By the above table it appears that if a mechanic, or clerk, saves only 2 $\frac{3}{4}$ cents per day, from the time he is 21 until he is three score and ten, the aggregate, with interest, will amount to \$2,900; and a daily saving of 27 $\frac{1}{2}$ cents reaches the important sum of \$29,000. A six pence saved daily will provide a fund of nearly \$7,000—sufficient to purchase a good farm. There are few employees who cannot save daily by abstaining from the use of cigars, tobacco, liquor, etc, twice, or ten times the amount of the six cent piece. Every person should provide for old age, and the man in business who can lay by a dollar a day will eventually find himself possessed of over \$100,000.

GAME AND FISHERY LAWS.

In the Province of Quebec the close season for Elk, Moose, Cariboe, Deer, Tawn or Hare is from the First of February to 1st Sept. For Grouse, Plarmigan, Partridge, Woodcock and Snipe from first of March to 1st. Sept. For wild swan, wild goose, wild duck, Widgeon and Teal from first of May to first Sept. west of Three Rivers, and 15th May to first Sept. of same place. Neither is it lawful to Kill any of the above birds between one hour after sunset and one hour before sunrise, No eggs of any of the kinds mentioned or any species of wildfowl are allowed to be disturbed, injured or taken. All the animals and birds mentioned in the act, except Hares, are protected from trapping. No Lynx, wild cat or Martin to be taken or killed between 15th of April and 1st. of November. Mink from 15th April to 1st November; Otter from 1st May to 1st November; Beaver from 1st May to 1st Sept; Mushrat from 1st June to 21st October, except West of Quæbec, while the time is from 1st May to 21st October. Fines vary from \$1 to \$50 and go to the informer, and in default of immediate payment the penalty is imprisonment in the common jail for a term not exceeding under this act can be set aside by *Certiorari* (*Certiorari*). An appeal only lying to the Circuit court of the chief place of the district wherein the offence was committed—No Trout (or Lunge) to be taken between the first October and the first January, except in Lake Memphrimegog where the close time is only during the months of October and November, Trouts are only to be taken by angling by hand with book and line, except in tidal water. White fish not to be taken between 19th of November and 1st December. The same regulations in force in Ontario as to gill netts and seiness appty to Quebec. Bass, Pickerel, Doré or MasKenonge are not to be taken from 15th of April to 24th of May. The close season for Salmon is from 1st September to 18th of May, for surface fly fishing, and from first of August to first of May by any other manner of fishing.

