We have no later dates from Europe than at the issuing of our paper of Tuesday. We have consequently yet to learn in what part of England the king landed on his return from the Emerald Isle, where he received every homage short of worship; and where he made every return that could tend to keep alive the flame of loyalty with which every Irish breast was so ardently kindled. Nor was this the only result of his majesty's visit to that portion of the British dominions; for it appears that, where there had been much previous division, his majesty's appearance, like the dove of peace that came with healing on its wings, operated as a sovereign remedy to convert the plague of party and religious dissensions into the pleasing strife of who should be most forward to forgive and forget. Thus, as it is acknowledged by all, speaks trumpet-tongued of his majesty's dominating powers, as being of no common description.

No people in the world are more alive to good or bad treatment than the Irish; none more ready and quick to receive their gratitude and attachment for the former; none more easily roused into resentment for the latter. None are more disposed to be pleased when they perceive a wish to please; none more prompt to take offence, when they conceive offence to be meant. They had discernment to perceive that his majesty sought the affection, and that he knew how to gain them; and the force they were not backward, nor slow, nor late were, in bestowing them. They poured them out with all the ardour of enthusiasm.

As we suspected the first accounts of the damage done to the crops in England turned out to be much exaggerated. The sudden rise on this side the water has lately received a check by a fall in the prices of wheat and flour; added to which, we have but few vessels in port to take off what produce may offer; freights are in consequence said to be high. None were more ready to take advantage of the rumour of a great rise than our bakers. We trust that the labouring classes will eat their bread this winter as reasonably as ever. A rise in articles of the first necessity at the setting in of winter, must be sensibly felt by our numerous poor.

To the Editor of the QUEBEC MERCURY.

Sir—This is the age of revolutions—Secret associations exist in every country, whose views inimical to every kind of order, disturb the well disposed, and distract all established governments. Who that is aware of the mysterious proceedings of the Illuminati, which now shake the Germanic body in its base. Who that remembers the atrocities of the Jacobins, or the horrors which the Carbonari have brought upon the fairest portion of the Globe will doubt that Canada has its Democrats? Yes, Sir, they exist in fearful numbers, as we have all long felt and lamented; but we have been so much, and so deeply interested by the convulsions of foreign states, we have vacillated with so generous and disinterested a spirit at the infernal projects of the Radicals in Great-Britain, that we have been insensible to the danger which threatens us with utter ruin at home. I was reserved for a sapient gentleman high in civil authority, whose office or chair (*) would seem

to confer a species of second sight, to discover that there exists in the very bosom of this metropolis, an organized band of miscreants, professing principles destructive of all social subordination, and calculated in their consequences to spread anarchy and desolation throughout the land. May the alarm which he has sounded awaken the slumbering energies of every patriot citizen. May it rouse the community from its torpor, and inspire every loyal inhabitant of the Province with the ardent and courage which should glow in the bosom, when all that endears man to life is menaced with destruction.

It would be wrong to anticipate the account which is to follow by any ill timed remarks. I shall not therefore expatiate upon the means by which the invaluable discovery alluded to has been effected, nor even stop to pay a passing tribute of admiration to the wonderful penetration and prescience with which the distinguished personage in question has the singular felicity to be endowed. It cannot have escaped the recollection of the public, that an astonishing proof of his sagacity was given one memorable evening in the year 1813(†) but it certainly never was in any thing more conspicuous than in this fact, that the ignorant citizens of Quebec, have for a long series of years been threatened with the most dreadful calamity from certain subterranean canals whose apertures are closed by wooden plugs, distributed in different parts of the city, and which its infatuated inhabitants like the ill fated Trojans of yore, have heedlessly suffered to remain undisturbed. Happily however for society and generations yet unborn, our Guardian Angel has discovered by a wonderful but infallible process, borrowed from that immortal institution the Spanish Inquisition, that these were engines of destruction which the Conspiring Democrats had prepared, to subvert the government of our most Gracious Sovereign and to deliver over our unhappy country to the tyranny of foreign despots. In consequence of this discovery, a strong *château-de-frise* has been erected in the vicinity of the apertures above mentioned, in each of which large bodies of military and municipal guards have been lodged, as well for the purpose of securing them, as of protecting the well disposed, and embarrassing the movements of the ill affected. It is unnecessary to state that this conspiracy is headed by some disbanded soldiers who have been long lurking in this Province, and who have nothing to expect but from confusion, bloodshed and rapine. We are indebted to the Philanthropic and venerable functionary in question for undeniable evidence, that these men have completely undermined the city, and that with a view to inundate it, the canals already mentioned were prepared. These have not yet been thoroughly examined, or explored to their sources; and it cannot consequently be with due precision ascertained whether we were to have been overwhelmed by the torrent of Chaudière or the cataclysm of Montmorency. Certain it is, however, that one of these falls was to have been conveyed to the Citadel for the purpose of destroying the garrison and overawing the loyal inhabitants of the capital; whilst the wooden plugs were to have been withdrawn, thereby affording a free admission to the waters, which would have flowed without resistance, and thus have washed the entire community into irretrievable ruin.

The egg of Columbus was not more illustrative of the difficulty of great conceptions than the simple fact which has now been recorded, and both confer imperishable celebrity on their authors. But to return—the conspirators it appears have had treatable negotiations with the great Mogul on the one hand, and the claim of Prætor on the other, with the intention of parcelling out the country between these two great Potentates. This they are supposed to have done, for the purpose of preserving a kind of balance of power, as these desperate doers have some English notions with all their ferocity. But it is awful and appalling to reflect that in the event of its invading us we shall be exposed to all the horrors which the descendants of Jenghis Khan and the countrymen of Lamelaque can contrive to accumulate on the heads of a devoted people.

