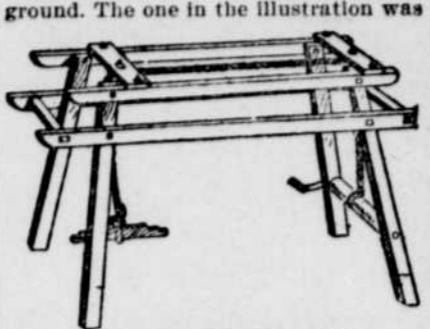

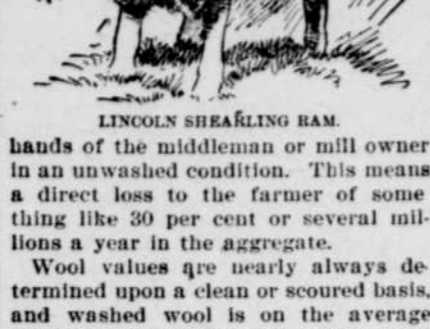

FARM FIELD AND GARDEN

IRRIGATION SUPPLIES.

Pumping From Wells and Streams. The Various Motors in Use. Sinking wells into water bearing strata to secure irrigation supplies is being resorted to as never before.

Over large areas of the country wind mills are used as motors for irrigation pumps. They unquestionably serve an excellent purpose, under favorable circumstances, up to the limits of their capacity, but irrigation for fruit growing, except in the family garden or on small areas of small fruits, is proceeding upon the basis of motors of higher efficiency.

Where large streams are adjacent to fruit lands and diversion at a sufficiently high level is not practicable, elevation by pump to a proper point for gravity flow or direct application from the discharge pipe of the pump is being largely resorted to.

A very interesting way for taking water for irrigation when the river is running high between levels which protect reclaimed land is the use of siphons over the crowns of the levees.

Hydraulic rams are also used to a limited extent where conditions favor them.

To Cure Insomnia.

An English physician of distinction gives these suggestions for cure of insomnia: In cases where the patient sleeps for an hour or two, then awakens with a start and cannot go to sleep again the physician recommends that a hot water compress be laid on the abdomen. When one cannot go to sleep on retiring and is unable to dismiss thoughts that have occupied the day, it is advised that the patient keep his feet in water as hot as he can bear comfortably for ten minutes before going to bed. He should then put on a pair of thin cotton hose wrung out of cold water and over those a pair of woolen ones. A more powerful remedy is a mustard sitz bath, with the proportion of a teaspoonful of mustard to a gallon of hot water. He should remain seated in the bath from 10 to 20 minutes. In many cases a reclining bath in tepid water is useful as a sedative.

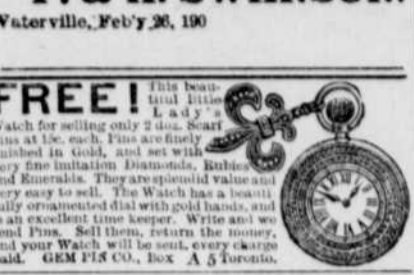

MR. H. C. WILSON DEAD.

Word was received in Sherbrooke yesterday of the death at Compton of Mr. H. C. Wilson, a gentleman long and intimately connected in business life in this city and widely known throughout the Townships. The medical examination of his body established by him shows that his foundation was well laid, and it has grown to be one of the most thriving in our city, and now carried on by the sons of the deceased.

Mr. Wilson was a public spirited citizen and took an active interest in everything that tended to up-build and benefit the town; he was a Justice of the Peace, member of the Board of Trade, and for several years an active and valued member of the Protestant School Commissioners.

Shortly after the death of his wife he retired from active participation in business and lived with his son-in-law, Mr. B. Hitchcock, at Compton, and it is only within a few weeks that he showed signs of failing health, passing away yesterday in his 74th year.

The subject of this sketch was born in Bradford, Vt., in 1827, and came to Canada with his family when quite young, settling at Moe's River where he lived several years engaged in farming. He had, however, a great liking for music and his work in leading choirs and teaching schools will be remembered by the older people of the Townships.

He began the selling of musical instruments in 1858 and removed to Sherbrooke in 1870 and continued from then on till he retired from active work some three or four years ago.

Mr. Wilson married in 1850, Miss Buckman of New Ipswich, N. H., by whom he had several children, those now living being Mrs. B. Hitchcock, of Compton, two sons in the west, and Messrs. Walter H. and Frank B. Wilson who are carrying on the business.

The funeral will take place Saturday (to-morrow) afternoon at 3.10 o'clock from the Grand Trunk Station, Sherbrooke, to Plymouth Church, of which deceased was a member, and thence to Elmwood cemetery where the remains will be laid beside those of his late partner in life.

The Santa Maria Derelict.

Of all the devilish, cold blooded things done by men you will have read of few to equal what took place aboard of the Spanish merchantman, the Santa Maria, in the year 1802. It was published in the papers at the time, but only a partial account, and as we had war and excitement at home the incident was soon forgotten.

One of the oldest business houses in Mexico up to the date above named was that of the Spanish house of Gahera & Co., founded 75 years previously. The business of this house was banking, mining, merchandising and cattle raising. It had a dozen branches in Mexico, and it had dealings with half a dozen countries. In a financial sense it was stronger than the government, and its yearly profits footed up an enormous sum. A son of the founder had succeeded to the management, and when old age came he turned the active work over to a cousin named Alvarez. The new manager was a young man of 25, born in Spain of a fine family, and had been educated for the priesthood. He was a man without a vice. Such was his probity that he was called "Holy Alvarez" even in his youth. At an enormous salary and with autocratic powers young Alvarez took over the management of affairs in Mexico, and almost as soon as he stepped foot on North American soil a change took place in his character. He began to drink, gamble and play fast and loose. At about that time a noted French adventurer appeared at the Mexican capital and Alvarez speedily became his favorite.