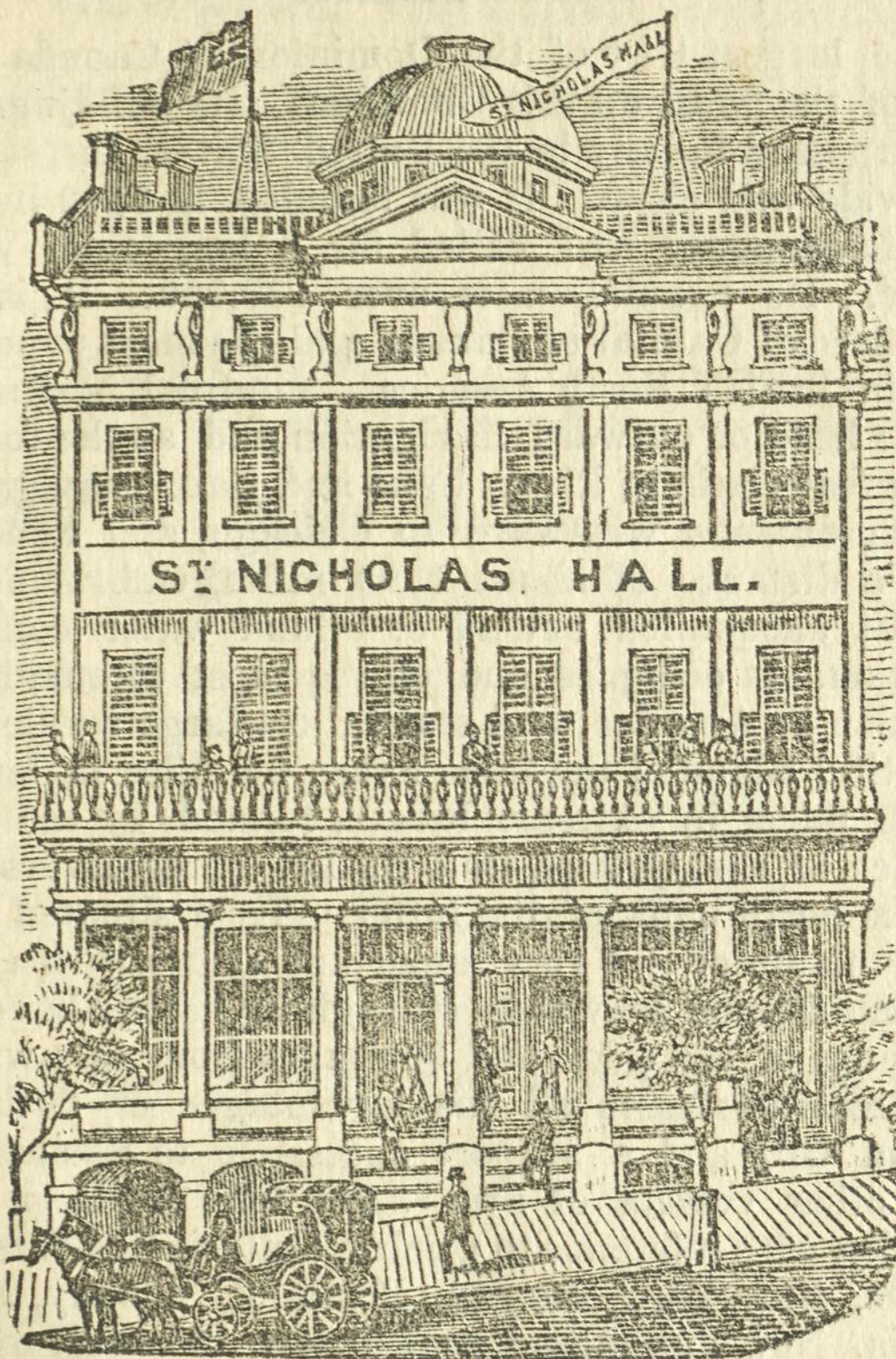

There are numerous inclined planes from the wharves by which carriages ascend to the street above and the whole for appearance, commodiousness, and cleanliness, is unexcelled by any port on the Continent. From Point St. Charles, at the head of the Harbor, to St. Lambert on the opposite shore a distance of about two miles; the "Great Father of Rivers" the St. Lawrence is spanned by the Victoria Bridge, the most costly and magnificent work of the kind ever erected. With its two long abatments and twenty-four piers of solid masonry, this great tubular bridge of iron stands a monument of engineering skill and the wonder of the world. The total length of the bridge is 9,284 lineal feet with 24 spans of 242 feet each and one (the Central tube which is 60 feet above high water) of 330 feet. Whitby and Port Perry Railways, and also with the Canada Air Line and Southern when completed; and in the province of Quebec with the Vermont Central, Stanstead, Shefford and Chambly, south eastern Counties junction and Massawippi Valley railways and with the projected lines some of which are in course of construction actually. Levis and Kennebec, North Shore Railway, Canada Central, Richelieu, Drummond and Arthabaska Counties, Gosford, St. Francis and Megantic international, and the great intercolonial. The two latter roads will give Montreal regular Rail communication with the Maritime Provinces and be the means of largely increasing the trade with St. John, Halifax, &c., &c. The St. Francis and Megantic will extend from Lennoxville to Megantic connecting there with an other line from Lincoln, a station on the main division of the European and North American Railway. Only 170 miles of road have to be built to give Montreal by this route direct communication with St. John, N. B., and reduce the distance between the two Cities to 430 miles. The New-Brunswick and Canada Railway when extended from Woodstock, N. B., will also connect with the Grand Trunk at Rivière du Loup. In the Eastern States the Grand Trunk connects with several lines branching up from its principal station and at Portland with the Allan's Line of Steamers in winter and with Steamers for St. John and Halifax the year round. The Vermont Central and Montreal and Province line railways and their connections also afford direct communication with New-York, Boston and the principal cities in United States. that of the navigation which is usually open from about the middle of April to the end of November. The Allan's line of splendid powerful fast screw steamers, performing regular mail service, ply weekly between Liverpool and Montreal in summer and between Liverpool and Portland in winter.