It is proper to apprise you, Sir, that intelligence which can be relied on has been received, by which it appears that the fleet of the great Mogul, which was sent overboard from India at a most dangerous season is now hovering on the tops of the rocky mountains; and that 50000 horse commanded by the famous General Anoufawin-Ahamed Khan, son and heir apparent to his Fararwan Majesty, are now manoeuvring on the Banks of Newfoundland, ready at a moment's notice from the conspirators, to poance upon this unhappy country.

In the midst of all our afflictions it is consolatory however, to reflect that we shall reap every possible advantage, from the warm friendship and strict union subsisting

between certain of our civil and military worthies between whom, congeniality of sentiment, and mutual good offices have cemented an *offensive alliance*. To this happy understanding indeed between the high contracting parties, we are indebted under God, for the safety which we now enjoy in despite of our external foes and the machinations of the wretches whose diabolical designs have aimed at nothing less than our utter extermination. It cannot be considered as surprising, Sir, that a conspiracy like this, exceeding that of *Cato street in atrocity*, should have been followed by an attempt to which in the emphatic language of one of our Magistrates, *the late attack upon the Barracks at Knightsbridge is not to be compared*. How much we have been endangered is not as widely and as generally known as the importance of the fact requires. We have had a contest Mr. Editor—a dreadful, murderous contest within our very walls—one in which the white advanced guard of the Calmucks, led on by chiefs of desperate fortunes and remorseless ferocity, attacked one of the *châteaux de-frise* in question, with a courage and determined worthiness of a better cause.

To vulgar optics these intrenchments assume the appearance of ordinary wooden boxes; but the gallant veteran whose name has graced the judicial *if not the military annals* of this country, threw himself manfully into them, and kept the enemy at bay until joined by his ally of the *useful countenance*, with whose assistance he succeeded in frustrating a premature and ill concerted attempt to destroy the city by means of the *obnoxious plugs, sluices or canals* in question. The contest was long, violent, and doubtful since alas neither civil or military authority can always confer victory, nor render men invincible; but it eventually terminated in the total defeat of the *Conspirators*, who with their *Calmuck Confederates*, fled howling and dismayed to the dens from which they had issued.

The Allied powers being thus left masters of the field of battle, hastily threw up a fresh breastwork to protect them from the incursions of the enemy, doubled all the guards, and retired to refresh themselves after their martial toils; but as it was found that a military guard with fixed bayonets was not sufficient effectually to protect these intrenchments, they were immediately surrounded by a strong detachment of three thousand men in complete armour. It is said that the very glance of these warriors intimidates their adversaries, but their tone certainly produced a sensible effect upon the nerves of some *Calmuck women* who were taken fighting in the ranks with their husbands, and who fell into the hands of our municipal hero whose benignant aspect never glowed with more of generosity and magnanimity than upon this memorable occasion.

To conclude, Mr. Editor, I shall barely add a syllable of advice. Our situation is critical in the extreme—surrounded by foreign and domestic enemies, our councils are distracted, and we know not where the storm will burst. I know of no parallel to the present emergency, except that of a Society which was saved in nearly as desperate an exigency by a timely application of severity.

"*Silent Leges inter arma*" was then the maxim of a *quandam* arbitrary, but even illustrious worthy, and it is still reverberated by the delighted echoes of the North.

I avail myself of the precedent to recommend the revocation of Magna Charta and the Bill of rights, the suspension of the Habeas Corpus Act, the declaration of martial Law, and the creation of a Dictator. He (I mean our Dictator) will then have it in his power to drag every demonstration of persons from the bosoms of their families, either to extort unwilling and sometimes impossible testimony, or to commit them to duress; he will be enabled to terrify the young and the weak, and to ruin the defenceless with impunity.—In fine Sir, he (I still mean our Dictator) will fine, imprison, whip, and behead us, according to his unerring wisdom. Without the tedious process of the law and the cumbersome appendage of Juries, he will make a perfect Consul of our city, and then who can cease to be warned and animated by genuine loyalty and veneration for his King, or insensible to the benefits of that glorious form of government—the English Constitution.

Montreal, Nov. 6.

The trial of Mr. Samuel Hull Wilcocke, for forgery, took place on Friday last; the verdict given by the Jury upon the evidence, was—Not Guilty.

Lieutenant Creighton, 70th Regt. arrived here from Quebec last Sunday night, on his way with government dispatches to New-York, where he is to wait the arrival of the November Mail. Yesterday afternoon, he proceeded hence to the United States, in company with James Buchanan, Esq. and the Catholic Bishop of Philadelphia, who came in the same Steam-boat from Quebec. It is said that a British Officer will be sent to the States, for the December, January and Feb. Mails.

The spirit of speculation in bread-stuff has been much more moderate here than amongst our neighbours and has much abated; partly from an apprehended scarcity of freight, but principally because authentic information has, (we learn) been received from G. Britain, announcing that the damage done to the harvest is much less than was at first supposed, two thirds of the grain being saved safely housed before the great rains. Besides there is, it is said, a large surplus from last year in the hands of the British farmers, who have eagerly magnified the disaster through interested motives. That the ports will open for foreign grain, is now considered doubtful by our coast heads. Prices here: WHEAT, 3 6d per bushel; FLOUR, superfine, £1 10; fine £1 7 6; middling £1 5, barrel.

It was yesterday mentioned to us, that his Excellency had been pleased to appoint a Committee of twelve Barristers for the purpose of a certain of the most eligible places in the district, to make the seat of County Courts; the names of two gentlemen were even called to us, but upon further enquiry we did not find the account corroborated. Its expediency, however, forms a strong presumption of its adoption.
