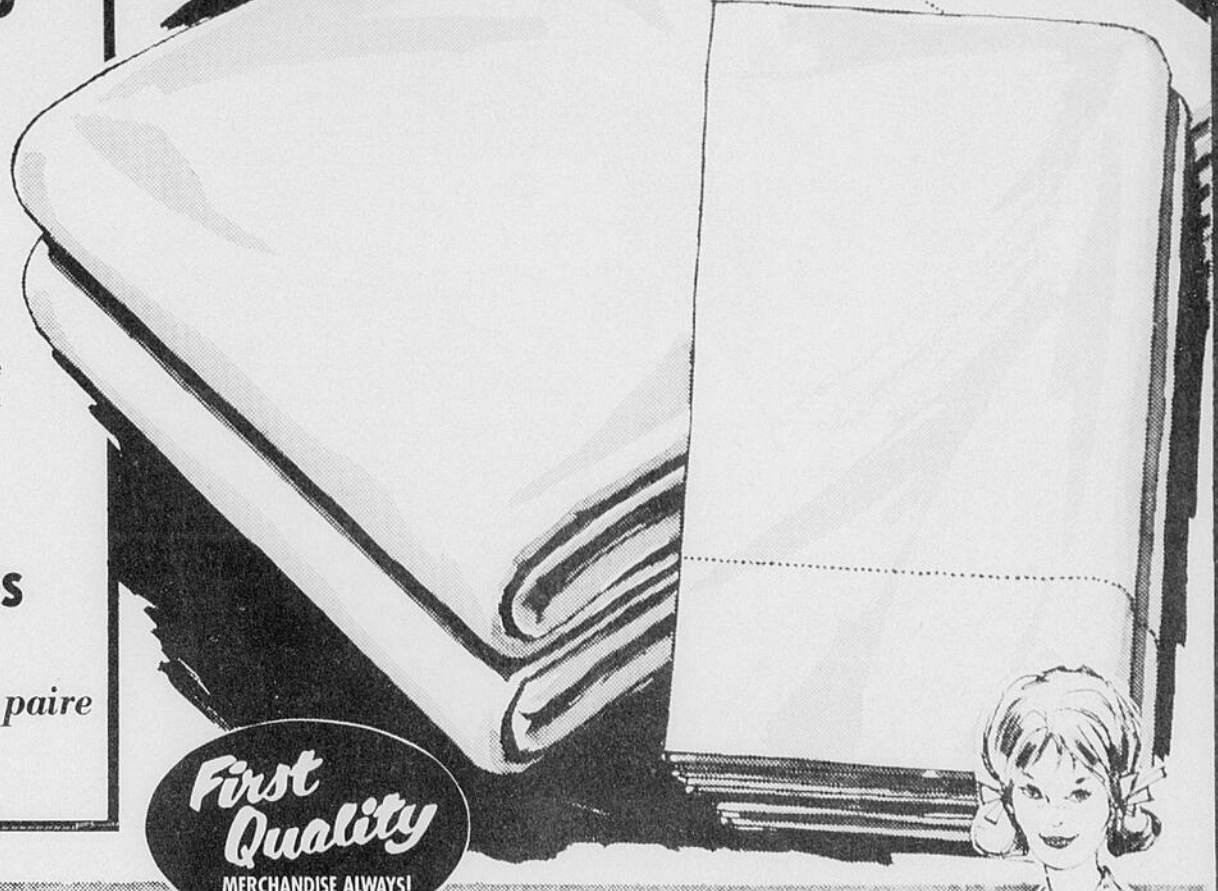