During season of Navigation daily lines of steamers, propellers and others vessels run between Montreal and Quebec, Ottawa, Prescott, Brookville, Kingston, Belleville, Rochester, Cobourg, Port Hope, Toronto, Hamilton, and many other lake and river parts eastward as well as westward. Montreal is the Metropolitan See of the Church of England in Canada and the seat of a roman catholic bishop. It returns three members to the Dominion House of Commons, and three to the Quebec Legislature. The City is well governed, by a Corporation composed of a mayor, 9 aldermen, and 18 councillors, has a fine police force an efficient fire brigade and the best fire alarm telegraph system in the world. It is the principal port of entry in the Dominion, and is rapidly increasing in population and extending its City limits, East, West. 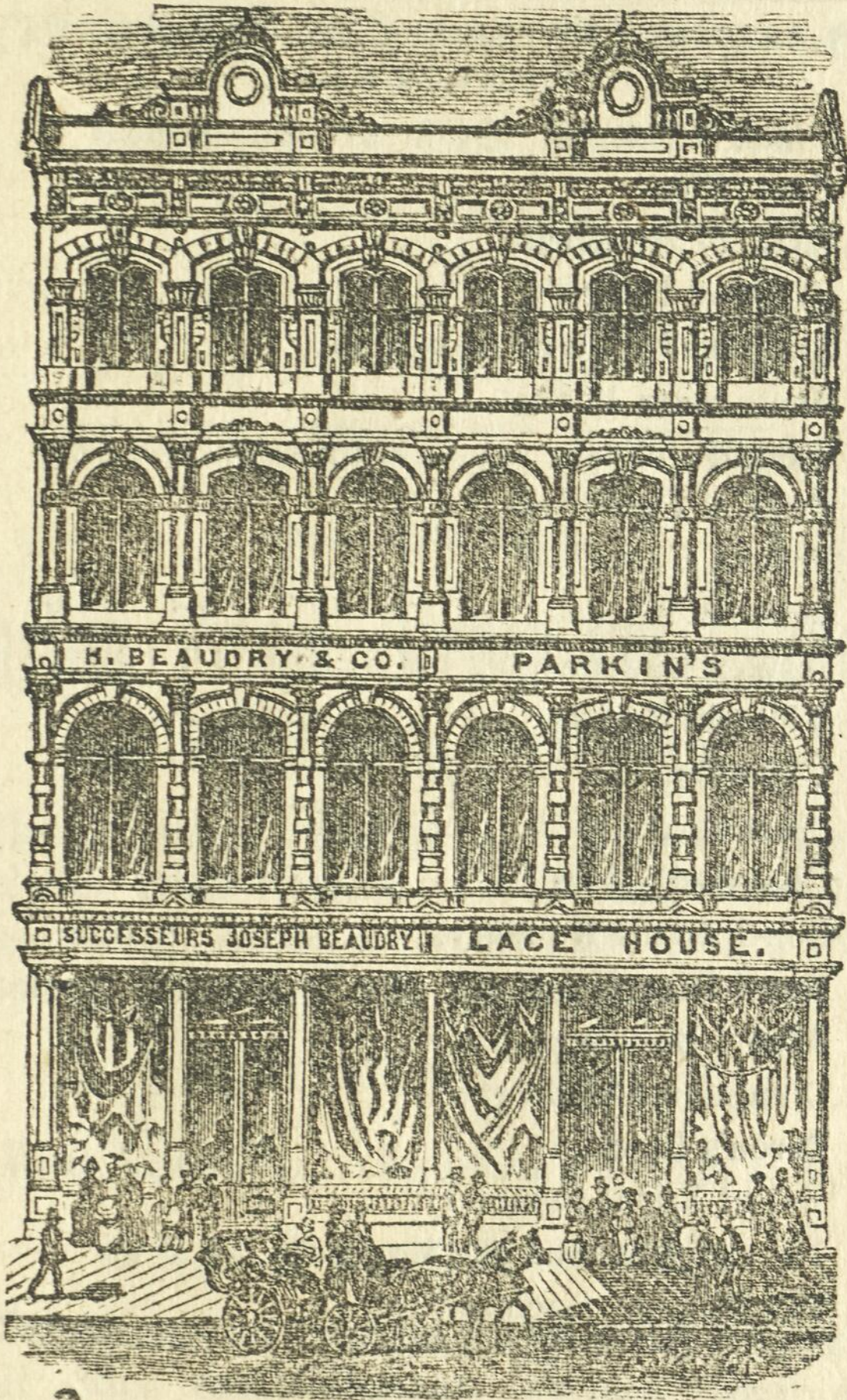
conquest left her without a british soldier. On the 28th November 1870, St. Helen's Island, the Quebec gate Barracks, the beautiful Champ de Mars and all other Imperial property in Montreal was presented by the Commander in Chief Sir Charles Hastings Doyle, in the name of her Majesty, as a gift to the Dominion Government.