Of course there was gossip about the new manager, and there were those who predicted that his extravagances would ultimately bring ruin to the old house, but there were no official complaints. He knew little or nothing of business, but he did know how to spend money royally, and in a year he had people guessing how much longer it would take him to bankrupt the house. It was after the balance sheets had proved to him that he was spending more than the profits of the house and was a debtor to an enormous amount that he set about preparing a grand coup. The Spanish merchantman was loaded with a consignment of gold, silver, copper, furs and dyestuffs for Spain and the cargo seemed to the last cent. Alvarez took to his confidence a young man named Prado, and when the Santa Maria sailed his confederate went with her as supercargo. The ship was manned by a crew of 14 men, all Spaniards. Thirty days after her sailing to the southward the American bark Homebound left the port of Valparaiso homeward bound. We had been out three days when we ran into a dead calm, with the weather so terribly hot that the deck planks smoked in the sun. As we lay heaving on the ground swell a small boat drifted into view. It seemed to be empty, and it had been in sight for two hours and was not over half a mile away when the captain decided to pick it up. A boat was sent off, and when she returned with the stranger we had a sad spectacle under our eyes. There was a dead man lying at full length under the thwart. He had not perished for lack of food or water, as the boat was well supplied. It was sickness of some sort that had brought his end, and the hot sun had baked and shriveled his body until the sight was not one to look at twice. As there was no evidence that a second person had occupied the boat, we inclined to the belief that a malicious crew had sent their captain adrift. There were some who thought he might have been blown off the coast, and yet in that case it did not seem as if the craft would have been stuck with food and water as she was.

We gave the corpse burial and hoisted the boat aboard, and two days later the puzzle was solved. We had caught a breeze and made a run of a hundred miles when we sighted a derelict. She was a square rigged ship with all sail taken off her and was driving away broadside to wind and sea. It was plain that she had sprung a leak, but she was by no means waterlogged. We ran down and hailed her, and getting no answer, the mate was sent to board her. I was one of the crew of his boat, and the sight we saw as we climbed over the rail was one never to be forgotten. Five men lay dead on the decks, and the corpses were in a far worse state than the one in the boat. You could tell at a glance that the dead men were Spaniards, and yet their hands and faces were as black as a shoe, and the bodies had shrunk

Clay's First Speech.

Henry Clay as a young man was extremely bashful, although he possessed uncommon brightness of intellect and fascinating address, without effort making the little he knew pass for much more. In the early part of his career he settled in Lexington, Va., where he found the society somewhat congenial, though the clients seemed somewhat recalcitrant to the young lawyer. He joined a debating society at length, but for several meetings he remained a silent listener.

One evening, after a lengthy debate, the subject was being put to a vote, when Clay was heard to observe softly to a friend that the matter in question was by no means exhausted. He was at once asked to speak and after some hesitation rose to his feet. Finding himself thus unexpectedly confronted by an audience, he was covered with confusion and began, as he had frequently done in imaginary appeals to the court, "Gentlemen of the jury."

A titter that ran through the audience only served to heighten his embarrassment, and the obnoxious phrase fell from his lips again. Then he gathered himself together and launched into a peroration so brilliantly lucid and impassioned that it carried the house by storm and had the cornerstone to his future greatness, his first coming to him as a result of this speech, which some consider the finest he ever made.—Collier's Weekly.

Odd Ideas of Providence.

The temperance lecturer, John B. Gough, had occasion in one of his addresses to refer to the indiscriminate and arbitrary yet consoling doctrine of Providence. He said: "Some people have strange ideas on this matter. Once when a ship was in danger at sea, the captain in great distress, 'We must trust in Providence, madam,' said he. 'Goodness gracious, is it as bad as that?' she cried.

"A washerwoman had her little shanty burned down. She stood before the wreck and, lifting her eyes to heaven and shaking her fist, exclaimed, 'You see if I don't work on Sundays to pay for that!'

"In the fifth of Forth a vessel struck on a rock, and a tug was drawing nigh to the rescue. A boy, much alarmed, was clinging to the mast. She said, 'We must put our trust in Providence, Jamie.' 'I will, nither, as soon as I get into that boat.'

"In New York a Dutchman with a companion went into Delmonico's to get lunch. They were charged \$6. One of the men began to swear, as he thought the charges excessive. 'Don't you swear,' said the other. 'Providence has punished that man Delmonico very bad already.' 'How is that? How has he punished him?' 'Why, I've got my pockets full of his forks and spoons.'

Etiquette in 1624.

Here is a curious extract from the court regulations of the Hofburg for the year 1624 on the etiquette to be observed by officers when invited to the royal table. "1. Officers should come to the palace handsomely dressed and not enter the room in a half drunken state.

"2. When they are at table, they should not rock about on their chairs nor sit back and stretch out their legs.

"3. They should not drink after each mouthful, as by so doing they will very soon get drunk, nor drink more than half a glass at a time, and before drinking they should wipe their lips and moustaches.

"4. They should not put their hands in the dishes nor throw bones under the table.

"5. They should not lick their fingers nor drink so brutally as to fall off their chairs."
