How much money is needed for a trip abroad is a question asked frequently by those who are thinking of summer vacations. Like that other popular question as to how much is enough to marry on, it admits of many answers.

Everything depends on the manner in which the tourist lives and travels abroad. If instead of first class he buys third class railroad tickets, which will carry him over the same route as the first class, but at a lower price, the difference between the first, second and third class fares is absurdly great.

At a boarding rate, one can count on \$1 a day as the minimum, although it can be done for less, but not very graciously. In both Paris and London excellent food and accommodation is to be had at that price.

Some travellers accomplish the miraculous in this matter of economical travelling abroad. One woman, who is a most successful business woman, writes to a friend from Rome:

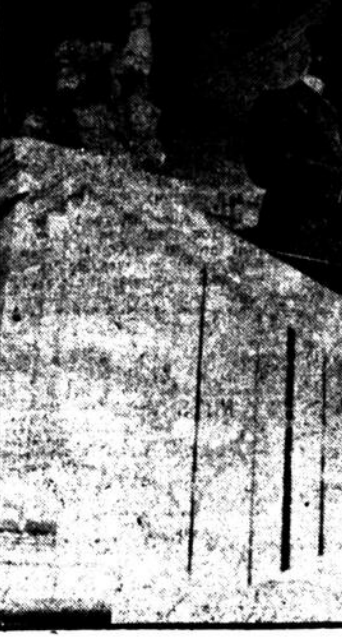
"I can now understand why so many people who are so successful in business do not travel. It is to this delightful and interesting place that I have not yet been. Since August I have not spent \$400 and I have travelled all over Europe. I went to Dublin for the exhibition, and then to Cork and then to Liverpool, and went to London for six weeks. I stopped at the Hotel Hendon, which is in Bloomsbury and then went to Paris and remained there three months.

"From there I went to Nice and stayed a month, then to Genoa for two days, to Rome, to Naples, where I stayed so long that I stayed a month; then back to Rome, and I will be here good enough to Genoa for two days, to Venice, Switzerland and Germany for the summer.

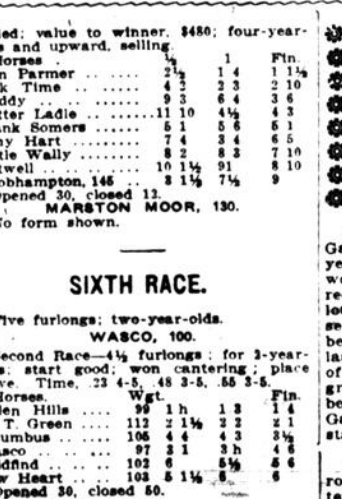
"I shall make the entire trip very soon, for I have never before. I think it a wonderful thing. I said I would do it on this amount when I came away, as I had had a bad year on the ranch, only one cutting of hay, and I had to be content with my sheep, only at good places and have met charming people.

"In London I paid five shillings a day, including all the expenses of five francs and about thirty centimes a day for light—a first class place—about forty people. I had the smallest room in the house, but was very comfortable.

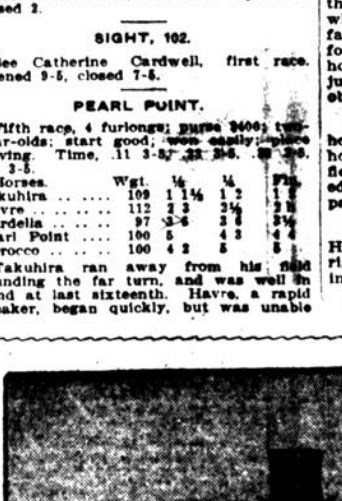

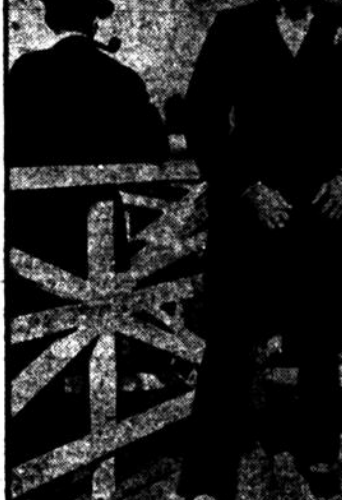
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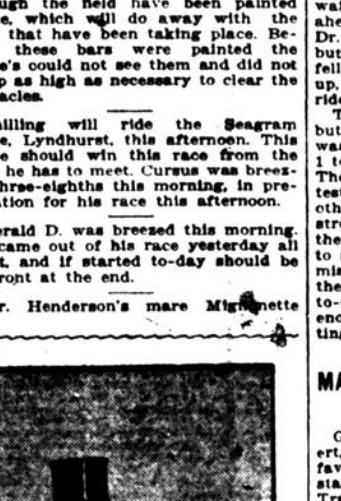
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MEETING OF RUNNERS HELD LAST NIGHT AT THE Y.M.C.A.

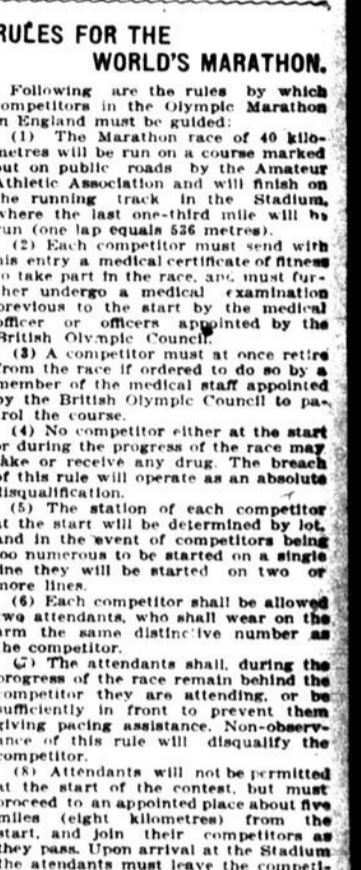
STEEL BELTING FOR DRIVING MACHINERY.

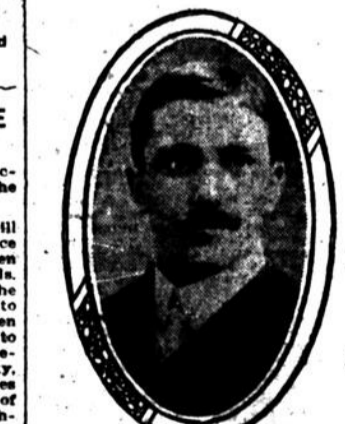