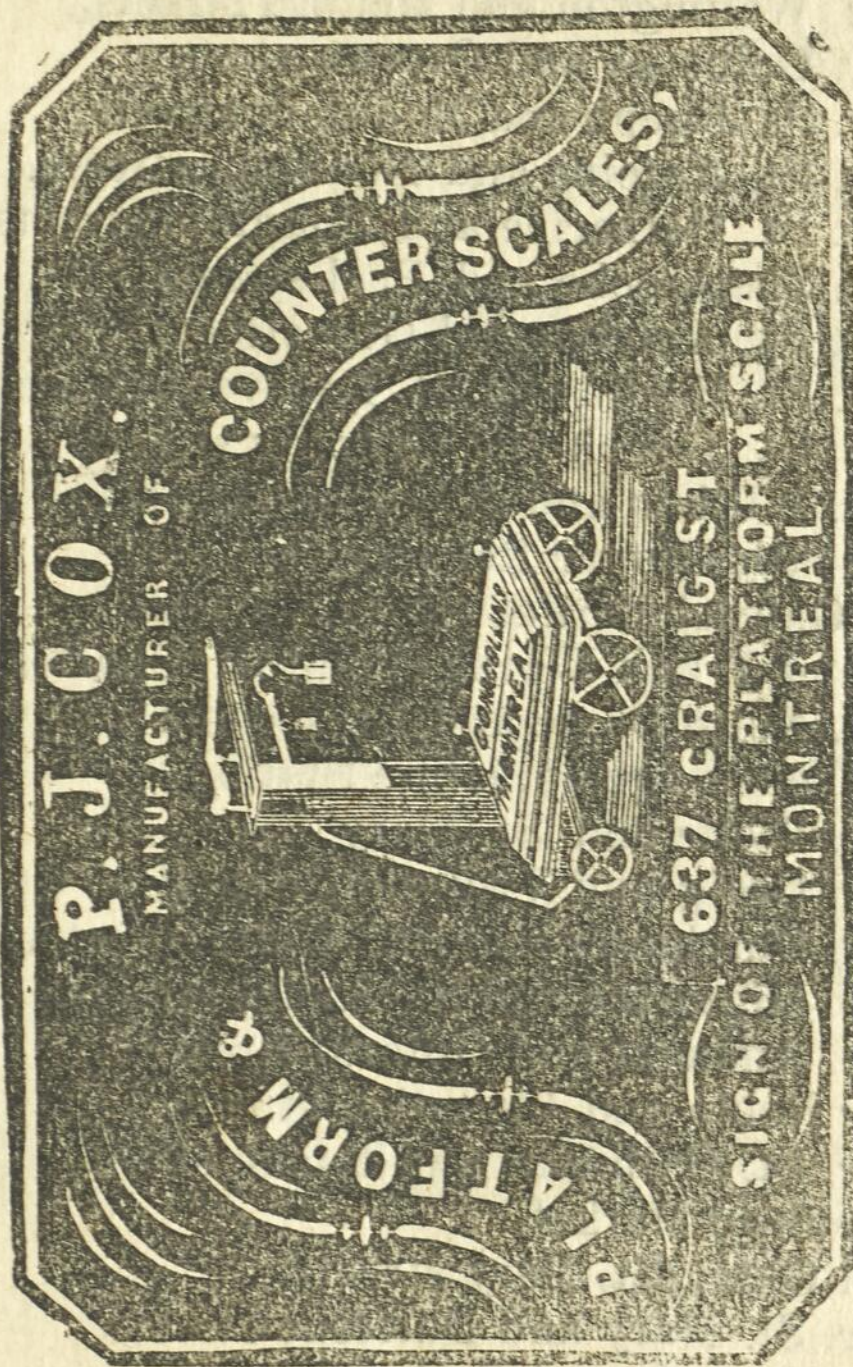

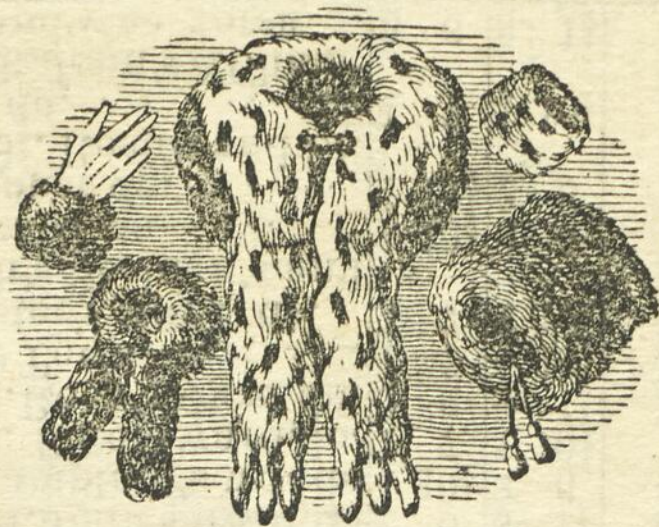

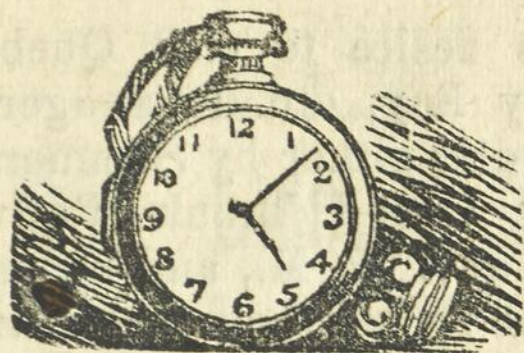

the navigation and by military authorities is declared impregnable. The city is reputed to have derived its name from the words "Quel Bec" the exclamation of its adventurous discoverers when first its sight broke on their astonished view. Quebec has a very grand and imposing though somewhat confused appearance quite in keeping with the broken, bold magnificence of the surrounding country, which for natural grandeur is generally allowed to be unexcelled. During summer Quebec is largely visited by strangers especially Americans who take much interest in viewing the many historical scenes and objects connected with it. In wealth, population and importance Quebec ranks after Montreal in the Dominion of Canada, and as seaport third, or after Halifax N. S., and St John N. B. She carries on a considerable trade with the surrounding country and with the ports and fisheries below, but her principal business is shipbuilding and lumber trade. She annually launches a good number of vessels of varying tonnage from 1,000 to 2,000 tons or more. The building of the Gosford Rail Road and the construction of the North Shore and Levis and Renebec R. R., will prove of incalculable benefit to Quebec and add much to her commercial prosperity. Opposite the city are two flourishing towns, South Quebec and Levis, with these there is constant communication by steam ferries. The Grand Trunk Depot is situated in the latter town. From thence trains proceed to all points westward and eastward to Rivière-du-Loup. Quebec is the summer port of departure of the Allan's line of Steamers for Liverpool and Glasgow, also of a weekly line of Steamers for the Gulf Ports and Marine Provinces. The Richelieu Palace

steamers ply daily between Quebec and Montreal and during the hot months the Canadian Navigation Co., Steamers make four trips a week to the Saguenay and other fashionable watering places. Distant from Three Rivers 98 miles, from Montreal 180 miles, from Portland 317 miles, Ottawa 336 miles.

The situation of Quebec, and the scenery all around it, are, at every turn, most beautiful and picturesque. The mountains are tolerably high, and present a fine appearance in the distance. There is a very noble view from the citadel, which, as been before remarked, is the strongest post in America; and indeed, next to Gibraltar, Quebec is the strongest fortified place in the world. The view from the citadel is connected with associations of the most interesting character. Here may be seen the Plains of Abraham, where, after his bold ascent of the almost impassable heights from the river, Wolfe appeared in arms at morning dawn, and where Montcalm, with equal courage and gallantry, came out to meet him, though not compelled to do so, and where both heroes fell in the sanguinary struggle of that day,—each a bitter loss to his country, each a living name in the annals of their military glory, and both a brilliant evidence of French and British valor. The memorial of mutual valor here erected is at least an instance of generosity in rivals, which it is pleasant to contemplate. If anything could detract from the horrors of war, it would be instances like this.

The city of Quebec is one which it is impossible to approach without pleasure, and to leave without regret. Every locality connected with the place is fraught with interest to the traveller. As the limits

THE FALLS OF MONTMORENCI.

In taking our departure from Quebec, and on our way down the river, we pass this celebrated cascade. These falls, which are situated in a beautiful nook of the river, are higher than those of Niagara, being more than two hundred and fifty feet; but they are very narrow, being only some fifty feet wide. This place is a very celebrated focus of winter amusements. During the frost, the spray from the falls accumulates to such an extent as to form a cone of some eighty feet high. There is also a second cone of inferior altitude, and it is this of which visitors make the most use, as being less dangerous than the higher one. They carry "toboggins,"—long, thin pieces of wood,—and having arrived at the summit, place themselves on these and slide down with immense velocity. Ladies and gentlemen both enter with equal spirit into this amusement. It requires much skill to avoid accidents; but sometimes people do tumble heels over head to the bottom. They generally drive to this spot in sleighs, taking their wine and provisions with them; and upon the pure, white cloth, which nature has spread out for them, they partake of their dainty repast, and enjoy a most agreeable picnic. One does not feel in the least cold, as the exercise so thoroughly warms and invigorates the system. The distance of these falls from Quebec is eight miles.

romantic. The river here is about four hundred feet wide, and the height of the falls is one hundred and thirty feet.

THE ISLAND OF ORLEANS.

situated in the river St. Lawrence, immediately below Quebec, is nineteen miles long by five and a half miles wide, and, like, the Island of Montreal, is superior in fertility to the main land adjacent to it. Its present population is about six or seven thousands.

THE FALLS OF ST. ANNE.

are situated on the river of the same name, on the north side of the St. Lawrence, twenty-four miles below Quebec, and present a variety of wild and beautiful scenery, both in themselves and their immediate neighborhood.

THE RIVER SAGUENAY.

falls into the St. Lawrence from the north, at a distance of one hundred and forty miles below Quebec. This noble river takes its rise in Lake St John, and has a total length of one hundred and twenty-six miles, till it falls into the St. Lawrence. It is navigable for large vessels sixty miles, and at Ha Ha Bay, fifty miles from its mouth, the largest fleet of men of-war would find a safe and spacious anchorage. The river is very deep, and at its mouth a line of three hundred and thirty fathoms was thrown without findings the bottom; and at the distance of sixty miles from the St. Lawrence, its average depth is from fifty to sixty fathoms. The shores of this river present some of the grandest and most striking scenery in the world, rising from the water almost perpendicularly to a height of from one thousand to fifteen hundred feet; and in many places a ship of the line might run close to the rocks which overhang it.

URSULINE CONVENT

Is situated in Parloir Street. It was founded in 1639 by Madame de la Peltrie and 3 other Ursuline from Tours. In this institution the best of instruction is given to young ladies. Within the princinct of the convent lie buried the remains of the gallant Marquis De Montcalm who fell mortally wounded at the battle of the Plains of Abraham 13th of September 1759. His Excellency Lord Aylmer, governor in chief of Canada, had a plain marble slab placed in the Chapel of the Convent to the memory of this brave but unfortunate soldier with the following inscription :

Honneur
à Montcalm
Le destin en lui déroband
La Victoire
L'a récompensé par
Une mort glorieuse.

SEMINARY OF QUEBEC.

This highly useful and meritorious establishment was founded and endowed by Mgr. de Laval de Montmorency, first bishop of Canada in 1633. Firstly it was chiefly an Ecclesiastical Institution. At the extinction of the Jesuit's order, the members of the Quebec Seminary although in great distressed circumstances, threw open its doors to the youth of the country generally. Professorships were established, and all the ordinary branches of literature and science began to be taught. The building was twice burned down to the ground during the life of its founder who had resigned his bishopric and retired to the Seminary where he spent the last 20 years of his useful and pious life. He died on the 6th May 1708.

The branches of Education taught are chiefly French, English, Latin and Greek; geography, arithmetic, ancient and modern History both sacred and profane; Latin poetry; Belles-Lettres; Rhetoric and a very extensive course of Philosophy, just as perfect and good as in the first institutions of the kind in Europe.

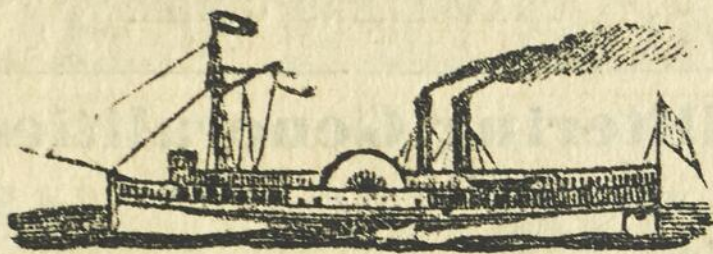

The admonition to beware of pickpockets is so state as to be almost superfluous here every body has an eye on them, yet it may not be amiss to remind you that their favorite spots for depredations are about the doors of theatres street cars and wherever a crowd congregates. Never unnessessarily display your pocket book every were.
